### Government says for state

The Consumer Product Safety Commission said Monday against seven of the nation's largest toy importers and distributors over the importation and sale of dangerous toys.

The department said the toys, all of which are imported, range from knives and other items with small parts that pose a choking danger to young children to toys coated with toxic levels of lead-based paint.

Although most of the toys were labeled for children over three years old, the CPSC found they were actually intended for younger children. No cases of death or injury resulting from the toys' use have been reported, the department said.

### Employee pay plan approved

LONGWOOD — With a stipulation that the city commission can change the ordinance, the final vote at last night's meeting was in favor of implementing a city employee pay plan which gives all non-unionized employees a four-percent annual cost-of-living adjustment, and an additional annual merit award of one to five-percent increase.

The four-percent raise will be for satisfactory performance, with the additional increase based on the employee's performance evaluation.

### Acting superintendent named

SANFORD — Rocky Ellingworth, who has been with the city recreation department for over one year, has been named as the city's acting Superintendent of Recreation to succeed Jeff Blomms, who has resigned the post effective Aug. 24.

According to Mike Kirby, recreation director, Blomms has indicated he wants to spend some months in a year in pursuit of outdoor activities, including mountain climbing, white water rafting and hiking in New Zealand.

Kirby said Ellingworth has been responsible for the Recreation Department's state league baseball program this year.

## U.S. now set to defend against Iraqi invasion

CAIRO — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney said today the United States intends to move quickly to provide additional arms to Saudi Arabia, such as F-15 fighters and battle tanks. No specific agreements were reached. U.S. officials said.

At the same time, Cheney said for the first time that the United States is "clearly in the position today to defend" Saudi Arabia.

He did not disclose the number of U.S. troops in Saudi Arabia but there are believed to be more than 45,000 on the ground already and a total of more than 100,000 are expected to go there.

Over the past few days, Cheney has avoided declaring

## It's back to school

Summer vacation ends tomorrow for public school students in Seminole County. It's the first day of classes.

While the district is strained under the financial woes of rising operating expenses, dwindling state support, a failed bond issue referendum and a rapidly-increasing student population, administrators are confident about the new year.

"I always look forward to the start of the school year," said Wayne Epps, principal of Seminole High School, 2701 Ridgewood Ave. in Sanford. "It's exciting to see the kids coming in on the first day."

Epps said that for the first time in three years, the preparation for school hasn't been hampered by construction projects. The construction, which gave the school several new classrooms, a new media center and a renovated cafeteria, will give the students an improved learning atmosphere, according to Epps.

He said that he believes the students are ready to come back to

### Private school students also return to class

While the majority of the private schools in Seminole County begin classes tomorrow to coincide with the public school schedule, some of the schools began their classes as early as Aug. 14 and others will not open their doors until after Labor Day.

According to state law, all students in Florida must attend school 180 days a year. There is no restriction on which 180 days they attend.

By more than a three-to-one margin, the private schools in Seminole County are affiliated with churches.

## Deputies' gun use probed

SANFORD — Three Seminole County Sheriff's deputies are under investigation today as a department brass determines if their use of deadly force was justified when they fired 11 shots from their 9 mm pistols at a fleeing stolen car near Longwood early Monday.

Undersheriff Duane Harrell said today the

deputies will determine if Sgt. John Hight, and Deputies Stuart Williams and Craig McCall acted properly during the incident that began about 2:30 p.m. at the westbound exit of Interstate 4, when they approached a car they had determined had been stolen in Polk County.

The driver of the car sped away and almost struck deputies with the Mustang, Capt. Roy Hughey said. Deputies fired 11 rounds at the car.

## Cause of increased food stamp rolls a mystery to federal administration

WASHINGTON — Enrollment in the food stamp program, the nation's major anti-hunger plan, has surged to its highest level in five years, but there was no simple explanation Monday for the increase.

In the past, participation rose or fell depending on the unemployment rate. But officials noted some months ago the linkage was not as direct as it once had been.

In Seminole County, the number of people receiving food stamps has increased dramatically during the last year. In July 1989, 9,864 people in 2,580 households were receiving the stamps, said Eric Durfee, spokesman for the Florida Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services. In 1988, only 7,513 people in 2,630 homes were receiving food stamps, Durfee said.

By comparison, in 1988, 6,330 people were receiving food stamps at 2,175 homes and in 1987, 5,588 people were receiving food stamps in 2,088 homes.

## Young men, slow drivers most accident-prone

TALLAHASSEE — Drivers most likely to be involved in fatal traffic accidents are very young or elderly men traveling 10 mph under the speed limit late at night on a Sunday, a state transportation study showed.

Nearly 250,000 crashes occurred last year in Florida, killing 3,000 people and causing more than \$750 million worth of property damage, the state Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles said.

By examining every accident reported in Florida last year, the department identified drivers and circumstances most likely to be involved in traffic accidents.

The study showed that driving under the speed limit is often as dangerous as speeding. For all traffic accidents, the average reported speed at the time of impact was about 10 mph lower than the posted speed.

