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## ... It Could Not Have Happened Accidentally' SCC Chemistry Teacher Finds No Conflict With Religion

There was a time when it was not a good idea to open Paul Hickson's refrigerator door without letting him know first. Otherwise you might have freed the frogs he was keeping in the vegetable bin.

It wasn't that Hickson was making home-grown frogs' legs. The frogs were used by Hickson, a medical technologist, in pregnancy tests. "We kept them in the refrigerator because they didn't need to be fed," he said, laughing.

Hickson also is a chemistry instructor at Seminole Community College where he teaches a course titled "Modern Concepts of Chemistry," two in general chemistry, and three laboratory sections.

"A great majority of students, even those taking advanced mathematics, find chemistry their most difficult course," Hickson says. He adds that, "because it is their most difficult course the instructor also has to spend more time working."

"Chemistry is difficult if it is properly taught," Hickson emphasizes.

Hickson is a registered medical technologist, having completed a four-year degree in the field and being registered with the American Society of Clinical Pathologists.

He has BS and MS degrees from Stetson University, DeLand, in chemistry and biology, and more than 30 hours completed toward a doctoral degree.

"I have only one year to go on my Doctor of Arts in Chemistry," says Hickson, "and when I can work that in, I will do so."

"I don't think obtaining that degree will make me a better instructor. The degree would be for my own satisfaction."

Hickson was born and raised in Sanford, and graduated from Seminole High School — where he later became a chemistry teacher. "I was at Seminole High

from 1957 to 1968, then moved to SCC. At the completion of this year I will have been teaching 30 years," he says — adding that he prefers teaching to the medical technology on which he used to work.

Hickson feels there are many people who ought to study chemistry, whether or not it happens to be required in their studies.

"Business majors often study chemistry," he says. "Chemistry is considered a great deal of logic, and guidance counselors often direct students of business into chemistry classes."

"Mathematics majors at SCC are required to study chemistry, because chemistry is applied mathematics," Hickson says.

He is concerned that the advent of that mathematics machine, the computer, might take away some of the things which are so important to him about working with his students.

"I don't believe in complete automation to help the student. It is too impersonal," Hickson says.

"I enjoy helping students who need help, but do not ever spoon feed them. As far as my schedule allows, I spend as much or more time outside the classroom working with my students as inside. I do not just

