County Ponders Job Survey



County Getting \$\$\$ Boost

Seminole County will receive an unexpected windfall of \$76,127.49 due to the final tax roll submitted to the county commission for certification by Mary Earle Walker, tax assessor Tuesday.

The estimated taxable tax roll submitted by Mrs. Walker to the commission in June and upon which the county commission and the school board based its budget was \$221,700,000 with total taxes of \$4,678,760.

The new and accurate tax roll as submitted by Mrs. Walker Tuesday however is more than \$15 million higher at \$235,339,976 with taxes of \$4,749,857.49.

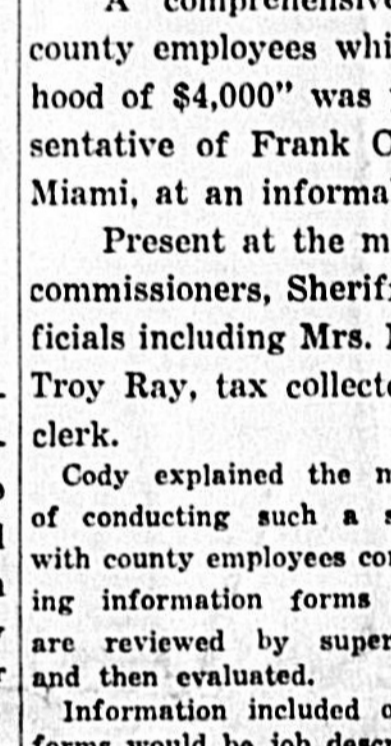
The additional income in line with the millage will go to the board of public instruction \$31,129.86; Seminole Memorial Hospital \$5,599.76 and for county purposes under the board of county commissioners \$19,397.87.

Some question exists according to local officials as to whether or not the additional income can be spent since it is not budgeted.

Seminole County School Board will meet at 1 p.m. Thursday. Main items on the agenda will be opening of bids and a report on a meeting in Miami today with architects designing the master campus plan for Seminole Junior College, attended by administration officials.

Space Needs Report Due In 45 Days

Plans are underway for the construction of a multi-storied new court house and jail complex for Seminole County with the signing Tuesday afternoon of contracts with John Burton IV and James Gamble Rogers as associate architects to design the new facility.

Estimated costs of the complex, to be located north of the present jail, is in excess of \$1.5 million.

Signing the contract on behalf of the county commission was John Alexander, commission chairman.

Burton and Rogers will discuss space needs with county officials and report back to the commission within 45 days.

Following review and determination of space allocation and layout by the commission, it is estimated plans will be completed and ready to put out for bid by June 1, 1967 and construction completed within 18 months to two years.

The board over the past six months has been investigating the current and future needs of each office in the court house to provide the increased services needed by the fast growing area.

Alexander noted "the current one-half mill of taxation levied for capital improvement will be sufficient to construct the facility and no new tax will be required for the project."

Winter Park Hospital — \$876 now, going to \$400 Jan. 1, 1967. Halifax (Daytona Beach) — \$400 monthly. Orange Memorial (Orlando) — \$400 monthly. Nurses there just got raised to this amount.

Seminole Memorial Hospital registered nurses, formerly making \$350 monthly, recently got an across-the-board raise to \$366.