The agency attributed the phenomenon partly to the high rate of

## Fall election candidates still raising money

SANFORD — Seminole County commission candidates have continued to slow fund-raising efforts, although a barbecue two weeks ago generated nearly \$6,875 for Sandra Glenn's campaign for re-election to the District 4 county commission seat.

Candidates were required to report their campaign finance activities for the first two weeks of August to the supervisor of elections office Aug. 10.

Glenn reported taking in \$12,855 during the period July 28 to Aug. 10, bringing her total contributions to \$60,707. Of that amount, Glenn has spent \$12,001 during the last two weeks, bringing her total expenditures to \$19,938.

Glenn's Republican primary opponent, Robert "Bud" Feather, raised \$723 in contributions during the last two weeks, bringing his total contributions to \$1,709. He has spent \$1,709, including repaying himself \$900 Aug. 3 for loans he has made to his campaign.

Democrat Larry Furlong, who will face either Glenn or Feather in November, raised \$980 during the last two weeks, bringing his total contributions to \$3,000. He has spent \$2,544 of that amount.

District 2 incumbent Bob Sturm remains the fund-raising frontrunner, although he has slowed his contribution-seeking efforts.

# Chiles releases medical records

TALLAHASSEE — Democrat Lawton Chiles moved to settle lingering questions about his fitness to be governor Monday by releasing medical records detailing his bouts with depression, heart disease and intestinal ulcers.

Nothing in the records, which cover the past five years, appear to bear out fears voiced by the campaign of Bill Nelson, his opponent for the Democratic nomination for governor, that Chiles might not be fit to serve, or that he might even commit suicide.

"Sen. Chiles seems to be

responding nicely to treatment for the above mentioned conditions. I feel that he is in excellent mental and physical health at this time," wrote Dr. Karl Hempel, Chiles' physician in Tallahassee, in a statement accompanying the records.

Dr. Robin Wooten of Lakeland said he examined Chiles and discussed his medical condition with him and concluded he was responding well to the prescription medicine Prozac, an anti-depressant.

"I did not feel Sen. Chiles' symptoms were compromising his ability to function," Wooten wrote. "I also felt that his willingness to acknowledge his symptoms and seek appropriate

treatment were in keeping with his general integrity."

Chiles said during a campaign stop Monday in Miami that he hoped the additional medical records would put an end to Nelson's questions about his health. He also noted that other political leaders have coped successfully with depression.

"Winston Churchill had depression and Abraham Lincoln had depression, and they did a fair job at what they were about," he said. "It's a question that a lot of people sort of know something about, but people generally just don't talk much about it."

Chiles said he would have

preferred not releasing the records.

"There are things in the records that are kind of subjective," he said. "I just as soon not have ever released them, but I'm not going to allow somebody to say that there is something that's not there, and so for that reason, here we are."

Nelson, 47, a congressman from Missouri, and Republican Gov. Bob Martinez have already released medical records for the past five years and both were reported in good health.

The records show Chiles, 60, suffered abdominal problems dating to his days in the U.S. Senate, from when he retired in 1986.

## Inspector says he ignored hazards

TALLAHASSEE — A former inspector of amusement rides said Monday he was often told to overlook hazards on rides operated by friends of his boss — who often told him to write up violations at county fairs run by competing companies.

Gary Small, who worked for the Agriculture Department 1984-88, said one midway operator tore up tickets in his presence while Wallace C. Rich, former head of the Bureau of Public Fairs and Expositions, looked on and laughed.

Small said he angrily resigned on another occasion, but that Rich phoned him a few weeks later and promised not to override his inspection reports any more — a promise Small said was not kept.

On another matter in the first day of testimony before an Ethics Commission hearing officer, former State Fair board chairman Doyle Carlton Jr. said Rich in 1981 urged the board to hire a Florida-based company to run rides at the big annual Tampa show, even though a Tennessee firm had the best bid for the job.

Carlton said he thought it improper and checked with Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Connor, who told him the department had not given Rich instructions to favor Florida firms.

## NASA managers debate launch date

CAPE CANAVERAL — Engineers readying the repaired shuttle Columbia for blastoff on a long-delayed astronomy mission made up last time over the weekend, keeping the ship firmly on track for launch at the end of the month, officials said Monday.

A few miles from the launch pad, top space agency managers met Monday for a two-day "flight readiness review" to assess the status of Columbia's ground processing. William Lenoir, associate administrator for spaceflight, was expected to announce an official launch date Tuesday.

Columbia and its seven-man crew, grounded May 29 by a hydrogen fuel leak, are tentatively scheduled to blast off on the year's fourth shuttle flight — the first since April — at 1:17 a.m. EDT Sept. 1.

## Lawyer: Secord motivated by greed

MIAMI — An attorney for an airman whose plane was shot down over Nicaragua in 1986, exposing the Iran-Contra scandal, told a federal jury Monday that greed and not patriotism motivated Richard Secord and a cargo airline to provide military supplies to the Contra rebels.

