





# League Of Cities Conference Gives Mayor Management Ideas

Taking note of other city's management methods and philosophies "keeps us from re-inventing the wheel and opens our horizons to new ideas," says Sanford Mayor Bettye Smith.

Mrs. Smith compared notes with officials of other cities during the National League of Cities Congressional-City Conference in Washington, D.C. Feb. 27-March 1.

As one of the league's newest Human Development Committee delegates, Mrs. Smith and about 30 co-members spent a good part of the conference working on items the group will lobby for from Congress. But she also met a number of the other 5,000 city representatives who attended the conference and said her conversations with some of them could ultimately benefit Sanford, both in providing positive ideas and tips on pitfalls to be avoided.

At the same time, the mayor's comments about Sanford's substance abuse efforts have apparently

sparked interest among some league colleagues. As a result, Mrs. Smith said she expects to give a more detailed presentation at an upcoming league seminar.

The human development committee is scheduled to draft policies this year on substance abuse, AIDS, education, teen pregnancy and infant mortality, Mrs. Smith said.

The league has a number of standing committees, each of which sets respective priorities, then drafts policies for presentation to the full league membership for adoption.

The policies are "wish lists" containing programs and recommendations the league will lobby

for, Mrs. Smith said.

Two more human development committee sessions, in Washington again and St. Paul, will precede this December's policy adoption conference in Las Vegas.

Mrs. Smith said she plans to attend the three sessions, but will only consider asking the city to pay for one, the Las Vegas conference. Mrs. Smith paid for last week's conference and said she will not ask repayment from the city. By rights, she said, Sanford could be asked to cover all four conferences.

Since her election in 1985, Mrs. Smith has become involved in numerous local, state and national governmental associations and made it a practice to attend many of their conferences and meetings. Each session provides "a broader view" she carries back to Sanford, she said.

"It's easy to see your own boundaries, but seeing beyond them is necessary because we don't live in a vacuum and would hurt ourselves by trying to function as though we do," she said.

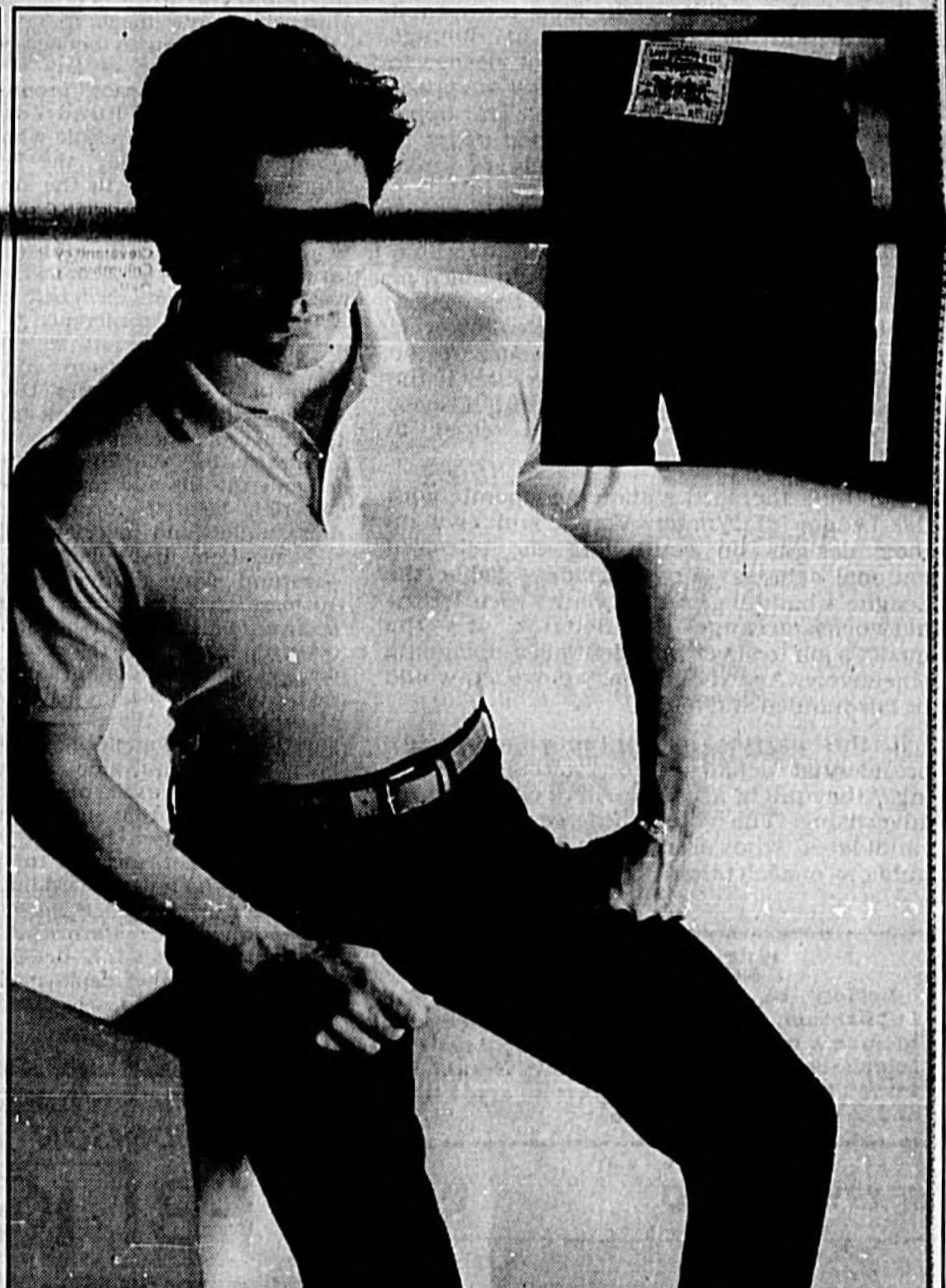
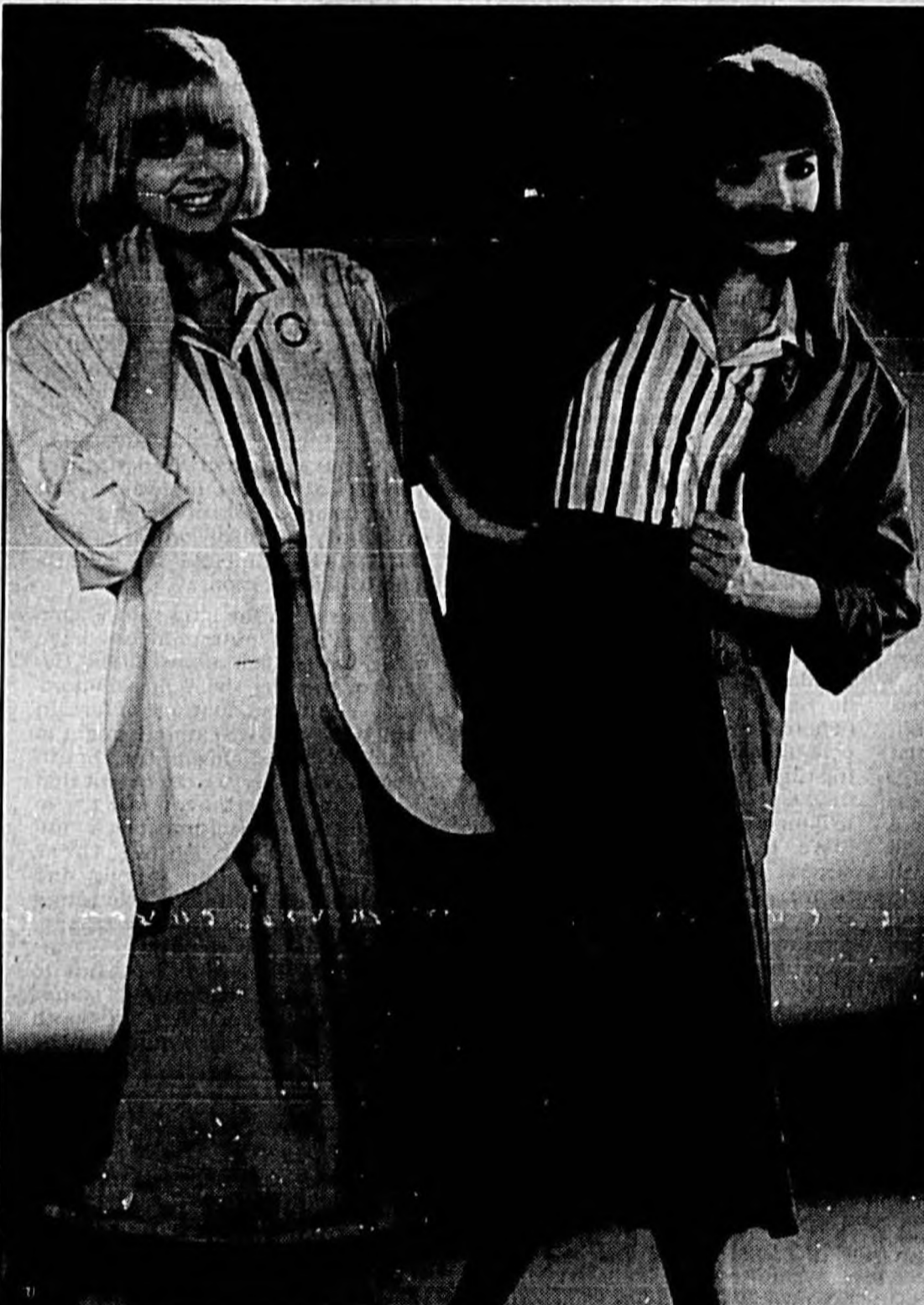

