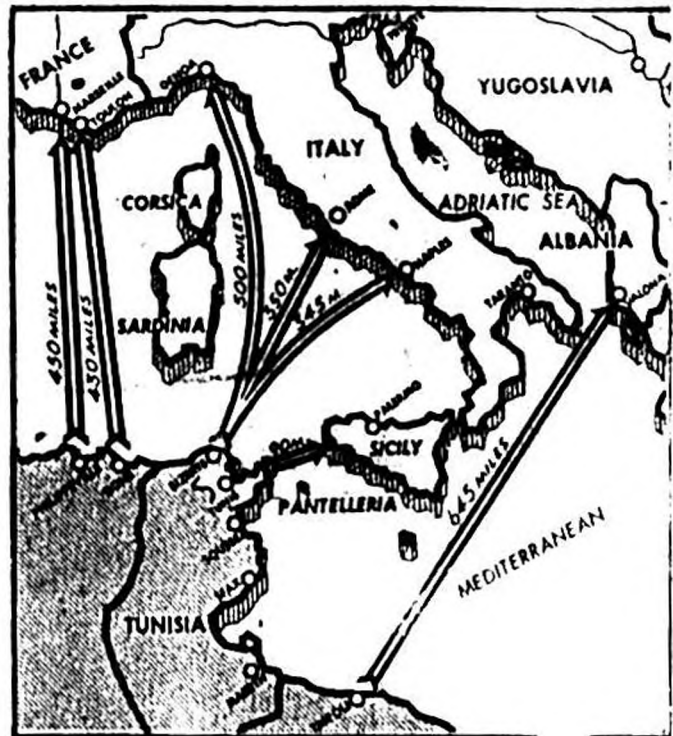

Max Rates Louis As Greatest He Has Ever Fought

But Declares That Schmeling Could Hit The Hardest

NEW YORK—There's no doubt in Pvt. Max Baer's mind as to who was the greatest fighter he ever fought. Joe Louis, the chocolate hammer who tied off Max's chin some eight years ago. But it's a big surprise to learn that Baer doesn't rate Jim Braddock, the Irishman who took the title among the top ten battlers he has met.

Baer's in the army now, an enlisted private at McClelland Field, Calif. Max is an instructor in the physical training division of the Sacramento Air Depot Control Area Command, teaching boxing and wrestling to thousands of soldiers in California and Nevada.

In a bull session with his khaki-clad mates the other day Max was asked to rate his opponents. Louis gave him his worst licking, knocking him out in the fourth round in 1936, so Max didn't hesitate in naming Joe as No. 1. Max Schmeling is second on Baer's list and he considers his defeat of the German in 1935 as his greatest triumph.

Continuing with his rating of fighters, Baer put Tommy Laurin in third place, Primo Carnera in fourth, Ernie Schaaf, fifth, Johnny Rizo, sixth, Paulino Uscudun, seventh, Tommy Farr, eighth, King Levinsky, ninth, and Tom Honey, tenth.

"That Nazi, Schmeling, hit me harder than any other man. It was in 1935—'Dempsy always told me that when a man hit me hard, I should hit him for the middle and when back. Well, sir, when Schmeling took that terrific punch at me that broke my nose—he just seemed to surround me. There were Schmeling's on all sides of me and in front of me, so I aimed for the middle, and sure enough, one back, too."

the Nazi went down. "I was at the peak of my fighting career that year—the year before I won the title. If I'd fought Louis then I'd have won. I'd have beaten him. As it was I took on the Louis fight in 1935 because there was \$150,000 in it.

"Two months before, in a match with Eddie Simms in Cleveland, my hand had been smashed and I went to the hospital. The doctors said it would take eight months to harden the cartilage; but the offer of the Louis fight was good and I couldn't say no. Naturally, I didn't last long."

Baer had plenty of tough fights in his fist career. The most grueling was in Reno, Nevada, July 4, 1931, when he fought Uscudun with the temperature 115 in the shade. Dempsy was promoted, he helped train Baer and went with him to Reno. Ancil Hoffman, manager of the Baers, and the man who really put them on the map, was there, too of course.

But it was Dempsy who gave him advice on how to fight, then turned around and gave the decision to the other man.

Max said: "I'd hit Uscudun and he'd say, 'You're a tough guy.' Finally after 20 rounds in the blistering heat, Dempsy gave Uscudun the decision. Next day, though, Jack was my best man when I got married the first time! He was my friend!"

Baer thinks it very likely some of the units in the Sacramento area will produce good fighters—perhaps even professional prospects for that after-the-war period.

