Those Amendments

The principal question to be decided in tomorrow's election has to do with the proposed constitutional amendments. Three of the Democratic nominees for high office have Republican opposition.

Four of these six amendments are of no particular concern of ours as they pertain to the consolidation or abolishment of certain offices in Orange, Hillsborough, Bay and Escambia counties.

Amendment No. 4 would amend the Constitution of Florida so as to provide for the appointment, by a concurrent resolution of the Senate and House of Representatives, of a director of the budget whose powers, duties, qualifications and term of office shall be prescribed by the Legislature.

The opposition contends that such a Budget Director, possibly appointed for life, could virtually set himself up as a dictator filling every political job in the state with his own favorites.

Amendment No. 5 would do away with "riders" containing appropriations, and would abolish "continuing appropriations" except for county schools, cities and counties.

The opposition contends that during its 60-day session the Legislature does not have time to consider each and every appropriation necessary under this amendment.

We are not prepared to say which side is right in this controversy. There is something to be said on both sides. If the amendments are adopted it remains to be seen how they will work.

Amendment No. 5 would amend the constitution to provide for the appointment, by a concurrent resolution of the Senate and House of Representatives, of a director of the budget.

Amendment No. 4 is an amendment to the constitution which would do away with "continuing appropriations." The amendment is in the interest of efficiency and economy.

TAMPA TRIBUNE. While it is not as seriously dangerous or fraught with such disastrous results as the continuing appropriation proposal, the amendment to Article XVI, which will be Number Fourteen on the ballot, is a bad amendment and should be rejected by the people Nov. 5.

This amendment would provide for the appointment by the Legislature of a Director of the Budget and authorize the Legislature to prescribe his powers, duties, qualifications and term of office, without any constitutional limitations whatsoever.

Because it would permit a majority of the Legislature—meaning 48 members of the House, 30 members of the Senate—to create an official die stamp in Florida, with more power than any elected official has at any composition the Legislature may choose to give.

Because it would enable the Legislature to cast aside the time-honored constitutional limit, federal and state, that no official in either the executive or legislative departments of government should hold office longer than four years and to appoint a Budget Director for any term of office or for any composition the Legislature may choose to give.

But popular I'd be if I bought one, wouldn't I, living in the suburbs with five kids, because we can't get a flat in town! Oh, a bustle's just the thing for the last crowded mid-night train back to Slough, with a good walk home through the rain at the end of it."

The show went on. Willow mannishness swayed past in evening clothes designed from almost every period in history. There were Mediceval dresses with sweeping skirts and high head-dresses.

### There'll Be Only One Thanksgiving For All This Year

WASHINGTON—This year there is no controversy over the day to be set aside to gobble the gobbler.

There are only four Thursdays in November, so Thanksgiving will have to be the last one.

The nationwide controversy over when Thanksgiving should be observed has worn a little thin anyway since Congress in 1941 set the fourth Thursday as the official feast day.

Some states continued to pick their own date when there were five Thursdays in the month. Last year Tennessee and Arkansas observed the last, or fifth, Thursday. All other states observed the holiday a week earlier.

The split grew out of a proclamation by President Roosevelt in 1939. In an effort to provide a longer period between Thanksgiving and Christmas, he ordered Thanksgiving to be the next-to-last instead of the last Thursday. In some years this would make Thanksgiving the third Thursday.

F. D. R. had acted at the request of retail merchants who thought their Christmas business might pick up if there were a longer shopping period between the holidays.

Many governors ignored the date, the last Thursday in the month, originally set by President Lincoln in 1864.

In 1941 President Roosevelt announced that the expected commercial benefits had failed to develop. Later by a house joint resolution, the fourth Thursday was set as the date anyway.

Whether Congress or state governors get the final say seems to be a moot question. Perhaps some day the U. S. Supreme Court will be asked to decide once and for all who is the final authority on declaring holidays.

Meanwhile, the Department of Agriculture says there'll be enough turkey and trimmings for everybody.