Airman Eugene Hassenfus, 48, and the family of co-pilot Wallace "Buz" Sawyer, who was killed in the ill-fated mission, are suing Secord and Southern Air Transport of Miami, owners of the downed cargo plane, for expenses Hassenfus incurred after being captured by the Nicaraguans and for death benefits for Sawyer, of Magnolia, Ark.

The six-person jury was scheduled to begin deliberations Tuesday in the civil suit. The panel must decide if Secord and Southern Air were running the secret Contra-supply service for personal profit or were pawns of the Reagan administration as the defense claims.

Hassenfus, of Marinette, Wis., spent three months in a Sandinista jail after being sentenced to 30 years in prison by a Nicaraguan court for aiding the Contras. He fled out to recover expenses incurred during his trial and for back pay for part of 1986 and 1987.

## Mayor is ripped off while promoting city

ST. PETERSBURG — Mayor Robert Ulrich is facing a \$2,000 repair bill after his car was stolen outside a hotel while he was courting national Republican Party officials.

Ulrich's car was outside the downtown St. Petersburg Hilton Sunday night while the mayor was inside talking to the party committee responsible for choosing the site of the 1992 Republican National Convention.

The suspects who stole Ulrich's car ran off after they wrecked it during a joyride. There is heavy damage to the front of the mayor's 1980 Buick.

Ulrich is not pleased about what happened, especially while he was trying to put on a good front for the visiting GOP leaders. But he says the incident likely puts a more human face on the city.

The Tampa Bay area is competing with Houston, New Orleans and Cleveland to get the convention, and none of the cities are known for their low-crime rates.

## Black leaders want part in Gasparilla

TAMPA — Black leaders have formed a united front to deal with their exclusion from the annual Gasparilla festivities.

The Gasparilla celebration is put on each year by Ye Mystic Krewe, an all-white, all-male group. It's usually in February, but is being moved to late January next year to coincide with the 25th anniversary Super Bowl game at Tampa Stadium.

The NFL wants to meet with Krewe leaders to talk about their racial policies, despite moves to include black vendors and two predominately black college bands in the parade.

## Cocaine-laced drink victim dies in Miami

MIAMI — A Miami man who went into a deep coma after drinking a Colombian malt drink laced with a deadly amount of cocaine was removed Monday from life-support systems.

Authorities at AMI Kendall said Maximo Rene Menendez, 25, died at 5:15 p.m. after being removed from life-support at 5:02 p.m.

"There was absolutely nothing that could be done for this man," said Victor Mays, hospital administrator.

The man's family requested last Tuesday that he be allowed to die after authorities found him to be brain dead. His mother withdrew that request after he began breathing on his own and his legs moved briefly, but there had been no significant developments in his condition since then.

A group of doctors from the University of Miami were called in this week to examine him and found that he was still living only because of the respirator that helped him breathe, Mays said.

Menendez fell into a coma July 29 after drinking a contaminated bottle of Pony Malta de Bavaria. Investigators believe Colombian drug traffickers were trying to smuggle the cocaine into the United States by dissolving potentially lethal quantities of the drug in the beverage, which is similar to American beer.

They said there still are about 8,000 bottles of Pony Malta unaccounted for in the United States.

## Lake Mary postal facility opens doors to public for tour of processing plant

LAKE MARY — During the past two months, the new Mid Florida Mail Processing Center, 800 Rinehart Road, has raised the curiosity of many passing motorists. It's a postal facility, but it doesn't sell stamps and you can't stop in to mail a package. For those who wonder about it and what goes on inside, the center will be holding an open house Sunday afternoon between 1 and 4 p.m.

Although the facility has only been fully operational since June 29 of this year, a number of improvements have already been made, and the staffing, including managerial personnel, has increased by 20 to 600. Mail sorting is now at a level of 1.5 to 2 million pieces per average day, and a rate of three million pieces per day moving through the processing facility is envisioned within just a

few more years.

Charles Ricci, manager of the center, said because of the time of day for the open house, visitors Sunday will not witness the heavy mail processing that goes on during a typical 24-hour period, "but the optical character reader and much of our other equipment will be up and running so people can see what goes on in this building."

The 340,000 square foot facility, built on 51 acres of land between Rinehart Road and Interstate 4, is a constant processing plant for 25 mail posted in areas with zip codes beginning with 327, 328, 329 and 347, which includes all of Seminole, Orange, Osceola and Volusia Counties plus the northern part of Brevard County.

In announcing the open house, Ricci said, "The Postal Service is looking forward to meeting our visitors during our open house so we can give them a sample of what goes on here on a day-in, day-out basis."

## Gold treasure found at shipwreck site off Key West

TAMPA — Treasure hunters off the Dry Tortugas have recovered six gold bars with markings that indicate they could be from a royal Spanish cargo fleet lost in a hurricane in 1623, a company spokesman said Monday.

Don Bagley, director of Tampa's Seahawk Deep Ocean Technology, said crews have found six 1.5-pound bars during the last two weeks at the company's wreck site about 75 miles west of Key West, under about 1,500 feet of water.

They also recovered a gold and emerald ring and 15 intact Spanish olive jars at the site last week.

