Florida-Key To Defense

Florida has been receiving its full share of defense spending during the past year. With new Army airports dotting the entire state, with several new naval bases, and Army camps, with a vast new shipbuilding plant at Jacksonville and another at Tampa, Florida is seeing literally hundreds of millions of dollars in outside capital brought into this state.

hundreds of millions of dollars in outside capital brought into this state.

As the Tampa Tribune said the other day, "If any person had said a year or so ago that Florida would suddenly sequire a new \$100,000,000 industry, he would have been put down as plain crazy. Defense projects so far constructed have cost \$83,000,000 and by July 1 they will be occupied by more than \$1,000 men and officers."

And that to our way of thinking is only the beginning. Most of this spending took place, most of the work was done, before the British aid bill with its immense consequences to America's future was written into law. The seven billion dollar appropriation to implement this policy has just been passed. Other billions will soon be voted to further, protect us against the consequences of Axis aggression.

Industrially Florida may not be expected to benefit much from the manufacture of arms, planes and munitions for England, but in the matter of shipbuilding we are already beginning to see some economic aid shead. More shipbuilding plants will be needed and they will be kept in full operation for years after the war is over replacing the millions of tons of shipping now being sunk.

But from a military and naval standpoint Florida is of the most vital importance in the defense program. News from France tells of the proposed construction of a railroad from the Mediterranean coast to Dakar on the Atlantic Ocean in French West Africa. This railroad line would serve as a springboard for Axis powers to launch an invasion of South America in the event they become successiful in their effort to conquer the continent and the north of Africa.

Just as this railroad line to Dakar would be the springboard for a German invasion of South America.

An expeditionary force, possibly to Brazil or Argentina, might become necessary to protect those nations from aggression. Such troops would probably move through Florida ports as the nearest points in the United States to the scene of action.

Warships to convoy them, transports to carry them, freighters to supply them, would be shuttling back and forth between South America and Florids throughout the entire period of hostilities. Ships would not go on to New York or other northern posts to refuel or take on supplies. That would take too long. They would put in at the nearest available ports. And they are in Florids.