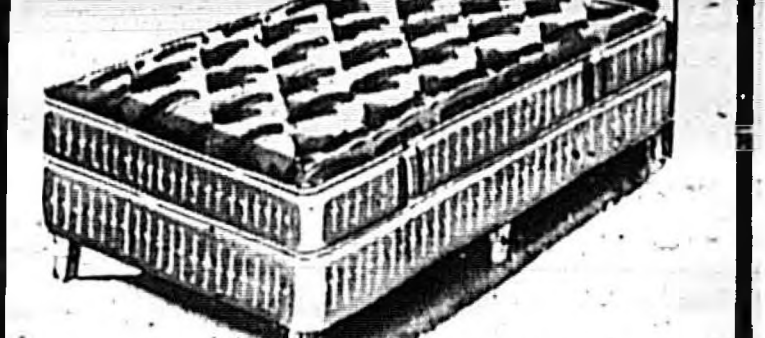

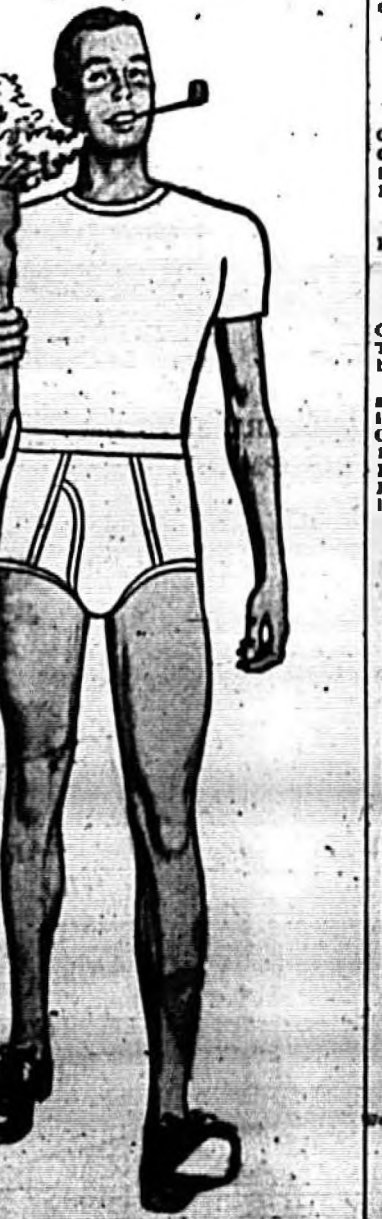

That's the kind of a job pretty, blond Mary Lou Van Ness has, as secretary to Paramount movie stars.

Mary, who numbers among her 30 bosses such glamor boys as Ray Milland, Stirling Hayden, Bob Hope and Alan Ladd, loves her job—but who wouldn't? She says:

"All the boys are nice, but Bing is everybody's favorite because he has such a wonderful disposition. He has the dressing room next to mine, and when he wants me to do something he chirps a parody on an old tune. It goes . . . 'Mary Lou, Where Are You?'"

Usually Bing knows where to find Mary Lou—in her little office-dressing room with a half-dozen stars and a multitude of problems. She may be framing pictures for Stirling Hayden, answering long distance calls for Bin or Bob Hope, dishing out the

Mary Lou, who attended St. Mary's College in South Bend, Ind. (where she studied art and planned to be a fashion artist) created this glamorous job for herself. Now other studios want her to help set up a similar system for them.