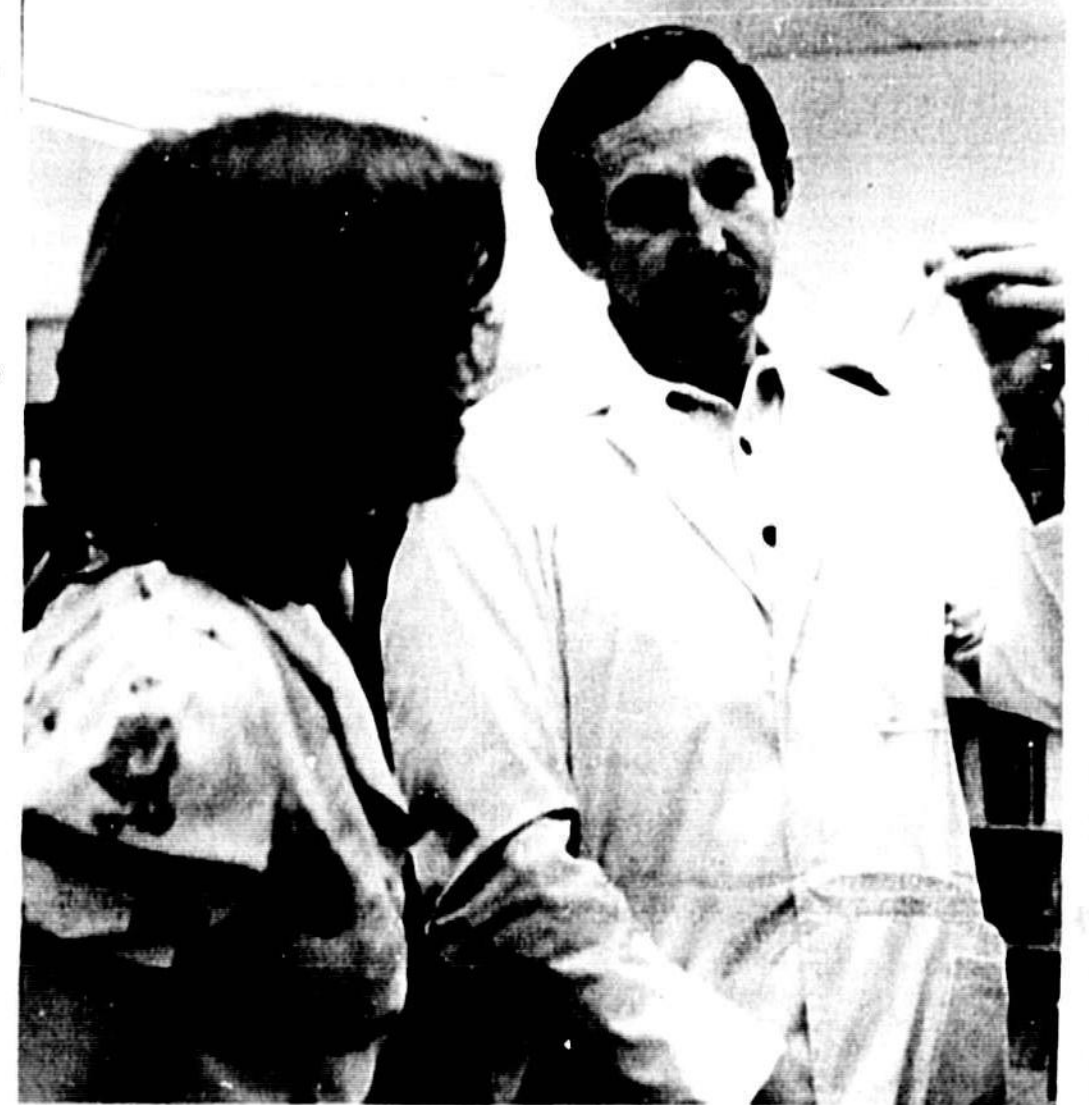
solved problems in front of them, and tell them they must learn from that. I ask them questions before they begin, and make them work through the problems completely."

There are several chemists, contemporary and historical, that Hickson admires — but Linus Pauling, twice Nobel prize winner, is the one whose name he mentions first.

"I have heard it said no one ever believes Linus Pauling, but sooner or later everyone uses the knowledge he gives us," Hickson said.

Hickson is excited about the educational possibilities for students at SCC, feeling that it offers strong rapport among faculty and students. "I think the function of a community college is to help students make the transition to an upper level university after high schools," he says.

Hickson, an Episcopalian, lives in Sanford with his wife Billie. He finds no conflict between his science and religion. "None at all. I look around me at the world, and I cannot believe that all those marvels could have just accidentally happened."

# U.S. Ignoring Plight Of Haitians?

MIAMI. — (NEA) — Late last summer 101 Haitian refugees landed by boat at the U.S. naval base at Guantanamo, Cuba. They told of fierce government repression in their homeland. They spoke of totalitarian brutality. Despite the exile's appeals for asylum, however, U.S. authorities sent all but four of them home.

But of all the examples, Haiti's exiles in Miami say their own nation is the most revealing. According to figures compiled by the Immigration and Naturalization Service, "Every man is supposed to be given equal consideration. But that's an illusion. Political and diplomatic considerations are the deciding factors." The Haitians believe the deportation of the refugees was another indication that the U.S. policy regarding political asylum is outdated, unfair and cruelly prejudicial. The criticism is this: while America has historically accepted almost all "sales from Communist states, it is increasingly reluctant to serve as a haven for refugees from right-wing dictatorships. No Cuban refugee has ever been refused, for example, but almost all exiles from friendly Haiti are turned away.

