Sheriff vows he will stay tough on gangs

As the Seminole County Sheriff's Office becomes the first law enforcement agency in the state to enforce a street gang recruitment law. the message is foud and clear that any gang related activity will not be tolerated.

Two teenage boys charged with violating the law went to trial today in the Juvenile court in Sanford. Thomas Savastano, 16, and Jeremy Estep. 15 were arrested Feb. 24 and charged with one count of street gang recruiting, a third degree felony, according to sheriffs spokesman Ed McDonough.

Savastano and Estep were accused of beating a 12-year-old boy for refusing to join their street gang at the Regency Apartments on State Road 436 in Fern Park, McDonough said. The victim has since moved out of the state to live with his father.

Last week, Victor Boyd, 16, a third suspect, was sentenced to probation and community control and 100 hours of community service

until age 19 after pleading no contest.

The gang recruiting law, which went into effect in October 1996, and the resulting trial, is very important according to Seminole County Chief Deputy Steve Harriett, because, "it sends a message by the community that we don't want people starting gangs or increasing and initiating gang activity."

'As a society, we say that this is not acceptable and we will hold you accountable in the effort to fight, minimize and eventually elimi-nate this type of activity." Harriett said. And although ging presence is negligible in

this county when compared to situations in other parts of the country like Los Angeles and Chicago. Harriett said it is still a concern for his office because gangs are associated with crime, violence, drugs and weapons.

Harriett characterized gangs as groups of loosely unit youngsters involved in criminal activity. Ages, he said, range from 13 to 20.

Harriett said those involved in gang related activity in the county are mostly trying to See Gangs, Page 9A

SANFORD . The Sheriff's Office has released a bank security camera photo of a man who is auspected of committing 13 vehicle burglaries at Seminole County parks last month.

Specifications are written on the back of the photo in Mr. Well's handwriting: Length - 8 feet, wingspread - 9 feet, propeller -3 feet, motor - 1 cylinder, 2 cycle air cooled 2 HP, RPM-900. The gas tank in the wing held one gallon of gasoline. The plane was suspended from a 20 foot pole and could travel along the road about 25 mph with the child in photo who is unknown. Mr. Wells was a skilled mechanic with Chase and Company for many years and invented several agricultural work items, most notably a famous "mule train" for harvesting crops. He and his wife, Buelah Spurling, were the parents of Mildred Stemper, Florence Stenstrom, Violet Currie and Gladys Dyal.





Toll-free number lets you help report motorists who pass stopped school buses

Florida Education Commis- lated the law. oner Frank T. Bro tinuing a statewide effort and toll-free number to alert Florida motorists to the importance of laws designed to reduce the serious threat to the safety of students that is posed when motorists pass stopped school buses illegally.

This initiative is a proactive way to avoid the tragedy that could result from violations of Florida's school bus passing laws," Brogan said, "It takes all of us, looking out for Florida's school children, to ensure that they arrive safely at school and return home safely each day,"

State law prohibits motorists from passing a school bus when it is stopped and displaying its stop sign, unless the motorist is traveling in the opposite direction on certain divided highways. The law also prohibits motorists from passing the school bus on the side where children enter when the bus displays its stop sign. in 1997, Brogan advocated tougher penalties for violations of the state's school bus passing law, resulting in the Florida Legislature doubling the fine of passing a school bus on the right.

The statewide effort encourages motorists to report viola-tions of the school bus safety laws by calling a toll-free mm-ber, 1-888-STOP-4KIDS (1-888-786-7454). They will be asked to provide the license tag number of the car, as well as the date, time, and approximate location where the illegal pass occurred. Working in conjuncment of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles, the Florida Department of Education will notify motorists reported to the hotline by mail that they were recently reported to have vio-lated the law. These motorists will receive a brochure outlining the law and penalties for

The campaign is part of a continuing effort to reduce the number of school bus-related accidents. Last year, Brogan

Teams (CTSTs) have been established throughout the state to educate the public and coordinate law enforcement blitzes to try to change the be-havior of those persons who pass school buses illegally.

The CTSTs were formed to improve traffic safety at the community level. They include persons from various disciplines who work in traffic safety and injury prevention. such as law enforcement officers, traffic engineers, health professionals, school district personnel, and others.

A 1996 study by the Center for Urban Transportation Research at the University of South Florida documented 10,590 illegal pasers of stopped school buses on a single day in Florida. In a 180day school year it is estimated that there are two million illegal passes, each representing the possibility of tragic injuries or fatalities to students. There are almost one million public school students transported to and from school each day on Fiorida's 14,000 school buses.

During the last five years, eight children were killed in Florida by motorists at school bus stops. Since 1990, 32 molorists or their passengers have been killed in other vehicles during a collision with a school bus. During that time, four students have been struck by motorists while buses were stopped to pick up or drop off

the students. Section 316.172, Florida Statutes, requires motorists approaching a school bus from either direction to stop when the bus is displaying the stop signal. Motorists traveling in the opposite direction from the school bus are not required to atop only if there is an un-paved median or space of at least five feet or a physical barrier between the lanes of traffic traveling in opposite directions. Regardiese of the type of roadway, drivers trav-eling in the same direction as the bus are always required to

Except for one runoff in Lake Mary, that city's and Longwood's elections for commission seats are over. And turnout for this off-year wasn't bad. We commend voters who took the time to go vote with no state nor national races on the ballot. We believe city politics are just as important as Washington politics are to our residents.

In Longwood, the two new commission members have served before, coming back to politics after a short hiatus. Both Steve Miller and Paul Lovestrand are forceful leaders, and we expect to see tough decisions made about sewer service, drainage and growth.