Mary Lou answers only personal letters for the stars. Their fan mail is another problem Paulette and Dorothy Lamour answer every letter personally, but Alan Ladd, who tops the mailman's pack with 25,000 letters a month, has six girls answering his correspondence.

Office work isn't all there is to Mary Lou's job. She goes shopping for the stars, drives their children to school and lunches with them when they are lonesome.

Recently she spent two days trying to find a kerosene burner for Ray Milland's yacht and one time she had to pick up 30 turkeys in a matter of seconds for a star's party . . . to say nothing of finding steaks at weird hours of the morning for expectant mother Betty Hutton.

Mary Lou's day starts about 7:30 a. m. and should wind up at 8 o'clock at night. But not always. She may sit around all evening and let a star cry on her shoulder—everybody treats her as a Mother Confessor, and a pal, Mary Lou adds proudly. 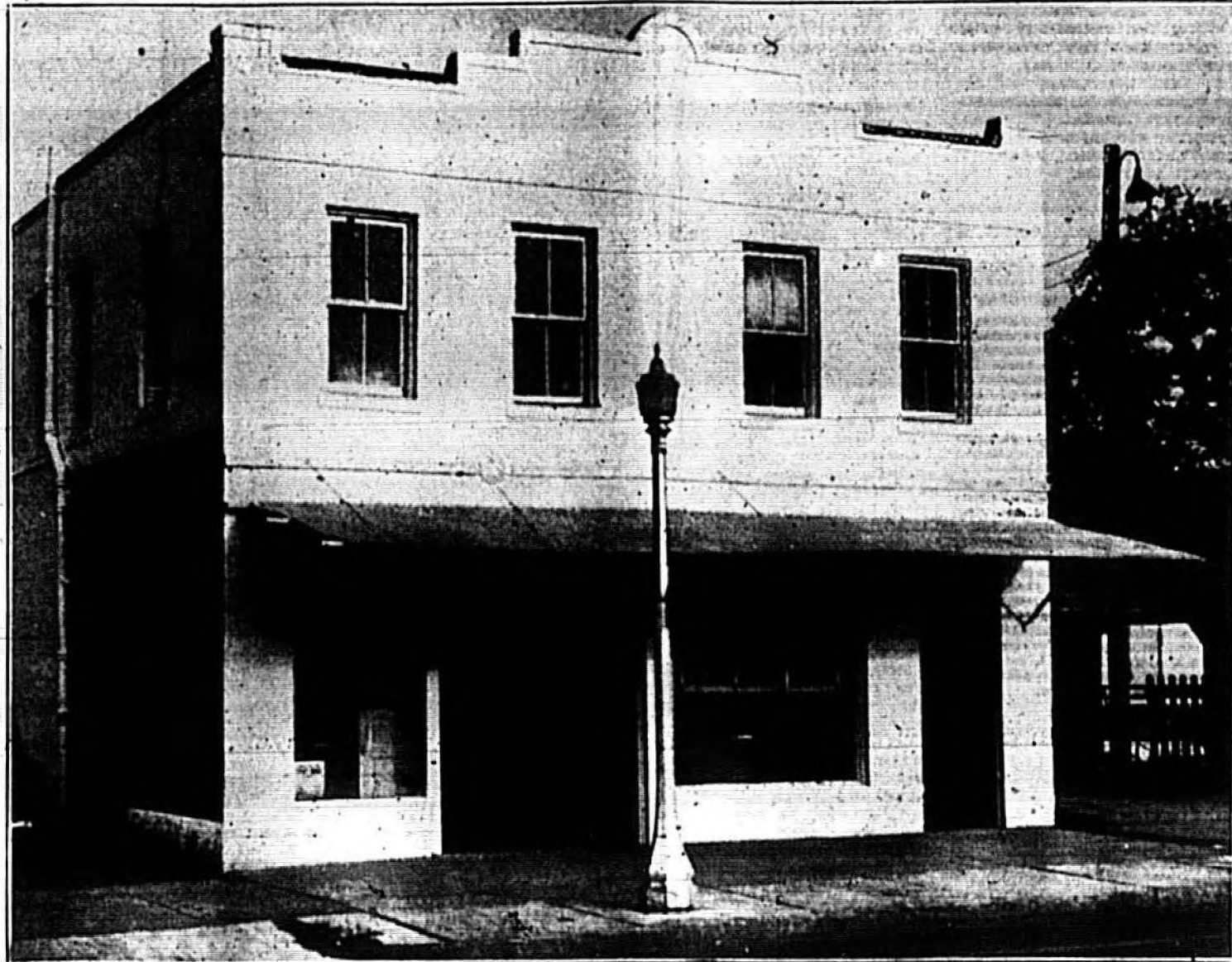

