

> As county officials ponder their response to the federal charges, the county's affirmative action officer, Personnel Director Ron Thames, has fired a black personnel analyst - one of only three black professionals in the county courthouse - who was working under Thames' direction to update and find ways to implement the county's affirmative action plan, approved in February 1976 by unanimous vote of the county commission.

> The personnel analyst is Arlease Rowell, hired in October 1976 as the county's grant coordinator and transferred two months ago to the personnel office to work on the affirmative action plan. The county will receive \$1.7 million this year from the revenuesharing office, whose director, Bernadine Denning, signed the sixpage letter to County Commission Chairman Dick Williams detailing the alleged discriminatory practices in the building department and sheriff's office.

> Ms. Denning's letter, in finding Seminole County in violation of the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972 and revenue sharing regulations, "requests" the county within 60 days to: - Offer Alfred G. DeLattibeaudiere "the next available position as building inspector and reimburse him the amount of pay he would have received had he been hired on May 7, 1973," the date the letter says a less-qualified white man was hired instead

(Following the EEOC determination in July that the county had discriminated against DeLattibeaudiere, the Sanford resident, and EEOC began a conciliation period to negotiate their differences under EEOC guidance.

DeLattibeaudiere broke off the conciliation effort, according to Thames, and launched a discrimination suit in July against the county in Orlando federal district court. Motions in the case have been filed, but a date for hearing arguments has not been set.) Carter Concedes Jobless

Goal Of 6.6 Percent Be Met

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Unemployment in the United States remains at the same level it was eight months ago and the Carter administration now concedes it will be impossible to meet its year-end goal of 6.6 per-

"That goal has been scrapped," a White House aide said Friday after the Labor Department released figures showing November unemployment at 6.9 percent of the labor force.

The jobless rate has fluctuated between 7.1 percent and 6.9 percent for the past eight

Arrest Suspect In Stranglings

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Police said a suspect was booked and questioned Friday night in connection with the "hillside stranglings" of 10 young women and girls. dating from Oct. 18.

Police Lt. Ed Henderson, head of the "Strangler Task Force" investigating the slayings, would not say how Bennett Merrett, 24, of Hesperia, Calif., may be connected with the killings. But, he said, Merrett resembles the composite drawing of the "long-haired, mustached man" witnesses saw with one of the victims shortly before she died.

Union Official Convicted

NEW YORK (UPI) - Fred Field Jr., a top officer of the longshoremen's union, has been sentenced to one year in jail for accepting payoffs from United Brand Co. in return for

Federal Judge Morris Lasker also imposed \$50,000 fine on the 57-year-old general organizer of the International Longshoremen's Association and placed him on two years probation in proceedings in U.S. District Court here Friday.

Field, who maintains apartments at 345 East 56th St., Manhattan, and in Miami, was convicted in September of accepting \$124,000 in payoffs from the Boston firm, formerly United Fruit Company during the dock strikes in 1968 and 1971 and in a non-strike period in 1974.

Troops Patrol Bermuda Streets Following Riots

HAMILTON, Bermuda (UPI) - Tourists were confined to their hotels today and troops carrying rifles and machine guns patrolled the streets of Hamilton in jeeps to guard against further racial violence over the executions of two blacks convicted of murder. Firefighters from the U.S. Naval Air Station on the island joined local departments Friday in combating a series of blazes police said were caused by firebombs hurled by black

Rock Star Faces Charges

TORONTO (UPI) — Rolling Stone guitarist Keith Richard was ordered to stand trial Friday on heroin and cocaine charges that could send him to prison for life.

Judge H.A. Rice rejected Richard's arguments that he had no intention of trafficking in heroin, which carries a maximum life sentence. He continued Richard's \$25,000 cash bail and ordered him to reappear Feb. 6 to have a date set for trial.

South Africa Crackdown

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) -Prime Minister John Vorster, defying U.S. anger at a court decision clearing police in the death of black leader Steve Biko, says blacks have no place in South African politics.

Vorster, giving his first interview since his avalanche victory in general elections earlier this week, also pledged a "drastic" crackdown on terrorism and efforts to stem any Marxist onslaught on his country.



> During her years at the church's child care center, Mrs. Carpenter said she became aware that "a lot of people need child care that they can afford. "Good child care is a service of itself," she said.

She also learned that "a lot of women are the sole support of their children. Some have pretty nice jobs, but are still unable to pay for child care. These women do not need a myriad of social services. All they need is a little help with child care payments. With the help they can be self-sufficient. Without it, they need the whole gamut of social services. "Child care is such a little thing comparatively," Mrs. Carpenter said. "I saw the child care center at 7 in the norning and returning to pick them up at 5:30. They would be tired, but their day wasn't over until they took their children

home and prepared their Others came into the center who were really in a need of a lot of things. Some were unkempt. Their children needed clothing and care and we would keep the babies free while they looked for work." she said.

Mrs. Carpenter said tha invariably the mothers wit their first pay check would bu their babies a new outfi Secondly, they would be themselves a new dress and ge their hair done and then would buy toys for the children before getting another apartment. 



Traditions In Conflict

.. No grant shall be made under this Act for any local public works project unless the applicant gives satisfactory assurance. . . that at least 10 per centum of the amount of each grant shall be expended for minority business enterprises. .."

