**Man who died after struggle identified**

CASSELBERRY - Authorities have identified a 40-year-old Casselberry man who died Tuesday of an apparent heart attack after sheriff's deputies tried to subdue him and sprayed him twice with pepper spray.

Josef Jacob Kirshenbaum of 600 Georgetown Drive died about 6:50 a.m. Tuesday. He had complained earlier to a neighbor that he was having a heart attack, and then told rescue personnel that he had been smoking crack cocaine. When the paramedics tried to subdue him, Kirshenbaum fought them off.

After Kirshenbaum took one of the deputy's nightsticks, he was handcuffed and the paramedics worked on him again, but he died.

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement is investigating.

## George: Trying to stay a step ahead of the devil

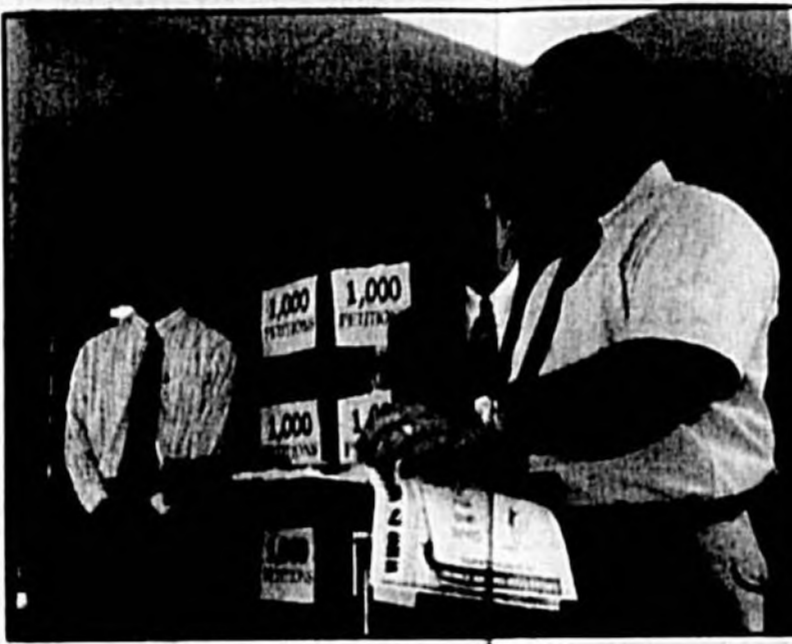
CASSELBERRY - There is someone like Mark George in most neighborhoods. Someone who demands to be heard. Someone prepared - perhaps - to wrestle the devil.

Clearly, Mark George is a force.

This summer he led the Citizens for Decency drive that led to getting the Public Decency Ordinance referendum on the Nov. 3 county ballot. At the same time, George began his run for Seat 1 on the Casselberry City Commission.

Should the voters agree with George, not only will he have helped to scrub nude dancing in the county and have a big say in Casselberry government, he also would emerge as a curious figure countywide. Some think he'll next make a run for the county commission.

George, 41, is one of the associate pastors at Community United Methodist Church in Casselberry. He emphasizes the word "Community" in the church title. He grew up in the community, went away for a while, but has come back to be a community leader.

Appalled at the existence of nude dancing clubs in Casselberry and in the county, George wants to fight the adult entertainment business with one glove as a pastor and the other as a city commissioner.

He says the opposition paints him as "A radical, right wing conservative - totally out of the mainstream."

## Hurricane could bring area floods

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Though Central Florida is not directly in the path of Hurricane Georges, county agencies remain on alert. Residents should also take the necessary precautions, officials said.

National Guardsmen are being assembled throughout central Florida, including Sanford, to support disaster relief efforts around the state.

Athletic fields and back yards have been turned into muddy swamps, suitable only for ducks and those lucky enough to have waterproof shoes.

Hotels in the area are filling up quickly with those who are evacuating from other areas. As of 3 p.m. Thursday, there were about 200 rooms available throughout Seminole County. Those rooms were going fast.

