Sheriff vows he will stay tough on gangs

As the Seminole County Sheriff's Office becomes the first law enforcement agency in the state to enforce a street gang recruitment law, the message is loud and clear that any gang related activity will not be tolerated.

Two teenage boys charged with violating the law went to trial today in the juvenile court in Sanford. Thomas Savastano, 16, and Jeremy Estep, 15 were arrested Feb. 24 and charged with one count of street gang recruiting, a third degree felony, according to sheriff's spokesman Ed McDonough.

Savastano and Estep were accused of beating a 12-year-old boy for refusing to join their street gang at the Regency Apartments on State Road 436 in Fern Park, McDonough said. The victim has since moved out of the state to live with his father.

Last week, Victor Boyd, 16, a third suspect, was sentenced to probation and community control and 100 hours of community service

until age 19 after pleading no contest.

The gang recruiting law, which went into effect in October 1996, and the resulting trial, is very important according to Seminole County Chief Deputy Steve Harriett, because, "it sends a message by the community that we don't want people starting gangs or increasing and initiating gang activity."

"As a society, we say that this is not acceptable and we will hold you accountable in the effort to fight, minimize and eventually eliminate this type of activity," Harriett said.

And although gang presence is negligible in this county when compared to situations in other parts of the country like Los Angeles and Chicago, Harriett said it is still a concern for his office because gangs are associated with crime, violence, drugs and weapons.

Harriett characterized gangs as groups of loosely knit youngsters involved in criminal activity. Ages, he said, range from 13 to 20.

Harriett said those involved in gang related activity in the county are mostly trying to

Deputies seek suspect in vehicle burglaries at park

SANFORD - The Sheriff's Office has released a bank security camera photo of a man who is suspected of committing 13 vehicle burglaries at Seminole County parks last month.

The vehicle burglaries occurred on various days at Wayside Park on Highway 17-92 near Sanford, Cameron Wright Park on East State Road 46 near Geneva and Florida Trails Park on County Road 426 near Oviedo.

In each incident, the suspect would wait until the victims left their vehicles and went hiking or fishing in the park. He would then break the driver's side window and enter the vehicle. The suspects stole electronic accessories and wallets.

The security camera photo of the suspect was taken on October 19th at the Sun Trust Bank in Oviedo. The suspect was attempting to use a stolen ATM card at the time.

The suspect is a white male, 35 years old with brown hair that is long in the back. He is believed to be driving a 1987 gray Ford Escort station wagon that has front end damage.

Lake Mary girls to dance in *The Nutcracker*

One of the most memorable Christmas traditions every year is *The Nutcracker*.

This year, four Lake Mary girls will have the unique opportunity of being a part of the production.

Betty Yen, Anne Sandefur, Alexis Underwood and Betsy Graves, all from Studio 5D, danced their way to parts in the Southern Ballet's yearly performance.

"Trying out for the Nutcracker was so much fun," Underwood said. "I have never been in the ballet and I only saw it once, even if I got a part I didn't like I wouldn't have cared. This is such great experience."

The experience of trying out was a little hectic for the girls. Gaymarie Tomlinson, the owner of studio 5D, found out the day of the try-outs that they were actually being conducted. Because she is a new school, she did not receive any information.

Within an hour, she needed to contact the girls, get them ready and transport them to the tryout location, while giving them instruction at the same time.

"I had to quickly decide which girls I wanted to take," Tomlinson explained. "I finally decided to take six and that decision was based primarily on height. Lots of times the parts are given to the girls who meet the correct height restrictions, not only on their ability to dance. I took six girls and four of them earned parts. We must be doing something right. The two who didn't get parts were not chosen because of their size. They danced beautifully, but did not fit the height requirement."

One of the girls who did not

receive a part was Jamie Staugler. No matter how much Tomlinson tried to explain to her that she was too tall for the costumes and would have been chosen otherwise, Staugler still had hurt feelings over not being chosen.