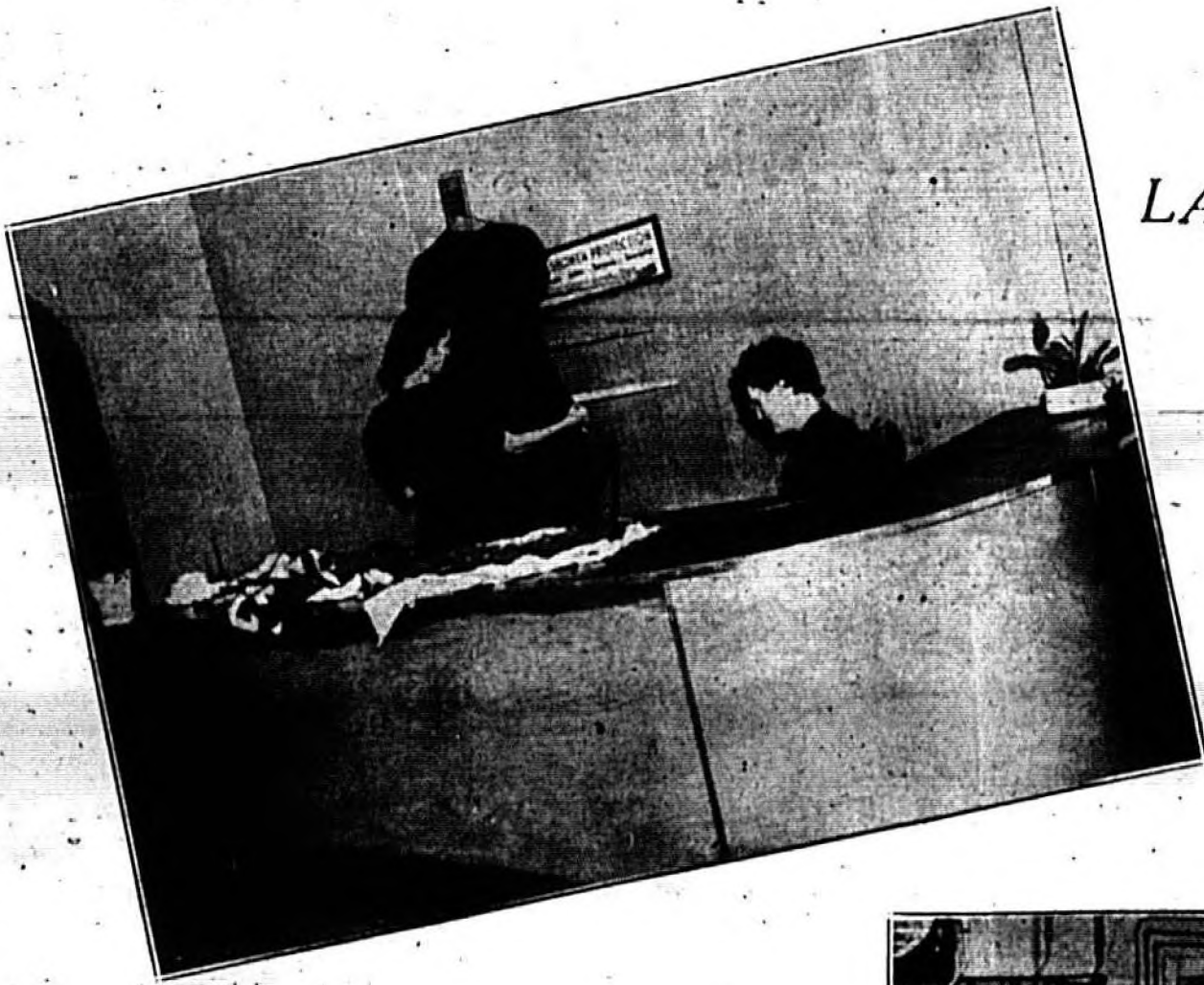

NEW YORK—The people of the west, have clamored these many years for big league sports.

Far West, through their sports have reached the big time in the business, industrial and entertainment fields, but still lag behind in the sports picture despite their two great cities, Los Angeles and



San Francisco. The former burg ranks third nationally in population, suburbs included. And the Bay Area isn't far behind.

Several moves have been made in the past to bring the big talent to the two cities. The St. Louis Browns' management, fed up with attendance which once found the 1944 pennant winning Browns playing to 600 people while riding a 10-game winning streak, tried to move to Los Angeles. Rumors had the Phillies and one or two other teams bickering for either L. A. or San Francisco.

Only in college football, with the Rose Bowl and astounding crowds at regular games, has the section reached the sports big time. But what the citizens of the cities wanted was big league baseball and pro football. They did not consider the National Football League truly national because it extended no further west than Chicago.

### Wild West Rodeo Held By Convicts In Texas Prison

HUNTSVILLE, Tex.—Cleveland Davis, serving 101 years in a Texas prison for a wide assortment of crimes, clad in stripes but with a cowboy hat jauntily perched on his head, roared out of Chute No. 2 astride a bucking-bronco named Blue Dog.

Twenty-five thousand persons rose to their feet and cheered. Blue Dog was too tough, and Davis hurtled over his head, landing on his shoulder.

He got up groggily and walked from the arena. He would return later and ride a wild bull, milk a wild cow, and try another bronco, this time one with a saddle on it. Desperadoes Enjoy It.

The cowboy in stripes was just one of 70 convicts and a handful of professionals participating in

the 15th annual prison rodeo at Huntsville.

The rodeo, held behind guarded walls and starring killers, embroilers, and rapists, is termed by many the roughest and wildest of them all. Many of the events are barred by professionals as too dangerous.

Fans pack the stands every October Sunday and the convict recreational fund is boosted about \$12,000 a year.

The convicts risk their lives for prize money, small compared with regular rodeos. But the rodeos are good for discipline, officials claim. Permission to attend depends upon good behavior.

There's excitement Galore. There's roar from the stands. Twenty-seven crazy-mad wild horses, ridden by 27 convicts in stripes, have flooded onto the field in a wild horse race.

J. W. Mann, serving a life sentence, the number 13 brazenly lettered on his striped suit, held on grimly and was one of the few who managed to finish.

The crowd cheered. From the convict section came humbling boos.

They're not booing the performers. C. C. Sprintled, executive secretary of the prison, said. "Every time an officer in uniform, like a Texas ranger or a state highway patrolman, walks in front of their section, they'll boo. They do it every time."

Where normal rodeos force a bronco rider to leave his mount, after remaining astride for a regulation period, in order not to ruin the animal for future shows, the prison rodeo lets 'em buck as long as the rider stays on, if he has the nerve.

Entertainment features have been added. The Dallas mounted quadrille staged a square dance on horseback. The champion roper of Mexico, Gundelups Partida and his horse Valentino, performed dazingly with his lasso. The Gorea girls, from the Gorea prison for women, dressed in black and orange costumes, sang cowboy songs.

But the big show, of course, is the rodeo. Well over 100,000 per-

sons saw this year's four Sunday rodeos and paid \$2 per ticket!

Huntsville, a small town, bulged at the seams each week. Front yards became parking lots, vacant lots bases for cold drink concessions, hot dog stands dotted the sidewalks, and everywhere vendors were selling prison-made novelties.

As the show ends, the crowd pours out. The prisoners stare stolidly. They will be the last to move. The guards are unusually alert.

Sometimes prison "graduates" in the crowd, or dishonest spectators, cause more trouble than the convicts. Last year, piggy banks circulated in the crowd for donations disappeared.

The event is directed by Albert

Moore and is under the general supervision of the Texas Prison Board Committee.

ence and the westerners get their wishes in the form of an All-America team in Los Angeles and another in San Francisco staffed with familiar players—players who drew crowds of 100,000 when they sparkled for colleges.

In addition, the world champion Cleveland Rams moved to Los Angeles with Bob Waterfield, a local lad, pacing the eleven.

