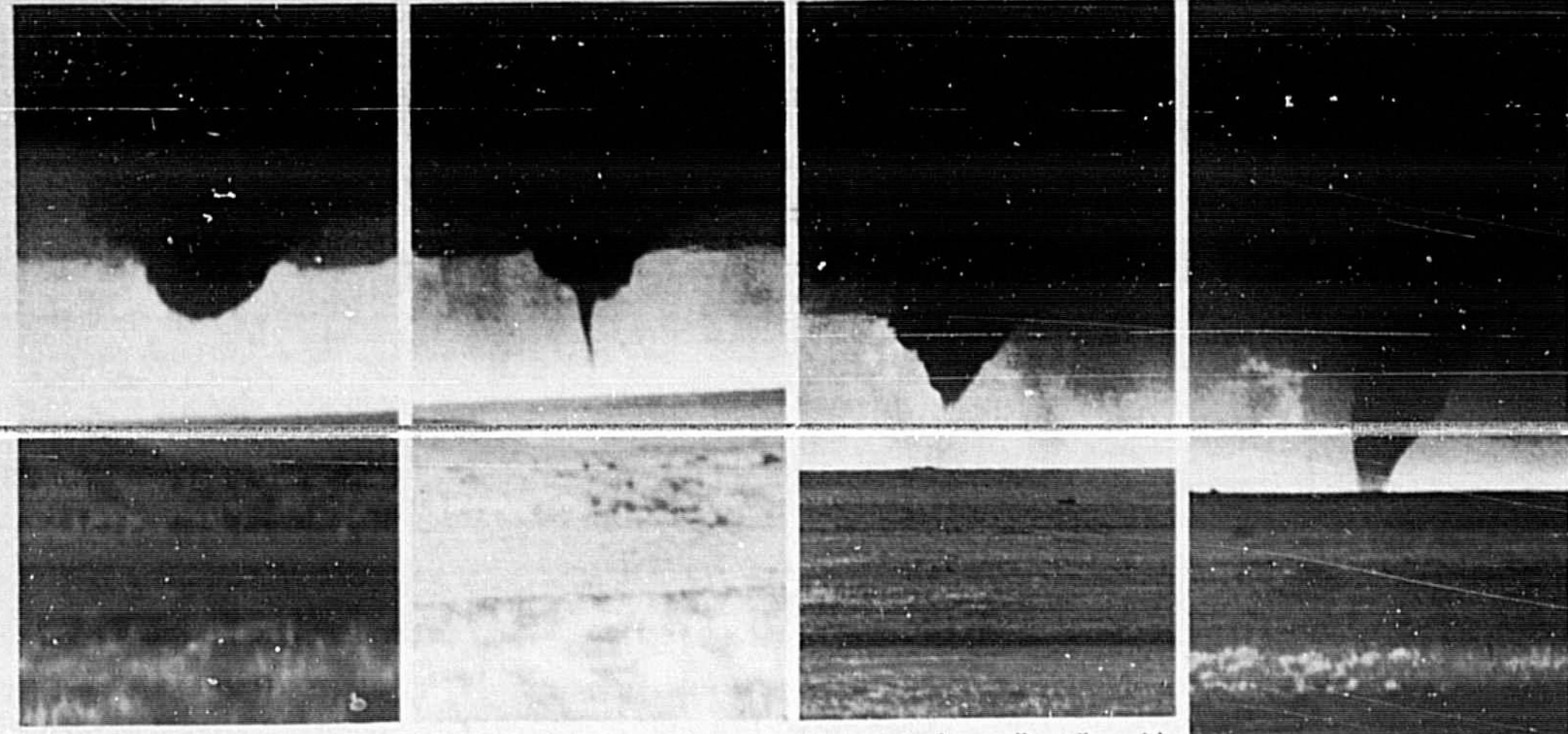




# The Anatomy of a Tornado

# McGovern Hearing Is Today

By GREGORY NOKES WASHINGTON (AP) — California supporters of Sen. George McGovern are seeking to win back in the courts the 151 California delegates they lost in the Democratic Credentials Committee.

A suit was filed with the U.S. District Court in Washington asking a restraining order to prevent the revised California delegation from being seated at the Democratic convention, which opens July 10 at Miami Beach.

