

SANFORD DISTRICT BRICK ROADS WILL BE STARTED AT ONCE

DELAYS CAUSED BY ACTION OF BOND FIRMS BRICK SHIPPED FROM GEORGIA

After a long and tedious wait the special Sanford road district will at last realize the dream of having twenty-five or more miles of brick roads and when the work starts in the next few weeks it will mark an epoch not only in the new county of Seminole but in the south. The Sanford special road district is probably the first special road district in the country to bond for brick roads. The progressive and public-spirited people of this section long ago realized that the so-called good roads made of clay and marl and other material were only temporary roads and that after the advent of the automobile and the settling up of the rivers delta with growers who were forced to haul heavy loads all the year round that no material but brick would ever stand the strain. Hon Frank Woodruff who at this time was a member of the Orange county commissioners board was heartily in favor of the special road idea and also of the bonding plan for brick roads and from that time on has consistently and ably represented the people in this stand. The road district established after people of this district became convinced that Orange county would never consent to bonding for brick and after the district was made and ceased to become an integral part of Orange the bond issue was voted on and carried by a large majority. About the time that the bonds were thought to be sold another change came in the shape of county division and the formation of Seminole county made another delay in the bonds. Chairman Woodruff was anxious to make the best deal possible for the tax payers and held out for a smaller rate of interest a matter that was finally arranged for the best interests of the people and the last deal made it possible for the work to start by the brick people taking part of the issue for the brick and the contractors taking bonds for the work of construction and in this way the falling bond market was eliminated and the work comes this week that the bonds have been approved and the brick will be ready to roll within fifteen days. Chairman Woodruff feels that the greater part of the roads will be constructed in six months. The roads that are travelled the most will receive attention first and the work will be divided in order that every section will receive a share.

There are several stretches close to this city that are almost impassable now and they have received no attention from city or county because the brick has been awaited. These roads will be the first to receive attention. The heavy hauling will soon take place as the road and the heavier west side of the city are in miserable shape. The news that the roads are to start will cause great rejoicing not only among the people who are forced to travel these roads daily but also from the people of Seminole county in general because the starting of these roads opens the opening wedge in the matter of good roads and when the work in the special district is finished the other parts throughout the county will receive the attention needed.

STATE GOOD ROADS DAY HAS BEEN NAMED BY GOVERNOR

FLORIDA CITIZENS WILL LABOR ON THE ROADS URGES ALL MEN TO TAKE PART

Tallahassee, Fla., Oct. 30.—Gov. Park Trammell has set aside Friday, November 21, as State Roadwork day, and has called the officials of each county, city and town in the state, as well as the citizens generally, to set aside that day in the making of good roads. Not alone for the consideration of good roads but in actual roadbuilding. The governor points out the needs of the state in this line and urges that all of the people take part in bringing Florida to the forefront in the making of the name of Florida a power with good roads. He urges that various trade bodies as well as city authorities and boards of county commissioners take practical steps toward making Florida's first good roads day a success. The governor's proclamation follows: "The State of Florida, Executive Department. "By the governor a proclamation. "Whereas, the construction of good roads is essentially a practical problem, and the value of good roads is shared, directly or indirectly, by all the people of every locality; and "Whereas, one of the greatest needs of practically every county in Florida is a well devised and well constructed system of durable rural highways and it is clear that the securing of same would provide an inestimable blessing affecting not only the commercial but also the social and educational life of the respective communities; to every section of the state which will put forth sufficient effort to secure such roads; and "Whereas, the citizenship of Florida is a progressive and resourceful as is to be found anywhere in the world and is in this age manifesting an increasing tendency to keep in the forefront of all enlightened movements looking to the betterment of the masses of the people; and "Whereas, the most effective way to secure desired results is to proceed in the most direct way to achieve them. "Now, therefore, I, Park Trammell, governor of the state of Florida, mindful of the urgent need of the people of all parts of this state for improved public roads within the several counties and to connect the several sections of the state, do hereby designate and proclaim Friday, November 21, 1913, as State Roadwork day, and I earnestly urge all of the good men of every locality to set aside their usual occupations and to devote their time and energy to the making of roads in their respective localities. It is the duty of every citizen to do his part in the making of these roads. Let us all unite in this noble and practical effort to better our roads and to better our lives. "In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed the great seal of the state of Florida, at Tallahassee the capital, this 27th day of October, A. D., 1913. (Seal) "Park Trammell, governor "By the governor, attest: "H. Clay Crawford, secretary of state."

