

SEPARATE UNIT OF MILITIA IS NOW PROPOSED

Divorce Of Bureau From The General Staff With Assistant Secretary In Charge, Is Recommendation Rickards

Negress Of National Guard Slowed, He Says

Present Method Of Conducting Examinations Called A "Real Injustice" By Chief

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Divorce of the Militia Bureau of the War Department from General Staff control through appointment of an assistant secretary to handle all national guard affairs under appropriations separate from those for the regular army, is recommended by Maj. Gen. George C. Rickards, head of the Pennsylvania National Guard, in his annual report made public today as chief of the bureau.

Progress of the National Guard has been hindered as a whole, Gen. Rickards declared, by "the tendency of the War Department general staff to take over certain administrative functions of the chief of the Militia Bureau."

"It should be apparent to the General Staff," the report continued, "that the Militia Bureau has a competent staff of regular army officers who are familiar with the National Guards of all the states, and know their problems through more intimate contact with them than it is possible for any other War Department agency to have."

"I am convinced," the General declared, "that sound business principles and best interests of national defense will be served when the Chief, Militia Bureau, shall have his duties fully defined by regulations, if not by law, and be permitted to exercise them. My experience leads me to the conclusion that if (the National Guard) feeling which now appears to be prevalent in the regular army to the effect that money is used for the maintenance of the National Guard are being taken from funds necessary for the support of the regular army."

"It is my firm conviction, based on long experience and close study, that had the Chief, Militia Bureau, as I believe was contemplated by the Congress, and to have handled the appropriations in his own way instead of being bound by the actions of the Secretary in his own way instead of being bound by the actions of the Secretary of War, which actions were based on recommendations of the General Staff, a strength of 190,000 could have

been reached and maintained throughout the years 1925 and 1926.

"Due to the restrictions placed upon it by higher authority, the Militia Bureau was forced to stop Federal recognition of new units, restrict recruitment, and reduce the number of armory drills, thus leaving a considerable unused balance of funds which was appropriated by the Congress for these specific purposes."

Gen. Rickards complained that present War Department policy of conducting examinations for general officers in the Guard only annually was "a real injustice" because it kept vacancies open for months and was not in harmony with the prompt promotion for regular officers. He also deplored other "hindrances" to the guard development, and added:

"I do not wish to be understood as condemning the whole War Department policy as it relates to the National Guard, for I trust I am too liberal-minded to do that. As a result of my experience during one year as a member of the War Department General Staff, four years as Chief, Militia Bureau, and 43 years of continuous active National Guard service, I feel qualified to speak on this subject."

"There is much to praise and comparatively little to condemn. Jealousy, animosity and personal advancement must have no place in the great undertaking, which has won such hearty approval."

"I still urge strongly as ever the amendment of the law so as to provide that there shall be issued to federally-recognized National Guard officers commissions in the Federal Service, to become effective upon call or draft into

the service of the United States without reference to appointment or commission in the Officers Reserve Corps.

"I respectfully recommend the advisability of abolishing the title of Chief, Militia Bureau, and instead to amend the law so as to make this officer an assistant secretary of war, with his duties specifically defined by law."

Gen. Rickards served as Chief of the Bureau for all but two days of the fiscal year covered by the report and signed the body of the document, which included his recommendations, at the request of his successor, the present chief, Maj. Gen. Creed C. Hammond of the Oregon National Guard.

Gen. Hammond made no reference to his predecessor's conclusions in the brief word he added to the report, although he commented on "the wonderful work" done by Gen. Rickards as militia chief. The new chief's recommendations were confined to requests for modification of the non-recognition policy of the department as to new guard units, particularly in the case of air units for the four guard divisions still lacking in this respect, the Thirty-Second (Michigan and Wisconsin), the Thirty-Third (Illinois), the Twenty-Seventh (Ohio) and the Forty-Fourth (New York, New Jersey and Delaware).

In connection with the need of the guard for increased appropriations, Gen. Hammond pointed out that many articles issued to the state troops formerly by the War Department from surplus war stocks, now must be charged against guard appropriations and that the "most gratifying" increase in attendance at armory drills merited an increase in appropriations for pay purposes.

STARTLING NEW EVIDENCE SHOWN IN BIG WILL CASE

Discomfiture Of Defendant In McArthur Hearing And A Hint At Sensational Disclosures Come Today

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 5.