With top-notch pro football as a starter, the west was hoping big league baseball soon would move into the region.

Los Angeles' All-America entry—the Rams—opened at home in the midst of a tremendous publicity campaign. With motion picture stars holding most of the stock in the team and local college favorites playing many of the positions, the team looked like a natural.

But on opening day in the huge Coliseum, the paying customers stayed away in droves.

Some 80,000 had turned out to see USC cavort the day before, but there were only 30,000 around when the pros took the gridiron.

It continued to get worse. The Rams drew about 20,000 in their league opener and the Rams attracted around the same figure in their second tilt. And then, after a successful road season, the Rams returned home to stage a gridiron classic in Los Angeles against Frankie Albert, Norm Standlee, and the rest of the San Francisco 'Vars.

A grand total of 12,500 showed up, including pass holders and relatives.

It has caused some people to wonder whether a town which turns out 80,000 to see a rodeo and 30,000 to meet Frank Sinatra at the train station, really is ready for the big time.

Of course, pro football has had trouble getting started in other cities, too. Many owners would have settled for a 12,500 crowd in the early days of the National League.

It may be too soon to judge Los Angeles harshly. But it is a disappointment in view of the tremendous crowds predicted before the season opened. Both leagues expected Los Angeles produce good crowds.

The crowds haven't showed up this year. But maybe they will later.

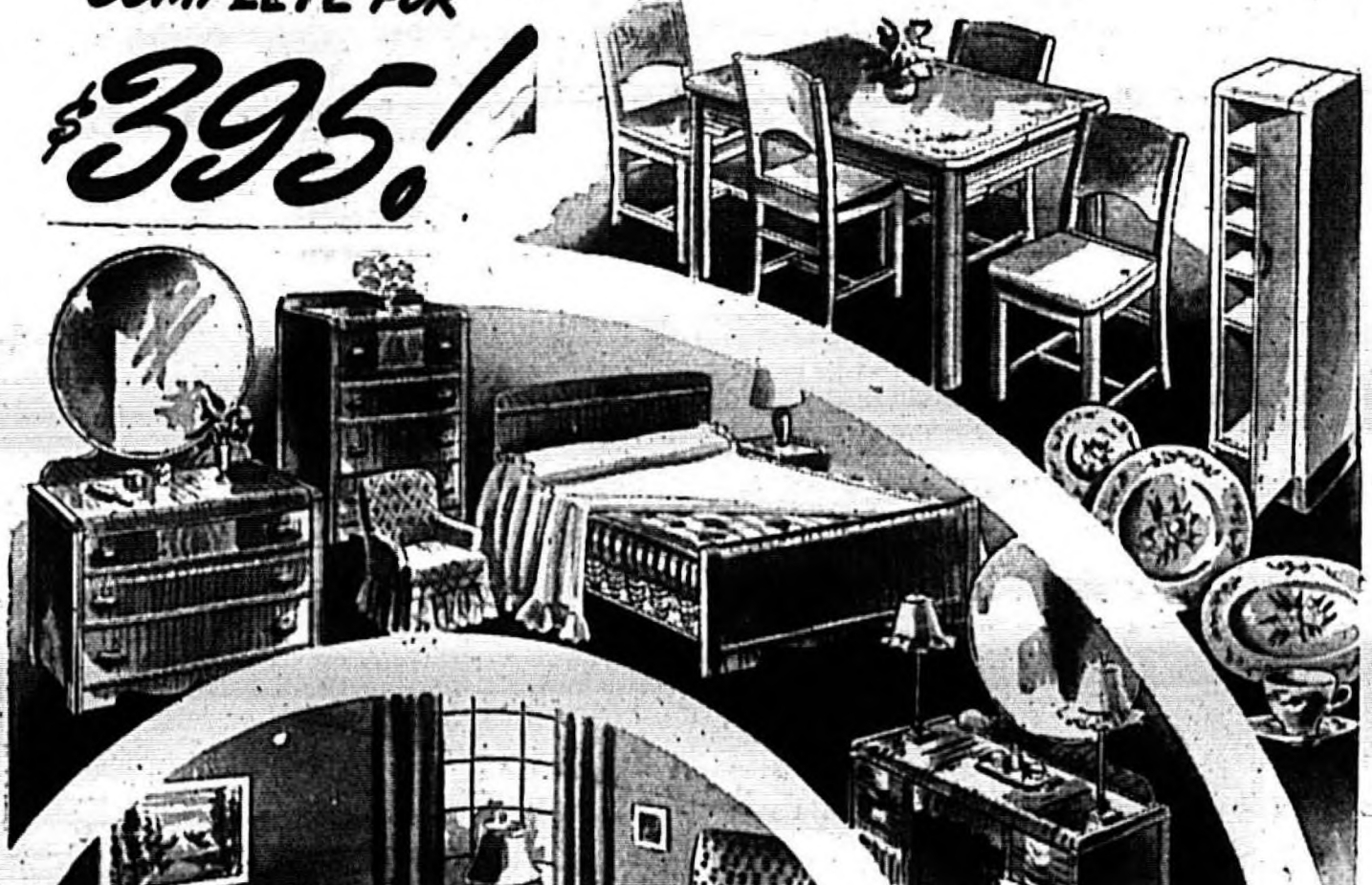

Passports Show These Americans Do Get Around

By JEAN EADS WASHINGTON, (AP)—If you are planning a jaunt out of the country you are advised by the State Department to apply for your passport at least three weeks ahead of time because of the heavy in-

crease in requests in recent months. In July 22,437 passports were issued. In August the number dropped to 18,505. Many of these applications were from wives planning to join their husbands overseas. A large number were from government officials. However, the greatest number were filed by those traveling for business reasons.