The suit alleges that the Credentials Committee acted unconstitutionally when it overruled California's winner-takeall primary, won by McGovern.

In an effort to beef up his strength in advance of Miami Beach, McGovern said he will seek a meeting with AFL-CIO President George Meany this week.

The main charge was that the regular party failed to adopt the party's reform rules in picking delegates.

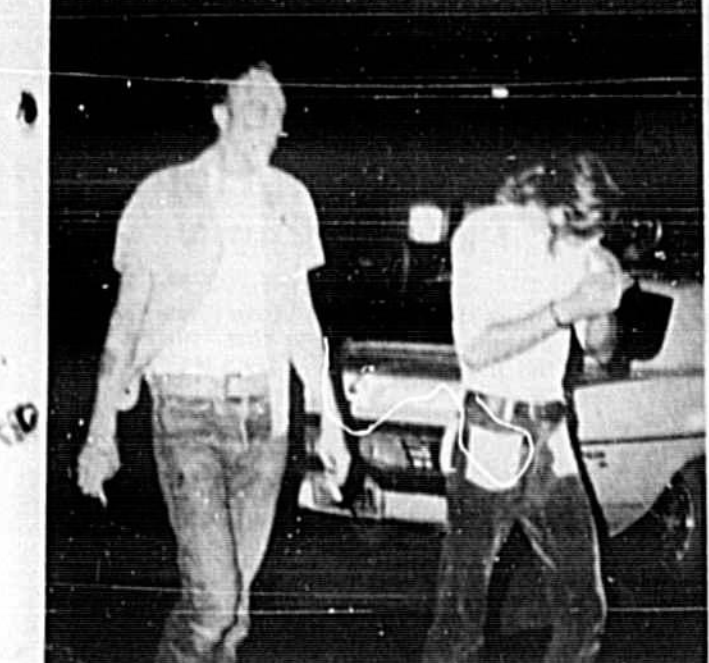

# Verdict Of Second Degree Murder Johnson Held Guilty By Jury

By MARION BETHIA A Circuit Court jury Friday found Tommy L. Johnson, initially charged with first degree murder, guilty of second degree murder in the death of Joseph Green.

Following the verdict of the jury, Circuit Judge Dominick Saffit remanded the defendant to custody, and ordered a presentence investigation. Johnson, 35, Midway, was convicted for the April 8 slaying of Green, 34, Midway, who expired after slugs from a .22 pistol struck him in the heart and arm. Green was gunned down while standing on the front porch of his home.