(AP)—The startling disclosure that a nephew of George E. Rafferty, was a roomer at the Rafferty home here for at least two weeks prior to the death of Archibald McArthur, on June 13 last, and that this man left Jacksonville to go to California about a month ago today, was dropped like a bomb into the hearing of the contest of McArthur's will before County Judge John W. DuBoise. Luther McArthur of McArthur, Calif., nephew, is leading in the fight by fourteen other relatives who seek to have the probate of the will revoked.

In the will Rafferty, of no kin to McArthur, was bequeathed the major portion of the estate estimated at \$50,000 to \$350,000 in value, while the relatives were left but \$5 each. Rafferty too is administrator of the will's provisions. Charles Muchison, associated with Herman Ulmer in the plaintiff's action brought the announcement from Rafferty while questioning him about a man named "Varrell." After further questioning, Rafferty, with some evident confusion, admitted that Varrell and James Stofer was one and the same man and that he was his nephew, and had roomed at his home at the time of McArthur's death, and had been there for about two weeks "while his wife was in Kentucky."

Spider Ropes, Hog Ties, Kills And Drags Away Mouse

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—(AP)—

A vouchsafed story of a long battle between an ordinary kitchen spider and a half grown mouse, in which the spider won by tediously wrapping its strands around the mouse's tail, and eventually lifting it free of the floor into its web, has been added to the long list of nature's paradoxical tales, by the American nature association.

The story, made public today by the association, was based on a report made to it by Martin J. Arvin of Indiana, who said he first found the mouse caught in the spider's web behind a leg of his kitchen range. When he first saw it in the morning, the mouse was suspended with several strands around its tail, and was desperately scraping the floor with its fore feet. After futile attempts to draw the mouse from the floor by throwing a web lariat around its neck, the spider took a position at the base of the mouse's tail, where the skin was tender, and "evidently sunk its mandibles into the victim, which was noticed to flinch several times."

Returning home in the evening Arvin said he found the mouse, then dead, lifted into the web a full inch above the floor. Things remained undisturbed until the following morning, when the mouse had been raised one and three quarters inches.

