# Price index rises slightly

WASHINGTON - Inflation at the consumer level increased 0.4 percent in February, the government said Tuesday, a pace that was uncomfortably high but not as alarming as wholesale price litkes in 1989.

The 0.4 percent increase in the Consumer Price Index followed a 0.6 percent litke in January. The Labor Department said declines in apparel prices and smaller gains in prices for food, tobacco, entertainment and energy accounted for the moderation in inflation last

Most economic forecasters had expected a February consumer price jump of at least 0.5 percent, with some saying it could go as high as 0.8 percent.

# Another bomb warning issued

LONDON — The Transport Department has issued a third warning to British airports and airlines to be on the lookout for terrorist bombs hidden in radio-cassette players like the one that blew up a Pan American World Airways jumbo jet over Scotland, killing 270 people.

The telex Monday was issued as the U.S. and British governments were criticized for giving inadequate warnings of a possible terrorist attack before the Dec. 21 bombing of Pan Am

# Three children die in fire

LOS ANGELES - Three young children were killed Monday night when flames swept through their two-story home in the Pacific Pallsades area, authorities said.

The children - two 5-year-old boys and a 7-year-old girl — were trapped in their bedrooms on the first floor of the house and were found dead shortly after 10 p.m., fire spokesman Jim Williamson said.

Officials said the children had been in the care of a babysitter, who reportedly ran from the burning house screaming that children were inside. Passers-by broke windows and tried to get to them but were driven back by intense

One man said he took a pipe and broke all of the lower windows at the back of the house in an unsuccessful attempt to locate the children.

# Phelps: A special teacher teaching special children

LONGWOOD - Longwood Elementary School teacher Krista Phelps looked stunned when the entourage, led by Seminole County School Supt. Robert Hughes and School Board Chairman Ann Neiswender, crammed into her classroom Monday.

She stopped using sign language to describe what was being said for her hearingimpaired students only long enough to cover her flushed checks when she realized what

was happening. She had been chosen teacher of the year from among 2,885 other teachers in the

school district. "I'm so surprised," she said, using deft fingers to repeat her comment to the third-fifth grade class

The 25-year-old teacher knew that she was one of the county's final three selections for

the top honor, she said later. She hoped, though she didn't expect, to win the award.

"I kept telling Craig (Hopes, her fiance) that I hoped I'd get this and he kept telling me not to get my hopes up too high because they usually go for someone with 10 or 15 years experience," the Apopka resident said.

Following the formal announcement, Phelps was embraced by her mother Barbara and Craig, who then kissed her. The twelve students were unanimous in twisting their faces to show their dislike for the mushiness.

Phelps began teaching hearing-impaired students almost by accident, but once she began, she found it challenging and rewarding and knew that she had found her niche.

Phelps' mother has worked with the mentally and physically handicapped in the Seminole County school district for as long as Krista can remember. From her mother, she learned that the only difference between the Sec Teacher, Page 5A

# Thanks, but no thanks

Lake Mary city manager candidate won't take job

LAKE MARY - Commissioners yesterday decided not to allow Robert A. Barcinski to live outside city limits if he accepted the position of city

So Barcinski, 39, turned down the \$50,000-a-year city manager position the commissioners offered him last Thursday.

They said last week that if Barcinski refused the job, their second choice would be John Charles Litton, 42. Litton currently serves as Winter Park's assistant city manager. Litton has told the commissioners he will accept the position and is available within 21/2 weeks.

Bareinski, assistant city manager in Delray Beach, had expressed reservations during the interviews about being able to afford a home for more than \$100,000. Mayor Dick Fess said Barcinski visited the city last weekend with his wife but that they could not find a place to live that was within their price range. Fess said the Barcinskis. considered living in the Crossings area, an unincorporated area.

Commissioners, however, decided yesterday not to allow him to live outside the city limits.

# Report: Midway living conditions improving

Herald staff writer MIDWAY — Health conditions in Midway have improved during the past five years, a state

Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services report shows. A team from the HRS-Seminole County Public

Health Unit toured the small community east of

Sanford on March 1.

They found 11 homes with violations of state health requirements, including three with cracked or failing seplic tanks, three with garbage on the ground, two with no plumbing and two with dish washers draining into nearby ditches. The team also found two unsecured refrigerators in the yards of two homes, a hazard

for small children who might become frapped in them

The inspectors also reported finding 21 abandoned or dilapidated homes. Addresses for those homes have been turned over to the Seminole County Building Department for inspection and possible enforcement action.

# Convicted murderer hopes for leniency

MIAMI — A 50-year-old nursing administrator convicted of the attempted murder of a profoundly ill five-month-old baby is hoping for lentency from Circuit Judge Peter Capua when she

Capua set sentencing for Jean Arias for April 19th. A jury deliberated for nearly nine hours yesterday before finding Arias guilty of attempted first-degree murder.

Jurora say they were looking for a way to be lenient with Arias, but decided that would be up to the judge.