"We are delighted to be finding gold this early in the excavation," Bagley said. "Actual excavation of the wreck site has been going on for only about two weeks, and we've uncovered a very small portion of the wreck."

Three of the bars have "EN RADA" stamped into the metal. That Spanish tax stamp also was found on some of the gold bars from the ship "Nuestra Señora de Atocha."

The Atocha was part of a royal Spanish fleet that sank in a 1623 hurricane with a load of treasure from the New World. The remains of the Atocha were found off the Dry Tortugas by Key West treasure hunter Mel Fisher in 1980 and proved one of the richest treasure ships ever recovered.

Seahawk has not been able to identify the wreck it is working, Bagley said. But the gold bars and the other artifacts suggest it may be a sister ship to the Atocha.

Seahawk crews also recovered two astrolabes from the site. A precursor to the sextant, astrolabes were used by ancient mariners to measure the angle of the sun or stars to determine the ship's position.

"Only larger Spanish vessels of a treasure fleet would have carried such an important piece of navigational equipment," said marine archaeologist R. Duncan Mathewson of Key West.

Other artifacts recovered from the site include silver eight-real coins, musket balls, ceramics and wood.

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# Abels backs utilities purchase plan

**LONGWOOD** - City administrators believe that buying Sanlando Utilities and possibly even Longwood Utilities is the best to receive the city's money crunch as well as to prepare for future development.

Residents groaned when that recommendation was presented during a town meeting last Tuesday.

But City Finance Director Ric Rink explained that the city's water utilities department is facing a \$430,458 deficit this year, and a representative from Beller Utility said the city's rates are not only higher than the other two companies serving Longwood, but they are the highest in the county.

Consultants were hired a year ago to conduct a study on the city's current water and sewage treatment facilities, and to present options on how Longwood can meet future demands on its system.

The consultants said that if the city increases its 591 customer base by purchasing Sanlando Utilities, which currently serves 8,531 residents, and Longwood Utilities, with 1,034 accounts, that the cost per

customer will go down.

However, most residents who spoke at the meeting were hostilely opposed to the acquisition.

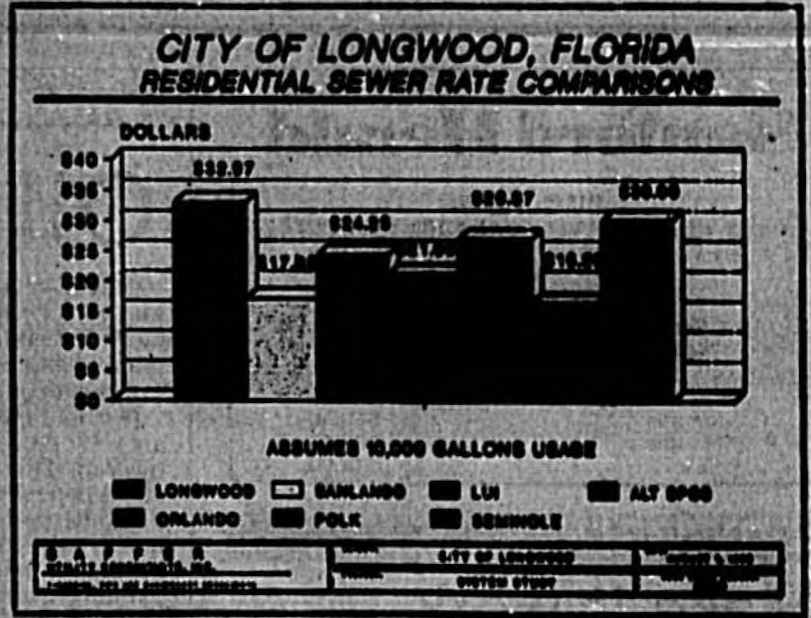
"The city can't serve 591 people at a reasonable rate, and you think it can support even more?" one resident said. "Give it to me at a reasonable rate, or get out of the sewer business."

John Burns, vice-president of the Wekiva Hunt Club Association, said his neighborhood represents 3,000 of Sanlando's 8,500 subscribers, and warned the city against purchasing that company.

"People do not comprehend the hidden cost of purchasing Sanlando," Burns said. "You think it will be for under \$35 million?" He said Sanlando's state permit to dump treated wastewater into the Wekiva River will expire soon, and it must come up with a costly alternative.

However, city administrator Mike Abels said last week that he supports the acquisition, provided Sanlando lowers its price tag to at least \$16.5 million.

"That seems to be the best option, although what they're asking for is outrageous," Abels said.



He explained that by purchasing Sanlando, people currently serviced by city utilities would see their rates go down immediately, and people on Sanlando will still experience a regular rate increase, "but it will go up less if they combine with us."

Abels said the city would finance the acquisition through revenue bonds, which are secured by funds generated by the utilities system itself.

"We would spread costs out over the whole system, and the rate of return would affect anyone dramatically," Abels said. "Current costs covered by 500 people would be dispersed over thousands."

Abels said the issue will be taken up early next year, probably after the budget is completed.