The number of applications is expected to decrease until March. That passport division, now fully staffed with 279 employees, is ready for its biggest business year yet. This is based chiefly on reports from travel agencies and airline companies.

Passports are being issued to tourists only for South American countries. But European countries, especially France, are longer to resume their tourist business.

However, an additional large number are going over on personal business to settle estates, visit relatives who fared badly during the war or to get married. Of the latter number, most are returning to wed the girl they left behind when they were sent home.

The State Department is limiting the number of passports to Germany, Austria and Japan. These countries are still under the control of the military government, and applicants have to go to the joint chiefs of staff.

Prospective travelers may get instruction booklets from the State Department on money, requirements of various countries and other data. For instance many countries require the use of travelers' checks rather than cash.

In Mexico Americans are requested to trade with \$2 bills. The State Department suggests that persons going to foreign countries take checks to safeguard against small pox, yellow fever, cholera and typhus. Some countries require proof that infectious have been given otherwise the traveler is put in quarantine for a week or two. In India there is a great fear that cholera and yellow fever might be brought

Health Division Again Pleads For Better Rest Rooms

JACKSONVILLE, Nov. 4, (Special)—For the second time this year the Florida State Board of Health is urging that restrooms, particularly those in filling stations, be kept in a more sanitary condition.

David B. Leo, Chief Sanitary Engineer, pointed out that "the tourist season is upon us and that it is necessary for the protection of health as well as the 'first impressions' of the visitors that public restrooms, usually the first stops for tourists be kept presentable."

The campaign early this year, he said, was very successful, but as summer came on "efforts in this regard were relaxed and as a result, in recent weeks we have begun to receive complaints from transients throughout the State that public sanitary facilities are again in a bad state of repair.

Leo was emphatic, however, in pointing out that his Bureau's interest in clean restrooms is not confined to the tourist season. "We owe ourselves the same sanitary considerations, and the same high standard of cleanliness should be maintained. The year-round traveler we don't get away from the fact that the tourist business in Florida is Big Business. As we travel over the State we see every imaginable sort of cleanup project in motion—and for what? Getting ready for the tourist season."

"Also, the State is spending \$500,000 annually to sell Florida to outsiders. It is the responsibility of the State Board of Health therefore to see that so far as finances will allow, that a creditable sanitary condition be presented to our visitors."

All companies have been asked to keep closer check on their local station restrooms. Naturally, all local health departments are being alerted to see that routine sanitation checks are made as regularly as their limited personnel will allow.

Clubs and service clubs are again asked to help in voluntary inspection. "Ask your members to inspect the station management when unsightly conditions are found, or to report them to the local health department."

"We need the help of every individual in furthering this statewide cleanup project because we do not have sufficient local personnel in any one health department to keep proper check on this situation. It all gets back to the economic situation—insufficient funds, therefore, insufficient inspectors. The good cooperation of the public and the oil industry along with the endeavors of our own staff is therefore necessary to do this job in a creditable manner."

Invents Electric Lock-Picker, But He Won't Sell It

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. — A Chattanooga locksmith says he has perfected a portable electric lock-picker that could be a menace to civilization.

William Miskill says his device will open the average door lock in a matter of seconds and would be a potential bonanza for housebreakers and car thieves.

But, he added, it will never be put on sale—he's a locksmith and it's his interest to preserve locks rather than undermine them. The device, the result of 19 years experimentation, consists of a long steel needle connected to some coils which cause the needle to vibrate when electric current is applied.

All Miskill has to do is insert the needle and a tension tool into the lock and press the trigger. The needle vibrates and, aided by the tension tool, forces the lock tumbler up and the door opens.

Pine Industry Puts Blame For Housing Shortage On OPA

NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 4, (Special)—Veterans of this country are still without the homes they have been promised over and over again and the prospects are hardly any brighter today than they were when the war with Japan came to an end more than a year ago.

The blame for this condition belongs right at the door of the OPA and other government agencies declared spokesmen for the Southern Pine Industry Committee on the eve of filing a formal protest with the Administrator of OPA.

"The pronouncement of an emergency by President Truman; the removal of tariffs on all lumber importations during the period of this emergency; and the wide use of subsidies, is just another evidence of confusion upon confusion," declared the Committee's Secretary, H. C. Berckes, "designed to offset the effects of many mistakes and consistent bungling. The extraordinary measure adopted, in my opinion, is just another mistake and, at best, only a smokescreen to focus attention away from the spot where the real trouble lies."