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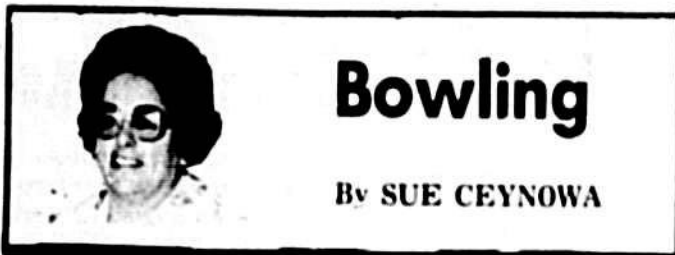
# Sanford Tennis Team Sweeps Red League

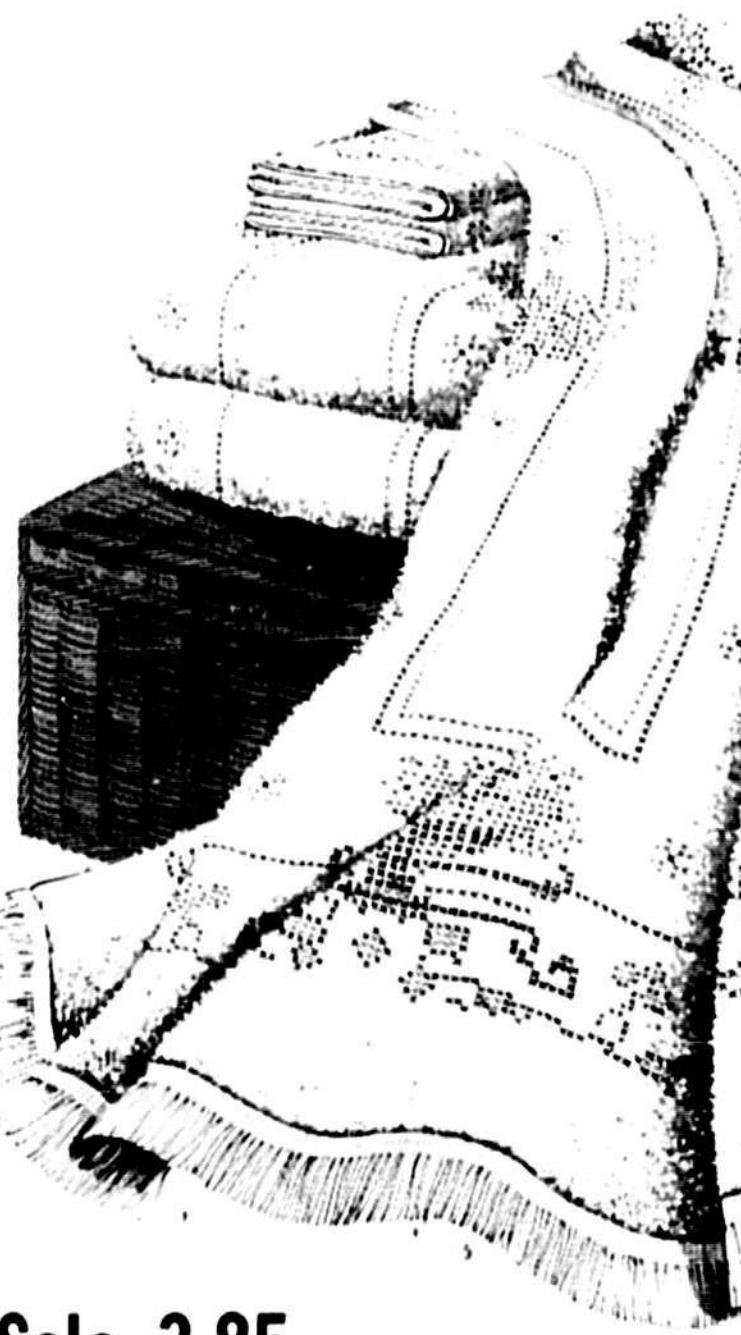

With only three weeks remaining, there are still 18 contenders for the NFL playoffs in addition to Dallas, which sat down after last week's victory over Washington to figure out it was the first team this year to qualify. Two more teams could join Dallas Sunday — Denver, if the Broncos beat Houston, and Los Angeles, if the Rams beat Oakland and New England wins at Atlanta. Denver, whose 10-1 record is the best in the NFL, leads Oakland by one game in the AFC West. A victory over Houston, also involved in a tight division race in the AFC Central, would send Dallas right now. Houston is on my mind. MADRID—The bullfight in Spain is mainly on the wane. Not that you'd know it by the paychecks of the country's top matadors. Toreros at the top earn around \$20,000 a year after taxes and expenses. But the 70 other cape-wearing professionals on the next rung of the ladder have to scramble from one village bulfight to another in week-end ventures, trying to make ends meet and stay alive long enough to climb up into the big time.