"I was very upset when I wasn't chosen" Jamie recalled. "But I worked through it and realized that it was a very good lesson. I had a positive audi-

tion and that will help me when I want to try for the next part in a ballet. It's hard to realize, though, that you didn't get a part because of height instead of your actual dancing."

Although the other girls felt badly for Staugler, they were still very happy that they received parts.

"Part of the fun of trying out is watching dancers from

other studios and learning from them," Yen said. "We work very hard in class and it's rewarding to perform at an audition and know that you did your best."

"It's also fun to see people that you know from other studios that you don't get to see very often," Sandefur added.

These girls were able to find fun in a very difficult task.

On the first day of try-outs, the girls were taught routines and performed for four hours. Their parents and instructor were not allowed to watch and Tomlinson said that was one of the hardest parts for the adults.

Then, the dancers were cut in half for call-backs, where they danced for an additional six hours. After that, the girls who received parts were announced.

"I had a part in the ballet last year," Graves said. "This year, the auditions were a lot harder and required more advanced abilities. Knowing that Ms. Tomlinson was waiting for me helped a lot and gave me a lot more confidence. That was really nice of her."

Agosto, who also didn't not receive a part because she was too tall for one and too short for the other, also believed that the experience of trying-out taught her a lot.

"I have only been dancing for about a year," she said. "And although I was pretty disappointed when I wasn't chosen for the ballet, it gave me something to build on. I will definitely try out again."

Now the fun starts for these four girls. They will have to learn their new parts, get fitted for costumes and then they will have the opportunity to dance for most of Central Florida.

And they aren't even nervous.

Specifications are written on the back of the photo in Mr. Wells' handwriting: Length - 8 feet, wingspread - 9 feet, propeller - 3 feet, motor - 1 cylinder, 2 cycle air cooled 2 HP, RPM-900. The gas tank in the wing held one gallon of gasoline. The plane was suspended from a 20 foot pole and could travel along the road about 25 mph with the child in photo who is unknown. Mr. Wells was a skilled mechanic with Chase and Company for many years and invented several agricultural work items, most notably a famous "mule train" for harvesting crops. He and his wife, Buelah Spurling, were the parents of Mildred Stemper, Florence Stenstrom, Violet Currie and Gladys Dyal.

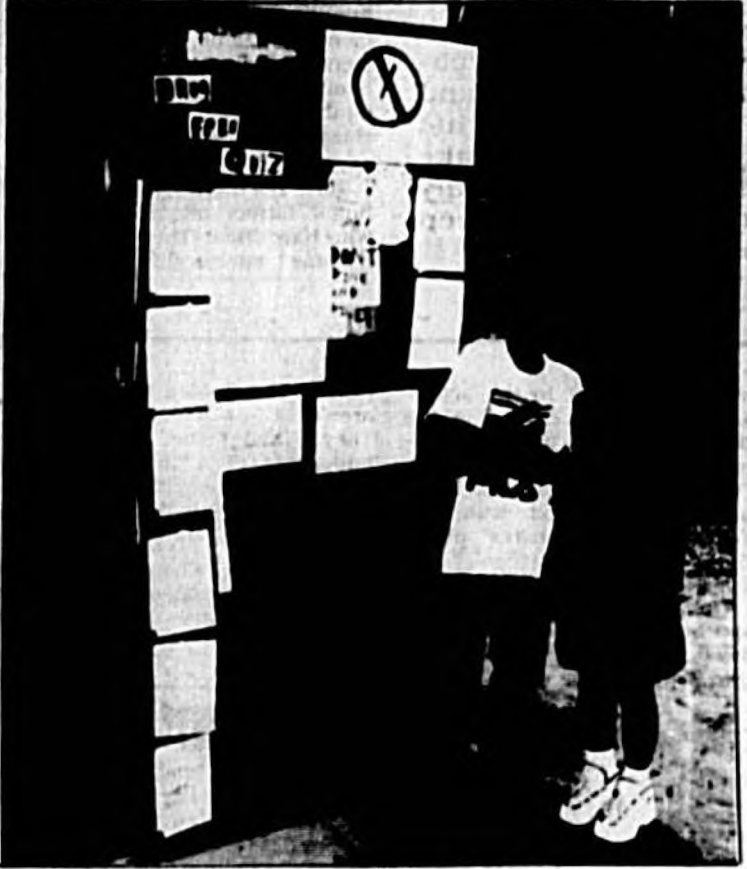

Toll-free number lets you help report motorists who pass stopped school buses

Florida Education Commissioner Frank T. Brogan is continuing a statewide effort and toll-free number to alert Florida motorists to the importance of laws designed to reduce the serious threat to the safety of students that is posed when motorists pass stopped school buses illegally.