## IN BRIEF

### Arms Negotiators Brief NATO Allies, Return To Washington

GENEVA (UPI) — Top U.S. negotiators at the Geneva arms talks briefed NATO allies in Brussels today on their way back to Washington to report Friday to President Reagan.

American delegation leader Max M. Kampelman was accompanied by Maynard Giltman and Ronald Lehman, the two other principal U.S. negotiators.

Kampelman negotiates on space defense systems, Giltman handles Intermediate Nuclear Forces and Lehman negotiates on strategic long-range nuclear weapons.

Chief Soviet negotiators also left Geneva today to brief Eastern Warsaw Pact governments on their way back to Moscow.

But Soviet delegation leader Yuli M. Vorontsov flew to Paris for talks with the French government about the latest moves in Geneva on eliminating INF or medium-range missiles in Europe.

### 18 Killed In Philippine Fire

MANILA, Philippines (UPI) — A fire swept through a Manila suburb today, killing 18 residents, mostly children, who were trapped in a shoe factory that had been converted into apartments without fire escapes, authorities said.

Three residents also were injured in the early morning fire that destroyed nine other houses in the mixed industrial and residential neighborhood of Marikina town (Barangay San Roque district, officials said.

The victims' bodies, mostly children charred beyond recognition, were packed in boxes and trucked to a funeral parlor, officials said.

### Soviets Deny Publication Plans

MOSCOW (UPI) — A spokesman for the Soviet literary magazine Novy Mir said today there are no plans to publish the works of exiled author Alexander Solzhenitsyn.

The statement by Vladimir Kostrov, deputy editor of the influential literary magazine, contradicted a report by a Greek author who said Novy Mir editor Sergei Zalygin told him the novel "Cancer Ward" would be published soon and "The Gulag Archipelago" later.

## Christian Leader: Syrians Hold Waite

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — A Christian militia leader said Wednesday that missing Anglican Church envoy Terry Waite and four Western professors kidnapped from a west Beirut college are in Syrian Army custody and will be freed soon.

Dani Chamoun, the leader of the Christian National Liberal party, said Waite and the four Beirut University College professors, three Americans and an Indian U.S.-resident, "would be released very soon."

