#### Something fishy going on

LAKE MARY — Forty new residents moved into Lake Mary during the noontime hour on Friday. Parks and Recreation Director John Holland identified them as Triploid Grass Carp.

The fish, certified by the Florida Game and Freshwater Fish Commission, are being placed in the small lake in Central Park, immediately south of the Lake Mary City Hall at 100 W. Lake Mary Blvd.

The transferral of the fish was handled by the operation known as "The Lake Doctors".

"This type of fish," Holland explained, "will be of great help in keeping the lake as clean as possible, because they eat many of the weeds and other life that would otherwise be in the pond," he said.

#### MTV interviews Clinton

LOS ANGELES — President Clinton will make a return appearance to MTV on Monday to discuss his proposal for national youth service, the network said.

Clinton will be interviewed as part of a 30-minute MTV News special, "Bill Clinton: Your Future, His Plan."

The special will include highlights of the president's planned speech at Rutgers University outlining his proposal and students' reactions to the plan.

Clinton will be interviewed by MTV News' Tabitha Soren on the Rutgers campus.

During last year's presidential campaign, Clinton courted young voters with MTV appearances.

#### National Geographic confused

SANTA CRUZ, Calif. — National Geographic could use a geography lesson itself.

The magazine, known for its reports of people and lands around the world, labeled the city of Santa Cruz as Santa Clara. The error was on a map accompanying an article on Monterey Bay in the March issue.

"It was a simple, plain ol' error. We're very embarrassed, and we're horrified," said Murkic Hunsiker, director of research.

A reader alerted the magazine to the error on Wednesday. National Geographic, with about 9.5 million subscribers nationwide, probably will publish a correction in the next issue, Hunsiker said.

The magazine's cartographic division really does know that Santa Clara is just north of San Jose while Santa Cruz is on the coast about 60 miles south of San Francisco, she said.

## Blacks file complaint

### NAACP cites discrimination by school district

SANFORD — The Seminole County chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) has filed a complaint of employment discrimination against the Seminole County School Board with the Florida Commission on Human Relations and is making a similar complaint with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC).

"We believe there has been on-going discrimination against black employees in hiring, promotion and firing in the school district," Turner Clayton Jr., president of the Seminole NAACP chapter.

Clayton said incidents of discrimination against black employees has occurred at all levels and in all departments of the school district.

He said that recent incidents of the school district failing to promote qualified blacks into management positions in the district.

### Boy's dad files \$5 million suit in alleged molestation

SANFORD — Suspended Lakeview Middle School band director Stephen Paterson called a

\$5 million federal lawsuit filed against him "absolutely absurd" Friday.

The father of a youth allegedly molested by the teacher filed the lawsuit claiming the teacher vio-

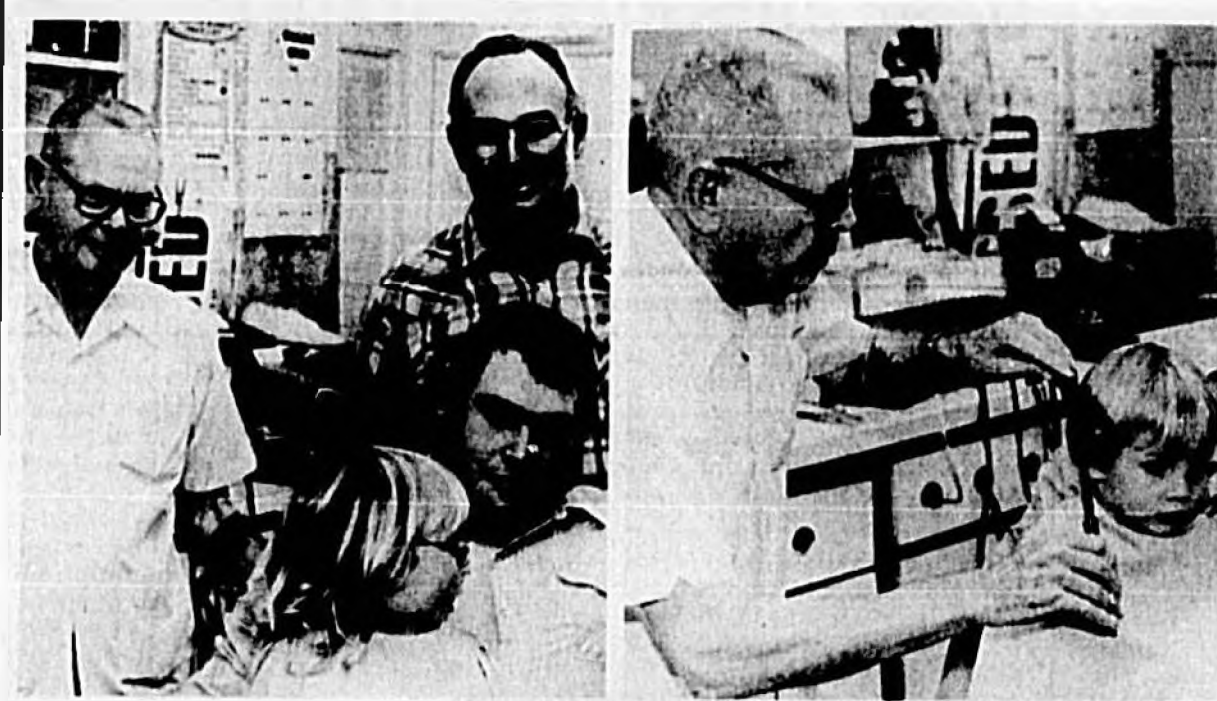
lated the boy's civil rights.