"This initiative is a proactive way to avoid the tragedy that could result from violations of Florida's school bus passing laws," Brogan said. "It takes all of us, looking out for Florida's school children, to ensure that they arrive safely at school and return home safely each day," Brogan said.

State law prohibits motorists from passing a school bus when it is stopped and displaying its stop sign, unless the motorist is traveling in the opposite direction on certain divided highways. The law also prohibits motorists from passing the school bus on the side where children enter when the bus displays its stop sign. In 1997, Brogan advocated tougher penalties for violations of the state's school bus passing law, resulting in the Florida Legislature doubling the fine of passing a school bus on the right.

The statewide effort encourages motorists to report violations of the school bus safety laws by calling a toll-free number, 1-888-STOP-4KIDS (1-888-786-7454). They will be asked to provide the license tag number of the car, as well as the date, time, and approximate location where the illegal pass occurred. Working in conjunction with the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles, the Florida Department of Education will notify motorists reported to the hotline by mail that they were recently reported to have violated the law. These motorists will receive a brochure outlining the law and penalties for violations.

The campaign is part of a continuing effort to reduce the number of school bus-related accidents. Last year, Brogan participated in a bus ride in

Pinellas County where law enforcement officers issued citations to motorists who violated the law.

Community Traffic Safety Teams (CTSTs) have been established throughout the state to educate the public and coordinate law enforcement blitzes to try to change the behavior of those persons who pass school buses illegally.

The CTSTs were formed to improve traffic safety at the community level. They include persons from various disciplines who work in traffic safety and injury prevention, such as law enforcement officers, traffic engineers, health professionals, school district personnel, and others.

A 1996 study by the Center for Urban Transportation Research at the University of South Florida documented 10,590 illegal passes of stopped school buses on a single day in Florida. In a 180-day school year it is estimated that there are two million illegal passes, each representing the possibility of tragic injuries or fatalities to students. There are almost one million public school students transported to and from school each day on Florida's 14,000 school buses.

During the last five years, eight children were killed in Florida by motorists at school bus stops. Since 1990, 32 motorists or their passengers have been killed in other vehicles during a collision with a school bus. During that time, four students have been struck by motorists while buses were stopped to pick up or drop off the students.

Section 316.172, Florida Statutes, requires motorists approaching a school bus from either direction to stop when the bus is displaying the stop signal. Motorists traveling in the opposite direction from the school bus are not required to stop only if there is an unpaved median or space of at least five feet or a physical barrier between the lanes of traffic traveling in opposite directions. Regardless of the type of roadway, drivers traveling in the same direction as the bus are always required to stop.

After the elections...

Except for one runoff in Lake Mary, that city's and Longwood's elections for commission seats are over. And turnout for this off-year wasn't bad. We commend voters who took the time to go vote with no state nor national races on the ballot. We believe city politics are just as important as Washington politics are to our residents.

In Longwood, the two new commission members have served before, coming back to politics after a short hiatus. Both Steve Miller and Paul Lovstrand are forceful leaders, and we expect to see tough decisions made about sewer service, drainage and growth.

In Lake Mary, a runoff between incumbent George Duryea and front-runner Jeff Deen will be held Dec. 2. Voters need to show up at the polls one more time this year. Meanwhile, Al Crump goes to work tonight, having won his race against incumbent Sheila Sawyer. Sawyer served her constituents well, but we believe Crump can help forge a better working rela-

tionship with the county. (Lake Mary goes from island to peninsula.)