There was no independent confirmation of his report, but a senior Syrian military source, who asked not to be named, denied it, saying, "If the hostages or Waite were under Syrian custody they would have been released immediately."

"The hostages are not held in areas under Syrian control," said the source, hinting they might be detained in the southern suburbs of Beirut, a hotbed of pro-Iranian Moslem fundamentalism outside Syrian control.

He said "contacts with the concerned parties were underway to secure their release."

Speaking after a meeting of the Lebanese Front, a coalition of Christian hard-liners that has

opposed Syrian military presence in Lebanon, Chamoun said the five "are being held under Syrian custody." He did not elaborate.

The Islamic Jihad for the Liberation of Palestine claims to hold the four professors — Americans Robert Polhill, 52, a Utah native and accounting teacher; Alann Steen, 47, of New York, a communications teacher; Jesse Turner, 39, an Iowa native and mathematics teacher, and Mithleshwar Singh, in his 60s, a department chairman at the college.

The four were kidnapped from the private college campus on Jan. 24 by gunmen posing as policemen.

Last week Gen. Ghazi Kenaan, the Chief of Syrian military intelligence in Lebanon, denied an NBC Nightly News report saying the four professors were held by the Syrian army.

Kenaan, the chief of some 7,000 Syrian army troops which swept into Moslem west Beirut on Feb. 22, also said he had no knowledge "whatsoever" on the whereabouts of Waite, who disappeared Jan. 20 when he left his seaside hotel to meet the captors of foreign hostages.

## School Bells Ring For Judge

Seminole's newest circuit judge will be hitting the books in March at a weeklong required course for new judges.

Circuit Judge O.H. Eaton Jr., elected in November, will attend judicial college at Florida State University in Tallahassee to study the judicial process and the role of a judge in law. The lectures are scheduled March 15

through 21.

Lecture topics for the state's new judges include criminal law, civil and family law, media relations, administration and ethics. The classes are paid for by the state.

Eaton, 43, assumed the bench in January and has practiced law for 16 years.