"David Doe" filed the suit on behalf of his son, "John" naming Stephen A. Paterson and unknown others as defendants in the legal action.

Advised by his attorney not to talk about the cases pending against him, Paterson deemed the federal civil suit, "totally absurd" and

LONGWOOD — A few people wandered along the quiet streets of Longwood's downtown historic district on Saturday morning. The Longwood Downtown Merchant's Association's Spring 'N Things celebration didn't draw too many shoppers to the district.

### Snook fillets marked grouper

VERO BEACH — A fishing expedition by undercover investigators netted a seafood dealer who was illegally selling snook fillets and marking them up as grouper.

Carol Gammill admitted in a plea bargain Thursday that she bought snook, one of Florida's most-prized gamefish, and sold it through her retail fish shop. She agreed to pay a \$9,600 fine.

Gammill bought the fish from state agents during a 10-month sting operation. She paid \$4.50 a pound, two to three dollars cheaper than the wholesale price for fresh grouper, then marked it up to as much as \$10 a pound.

It is illegal to buy or sell snook, which can legally be caught by recreational fisherman only seven months a year at a rate of two per person per day.

### Stop telltale tags

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Lawton Chiles ordered a state agency to stop issuing telltale license tags that make rental cars easy marks for crooks who target tourists for crime.

"Those who rent or lease a vehicle in Florida should have the security of knowing that they are not openly inviting criminal actions simply because they are driving in a designated vehicle," Chiles said Friday.

The action follows worldwide publicity about recent crimes against visitors to Florida, where the economy is centered around the tourist trade.

The governor's executive order will stop the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles from issuing plates intended to identify rental cars that begin with the letters "Y" and "Z."

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement found that in 1991, out of an estimated 40 million visitors, 6,994 were victims of violent crime. That's a rate of 0.02 percent.

### Jail inmate awarded \$375,000

MIAMI — A federal jury has awarded a jail inmate \$375,000 because Dade County failed to protect him from a cellmate with a history of stabbings, including several manslaughter convictions.

Steve Ivory was stabbed five times in the abdomen in 1986 by Generoso Lico, who used a homemade shank in their cell at the Dade County Jail.

In a civil rights lawsuit, Ivory, now 27 and a state prison inmate, charged the county should have kept Lico isolated.

"Although the correctional officers at the jail knew Lico was a dangerous, violent inmate who had already stabbed other inmates at the jail, they did not house Lico in a single-person safety cell," Ivory's lawyers argued.

Instead, officers placed Lico in the jail's general population.

Over the years, inmate safety problems and jail overcrowding have generated extensive public scrutiny and a steady flow of lawsuits. But awards the size of Ivory's have been few.

### Astronauts to hatch fish eggs

PACE — Astronauts will hatch fish eggs in space during the next mission of the shuttle Discovery scheduled for April.

Students from Pace High School in this Florida Panhandle town and their teacher are working with an aquatic researcher on the experiment to determine the effect of weightlessness on diapause, a form of suspended animation.

Diapause enables African killifish to reproduce in ponds and water holes that are periodically dry. The eggs can remain on dry land through rainy seasons and hatch when water returns.

Eugene Hull of Orbis Scientific, a company in nearby Milton, has developed fish eggs that consistently will hatch 30 minutes after water is added. His company markets the eggs in an educational kit called Fish Boom Bah!

In preparing for the experiment, the students will conduct pre-launch tests on killifish and their eggs, using laboratory equipment donated by Eduquest, a subsidiary of IBM.

### Time runs out on prostitution bill

TALLAHASSEE — A bill to permit seizure of cars belonging to men who repeatedly solicit prostitutes won't make it onto the books during this session of the Legislature.

The bill pushed by West Palm Beach Mayor Nancy Graham died quietly Friday when time expired for a hearing. She sought the bill as a way for cities to halt prostitution as a threat to neighborhoods.

Under the bill, anyone facing their first misdemeanor charge of soliciting a prostitute would be warned that police would seize and sell their car for a second offense.

Elvin Martinez, chairman of the House Criminal Justice Committee, explained the committee has just one remaining meeting scheduled for the legislative session, and the John's cars measure won't be on that agenda.

"In the first place, we do not need to expand the forfeiture laws," the Tampa Democrat said. "There has already been a lot of abuse of those laws, and this would be the first where we'd be allowing forfeiture for a misdemeanor."

# County challenges annexation

## Judge won't stop move on Monday

SANFORD — Seminole County Circuit Judge Robert B. McGregor refused Friday to grant Seminole County's request to halt Casselberry's annexation of the proposed 21-acre Brittany Gardens subdivision south of the city's limits.

The annexation will take effect Monday. McGregor ruled the city had not been properly served with the lawsuit. Assistant county attorney Lonnie Groot said delivery of the lawsuit will be attempted this week.