SANFORD CITIZENS WILL WORK IN REPAIRING PORTIONS OF ROADS

TEMPORARY REPAIRS WILL BE MADE IN ROADS

Anticipating brick roads Sanford citizens will repair various roads in vicinity. The rest of the state of Florida and Sanford in general has nothing on when it comes to public spirit and patriotism for the fall from Governor Trammell for all the kid glove men to get out and soil their hands in making good roads or making at them the people of Sanford and vicinity expect to repair some of the bad spots in the several roads that are travelled to a greater degree than some of the lesser trails. The work is only temporary for the people who have been journeying and waiting for the brick roads and consequently some of these mornings even before the Governor gives them permission the good people of the West side will congregate and those who do not feel able to work the roads in person will work them in spirit by turning teams or men to work their portion. Some of the residents are so busy that they are not afraid to work with their hands and throw a few shovels of dirt and help in the good work. All this will make better roads of only temporary and the feelings of the people will at least be appeased. The executive committee is composed of G. H. Fernald, G. A. Speer, J. D. Roberts, W. M. McKinnon, W. W. Abernathy. There were thirty two firms represented at the meeting and as many more have promised their cooperation in joining the League. Several ideas will be tried in the publicity direction and by offering the best goods at rock bottom prices and giving the customers free transportation to and from Sanford and the depot there is no doubt that the merchants of Sanford will have the greatest season that has ever been accorded. them and the League will be beneficial in many ways. The Merchants Transportation League met again yesterday to perfect their plans and the following membership committee was appointed: H. M. Ladin, G. A. Irwin and Geo. Speer. The committee will call upon the merchants to collect the initial fee for membership. Printed matter will be arranged for in a few days showing the list of members and other important details. Within a few days the membership fee will be raised to a minimum of \$2.00 per annum. This will be made necessary by the extra expense of printing new cards of the list of members every time new names are added to the list. This behooves all the merchants to join now at the low rate of \$5. The meeting yesterday demonstrated beyond peradventure the success of the league and the merchants expect to go after business of this season as never before.

Letter From Col. Thrasher

Oct. 26th 1913

Hon. F. L. Woodruff, Sanford Florida. Dear Frank: Have had a rough voyage from Bremen across this deep blue sea on the good ship George Washington seeking the land of Washington of Robert E. Lee and of Abraham Lincoln "my own my native land." And my bosom swells with emotion and my heart beats in ecstasy as I gaze at the Statue of Liberty and the stars and stripes proudly floating 'o'er the land of the brave and the home of the free." Altho' the storm raged furiously accompanied by rain and hail and the white crested billows mounted high—well about as high as Seminole County Court house—this good ship surged and rallied and plunged safely through it all and I did not loose my head "didn't feed the fish" but continued to eat three square meals each day with grits—dish divine and lit for the Gods for breakfast. Then the storm subsided and as we approached this great city the sea became calm and it seemed like floating through Southern Summer Seas with favoring winds soft yet brilliant sunshine and cloudless skies. And now there is joy and gladness in the faces and in the hearts of each of the 2674 passengers as well as of the 603 officers and crew and I am glad to report that "everything is lovely and the goods hangs high." And then I am as lively as a cricket and wild yes in a big rash hurry to see you and other Sanford friends.

Steamboats and railroads ARE SO SLOW. I am impatient and shall attempt to send greetings to Sanford by airmail or by wireless.

