Seminole Cities Unsure Of Mosquito Control Program

By DONNA ESTES Herald Staff Writer

Sanford City Manager W.E. "Pete" Knowles will find little support from the other six cities in the county when a questionnaire about a countywide mosquito control program is

Last week he asked the staffs of the other six cities -Altamonte Springs, Lake Mary, Casselberry, Oviedo, Winter Springs and Longwood - whether their respective municipalities are interested in a countywide program.

The first two questions in the survey asked: Is your municipality having a mosquito problem? And if you have a problem, is it severe enough to warrant a control program? The representatives of two cities said they have no problem.

Four of the cities already have mosquito control programs of their own. Longwood and Oyledo officials will discuss the issue tonight. Winter Springs will discuss it Tuesday night.


City Manager Phil Kulbes of Lake Mary said his city doesn't have a problem. "Based on the fact that we haven't received one single call from any citizen complaining about mosquitoes for the past seven months, I would say 'we don't have a

Mayor Walter Sorenson agreed. "It's no worse than ordinary at the moment."

Longwood City Manager David Chacey said Longwood has its own program and sprays when requested by residents. "Some \$5,000 is budgeted annually," Chacey said, adding he will take Knowles' letter to the City Commission for a decision at a meeting tonight.

Richard Rozansky, city manager of Winter Springs, was having a staff meeting today on Knowles' letter. He noted Winter Springs has its own program and spends about \$12,000

"We spray citywide weekly and drop capsules in swampy areas to kill the larvae," Rozansky said. The program has

been on-going for three years. Rozansky said he will give his recommendation to the Winter Springs City Commission for consideration Tuesday night.

Mayor Owen Sheppard of Casselberry said Casselberry spends about \$9,000 annually, spraying five nights weekly community-wide and drops pellets into the lakes and other areas where water stands. "We don't need to participate in any other program," he said.

A spokesman for the Oviedo City Council said the board will discuss the issue at a meeting tonight.

Altamonte Springs City Commissioner Lee Constantine said his city has had an effective mosquito control program for at least the past five years.

Knowles was instructed by the Sanford City Commission to look into the possibilities of a countywide program several

Knowles discussed the possibilities with County Administrator Roger Neiswender last week. Neiswender reported a countywide program would cost about \$400,000

Sanford's major interest was that the area take advantage, if possible, of state funds for mosquito control.

Both Mayor Lee P. Moore and City Commissioner Milton Smith said they received telephone calls complaining about mosquitoes. And Moore said, "The small black insects were particularly vicious this year."

School All Year Long?

With the Seminole County schools population growing by about 3 percent a year, the problem arises - what to do with all the additional students?

But school board member Pat Telson believes the answer lies not in constructing more buildings, but in making better use of existing facilities.

Mrs. Telson feels one way of better utilizing the schools is to hold classes 12 months a year.

"I would like to look at something to utilize existing facilities year round," she said. "We're going to have to go to that

Mrs. Telson doesn't want to rush into anything, but she doesn't feel Seminole County taxpayers should be saddled with the costs for continued expansion.

"We can't keep taxing the people forever," she said.

"I'm sure there are a lot of people who have ideas that are maybe good ideas. We should continue to look around," Mrs. Telson said. "We've got a lot of resources around with the University of Central. Florida, Stetson (University) and Rollins

One possibility is doing what the British do. "British schools close only for two weeks in the summer. Then they come back and they're off for two more weeks in the winter," Mrs. Telson said.

Several school systems in high-growth areas have tried experimental year-round programs over the past few years, but most have since reverted to traditional methods, according to Dr. Hortense Evans, a Seminole school administrator who has

examined those programs. She said Palm Beach, Pascal, Brevard

and Orange counties have each used some form of year-round classes in the past.

Palm Beach County used a program called Concept 6 which divided the year into three attendance periods. Students were required to attend two of the three sessions. The county will phase out that program

at the end of 1983, Dr. Evans said. "When they began the program, Jupiter School was overcrowded. Now there is

enough space," she said. Pascal and Brevard counties have used a program called 45-15. That program

divides students into four groups and sends

them to school for nine weeks, then gives

them three weeks off. "Most school districts that used 45-15 abandoned it when they got more facilities," Dr. Evans said. "The major problem was scheduling teachers and

students in secondary schools. Elementary students and teachers loved it." ·Orange County has a program called the quinmester program which offers an op-

tional summer program.

"Students can go to school year-round and can finish school earlier than they normally would, she said.

Each of the programs requires a few more teachers than are needed in traditional methods. "The teachers can opt for when they want to be off as well," Dr.

The main advantages of year-round programs is that they utilize school facilities for 12 months instead of 10 and reduce crowding, she said.

The disadvantages, she said, include increased costs for transportation and

National Officals Won't Intervene In DUI Case

A published report that the Miss America pageant board will refuse to let Miss Florida, Deanna Pitman, compete if she is convicted of drunken driving is false, the board chairman said today.