Terry White of the Marina Hotel on the lakefront in Sanford said "they are full at least through the weekend." The hotel is charging evacuees a special lower rate, she added.

John Blackwood, manager of the office of emergency management for Seminole County, said he believes most of the evacuees in this area are coming from the west coast of Florida, especially the Tampa Bay area.

Blackwood added that four evacuation shelters, at Lyman, Lake Mary and Winter Springs high schools and at English Estates Elementary School, and one special needs shelter at Highlands Elementary School are scheduled to open as soon as they are needed. A pet-friendly shelter will be open at Sanlando United Methodist Church in Longwood.

"It's just plain yucky out here," said Kevil Lang, who was walking through Fort Mellon Park with his five-year-old son Trevor on Thursday afternoon.

He said they had gone to Liberty Park on Country Club Road in Lake Mary only to find the low-lying park almost obscured by water.

"It was pretty flooded," Lang said. "I haven't seen it like that in a couple of years."

## Woman not guilty in drowning deaths

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - Two small girls drowned in their back yard pool a year and a half ago, but Thursday a judge threw out an aggravated manslaughter charge against the mother of one of the children.

Circuit Court Judge O.H. Eaton said the case was a waste of taxpayers' money and a potential nightmare for grieving parents statewide. He called the proceedings off, saying there was no reason for 22-year-old Rachel Reed to present her defense.

Reed, who works as a topless dancer, had been charged with the deaths of her 20-month-old daughter and her roommate's 3-year-old daughter.

Prosecutors said that Reed had fallen asleep, but were unable to convince Eaton that this was a crime. Had Reed been found guilty, Eaton said any parent who was ever hurt or killed because of a moment of inattention could be put on trial.

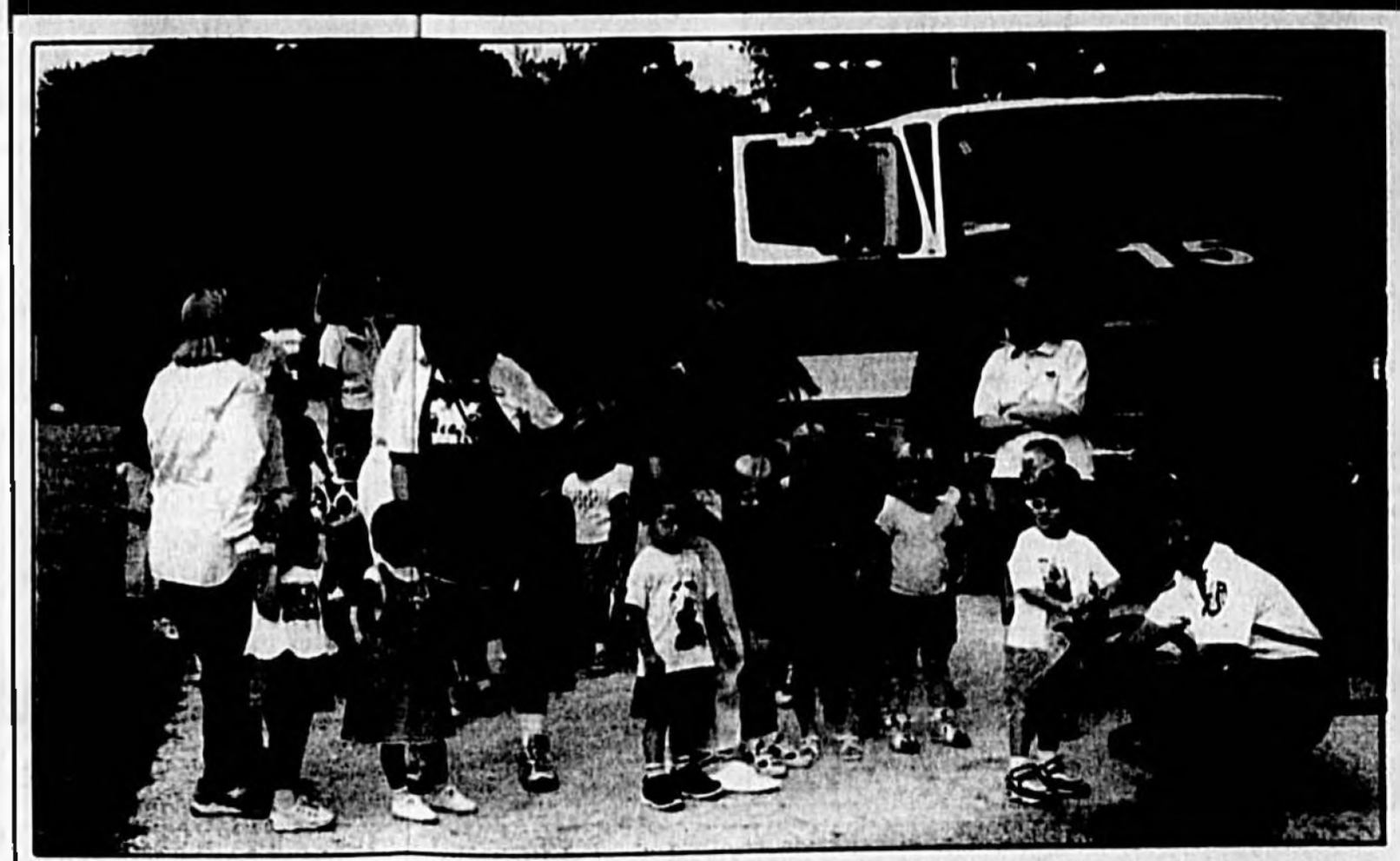
Michele Hall, the mother of the second victim, was not pleased with the judge's ruling and said she did not think "people should walk away from something like this." An officer for the Altamonte Springs Police said that Hall - not Reed - had been warned twice that the children were wandering the neighborhood on other occasions.

