Two governmental meetings are scheduled for Dec. 6.

The Seminole County Local Planning Agency will hold a public hearing on the Chuluota Small Area Study, beginning at 7 p.m. at the County Services Building, 1101 E. First St., Sanford.

The public meeting will be the first of two that will determine how the East Rural Plan and the county's Comprehensive Land Use Plan, established in the early 1990s, will be used to determine the rural character of east Seminole County.

Groups such as the Sierra Club, Coalition for Responsible Econlockhatchee Development, Seminole Audubon Society, and the South East Seminole Voters Association have indicated they will participate in the public hearing.

In Lake Mary, The Board of Adjustment will meet to discuss setback changes to allow a pool to be built near the front line of a home in the Misty Oaks subdivision.

That meeting begins at 7 p.m. at Lake Mary City Hall, 100 N. country Club Road.

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City will not pay for festival overrun

SANFORD - The Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce is seeking help from the city after exceeding its budget by more than \$17,000 for the Dec. 4 Heritage Festival.

Chamber director Ron Rose asked for \$9,748 to pay for electrical hook ups. The Sanford City Commission

on Monday approved \$5,000 to cover electrical hook up expenses. The commission previously approved funding \$8,600 for the festival. This leaves \$4,478 toward electrical hook ups that the city will not cover.

"We have got to be better stewards of the taxpayers' money," Sanford Mayor Larry Dale said. "We can't just dole out money after the fact. We've

got to know in advance what the benefit is to the taxpayers. We can't go spending whatever we want to, and expect the taxpayers to always cover it. We need to be more foresighted."

Rose said the local Community Redevelopment Agency had approved \$5,000 to cover electrical hook up. However, the commission said the agency had no authority to allocate \$5,000 of the city's money.

"You didn't discuss this with the commission before spending the money," Commissioner Whitey Eckstein said. "That's wrong. The CRA is an advisory body, at the most. If they said you could have \$5,000 it was erroneous. You should have come to us. The other \$4,500, the chamber has got to eat because of bad planning."

Rose said the Chamber does not have the funding to cover

the remaining costs of electrical hook ups.

"I have no idea how we're going to pay for it," Rose said. "We don't have the funding. We were expecting to make this money back with the festival. The chamber is in big trouble."

Rose said the permanent electrical hook ups represent a capital improvement to the city, and they will save the city. Please see Festival, Page 3A

Another automotive award rolls in for college program

SANFORD - The big wheels are grinning again at Seminole Community College. For the third consecutive year, the school's automotive program has received national honors and brought in \$30,000 in scholarships.

The college received the 1998 American Vocational Association Award in Automotive Service for post secondary, manufacturer-affiliated schools.

The Automotive Student Service Educational Training (ASSET) Program at SCC is a cooperative program between the school and the Ford Motor Company. Students participate in a two-year program that culminates in an associate's degree in automotive technology.

ASSET is divided into two parts; weeks of classroom instruction alternating with weeks of co-op work experience at a sponsoring Ford or Lincoln-Mercury dealership throughout the course.

"Our programs are now rated number one in the nation by the Industry Planning Council of the American Automobile Association and the American Vocational Association," said Jim Cox, automotive department chair at SCC.

SCC President Ann McGee said the award "recognizes programs in automotive service that exemplify high standards for career preparation as determined by individuals employed in the field."

Cox and Mike Griffin, Ford ASSET coordinator/instructor received the AVA award earlier this month at a convention in New Orleans. One official said that SCC's ASSET "far exceeds the value of any other technical school by the way it grooms the students with in-depth book and hands-on knowledge."

Students in the program also receive course requirements in social science, physical science, microcomputer applications, English and humanities. "Our stu-

Lyons will not run for city post

SANFORD - Sanford City Commissioner Kerry Lyons announced at Monday's city commission session that he will not seek re-election when his term ends in February.

Lyons has served one term, and was facing challenges from A.A. McClanahan and Dean Ray for his seat.

"It's a tough decision," Lyons said. "I've thought about it quite a bit. It's a lot of things. I could never replace my years here. Like Michael

Jordan, I'm going out on top."

Lyons said he will run for public office again in the future.

"I don't intend to leave Sanford," Lyons said. "I will run again for public office sometime in the future."

The announcement by Lyons took the commission by surprise.

