# Sanders Launches Southern Demo Drive Against Goldwater

### **Malaysian Chief** Flying To U. S. To Seek Help

LONDON (UPI) - Prime Minister Tengku Abdul Rahman of Malaysia left by air today for the United States where he will seek moral support and express his willingness to accept American heltcopters for Malaysia's jungle war with Indonesia.

Rahman, 61, a sorely-beset friend of the West, will meet President Johnson in Wash-Ington Wednesday.

The prime minister left London at 11:10 a.m. and was arriving in New York at 1:35 p.m. EDT. He will spend tonight at Williamsburg, Va. Malaysia, a new nation

created only 10 months ago out of Malaya, Singapore and the British Borneo territories, is fighting a guerrilla war with Indonesia, which regards Malaysia as a "tool of British imperialism."

The United States already has expressed moral support for Malaysia and has cut off the supply of weapons, ammunition and spare parts to Indonesia.

But U.S. officials are concorned that direct military aid to Malaysia would drive meutralist Indonesia into the arms of the Communists.

"If chain store operators are to meet the demands of expanding population and improved economics throughout tthe world," said Marcus, "we must have a free exchange of ideas and information.

"This, plus a closer relationship with agricultural groups, food processors and manufacturers, is vital to the development of an efficient world-wide system of foood distribution," he added.

## Safety Stressed In Homes







### Right-Of-Way **Provided For Canal At Gulf**

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) The Cabinet trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund provided right-of-way today for the west coast entrance to the cross Florida barge canal. The right-of-way, plus underwater property on which dredge material from the canal channel will be deposited, were necessary for a start on the western end of the canal. Work has already begun on the eastern entrance near Palatka on the St. Johns River.

Trustees Director William Kidd said contracts would be let by the canal authority "pretty soon" for work in Citrus County.

Kidd said the right-of-way extended about 10,000 feet out into the state-owned Gulf of Mexico bottom at the mouth

of the Withlacoochee River. He said arrangements had been made for spoil material to be deposited along the right-of-way in islands 1,800 by 300 feet in size which might later be used for recreational areas.