No hearing has been scheduled. County commissioners filed the suit against city commissioners Wednesday, alleging the city failed to poll unincorporated voters affected by the annexation of the site. County commissioners asked McGregor to immediately and permanently block the annexation attempt.

The 85-unit site, located between the Orange County line and Lake Howell Road, is not contiguous to the city limits. County Attorney Bob McMillan said. McMillan said he was uncertain how the city could poll unincorporated voters since the lands between the city and the subdivision are commercial properties and do not have residents.

Unless all of the affected unincorporated property owners consent to an annexation, the referendum process must be followed

according to state municipal laws. The city's Feb. 16 referendum garnered a 102 to 12 vote favoring the annexation. None of the votes were by unincorporated voters, because none exist in the affected properties.

The suit marks the first county annexation challenge since 1988, when commissioner Pat Warren and former commissioner Jennifer Kelley were elected to the board; vowing to promote cooperation between the county and cities by ending the lawsuit, although the county had won or settled 13 of the 14 annexation challenges.

The county's first full-time attorney, Nikki Clayton, resigned after commissioners voted 3-2 not to accept her recommendation to challenge a Sanford annexation she considered was in violation of state laws.

## Fight brewing between beer suppliers, stores

TALLAHASSEE — Beer drinkers be warned. Cheap suds are threatened.

Large beer distributors are asking lawmakers to force Florida's large supermarket and liquor store chains to get their supplies through them.

But major retailers, like Publix Super Markets and Winn-Dixie, largely bypass that system when stocking low-price brands such as Falstaff, Lucky Lager and ABC Beer at less than \$2 a six pack.

The supermarket chains say the proposed law would make cheap beer a thing of the past because large distributors would drop the brews in favor of the pricier stuff, and even those prices would rise.

"The lowest-priced item in a category is what keeps the price down," said Charles Bailes III, vice president of ABC Liquors. "When you knock the bottom rung off the ladder, everything moves up."

Beer suppliers disagree. "I don't see why they're getting so worked up," said Buddy Gridley of the Beer Industry of Florida.

Gridley said distributors would sell low-price brands if they had

a chance, saying, "Any brand there's a market for, there's a distributor who will carry it."

Florida's alcohol distribution system, which dates back to the 1933 repeal of Prohibition, is intended to allow equal access to beer suppliers at reasonable prices.

"They say we're being anti-competitive," said Rep. Kevin Pruitt, R-Port St. Lucie, who agreed to sponsor the bill at Gridley's request. "We're saying the flip — they're being anti-competitive."

Lobbyists for Publix, Kash n' Karry, Winn-Dixie and ABC say their stores want a chance to transport and distribute alternative brands ignored by distributors more concerned with Budweiser, Coors and Miller.

Gridley said distributors want all the beer to go through them to ensure freshness, quality and quantity to all retailers.

Pruitt tried floating a compromise, saying he'd give retailers an exemption for one brand of beer.

The stores don't like it. "What if we wanted to have an imported beer?" asked Ed Litton of Kash n' Karry. "What if we wanted to have a regular and a light beer? All it's doing is tying our hands."

## Bill allowing creditors to garnish wages OK'd by House committee

TALLAHASSEE — Creditors would gain new powers to collect debts from people who declare bankruptcy, including garnishment of wages, under legislation approved Friday by a House committee.

The bill (HB 1293) would enable a creditor to garnish up to 25 percent of a debtor's wages, with the first \$500 in weekly earnings exempt. The main sponsor, Rep. Scott Clemons, D-Panama City, said that would protect people who earn under \$24,000 a year.

The House Judiciary Committee voted 20-3 for the bill, which is similar to previous unsuccessful legislative attempts to remove a number of exemptions in bankruptcy law that allow debtors to protect some of their most valuable assets.

"This is an attempt to get at Florida's image as a debtor's paradise," said Judiciary Committee Chairman Robert Trammell, D-Marianna. Federal bankruptcy laws allow states to set their own

statutes regarding exemptions, which Florida has done.

Current Florida bankruptcy law allows the head of a household to shield every penny they earn from creditors. Debtors can also keep their homes, insurance policies, \$1,000 in personal property and a bank account that can be traced to a person's earnings.

The bill would make several changes, including an exemption for a car worth only \$1,000.

In addition, the bank accounts exemption would remain in effect for just six months. Currently, there is no time limit.

Rep. Miguel De Grandy, who voted against the bill, said he opposed it because the \$500 in exempt earnings may be too low for some families. "There should be a sliding scale based on dependents," said the Miami Republican. "If you have to support children, it might be a lot tougher." The legislation moves next to the House Appropriations Committee. There is no Senate companion.

Deputies report that they stopped Smith for a routine traffic violation and ran a check of his license plate in their computer. The information came back that the car had been reported stolen in Sanford the day before.

They further found that his license had been suspended twice. There are also two outstanding warrants for his arrest on unrelated charges in Orange County, deputies reported.

He was taken to the John E. Polk Correctional Facility. Bond had not yet been set.

### Resisting warrant arrest

# Crackdown on open containers

SANFORD — An increase in arrests for open container law violations has been reported earlier this week. Five arrests were made in just over two hours in the W. 13th Street area Tuesday.

Several additional arrests have been made in the general area during the past two days, but in isolated cases.