Albert Marks said a story which appeared in Saturday's Orlando Sentinel quoting him as saying he would intervene if Miss Pitman is convicted of the drunk driving charge "was taken out of context."

"I was reading to them (the Sentinel) that part of the contract that all the contestants sign which says they cannot compete if they are convicted of a crime," Marks said.

"But that brings us to a question, 'Is

if Miss Pitman "is convicted of a crime I would have to intervene. They substituted drunken driving for

Marks said he stands by statements he made a week ago in an interview with the Evening Herald that he would

"We leave those things to the state boards. If the state board certifies her, she will be eligible for the Miss America pageant," Marks said in that interview.

Marks reiterated his feelings that drunken driving is not a crime nor that it necessarily means a person is of bad moral character.

"To me, a crime is a felony, not drunken driving," he said. "If being arrested for DUI means you are of bad moral character then a lot of people have a bad moral character." But Marks' position does not

necessarily mean Miss Pitman will be allowed to participate in the pageant, scheduled for September in Atlantic

Bill Wolfe, chairman of the state pageant board, said today the board will wait and see whether Miss Pitman is convicted of the charge before it takes any action.

"We don't think there's anything more to say right now," Wolfe said. "She's scheduled for her day in court July 29."

And she apparently will get her day

in court before she has to go to Atlantic City for the national pageant. Her lawyer, Jack Bridges, said today she will have her trial on the charge sometime next week.

Bridges said a hearing was held before a judge and at Bridges' request the DUI trial has been advanced on the calendar to next week.

"I understand from talks I have had with the powers that be of the pageant that the case must be resolved before the week of the pageant Sept. 3-11," he said. "And it will be," he added.

Wolfe said he has received a lot of telephone calls from people around the state since Miss Pitman was arrested July 16.

"I have heard from people all over the state who say she should be stripped of her title and I've heard from people all over the state who support her," Wolfe said.

Down 21 Percent To \$2.76 Million

OK Expected For Airport's Budget

A public hearing on the Sanford Airport Authority's proposed \$2.76 million operating budget and capital improvement program for fiscal 1982-83 will be held by the Sanford City Commission at 7

The hearing will be the first topic of debate when the City Commission convenes at City Hall, 300 N. Park Ave.

The Airport Authority budget, which usually enjoys automatic approval, is down by 21 percent over the current year's \$3.5 million spending plan. J. S. "Red" Cleveland, director of the Sanford-

Central Florida Airport, said the reason for the lower budget is because the authority doesn't anticipate borrowing as much money for new construction in the coming fiscal year, which begins The proposed budget also shows no anticipated

aid from the federal government in the new year. During the current year, the authority received \$1,980 in federal assistance.

Construction loans were estimated at \$881,195 this year and are expected to drop to \$300,000 in the new year. Terminal revenue is also expected to drop from the \$1.36 million anticipated for this year to \$906,800. Actual receipts through May 30 in terminal

Industrial revenue, meanwhile, is expected to rise from the \$498,900 expected this year to \$591,730 in

Salaries will go up from \$378,283 to \$400,510, according to the proposed budget. Employees are to receive the same pay raises as other city employees -4 percent Oct. 1 and another 3.1 percent April 1. Some \$10,000 is budgeted for a financial analysis on rental fees charged airport users.

At the same time, \$508,329 is budgeted for airport

improvements. This money is set aside as the authority's share of future airport development programs. The construction account of \$628,939 will make

payments on 12 loans the authority has taken out for various improvements at the airport over the years and set aside another \$300,000 for unprogrammed the authority paying the other half.

construction, building additions and renovations. The longest term loan expires in 1992.

City Manager W. E. "Pete" Knowles has recommended that the budget be approved by the commission, noting that the airport is financially self-sufficient. Although the city owns it, the airport has never needed city funds to supplement its operation costs.

A week ago, the airport received state approval for a \$20,000 grant to begin engineering work for the development of the north side of the airport.

Cleveland has estimated that \$580,000 will be needed for the first phase of that project to provide space for large aircraft on the airport's north side. Ultimately, Cleveland said, he expects the state to approve a grant of half the development cost with

The States Need More Say In Nuclear Waste Disposal

HILTON HEAD ISLAND, S.C. (UPI)-Officials of the Southern States Energy Board told the region's governors today the states need more voice than Congress is providing in disposal of spent nuclear fuel.

Kenneth J. Nemeth, director of the board, said in a report to the Southern Governors Association that the South produces about 40 percent of the nuclear power generated nationwide. He said there are 27 nuclear plants in southern states and that 13 of them will need to expand spent-fuel storage capacity before 1990.

Nemeth and Arthur Wacaster, director of policy and technology for the SSEB, said none of the bills now pending before Congress gives states anything more than a right to "consult and confer" with the U.S. Department of Energy about location of nuclear waste disposal sites.

Movie Death Probe Widens

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)-The state Labor Department today was investigating whether two children killed with actor Vic Morrow during filming of a movie were working in violation of state labor laws. Threats of criminal charges have been made in the case.