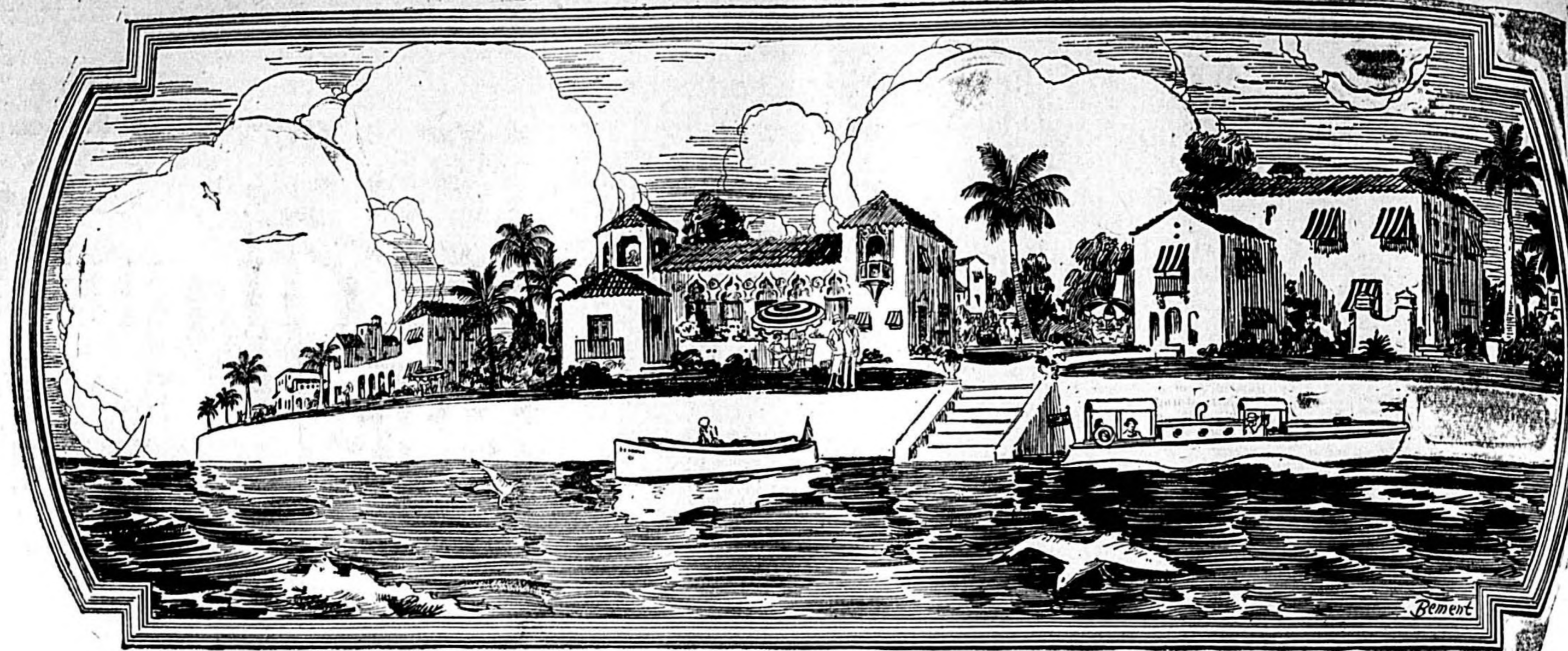

To Keep Grand Jury Busy

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Enough evidence of rum running and corruption of government officials by the alleged "Dwyer syndicate" is on hand to keep the grand jury which convenes today, busy for a month, U. S. Attorney Buckner believes.

Twenty members of the "gang" still are sought although 23, including William Dwyer, widely known sportsman and race track owner, have been arrested. The syndicate, it is charged in the latest report found operating on the Atlantic seaboard, its business is to sell to rum runners millions of dollars annually.

The Steamship Augusta was under guard today for the second time in connection with rum running investigations. The first seizure was July, when it had 30,863 cases of whiskey aboard started the investigation which resulted in last week's arrests.

Claim Big Shipment Landed

Yesterday the Augusta nozed out of the port of Cape May, N. J., with barely enough steam in its boilers to keep it moving. A Coast Guard boat piloted it between two rock jetties to a safe anchorage. Investigation started when a sailor boasted the vessel had run 2,000 cases of liquor ashore under cover of the heavy fog, and the captain had gone ashore with the money from the sale.

First mate Albert Erickson of the Augusta told coast guardsmen neither he nor any of the crew knew the captain's name or whereabouts, and that the captain has his own, the ship's and Erickson's papers.

the taxpayer increases in uniformity. It was impossible to reduce the rates in all brackets and preserve proper gradations in the tax. That somewhere benefited more than other is due largely to the arbitrary character of the reductions made by the acts of 1921 and 1923.

No Useful Purpose Served

Referring to the committee's repeal of the provisions for publicity of income tax returns, the report declared the Treasury Department had informed the committee that "no useful purpose has been served" by it.

Reduction of the inheritance tax rates from a maximum of 40 per cent to 20 per cent and increase in the credit to be allowed in federal inheritance tax settlements of the amount paid on state inheritance levies from 25 per cent to 80 per cent eventually will reduce by one half the present yield from this levy of \$100,000,000 annually, the report said.

The decrease in revenues from inheritance taxes by virtue of these revisions, however, will be gradual it said with the loss next calendar year being negligible and in following year amounting to about \$15,000,000. The report points out that the states by use of the credit provision will be able to make use of this tax without additional cost to its citizens.

Referring to the repeal of most of the excise and occupational taxes, are now equitable in their application and produce but little revenue.

Cuts Based on Conditions

The tax on cigars, which was reduced, "was so high as to depress the business and reduce the revenue to the government," the report declared. The tax on jewelry also repealed, was declared as "difficult to collect and burdensome of operation."

Repeal of the tax on automobile trucks was voted because it was a tax "solely on business," the

report said, and the levies on automobile tires and parts, also repealed, were declared taxes on "misfortune."

Repeal of the passenger car tax could not be considered, the report said "as it would make the total reduction carried by the bill altogether too large." The rate was cut from five to three per cent.

The tax on alcohol, which would

be cut 25 per cent a year hence, and an additional 25 per cent in two years, was classified as a levy which "constitutes a burden upon the consumers to whom it is in most cases shifted by the manufacturer."