A number of complaints have been voiced by residents during the past two Sanford City Commission meetings, regarding people standing out in public with beer cans and openly conducting drug sales.

Acting Police Chief Ralph Russell, early this month, had told the commissioners he planned to concentrate on several areas indicated as areas of concern by the people, including both the east side and on W. 13th Street.

In the commission meeting Monday night, a citizen specifically commented on problems in that area.

Mayor Bettye Smith responded. "Acting Chief Russell is writing this down as you speak, and I'm sure he will be looking into this problem in that area soon."

Friday Russell commented, "There were some problems with the way the open container ordinance was originally written, but now it has been upgraded, so

you'll see us making more arrests."

He added, "This particular situation happened in one relatively small area, but we'll be concentrating on these violations all over the city from now on."

The five arrests were made shortly after noon on Tuesday, by members of the Sanford police department Special Investigative Unit.

Anthony W. Roker, 18, #17 William Clark Court, was arrested in the 1500 block of W. 13th Street.

Leroy Hubert King, 30, of 2350 W. Center Street, and Larry Eugene Snell, of 1409 W. 14th Street, were both arrested in the 1600 block of W. 13th Street.

Rufus Bradley, 38, 1905 Airport Blvd. was arrested at 13th Street and Shepard Avenue, and Anthony Eugene Brown, 42, of 1006 Pecan Avenue, was arrested in the 1400 block.

Each of the five was charged with violation of the open container law.

Police also arrested Manuel E. Gordon, 28, of 1201 W. 13th Street. He was located by SIU agents in the 1000 block of W. 13th Street. Police said he was in possession of a plastic bag containing approximately three grams of what was later proven to be crack cocaine. He was charged with possession of crack cocaine with intent to distribute.

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# County reports increase in construction

SANFORD — Construction continues to mount in the unincorporated areas of Seminole County.

The county has issued 6,817 building permits for new homes, stores and offices since Oct. 1, 1992, the start of the county's fiscal year. That represents a 29 percent increase over the 5,282 permits issued during the same October-to-January time frame a year ago.

The county issued 1,515 building permits in January, a 29 percent increase over the 1,172 permits issued in January 1991. The January 1992 figure represents a 17 percent decline from December figures, but is in keeping with a winter leveling of construction.

New residential construction showed a slight dip from December figures, dropping from 69 to 62, and a four-home drop from January 1991. Housing construction for the first four months of the fiscal year is 6 percent lower than that period last year. A total of 275 new home permits have been issued this year compared to 295 last year.

But signs are many people are staying in their present home and remodeling or upgrading it. A total of 33 swimming pool permits were issued in January, a 94 percent increase over the 17 permits issued last January. There has been a 102 percent increase in new pool permits since Oct. 1 compared to the same time period a year ago.

South-county residents are still replacing their roofs from last March's hailstorms. Of the

902 miscellaneous permits issued in January, 651 were for new roofs. By comparison, only 300 miscellaneous permits, which included re-roofs, were issued in January 1992.

Commercial construction continues to remain strong for the year, although no new commercial construction permits were issued in January, compared to six in 1992. Commercial construction is up 85 percent this year over last year. A total of 26 new commercial structures have been permitted this year.

## Times have changed

The Lake Mary City Manager and Fire Chief are working in unison to improve the city fire department. How times have changed.

In mid-1992, conflicts and disagreements between a number of department heads in the Lake Mary city government reached such a level of conflict that a retired judge was hired as a Special Master to look into the problems.

Following several high-level resignations and the resolving of a number of problems, the disputes eventually ended. The problem solving to be done by the Special Master was no longer required, and he was dismissed.

By the time 1992 concluded, the city government was again operating smoothly and a new era seems to have emerged.

An example of cooperation occurred recently, when City Manager John Litton and Fire Chief Bob Stoddard met together to discuss the need for improvements in the operation of the fire department.

There had been some complaints about this time they were not personnel disputes. They came in the form of concerns over the operation of the department.

The two men examined the problems and obtained the services of a retired fire chief for additional suggestions. They are now compiling new procedures which they believe will serve to greatly improve the operation of the fire department and its personnel.

For the future, Litton has indicated the need for at least one new fire truck, to replace one deemed to be in less than adequate condition. It may have to be included in the next city budget.

The city leaders will hopefully approve the purchase, even though fire trucks cost a great deal.

We believe the city of Lake Mary, its fire department and its citizens will all benefit from this excellent example of cooperative effort.

We commend Litton and Stoddard for getting together to resolve these problems. Working in this fashion must be the goal of city staffs and officials not only in Lake Mary, but Sanford, Longwood, and all other government bodies.

## Adapt to restructuring of job market

According to Apple Computer Chief Executive Officer John Sculley, the continuing "reorganization of work itself" is a social transformation as dynamic as the industrial revolution.

One of America's economic gurus, Charles Drucker, predicted several decades ago that there would be a colossal restructuring of the job market. He envisioned that technological advances would redefine jobs and decrease the need for people. Many tasks would be streamlined and handled by machines, robots and computers. There would be a negative correlation between increased integration of technology in the workplace and the number of workers required.