Similar warnings were given both women from a state child-welfare investigator, and this said Assistant State Attorney Stewart Stone made Reed's unintended nap a crime.

Defense attorney Don Lykkekak said that the prosecutors had singled out Reed because of her profession. (Michele Hall also worked as a topless dancer.)

Wolfinger denied Reed's occupation had anything to do with the deaths. He said his office would continue to be "very aggressive" in cases of this nature.

## Melissa's story

Editor's Note: The last part of this story was inadvertently omitted from the Sept. 24 edition of the Seminole Herald. It is reprinted here in its entirety.

SANFORD - Melissa is 23-years-old and pregnant with the child of a man who was shot to death 12 days ago.

Her hazel eyes are still watering.

She isn't sure what she is going to do and what is to become of the child who has no daddy.

"Every day there are more and more WHYS, more and

more WHAT WILL WE DO'S," Melissa said.

Melissa, who asked her last name not be used, was engaged to Paul Kafka, a 23-year-old who was killed in his car on a Saturday night in the Washington Oaks section of Sanford. Maurice Williams, a varsity football player at Winter Springs High School, admitted to police that he shot Kafka. He is now in custody.

"When Maurice walked up to Paul's car and killed him, not only was Paul's life destroyed but so were all of his friends, family and loved ones," Melissa said. "How can a boy, 17, be so thoughtless and uncaring to be able to decide to take another