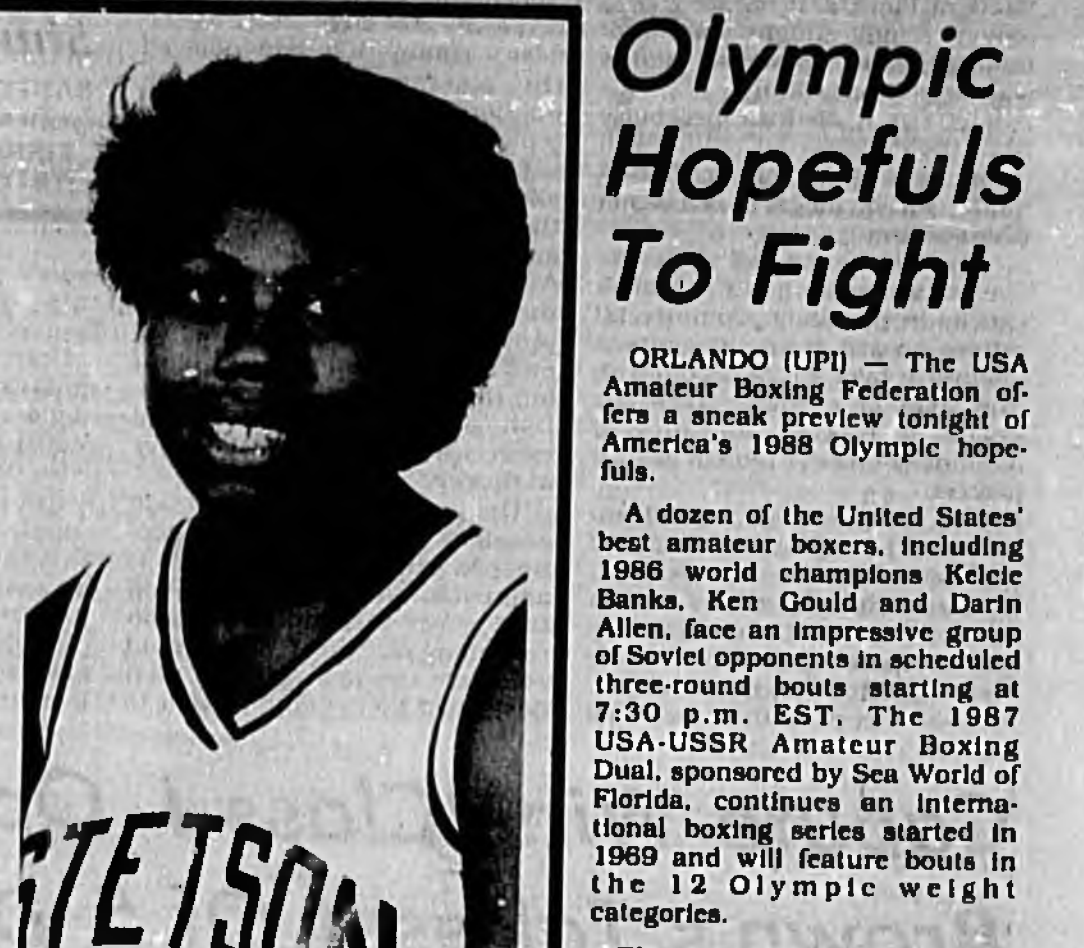

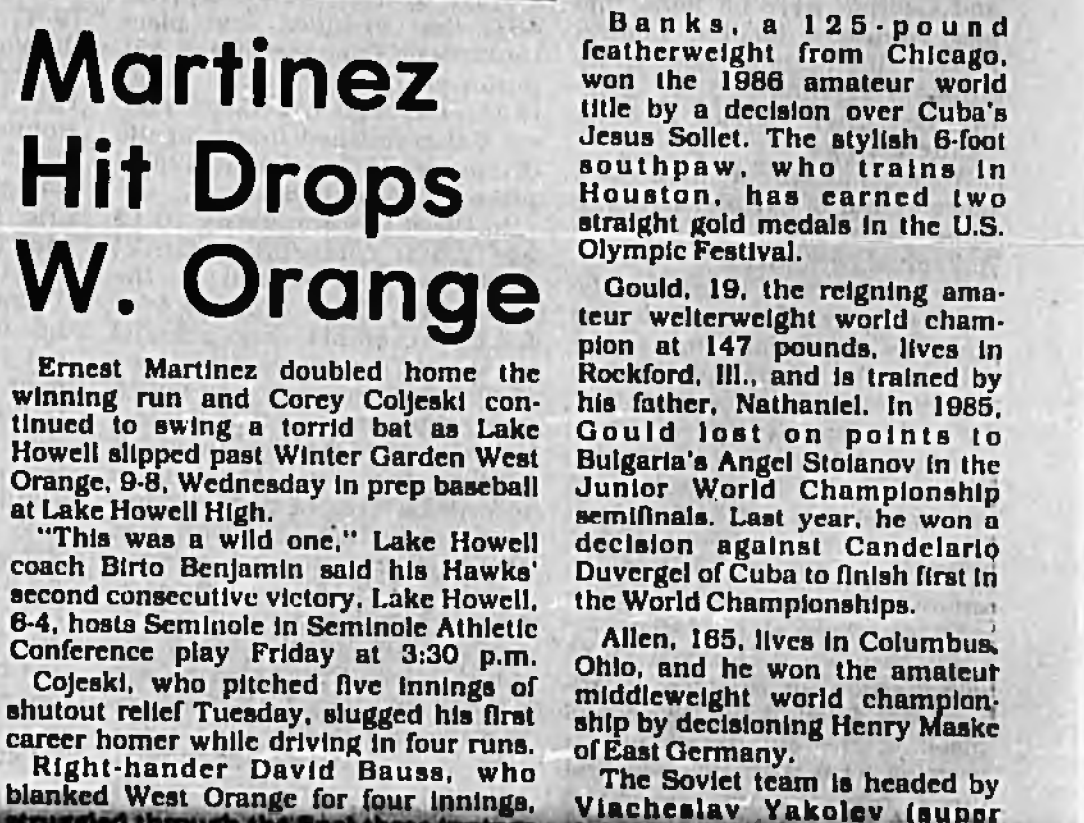

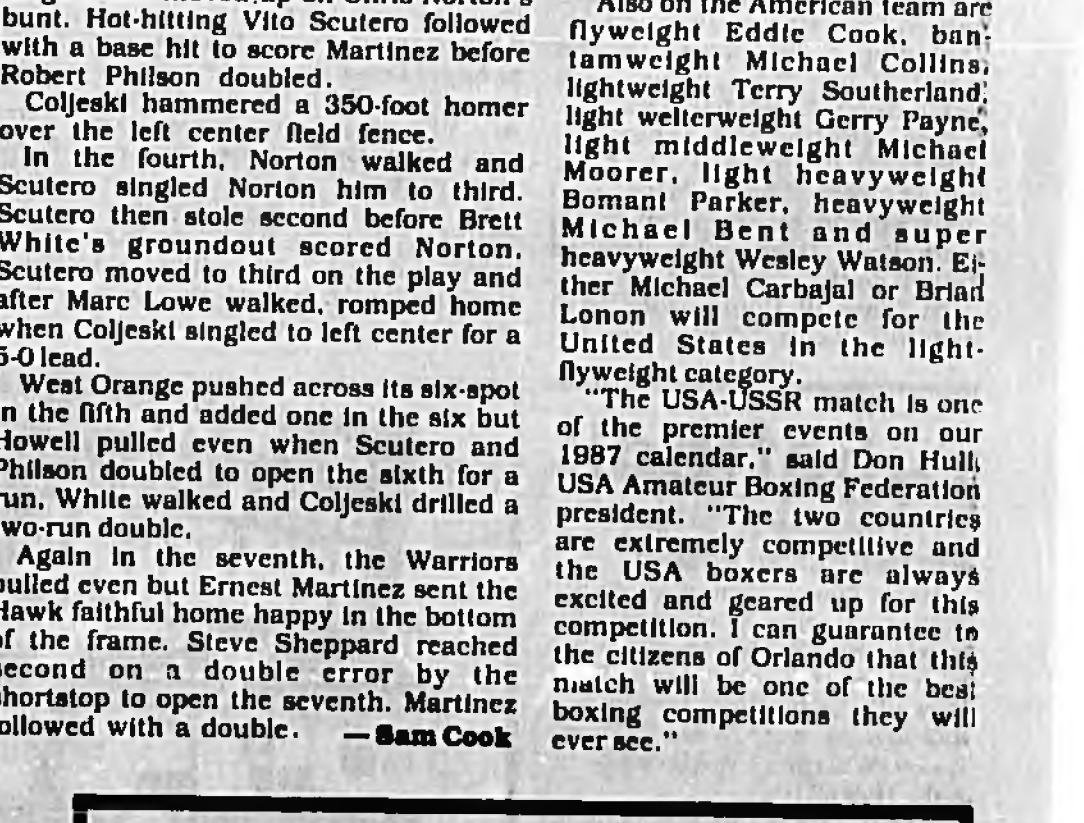

Olympic Hopesful To Fight

ORLANDO (UPI) — The USA Amateur Boxing Federation offers a sneak preview tonight of America's 1988 Olympic hopefuls.

A dozen of the United States' best amateur boxers, including 1986 world champions Keltie Banks, Ken Gould and Darin Allen, face an impressive group of Soviet opponents in scheduled three-round bouts starting at 7:30 p.m. EST. The 1987 USA-USSR Amateur Boxing Dual, sponsored by Sea World of Florida, continues an international boxing series started in 1969 and will feature bouts in the 12 Olympic weight categories.

The competition will be governed by rules of the International Amateur Boxing Association and the event will be taped for a national-television audience.