"This is a shock," Commissioner Velma Williams said. "I was looking forward to working with you on your campaign."

Lyons said he would remain neutral on who he sup-

ports for his commission seat.

Lyons said the highlight of his tenure on the commission was being elected, Dec. 4, 1994. Lyons defeated McClanahan.

"What else could top being elected," Lyons said.

"Working with both commissions that I've worked with has been wonderful."

Lyons said that when he took office, he only intended to serve one term.

"This is what I've said I would do all along," Lyons said. "I've done what I wanted to do."

Police department gets cameras compliments of M.A.D.D.

LONGWOOD - The Longwood Police Department is using in-car video cameras in marked patrol vehicles to fight crime, thanks to a donation from Mothers Against Drunk Driving.

The Orlando Chapter of M.A.D.D. donated \$8,000 for the purchase of two in-car video cameras, which were installed last month.

The cameras have been used to audio tape two burglary sus-

pects, to apprehend two armed robbery suspects, and to arrest 14 impaired drivers.

"We're very grateful for this," Mayor Rusty Miles said. "This is a wonderful organization. This is truly a partnership in fighting crime."

Casey Morris, Orlando M.A.D.D. chapter director, received a certificate of appreciation from the city commission.

"I want to thank Lt. Stephanie Ryan [of the Longwood Police Department] for helping us in our mission to save lives," Mor-

ris said. "I just want to thank Longwood for everything they're doing to fight against drunk driving."

The Longwood Police Department determined that in-car video cameras would be a valuable asset in law enforcement, especially in the identification, apprehension and prosecution of impaired drivers. The police approached M.A.D.D.'s Orlando Chapter regarding the acquisition of the cameras and related equipment.

Go on, laugh and be healthy

"Patch Adams" is a make-you-feel-good movie that ought to cure anyone who has the post-Christmas blahs.

Most real doctors aren't as funny and sweet as Patch Adams.

Nowadays, they can't afford to be. They'd probably be sued for malpractice.

A friend who had surgery on Christmas Eve at Central Florida Regional Hospital in Sanford said the doctor on duty at the emergency room entertained her by doing some magical coin tricks. She said he also gave a shirt to a homeless man.

Ernest Hoffman said he remembers a doctor in a Gainesville hospital who recited lines from Marx Brothers movies. "I loved the guy," Hoffman said.

Another man, hospitalized with a staph infection, wondered why no one came to his room for several hours. His doctor had written "Leper Colony" on the door.

In recent years, two of America's surgeon generals have caused a few laughs. All C. Everett Koop had to do was look into a camera, and people laughed. All Joycelyn Elders had to do was share her ideas about sex education for children and we howled.

It's more than evident that we hold our physicians more accountable than we do our presidents. Bill Clinton would have been out of the Oval Office a year ago if he were a doctor. Bombing Iraq is one thing, performing an appendectomy another. America prefers surgeons with clean hands.

Some doctors not only are afraid to joke on duty but worried about saying or doing something stupid at a party. They're liable to repeat a joke some idiot told the same night. Many doctors keep their opinions and jokes to themselves when off duty.

Years ago the family doctor used to make house calls. The minute he knocked on the door, everyone felt a little better. He'd come into your room, take your temperature, ask you to say "aaah" and then he would visit awhile. He was part of the family.

Most of us don't have a doctor of our own anymore. We go to a number of doctors and are referred to another number of doctors. Just about all of them are very smart but only a few have the slightest trace of humor. Hopefully, they're kind and not terribly expensive.

We're finding out more and more that life is dangerous to our health. Something new constantly is wearing us down or killing us. The things we like either cause cancer or brings on heart attacks. Many are scared to death to breathe heaven forbid lie in the sun.

The least funny doctor is our morbid Michigan pal, Dr. Jack Kevorjian. Dr. K. leaves them in the aisles but they aren't exactly laughing. Patch Adams and Dr. K. wouldn't care much for each other's methods even if their lives depended on it.

We can not live without good medical attention from dedicated doctors. Everyone should get frequent checkups and listen to what the doctor says. Consider yourself lucky if the doctor makes you laugh. It's the healthy thing to do.

