When you recall the extremely crowded conditions of stores the final two or three weeks before Christmas, the problems become evident.

If no early Christmas shopping were done, this condition would be multiplied many fold. (Actually there would not

be enough room behind store counters for enough sales people to serve shoppers during this period between Thanksgiving and Christmas.)

Those in the store business know that an extremely large percentage of the Christmas gifts that are selected are items that are in plentiful supply the entire year.

If you were to ask the thousands of retail employees ... (and as a group they represent one of the largest employee groups in the Seminole County area) ... they would tell you that much of the stress and strain of their Christmas would be relieved if the shopping public would anticipate Christmas shopping throughout the year. (Then, you would seldom hear your friends in retailing remark, "I'm simply worn down to my knees by Christmas Eve.")

Granted that the problem is not a one-sided one, it should be recognized that stores are faced with the problems of convenient service to customers, of maintaining helpful employee relations, of providing a place where those of the public who can not, or do not, plan ahead may select the traditional gifts for their loved ones and friends.

We are sure that if all of our storekeepers could chat with you, personally and informally, that you would be convinced of their sincerity, and that in the true spirit of Christmas they would not be criticized for their effort to perform a helpful service to their shopping public.

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Vibrating Noises Shake Seminole And Orange

Supersonic airplane boom? Dynamite blasting? Navy bombing jets? Earthquake? Moon landing blast-off? Whatever it was, the Sanford Herald's and sheriff's department's switchboards were flooded with telephone calls this morning, all with the same question: "What is that noise; vibration is shaking the building?"

Mrs. W. H. Mathews, of Lake Mary, reported three distinct sounds, in a series: "The first wasn't too bad," she said. "I thought it was an approaching freight train. The second shook the house harder. The third was terrific. The water pipes under the house vibrated. The dog started barking and wanted out of the house. All the neighbors ran out into the street."

Ray Manley, working at the Shell service station, SR 46 and 14: "The whole building shook, like puffs of wind at the back of the building. It was like a tremor. It scared me and I ran outside."

One telephone caller is quoted: "I don't believe in this business of going to the moon. Those tremendous blast-offs could have an effect."

These were the gist of hundreds of telephone calls, from Lake Monroe to Orlando, to the west and south of Sanford. The Herald spent two hours checking out the cause and came up with nothing. The Air Force at Orlando said it could be the Navy out of Mayport but "they will deny it." Persons familiar with supersonic booms reported this noise this morning was not from a speeding jet.

There were indications, however, from knowledgeable persons that it may have been a slight earthquake. Associated Press at Miami was checking seismograph stations throughout the East for any recordings from the Central Florida area.

PLACESTATE IMPACT RANGE (AP) — Navy bombers blasted their leafy practice range here today and touched off reports of earthquakes as far south as Sanford and Orlando.

The range, located in the Ocala National Forest, was pelted with bombs from an undetermined number of Navy planes.

Navy officials refused details of the training mission but said the practice bombing was the cause of the earthquake scare.

Will Trod Lunar Surface Again Spacemen Reenter 'Intrepid'

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Two American astronauts made a bull's-eye landing on the moon today, raising 15-ft national flag and exploring its black, powdery surface for about four hours.

Before returning safely to their lunar ferry Intrepid, they deployed a set of five scientific instruments powered by the first nuclear generator on the moon. It was man's second quest for knowledge on that alien soil.

The moonwalk was spoiled for earthlings when a camera relayed the first color television pictures from the surface failed after 44 minutes.

Charles "Pete" Conrad Jr., Command Pilot

Alan L. Bean, the third and fourth humans to trod the moon, were in good humor and wisecracked often as they conducted a detailed exploration of the moon's surface. Conrad's cackling laugh became a familiar sound.

They steered their lunar ferry Intrepid to a perfect landing just 20 feet from the edge of their target crater at 1:54:39 p.m. Thursday. They also hoped to have the television camera repaired in time for the second walk. Experts on the ground were working on a solution.

The nuclear generator worked perfectly, and the instruments began sending data to earth as in-noon as the unit was turned on.