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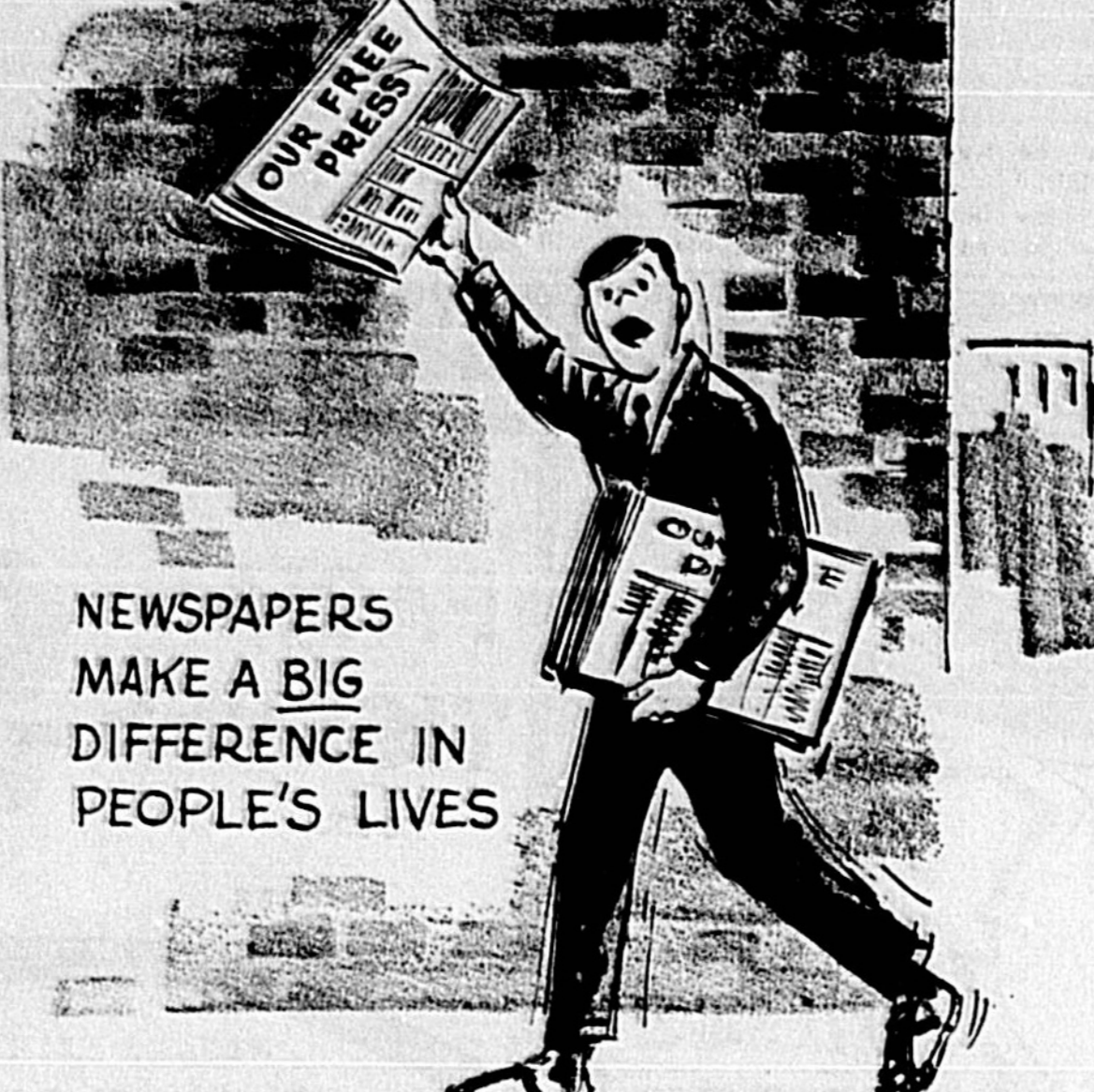

Navy Considers Alternative To Jet Warplane

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy, aware of the tide of controversy again mounting in Congress over its F11B fighter, is considering an alternative to its version of the TFX warplane.

The suggested option is to place a variable-sweep wing on the Navy's present first-line fighter, the F4 Phantom now being used in Viet Nam, to improve its capability. The swing-wing would be extended for subsonic flight but could be pulled near the sides of the fuselage to limit air resistance at supersonic speeds.

Sources give no indication that the Navy thinks there is much of a future for this kind of substitute for the Phantom for purposes — but the idea could attract considerable discussion if congressional disfavor with the F11B continues to mount.

The revamped Phantom jet apparently would not include the Phoenix missile system being developed for the bigger, more powerful F11B. This missile is capable of scanning and tracking enemy aircraft, approaching from all directions, and then knocking down several of them at the same time from 40 miles out.

The F11B project is having problems: The plane is too heavy, it costs nearly three times more than the originally estimated \$2.9 billion, and its development schedule is lagging by as much as 18 months.

Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., chairman of the Senate Permanent Investigations subcommittee, has announced that he will reopen a probe into the TFX case. McClellan's subcommittee held a series of widely publicized hearings in 1965 after Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara awarded the multi-billion dollar TFX contract to the General Dynamics Corp. despite a lower bid from the Boeing Aircraft Co.

The \$2.6-billion defense appropriations bill now pending in a Senate-House conference includes a rider offered by McClellan that would bar the use of funds to buy the F11B, but would not prohibit its continued development.

The proposed modification of the Phantom jet was suggested by the McDonnell Aircraft Co., recent testimony before a Senate Defense Appropriations subcommittee has revealed.

Navy budget director Rear Adm. E.E. Grimm told the subcommittee that the McDonnell proposal "submitted the wrong F4 proposal on an unassociated basis."

MARTIN STINECIPHER Veteran Aide Ends 40 Years With Chase Co.

Mailing Morale To Combat GI's Costs Money

By TOM TIEDE
PORT LEE, N. J. (NEA) — Every evening Linda Galardi, age 20, of this city, writes several pages of airmail letters to Pvt. John Riley, age 22, at Tanh, Viet Nam.