"You can't tell—I might even be back in the ring myself. Most people think I'm through. Maybe I am, but if you say you're through, that's all there is to it. If you withhold a decision, there's always a chance for a comeback."

"Look at Braddock. He was a down-and-out old man when he fought me. I was going to be big-hearted and let him make ashwing. I didn't train. I was so cock-sure, so undertrained, that he won the fight after we'd gone 15 rounds." With a wide grin, Max said, "Maybe this old man will fight you, too."

Boxing Is Called Great Sport For Men In Service

NEW YORK—Boxing should be the last sport to be eliminated if it becomes necessary to halt athletic activities for the duration. That is the opinion of men stationed at the U. S. Maritime Training Station, located near here on Hoffman Island.

The latest of the sports polls being conducted by AP Features among service men all over the United States, found 1,134 members of the Merchant Marine stationed on the small island in New York Harbor, taking part.

Next to boxing, the seamen thought basketball should be the last to be curtailed, right after baseball.

Here is the order in which the men of Hoffman Island think sports should be eliminated—if it becomes necessary:

Bowling, ice hockey, golf, horse racing, wrestling, tennis, football, baseball, basketball and boxing.

In the same poll the Hoffman Island men voted on sports as to their general interest and morale value and boxing again came out tops. Basketball was second and baseball third.

The others rated in this order: tennis, football, wrestling, ice hockey, horse racing, golf and bowling.

Lt. Benny Leonard, the former world lightweight boxing champion, is director of welfare and athletics at Hoffman Island. In addition to tutoring, Leonard often boxes with the men.

"Sports, especially group athletics, are a major factor in developing quick thinking, coordination of mind and muscle, and they teach men to keep cool under fire," Leonard says.

"My thought is that if a ship gets hit, the athletic type of man will not go haywire. He will see his post, keep his eyes open and his head high. For he has been hit in the nose before and has the courage and stamina to take it and carry on," he says. "That is why I think the men at Hoffman Island will make great seamen."

Leonard tries to get every man at the base to compete either in varsity or inter-barracks athletics. His assistants are Jack March and Al Arick. March, who won the tennis title at Hoffman, was a tennis professional before entering the service and taught at various resort spots. Arick, a boxing, football and basketball standout, was well known in Pennsylvania as a basketball official.

Hollywood, May 5. (FNS)
Termining the so-called "emancipation" bill for married women, recently introduced in the legislature, a "delusion and snare," Ello Jo Stolberg, prominent woman attorney of Broward county, warns Florida married women that they have more to lose than gain should the bill pass.

Present laws, Miss Stolberg points out, protect married women against suit on contractual obligations, such as debts, mortgages and accounts and they would lose such rights under the bill.

"By becoming a free dealer a woman no longer operates as though single and can handle her own estate, while her husband must have her signature to sell his, and the bill gives no rights not now available by free dealership," she states. "Every married woman should be opposed to this legislation which offers nothing and takes many advantages they now enjoy."

In an open letter to the press an dwomen's clubs, Miss Stolberg urges women to acquaint themselves with the bill and register their protest to representatives and senators.

Mailing Restrictions Told By Mrs. Holly

Restrictions governing the mailing of parcels to service men outside the continental limits of the United States, were today announced by Mrs. M. T. Holly, acting postmaster.

"No parcel will be accepted for mailing overseas weighing more than 5 pounds or exceeding 16 inches in length or 16 inches in length and 7 1/2 inches combined. This includes parcels addressed in care of the Postmaster or the Fleet Post Office at New York, San Francisco or Seattle," she stated.

"Instructions of the Navy Department now in effect require that personnel of the Navy must contain the continental limit of the United States have their mail addressed to Fleet Post Office, at either New York, San Francisco or Seattle, and also that no parcels be mailed in any one week when sent to the same address by the same person or firm."

prices which have got out of hand. The prices of meat, fruit and canned vegetable, coffee, among others will be rolled back.

Third, to establish specific dollar-and-cent prices for foods, so that all may know-sellers and buyers alike-what the legal price is. These prices will be printed in small booklets which the housewife can put in her handbag when she goes to market, and will be otherwise displayed.

Fourth, to bring the retailer, the racketeer, the black market operator to justice. These parasites feed not only upon the consumer but upon the overwhelming majority of businessmen who are eager to abide by the law and our regulations under the law. I propose with your help to enforce these ceiling prices and to exterminate these criminal operators of the illegitimate markets.

"The main responsibility for control of the black market is with you, the American people. In a short time you will know the legal price for practically all food you buy. If you pay a higher price you are a law violator. If you are charged a higher price the seller is law violator. I do not think the United States Army could enforce price control completely without the active cooperation of the American people.