Morrow, 50, a veteran actor best known for his 1960s TV series, "Combat," was carrying the children across a shallow inlet of the Santa Clara River about 30 miles northwest of Los Angeles during a simulated Vietnamese War battle sequence.

A camera helicopter, apparently disabled by ground explosions simulating gunfire, fell and the main rotor blade struck Morrow and the children.

Westinghouse OKs Pact

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—Negotiators Westinghouse Electric Corp. and three unions reached a tentative contract agreement a half-hour before a threatened midnight strike by 30,000 blue-collar employees nationwide.

The 11th-hour settlement announced just after 11:30 p.m. Sunday averted a walkout by workers disgruntled with a company requirement they contribute to their pension program. They struck over the same issue three years ago.

NEW YORK (UPI)-Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis will turn 53 Wednesday amid speculation a devoted friendship with a married minerals tycoon may be turning into a romance that will lead to her third marriage.

The former first lady has become more dependent on the companionship of balding, bespectacled Maurice Tempelsman, 53, her longtime financial adviser, as her career in book publishing has increased her responsibilities and decreased her leisure time.

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Man Indicted In Drug Trafficking Case

A 23-year-old Lake Monroe man has been charged with conspiracy to violate the Controlled Substances Act by an Indianapolis, Ind., grand jury following a 5-year drug investigation into a cocaine trafficking operation between that city and Florida cities.

Thomas Smith, whose specific address has not been disclosed, was indicted along with nine other people in connection with the illegal drug operation, according to the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, Agents say they began the extensive investigation into the suspected drug ring after purchasing 20 pounds of cocaine for \$20,000 in a 1977 drug deal.

The indictments of the 10 suspects arrested include charges of various violations of the federal Controlled Substance Act and the Internal Revenue Code, as well as charges of making false statements to a grand jury. The indictments were returned before U.S. District Judge Cal Holder in Indianapolis.

Longwood Officials Eye Hospital Plans

A week-and-a-half ago, Hospital Corporation of America cleared its first hurdle in efforts to construct an 80-bed psychiatric hospital in Longwood by receiving unanimous approval from the city's Land Planning Agency for a conditional use permit.

Tonight at Longwood City Hall, 175 West Warren Avenue, Longwood's City Commission will get its first detailed look at the plans for the facility. A public hearing has been scheduled for Aug. 16 on the conditional use permit request.

If approved, HCA officials say construction of the psychiatric hospital would begin sometime in the third quarter of this year. Although no total dollar figure has been placed on construction costs, HCA officials indicated at the Land Planning Agency meeting the needs assessment certification received from the state was for \$4 million.

Prior to the Aug. 16 public hearing, the commission is expected to decide on taking an inspection trip to a similar HCA facility in Chattanooga, Tenn. A tentative date of July 30 has been set for the proposed inspection trip.

During HCA's meeting with the city's Land Planning Agency on Aug. 14, board members of the agency raised a multitude of questions dealing with hospital security, admission practices, types of service and costs.

Apparently satisfied with the answers has recommended approval.

HCA's staff provided, agency members voted unanimously to approve the conditional us permit request.

HCA thought it had received permission to build the facility in January when the city commission approved plans for a 150-bed general use hospital to include a psychiatric wing. But when HCA later announced plans to construct a separate psychiatric hospital, the city advised the nation's largest hospital corporation it would have to seek a conditional use permit to build a separate facility.

The commission also is expected to address a request from Florida Residential Communities for a one-year extension to commence construction at Tiberon Hills subdivision and a site plan review from Florida Homecrafters developer Richard Tickel.

Florida Residential Communities received final site plan approval for Tiberon Hills in July 1981. But according to the city's land planning regulations, the approval came with an ordinance requiring construction to begin within a year of site plan approval.

Florida Residential Communities has cited a poor housing market condition in failing to begin construction and notified the city it plans to begin construction of the housing development in the near future. Florida Residential Communities will seek a one-year extension of its site plan approval.

Tickel will seek site plan approval for an office complex proposed by Florida Homecrafters to be located on a 5.4-acre parcel located at State Road 434 and Bay Avenue.

Bottle Assault Stops China's First Hijacking

PEKING (UPI) - Five Chinese demanding to fly to Taiwan seized a Shanghai-bound jetliner with 19 Americans among its passengers but a crew member led a winebottle assault to halt

the nation's first known skylacking. One hijacker was seriously wounded when he set off a bomb in the plane's washroom, and several other people were hurt in a brawl for control of the jet carrying some 80 people, officials

All the passengers were reported unharmed, officials said. Authorities said today they were clamping a lid on news about Sunday's hijacking attempt, leaving unknown exactly how many people were on board the plane, how many were hurt and where the suspected hijackers were being held.

A foreign source in Shanghai said he had "no report from any source that any of the passengers were hurt" and the 19 Americans on the plane were safe and touring the scenic cit of Suzhou near Shanghai today.