The baby suffers from osteogenesis imperfects, a rare disease that makes bones brittle and lead to curvature of the spine,

blindness, and heart problems.

Arias was convicted of asking another nurse to give the baby

a lethal dose of adult cough syrup. The nurse called police.

Defense attorneys said that nurse had a grudge against Arias.

The baby is the granddaughter of North Miami Beach doctor Jerome Reich. According to testimony, Arias has said he knew about the plot.

# Salvadorans stage hunger strike

TALLAHASSEE -- Three refugees from El Salvador said Monday they are staging a hunger strike to protest the U.S. endorsement of that country's presidential election and Gov. Bob Martinez' role as an observer.

The refugees challenged Martinez, one of a team of U.S. observers sent to El Salvador to ensure the elections were conducted fairly, to debate whether truly democratic elections are possible without a ceasefire in the civil war,

The refugees said they have a court hearing in Orlando next month on their request for political asylum.

They said they began their fast Sunday morning as balloting began in their homeland and plan to continue until March 24, the ninth anniversary of the assassination of Salvadoran Archbishop Oscar Romero.

Rightist groups claimed victory in the election and each side said the other used terrorist tactics to short-circuit the electoral

"He (Martinez) is not taking a position on whether the right candidate won. But from his standpoint, it looked like the democratic process worked." said Jon Peck, spokesman for the

# Dredging plan stirs controversy

CLEARWATER - Early residents called this west coast Florida town "Clear Water Harbor" because they were impressed with the pristine quality and clarity of the Gulf waters that flowed in and out of Dunedin Pass.

But time and sand have combined to close the pass, setting the stage for a battle between homeowners who want the pass opened in hopes the harbor's murky water again will be clear and environmentalists who argue dredging will damage the area's delicate ecosystem.

'Most of the decline in Tampa Bay and Boca Ciega Bay ... has been blamed on dredging operations," Ralph T. Heath Jr., director of the Suncoast Scabird Senetuary, said in a recent

Heath said dredging to open the channel so it can be used by boats will destroy sea grasses used by many marine animals as

Not so, counters Paula Boulton, a homeowner in the landlocked harbor who is spearheading a drive to have

Dunedin Pass open again.

Boulton said the water in the small harbor no longer is conductive to swimming because it is so murky. To that end, she has handed out fliers, organized boat parades and plastered her call with bumper stickers urging the channel be re-opened.

# Eastern flight attendant sues Boesky

NEW YORK - Convicted stock swindler Ivan Boesky has got more legal troubles - but this one has got nothing to do with Wall Street.

An Eastern Airlines flight attendant is suing Boesky for \$500,000 claiming she suffered serious injuries when she tripped over his briefcase during a 1986 flight, the New York Post reported Tuesday.

In a lawsuit filed in Brooklyn Federal Court, the flight attendant. Garvetta Spencer, a resident of a Virginia suburb near the nation's capital, claims she was "rendered sick, sore. lame and disabled."

Boesky's attorney in Washington, Bob McCaw, was not immediately available for comment.

Bocsky, once one of Wall Street's most powerful stock speculators, confessed to a massive insider trading scheme that sparked a series of investigations into criminal wrongdoing in the financial community. Boesky pleaded guilty to securities law violations and was

sent to a federal prison in California where he is currently serving a three-year sentence.

He also paid a then-record \$100 million-dollar fine to settle civil charges filed by the Securities and Exchange Commission. which barred him for life from the securities industry.

# Trump throws wrench into Eastern deal

MIAMI - New York developer Donald Trump asked strike-bound Eastern Airlines for a \$125 million reduction in the sale price of its Northeast shuttle service, and Eastern responded by saying it would look for another buyer for the profitable

Trump had said the strike by Eastern's ground workers. which began March 4 and forced the carrier to seek protection from its creditors under the Federal Bankruptcy Code. makes the shuttle worth less than his offer of \$365 million. made Oct. 12.

The real estate magnate said he wanted Frank Lorenzo, chairman of Eastern's parent. Texas Air Corp., to cut the price by at least \$125 million.

In a letter to Trump, Eastern Senior Vice President Barry P.

Simon replied that Eastern now must look for another buyer to ensure the shuttle sale is completed under the best possible terms for Eastern

"You should know that we have recently received substan-tial unsolicited offers from other parties, including one just this morning," Simon wrote. "You are welcome, of course, to make

any offer you feel appropriate."
Eastern officials, who would not identify others who made offers for the popular shuttle, had been counting on the shuttle deal to bring in badly needed

Trump was not available for comment and he did not disclose in the letter what he is now willing to pay for the shuttle operations. But Susan Heilbron, a Trump spokesman, said the developer is seeking a reduction of \$125 million or more.

Trump wrote Lorenzo that he

is "still very interested in acquir-ing the shuttle" linking New York, Boston and Washington, but that when he agreed in October to buy the shuttle for \$365 million, "I agreed to buy a fully operational shuttle which held nearly 60 percent of the market, commanded the principal loyalty and confidence of business travelers and provided excellent service to the custom-

Since the strike and the subsequent bankruptcy filing, "the shuttle has become an entirely different business," he said.

