

Final Plans Are Made For 34th Safety Congress

Prevention Of Accidental Deaths Is Purpose Of Parley


CHICAGO, Oct. 4. (Special)—The prevention of accidental death even in the atom age will be the purpose of the 34th National Safety Congress, which will be held here, Oct. 7 through 11.

In announcing final plans for the Congress, annual convention of the National Safety Council, J. H. Davenport, Congress president, emphasized the need for attaining a philosophy of fully planned safety for the atom age.

"There is today no over-estimation in America today," Davenport said, "of the atom bomb. It is not a plugged nickel anymore, and that is the danger. It is to be handled in some devastated city."

Pointing to the statement by a prominent educator that educational efforts aimed at young people seem to be the best means of doing something toward arousing the nation to safety.

"All of us in the safety movement will continue to do our best to prevent needless death and suffering from the time a child is born until the time of his death. There will be no more accidents after a long and useful life. There will be no more predictions of atomic doom at the Congress. The problem is now not the theoretical future. What should we do now, much more than ever, to prevent accidents which haven't even solved the problem of using the automobile safely and soundly?"

Injury lists through most of the conference appear to be dividing this evening, as the squads get ready for the weekend tilt. For the Bulldogs, however, a coach who has been added to the sick roster, Line Coach J. B. "Ears" Whitworth has been placed under observation for an undisclosed malady at Emory hospital in Atlanta, and he probably will not make the trip to Philadelphia.

The Tulane Green Wave and the Florida Gators seem to have their game pretty well doped out. Coach Henry Frka of Tulane is putting the emphasis on passing, and Coach Ray Wolf of Florida's spring team is on a pass-doping spree. The Gators did pretty well.

At Alabama, Coach Frank Thomas comes up with a frank comment on the Crimson Tide's defense against the South Carolina 17 formation. Thomas labeled the effort "pretty sorry" as receivers gained consistently against the regulars.

There's good news at Auburn, where the Tigers are preparing to entertain Furman. Jack Cornelius, injured right tackle, has come around into playing condition. In Atlanta, the injured list at Georgia Tech looks a little better with ace quarterback Frank Broyles rapidly rounding into shape.

The current dispute in the conference, President John J. Tigert says he has sent a telegram informing the University of Kentucky that star back Ermal Allen has been declared ineligible. Some reports from Kentucky in-

cluded the wildcats were planning to use Allen on the basis of an earlier decision, which said Allen could play.