## Smoke in car brings arrest

## Developer withdraws zoning request

**LONGWOOD** - At last night's city commission meeting, over 75 homeowners turned out to oppose a plan by Star Enterprises of Matland to build a gas station and car wash at the southwest corner of Longwood Hills Road and County Road 437.

Star Enterprises withdrew its request to rezone property for that development after a 140-signature petition was submitted to the commission last night.

Around 100 residents living near the proposed station, mostly residents of the Lake Ruth South subdivision, had signed a petition protesting the gas station, saying it would increase traffic on CR 437 and aesthetically harm the appearance of their neighborhood. They felt the proposal was not in line with the comprehensive plan for CR 437.

Last night was supposed to be a public hearing on rezoning the 3.34-acre site from office commercial to general commercial, but then Dick Pesa, a consultant representing property owner Irene S. Philpitt, asked to strike the item from the agenda, saying Star Enterprises had to work out more landscaping details on the site plan. The commission

refused to delay the vote for 30 days.

The residents who showed up at the meeting were not happy about the request, and said they should have a right to speak on the issue since it was a public hearing.

"I've got petitions with 140 signatures," said Gary Hefter, who spoke on behalf of the protesting residents. "I think these people have come here tonight after work and they should be allowed to speak."

Deputy Mayor Jeff Morton agreed with Hefter, but said Star Enterprises should have a chance to present its case in final form before bringing it to a public hearing.

After the public put pressure on the commission to refuse Star Enterprises' request to delay, Pesa came forward and asked to withdraw the application entirely, and said later he didn't know if Philpitt will try again to rezone the property from office to commercial.

Although most of the audience members complained about the withdrawal, Commissioner Rex Anderson said, "In essence you people have won your case tonight." Similarly, Mayor Gene Farach said, "I'd like to commend you for participating with us in the government of this city. I'd like to see the same intensity of commitment as we work on our comprehensive plan for Longwood."

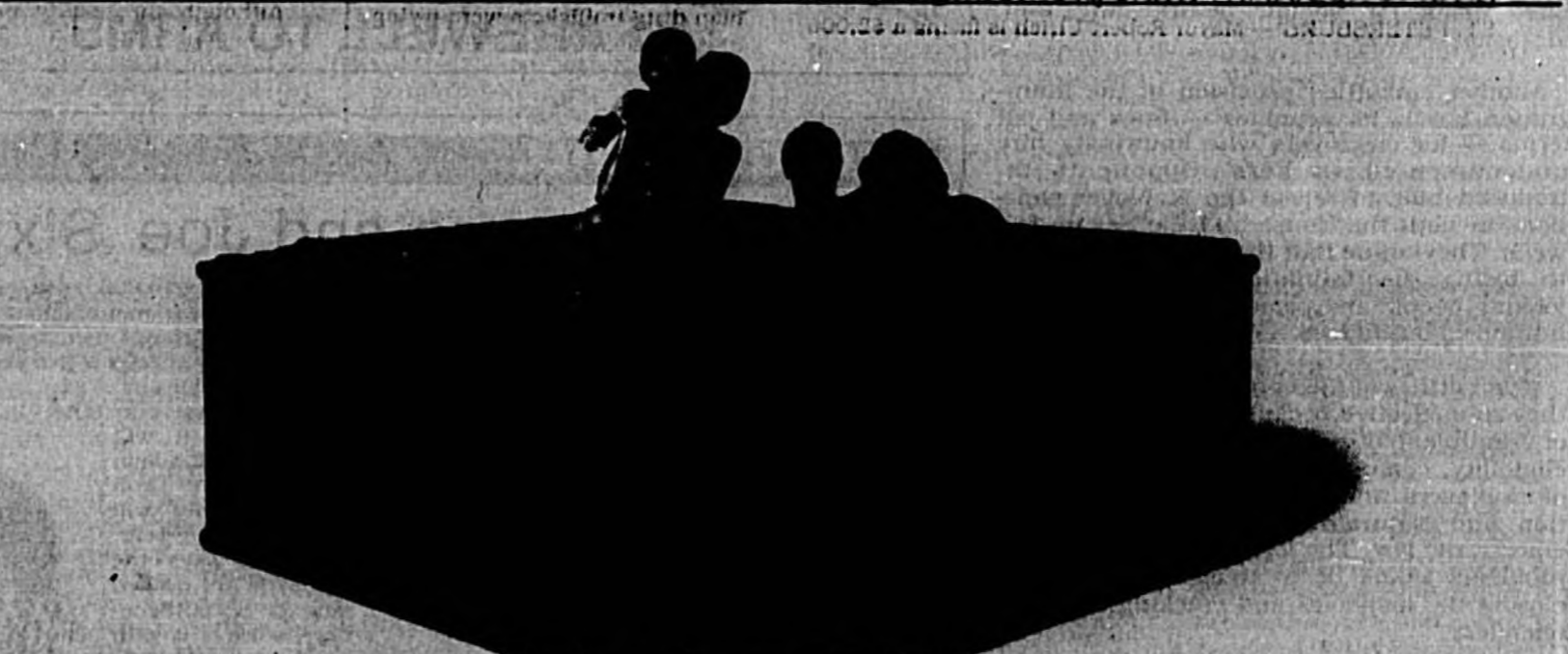
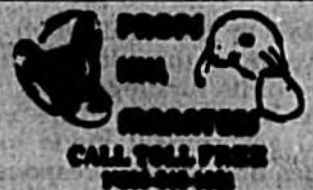