"What we really lack today," sighs Julian Rojas, owner of one of Madrid's bullfight restaurants, "is the novilleros, the young espantosos who jump over the wall to fight a year business. They tie the sport for maximum profit, not primarily to fight big cities and big crowds." KITCHEN AT SEMINOLE MEMORIAL HOSPITAL. STAFF EATS WHAT THE PATIENTS EAT

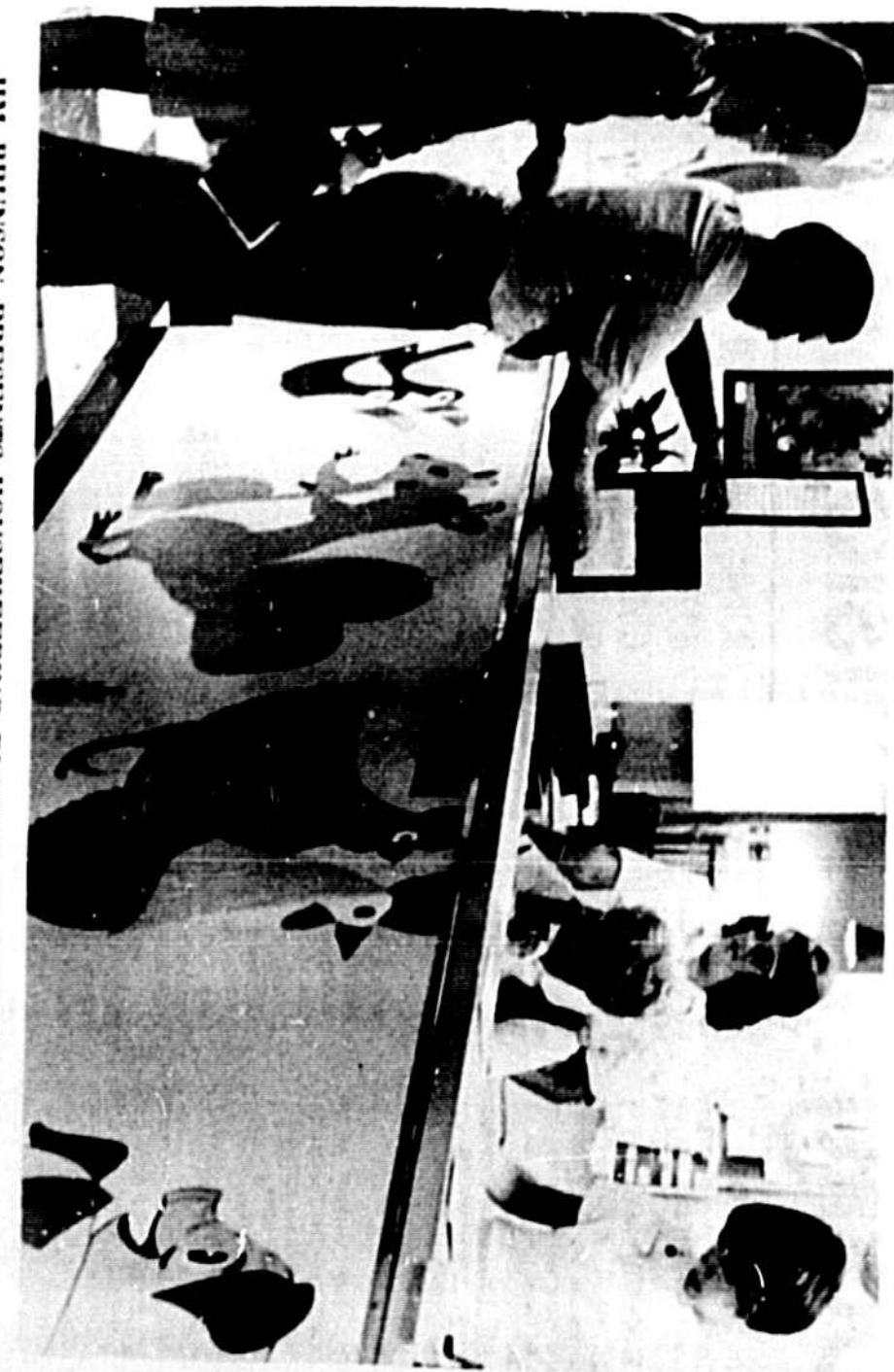

## 'Discrimination': Some Officials Aim Blame At State Standards

While spokesmen for two Seminole County departments, under fire from the federal Office of Revenue Sharing for allegedly using discriminatory hiring practices, responded, a black personnel analyst who was fired last week said this morning she would appeal the firing.

Here's where the matter stands today:

- Arlene Rowell, fired a week ago by Ron Thames, the county's personnel director and affirmative action officer, said she would appeal her unsatisfactory performance rating, which led to the firing, to the County Administrator Roger Neiswander, who will have 30 days to uphold or overturn the firing.

- Duane Harrell, chief sheriff's deputy, said questions on the sheriff's employment questionnaire for hiring deputies which federal investigators have termed "potentially discriminatory" are determined by the state Police Standards Council — not local officials — and that the questions are the same as those asked of prospective FBI agents.

- Don Flippen, chief of the county's building division, said he'd be happy to hire qualified blacks, but that none has applied since he was hired by the county in April 1974.

- Personnel Director Thames said the county would determine its response to the charges after county officials meet with the county's labor attorney, David Kierreich of Miami, when Kierreich returns from his vacation next week.

- The charges of discrimination were contained in a letter from Bernadine Denning, director of the federal Office of Revenue Sharing, to County Commission Chairman Dick Williams which the chairman received Nov. 17.

- Please indicate your intentions and efforts to correct the violations cited "within 60 days," the letter says. The county this year will receive \$1.2 million in revenue-sharing funds.

- Ms. Rowell, hired in October 1976 as the county's budget officer, has worked under Thames' direction since November to find ways to update and implement the county's affirmative action plan, approved by unanimous vote of the county commission in February 1976.

- Ms. Rowell — one of three black professionals who work in the courthouse — was fired by Thames after spending a year on probation.

- She appealed her firing to Thames' supervisor, Neiswander, who will have 30 days to uphold or overturn Ms. Rowell's firing, under county personnel regulations.

- Thames said this morning that if Neiswander upholds her firing, Thames will hire another personnel analyst "whose principal responsibility will be working with me to update the affirmative action plan."

- The letter from the revenue-sharing office "requests" county officials to "establish goals and timetables which will enable the workforce of Seminole County" government, including the sheriff's office, to reflect the county's labor market, which is composed of 16.4 percent blacks and 38 percent females." The letter also requested the sheriff's office to eliminate "potentially discriminatory" employment questionnaire questions regarding