- From the amendment by Congressman Parren Mitchell as amended by Congressman Robert Roe, to the Public Works Employment Act

Now that U.S. District Judge A. Andrew Hauk has amended these words just a little more, by declaring them unconstitutional and illegal, the fact seems remarkable that as Messrs. Mitchell and Roe were doing their handiwork back on Feb. 24, none of their colleagues interrupted them to suggest this eventual judicial fate.

No one mentioned the possibility of unconstitutionality, no one brought up the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and no one uttered a word about the Bakke case.

The constitutional issue in Board of Regents v. Bakke, which the Supreme Court now is mulling, is whether the Constitution forbids the preferential treatment (be it by "goals" or "quotas") of minorities in an admissions policy of a state-

operated medical school. To be sure, there are distinctions here. If anything in the Constitution applies to Bakke's complaint, it is the Fourteenth Amendment, and if anything in the Constitution applies to the complaint against the "10 per centum" of the Public Works Employment Act, it is the Fifth Amendment, since the latter is a federal, not a state, law.

And, too, if preferential treatment for minorities is in some cases allowable, it may be argued that a legislature (federal or state), not the faculty of a university (which obviously is less politically responsible) is more justified in

But the point is that none of these distinctions was essayed in the House, nor was the apparent difficulty of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 brought up. Title VI says: "No person. . . shall, on the ground of race, color or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be activity receiving federal assistance." The question then naturally suggests itself: what is one to make of all this silence?

Terrance Sandalow, a professor of law at the University of Michigan, has pointed out that there are two ways that our constitutional tradition with respect to racial and ethnic discrimination can be read. One is that the tradition is rooted primarily in an ethic of individualism, "a belief that each individual should be judged solely on his own merit." The other is that the tradition flows primarily from egalitarian values. "a concern that government ought not to contribute to the subjugation of

There is a line of thought today, however, which says that legislation like the Civil Rights Act has not resulted in the hoped-for egalitarian results, that, therefore, the two traditions are at least temporarily in conflict, and that, finally, it is necessary to choose in favor of effecuating egalitarianism right now - by, of course, mandated "goals," "quotas," and the like.

The silence of the House, especially when so much could have been said in discussion of the Mitchell-Roe amendment, indicates that the House at least tacitly agrees with this line of thinking. The next question is whether it more than tacitly agrees, and ths, of course, one cannot answer.

Yet it is precisely this question that Judge Hauk's ruling forces upon the House, and indeed upon the Senate and the President of the United

A Friendship Grows Into A Partnership

About 300 banking officials, businessmen, automobile dealers, press, friends and others were there to welcome Yvonne Baird and Bill Ray to their new Baird-Ray Datsun dealership building at

It was Thursday evening, first phase of the grand opening that will continue until Dec. 11 for the public during regular business hours, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, according to Ray. The opening of the new 27,000-square-foot complex is the latest step in a long friendship between the Baird and Ray families.

Mrs. Baird, who is one of only six women Datsun dealers in the U.S., has seen the Datsun franchise she and her husband, Dick, first began operating 10 years ago mushroom from a one-car-perday sales pace to about 1000 cars per month. Following the death of Baird about 18 months ago, she asked

The site was bought by the Bairds seven years ago, when the couple felt that the success of the Datsun franchise, the only one in Seminole County, would someday create a need for more room, The old location, she said, held only about 125 cars. The new

complex will enable the Datsua purchaser to choose from 250-300 new and used cars, Mrs. Baira said. The new complex will meet the increased demand for Datsun automobiles, which have been selling quite well according to Mrs. Baird. She attributed the Datsun success story in part to the gasoline "crunch" and energy crisis of recent years. "There's no way to go but up," added Ray. "The quality of the

automobile has been established." Ray also noted the high-growth projections for the Seminole County area would create a demand for more Datsuns. Mrs. Baird said the Nissan Motor Corp in U.S.A., which distributes Datsun in this county, prides itself in the women dealers the company has appointed. She said she was not automatically handed the Datsun franchise. "I really had to prove myself," she said.

Helping to welcome the Baird-Ray dealership into its new

building were four representatives of Nissan, U.S.A.: Charles R. Ross, area dealer development manager; Al Allaband, business management manager; John Henke, regional sales manager; and William Bartlett, district sales manager. Ross said that the new Baird-Ray complex was typical of the general manager of the new \$1 million complex which employs 35 aggressive expansion now taking place throughout the country on the part of Datsun dealers and the Nissan company.

Olcott said self-service stations - where washing your own windshield is almost impossible unless you bring your own cleaner and cloth - will grow even more impersonal. "We're going to have a large piece of land with maybe 10 islands, all self-serve," he said. "At one end, will be a

little kiosk in which sits the moneytaker. "The pumps even could be overhead so that as the car drives over the parapet it will trigger this gadget that will somehow lower this pump, which could be a long tube

coming down from above." There might not even be a moneytaker. "One of the things the companies have been thinking about is a card that would be put in a pump and unlock the flow of gasoline. You could take what you want, elec-

tronically recorded in a central billing place." The oil companies already are interested in phasing out the personal service of their own credit cards, he said. They would prefer bank cards, which somebody else has

Margins of profit for the small-volume gasoline dealer. and the smallvolume jobber who serves several stations. are shrinking. Costs are rising. Olcott said growth of the "big pumpers" will leave a service gap that increasingly will be filled by specialists. a trend already visible. He said this is what will save some

The reason for all this, Olcott said, is economic.