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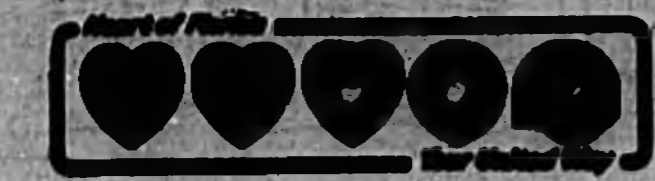

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**De Klerk arranges Zulu leader meeting**

PRETORIA, South Africa — President Frederik de Klerk arranged a meeting for Tuesday with Zulu leader Mangosuthu Buthelezi following eight days of violence between supporters of Buthelezi's Inkatha movement and the African National Congress that has left 392 dead.

The violence erupted and spread to at least nine townships on the outskirts of Johannesburg, uprooting hundreds of residents and hostel dwellers in a wave of suburban internecine violence not seen in 42 years of white rule.

Police Tuesday morning put the death toll at 392, including 112 killed in the sprawling black satellite city of Soweto southwest of Johannesburg and 280 in townships to the east. More

than 1,400 people have been wounded.

Police Commissioner Gen. Johan van der Merwe Monday posted rewards for the recovery of illegal automatic weapons, other firearms, ammunition and explosives in a bid to help curb the fighting. But he warned, "Indications are that they might spread."

"Our country is being racked by a spate of violence in various black residential areas," he said in a statement.

# Three teams make top 10

## Rams, Patriots, Greyhounds in preseason poll

With the first varsity cross country meet of the season still almost three weeks away, the boys' teams in Seminole County are already looking over their shoulder.

Once again, competition should be fierce among the county schools. When the 1990 Class 4A preseason top 10 came out last week, three Seminole County schools were among the leaders: Lake Mary (No. 2), Lake Brantley (No. 7) and Lyman (No. 8).

Individually, Lake Mary's D.J. Lewis is ranked second, just ahead of teammate Bob Robertson. Lyman's Kevin Padgett is seventh in the preseason rankings.

"We're pretty pleased with that," said Lake Mary coach Willie Calloway, who has everyone back from last year's team that was sixth at the state cross country meet. "We have two of the top 10 runners in the state in Robertson and Lewis."

Both Lewis, a junior, and Robertson, a senior, added to their list of accomplishments during the summer. Lewis, who was eighth at the state cross country meet last year, finished fifth at the Junior Nationals in Nebraska. Robertson, who was 12th at the state meet last year, came in third at Golden South Classic.

Also back from last year's team are Steve Heidt, Tad Burkhardt, Travis Olson and Steve Platt. They will be joined by a group of newcomers led by Brian Benson. Other new faces are Chris Hurd, Eric Hamm, Ed Russ, Joshua Smith, Jeremy Mosure, Paul Wehrley and a solid group of freshmen: Brian Ebaugh, James Newberry, David Robertson, David Heidt, Jason Seibold and John Ayers.

"Actually, those are the people that are out so far," said Calloway. "I have 26 on list. We may have our largest turnout ever. I'm expecting to have close to 40 guys out this

"All of last year was a proving thing for them. This year, they're ready, physically and mentally, to

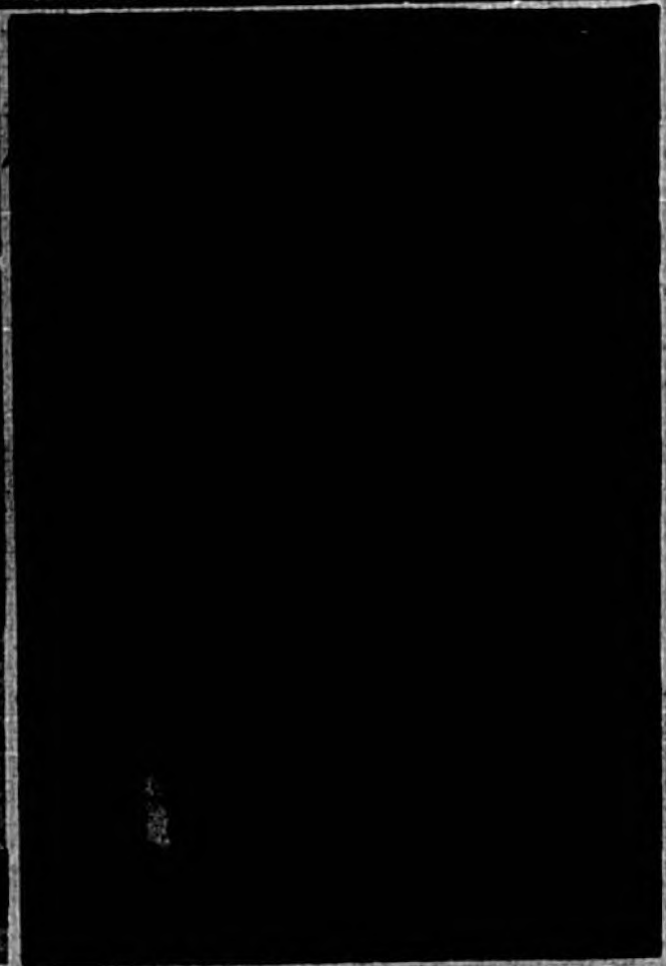
compete and be successful."