When Eastern announced the bankruptcy filing March 9, the airline's president, Phil Bakes, said he was confident that the shuttle deal would go through. He also said, "We look at the sale of the Eastern shuttle as the blood plasma for the rebuilding of Eastern Airlines."

In the letter to Lorenzo,

to close the deal "quickly, before the shuttle operations become worse, perhaps irrevocably so. and to provide Eastern with the cash infusion which it desperately needs."

Eastern is about \$2.5 billion in debt and its assets exceed its liabilities by more than \$1 billion, Lorenzo has said. Before the strike, the airline was losing about \$1 million a day.

"When he entered into the contract, around 58 percent of the (shuttle's) market share was enjoyed by the airline, and they were charging \$99 a ticket," said Heilbron, the Trump spokeswoman.

"Today the percent of the market is anyone's guess. Is it 4, 5 percent? Certainly the asset he contracted to purchase is not the same today." Heilbron said.

# Deputy is mistaken for prowler, shot by wife

TAMPA - A Hillsborough County sheriff's deputy was in critical condition Monday after his wife mistook him for a prowler and shot him once in the head, authorities sold.

Charlene Cooper used the .357-caliber gun she kept by her bed to shoot her husband, Depuly Bulord Martin Cooper, 42, early Sunday, said Jack Espinosa, a spokesman for the Sheriff & Office.

Cooper was airlifted to Tampa General Hospital, where he was in critical condition Monday, according to a hospital

spokesman. "It's painful for me to know what happened to him, since I've been to so many shootings," Deputy Craig Darlak told The Tampa Tribune.

Darlak served as the couple's best man at their wedding in Darlak said Cooper wanted his wife to keep a gun by the bed because he feared for her safety. Charlene Cooper, 31, has not been charged in the shooting.

Espinosa said. 'it's categorized as a shooting investigation at this point," he said. "Any shooting is investigated thoroughly."

# Georgia couple wins \$23 million in Florida Lottery

TALLAHASSEE - A Georgia firefighter and his wife won the \$23.46 million grand prize in the weekend Lotto drawing and said Monday it was "hard to imag-ine the enormity" of their winnings.

Lottery officials handed Jim Watson, 38, and his wife Treasa, 31, a check for \$1.18 million Monday during a news conference to announce the winners. The money was the first installment on the couple's grand prize.

Watson said the winning tickets were among 100 he purchased at the Capri Restaurant and Motel near Monticello, Fla., with his \$180 in winnings from the previous week's Lotto drawing.
"It's hard to imagine the

enormity of this whole thing."

Watson said. "We're not out of the daze yet," said his wife.

The Waisons also won an additional \$15,493 for having two tickets with five out of six numbers correct, three tickets with four of six and eight

tickets with three of six.

The couple will collect the rest of their grand prize winnings in annual installments over the next 20 years.

They are the second out--of-state winners in Florida's Lotto game, and the first Lotto grand prize winners from Georgia, where lawmakers have been unable to pass a bill creating a lottery to compete with Florida.

# Rocket fuel ingredient given back

HOUSTON - A Florida company apparently will be given back a scarce rocket fuel ingredient that was confiscated by U.S. Customs agents who claimed it was destined for Iran.

U.S. District Judge Sim Lake last week issued a temporary injunction requiring the government to release by Monday 1.144 drums of ammonium perchlorate, an indispensible component of the solid fuel in rockets ranging up to the glant MX missiles. The chemicals were to be

returned to Girindus Corp. of Tampa., Fla., Monday unless the government objected. Court officials and attorneys for Cirindus said there apparently was no such action.

The chemicals were seized in Feburary 1988 as they were being loaded onto an Iranian freighter in the Dutch port of Rotterdam. Houston attorney Robert

Givens, who is representing

Girindus, sald he was not notified that the government had filed any action to prevent Lake's temporary injunction from being lifted.

27, although Givens said the government does not have a "In light of the court findings

. it looks like an uphill battle for them." Givens said. "It was clearly a bungling on the part of the Customs Service. Attorneys for the government

did not return phone calls to Under Lake's order, the fuel

would be returned to Girindus. which Customs officials believe was involved in an attempt to ship it to Iran by sending it from Houston to Europe under a bill of lading showing it was bound for a buyer in Basel. Switzerland.

The shipment was considered significant because it came at a time when the Iran-Iraq conflict was in the "war of the cities" phase in which the two sides

were firing Soviet-supplied. short-range ballistic missies at each other's population centers. The U.S. Air Force said Iran

might have needed the chemical to refuel its rockets but, more significantly, may be developing its own arsenal of short-range surface-to-surface missiles. Lake ruled last week that the

Customs Service had no authority to selze the shipment because ammontum perchlorate, in its pure form, was not on the list of weapons-related items requiring a special license from the State Department.

U.S. officials concede that the chemical was not on the list in February 1988, but it since has been added.