Many different tropical and subtropical plants are found in a typical Florida landscape. While tropical plants need to be protected from temperatures below 50 degrees F, subtropical plants can harden to withstand freezing temperatures. The ability of plants to tolerate freezing temperatures is influenced by temperature changes prior to a freeze. A gradual decrease in temperature over a relative long period of time prepares the plants to withstand cold temperatures. Even plants normally tolerant to low temperatures may be injured if a sudden decrease in temperature occurs. Cold injury can occur to the entire plant or to plant parts such as buds, flowers, fruits, trunks, stems or roots. Many plant parts can adapt to tolerate cold, but flowers, buds, fruits and roots have little ability to develop cold tolerance.

Containers: Roots of plants in the landscape will escape cold injury frequently, but under the same conditions plant roots growing in small containers can be frozen by low temperatures. Roots of plants growing in exposed containers can be injured by low tempera-

Fertilization: Most landscape plants are fertilized two or three times a year. In Central Florida, usually one application is usually scheduled in March and another in September. Late fall applications should be avoided as it can promote untimely late flush of new growth. Fertilizer rates

should be reduced in the fall because plant nutrient consumption declines during the colder months. Plants should receive in the fall about a third to one half the normal fertilizer rate.

Irrigation: Materials such as cloth sheets, quilts and plastics can be placed over plants to protect them from frost damage. Covers that extend to the ground and do not touch the plant tissues, will protect plants by reducing radiant heat loss from the plants and the ground. A light bulb can be placed under the covers to provide a source of heat to the plants when very low temperatures are expected. The covers must be removed as temperatures rise during a sunny day. Contact between the plant tissues and the coverings, may result in cold injury.

Pruning after a freeze: Pruning should be delayed until new growth is visible. Dead leaves may be removed as soon as they have turned brown. Cold damaged to woody tissues can be best determined by examining the food conducting tissues under the bark. If scratching into the bark reveals black or brown tissues,

continue the search until you find green tissues when scratched. Prune back to the live wood to promote healthy growth of the branches.

Cold injury to palms: Remove damaged portions of leaves but keep the green, not injured portions of the leaves to maintain a high level of photosynthetic area. Spray palms with a copper containing fungicide at the recommended

rate. Repeat the spray 10 days after the first treatment with the copper fungicide or another broad spectrum fungicide. Palms growing in containers should receive a fungicide soil drench to suppress possible root infecting fungi from causing root rot. A monthly soluble nutrient solution containing minor elements can be applied to help palms recover from light freeze injuries.

Subtropical plants can adapt to tolerate cold

Soil heat: Radiating heat from soil warms the air above ground and low-growing plants will greatly benefit from this source of heat. Mulches placed around plants to protect the roots will help in preserving soil heat. Organic mulches such as pine bark are recommended.

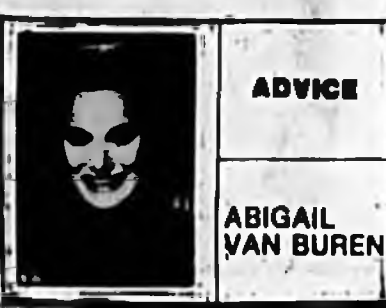
leverage and could manipulate the cutlery much easier.

money in the future. Hook ups were installed on a city light pole for 600 amp service, 400 amps for lights and 200 amps for sound.

"We found out that if we went this route it would be a capital improvement for the city," Rose said. "It was a good investment for the city and the community if we're going to have future events. In the long range, this expense will save you money."