Banks, a 125-pound featherweight from Chicago, won the 1986 amateur world title by a decision over Cuba's Jesus Solter. The stylish 6-foot southpaw, who trains in Houston, has earned two straight gold medals in the U.S. Olympic trials.

Gould, 19, the reigning amateur welterweight world champion at 147 pounds, lives in Rockford, Ill., and is trained by his father, Nathaniel. In 1985, Gould lost on points to Bob Moran, a three-time Junior World Championship semifinalist. Last year, he won a decision against Candelario Cuervo of Cuba to finish first in the World Championships.

Allen, 165, lives in Columbus, Ohio, and he won the amateur middleweight world championship by defeating Henry Maake of East Germany.

The Soviet team is headed by Vichaslav Yakovlev (super welterweight), a third-place finisher in the 1986 World Championships. He has beaten Cuba's Teofilo Stevenson, a three-time Olympic gold medalist and reigning world champion.

Also on the American team are light heavyweight Michael Collins, lightweight Terry Southernland, light welterweight Gerry Payne, light middleweight Michael Light, heavy welterweight Bomani Parker, heavyweight Michael Bent and super heavyweight Wesley Watson. Eric the Michael Carbajal or Brian Lonon will compete for the United States in the lightweight category.

The USA-USSR match is one of the premier events on our 1987 calendar," said Donnie USA Amateur Boxing Federation president. "The two countries are extremely competitive and the U.S. boxers are always excited and ready for competition. I can guarantee in the citizens of Orlando that this match will be one of the best boxing competitions they will ever see."

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# Market Even Stronger

**NEW YORK (UPI)** — Prices opened higher today in active trading of New York Stock Exchange issues.

The Dow Jones industrial average, which soared 30.93 to a record high Wednesday, was up 12.94 to 2270.39 shortly after the market opened.

Advances led declines 657-296 among the 1,390 issues crossing the New York Stock Exchange tape.

Early turnover amounted to about 18,650,000 shares.

The Dow Jones industrial average and other indexes jumped to record highs Wednesday as investors ignored the political crisis in Washington and focused buying on auto, oil, drug and technology stocks.

Analysts said a strong bond market and news of a massive General Motors' stock buyback plan helped fuel the buying.

The Dow rose to 2257.45, passing the previous record close of 2244.09, set Feb. 19.

Analysts attributed buyers' renewed confidence in part to General Motors' announcement late Tuesday that it would buy back up to 20 percent of its common stock by 1990. But Michael Metz, investment strategist at Oppenheimer & Co., said Wednesday's rally was foreshadowed by Tuesday's trading activity, which was marked by light volume and a dearth of sellers.

"There was no pressure on the market Tuesday, and there were a lot of buyers waiting impatiently in the wings," Metz said.

# Dollar And Gold Both Move Higher

**By United Press International**

The U.S. dollar opened slightly higher in light trading on major foreign currency markets today. The price of gold also moved higher.

In earlier trading in the Far East, the dollar closed slightly higher against the Japanese yen in quiet trading. The dollar closed at 153.75, up 0.28 from Wednesday's close of 153.47.

In European trading, high interest-yielding currencies such as the British pound attracted attention. "These always attract activity when general trading is quiet," one American bank dealer in London said.

The pound sterling opened at \$1.563, compared with \$1.5660 at close of trading on Wednesday.

In Frankfurt, the dollar opened at 1.8415 German marks, up from 1.8304 on Wednesday, and in Zurich, the dollar opened at 1.551 Swiss francs, up from a

previous close of 1.5442.

The rate in Paris was 6.1285 French francs, up from 6.1025 and in Amsterdam the dollar was worth 2.075 Dutch guilders, up from 2.07 on Wednesday.

The rate in Brussels was 38.47 Belgian francs, up from 38.30 and in Milan it was 1,306.50 lire, up from 1,301.25.

In early New York trading, the dollar was slightly higher against all key foreign currencies except the British pound in moderate trading.

Traders in New York noted the dollar's early strength came one day before the Labor Department is expected to report a moderation in the nation's employment growth during February.

Precious metals moved higher in early trading as world oil prices continued to show signs of strength, but dealers in New York said the stronger dollar could dampen gold's rise.

In London, the dollar opened at 1.551 Swiss francs, up from a

previous close of 1.5442.

## TWA Enters Airline Bid Wrangle

**WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (UPI)** — Trans World Airlines' surprise bid for USAir Group Inc. Wednesday has put possible approval by Piedmont Aviation Inc. of a USAir buyout on hold.

"I don't know what the ramifications are and I'm not here to comment on it... It's going to take some time to sort it out," said Piedmont spokesman Don McGuire of the TWA bid for USAir.

Piedmont board members took no action during a teleconference Wednesday on the \$1.6 billion offer by USAir.

In a letter to USAir officials, TWA Chairman Carl Icahn offered to pay \$52 in cash for each share of USAir in a deal valued at about \$1.4 billion. Icahn also wrote USAir Chairman Edwin Colodny that merging all three airlines could garner a 16 percent market share.

TWA's unexpected bid boosted USAir's stock by \$5.13 a share to about \$48.88 Wednesday. Piedmont's stock dropped 38 cents to \$69.75 a share and TWA's stock rose \$1.75 a share to \$31.38 in light of the takeover proposal.

perspective. You pull your energies together. You change. You go forward."

Reagan said moving ahead "in no way diminishes the importance of the other continuing investigations" into his worst crisis, "but the business of our country and our people must proceed."

The president voiced confidence that the trail of the missing millions of dollars in arms sale profits will be traced by two special committees in Congress and independent prosecutor Lawrence Walsh — three investigations that will keep the scandal in the public eye at least through the summer.

"I didn't know about any diversion of funds to the Contras," he said. "But as president, I cannot escape responsibility. ... As personally distasteful as I find secret bank accounts and diverted funds, as the Navy would say, this happened on my watch."