The bill proposes to retain the membership of board of tax appeals at 16 and increase the salaries of members from \$7,500 to \$10,000 annually.

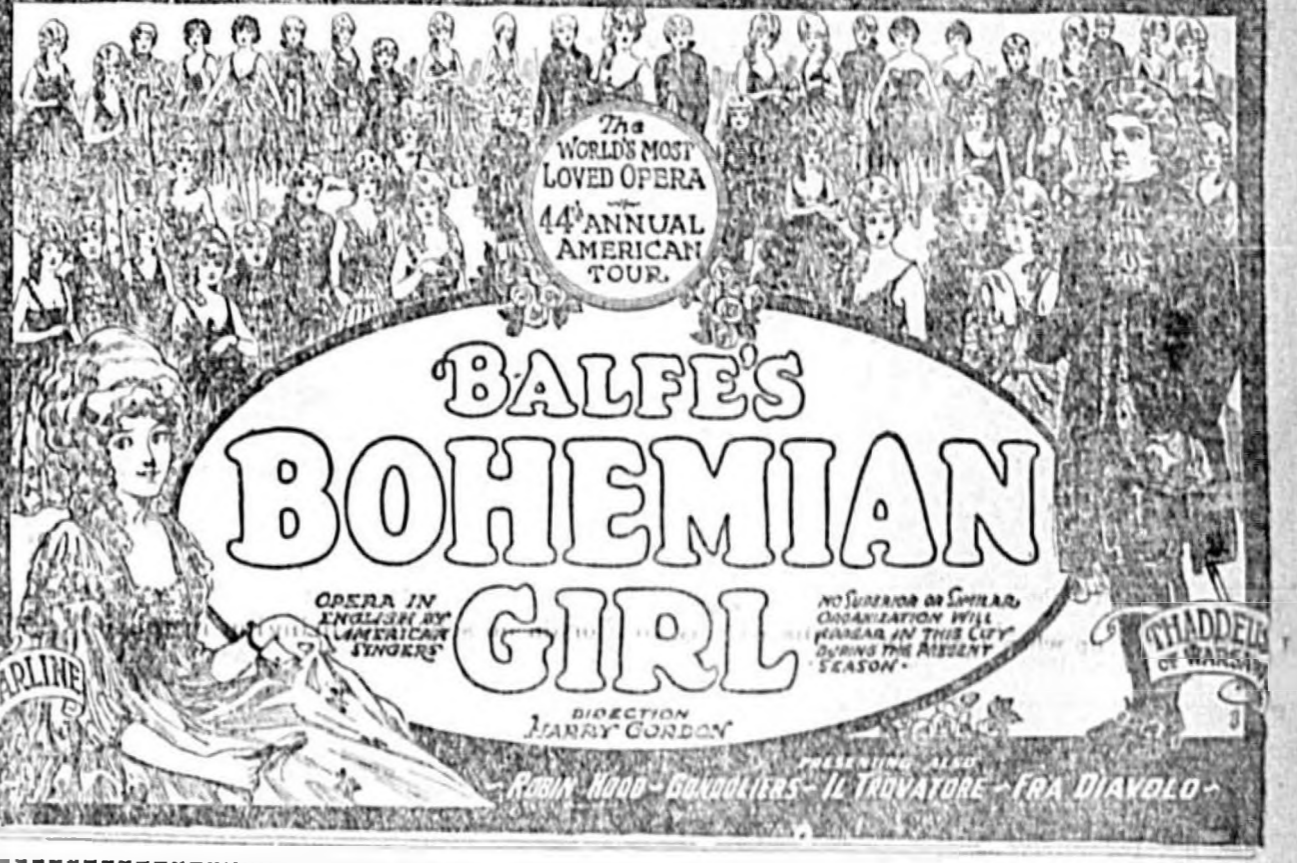

NORTHERN TOURS ARE SCHEDULED TO VISIT FLORIDA

Numerous Points, Including Sanford, To Be Visited By "All Expense" Tours From Chicago And Louisville

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Dec. 7.—(P)—Proof that the North is still vitally interested in Florida and is sending most of its "All-Expense" tours to this State, was had here yesterday in an announcement from the Chamber of Commerce that 75 Florida Golf tourists under the auspices of The Chicago Gopher, and over 100 Pendergrass All-Expense tourists from Louisville, Ky., will visit Daytona Beach during the next 60 days.