Running for office is a time-consuming, exhausting and sometimes thankless task. Candidates live in a fish bowl, and are open to constant criticism. For those who serve the cities, the pay isn't much. But still they run. We applaud first-time candidates Trudy Meyer and Michael Wierzbowski in Lake Mary and Jerry Dutcher and Craig Van Hooven in Longwood, for daring to throw their proverbial hats in the ring. We know they learned a lot. And we urge them to consider serving on volunteer boards, to stay active in politics.

All of the recent candidates are examples of why the American political system works; men and women from many walks of life share their knowledge to make our government better. Many voices and good debate will keep us free. Kudos to them all.

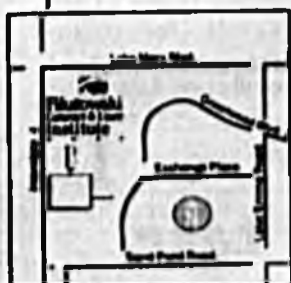

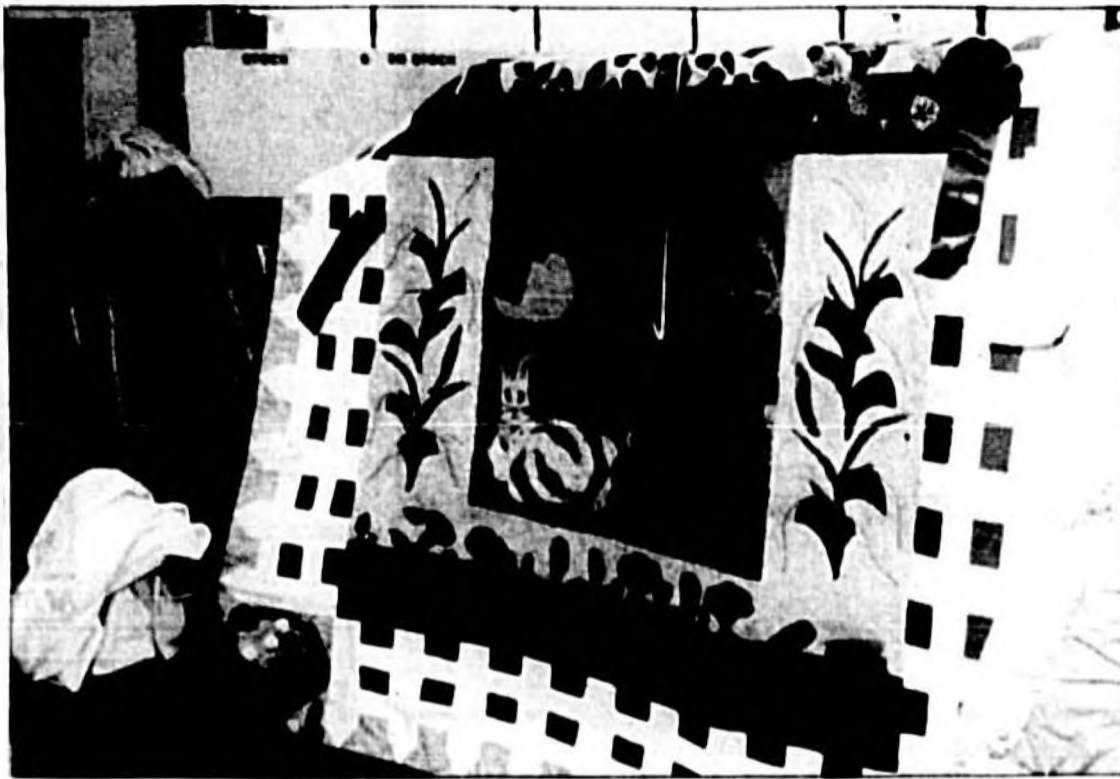

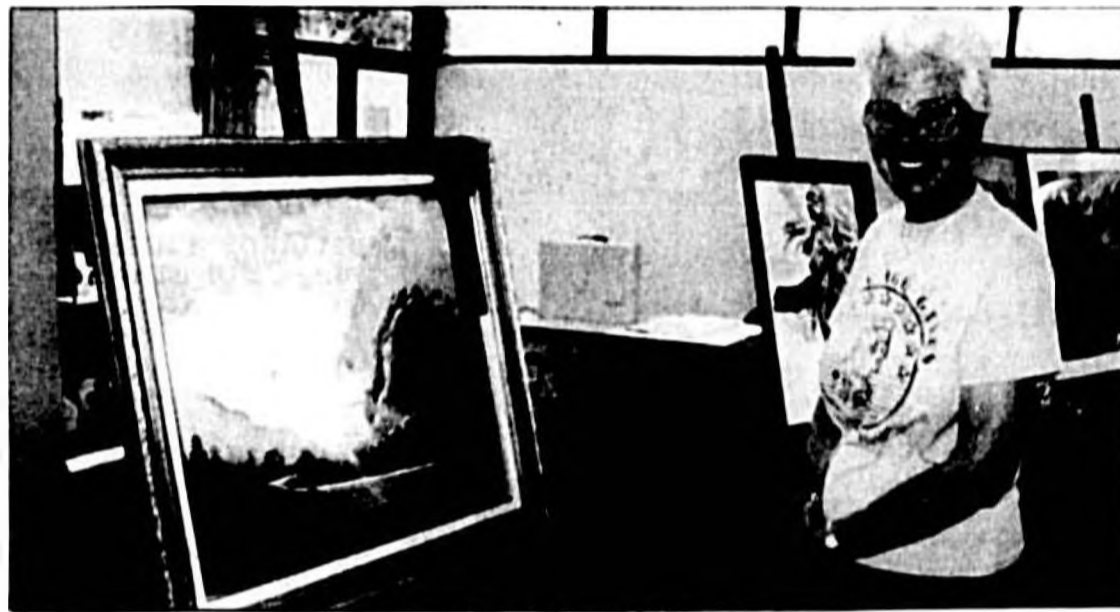

emulate what they perceive as gang related behavior through the use of signs, colors, symbols or clothing.

"They may be pretending they are in a gang," he said. Through its proactive stance,

Harriett said his department operates a Gang Resistance Education and Training program (GREAT). The program designates trained resource officers from each middle school to provide education to students. The focus is on self-esteem and violence abatement. "The officers teach the kids

the importance of making their own decisions and how not to respond to peer pressure," Harriett said. "This instills values and teaches kids that there are alternatives to following.

Also in effect in the sheriff's Gang Suppression Unit where

four deputies work in areas of the county gathering intelligence and monitoring kids who show a propensity to this type of activity, said Harriett.

"This allows the punishment to be greater and serves as a deterrent," he said.