# Treating gout with Zyloprim

DEAR DR. GOTT: For years I have been taking colchicine for gout. Now my doctor has prescribed Zyloprim to prevent acute attacks. He plans to stop my colchicine after three months, but I continue to have painful joints. Is this an appropriate strategy? DEAR READER: Gout is caused by an accumulation of uric acid crystals in the joint spaces. Until Zyloprim has had a chance to block the formation of such crystals, you can develop gout attacks. Therefore, you may have to continue the colchicine until the Zyloprim has reached maximum effectiveness, because the colchicine will relieve the acute symptoms. Ordinarily, Zyloprim and colchicine do not interact. Therefore, I believe that simultaneous use of the two drugs is entirely appropriate. To give you related information, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "About Gout." Other readers who would like a copy should send \$2 plus a long, self-addressed, stamped envelope to P.O. DEAR DR. GOTT: My doctor prescribed niacin to lower my cholesterol level. However, every time I take it, I get a flushed feeling and I'm hot all over. Is this dangerous? DEAR READER: On the contrary, flushing is a recognized and predictable consequence of niacin therapy. You can reduce the strength of the reaction by taking an aspirin tablet with the niacin. Or you can simply put up with the symptom, which will lessen after several weeks of therapy. DEAR DR. GOTT: On occasion, you have suggested to readers that they flush out dated or unusable medicines down the toilet. Won't this contaminate the water supply? DEAR READER: Once dissolved, drugs quickly decompose in septic

DR. GOTT PETER GOTT, M.D. fields and municipal sewage treatment plants. Such discarded medications are very unlikely to reach a drinking water supply. In my view, this is a non-problem.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please give me information about myelofibrosis. I have been told by my doctor that it is very rare and that I have to have blood transfusions periodically because there's no other treatment. DEAR READER: Myelofibrosis is an uncommon disease of the bone marrow, characterized by the formation of scar tissue that interferes with the production of infection-fighting white blood cells, called neutrophils. As a consequence of the disease, the body is forced to call on secondary, less efficient sources of blood cells, notably the spleen and liver. Put simply, myelofibrosis causes a lowering of the white blood cell count that is not compensated for by blood-formation in sites other than the bone marrow. Some specialists consider the ailment to be a form of bone-marrow cancer; the condition is often seen in patients with leukemia, Hodgkin's disease and bone-marrow damage (from radiation or chemicals such as phosphorus). However, myelofibrosis may occur without an obvious cause. It typically is associated with enlargement of both the spleen and the liver. No universally effective therapy has yet been developed. Transfusions provide temporary respite by supplying the vital blood that the patient lacks. In my opinion, patients with myelofibrosis should be under the care of hematologists, specialists in the diagnosis and treatment of blood diseases.

# WIN AT BRIDGE

## Two classic ducking plays

Let's end the week with two of the most famous ducks in the history of the game. First, we'll visit Miami Beach in October 1986, where the weather was warm and wonderful -- not that the players competing in the world championships noticed, because they were in the air-conditioned Sheraton Bal Harbour Hotel. How should the play go in three no-trump after West leads the club 10? The auction was strange. North's one-club opening was artificial, showing 16-plus points. South's double of East's debatable overall indicated 7-9 points. And North's ill-advised three-club rebid (pass is preferable) asked South to bid three no-trump with something in clubs.

West led the club 10, which marked South with the jack. Declarer called for dummy's seven. Sitting East was one of France's best players, Michel Lebel. If South had the club ace, it didn't matter which card Lebel played. But if West was leading from the ace-10-nine, it made a big difference. Lebel didn't put up the queen at trick one -- he ducked! If able to see through the backs of the cards, South would have ducked also. By keeping West's club suit out of the game, declarer would have lost only four tricks: one heart, one diamond and two clubs. However, South was human. He won the first trick and played a diamond to dummy's nine. After winning with his king, Lebel returned the club queen. West overtook with his ace and cashed four more club tricks: two down. Finally, note that if declarer plays dummy's club king at trick one, East must unblock the queen.