After collecting a few rock samples, raising the flag and deploying the nuclear-powered instruments, Conrad and Bean climbed back into Intrepid's cabin to rest for the second excursion Thursday.

Before returning to the cabin they brushed off layers of the dark powder that clung to them. The moonwalkers originally were to have stayed outside about 3 1/2 hours. With their oxygen supply holding well, Mission Control told them to remain out an extra half an hour and in-noon as the unit was turned on.

FBI Enters Probe Of \$4,844 Holdup

The Federal Bureau of Investigation has taken over the investigation of the hold-up of the North Branch, Winter Park Savings and Loan Association, at U. S. 1742 and SR 426 at 2 p. m. Tuesday.

Sheriff John Polk said two young men robbed the branch office of \$4,844 and escaped in an automobile taken from a teller after locking five employees in a vault.

Polk said two men entered the office and ordered teller Carol Daughtry to put the currency in a paper bag, which she did.

Another man held a blue .22 caliber pistol and ordered her to hand over the keys to her 1968 model car parked outside, which she did.

Then, at gunpoint, five savings and loan employees were ordered into the vault, which was locked.

The five stayed inside for several minutes before unlocking the vault from the inside and coming out to call authorities.

The get-away car was found several blocks away parked behind American Legion Hall at Lakewood and Calvin Drives Intersection. Authorities believe a vehicle was hidden there by the robbers before the incident.

The hold-up pair are described as between 25 and 30 years and approximately 5 feet 9 inches to 9 inches tall.

They reportedly have black hair, weighing from 165 to 180 pounds each.

New Sewer System Topic Of Meeting

The new sewer system in Altamonte Springs was discussed in detail at the second in a series of public information meetings last night at the Altamonte Community Center. The forums are being sponsored by the South Seminole Jaycees.

Presentations were made by Val Robbins, of the county health department, and Harold Radcliff, of Glace & Radcliff, consulting engineers to the municipality. On hand to answer questions were S. Joseph Davis, Altamonte city attorney, and D. Kirk Gundy, fiscal agent. The speakers were introduced by James Buckridge, president of the South Seminole Jaycees.

Robbins stated that the health department has been waging "war" on septic tanks for 20 years. However, he continued, septic tanks should not be condemned as a means of sewage disposal. He stressed that they were designed primarily for rural areas. The expanded population growth was cited by Robbins as the need for a central sewage collection plant, since as long ago as 1958 1 acre were built three per acre and culled 30 gallons of waste per day.

Radcliff also affirmed the mushrooming growth of the area, with the fact that in 1959 there were 450-500 citizens in Altamonte, increasing to 1,212 in 1960 and 1,300 at the present (based upon figures of water system users). Radcliff gave a comprehensive resume of the water system and the new sewer system.

Radcliff gave the location of the site for the plant as 20 acres of land southwest of the city limits of Altamonte and north of Eatonsville.

The engineer gave some comparative figures in relation to the sewer system, again showing a trend in a projected growth. In February 1968 the projected cost of the system was \$1,131,000 which increased to \$1,734,500 in November 1969. Radcliff feels that the growth pattern indicates that there will be an extremely rapid rate of pay-off of the bonds on the system.

During the question and answer session Radcliff stated that his firm had recommended that the sewer bill be 75 per cent of the water bill, with a maximum of 21.50 per month. But users would pay 100 per cent of the water bill for sewer service.

Lawmen 'Tell Off' Attorney

Seminole County and Sanford law enforcement officials reacted today to statements made by State Attorney Albert Herring to County Commission yesterday blaming the low percentage of felony trial convictions on all county law agencies, including sheriff, police justices and constables.

Sheriff John Polk and Sanford Chief Ben Butler, in prepared statements, refuted allegations made by Herring, who is seeking \$20,000 annually from the county to hire investigators to work for his office.

Herring says Additional funds are needed to hire a second part-time assistant state attorney and a full-time investigator "since it is impossible to educate law enforcement people in crime detection."

Both Polk and Butler took issue on Herring's allegations concerning education.

Polk said, "A few months back, when the state attorney thought he was going to have the money to hire an investigator, he approached me about hiring one of my investigators."

Polk asked, "How can an investigator be good enough to hire one day and be called an uneducated police officer the next day?"