The Americans were "mostly older folks," the source said. The Chinese national airline CAAC Soviet-built Ilyushin-18 turbo-propeller craft was about 100 miles from Shanghai when the hijackers commandeered the jetliner, the official Xinhua news agency said in a brief dispatch.

Some of the hijackers stormed into the cockpit and held a knife to the throat of the pilot, Chinese and foreign sources

Dangerous Hurricane Season Warning Issued By Center

MIAMI (UPI)-Potent and threatening early summer storms pale in comparison with the power of storms that could potentially develop as the 1982 Hurricane season enters its most dangerous phase. Forecasters at the National Hurricane Center in Miami said the possibility of serious storms is now

"Normally July is a slow month. Everything is in transition," said Joe Pellisier, a forecaster with the center. "But now the tropics are starting to come

He explained that the summer's sweltering heat and sluggish winds of late July, August and early September turn the Atlantic Ocean between the Lesser Antilles and Cape Verde into a vast spawning ground for giant tropical storms.

25 Haitians To Go Free

MIAMI (UPI)-Resettlement workers hope to get another 25 Haitian refugees released from a federal detention center today, and despite some problems in coordinating and financing say they will find new homes for all imprisoned Haitians.

Five resettlement agencies trying to relocate the refugees insist they can find homes quickly for all Haitians now in federal camps, one of the requirements federal Judge Eugene Spellman ordered in his release program. They plan to obtain the release of 25 Haitians a day.

But questions relating to stacks of paperwork, tight budgets, who will pay for the resettlement and now those settled in states other than where the detention centers are located will make their court-ordered, weekly reports could delay the realease of some Haitians.

Patrol Planes Use

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)-Eldridge Beach, former Florida Highway Patrol director, says reports of his using patrol cars and planes for personal use were exaggerated by "three or four," top patrol officials out to get him.

Beach, who retired under pressure July 8 following the reports, claims colleagues who wanted him out of the way duped him into leaving his job.

The former patrol director, however, says he won't fight to get his job back. Beach was the first state official to be touched by an ongoing investigation of alleged misuse of state vehicles. But like others involved in the investigation, Beach refuses to talk specifics.

PLO West Beirut Targets United Press International

Israeli warplanes bombed PLO targets in west Beirut for a fifth straight day today amid new warnings by Israel that the Palestinian guerrillas must leave Lebanon.

Israeli fighter-bombers pounded Palestinian areas in west Beirut and residential areas along the coast in a raid that began at 2:45 p.m. (8:45 EDT), said wit-

There was no immediate word on casualties.

The raids came amid a diplomatic furor over a statement signed by PLO chief Yasser Arafat that appeared to accept Israel's right to exist, Israel spurned the Arafat statement and warned the PLO must leave Lebanon.

Saudi Arabia's Prince Abdullah met Sunday with officials in Baghdad and Damascus in efforts to persuade Syria to withdraw its support of Iran and mend its differences with Iraq.

Syria and Libya have said they backed Khomeini only because Iraq originally invaded Iran and because their policies opposed any form of foreign occupation. They have maintained silence since the Iranian invasion July 13. Saudi Arabia and other moderate Arab states, particularly Jordan, have supported Iraq.

Iran's Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, faced with the collapse of his massive invasion of neighboring Iraq, threatened to expand the war throughout the Persian Gulf unless moderate Arab regimes cut aid to his enemy in Baghdad.

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Lofty Rhetoric, And More War

The least surprising thing about the recent United Nations Special Session on Disarmament was that it failed to persuade anyone to disarm.

To understand this failure, one need only reflect on the fact that the speeches at the United Nations were usually drowned out by the sounds of war from the Falklands and Lebanon. Less noticeable, but hardly less deadly, were the continuing wars in Afghanistan, Cambodia, El Salvador, Guatemala, Iran-Iraq, the former Spanish Sahara and Namibia.

Add to these the numerous lesser brushfire conflicts and insurgencies, the huge armies facing each other in Central Europe and along the Sino-Soviet border, and the array of nuclear weaponry deployed by both the Soviet Union and the United States and a clearer picture of the world emerges.

Pious speeches at the United Nations are not going to do much to promote disarmament when half the nations on earth perceived very real threats to their security, and indeed to their very survival.

At least a portion of the blame for this pervasive sense of insecurity rests not with such stock villains as the arms merchants but with the United Nations itself. The U.N., successor to the failed League of Nations, was created precisely to discourage aggression and war. The mechanism that was supposed to guarantee international peace and order was collective security; all nations were to join in resisting clear-cut aggression.

Collective security under United Nations sponsorship worked exactly once — in Korea — and then only because the Soviet delegate forfeited Moscow's veto by stalking out of the Security Council. And even in Korea, the United States was left to carry almost all of the combat burden itself.

Since then, the United Nations has grown ever more feeble in its response to aggression. To cite but two of the most recent examples, neither the Security Council nor the General Assembly has lifted a finger to punish the Soviet Union for its invasion of Afghanistan or Vietnam for its seizure of Cambodia.