Today we are living through the restructuring of the job market. This has been a very traumatic time for white collar workers. The American work ethic has been central to our value system. One's job in the social order has helped define one's personhood and been an integral dimension of one's self-concept. Suddenly one's job may have exited from the job market forever. Although the disappearance of the job may have been dictated impersonally by technology, the individual reacts very personally to the loss of

employment.

Over the past several weeks corporations have continued the downsizing phenomena. Sears eliminated 50,000 jobs, International Business Machines 25,000, Boeing plans to cut 20,000, United Technologies 10,500, McDonnell-Douglas 8,700 and Eastman Kodak fired 2,000.

Corporations are eliminating numerous managerial positions affirming the trend away from hierarchical vertically structured management systems. Temporary employees for particular projects are in vogue and are the precursor of profound structural changes in the labor market.

Experienced workers are a growing number among the unemployed and underemployed. Jobs such as product marketing managers, architects, electrical engineers, regional controllers have all been terminated.

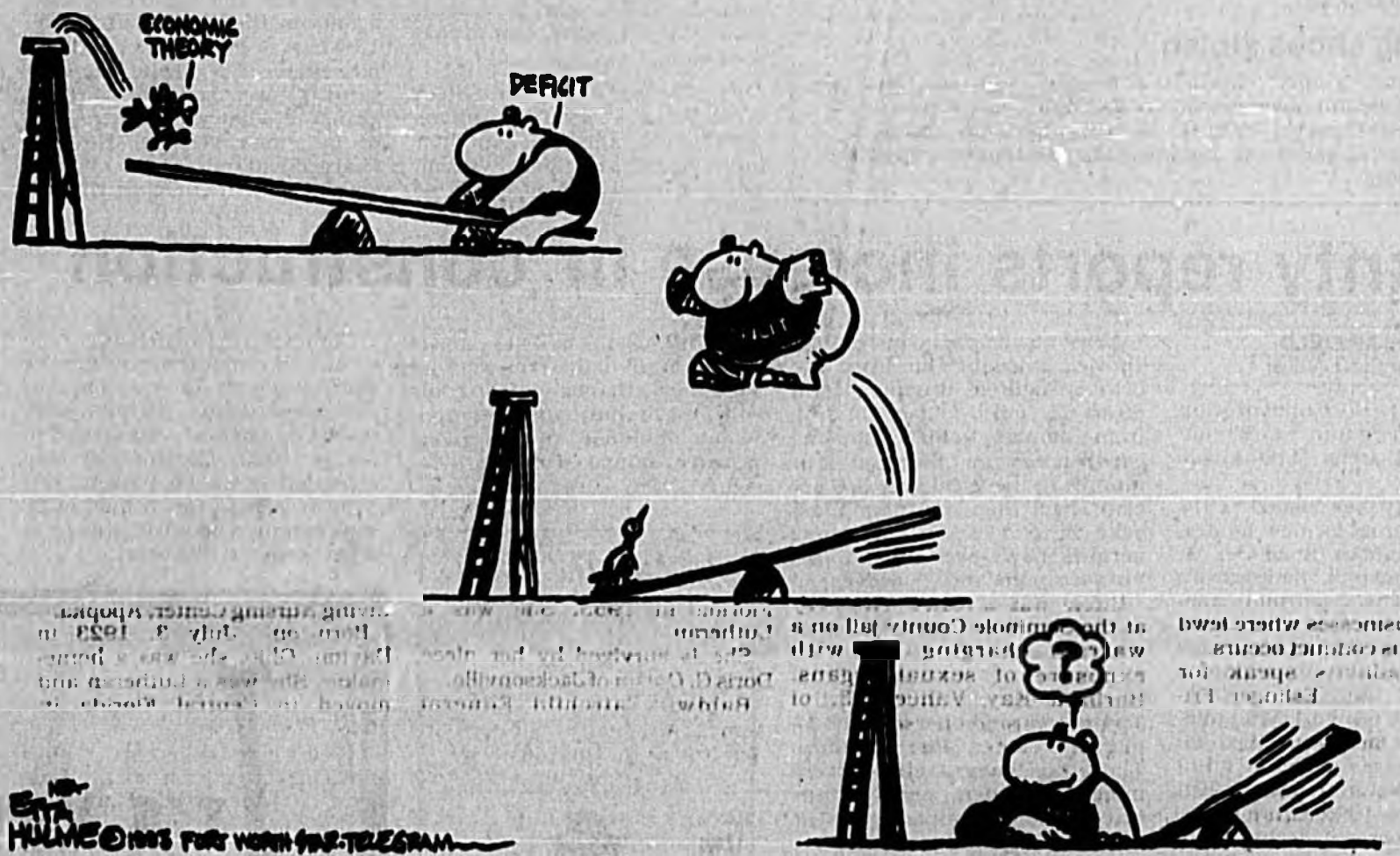
Downsizing of companies has spotlighted the older worker whose salary is much greater than entry level employees. The Conference Board survey of 400 large companies confirmed that 40 percent were offering very attractive retirement packages to encourage early retirement.

It must be accepted that the status-quo relative to the job market will not be maintained. Therefore, American workers need to be flexible, adaptable and possess more generalized skills. They will be more actively involved in negotiating their own destiny in the job market.

