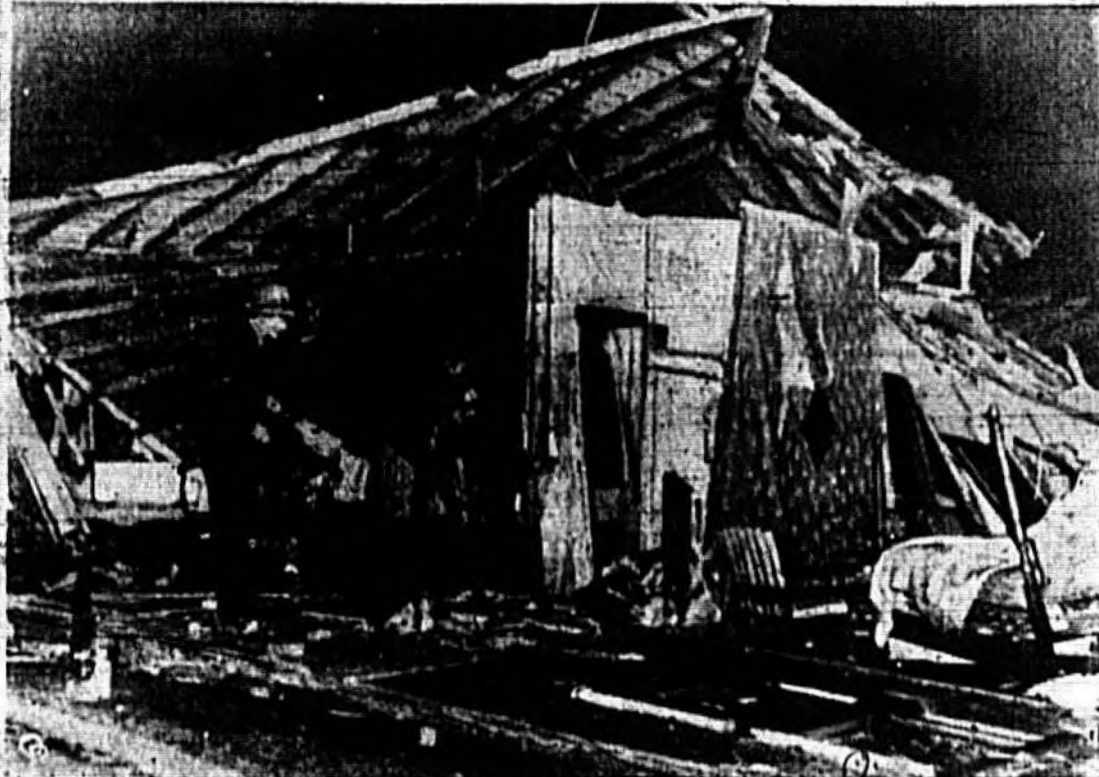

## Higgins Retires As City Mayor Tomorrow Night

### Served As City Head Six Years Since Election In 1937

An organization meeting of the City Commission will be held Tuesday evening at 7:30 o'clock at which time two new commissioners, Robert A. Williams and Lee H. Lester will be installed. Mr. Williams succeeds Edward Higgins as commissioner and Mr. Lester succeeds M. J. Lodge. A new mayor will be elected by the board. Mr. Higgins and Mr. Lodge have both served for nine years as commissioners, and the latter filled the unexpired term of the late T. L. Dumas in 1936. Edward Higgins was first named mayor in 1937, served the following two years in that capacity. In 1940 Walter Coleman was named mayor, and in 1941 and 1942 William C. Hill served in this office. Mr. Higgins then served for three more terms, 1943, 1944 and 1945. He declined to run again as a commissioner in order to devote full time and attention to his work as manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce. During his last three years as mayor, Mr. Higgins backed many improvements in Sanford and Seminole County—especially those that aided in the war effort. He was instrumental in promoting the municipal airport which later became the Sanford Naval Air Station. He also assisted in securing the federal building now housing the USO. He obtained grants from the federal government for the extension of the waterworks to increase the water supply for Sanford. Through his work with the Chamber of Commerce he secured government approval of a project for deepening the St. Johns River to 10 feet in depth, and later, by endorsement of U. S. Engineers to 12 feet. Always interested in road improvements, he furthered the project of widening the Park Avenue bottleneck and in co-operation with State Senator L. F. Boyle and Representatives M. B. Smith and L. B. Mann obtained state approval for Road 44 construction. This road is now being built from Sanford to Geneva and the Titusville Bridge. He furthered the establishment of a city bus line here. Projects which he is now working on include the development of a lake front terminal for which land has been purchased and securing a commitment by the State Road Department for an alternate highway into Sanford that will make the mercantile of the waterfront possible. He has also been striving for a policy to take over state and county property in the city and county for park purposes.

## Wilson Displeased With Slow-Motion OPA Negotiations

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Jan. 7, (Special)—"Finally, I am disappointed at the total lack of progress that has been made in the winter of Florida's produce, of Winter produce, which has been revealed by the slow-motion procedure of the Office of Price Administration, in its consideration of our appeal for removal of price ceilings in this luxury product," said William L. Wilson, director of Florida State Farmers' Markets, today. "This delayed-action method has had the effect of largely nullifying any benefit which might accrue to growers of the produce," he said. "Of course there hasn't been any indication that they will be lifted at all, despite our earnest and thorough presentation of arguments and data supporting the plea for a free market for this product." "The fact that the OPA has slapped ceilings back on citrus after having removed them for a short time, makes it look as though we have little control over our own produce. When I appeared in Washington, together with H. E. Johnson, manager of our State Farmers' Market in Plant City, before a committee of nine, representing the OPA, the point was stressed that Florida's strawberries are produced and marketed at a season when they do not compete with the great volume of berries which supply can plant berries every season, and has been pointed out before they must run all sorts of hazards in producing the crop, which is not a highly perishable product as strawberries. They can, and have, curbed the payment of premium prices — but when levels drop to the red-line zone they're busy with the controlling of some other product."