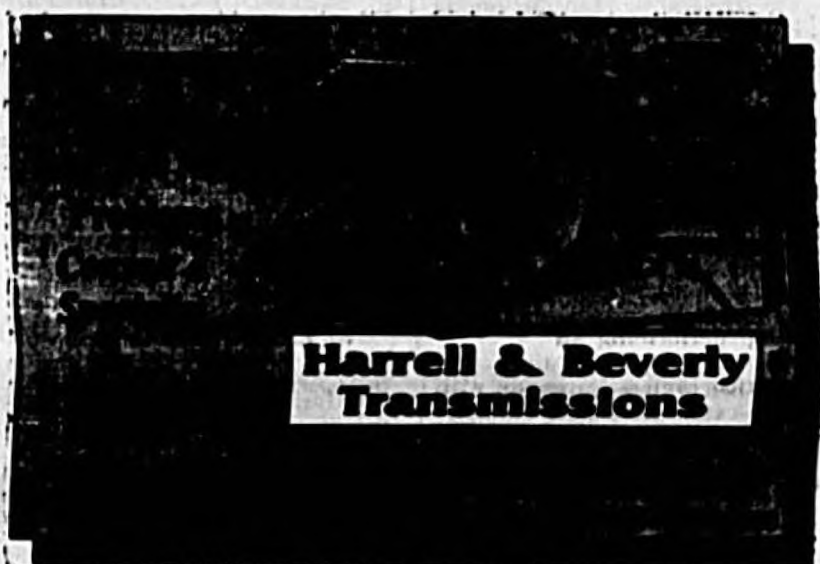
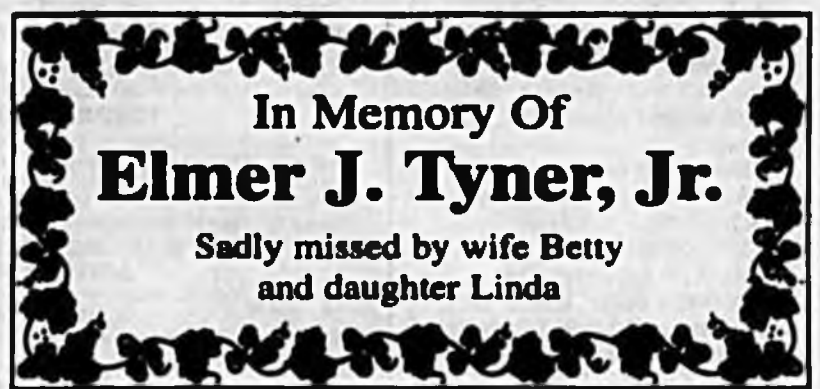
This is the second consecutive year the city has provided debt funding for a city festival. Last year, the city provided Sanford Main Street with \$7,000 in funding over the budget for its festival.

"The thing that concerns me is it's always the city," Commissioner Kerry Lyons said. "There's no question it was a great festival. I just have a problem with the city always bailing this out."

This was the first year the Chamber sponsored the festival.

"Without spending this money there would have been no festival," Rose said. "I knew there was going to be a gamble. I was going to take a gamble and risk my job to turn this chamber around. I am positive this event will make money next

year. I apologize for this not being handled properly."

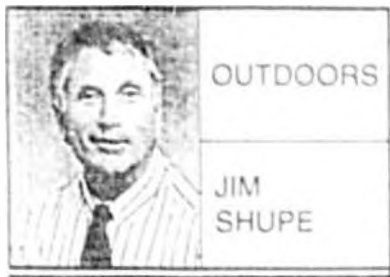

Trailing your boat

Have The Right Trailer For Your Boat

Normally, the width and length of the boat determines the width and length of the trailer. Most trailers have plastic rollers or cushioned wooden banks to support the bottom of the boat.

Check out the trailer manufacturer's load capacity. If the weight of the boat and its engine is more than 90 percent of the recommended load capacity, buy the next larger trailer. This is because your gear (fuel, PFDs, anchors, lines, etc.) will increase the overall weight by at least 10 percent.

Most boat trailers connect to a ball hitch on the towing vehicle. Frame-mounted hitches reduce trailer swaying. Most importantly, the trailer hitch must match the size of the ball hitch. Never use a ball hitch that is too small. The size rating will be stamped on the ball. On the trailer hitch the size will be stamped on the coupler.

Tongue weight is the weight the loaded trailer places on the towing hitch. The tongue weight should be 7-10 percent of the boat and trailer weight. Too much tongue weight will cause "tail dragging" of the towing vehicle. Too little tongue weight will cause the trailer to sway while pulling.

Couplings may work loose, and should be checked frequently. Trailers should be equipped with two safety chains that are strong enough to control the trailer if the hitch or coupling breaks.

Before Leaving Home
All gear in the boat should be secured firmly to keep it from shifting, and should be arranged so the weight is balanced.

Properly secure the boat with tie-down straps and/or safety lines to prevent it from shifting. Never trust the capability of the bow winch to hold your boat.

Inspect all lines, tie-downs and the winch. Tighten as necessary. Replace those that show signs of wear.

Tilt and secure the boat engine to increase road clearance.

