Books And Authors
By MRS. IRVING FEINBERG

"If I live in Germany a hundred years, I shall never understand these people", William Shirer wrote in his diary one winter night after an argument with a Nazi censor. He lived in Berlin only some six years, but in the end the Nazis and the censors were glad to see him go because he understood too much. He had come close to understanding, closer probably than any other American, the dark tragedy of what was happening to the German people and, through them, to all of us, and he had set down his understanding in his book entitled "Berlin Diary". Shirer first went to Berlin as a reporter for a news agency. When it suspended, he became one of the first broadcasters of news by radio. After the war began, working under a more immediate censorship than his newspaper colleagues, he developed a style of sarcasm and irony as gallant as it was elusive to the Nazis whose job it was to blue-pencil his script. His tone of voice was hard to censor. Now he has written down in diary form his record of these years, in simple language unencumbered. It makes the most important and the most exciting book written out of Germany since long before the year began.