Heeding the advice of friends and foes alike, Reagan welcomed the critical report issued last week by his own presidential Tower Commission, speaking of his "wrenching ordeal" while the board conducted a three-month review.

"Let's start with the most controversial part," he said. "A few months ago I told the American people I did not trade arms for hostages. My heart and my best intentions still tell me that is true, but the facts and the evidence tell me it is not."

The president stuck by his insistence the deals "began as a strategic opening to Iran," but admitted they "deteriorated into trading arms for hostages. ... There are reasons why it happened, but no excuses. It was a mistake."

Reagan said he accepted all the recommendations and findings of the three-man board, which blamed not only his top advisers but the president himself for the sort of lax management that allowed the policy to go awry.

"Let's face it," Reagan said, "my (management) style didn't match its previous track record. I have already begun correcting this."

He outlined several changes he has made already — including the appointment of former Sen. Howard Baker, R-Tenn., to replace Donald Regan as White House chief of staff — but he still did not address several key points such as whether he believed laws were broken during the Iran-Contra operations.

And though he expressed disappointment and anger at "some who served me," he did not mention anyone by name.

including Rear Adm. John Poindexter and Lt. Col. Oliver North, the two ousted White House aides who have refused to testify about their principal roles in the operations.

Still, lawmakers responded to the speech by applauding Reagan for conceding error and promising to work with Congress — though Democrats said substantive action is required to back up his pledge of effectiveness as chief executive.

"The president now must ensure full and prompt disclosure of all aspects of the Iran-Contra scandal — and that includes complete accountability for all of the missing money," said Rep. Dante Fascell, D-Fla., the House Foreign Affairs Committee chairman.

Reagan was said to have had a big hand in drafting the candid speech, which was one of the most forthcoming since President John Kennedy took personal responsibility for the failed Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba in April 1961.

Reagan's previous public discussions of the scandal — a Nov. 13 address and a Nov. 19 news conference — were tainted by his own shaky recollections and a chronology later found to have been falsified by White House aides to conceal his role in the policy's initiation.

Reagan asserted that poor recordkeeping by aides "led to my failure to recollect whether I approved an arms shipment before or after the fact." The Tower board concluded he "most likely" gave prior approval in August 1985 for the first shipment of U.S. arms to Iran to be made from Israeli stockpiles.

The significant question became a major point of dispute between two top presidential aides — Regan and former national security adviser Robert McFarlane — and the president changed his story twice in interviews with the Tower board.

"I did approve it; I just can't say specifically when," Regan said Wednesday night. "Rest assured, there's plenty of recordkeeping now going on at

1600 Pennsylvania Ave."

The president told the nation he "paid a price" for refusing much comment on the scandal until now but defended his decision to give the Tower board "the chore of pulling the truth together for me."

Former Sen. John Tower of Texas, the Republican Reagan loyalist who led the commission in its review, called the president's speech "brilliant" and said it could reverse his political troubles.

"You don't ordinarily have sitting presidents confess to error like that," Tower told ABC News. "I think a man is never more credible than when he admits a mistake."

Senate Republican leader Robert Dole of Kansas also praised the president, saying he "told the American people what they needed to hear — that mistakes were made and he made them. ... Coming on the heels of the Howard Baker appointment, tonight's speech caps a comeback week for the president."

But Senate Democratic leader Robert Byrd of West Virginia said he was disappointed and thought Reagan "should have recognized it was his orders that authorized the arms sales to Iran. ... It didn't just deteriorate into that."

Sen. George Mitchell, D-Maine, joined many of his colleagues in noting Reagan now must back up his words with actions.

"If there is one thing the American people knew before this, it is that Ronald Reagan can deliver a good speech," Mitchell said. "The real test is his actions over the next 18 months."

Rep. Dick Cheney of Wyoming, ranking Republican on the select House panel investigating the scandal, said he thinks Reagan already is "on the way back."

"He hit exactly the right note," said Cheney, former chief of staff to President Ford. "It's clear that he has studied the Tower Commission recommendations and taken the report to heart."

with the burglar for a few seconds before she called to her husband and the man fled taking \$20 and a credit card.

Patton said the robber is believed to have entered the Diehl residence through an unlocked door. That is typical of the actions of the cat burglar who has plagued that area, he said. The suspect also defecated in the garage of that home and Patton said that that too was typical of the suspect in the burglaries.

Mrs. Diehl reportedly identified a suspect in a photo lineup and Patton said the same man had been a suspect in the case early in the investigation.

Patton said that the rash of burglaries, most to occupied homes and occurring in early morning hours when the victims were sleeping were very disturbing to area residents. The burglar seldom took many valuables. He would take credit cards, cash from wallets, and some jewelry, but would ignore other valuables.

In most cases he entered the homes through an unlocked window or door, but a couple of times forced entry to homes, Patton said.

After four months of watching and waiting for the suspect, Patton said, Sica was in the right place at the right time, when he nabbed Osterback.

From burglary sites deputies have many samples of human waste to be analyzed, which are expected to further tie the suspect to the burglaries. In one case the burglar defecated inside a briefcase in a burglarized home, Patton said.

# School Board Fires Aide For Sexual Misconduct

The Seminole County School Board Wednesday fired a county juvenile detention center teacher's aide based on testimony that he had sexual relations with one of the center's 16-year-old female detainees.

Mark K. Miller, 24, 613 Plum Lane, Altamonte Springs, was fired for misconduct in employment and has 30 days to appeal, board attorney Ned Julian said. He said Miller was fired "specifically for engaging in an act of sexual intercourse with the female detainee."

The board voted 4 to 1 to uphold Superintendent of Schools Robert Hughes' recommendation to fire Miller for misconduct in employment. Board member Larry Betsinger voted against the recommendation and could not be reached for comment today. Miller also could not be reached for comment.

More than three hours of testimony was given by Miller, the girl, and employees from the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services before the board reached its decision in a closed-door hearing. Miller's attorney, Kelvin Averbuch of Orlando, asked for a closed hearing at Miller's request based upon a Florida statute that speaks to the confidentiality of information regarding minors.