A fuel-grade version of the chemical is covered under the Missile Technology Control Regime, established in April 1987. to keep ballistic missile components away from Iran, Iraq and other potential Third World combatants.



# **PACTster arrested in Volusia County**

A key member of a group of "fake police" who operated for about eight years in Seminole County was arrested in Volusia County Saturday after allegedly confronting people in illegal traffic stops.

The man arrested, Michael David Perry, 30, of Casselberry, was once identified as a member of the Patrol Assistance Citizen Team (PACT). Last March, when Seminole County Sheriff John Polk reviewed allegations that surfaced against PACT in Sanford, he said "The felon will have to go." He referred to Perry.

Perry had served three years in a Texas prison on a burglary charge before coming to Casselberry and joining PACT. After the statement, Polk and the Orange County sheriff ultimately decided that, with or without Perry, IACT members would be arrested if they continued to allegedly break the law by posing as or implying that they were police officers during

confrontations with civilians and

**PACTsters** portedly monitored police radio calls and responded to real police calls, and had unauthorized confronta. tions with police and citizens

while in dichael Perry (PACTsters) were police officers. Polk said the group of about 12 volunteers was not sanctioned by his department. Deputies said they were tired of having PACTsters show up at crime and accident scenes. Deputies said in some cases undercover police had been confronted by PACTsters, including Perry, who did not realize they were police. Civilians too were stopped and detained and in some cases reportedly battered and

assaulted by PACTsters, deputies reported.

Perry was arrested in the Deltona area of Volusia County at about 5:30 p.m. Saturday on three counts of aggravated assault. Volusia County shcriff's deputies allege Perry had made illegal traffic stops of civilians in that county and put them in fear for their lives. Volusia County sheriff's deputies said Perry's car, a 1988 Ford Escort, was equipped with a red emergency light and a siren, which were used in making the illegal traffic

PACT was accused of operating in a similar way in Seminole and Orange counties, until the threat of arrest curbed their activities here.

After the ban on PACT activities in Seminole County, Perry, on Aug. 16, was arrested by Seminole County sheriff's deputies for allegedly stealing an electrical meter. He was charged with grand theft in that case. Sheriff's deputies called

Perry's PACT activities, "the fox guarding the hen house." Polk said he didn't know about

the PACT operation until the leader of the group, Ed Lewis, of Casselberry, complained last March to sheriff's investigators that Perry had been verbally abused by an investigator at the scene of a traffic accident. That brought a probe of the group by Polk who said he didn't need their help and that he did not consider them to be on the same level as Neighborhood Watch volunteers or state certified aux-Illary or reserve police officers. whose supervised activities are welcomed by the sheriff's de-

Throughout the PACT controversy last spring. Lewis, the operator of a radio communications business which employed Perry, maintained that PACT operated in support of police and had done nothing wrong. Lewis was a key supporter of Sanford sewer plant operator Patrick Wilson, who ran against Polk for the office of sheriff last year and lost. During Wilson's campaign he was quoted as saying if he were sheriff he would have hundreds of PACTsters working for him.

# Commission may eliminate launching fees

SANFORD - Launching fees may be eliminated without proposed parking restrictions at the marina, the city commission decided at a workshop yester-

The commission decided to drop the boat trailer parking restrictions from an ordinance established to eliminate a \$5 marina launching fee. Second reading of the ordinance will be at the March 27 meeting.

# She slew Goliath

In a complex, overwhelming world, the average citizen is driven to ask what one person can do to make a difference against a perceived wrong or injustice.

Mrs. Terry Rakolta, 41, a Michigan mother, has just shown us. She has rattled cages in the vast television industry from top to bottom. Mrs. Rakolta began a letter-writing campaign earlier this year after she and three of her children had watched an episode of "Married ... With Children" at 8:30 p.m. on a Sunday. It is the Fox

Broadcasting Co.'s top-rated series.

She was appalled by the program's crude sexual innuendo, its coarse treatment of women, its offensive references to homosexuality, and a sequence featuring a woman removing her brassiere in public.

Besides compaining to the network, Mrs. Rakolta wrote to 45 companies whose advertisements appeared during the series. She accused them of helping to feed American children a steady diet of gratultous sex and violence.

The result was astonishing. Several of the nation's largest advertisers canceled their advertisements. Proctor & Gamble, McDonald's, Tambrands, and Kimberly-Clark instructed their agencies not to buy any more time on the program. Even more significantly, the president of Coca-Cola USA, Ira C. Herbert, apologized in a letter to Mrs. Rakolta, saysing he was embarrassed, corporately and personally, that an advertisement for Coke had been associated with the program.

Furthermore, Mrs. Rakolta's story became front-page news in The New York Times and her campaign was the subject of an admiring. hour-long analysis by Ted Koppel on ABC's "Nightline."