Each letter costs her eight cents. Frequently she wraps up four or five pound packages—oatmeal cookies, small cakes, sourilk donuts—and sends them to her infantry-enlisted boy friend.

They cost her "about \$8" apiece. If she sends 265 such letters in the coming year and two such packages a month—which she insists she will—she will spend nearly \$150 on postage alone to mail morale to Pvt. Riley during his 12-month tour of the war.

"Gee," she observes, "it's expensive." With countless Americans now sending thousands of pounds of mail every day to soldiers in Southeast Asia

(some 5,000 more tons are expected before Christmas) the total tab for statesiders is millions of dollars. Because of this cost, many families must keep mail to GI relatives at a minimum. And a few people—say the wife of a Pvt. K-2 earning \$97.50 a month—cannot afford any packages whatsoever.

Linda Galardi thinks it's a shame. "So," she says, "some of my friends and I have gotten together a petition in northern New Jersey. It asks for some kind of legislation to be passed in Washington to eliminate the postage on mail being sent to servicemen in the war. The signature and on this issue has been encouraging."

The petition argues that no warfront soldier should be kept from maximum homefront mail because of economic reasons. It also implies that, since the United States is now spending \$2 billion a month toward increasing the machinery to wage the war, it can also afford some money toward increasing the morale to wage it.

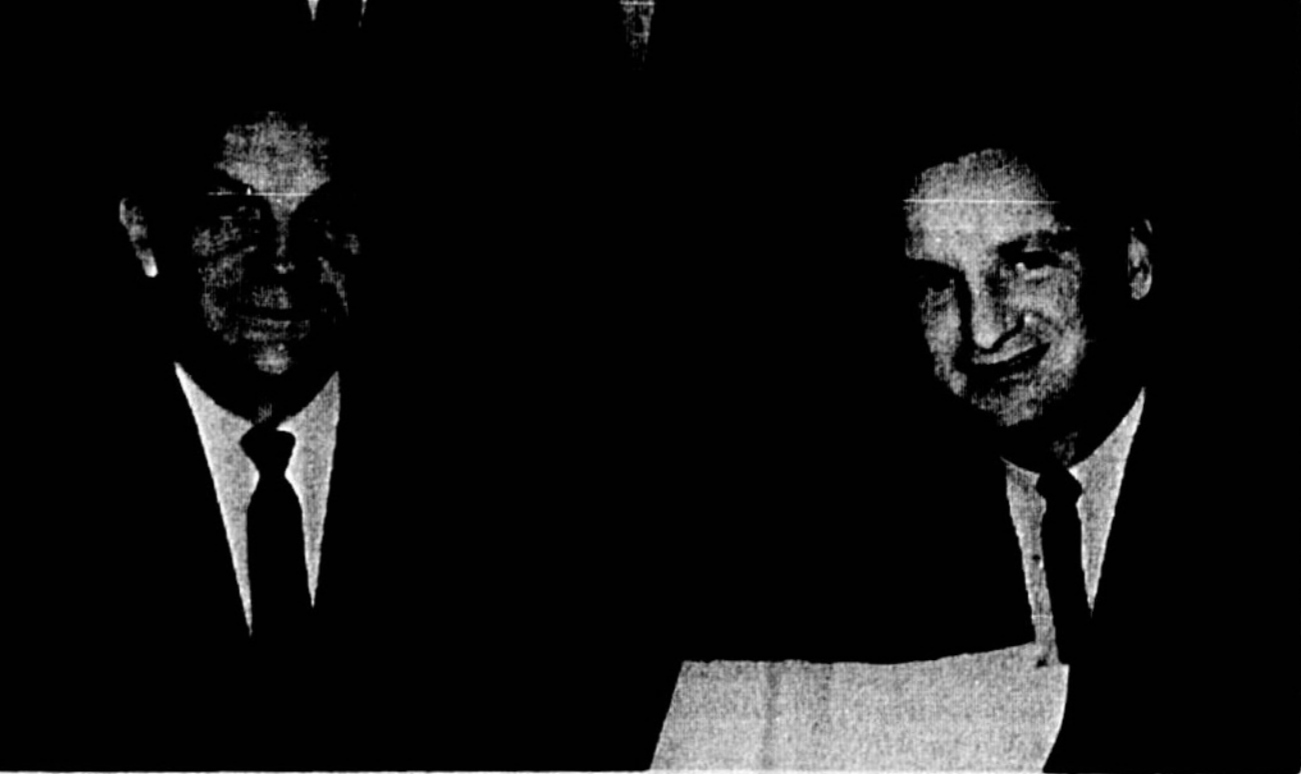