Averbuch said last month that Miller denied the allegations.

A hearing was first set for Feb. 6 after Hughes said he received a letter dated Nov. 26 from Marcia Gilliam, an HRS supervisor, stating the detention center had received a report on the alleged incident which indicated abusive and negligent behavior on Miller's part and cited sexual exploitation of the female detainee. Hughes suspended Miller with pay on Dec. 5. The board suspended Miller without pay on Dec. 10.

John Reichert, school board personnel director, said Miller had been employed at the center since Jan. 2, 1985 and had a good employment record. A letter in Miller's personnel file from Irma D. Webb, department chairperson of the detention center, states in part, Miller "uses candid aptness when dealing with our students and above all, shows them that he really cares. I have been blessed with good help in the past, but Mr. Miller has that 'special gift'."

Julian said he is preparing a formal order that will be presented to the board on March 11 that will finalize the decision which he said "I expect the board to approve."

Averbuch was in conference this morning and unavailable to say if an appeal would be filed.

## Medical Equipment Malfunctions Unreported

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Food and Drug Administration is not getting the information it needs to regulate the safety of medical devices ranging from bed pans to heart-lung machines, government investigators said Wednesday.

The General Accounting Office concluded that once a medical device has reached the market, "severe underreporting" of problems hampers the FDA in taking regulatory action.

"The main finding was that the FDA only knew about 1 percent of the problems with the devices," Gerald Dillingham, the GAO's project manager for the study.

"That is pretty significant since the FDA is charged with regulating the effectiveness and safety of the devices. That's pretty tough to do if you don't get the information."

A spokeswoman for the FDA said agency officials are studying the report and will comment on it in a few weeks.

The GAO study, prepared for a Senate committee and released in January, found most problems with medical devices in hospitals were unknown to both the manufacturers and FDA.

"Even when the problems were associated with injuries or had the potential for causing injury, information almost never reached FDA," said the report.

Medical devices are non-chemical products used to detect, prevent or cure diseases or to alter the way the body works. The report said products range "from the very simple to the extremely complex, from common household items such as thermometers and bandages to kidney dialysis machines and implantable heart valves."

Other examples of medical devices include artificial hips, soft contact lenses, hearing aids, X-ray machines, pregnancy detection kits, tongue depressors, tampons, condoms, bed pans and syringes.

The report noted that there are more than 1,700 different types of medical devices available in the United States and that it is a \$14 billion-a-year industry.

In 1976 Congress expanded the authority of the Food and Drug Administration to regulate medical devices after many complications were linked to faulty heart valves and an intrauterine contraceptive device. A 1984 regulation requires that manufacturers report serious problems with medical devices to the FDA.

### AIDS Cure, Smokeless Society Predicted

NEW YORK (UPI) — America's leading scientists looked into a crystal ball and predicted Wednesday the development of an AIDS vaccine and the demise of Freudian psychoanalysis in the near future — but no way to prevent the common cold.

The 227 scientists include six Nobel Laureates along with leading researchers in the fields of cancer, nutrition and biotechnology, according to a report released Wednesday.

Most of the participating researchers foresee major advances in health and medicine over the next few decades — and predicted America will become a "smokeless" society where people eat less, exercise more and live an average of 10 years longer than they do today.

A majority of the researchers said they believe the turn of the century will bring cures for many diseases, including some forms of cancer and acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

"We are learning about the cancer cell at a rate that is almost alarming," National Cancer Institute Director Dr. Vincent DeVita said in his interview last year, according to the report.

"If there is a cancer cell headquarters somewhere, they should be frightened out of their wits, because we are doing things that nobody would have predicted 10 years ago."

The researchers said they expect a safe and effective AIDS vaccine by the end of the century and, perhaps, a cure the following decade. However, they said the disease will probably have struck at least 1 million Americans by that time.

A few other sobering predictions were included in the report.

There will be little progress in the fight against some forms of cancer, malnutrition will continue to stalk the Third World and no one will come up with a way to prevent the common cold, the scientists predicted.

Almost 98 percent of the researchers said psychoanalysis — the self-searching mode of therapy — will be history by the year 2000. Drugs will be used to treat most psychological problems, they said.

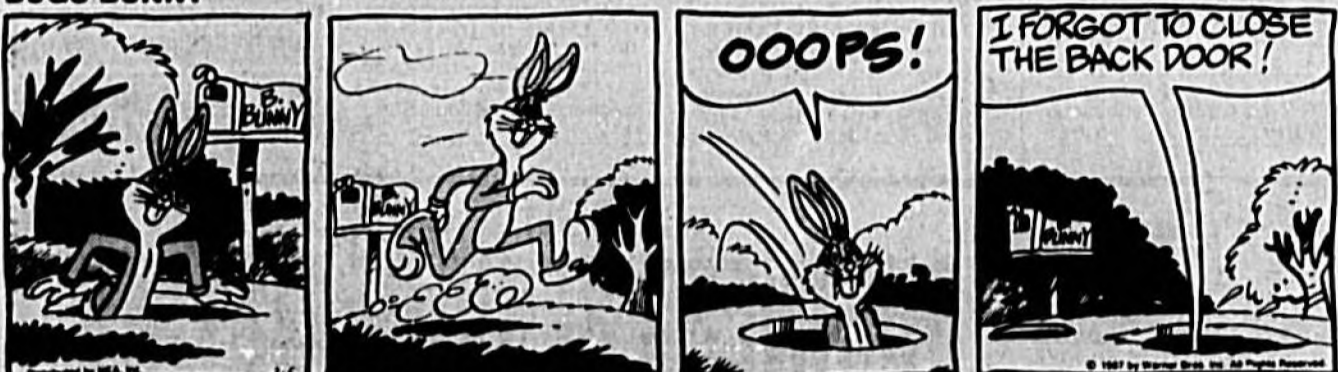

# Menstruation Cycle Changes With Age

DEAR DR. GOTT — I'm 35. My menstrual cycles have always been very regular. Now I'm beginning to get spotting a week before my period. My Pap test and exam were normal and my gynecologist brushed it off as "getting older." I don't feel she answered my concerns. Is a D & C in order?

pressure, dizziness, shortness of breath and a feeling of impending catastrophe. I do not understand your doctors' confusion. A simple blood test will tell if your thyroid level is excessive. Cardiograms and enzyme blood tests will indicate a heart attack. This seems to me to be a straightforward problem:

the two conditions should be easily distinguishable. Incidentally, your weight seems to be excessive for your height. I think you should check with your doctor to see if a weight-reduction program would help your symptoms.