Understandably, Mrs. Rakolta was amazed by the response to her single-handed efforts. Although she had expected her complaint to be disregarded, officials at several companies, including Coca-Cola, went to considerable lengths to address her complaints, Top sponsors recognized Mrs. Rakolta had focused on what was, in fact, a national concern that prime-time television is bing loaded with salitelous material packed with double-entendres and sexual innuendoes. This particular series has been out at almost 1997 series has been onth air since 1987 and recently scored the second-highest rating and share in its highly competive Sundy evening slot. But even Fox president Jamie Kellner admits that his producers were "pushing the show a little too far." He has ordered them to tone down the script.

What is particularly controversial about the show's moral lapese in the fact that millions of children can be expected to be watching at that time on Sunday evening. Impressionable minors, of course, need to be protected from the gratuitous glorification of promiscuity and sex without live and responsibility.

indeed, the Federal Communications Commission last year imposed new decency standards for prime time broadcasts and fined a Missouri television stattion for broadcasting a sex comedy at 8 p.m., when children were likely to be watching. in 1987, the FCC adopted the guiding principle that adult material should not be broadcast on radio or television between 6 a.m. and midnight.

Although the need for such restraint is glaringly obvious, the television industry in general has not practiced it. A study conducted last year noted that the three networks broadcast 65,000 references to sexual behavior in the 1987-88 season, an average of 27 references an hour. The study was commissioned by the Planned Parenthood Federation of America, which asserted that television subjects the public to a constant barrage of fletional characters engaging in casual sex without commitment, and without regard for emotional

Mrs. Rakolta's campaign is noteworthy for the unsuspected support in commands on all sides. It is also a testimony to what may be achieved by one determined person. And, not least, it is a heartening demonstration of widespread respect for old-fashioned social virtues which rightly seek in protect innocent children from sex and violence that oversteps the bounds of common decency.

# Minimum wage compromise is coming

For liberals, establishment of a "living wage" is a key to progressive economic and social policy. They believe that private enterprise will exploit workers unless government sets minimum standards for pay and working

For conservatives, setting a mandatory wage for private employment is contrary to the basic tenets of free enterprise. They believe minimum wages assess artificial costs on goods and services and in the end hurt consumers and workers, especially beginners, more than

This argument has been going on since the first federal minimum wage was enacted during the New Deal. As the wage floor was raised from 40 cents an hour in a series of hard-fought battles and as coverage of the minimum was expanded, the issue of its effect on new workers continued to be one of the main points of

surveys had proved the minimum wage hurt McDonald's founder wanted it to keep pay low for the young workers at his hamburger restaurants. The Democrats who controlled Congress blocked the sub-minimum wage for eight years, but they also were unable to push through an increase in the \$3.35 wage, losing in a Senate Allbuster just last year.

This year, the new Bush administration jumped quickly into the fray, endorsing an increase to \$4.25 over three years but insisting that the \$3.35 level be retained for newly hired workers for at least the first six months they are on the job.

Die hard liberals, such as Chairman Augustus Hawkins, D-Calif., of the House Education and Labor Committee, denounced the "training wage" idea. The regular minimum wage always has been exactly that — the rate at which entry level workers are started, he said.

But over the years, the liberals and the conservatives who have battled over the minimum wage have found small patches of common ground several times and broken deadlocks over the amount or coverage of the minimum wage.

# David Duke used GOP tactics to win

METAIRIE, La. — Since the election of former Ku Klux Klan grand wizard David Duke to the Louisiana House of Representatives. GOP leaders have repudiated him, calling his win an "aberration." But a substantial case can be made that Duke represents a significant acgment of the Southern vote that the GOP has

worked tirelessly to woo.

Metairle is a pleasant, conservative middleclass community. It had its greatest growth in the late 1970s when many whites fled New Orleans to avoid court-ordered racial busing. It is almost completely white - about 99 percent. It is also overwhelmingly Republican, giving Ronald Reagan 84 percent of its votes in 1984 and George Bush 81 percent last

Duke has lived in the area for years. He maintains that in 1979 he left the Klan and has since repudiated many of its positions. He says now that he is the head of the "National Association for the Advancement of White People," which, in his words, "is for civil rights for all people."

But the facts dispute this. Until just before the election. Duke's house and phone number were listed as that of the Klan's. Duke says that was an error on the part of the phone

As for the new organization he heads, it publishes a virulently anti-Semitic newspaper that, among other things, takes the position that the Holocaust never happened. It also takes the position that members of certain races and religions in this country should be forced to live in separate areas.

Duke previously had run for office as a Democrat: he ran for president as the candidate of the Populist Party. But he says he turned Republican because, "I'm more comfortable as a Republican, and I m as much a Republican as Lee Atwater.'

Atwater, the national GOP chairman, has lashed out at Duke as "a charlatan and political opportunist who doesn't represent the Republican Party or anything we stand for.'

Since the election, many Republicans have implied that Duke - a smooth campaigner with a made-for-TV image - pulled the wool over the eyes of voters as he eked out his 227-vote victory. But Duke's background and his recent activities were major news stories locally for weeks before the election. Voters pulled the lever for Duke knowing exactly what they were getting.