Butler said, "On several oc-

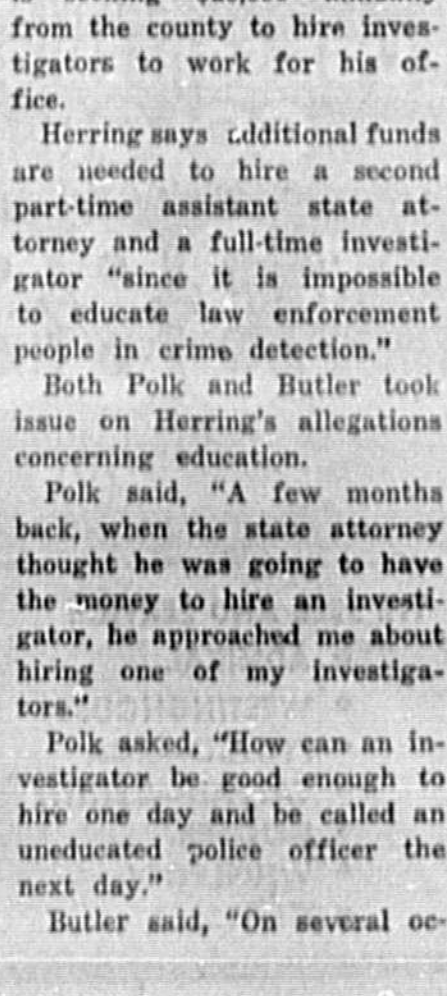

Five Candidates Voice Convictions On City

Sanford City Commission political pot is starting to boil over with five candidates for the two commission seats being held by the city's voters.

All five were "in action" last week speaking to civic groups and outlining what method each would use to solve city's problems.

A. L. Wilson started off Thursday noon in an address to the Sanford Jaycees in which he stated right away his intention to "scotch" a rumor that he was physically unable to serve another three-year commission term.

Wilson advised the Jaycees he had consulted his doctor previous to qualifying and was told he was in top shape.

The incumbent, whose current term ends in December, is looking to retain his seat, also being sought by Gordon Meyer, insurance man, who lost in his first try at politics last year when he was defeated by J. H. Craves.

Wilson has served since 1962 and was mayor three times during his tenure.

He outlined city's progress made during the years and while not claiming credit for everything, he commented, "I was there."

Wilson said 75 per cent of paved street improvements had been made in the mostly Negro neighborhoods such as underdeveloped Georgetown area.

The incumbent said he favored the proposed bus system if it can be done legally.

Meyer, Wilson's opposition, made some of his views known when he appeared with Mayor Lee P. Moore, Harry Skop and J. H. Craves before a forum conducted by the SISTER organization.

"I will not vote to give away the use of your public land to an organization," Meyer said.

Meyer said he would not support any utility services to any area.