The golf enthusiasts will be entertained here for two days on December 10 and 11, by Daytona Shores. A fleet of parlor Pullman buses will be placed at their disposal for visiting three completed golf courses in this vicinity. In addition, they will be taken on a tour of the Halifax Country and over the 22 miles comprising the World's Greatest Beach.

The Louisville tourists will be in Daytona Beach on Sunday, January 17. They too, according to arrangements with the Chamber of Commerce, will be the guests of Daytona Shores. The party will be entertained at luncheon and dinner at Daytona Shores Lodge, the former roadhouse inn along the Dixie at the head of the Halifax River.

The tourists will have the following itinerary: Louisville to River Junction over the I. and N. R. R.; A. C. R. R. to Jacksonville; F. E. C. R. R. to Miami; F. E. C. R. R. to Orange City Junction; A. C. L. to Deland; A. C. L. to Tampa; A. C. L. to Leesburg; A. C. L. to Palatka; A. C. L. to Jacksonville; A. C. L. to Albany; and thence over the C. of G., R. R. and I. and N. to Louisville.

In addition to Daytona Beach, the party will stop over at the following Florida cities: Pensacola, Halls, Jacksonville, St. Augustine, Miami, Hollywood, Ft. Lauderdale, Boca Raton, West Palm Beach, New Smyrna, Deland, Sanford, Orlando, Tampa, Lakeland, Leesburg, Ocala, Green Cove Springs, and possibly other intermediate points. The trip is to take 10 days.

Many Cattle Given Tuberculosis Test

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Dec. 7.—(P)—Sixty three herds of cattle, or 1,112 head, were tested for tuberculosis in Florida during the month of October, according to a report on eradication work, sent out by the United States Department of Agriculture. The total once-tested free for October in the state was 5,923 herds, or 97,916 heads, the report states, and the total accepted 2789 herds, or 15,012 heads.

The total under supervision in Florida during October, the report says, was 6,735 herds, or 84,592 heads, while those on the waiting list were 60 herds, or 900 heads.

The number of "modified re-credited" counties in Florida in the eradication work for October, the report adds, was three.

Twenty one cattle reacted to the test for the month. The tuberculosis eradication work, it was explained, is being done in the various states with the federal government and commonwealths co-operating.

NEGRO IS NOW ASSISTANT SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Dec. 7.—(P)—William S. Matthews, negro, Washington, arrived today to be assistant United States deputy. He was sent by the Department of Justice after a disagreement between District Attorney Williamson and Senator Deneren over appointment of a permanent assistant.