Duke, quite simply, ran a very Republican

For the last 20 years, the GOP has tried to overcome Democratic domination in the South. Republicans have gone all out to attract the white male vote - dubbed the "Bubba" vote by many. These are conservative white voters who - while they don't see themselves in the same light as the segregationists of the

As one longtime Metairle resident, Don Mueller, puts It: "Duke got on the right side of an issue that people around here care about a lot. The only thing Treen said was that he was against Duke. You shouldn't win if you run as poor a campaign as Treen did."

At the eleventh hour, when polls showed Duke pulling away, major national GOP figures including President Bush, Ronald Reagan and Atwater came out for Treen and made ads for him. Atwater said that Treen 'much more closely represents" the GOP in the South.

But Treen himself is not exactly a model for enlightened race relations. He admits that he was a former segregationist who moderated his views after the Supreme Court abolished separate-but-equal schools. He was also a member of the Louisiana States Rights Party that was for years the final bastion of anti-integration in the state. He also remains firmly opposed to busing, minority economic set-asides and other forms of affirmative

How did Treen try to differentiate himself? "He (Duke) attaches racist innuendo to it," Treen told one reporter. "I'm opposed to it on a matter of principle.

# **Defense Department** 'tiger team' blows it

WASHINGTON - Some investigators in the Defense Department are beginning to resemble the bloodhound in "Lady and the - the one who lost his sense of Tramp"

They call themselves the "tiger team," but are officially known as the Special Inquiries Unit, under defense department inspector general June Gibbs Brown. Brown recently added to their duties the job of investigating hotline tips about military bigwigs involved in wrongdoing.

The Defense hotline can be used to report all types of fraud, waste and abuse. Information involving Pentagon brass had been referred to the individual military services, but Brown decided to give the job to

Special Inquiries when it appeared the services might be covering up for their officers who were implicated in hanky-panky.
If Brown thinks the

services blew it, wait sinks its teeth in.

We have already reported how the elite team bungled the bribery investigation of former Navy Commander Donal Billig, a surgeon. He was serving a prison sentence for

involuntary manslaugh-ter and negligent homicide in the deaths of three of his patients when a Court of Military Review overturned his conviction and freed him last April.

After Billig was set free, the Defense

Department got an anonymous tip claiming the doctor had bribed one or more of the members of the military review panel.

The tiger team lumbered into the investigation like amateurs and the case had to be turned over to the Defense Criminal Investigative Service, a group of crack investigators that continues to probe Billig's

Now, sources have slipped our associate Stewart Harris documents about two more investigations that were mishandled by the tiger team. The cases hardly inspire confidence in the Pentagon's ability to put lishouse in order.

· A military official working on a "Star Wars" contract retired and went to work for McDonnell Douglas, the private company that had the contract. The man's defection to the private sector looked like a conflict of interest. After a cursory examination, the tiger team recommended that he be prosecuted.

They later had to drop the case when Army attorneys pointed out that the man had not handled procurement matters while he was in the military and had been in no position to change the McDonnell Douglas contract to benefit the company - a detail that the tiger team missed. In the interim, the poor man's name had been dragged through the mud.

The tiger team managed to goof up a fairly straightforward investigation involving a secretary suspected of forging her boss's signature on overtime vouchers. The boss said he hadn't signed the papers, so there was little doubt that someone had forged his signature.

But the official report by the tiger team became the laughing stock of the inspector general's office. The investigators failed to do something as basic as getting the opinon of a handwriting expert. And when defining forgery, they used a dictionary instead of the U.S. criminal code.

Despite its failings, the tiger team continues to be given more independence and re-sponsibilities. Sources inside the inspector general's office blame Deputy Inspector General Derek Vander Schaaf. He is fond of the tiger team because it is supposed to finish sticky investigations in short order without involving prosecutors or grand juries.

handicapped and other people was "how we learned, how we moved around and how we communicated."

Phelps said that she hopes to inspire her students as much as her teachers at Spring Lake Elementary, Teague Middle School and Lake Brantley High School had inspired her.

As a senior at Lake Brantley High School she saw, in a college catalogue, a class for com-municating with the deaf. She said that at the time, she'd never even met a deaf person. "I saw that and said to my mom 'I'm going to Flagler and I'm going to learn to work with the hearing impaired'," she said.

Phelps is not satisfied just to teach the deaf students, she has been instrumental in mainstreaming many of them into classes with the general student body.

"I do what I do...and achieve what I have...because I can come In and work with my kids and see them out there," she said, pointing toward the other areas of the school, "doing all that they've done."

In 1986, Phelps' students participated in the Seminole County Teacher of the Year award banquet by singing and signing. "We are the World," along with their hearing peers. Her students regularly participate in academic competitions. One recently won an honorable mention at the county science fair.

The other teachers in the school have nothing but good things to say about Phelps and her students.

math teacher Jean Adams. "They have all the math skills of their peers and they fit right in with the others. They have been among the top students in my

Adams, who said she has learned some basic signing, finds it unnecessary to use it to communicate with her hearing impaired students.