I must shake hands with Harry Papworth, Miss Jana and some other New York friends tip my hat to "Miss Liberty" and pay my respects to Her old square, before speeding southward. Now Frank: do be very careful of yourself; keep well and sober and REMAIN ON THE EARTH TILL AFTER my arrival for I wish to shake your hand and gaze at a smiling face. 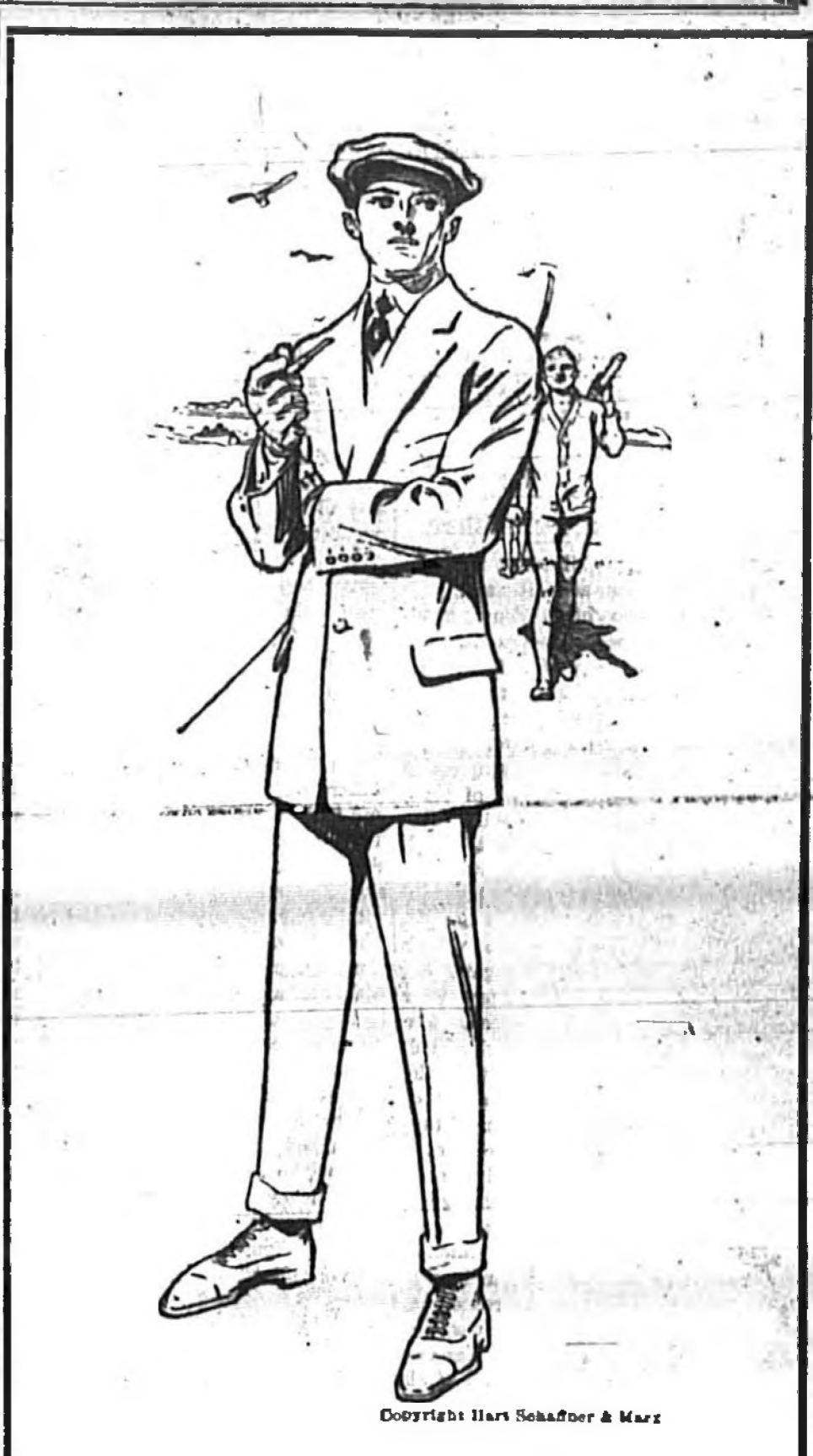

To Test Air in Room.

A simple way to tell whether your room is properly ventilated is to place a wide-necked bottle of water, into which you have put half an ounce of lime water, in the room, letting it remain uncovered over night. If in the morning the lime water is milk the ventilation is bad. At the time water becomes milk on your covering the bottle with your hand and shake. The mouth with your hand and shake. If the vessel the ventilation is not sufficiently good. If the time water remains clear the air of that room is pure.

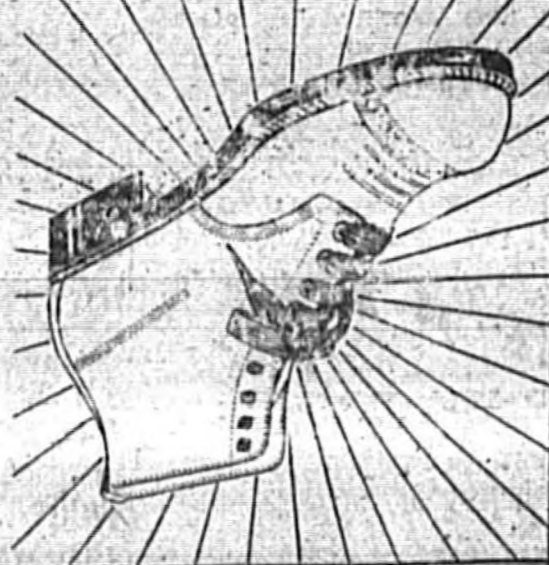