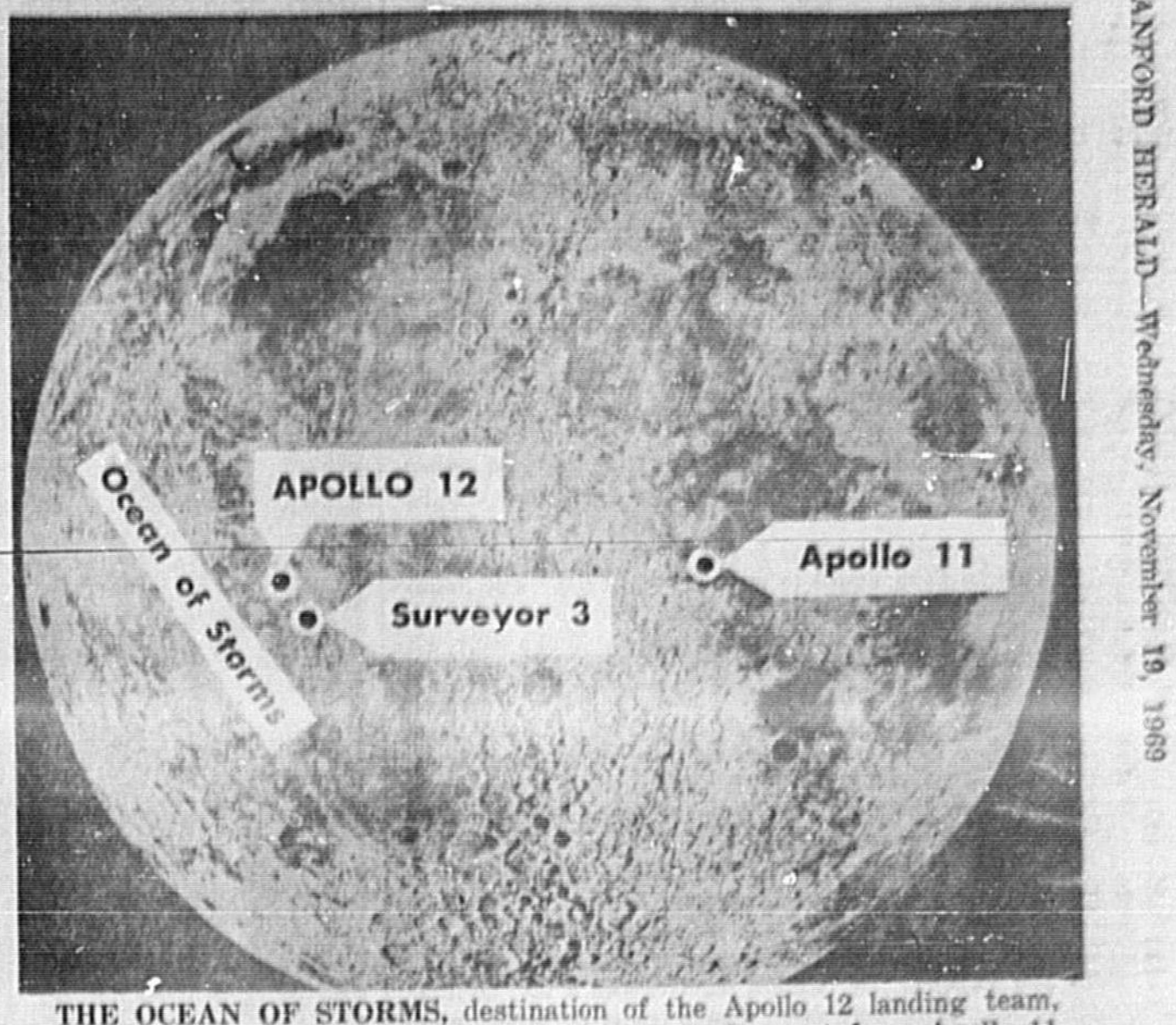

Court Hears Appeals Against Mix

HOUSTON (AP) — Thirteen judges of the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals sitting "en banc" here Tuesday more sharply challenged desegregation methods in six Southern states.

The panel heard several cases Monday and Chief Judge John R. Brown said the arguments would be completed the second day.

Rulings from the court were expected later from its New Orleans headquarters.

The Legal Defense Fund of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People is involved in 10 of the cases.

Norman C. Amaker, an LDF attorney, told the judges that busing of children should be utilized if it will help integrate schools.

Amaker said busing has been used in the past to promote segregation by transporting white students past Negro schools to attend all-white classes.

He said there was no reason such busing cannot be used in the freedom of choice cases, permitted the districts to maintain dual school systems—or "racially identifiable schools"—and that busses have not ordered them to move fast enough in desegregation as the appeals court had asked.

School districts in Louisiana, Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, Florida and Texas are involved in the appeals. In most of the cases students' parents of students or residents have filed. The LDF and the U.S. Justice Department have filed in some.

One appeal argued Monday involved the Jackson, Miss., School District. In this case a lower court refused to grant an injunction halting the construction of classroom additions to predominantly black schools. The Legal Defense Fund argued that such additions would only perpetuate the dual system. The Circuit Court granted the injunction pending the hearing here.

Another case involved proposed grouping of school children of two Marshall County, Miss., school districts according to scores on achievement tests. School district representatives argued against pairing or zoning of classes, claiming there is a wide disparity in achievement levels of whites and blacks.