While it might be argued that the veto power has effectively incapacitated the Security Council, no veto can prevent the General Assembly from voting sanctions against an aggressor or even expelling a member from the world organization. Yet, so timid has the General Assembly become that its successive resolutions urging a withdrawal of all foreign troops from Afghanistan never mention the Soviet Union by

As for Vietnam, the governing council of the United Nations Development Program managed to overlook Hanoi's continuing war of aggression against Cambodia long enough to approve an aid package for rebuilding Vietnam's railroads. That should make it easier for the Vietnamese to supply or reinforce their army of occupation in Cambodia.

These are not examples of diplomacy, but of rank hypocricy. They foster contempt for the United Nations, and for its pleas on behalf of disarmament. Potential victims of aggression should be forgiven if they place more trust in their own armed strength than in the lofty rhetoric so much in evidence during the Special Session on Disarmament.

But if the United Nations cannot reasonably hope to bring about general disarmament, it might at least be expected to condemn violations of arms control agreement negotiated under its auspices, or those of the old League of Nations. Two such agreements are the 1925 Geneva Protocol prohibiting first use of chemical weapons and the 1972 Biological Weapons Convention forbidding even the possession of biological weapons.

If the United Nations wants to be taken seriously as a catalyst for disarmament, it must begin somehow to reclaim its lost integrity. One way to start would be to document Soviet violations of arms control agreements once hailed at the United Nations as abolishing the terrible specter of chemical and biological warfare.

The plan proposed by Lake Mary's Charter Revision Commission, calling for the creation of four voting districts within the city where residents would elect their own individual councilman, has become controversial.

And creating those voting districts may be very difficult and costly.

At least Sandy Goard, office manager for Seminole Elections Supervisor Camilla Bruce sees it that way.

Mrs. Goard told the Commission last week that it will be difficult to create city districts with boundaries conforming to county precinct lines. Keeping the city districts equal in population

will also present some problems, she said.

She said the registration cards of each city voters would have to be keyed to indicate city voter districts and the expense of this would

most likely have to borne by the city.

A question from Commission Chairman Burt Perinchief about whether any other cities in Seminole County have similar voting districts was answered, "No" by Mrs. Goard.

Mayor Walter Sorenson, a member of the Commission, said that districting probably could be accomplished. But, he continued, the charter Commission might have to change its mind about the city's election date.

The Commission earlier decided a September city election would be preferable to the current December elections.

Mrs. Goard said it appears that the Commission's recommendation would require three city voting districts within precinct 10, meaning the city would have five different ballots at an election. She said this would also be expensive. The September election time recommended by the Commission would coincide with the first primary.

Sorenson said he opposes the districting idea, but is doubly opposed if the city election runs at the same time as the first primary election.

the same time as the first primary election.

He said the districting problems could probably be worked out if the city election were not held at the same time as a county election.

Mrs. Goard said she would try to get cost estimates together and would find the difficulties involved in recoding the computer cards of Lake Mary voters.

The issue became controversial when the Lake Mary City Council last week voted 5-0 to indicate to the Charter Revision Commission its dissatisfaction with the districting idea.

Stop Dole's Tax Bill

Senator Robert Dole of Kansas may have cost Gerald Ford the 1976 election when he appeared as the dour heavy in his televised debate with Walter Mondale.

But now Dole is at it again, undercutting President Reagan's promising effort to rejuvenate the private sector and get the economy moving.

As chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Dole has engineered a tax bill that would raise taxes by \$98 billion, the largest tax increase in the nation's history.

For his exertions, Dole is being celebrated by the media. For the New York Times, Dole is now a "moderate." Elsewhere, one hears claims that he has "grown" into "responsibility."

For this point of view, a "moderate" and "responsible" Republican is one who balances the budget by raising taxes to pay for federal programs voted into being by liberal Congresses. The conservative point, of course, is not only to balance the budget but to do so at a lower rate of federal expenditure.

Dole's performance has cast him as the enemy of all that the Reagan administration was expected to accomplish.

Dole's tax package contains modest

Dole's tax package contains modest spending cuts of some \$16 billion, along with the aforementioned huge increase. Dole is playing his cards shrewdly by not separating the cuts from the increase.

As the Times noted editorially, "Some senators obviously would like to resolve their dilemma by voting on separate tax and spending measures. Robert Dole, the chairman of the Finance Committee, resists that approach, and for reasons that moderates (sic) should appreciate. Since overall support for spending cuts is much stronger than for tax reform (i.e., tax hikes), a split vote could easily result in passage of only the spending cuts."

What a disaster that would be. The deficit would be lowered by spending cuts. Some federal programs would be scaled back. There would be no tax increase. Republican Senator Robert Dole has become the liberals' Horatius at the bridge, raising federal taxes to protect federal programs, maneuvering cleverly to frustrate the very essence of the president's recovery program.

This folly comes with tragic timing. All indications are that we have been passing through a painful economic transition.