## Judge sends Steinbrenner to the showers

CLEVELAND — A federal judge Monday refused to grant a temporary restraining order that could have allowed George Steinbrenner to remain, at least temporarily, as general partner of the New York Yankees.

The ruling by U.S. District Judge Alice Batchelder effectively ended the controversial owner's reign as the leader of baseball's best-known franchise.

Batchelder denied the request by Yankees limited partners Daniel McCarthy and Harold Bowman, who filed suit in a last-ditch attempt to prevent baseball from enforcing an agreement signed by Steinbrenner

and Commissioner Fay Vincent ordering him to surrender control of the baseball operations of the club by midnight Monday.

"We are obviously pleased and gratified that the decision of the court in Cleveland is consistent with our position," Vincent said.

Attorneys for McCarthy and Bowman claimed they would suffer "irreparable harm" if Steinbrenner relinquished control of the team and said that Steinbrenner was coerced into signing the agreement with Vincent on July 30.

Vincent ruled that Steinbrenner's conduct in the Howard Spira affair, which included giving the admitted See Yankees, Page 28

## Hurricanes exploring all options

CORAL GABLES — Eastern Seaboard schools will meet soon to discuss the possibility of creating a sized-down football conference that could include such teams as Miami, Syracuse, Pittsburgh and Florida State, University of Miami Athletic Director Sam Jankovich said Monday.

Jankovich also suggested that despite the expected flurry of realignment of conferences around the country, remaining an independent could be a realistic option for the Hurricanes.

"I've had phone calls from institutions asking if we would schedule them if Miami did not hook up with a conference," Jankovich said.

The University of Miami's defending champion football program was thought to be one of the big prizes when rumors of realignment of several conferences began flying last spring, but conferences seem to have cooled on the Hurricanes since then.

Jankovich, however, said all Miami's options are still open including joining the Southeast Conference or the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Jankovich met with officials of the Southwest Conference last week, but said aligning the Hurricanes with that league would be difficult.

He also said the SEC presidents will meet later this month and could decide to halt expansion at two additional teams. Arkansas already has joined, and Florida State is seen as the favorite to become the second new member of the SEC.

Jankovich said it was also a possibility the presidents of the ACC would vote not to expand at all.

He said the situation is so much in doubt, nobody knows what will happen.

"The unfortunate thing is you don't know where anybody is coming from. You don't know if anybody is telling the truth," Jankovich said.

"There has to be a cooling down See Conference, Page 28

freshman Hunter Kemper, the most intriguing of all newcomers to the sport this year. Kemper is a competitive triathlete who was the national ironkids champion in his age group and won several other triathlons around the state this summer.

According to Harris, Kemper will attempt to compete on the varsity level in both cross country and swimming this year. Since swim meets are generally held during the middle of the week and cross country meets are scheduled on the weekends, there shouldn't be a major conflict until the post-season meets in late October and November.

At Lyman, Coach Fred Finko begins the FTM (post-Teddy Mitchell) era. Mitchell, the two-time Class 4A state champion in cross country, graduated last year, but there's still enough talent to earn the Greyhounds a spot in the preseason top 10.

"This is going to be a learning experience for all of us," said Finko. "We have a lot of young kids with a lot of potential. But we won't be able to gauge just how good they are until about three-quarters of the way through the season."

period, when everybody can take their time and look at the big picture," he said. "The whole answer is still up in the air. I don't think there will be any change until maybe by the first of the year."

He said the Eastern Baseball Conference would meet Aug. 25, during the weekend of the Klamath Classic football game at the Modoc grounds in New Jersey.

He said a small football conference of six or eight teams could be formed. He said in order to fit out their schedule, a scheduling agreement might be worked out with the Southeastern Conference under which teams from both leagues would play each other on a rotating basis.

"I've discussed Florida State and Miami all being something to the table," he said.

He said other possibilities are South Carolina, Rutgers, West Virginia, Memphis and Virginia Tech.

He said the conference could be set up to play only one or two games a year, but a preseason football tournament would be one of the possibilities.

former gambler \$40,000, was not in the best interests of baseball.

"The plaintiffs did not present evidence that this settlement was anything other than an unpleasant choice that Mr. Steinbrenner made," Buchalter said. "I find that the temporary restraining order which has been demanded should be and will be denied."