In Lake Mary, a runoff between incumbent George Duryea and front-runner Jest Deen will be held Dec. 2. Voters need to show up at the polls one more time this year. Meanwhile, Al Crump goes to work tonight, having won his race against incumbent Sheila Sawyer. Sawyer served her constituents well, but we believe Crump can help forge a better working relationship with the county. (Lake Mary goes from island to penin-

Running for office is a timeconsuming, exhausting and some-times thankless task. Candidates live in a fish bowl, and are open to constant criticism. For those who serve the cities, the pay isn't much. But still they run. We applaud first-time candidates Trudy Meyer and Michael Wierzbowski in Lake Mary and Jerry Dutcher and Craig Van Hooven in Long-wood, for daring to throw their proverbial hats in the ring. We know they learned a lot. And we urge them to consider serving on volunteer boards, to stay active in politics.

All of the recent candidates are examples of why the American political system works; men and women from many walks of life share their knowledge to make our government better. Many voices and good debate will keep us free. Kudos to them all.

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



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

emulate what they perceive as gang related behavior through the use of signs, colors, symbols or clothing.

They may be pretending they are in a gang," he said. Through its proactive stance.

Harriett said his department operates a Gang Resistance Education and Training program (GREAT). The program designates trained resource officers from each middle school to provide education to students. The focus is on self es-

teem and violence abatement. The officers teach the kids

the importance of making their own decisions and how not to respond to peer pressure." Harriett said. " This instills values and teaches kids that there are alternatives to fol-

Also in effect in the sheriffs Gang Suppression Unity where four deputies work in areas of the county gathering intelligence and monitoring kids who show a propensity to this type of activity, said Harriett.

This allows the punishment to be greater and serves as a deterrent," he said.

The gang recruitment law falls under the state statute relating to criminal street gangs, which by definition, applies to three or more persons who have a common name or identifying sign, colors or

clothing.

Making it even tougher on young offenders, a gang en-hancement law, which has been on the books for several years, states that if a gang member is convicted of a crime committed for the furtherment of the gang, then the penalty and punishment increases.

Harriett said his office does not refer to gangs by their names because "It lends credence to their existence."

What we see mostly in the county is would be gang activity like graffiti," he said, adding that graffiti is removed as soon as possible through an abatement program involving juvenile offenders, he said.

As another deterrent, deputies have traveled to Los Angeles to learn about gangs and "it was very enlightening," he

After assessing the sheriff's program in Seminole County, Harriett said the L.A. police described the gang related activity here as something they

had 30 years ago.
"We are addressing it here and Seminole County is very fortunate because we are already ahead of the curve for gang activity," he said. "We

have a manageable attuation."

Of all the deterrents, however. Harriett said mom and dad are the most successful

He said many of the kids involved in gangs are looking for acceptance and an identity. They refer to the gang as their family.

Harriett said parents often miss the signs such as symbols drawn notebooks or clothing. To help educate parents to recognize the early signs, the sheriffs office also offers a Gang Awareness program through the PTA. churches, schools and other

community organizations. "All of it begins at home." Harriett said.



DEAR DR. GOTT: I've read that coffee can cause cancer, heart disease and osteuporosis. In this true? I'd hate to give up my two cups in the morn-

DEAR READER: These claims about coffee have been refuted.

about coffee have been refuted, according to a report in the July issue of the Mayo Clinic Health Letter.

While there is a "limited" risk of cancer from coffee, the association has been detected only in people who drink an extraordinary amount each day.

Moreover, the Harvard Nurses' Health Study (of more than 126,000 women) failed to find a relation between coffee-consumntion and between coffee-consumption and heart attacks.

Huge amounts of coffee do cause the body to lose calcium, thereby — in theory — worsening osteoporosis. However, for moderate drinkers, this is not a problem.

As with other things in life, moderation is the key. When used appropriately, collee is a safe heverage that healthy people can enjoy without fear or gall.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband has a puzzling problem that my friends insist is not unique. At age 46, he is ordinarily very loving and caring. As men age, their levels of testos-terone fall, leading to a host of pre-dictable consequences, including impetence, estemporosis, less of interest in sex, reduction in muscle development, and — often — depression. However, rude and abusive behavior is not customarily part of the syndrome As much as we make would drome. As much as we males would prefer to blame our hormones (or lack of them!), that excuse won't do. We have to take responsibility for our

When you address this issue with your husband, make sure that you emphasize that he is not "crazy"; rather, he should seek help in han-dling the mood changes which you find so distressing.

Medical opinion varies concerning the product's effectiveness. Some orthopedic surgeons endorse glu-cusamine as a safe and inexpensive remedy for arthritis; other doctors believe that it is simply a waste of

In my experience, the medication is very useful in some patients. In other people, it seems not to work as well. However, I encourage my patients to try it because it does not have side



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effects and often reduces pain.
Unfortunately, there is so way to produce a feverable response: People just have to experiment with it. If glucesamine reduces pain, fine; if it doesn't, I advise patients to try other alternatives such as Buprolen or prescription anti-inflammatory drugs (codeine, Indocin and so both).

bid — and why.


The booklets that might interest you discuss fourth-suit forcing, Lebensohl, losing-trick count, negative doubles, Roman Key Card Blackwood, splinter bids, transfer bids and weak two-bids. Here's a deal built around an example in the negative-double booklet.

South's negative double promised at least four spades. His rebid showed a long spade suit in a hand that was too weak to bid a forcing two spades on the first round. (Yes, the opposition, and East in particular, showed a real lack of enterprise. They can win 10 tricks in clubs, and it takes unlikely defeat three no-tru

The defenders began inaccurately with three rounds of clubs. South discarded his heart loser, allowing West to score the spade 10. West exited with a low diamond. Resisting the temptation to take the trump finesse, declarer played a spade to his ace and led the spade queen. Now East couldn't get a diamond ruff, so the contract made.