## Reds Attack Towns South Of Chefoo

### Communist Trying To Divert Power Of Nationalist Drive Toward Key City

PEIPING, Nov. 5, (AP)—Chinese Communist troops today attacked several towns to the south of Chefoo in what observers said was an action to divert government strength from its Chefoo offensive. The Communists attacked numerous towns along the Tsinan-Tsinan railroad about 120 miles south of Chefoo. At the same time, Communist reinforcements are being rushed from southern Santung province into the Chefoo area where severe fighting is raging for Chefoo and other port cities.

The government is continuing a virtually complete blackout of news from their side of the fighting around both Chefoo and Dairen. Elsewhere the government announced capture of two towns in southern Manchuria and Hopen province.

Chinese Foreign Office sources at Nanking, meanwhile, claim they have no knowledge of negotiations to be going on with Russia about Dairen. Earlier it had said the Chinese government was desiring to take over the Russian-controlled city under the terms of a treaty made in 1945.

## Former Postal Clerk Admits \$40,000 Theft

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5, (AP)—Postal inspectors today said that a former postoffice clerk has confessed to the theft of \$40,000 in cash from a mail sack in 1937. The inspectors explained that the clerk cannot be prosecuted because no indictment was returned within the three year period specified by the statute of limitations.

However United States Treasury officials are interested in the case because the man failed to pay income tax on the \$40,000.

Special postal investigator W. B. Palmer quoted the man as confessing that he split open a registered mail pouch en route from the Federal Reserve Bank to an Oakland bank and grabbed a small canvas bag containing \$40,000 in currency.

Palmer said the man remained in the postal service for two years then went into business for himself. Eventually he lost every cent of the money.

## Amendments 4 And 5 Explained To Rotarians By Odham And Ware

### Fights Crime Wave

Brailley Odham, Seminole County representative, and Judge T. W. Ware were the principal speakers at the Rotary luncheon yesterday, explaining the proposed constitutional amendments and taking opposite sides on the question. Jack Katigan, Jayce president, announced a meeting Tuesday night for the purpose of reorganizing the Boy Scout committee and urged members of the Rotary Welfare Committee to be present.

Mr. Odham, introduced by Andrew Caraway who was in charge of the program, urged everyone to take a more active interest in government operation and said that "Too many of us are prone to let Joe do it." He said that the argument over the budget director amendment boiled down to whether the executive branch of the government is to continue to control state expenditures or whether the legislature is to control them.

Pointing out that between 80 and 90 percent of all present state expenditures now come under the head of "continuing appropriations," that is, those which are re-enacted automatically every two years without legislative review, he said that even if the amendment carries, exceptions provided such as for schools, pensions and so forth, would bring only about \$40,000,000 under control of the Legislature.

Judge Ware opposed the passage of all the amendments on the grounds that the Constitution has been amended too much already and that whenever it is amended the burden of proof as to the necessity of the amendment should rest upon its sponsors. And he declared, no proof has been offered that any of these amendments are necessary.

Declaring that if the legislature controlled the budget director, it just wouldn't work, Judge Ware pointed out that the budget director might be appointed for life and no one knew what his salary would be.

Les Leaser presided over the meeting in the absence of President G. A. Speer. Mr. Leaser reminded the Rotarians of the best ride which will be held Wednesday afternoon leaving the Olsen Bridge at 2:00 o'clock. There will be no meeting of the club next Monday.

### Observers Say Constitutional Amendments In Spotlight

Voting was light in both Sanford precincts this morning and up to noon, 222 votes had been cast in Precinct No. 1, at the Old Depot, and 313 votes had been cast in Precinct No. 2, a total of 535 votes. There are more than 7,000 registered voters in the two precincts, according to Mrs. Lourine Best, county registrar.

JACKSONVILLE, Nov. 5, (AP)—As thousands of Floridians went to the polls today to participate in the first post-war general election, observers throughout the state described the election as unusual since the candidates are not receiving as much attention as the six proposed amendments to the Florida constitution.

A light to moderate vote was forecast in the state. However Governor Caldwell, Senator Holland and many Republican leaders urged the voters to go to the polls and exercise their privileges.

Here in a strongly Democratic Florida only two candidates for state-wide offices had opposition. United States Senator Holland was opposed by GOP nominee Harry Schud of Gainesville. William King, Democratic nominee, was opposed by Clifton Scalf of New Smyrna Beach for the Ballot Commission post held by Eugene Matthews. Matthews did not seek re-election.

Candidates in three of the six constitutional districts faced Republican opposition. George Smith, Miami Democrat, was opposed by Republican Norman Curtis, also of Miami, in the Fourth district. In the Sixth district, Representative Dwight Rogers of Fort Lauderdale is opposed by Joseph Moe, also of Fort Lauderdale. Representative Joe Hendricks of DeLand faces M. J. Moss, Jr., of Orlando, in the Fifth.