Nicole Morgan, professor, Public Administration, Queens University, Kingston, Ontario in her book "Nowhere to Go" sums up our dilemma thusly, "We have a lot of ambitious people with huge career expectations competing for a diminishing number of jobs."

Restructuring of jobs calls for restructuring of our thinking and utilization of our creativity and ingenuity in confronting the challenges.

## Sanford residents are the big losers

Recently the city commission voted to amend the educational requirements for the positions of police and fire chief. As it turns out, in March 1992, the fire chief's educational requirements were already changed.

The proposed educational change is this: To change the four-year college requirement to a two-year associates degree and substitute the other two years with experience in a command position. This proposal was sent to the Civil Service Board (Thursday, Feb. 25) for a hearing. The hearing was held in city commission chambers. This is where it gets confusing. The Civil Service Board was asked to act on an action that had already been addressed in March 1992. The board was confused as were the people in attendance. After some discussion, the board agreed that the lowering of the educational requirements for fire chief had already been done and focused their attention on the police chief's position. This is where the good law-abiding citizens of Sanford lost and the criminal element of Sanford won.

The Civil Service Board voted unanimously to leave the requirements for police chief as they were, but more strangely, they changed the requirements for fire chief from two years back to four years of college, but stated that this will not affect the present fire chief as he is "grandfathered" in.

Friends, a great injustice took place Thursday night in the name of education. Education comes in many forms — from grade school to

college, vocational and on the job. Who can say that having a four-year degree will make the applicant a better department head, which the chief of police is, than an applicant with a two-year degree with hundreds of hours of police related courses taken on the college level which include among other police management courses. Who can say that an applicant with a four-year degree will make a better department head than a person that has given 27 years of his life to protect and serve the citizens of the city of Sanford, over half of which have been in a command position of lieutenant or higher and done so in exemplary fashion. The answer to the question is "no one can."

As a result of the actions taken by the Civil Service Board, I feel that the most qualified person within the Sanford Police Department will withdraw his application and the police department and the good citizens of the city will be the losers. The city needs a permanent police chief and it needs one now. It needs a chief that knows this city and the problems this city has. It needs a chief that would have the support and respect of the members at the police department. It needs a chief that is capable of managing a city department, and last but not least, the residents need and deserve a police chief that will use all of his resources to make Sanford a safe place to live.

Jim was the grandfather of the world's top ranked tennis player, Jim Courier. Rosa was the widow of the well-known Sanford attorney Lloyd Boyle whose untimely death came while he was serving this district in the Florida Senate. Volle had a distinguished career in the legal

profession. He was an attorney, an assistant state's attorney, a member of the Florida Legislature's House of Representatives, a circuit court judge for many moons and one year was selected by the Florida Junior Chamber of Commerce as one of the state's top five young men. And, there was more.

claims the plaintiffs will lose when the facts come out in court.

Paterson is out of jail on \$20,000 bond on two criminal cases charging him with committing lewd and lascivious acts on a child and having sexual activity with a child in his custody. The Seminole County School Board is scheduled to fire Paterson March 9.

At the present time, Paterson said he is dealing with a lot of legal paperwork involving the cases against him.

"I'm not losing any sleep over it," Paterson said. In a seemingly upbeat manner, "That's what you have an attorney for." Attorney J. Cheney Mason is representing Paterson.

There are two sides to every story, Paterson said and he feels the media has been "trashing me big time."

"I have a lot of support all over the state," Paterson continued. "This has been quite a nightmare."

"In America," he added, "a person is supposed to be presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law."

In the suit filed by Doe, he alleges the defendant (Paterson) over a period of three years did, persuade, induce, entice and coerce "John" to engage in sexual conduct in violation of the law and in violation of his Constitutional Rights as provided by the Fourteenth Amendment, the right to life, liberty and pursuit of happiness, including a normal life free from sexual exploitation.

Further the suit claims the "defendant did make video recordings of many sexual episodes, totalling not less than two occasions" and he "did use the mails to transport these videos to other states for the purpose of marketing them for profit."

No less than two times, the suit alleges, the youth was driven from school social activities to the defendant's home where he performed sexual acts on the youth. "Plaintiff was aware that a video camera was set up in defendant's living room and defendant was videotaping the sexual acts."

On no less than 10 occasions in Paterson's school office in the presence of others and no less

than 10 times with no others present, the suit claims Paterson performed sexual acts on the plaintiff. On not less than 15 occasions, "When sexual acts were performed upon 'John' a camera or other photo equipment was usually present, and photos were taken during the performance of these sexual acts."

The suit also states, Paterson drove "John" home from school and performed sexual acts upon him.

In conclusion, the suit states, "Plaintiff is aware that other persons and agencies knew of the violations of the defendant, and purposefully covered up those acts or otherwise failed in their duties to report the violations. Upon discovering these parties or agencies, plaintiff reserves the right to make amendments to the complaint in order (to) name the 'unknown others' as defendants."

The fathers of two boys allegedly molested by Paterson said the families are trying to cope with what has happened. The boys are in high school now. The parents are seeking counseling for the youths but all

of the counselors require fees at the time of the initial visit.

"I've contacted three (doctors) so far, the last one wanted \$250 for the initial visit," one father said.