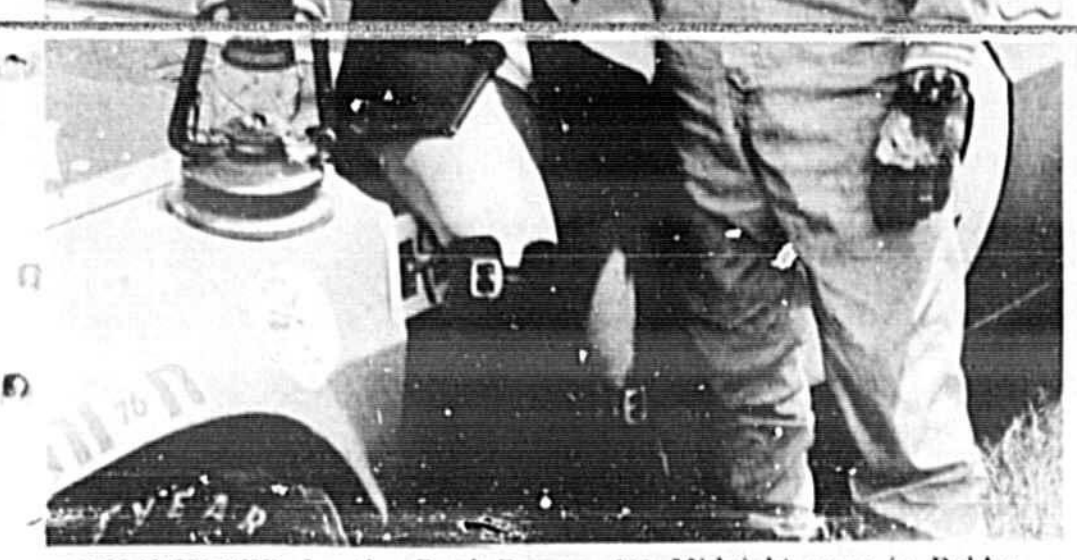

Firecracker 400 Tomorrow Reverse 250 Riders Go Tonight

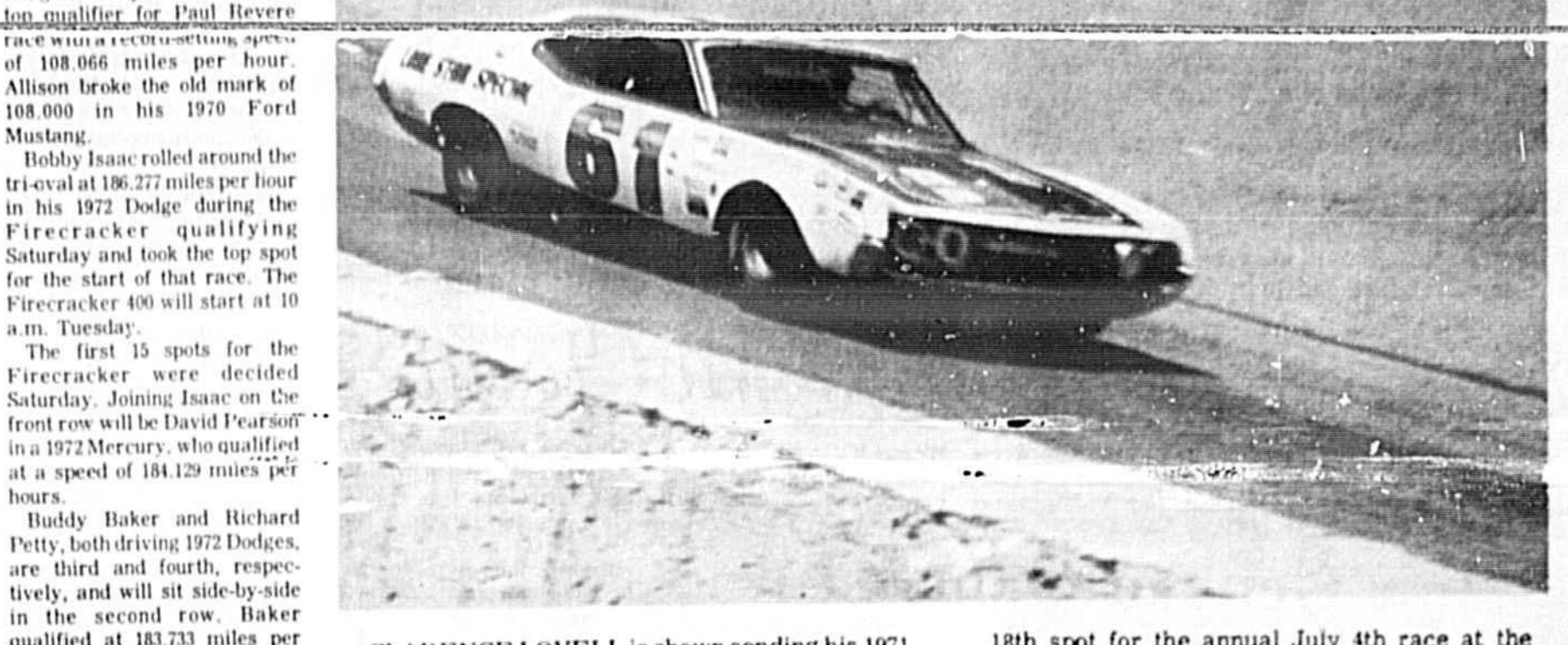

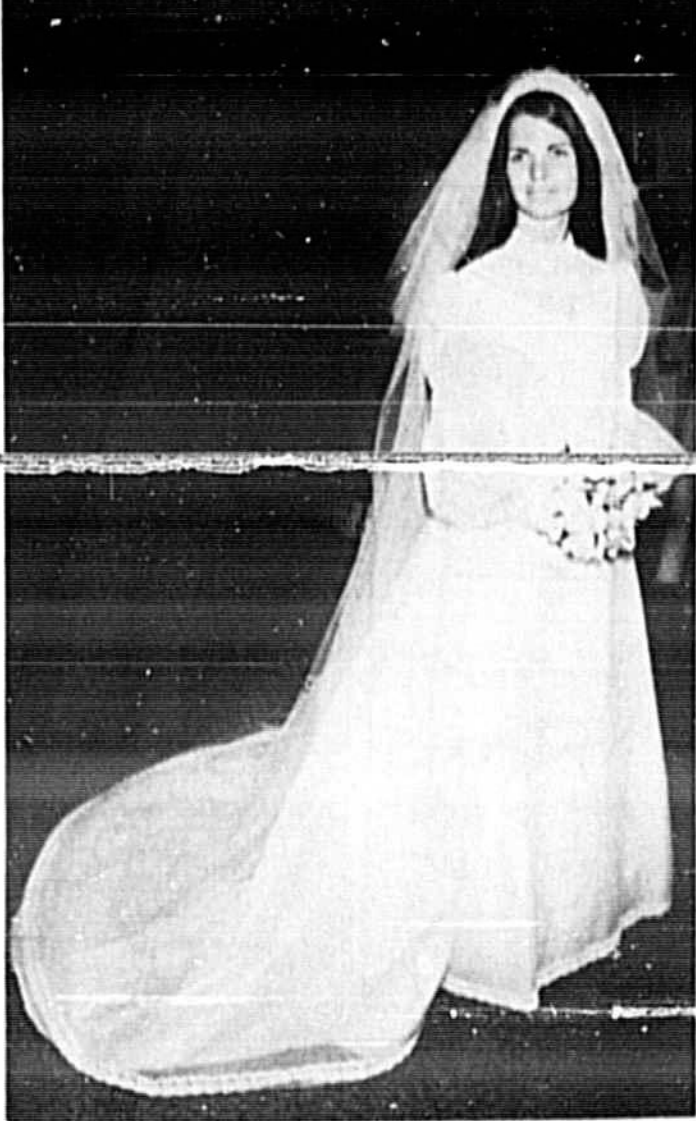

**Scientists Trying To Make Sense Of Scents**

Some day we may be classified by our "odor prints" observes perfume chemist Art Lorenson, one of the well-known "noses of the industry."

Scientists are at work on that theory, and their research may even show whether people are attracted to each other by scents. It may clear up the mystery of why one perfume may survive for a half-century, and the popularity of another fade in a short time.

"The Illinois Institute of Technology is evolving the odor print theory but many new ideas are coming out of the study. These include lures for insects and fish," he explained, adding that work is being done on the effects of scented attractants on men and women.

"It is known one person may enhance a particular perfume more than another might, and this may have something to do with one's own built-in chemistry additive. The idea isn't new. The ancient Greeks believed that people's own odors could be improved upon. London points out that ancient tribes rubbed noses (and still do) which may have been a ceremony in the interest of personal research.

Tests have shown men and women have different odor acceptance levels. At certain times women are greatly susceptible to musk, an ingredient of many perfumes, a finding that has led many experts to suspect a relationship between