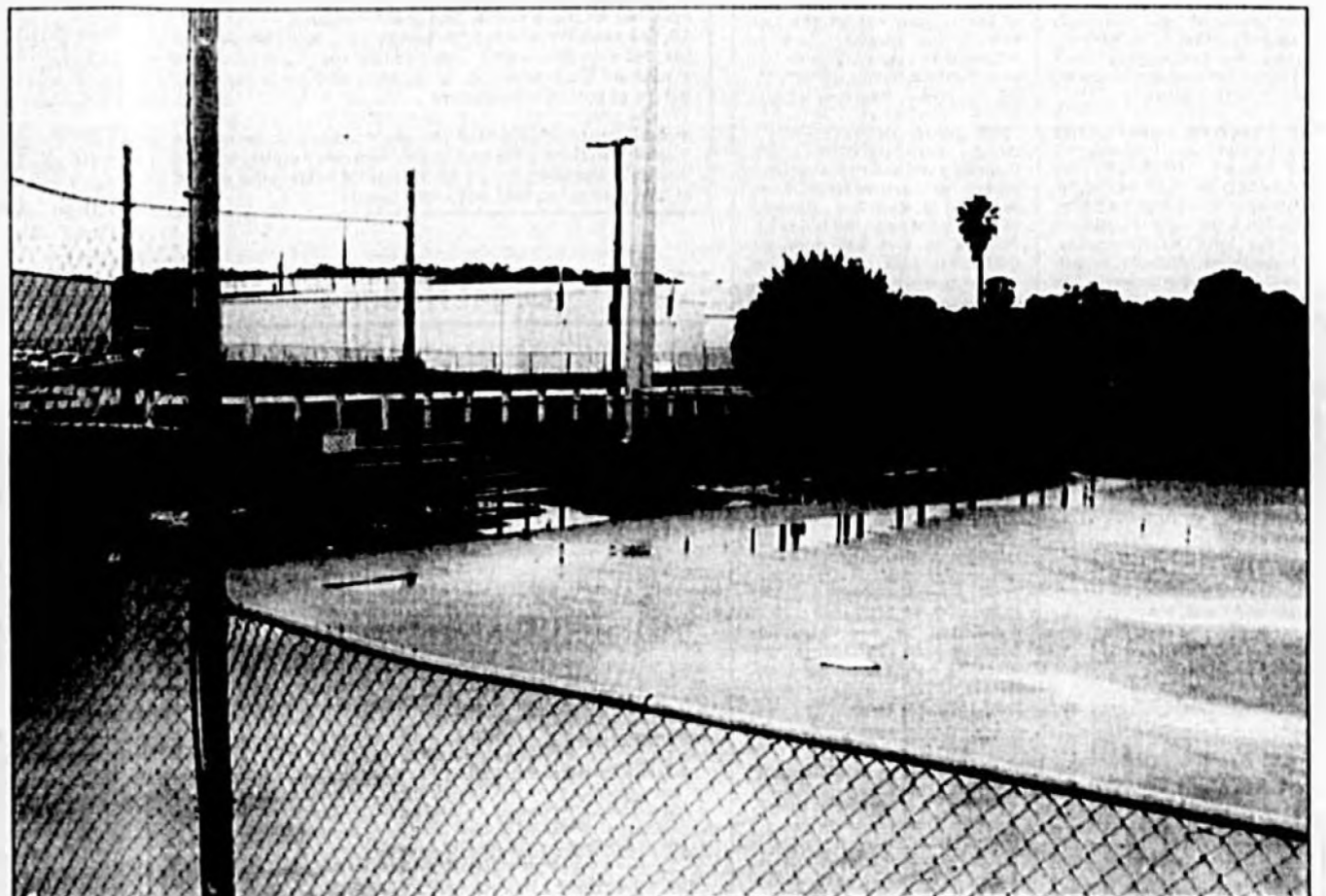

Ann B. Davis, best known as *Brady Bunch* housekeeper Alice, won 1958's Emmy for best supporting actress for *The Bob Cummings Show*.

The first live Emmy Awards show was local broadcasts now lost to history. The 1954 ceremony, preserved on kinescope, is the oldest on record.

Alfred Woodard won her first Emmy for a 1984 appearance on *Hill Street Blues*. She played a woman whose child is killed by a police officer.

Emmy Awards have been known to include canceled shows. Such survivors include *Cagney & Lacey*, *Hill Street Blues* and *Mission: Impossible*.

The only person ever to win Emmy Awards for acting, writing and directing is Alan Alda, who won them all for *M\*A\*S\*H*.