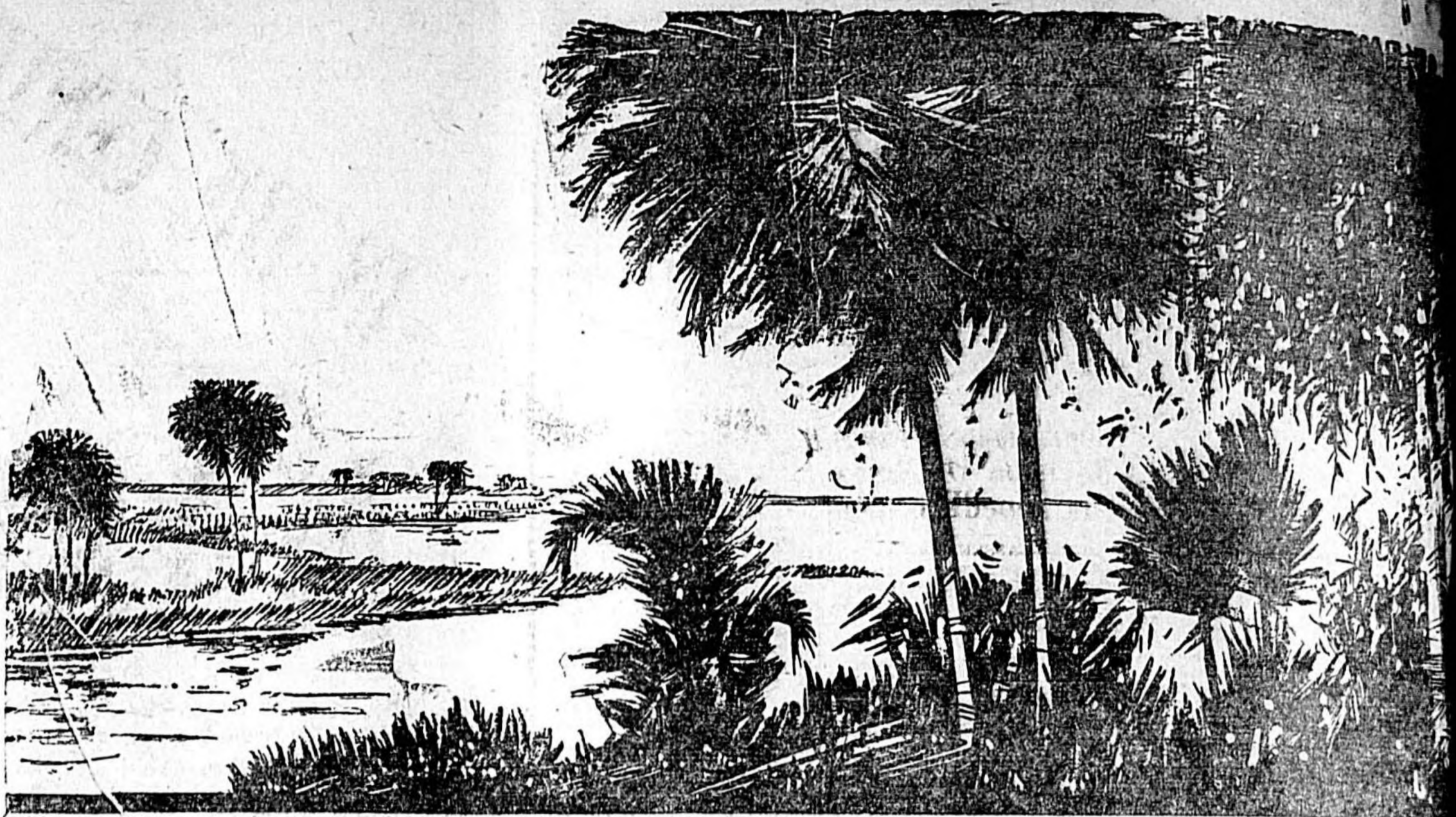

Five Reasons Why College Athletics Are Essential, Given By Dr. S. V. Sanford

ATHENS, Ga., Dec. 7.—(AP)—There are five reasons why intercollegiate athletics are essential to the proper college life of today, Dr. S. V. Sanford, president of the Southern Conference, told representatives of that organization during his impromptu address, in which he defended the principle of college sports and replied to criticisms of such sports.

The five reasons as enumerated by Dr. Sanford were as follows:

1. Athletic contests improve the physical condition of the students. In the early days of athletic sports students trained for the season only, but now they train for all time. Students have been taught true lessons of loyalty that demands constant training in season and out of season.

2. Athletic games improve the morals and manners of the students and the public. These contests teach men how to make sacrifices, how to command, how to obey; they teach them to be temperate in all things; to know the value of team work; to be energetic, to be courteous and fair under all circumstances. They give the public its finest lessons in clean sportsmanship for the manners of a people are made on the grounds where the games are played. The respect shown for the sportsman's code is as refreshing an example of the progress of the race as was the gentleman's code exemplified by the knights in the age of chivalry.

3. Athletic games increase the loyalty of the students to the college. I think our most loyal alumni are those who have represented the college on the athletic field. They are the men who have been willing to give something while in college. In the last session of the Georgia legislature there were 55 alumni of the University. They were all loyal. It cannot be denied that the most sacrificing, the most aggressive were the athletes—those who had taken part in competitive contests.

4. They serve to create and foster an institutional solidarity afforded in like degree by no other agency. To some this may seem like a humiliating admission, but it is certainly a fact that athletics have in many institutions constituted practically the only bond of common interest. How large an auditorium is needed to

care for the alumni who return at the annual alumni reunion at commencement, but where is the stadium that can accommodate the alumni who return at "homecoming"—the annual football game?