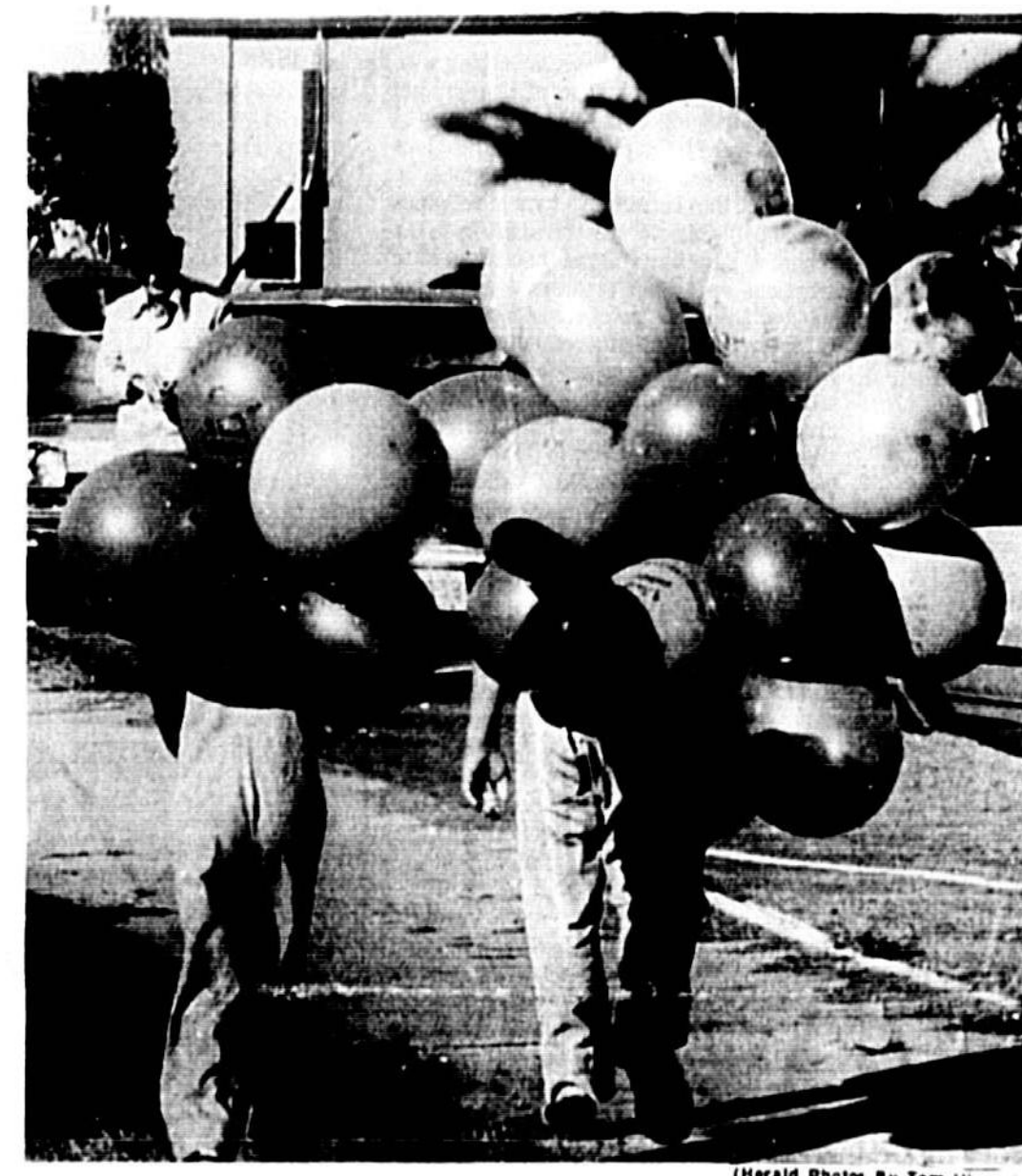

## Altamonte Boy Struck By Several Cars Youth Misses Ride, Hitches From Rock Concert, Killed

Orlando police today are seeking public aid in locating the driver of a yellow Volkswagen that struck and killed an 18-year-old Altamonte Springs boy as he walked along I-4 early Sunday morning.

Killed was Robert Marzula of 410 Auburn St., as he hitchhiked along a well-lit section of the interstate above Robinson Street in Orlando about 12:30 a.m., according to Orlando police.

Investigating officer Clarence Bass said police are looking for the early model fatback said by an eyewitness

to be the vehicle that first struck the youth.

Bass gave this account of the accident:

Marzula was walking along in the eastbound lane of I-4 when, according to the female motorist who said she saw the accident, the yellow Volkswagen went around her eastbound car in the passing lane, swerved back into the outside lane in front of her car and slammed into the boy.

Marzula, according to Bass, was killed instantly, but dragged 350 feet. However, Bass also said several other vehicles struck the boy after the Volkswagen. "but we're convinced from the evidence

that he was killed in the initial impact."

Officer Bass said among the other vehicles which struck the Marzula boy was a car driven by an Orlando city commissioner.

He was identified as Commissioner Robert Keith, cousin of Sanford City Commissioner Eddie Keith.

"He was the only motorist who hit the boy to stop and return to the accident scene. We determined from examining the commissioner's car that his car could not have killed Marzula.

"It was a very sickening sight to see a body laying in the road like that," said Commissioner Keith today. "I have a CB radio