Inspect the hitch and safety chain. Cross-cross the safety chains when attaching them to the tow vehicle. The chains should have a breaking strength of no less than the overall weight of the boat and trailer.

Make sure the brakes and lights are working properly.

Check tire pressure and lug bolts.

On The Road
Steer wider on corners to clear curbs.

Allow more time and greater distances for stopping.

Remember the length added by your trailer when passing other vehicles.

If on a long trip, pull over periodically and check your rigging, tires, bearings, and weight distribution.

If trailering a sailboat, watch for overhead wires and bridge clearances.

SHUPE'S SCOOP

Anglers typically concentrate most of their time on boats. Boat trailers, however, are equally as important, and can be more problematic if not attended to.

FISHING FORECAST

Expect great bass action in the river and local lakes. Shiners will take most of the lunkers at this time of year. Fish shiners right to heavy cover such as floating water hyacinths for sure action. Slow trolling with shiners is another deadly tactic. The stretch of river from Puzzle Lake south will be hard to beat.

Sebastian Inlet has good action with large flounder. Finger mullet bounced slowly across.

But Hiwassee took control in the third period, outscoring Lake Mary, 17-7, to take a 56-39 advantage.

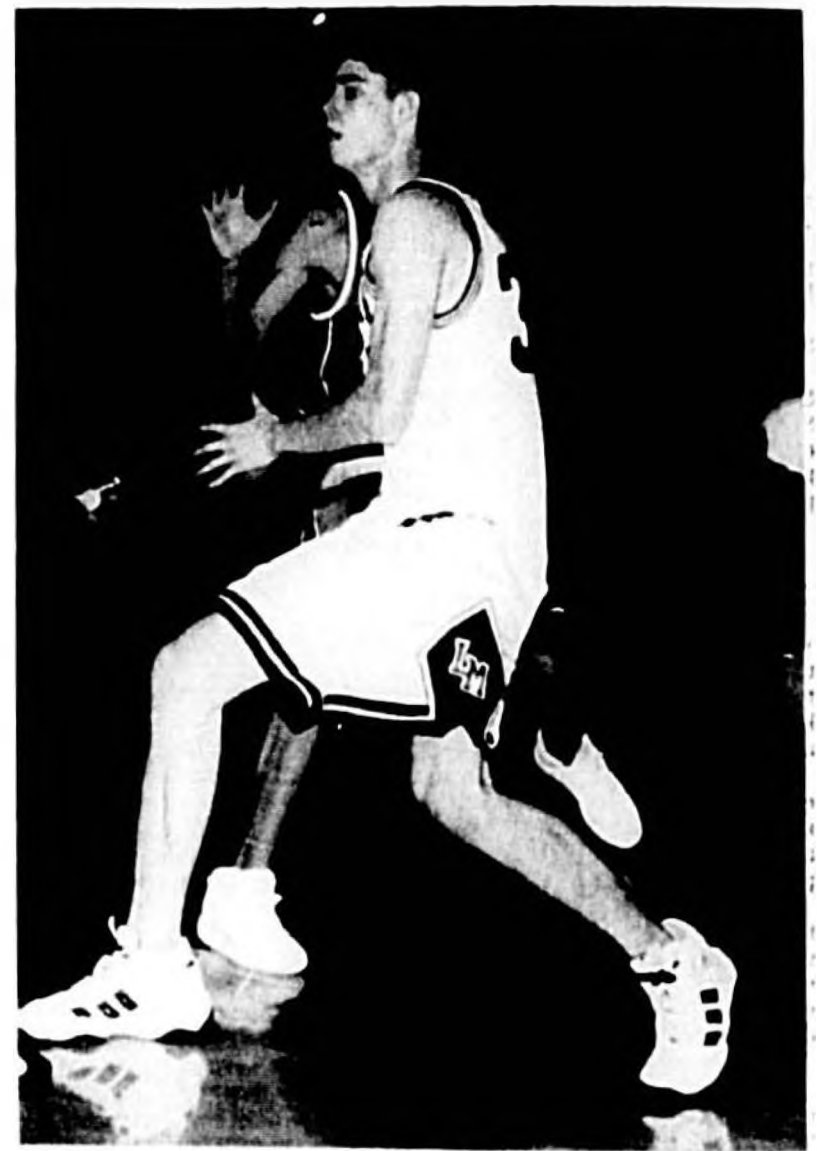
The Rams came back to win the fourth quarter 12-9, but the deficit was too much to overcome.