# A Year After Being 'Bailed Out' Lockheed Still In Financial Straits

**Editor's Note:** A year ago the nation faced the possibility that its biggest defense contractor could go into bankruptcy. Then Lockheed Aircraft Corp. received federal help. The following report by Donald M. Rothberg of The AP Special Assignment Team looks at Lockheed today.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A healthy flow of Pentagon business, a huge federal loan guarantee and a helping hand from Britain so far have failed to lift Lockheed Aircraft Corp. above financial storm clouds that threatened it with bankruptcy.

The nation's No. 1 defense contractor, heavily in debt, has pegged its future to its big commercial jet, the Tristar 1001. But the airline business

118 million plane are below expectations.  
A year ago, Lockheed was reeling from \$484 million in losses on four government projects and from the bankruptcy of Rolls Royce Ltd., British builder of the engines for the Tristar.

Lockheed owed a consortium of 24 banks \$490 million. Its net worth, according to a Pentagon study, was \$240 million. The banks wouldn't lend any more money.

So Lockheed kept alive. The Nixon administration backed Haughlin's appeal and after a long and bitter fight, Congress voted to pledge government credit for up to \$250 million in new bank loans.

Lockheed says it will start making money once it sells between 25-30 Tristars. A classified Pentagon study puts the figure at 370, an estimate Lockheed says is too low.