The gang recruitment law falls under the state statute relating to criminal street gangs, which by definition, applies to three or more persons who have a common name or identifying sign, colors or clothing.

Making it even tougher on young offenders, a gang enhancement law, which has been on the books for several years, states that if a gang member is convicted of a crime committed for the furtherment of the gang, then the penalty and punishment increases.

Harriett said his office does not refer to gangs by their names because "it lends credence to their existence."

"What we see mostly in the county is would be gang activity like graffiti," he said, adding that graffiti is removed as soon as possible through an abatement program involving juvenile offenders, he said.

As another deterrent, deputies have traveled to Los Angeles to learn about gangs and "it was very enlightening," he

said.

After assessing the sheriff's program in Seminole County, Harriett said the L.A. police described the gang related activity here as something they had 30 years ago.

"We are addressing it here and Seminole County is very fortunate because we are already ahead of the curve for gang activity," he said. "We have a manageable situation."

Of all the deterrents, however, Harriett said mom and dad are the most successful ones.

He said many of the kids involved in gangs are looking for acceptance and an identity. They refer to the gang as their family.

Harriett said parents often miss the signs such as symbols drawn notebooks or clothing. To help educate parents to recognize the early signs, the sheriff's office also offers a Gang Awareness program through the PTA, churches, schools and other community organizations.

"All of it begins at home," Harriett said.