DEAR READER — I think not. Women's menstrual periods do tend to change with age, and your spotting may simply be such a change. If you believe that your gynecologist did not satisfactorily answer your questions, ask for another session with her to review your concerns.

DEAR DR. GOTT — Your article on fish oil as a lifesaver was quite educational, but most of the fish in our Great Lakes have high levels of PCBs, and we are instructed to remove the fat. With the fat discarded, does the fish still offer the same benefits?

DEAR READER — Omega-3 fish oil, a compound that shows promise in combating arteriosclerosis, is present in the flesh of fish as well as in its fat. Ocean fish may be preferred over lake fish if your homegrown variety is spiced with industrial pollutants. Fish oil also is available in capsule form. Because fish fat obviously contains more oil than non-fatty tissues, you probably will get less Omega-3 from fully cleaned fish. However, scientific studies do not show this to be a dietary disadvantage.

DEAR DR. GOTT — I've been treated, for an underactive thyroid for about a year. During several trips to the emergency room because of chest pains, difficulty breathing and left-arm numbness, the doctors have told me they can't tell the difference between a heart attack and a thyroid attack. Are they correct? I'm female, 5-foot-1 and 175 pounds.

DEAR READER — Too much thyroid in your system could lead to nervousness, sweating, weight loss, weakness and palpitations. The symptoms of heart attack are chest pain or

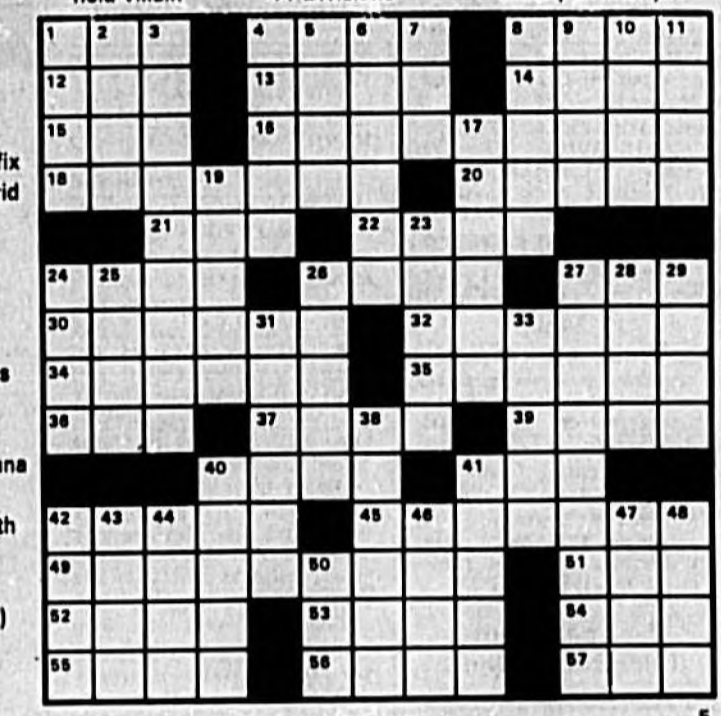
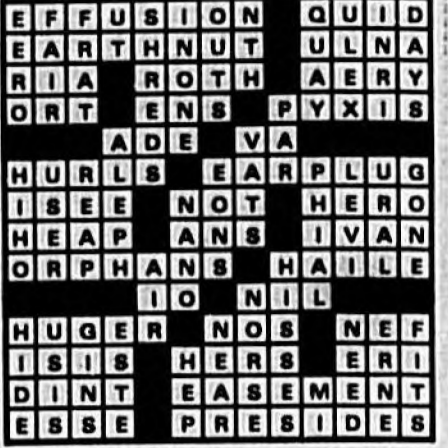

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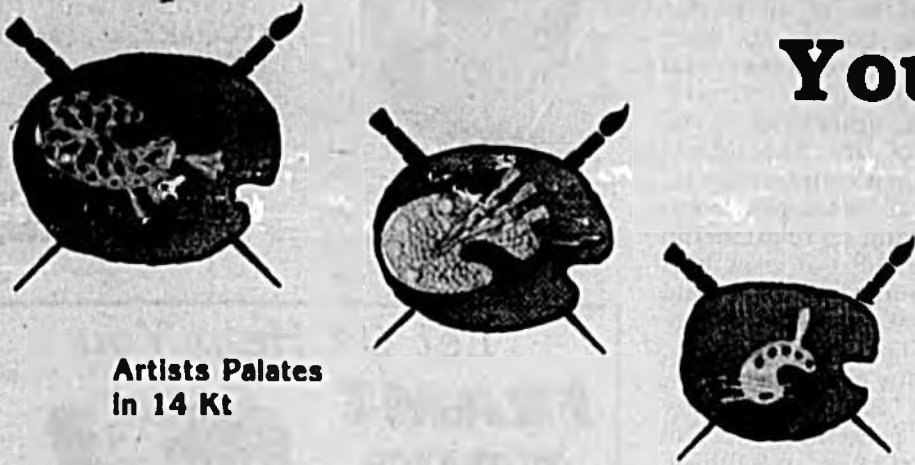

5. All cars must be out of display area by 9:30 a.m. Saturday and Sunday. Judging will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday. Ribbons will be presented on