It has long been recognized that the American steel, automobile and other heavy industries were in noncompetitive positions, and that the cutting edge of the new economicera would be in important respects high technology. One effect of the recession, which shows signs of passing, will have been to weed out obsolescent enterprises and free resources for more promising ones. Both the automobile and the steel industries will have to be transformed and modernized.

Massachusetts may not be known as Taxachusetts for long. A center of high tech industry, the state may now be in a "take-off" situation, and, not surprisingly, the high-tech corporations in Massachusetts have been vigorous campaigners for lowered taxes. States with no personal income tax, such as New Hampshire, Texas and Florida, have led the nation in economic resilience.

Reagan's modest tax reductions already show signs of stimulating a torpid economy. This month, in in-depth analysis, "Fortune" magazine predicts a steady and sustained recovery. Reagan's economic theories have been correct from the start.

Trade Disputes Alliance

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Economic and trade relations between the United States and its European allies seem to have reached a new low point.

Each side is accusing the other of reneging on a deal that all thought had been struck before the Versailles economic summit in tune

June.

In the weeks leading up to the summit, special emissary George Shultz (now the secretary of state) made a round of visits to European heads of state. His goal was to put together an agreement on some of the most contentious issues before the world leaders arrived at Versailles.

The Eurpeans were most concerned with the Reagan administration's opposition to the Soviet gas pipeline, which will bring billions of dollars in business to European companies and billions of cubic feet of natural gas to European countries that need it badly.

On the other side, Washington was most concerned with the Western Europeans' practice of extending loans and export credits to the Soviet Union at below-market rates.

Both sides went to Versailles thinking that they had a deal, or at least a tacit understanding: The United States would temper its objections to the pipeline, and the Europeans would stop extending cheap credit to the Soviets.

According to U.S. officials, this understanding was reflected in the section of the Versalles communique that read:

"Taking into account existing economic and financial considerations, we have agreed to handle cautiously financial relations with the U.S.S.R. and other Eastern European countries, in such a way as to insure that they are conducted on a sound economic basis including also the need for commercial prudence in limiting export credits."

The Americans thought this statement was clear: No more cheap loans and credits to the Soviets.

But as Raymond Waldmann, assistant secretary of commerce for international economic policy, puts it: "Almost immediately both (West German Chancellor Helmut) Schmidt and (French President Francois) Mitterrand announced that this did

not mean they were going to step offering below-market loans and credits to the Soviets, which they look upon as business as usual, nothing out of the ordinary.

"Which I guess is true. The Germans and the French can't sell their products any other way, so they buy their way into markets by offering cheap credits."

At about that time, the Reagan administration announced that it not only would continue to object to the pipeline but would also extend its ban on technology exports to the Soviets to include foreign subsidiaries and licensees of U.S. companies.

This would have a direct impact on the pipeline project, and especialy on a score of West German, Italian, French and English companies that have signed contracts to sell pipeline products made under license from U.S. companies.

The Europeans argue that the United States has no right to complain about their economic dealings with the Soviets as long as it refuses to reimpose the grain embargo. Waldmann contends that grain is a very different matter because the Soviets must buy it with hard currency rather than on easy credit; this distinction is lost on the Europeans.

Now the finger-pointing has started. The United States charges that the Europeans violated the pre-Versailles agreement by offering the Soviets cheap credit as usual. The Europeans counter that they thought they had an understanding on the pipeline.

Each side is accusing the other of having been the first to break faith.

Even as the United States tries desperately to downplay this festering dispute, the evidence of how diversive it has become continues to mount, in both small and large

A consortium of West German banks has announced plans to lend the Soviets \$1.6 billion to build the pipeline at 7.6 percent interest, perhaps half the current market rate.

At the same time, the banks announced that the West German government would guarantee more than 80 percent of the loan and would make up the difference between the interest being charged the Soviets and the current market rate.

Tragedy Of The Missing

A different sort of convention took place in Washington, D.C. in early July: the 13th annual meeting of the National League of Families of American Prisoners and Missing in Southeast Asia, at which some 500 relatives of those still missing gathered.

The meeting marked an especially poignant legacy of the Vietnam War. In 1973, the United States negotiated "Operation Homecoming," the release of 566 American prisoners of war who had been held captive in North Vietnam. Millions of Americans watched the unforgettable telecasts of their arrival at Clark Air Force Base in the Phillipines. They emerged from the plane with gaunt and ravaged bodies, that new clothes and even the euphoria of release could not conceal.

Those moments obscured the agony of hundreds of families of Americans who did not return, but only for a short while. At that time, 1,300 U.S. servicemen remained unaccounted for in Southeast Asia. According to Dr. Edna J. Hunter of the Center for Prisoner of War Studies at the Naval Health Research Center, those missing included 113 men who were known to have been held captive in Laos and North Vietnam, based on hard evidence such as filmclips, radio transmissions, or undeniable intelligence reports. Furthermore, there is reason to doubt that the Vietnamese have been completely forthright in official statements regarding the fates of other Americans, mostly pilots who crashed in North Vietnam and are presumed dead. Although there are several hundred men in that category, only 75 bodies have been returned by Vietnam.