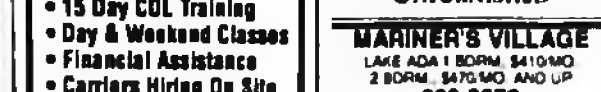

The link between faith and health

DEAR DR. GOTT: Why do religious people enjoy better health?
DEAR READER: This is a fascinating subject that has attracted a lot of attention from both scientists and the laity. Several studies have confirmed that people, both young and old, experience better health when they have a high level of religious involvement.

Predictably, these findings were interpreted by some zealots as an example of divine intervention. Not so, says Christopher Ellison, Ph.D., of the University of Texas, and Jeffrey Levin, Ph.D., of the National Institute of Healthcare Research. The authors published an article in the December issue of Health Education & Behavior in which they explore a range of explanations for the religion/health relation.

To begin with, religious people usually exhibit healthful behavior. They often make positive lifestyle choices, including the avoidance of tobacco, alcohol and illicit drugs. Second, they benefit from active social support from other church members. Such support often provides needed assistance during the unavoidable periods of loss and catastrophe.

Third, religious involvement often promotes feelings of self-worth and confidence in the ability to control one's own affairs. Also, trusting in a benevolent Higher Power usually reduces tension and stress.

Fourth, prayer and meditation may help people deal with unpleasant situations and relieve depression. Fifth, religious commitment has been shown to cause positive emotions that can favorably influence the immune system.

Last, faith promotes a positive outlook that enables its believers better to cope with the vicissitudes of life.

In short, attention to spiritual factors is associated with health benefits, not because of divine intervention but because the various aspects of a religious life promote behavior and attitudes that are healthful.

DEAR DR. GOTT: In your review of herbal remedies, you noted a list of side effects. How about printing a list of all side effects from prescription medications? Natural remedies threaten the income of the medical profession and related industries.

DEAR READER: Were I to list the side effects of prescription medicines, I'd lose a lot of readers, because the list would fill a daily column for several years; it goes on and on.

Basic fact: The more potent and effective a drug, the more side effects

it has. But, as I have mentioned many times, the physician and patient must consider the risk/benefit ratio. For instance, it doesn't make sense to deny a patient penicillin for a strep throat because of the rare incidence of allergic shock (the risk), when the antibiotic will save that patient from developing post-streptococcal rheumatic fever or kidney infection (the benefit).

As a general rule, natural/herbal remedies are far less potent than prescription drugs; hence, they are associated with fewer complications. This doesn't mean that such remedies do not have a place in treating certain afflictions. But when I develop hypertension or a heart attack, I certainly

want to receive the most effective and appropriate antidotes, not a weed or an herb. Side effects are important and must be taken into account when any medicine is prescribed; this is simply a fact that every consumer has to accept.

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WIN AT BRIDGE

The winners were 'unknown'

Perhaps it is only in bridge that a relatively unknown pair can win a world title. And that happened in Lille last September. Michal Kwicien and Jacek Pazdzioła, from Poland, collected the gold medals in the Open Pairs. However, their victory was somewhat marred by the incorrect movement used. In theory, all 72 pairs who qualified for the final were to play two deals against each of the other 71. However, this didn't happen. Forty pairs were affected, the most important being Larry Cohen, from Boca Raton, Fla., and David Berkowitz, from Old Tappan, N.J. They finished second, but didn't play against five pairs. They were given an average of their scores on the other 132 deals.
I couldn't find an interesting deal

featuring the winners, so here is an excellent deceptive play by Simon de Wijs in the Open Pairs.

With an unappealing choice of leads, West went with the old standby, fourth highest from his longest and strongest, the diamond two. And when East put in the jack, South won not with the queen but with the ace!

Declarer led a club to dummy's queen, returned to hand with a heart, led another club to the king, and played a third club, establishing the suit.

Completely fooled by trick one, the former world champion sitting West cashed the diamond king, then played another diamond. Declarer immediately claimed 11 tricks.

Can East help West? Well, he tried, by discarding the heart nine on the third round of clubs. He was hoping this would be read as a suit-preference signal for spades. But at the table, it