Hints To Housewives

GAINING TOMATOES
Versatile and popular for serving in its fresh state, the tomato is one of the earliest of all vegetables to can at home.

Tomatoes are not, as are fruits, therefore, they are subject to can than non-acid vegetables such as peas and beans. You can process tomatoes in a boiling-water bath instead of the pressure cooker required for practically all other vegetables. Vitamin loss is negligible. Fresh tomatoes are light-colored, deep red when ripe, and have a thick, firm skin on their value.

The hot-pack method is a good way both to can tomatoes and to give in hot sauce—imperial and that there is a selection of useful equipment. Use firm, ripe tomatoes with no damaged spots. One pint of tomatoes makes out with a weight of 1 1/2 pounds.

First, wash the tomatoes. The easiest way to do this is to use a large bowl of water. The tomatoes should be very dry when packed. They should be packed in a sterilized jar or can. The jar or can should be filled with the tomatoes, and the water should be poured over them. The jar or can should be sealed and then processed in a boiling-water bath.

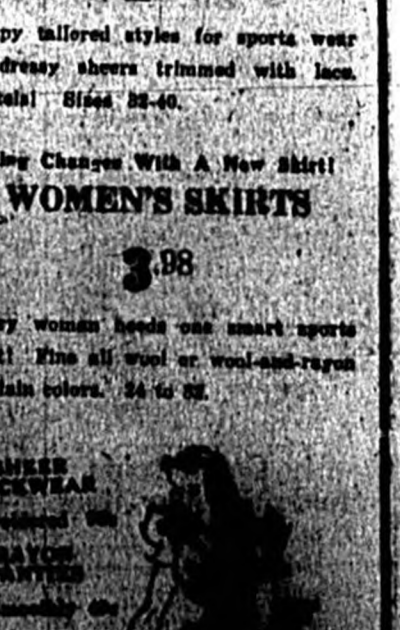

They may come this week. President Philip H. Heall of the Senate and Speaker Richard Simpson of the House have worked the two branches at top speed, and Heall has kept the Senate calendar virtually cleared every day. "We're ready to consider the when it is presented," President Heall said. "Full information confirming the accident is not yet available. "Due to wartime secrecy, it previously had not been announced that Andrews was in American-occupied Iceland. On his appointment he had said that his first job was to increase bombing of enemy targets and to "prepare for the reception of the larger American force undoubtedly to be brought to the United Kingdom." A few minutes after the announcement that Andrews had been killed, the British air ministry announced that American bombers resuming their offensive had attacked industrial targets at Antwerp, Belgium, Tuesday afternoon and had returned without loss. 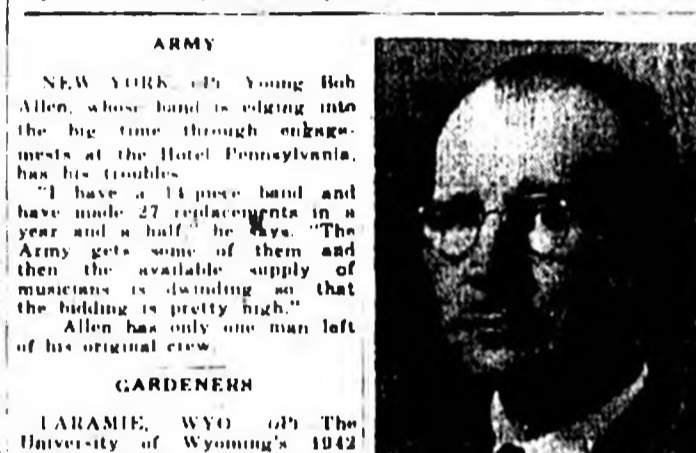

SITTING IN WITH THE LAWMAKERS

Determined to get the facts in connection with the "special attorney" racket, the Shands Committee in the Senate made a careful check of the passenger list on this delus "Gravy Train" and compiling data secured from various departments, boards and

bureaus revealed that the State has paid out over half a million dollars to lawyers for "special" services rendered during the past two years. Fees gathered in by the joy riders ranged from a few dollars to a hundred thousand or more. Riding in a famed train's parlor car were the firms of Keen & Allen of Tallahassee, recipients of \$120,000 and Casey Walton & Spain of Miami who knocked down the tidy sum of \$46,870 in fees. Attorney General Tom Watson contends that most of the service rendered by special attorneys could and should be done by his office. The Shands Committee has not made its recommendations to the Senate but will in all probability take steps to prevent further payment of excessive fees for legal services to private firms.

The sweet voice on the telephone that calls to remind you that you forgot to pay your telephone bill is an appeal for Representative Eugene C.