The meeting of the League was given the dignified attention it deserves from the Reagan administration. In a letter, President Reagan said that "Actions to investigate live-sighting reports receive, and will continue to receive necessary priority and resources, based on the assumption that at least some Americans are still held captive." Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger added that "We are proceeding on the assumption that Americans are still alive and still being held."

Seven years after the American disengagement from Southeast Asia, plausible reports of Americans sighted in Vietnam, some in chains or being led under guard through the jungle, continue to trickle home. Mr. Weinberger said that there have been over 400 first-hand sighting of Americans in Vietnam and Laos, mostly by Vietnamese refugees.

The amount of evidence that Vietnam is still holding Americans as potential "bargaining chips" in negotiations with the U.S. on financial assistance or diplomatic recognition, while unverifiable, is persuasive. It must be remembered, as Dr. Hunter explains, that "History shows that no communist nation has ever released all known living prisoners of war at the end of hostilities." She points out that 13 French POWS captured in the French Indochina war which ended in 1954 were not released until 1970. France has been buying back the remains of its dead soldiers ever since Dien Bien Phu, and reportedly as recently as March 1981.

The lingering heartache of the MIA families could be eased by the Vietnamese government, by releasing any Americans still being held, or providing absolute evidence that no POWs remain. But that is unlikely.

Hunt's Blackmailer An Unlikely Criminal

WASHINGTON — The person who tried to blackmall the richest man in Texas is an unlikely desperado. He may have been motivated as much by a quixotic zeal to punish the billionaire as by any desire for personal gain.

Last March, I broke the bizarre story that an anonymous extortionist had demanded a \$440,000 loan from Nelson Bunker Hunt, the oil and commodities tycoon. In return for this "loan," the blackmailer promised not to report to the authorities that Hunt had arranged an \$87,000 bribe to Rep. George Hansen, R-Idaho.

The indignant Hansen took the blackmail plot to the Justice Department, protesting that he had been maligned. This apparently unnerved the blackmailer. For the second letter to Hunt, signed "Gordon Warner," asked the Texas tycoon to forget the whole thing.

But it was too late; the FBI was already on his trail. So the mouse that roared at Nelson Bunker Hunt — and then tried to creep back into his hole — crawled mournfully out again and turned himself in to the federal authorities.

Arthur Greenhill Emens III, 35, is to be sentenced in U.S. District Court today. More skillful in plea bargaining than in extortion, Emens agreed to plead guilty to a single count of blackmail, in return for the dropping of all other charges the government might have brought against him.

Friends and former co-workers describe Emens as a "private person," not at all menacing, with intense brown eyes, a beard and a general look of learnedness that makes him seem too academic for the sordid business of blackmail. He was a member of the Audubon Society.

While attending Columbia University, Emens worked in Harlem as a tutor, teaching a black youth named Walter how to read. Later, in Oklahcma City, he and his wife organized a neighborhood watchdog group to protect a residential area of senior citizens. They are now sponsoring an orphan in Indonesia through the Christian Children's Fund.

In Orlando, Fla., Emens was a volunteer in the city's Big Brothers-Big Sisters program., He now lives in Winter Park, Fla.

Professionally, Emens has worked for Price Waterhouse as a tax accountant, for Cargill Investors Service in Chicago as a commodities trader and for Ming & Co. Inc. in Oklahoma City in the same capacity.

It was at Ming that he discovered the evidence that he thought Hunt would pay \$440,000 to keep quiet. It involved an \$87,000 profit that Hansen's wife, Connie, had made on a silver transaction through Ming.

Hunt had recommended the commodities firm to Mrs. Hansen, but had nothing to do with the transaction. And the Hansens have a legal separation of their financial affairs, as Idaho law allows.

It was also at Ming that Emens typed the two letters to Hunt—signing the one "Gordon Warner" signature with the wrong hand to throw off investigators.

Close associates of the quixotic Emens told my associate Tony Capaccio that a likely motive for his ill-starred extortion attempt was displeasure at Hunt for allegedly causing the wild fluctuations in silver prices in January 1980, which hurt many small investors.

The Hansen connection seemed to be a way to punish Hunt for his supposed sins. Emens attorney, James L. Lyons, would not comment on the case, beyond saying his client was "extremely remorseful."

More than a year after Hansen informed the Justice Department of the blackmail attempt, meanwhile, a grand jury is still investigating Emens' charges of impropriety. As part of his plea bargain, Emens agreed to give the investigators the evidence he had thought was worth \$440,000.

A check of Hansen's legislative record shows no action he has taken that would have directly benefited Hunt, and the congressman is confident that no such evidence exists. But there are some people at the Justice Department who would dearly love to make a case against the rich Nelson Bunker Hunt.

As the skunk who ambled into Hunt's lawn party, Emens has succeeded in raising a

stink.