5. They afford a laboratory training for the development of character such as is not afforded elsewhere in the life of the undergraduate.

Commission Orders Revision Of Rates On Canned Products

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Dec. 7.—(AP)—A controversy of several months standing was ended here when the Florida Railroad Commission ordered a revision of its previous schedule of rates on canned goods.

In Order Number 831, issued recently by the commission, the protests of fourteen Short Line Railroads of Florida against a scale of canned goods freight rates put into effect June 4, 1925 were upheld. The scale had been applied primarily for the larger carriers, and the smaller roads declared it unreasonable for them.

The rates ordered June 4, to be effective August 1, were cancelled insofar as they applied between points of Florida on the lines of the following carriers:

Alabama, Florida and Gulf; Apalachicola Northern; Atlanta and St. Andrews Bay Railway company; Birmingham, Columbus and St. Andrews; Charlotte Harbor, and Northern; Fellsmere Railroad; Georgia and Florida; Georgia, Florida and Alabama; Gulf Ports Terminal; Muscle Shoals, Birmingham and Pensacola; Tampa and Jacksonville; Taveres and Gulf; Mariana and Blountstown.

The more recent order of the commission has been mailed out to all interests involved, with a schedule of rates for the smaller carriers set forth.

BEARS WIN WITH GRANGE PLAYING IN SUPERB FORM

Former College Star Leads Team To Victory Over Yellow Jackets At Philadelphia Saturday Afternoon

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Red Grange's second invasion of Philadelphia was again a success: He scored two touchdowns for the Chicago Bears in their football game with the Frankfort Yellow-jackets of this city Saturday evening the western team to win, 11 to 7.

The western comet was not as spectacular as he was in the game against the University of Pennsylvania, but he was there with the so-called punch when it was needed in the second period when he had to go only a yard and a half to the goal line. He left the game shortly afterward and came back in the fourth period. With the ball on the one yard line he was again called upon to make a touchdown and came through nicely with good interference.

A Britt-Chittenden Development

Cement Companies Locating In State Help Construction

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Dec. 7.—(P)—Florida affords excellent opportunities for the manufacture of cement, and the new plant announced for Marion county is, doubtless, only a forerunner of others to follow.

This was the comment of Herman Gunter and D. S. Mossom, state geologist and assistant state geologist, respectively, in referring to the announcement that a cement plant to cost two million and a half dollars would begin operations in Marion county in the fall of 1926.

Erection of a cement plant, the geologist and his assistant remarked will greatly aid certain projects in the state, such as highway work, and construction of all kinds. Florida, it was stated, uses 3,000,000 barrels of cement each day.

Florida is particularly suitable for cement plants, the geologists said, because of the splendid limestone deposits. There is no reason why the state should not produce a large portion of the cement used in Florida which is purchased in other states, and in foreign countries, it was pointed out.

The Marion county plant will be located near the old home of Governor Martin. The chief executive was highly elated when told of the plans for the plant.

Educational Work And Prizes Offered To Florida By Iowa

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Dec. 7.—(P)—Floridians interested in research work are eligible to participate in a contest announced by Maude McBroom, of the University Elementary School, Iowa City, Iowa, who is president of an association of noted educators, who are seeking the best paper on research in education scholarship, for the year 1925-1926.

The contest is being staged by Pi Lambda Theta, which organization, according to a copy of the application received at the Department of Public Instruction, desires to secure the most worthy young woman in the country interested in Educational research.

The qualifications state that the candidate must have at least a degree in Master of Arts from a graduate school of recognized worth, and shall have shown notable skill in teaching and significant accomplishment in research, and have definite plans for further research. The obligations are that the scholar must devote herself unreservedly to study of research, as outlined in her application; to submit any proposed change in plans to the chairman for approval, and send the chairman at least two reports of work, the first not later than January 15.

Co-Operation Of All Civic Bodies Sought

AUBURNDALE, Fla., Dec. 7. Under the direction of Campbell Palfrey, president of the local realty board, a liaison unit composed of all civic and trade bodies of the city, has been formed to co-operate in unifying their efforts toward the betterment of the city.

The liaison unit now has on its program the demanding of safety gates at railroad crossings in the city; preservation of Lakefront beauty and elimination of petty jealousies between individual firms of the city and between Auburndale and neighboring cities.