Claira Sidman has worked with Phelps from the beginning in mainstreaming the students.

"She has inspired all of us with her enthusiasm," said Sidman. "And her work in getting the kids prepared with social skills has been the best."

Phelps uses a variety of teaching methods to reach her hearing impaired students. For example, she knew that drug pushers would probably not sign their intentions to her kids, but they might bring out the drugs to show them. She invited two sheriff's officers to bring some drugs and related paraphernalia to her classroom to show them the things that are bad for them.

She also uses role-playing. She believes that they learn not only from the role they have assumed, but they also learn to draw on past experience to learn to handle current problems. Phelps, however, does not

limit herself to teaching the hearing impaired to deal with other students. She offers sign language classes for third, fourth and fifth graders before school and for other teachers after school.

She has made it a priority to go, into the community and speak to civic clubs about the special needs of the hearing "She does an excellent job of impaired. She has had groups

preparing them," said 5th grade and individuals donate closed-math teacher Jean Adams, caption decoder machines so that her students who are unable to affod such devices could enjoy television. They have received TDD (Telecommunication Devices for the Deaf) to make telephone use a reality.

"Mostly, though, I teach them about the hearing impaired." she said.

DAvid Scott, principal of Longwood Elementary School, said that Phelps was "the spark plug that got the whole school going."

Phelps said that one of the most rewarding experiences she has had was being the Special Olympics trainer for her students and seeing them become competitive, work toward a goal and achieve things thought to be out of their reach.

Phelps tried to underplay her accomplishments saying that it was the inspiration of her students that got her up and to work every morning.

"Hove my Job." she said. As Teacher of the Year, Phelps will receive \$1,000. Half is from the Seminole County School District, funded through private donations. The other half from the Department of Education.

She is now in the running to be named Florida Teacher of the Year. That winner will be announced in Tallahassee on May

Phelps said she wants to use her place as Seminole County Teacher of the Year to get the message of getting involved into the community. Pointing out that there are unlimited ways of joining in, she said that she wants parents and students to be involved with teachers in the educational process.

sald condemnation proceedures have begun on four of the homes brought to his attention by the health officials. Many of the homes were sound and were either sealed or in use, Nabavi sald. He has also begun condemnation proceedings on another six homes lie found or he was notified about from the community.

"One we thought might be a privy turned out to be a tool shed. Another one was a doll house a man built for his children. Another one was out of use and the man had plans to tear it down and fill it in."

Midway agrees her neighbors have improved their community. she said more needs to be done. Johnson is a community leader

People are doing more to their yards," Johnson sald, "But still see the same filthy ditches: We've still got the same dirt roads that flood every time it



# Serratia infection may come after surgery

husband had bypass surgery. then developed serratia infection. Is this the same thing as osteomyelitis?

DEAR READER: One of the complications of surgery - any surgery, bypass grafting in-cluded — is infection. Bacteria can enter through the surgical wound and cause widespread inflammation that must be treated for the patient to survive. Serratia is a type of microorganism, like staph and strep, that can cause post-operative infec-tion. If untreated, the bacteria can be carried in the bloodstream to distant sites. including bone. Osteomyelitis is bone infection. Therefore, serratia is a type of bacterium that can cause bone infection, but it is by no means the only one. Most post-operative infections can be readily treated and cured by modern antibiotics.

DEAR DR. GOTT: At work one day, I started to run and heard a pop in my calf. The pain made me pass out. For three days I couldn't flex my leg or foot. For the past year it's settled down into constant muscle spasm. My doctor is puzzled. Is this related to the spon-

dylolisthesis of my lower back?

DEARREADER:
Spondylolisthesis is the partial dislocation of one spinal vertebra over the one below it. I believe that this condition is not related to your present symptoms.

I think that you suffered severe strain or, more likely, a tear in your calf muscle. You may need surgery to repair the muscle. Ask your doctor to refer you to an orthopedic surgeon.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I had bad varicose veins and had the valves repaired in my legs. Isn't this better than stripping?

DEAR READER: That de-

pends on whether your operation was successful or not. Sometimes the venous valves the structures that prevent backflow of blood in the veins can be repaired. However, in my

DEAR DR. GOTT: My experience, venous stripping (or other surgical methods to remove or close varicose veins) is superior to valve-repair because the procedures are simpler.

Also, by the time varicose veins need sugical attention. they are usually swollen, dilated and unsign the veins are not likely to read to their original







# Washington curfew blocked

WASHINGTON - A federal judge temporarily prohibited the District of Columbia from enforcing its controversial new curfew law intended to keep teenagers off the streets of the violence-plagued capital.

U.S. District Judge Charles Richey Issued Monday a 10-day temporary restraining order at the request of the American Civil Liberties Union. The ACLU said the law is overly broad. and violates the First, Fourth and Fifth Amendments of the Constitution.