Teach Children To Report A Molester

psychiatrist who works closely with a child development specialist in Bangor, Me. As an example of the power for good that your column has, we want to share this story:

Two years ago, a teacher in a nearby town gave her class an assignment to bring in a news item for class

discussion. Expecting current events and human interest stories, the teacher was surprised when a quiet 12year-old approached her desk with a clipping from your column about a girl who was being sexually abused (raped), and said, "This is happening to me."

The teacher and the school's guidance person obtained our help in providing supportive counseling during the difficult process in which the child was placed in foster care because her mother "stood by" her husband (the child's stepfather) and called her daughter a "lying bitch."

You have many young readers. We urge you to encourage children to seek help from their school guidance people, doctors or community health centers (listed in the Yellow Pages) if they are being involved sexually by adults. You may use our names or sign us, "Concerned Professionals."

PATRICIA SMITH RANZONI, M. Ed. DEAR CONCERNED: The importance of your message cannot be overstated. Whenever I publish a letter from someone who has been sexually abused as a child, I am inundated with letters from readers saying that this has happened to them. (Many confide that they had lived with that ugly secret for as long as 40 and 50 years - too ashamed to tell anybody.) It is the responsibility of adults to teach children (3and 4-year-olds are not too young to understand) that it is not OK for anyone to touch their private parts, and if someone does, the child should tell a trusted adult immediately. Stress that even if the person who had made these advances has threatened to "kill" her (or him - little boys are molested, too) the child must tell anyway and be assured she will be protected. Some facts: Today in the

U.S. there is a one-in-four chance that a child will be the victim of incest, child molestation or rape by the time he or she reaches 18 years of age. Statistics tell us that 80 percent of the offenders had themselves been physically or sexually abused

as children. All 50 states now have reporting statutes, which are laws that require professionals who work with children to notify public authorities of instances of suspected child abuse (including physical, emotional, sexual) and sometimes neglect

Children seldom lie about sexual abuse.

Child molesters are rarely strangers. They are usually related to or living near the child, and are known and trusted by the child. A child needs to tell a

trusted adult if he (or she) has been melested; if not believed, the child should tell another adult, and still another adult until believed. A child needs to be assured that if he (or she) has been molested, the shame and

blame belong to the adult -

the child is the victim!



DEAR READER - 1 doubt very much that your symptoms are related to diabetes in any way. They sound like hypoglycemia. If so you probably have reactive hypoglycemia, the form that occurs as a rebound reaction to carbohydrate loading. The large intake of concentrated sweets and starches stimulates an overproduction of insulin, or a release of the insulin at the wrong time.

The symptoms are those we see with the outpouring of adrenaline in response to a fall in blood glucose levels. That causes sweating, weekness and a tendency to dizziness or faintness.

The exercise helps to deplete your body of its glucose. Even diabetics who take insulin have to regulate their exercise can decrease the insulin requirements causing a hypoglycemic reaction. Then you add to the problem by consuming a breakfast high in starches and

sweets. I think having changed your breakfast you may avoid symptoms. If not, try taking some sweet liquids during your runs, such as orange juice. Or switch your program so you eat a light breakfast pressure by surgery.

DEAR DR. LAMB - The doctor said I have a thoracic outlet syndrome in the left shoulder area and I should have an arteriogram of the section. It may mean cutting away part of the top rib to relieve a pinched artery. Is that serious or common? Is there any other treatment alternative? What causes it?

DEAR READER - The nerve trunks to your arm pass under the clavicle (collar bone) and so do the large arteries to your arm. Behind these structures is the rib

In some cases the clavicle can be pulled back against the rib cage, literally trapping the blood vessels and nerves. This can affect the arm and hand. In extreme cases atrophy may follow. We see this in people carrying a back pack that pulls the shoulders back.

If a person has an extra rib it may compress the space. And in some people muscles in the neck area may compress arteries or nerves. It is not common but it is not rare either. If it is caused by a back pack, eliminating the pack may belp. But in many cases the best appreach is to relieve the mechanical



Oswald: "A diamond lead would almost surely hold South to eight tricks, but no one can find any fault with West's choice of the nine of hearts."

Alan: "After that heart lead South should have made his game, but a little deception on the part of East caused South to go after overtricks and wind up in the ashcan."

Oswald: "South won the first heart in dummy and led a low heart to his 10. Then came a spade to dummy's queen. East dropped the deuce in the same way that a trapper sets his trap and South fell for it. Back to his hand with the ace of hearts. he followed with a low spade lead to dummy's king. That villain East produced the ace, cashed the jack and nine and shifted to a diamond to sink declarer's game contract.

Alan: "There was no sure way to make the game, but South had a safer line of play at his disposal. When the queen of spades held he should lead a spade back to his 10. This would insure his contract except against an original holding of jack-small by West. The line that South adopted would lose against the actual holding of two small or a singleton in

the West hand." Oswald: "Actually, the winning line of play would be adopted by any world class player and most other great experts. The great majority would fall for East's play just as this South did."


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