The agreement Vincent originally brought into the July 30 meeting with Steinbrenner called for a two-year suspension and three-year probation, but the Yankees owner and his attorneys asked for an agreement that forced him to step down as general partner. He is allowed to continue to take part in the financial affairs of the Yankees, and his family will control 55 percent of the stock, said Patrick McCartan, a spokesman for the major league.

Steinbrenner has denied being part of the lawsuit and has said all along he intends to follow the agreement, and attorneys for baseball even played a tape of an interview on the ABC news show "60 Minutes" in which Steinbrenner said he wanted to step down.

There was speculation Steinbrenner, who is banned from fighting the agreement under terms of the settlement, might be called on to testify by phone. Both parties agreed after a lunch break that his testimony was not necessary Monday, and there was no evidence presented that stated he wanted to stay on as general partner.

DEAR ABBY: I am a 61-year-old bachelor who never married because I took care of my widowed mother, who just died at the age of 93.

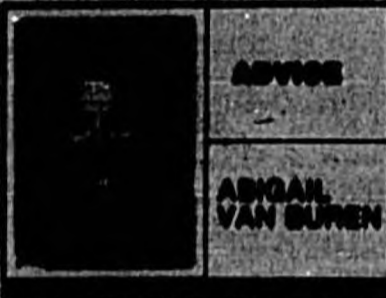
I am somewhat withdrawn and never had any girlfriends, although I'm told I'm above average in looks.

# True about mole removal

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My dermatologist told me I should have a mole removed from my leg. It's about 1/2 inch in diameter and I've had it all my life. Should I go with it if it's not giving me any problems?

**DEAR READER:** As a general rule, people do not have to part with moles that have been present since childhood, unless the moles darken, bleed or change in configuration. However, in your case, I believe you should follow your dermatologist's advice because, as a specialist, he or she knows which skin lesions look benign and which are questionable. For example, moles called dysplastic nevi may appear harmless to the untrained eye, yet they could herald the development of a future malignancy.

Removal of a small mole from your leg is a simple office procedure that is relatively painless and free of complications. If your dermatologist urges removal, do it: the peace of mind is well worth the expense and slight inconvenience.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** In September 1984, a tube of Diprosone cream 0.05 percent cost \$4.35. My prescription was renewed this week for \$17.50. This is the best medication I've found for scaling cuts, so I shouldn't complain. But it gives an example of the horrendous increase in drug costs. Is there a generic available at a more reasonable cost?

**DEAR READER:** Cortisone creams, of which Diprosone is a particularly good brand, are available in less expensive, non-prescription, generic forms. Ask your pharmacist to recommend one.

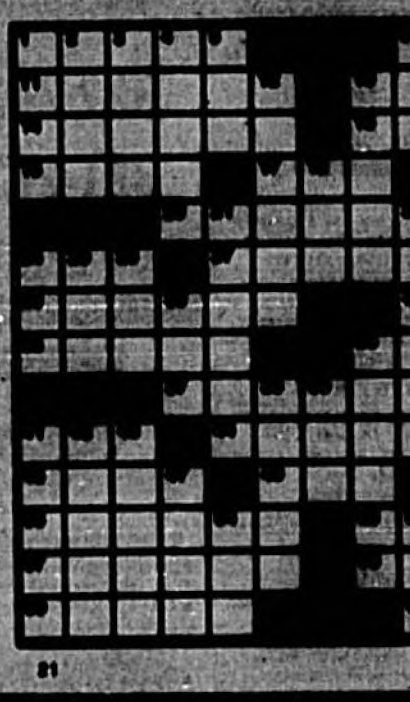
You should never use cortisone creams to treat cuts. The medicine retards healing and encourages infection. Cortisone is appropriately used for allergic skin reactions, such as contact

dermatitis, or for skin diseases, such as eczema.

It's best to avoid sun, ulcers and abrasions with gentle soap-and-water washing. They leave the area uncovered so germs, rapid healing. Use a sterile dressing only if there is

Gen. James Tucher (ret.) of Abilene, Texas, has won several regional titles in the course of a bridge career that was interrupted not only by military service but also by a busy medical practice. Playing against top-level opponents, he laid a clever trap by apparently allowing his side to be forced to a high level. When Tucher's partner (South) made a one-diamond overcall and West bid one heart, Tucher quietly raised to two diamonds. East raised hearts. South competed farther with three diamonds, and West bid three hearts. North now bid again, although South was probably hoping to have a chance in denied against hearts. When four diamonds was passed around to West, he doubted, expecting his two ace opposite partner's opening bid to easily produce a set. West led the club

ace and continued clubs. Declarer ruffed, played a heart to dummy's ace, and cashed the king and ace of diamonds. He opened the heart king, throwing a spade from dummy, and ruffed a heart. When East's heart queen fell, South discarded another spade from dummy on his good heart jack. He then conceded a spade, making an overtrick. For East-West, there were two serious errors. First, West should have made a negative double after South's diamond overcall. That would have shown four spades as well as a heart suit and would have left East better placed to participate in any competitive decision. Second, the double was dangerous. A one-trick set would not East-West only 100 as opposed to 50 — not an important difference — and a two-trick set was not very likely.