The other father, who filed the federal lawsuit, said he doesn't want a penny for himself out of the suit, but he wants to get his son the best counseling money can buy. When he asked his son if he wanted to talk to a counselor, his son responded, "I'm okay. I'm handling it. I'm fine."

Both men praised the work done on the criminal investigation by Sanford police, especially acting Police Chief Ralph Russell and Corporal Carlos Monti.

Since Paterson's release from jail, at least one of the youths has started having nightmares, his father said. "The kids are afraid," he said.

The fathers said their sons also know 99 percent of the teachers are dedicated and would not harm them. Despite the experience, they said they know not all teachers are bad. Both boys have abandoned their band instruments, refusing to have anything to do with them.

for Tezin, permitted lingerie models to perform lewd and lascivious acts.

Neither Morgan nor Louis Gragnano, listed as Tezin's owner, could be reached for comment Friday.

The suit seeks to close the stores immediately and permanently. State law permits court closure of businesses where lewd and lascivious conduct occurs.

"The affidavits speak for themselves," said Eslinger Friday.

Affidavits filed with the motions state that models in both businesses would masturbate in front of clients in return for tips,

Undercover agents with the City-County Investigative Bureau reported witnessing the actions.

One model, Robin R. Cable, 22, identified herself as a Tezin manager, according to the statement. In return for \$75, an agent reported Cable exposed her breasts and masturbated in full view of him.

Cable was arrested Thursday at the Seminole County jail on a warrant charging her with exposure of sexual organs.

Barbara Kay Vance, 33, of Tampa, turned herself in on Friday evening. Other arrests on the same charges were made on models following raids on the businesses Wednesday.

food service department were the incentive to getting the NAACP to file the complaints, but he said the violations of the employees' civil rights has been going on for "a very long time."

He noted that there are widespread incidents of nepotism "among the hiring and promotional process of white employees and applicants."

Clayton said that in addition to the discriminatory practices in hiring, firing and promotion, there has been systematic harassment of black employees.

According to the complaint, black employees are "harassed, threatened, and even forced under pressure to quit their jobs."

Clayton declined to give specific examples of such actions, saying that the specifica-

would be brought to light during an upcoming investigation.

He said that the NAACP is continuing to seek out black employees and former employees who feel that they have been discriminated against by the school district.

Ned Julian, the school board's attorney, said on Saturday that the school district is aware that the complaint has been filed.

"At this point it is just that, a complaint," Julian said. "An investigation will be conducted and they will request data and we will provide them with it."

Richard Wells, assistant superintendent for business services, said the investigative process has not yet started. As a matter of fact, he has been officially notified of the complaint.

"I haven't even seen it yet," Wells said.

cause the city's new vacuum sewer system. Public Works Director Jerry Herman will report on streets, drainage and public works projects.

Grounds Maintenance Coordinator Howard Jeffries will comment on tree maintenance, and Acting Police Chief Ralph Russell will discuss crime prevention.

Pamphlets are being made available to residents of the Georgetown area in preparation of the meeting.

The pamphlets include statistics relating to the city, its budget, staffing, expenditures, and personnel to be contacted for various needs.

On the rear of the pamphlet is a Citizen Request Form to be filled out by persons wishing to voice specific requests for services. The lower portion of the form contains spaces for the city to indicate the action to be taken, and department or division to which the situation may be assigned.

Charles Rowe said the pamphlets will be distributed by churches over the weekend, and fliers announcing the meeting will be circulated around the Georgetown area.

Simmons said the pamphlets will also be handed out to the public just prior to the start of Tuesday night's meeting.

"We will be sort of experimenting with this meeting," he said. "Then, judging from the way this first one comes out, we will be looking into what changes, if any, may be worthwhile for both the public and the city, to be incorporated into the next meeting."

He added, "We may ask for citizen input in advance so we will have appropriate city staff members on hand, or take some other approach."

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# Once denounced as racist

## Harvard biologist now fights for the environment

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — There's something vaguely unsettling about Edward O. Wilson's Harvard University office, and it doesn't take long to figure out what it is: The place is crawling with ants.

Amid books and microscopes, leaf-cutter ants stream along a three-foot twig looping from one plastic box to another beside Wilson's desk.

The ants have taken Wilson many places in his 63 years. They have made him one of the most important and controversial figures in modern biology.

In the 1970s, they led to his book "Sociobiology" — and to angry charges that he was promoting racism and sexism in the guise of evolutionary studies.

Now, in the 1990s, the ants have inspired a new book, "The Diversity of Life," in which he argues that preservation of the world's biological diversity — its wealth of wild plant and animal species — is central to the maintenance of life on Earth.

Suddenly, many of the same people who attacked Wilson less than 20 years ago — in one case, attacking him physically — are his allies, lauding him as an environmental champion. Wilson could gloat, but he'd much rather study ants.

Carefully placing a mounted specimen of *Phaedole longiscapa* under a microscope and adjusting the focus, Wilson asked a visitor to take a look. The strikingly beautiful image was of a monster with a gleaming golden head, long, sweeping antennae and coal-black compound eyes staring directly into the lens.

"I call it looking in the face of creation," he said. "You're looking at something that may be a million years old, and nobody's seen it before."

Wilson first became fascinated by ants when he was in his teens; he has since spent much of his life examining ants under the microscope, carefully recording and cataloging the

unique features of thousands of species.