The emergency 90-day law — designed to fight drug trafficking and attendant violence — officially went into effect last week, but police had planned to begin enforcing it at 11

The law would prohibit people under the age of 18 from being on the city's streets from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. on weeknights, and midnight to 6 a.m. on weekends.

Art Spitzer, the ACLU's legal director in Washington, said he knew of no other big city with a curfew law as stringent as the D.C. statute. The law would specifically exempt only minors who legally work at night and could provide an affidavit signed by their parents and employer.

# Scandal figure attempts suicide

WASHINGTON - Defense industry consultant William Parkin, a key figure in the unfolding Pentagon corruption scandal who had been negotiating a plea agreement, attempted suicide by taking an overdose of pills, sources close to the case said.

Parkin's daughter found him at his home Saturday, and he was rushed to nearby Alexandria Hospital, the sources said Monday. Parkin was listed in fair condition Monday night.

U.S. District Judge Richard Williams delayed for a week the scheduled March 27 beginning of Parkin's trial on a 25-count conspiracy and bribery indictment.

Parkin is among about a dozen industry consultants who were subject of FBI and Naval Investigative Service wiretaps during the 2 1/2-year investigation - code-named Operation III Wind - into the alleged passing of bribes to Pentagon procurement officials in exchange for insider contract

# Wright ethics probe begins

WASHINGTON - Members of the House ethics committee, promising a bipartisan decision, began discussions Monday on whether a nine-month investigation of Speaker Jim Wright uncovered any violations of House rules.

The chairman of the committee, Rep. Julian Dixon, D-Calif., said that if the panel did not reach a decision by Wednesday night, deliberations would resume following the Easter recess. Monday's meeting was the first full session during which the

six Democratic and six Republican members of the panel met without aides to discuss the investigation.

Last week the committee heard from special counsel Richard Phelan, who conducted the investigation, and from Wright's lawyer, William Oldaker.

# States must help with gun control

United Press International

WASHINGTON - President Bush said the federal government alone cannot resolve the volatile gun control issue of semiautomatic weapons and that the states must provide the solution "in various ways."

"I am convinced that reasonable men and woman can work together to find an answer to these automated weapons,' which are being used in rising numbers by criminals, Bush told a group of state legislators at the White House on Monday.

Bush, a lifetime member of the anti-gun control National Rifle Association, didn't offer any specific suggestions to the states, many of which are already considering their own bans or restrictions.

Gun control advocates, along with numerous police groups, say national action is needed to get a handle on a wave of the so-called "assault wcapons," which include AK-47s, Uzis and a gun called 'The Streetsweeper.'

Last Tuesday, William Bennett, on his first full day as federal drug czar, announced a ban on the import of five types of semiautomatics pending a review to determine if the guns, as required by law, have a legitimate sporting use.

The White House says it doesn't expect further restrictions until the review is completed, probably within 90 days. Law enforcement groups com-plain that semiautomatics have become standard equipment for many drug gangs.

Bush, who has said he wants to safeguard the rights of legitimate sportsmen as well as protect policemen from heavily armed criminals, told the state legislators: "I am very serious about this drug fight and its going to be fought on all fronts.

"We have got to give police the proper support ... so we'll find some answer (to the semiautomatics) that is constitutionally sound," Bush said.





# Rightists win in San Salvador

United Press International

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — The candidate of the Christian Democratic Party conceded defeat in El Salvador's presidential election. accepting the victory of Alfredo Cristiani of the right-wing Nationalist Republican Alliance.

"I have spoken to the ARENA (Nationalist Republican Alliance) candidate to congratulate him on obtaining first place," Fidel Chavez Mena. candidate of outgoing President Jose Napolcon Duarte's Christian Democratic Party, said at a news conference Monday. "The Salvadoran people made a decision yesterday and we are going to support it."

Preliminary official results showed Cristiani winning a clear majority in Sunday's violencemarred election. The Central Electoral Council said that of 576,339 valid votes counted by midday Monday, Cristinai had won 53.81 percent, or 310,142 votes.

Chavez Mena had 36.59 percent, or 210,925 votes, the National Conciliation Party was in third place with 4.21 percent and the Democratic Convergence, a year-old leftist coalition allied with the rebels of the leftist Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front, or FMLN, followed with 3.2 percent.

The Electoral Council announced Monday night it had tallied votes from only one-third of the polling places and would announce more results at midday Tuesday.

Speaking at a news conference shortly after Chavez Mena conceded, Cristiani called on Salvadorans "to unite for the good of the fatherland and to keep working toward the development of democracy, which we all want."

"Today in El Salvador there was a winning party and a losing party, but ARENA will not have a divided government," Cristiani said, adding that his objectives as president would be "ending the violence and abuses of human rights and working toward the growth of democracy.'

"I have spoken to Dr. Chavez Mena and he said he would work with us for the benefit of the fatherland.'

Chavez Mena said that low voter turnout of between 45 percent and 50 percent, caused by heavy fighting and an intimidation campaign by leftist guerrillas, contributed "significantly" to his defeat.