## Body Found Slumped Over Gas Heater With Jet Turned On

### W. E. Watson, coroner, investigated the death of Earl Jeter this morning pronounced it as "suicide due to asphyxiation."

Earl Jeter, dispatcher of the Florida Power and Light company plant, was found dead at 11 in a two-story apartment building at his home at 2411 Palmetto Avenue by H. A. Moreland who entered the garage after he had looked through the window and had seen Mr. Jeter, seated on a chair and slumped over a gas heater.

The place was full of gas fumes, according to Fire Chief Williams, who with Claude Whitcomb, fireman, tried artificial respiration method for C. L. Jeter, who soon revived, pronounced Mr. Jeter as dead.

Police Chief Roy G. Williams stated that about the same time as the fire chief discovered the body slumped over the gas heater was a three plate affair, and doors and windows of the room had been closed.

Mr. Moreland, a clerk at the Post Office, was home for lunch when the telephone rang and Mrs. Jeter told Mrs. Moreland that she was alarmed at not being able to locate Mr. Jeter. Mr. Moreland immediately left his home at 1110 Palmetto Avenue, and soon after located Mr. Jeter in the garage. A note of undisclosed contents was found nearby, according to Chief Williams.

## W. W. Thompson, A Pioneer Resident Dies In Alabama

Word was received this morning of the death of W. W. Thompson, resident of Sanford for more than 20 years, which occurred in Tuskegee, Ala., at the home of his son, Mr. Thompson had been ill for several months.

Mr. Thompson was former owner of the Elder Springs property and operated a large grove South of Sanford. He was 83 years old at the time of his death.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Sallie Thompson; three sons, Philip Thompson of Montgomery, Ala., Gaudier Thompson of Winter Haven and Cleveland Thompson of Tuskegee; and two daughters, Mrs. Olive Davey of Tampa and Mrs. F. L. Wadsworth of Tuskegee.

## 35 Million Citizens Trek To Polls In Test Of Nation's Reconversion Try

NEW YORK, Nov. 5, (AP)—Senator Claude Pepper of Florida declared today that a Republican victory in the general election "would wreck the labor laws of our country." Pepper also asserted that with a "G.O.P. victory" there would be no National Labor Relations Board after a few months.

The Senator's statement was made at an outdoor rally in mid-Manhattan. He spoke in behalf of the candidates of James M. Mead, Democratic coalition candidate opposing Republican Governor Thomas E. Dewey for re-election, and Herbert H. Lehman, Democratic coalition candidate for the Senate.

Mead has over the nation only slightly more than 35,000,000 of some 92,000,000 persons over 21 years of age are expected to participate in the first post-war general election. The largest factor in the turnout is generally the weather or but the weathermen predicted a frost throughout most of the country.

The first precinct to complete its count was Pointe Aux Barques in Hudson county, Michigan. Twelve of the 13 eligible voters voted. The straight Republican ticket and a straight Democratic ballot.

There are many hours, however, yet to go and the early hours of voting show heavy balloting in many of the population centers.

The prime issue of the election is generally expected to be how well the Democratic administration fared in its efforts to reconstruct a wartime to a peacetime economy. The Republicans predicted confidently that on that prime issue the Democrats will be swept out of power in Congress.

However, some analysts have said that they expect a narrow but contented that they will keep the legislative machinery in their grasp.

In the race for 35 senate seats at stake in today's election 16 of the most significant contests to be decided are in California, Delaware, Idaho, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming. California and Kentucky now have Republican Senators and Wisconsin a Progressive. All the remaining seats now are Democratic.

In the 33 governorship contests, 12 races are regarded as worth watching. These are in Connecticut, Idaho, Kansas, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New Jersey, New York and Oklahoma.

Some of the House contests also are regarded as having more than local significance. Altogether, 880 candidates are contesting for the 432 House seats to be filled in today's election.

Only one state in the union—Maine—will not be voting today. The Maine election was held last Tuesday. Voters chose a governor, senator, and three house members—all Republicans. These must be added to today's results to determine which party controls congress and gets the edge in state administrations.

British newspapers are worried about the economic trends which may be indicated by the balloting results.

The French press gave more space to the windup of the American campaign than to the coming national assembly elections in France itself.

A Soviet controlled paper in Berlin expressed the hope that right wing Republicans and Democrats in Congress would suffer defeat.

The only Moscow paper to comment was the army publication Red Star which asserted there really is no significant difference between Republicans and Democrats. One Rome newspaper came up with what was supposed to be an explanatory headline but it was sure to puzzle many Italians. It said: "Donkeys and elephants to govern the U. S."

## Astronomer Injured In Fall Last Night

PASADENA, Calif., Nov. 5, (AP)—An internationally known astronomer, 64-year old Alfred Joy is in serious condition today following a fall in the big dome of Mt. Wilson Observatory's 100-inch telescope.

His wife said Dr. Joy still is in a daze and is unable to tell what happened. Joy was working in pitch darkness high in the dome of the observatory and fell 30 feet.