As a student of myrmecology — the study of ants — Wilson easily might have faded away into the shadowy recesses of Harvard's natural history museum, home of the world's largest ant collection, with 1 million specimens.

Instead, he made the study of ants a central concern in biology, turning a scientific backwater into an exciting area of vigorous research.

In 1975, he took a step back from the miniature world of ants. Inspired by the lessons he had learned from these tiny insects, he published "Sociobiology: The New Synthesis," in which he looked at how genetics influenced human behavior.

He wrote, for example, that male dominance is common in many animal societies. That probably means it has a genetic origin, he wrote in a 1975 magazine article, and thus "men are likely to continue to play a disproportionate role in political life, business and science."

The response was predictable. The vitriol created at a 1978 meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Wilson was talking about the social lives of ants and the lessons they offer humans when protesters seized the stage and upended a pitcher of water on his head.

His crime, they said, was promoting a genetic determinism that could be used to justify social inequities — a sort of social survival-of-the-fittest. They said his theories were based on scant evidence and supported a racist and inequitable status quo.

Wilson's defense was that he was simply trying to apply evolutionary biology to human behavior.

Wilson was then a tenured Harvard professor, and already a

prominent figure in biology. But the intensity of the protest frightened him. "I thought my career was going up in flames," he said.

"In time I gave up open public lecturing, confining myself to talks and seminars to universities, colleges and professional groups," he wrote in a brief autobiography a few years ago.

He was particularly disturbed that some of his severest critics were Harvard colleagues, including the biologist Stephen Jay Gould, who recently reviewed Wilson's book on biodiversity.

Asked about his current feelings on the sociobiology dispute, Gould said only, "I'm not interested in discussing that in the context of this book, which I like very much."

Wilson is an unlikely candidate for notoriety. If anything, he's the image of the tweedy, retiring professor. His slender frame, sharp features and clipped brown hair give him, at 63, a boyish look.

He smiles easily and speaks in measured phrases sprinkled with literary references and anecdotes from a lifetime of often strenuous biological field work in the tropics, mostly in Latin America.

He is midway through a project to completely revise the scientific classification of some 300 ant species belonging to the genus *Phaedole* — a Herculean task that even fellow myrmecologists said he was crazy to attempt.

Wilson's research and travels haven't kept him away from Harvard classrooms, where he teaches a core course in evolution (he is prone to departing from the syllabus to discuss such subjects as "Monsters: Why We Love Them.")

He was awarded the National Medal of Science in 1977 and the

Crafoord Prize of the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences in 1990. He has written 13 books.

Wilson summed up much of his work on ants in a 1990 book titled simply "The Ants," written with Harvard colleague Bert Holldobler. Weighing in at about 7.5 pounds — or 100,000 times the weight of the typical ant — the book led to creation of the computer game *SimAnt* and won Wilson his second Pulitzer.

But "Sociobiology" is not forgotten. In 1989, fellows and officers of Animal Behavior Society overwhelmingly chose it as the most influential book in their field in 20 years.

Wilson has what he calls the "soundbite version" of the biodiversity crisis he explores in his new book. He described it recently at the Harvard Faculty Club over a dinner of hare consomme, wild boar, mallard and blackened venison. ("We still haven't hit any endangered species," he said.)

"The diversity of life on Earth is far greater than even most biologists recognize," he said. Fewer than 10 percent of the Earth's species have scientific names, he said, making it "a still mostly unexplored planet."

But he documents what he labels a galloping rate of loss of biodiversity, named and unnamed species alike.

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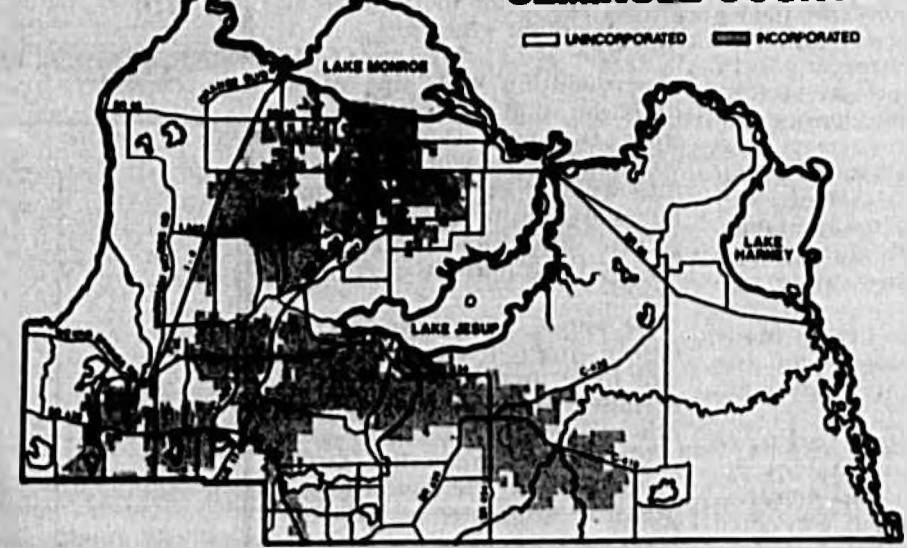

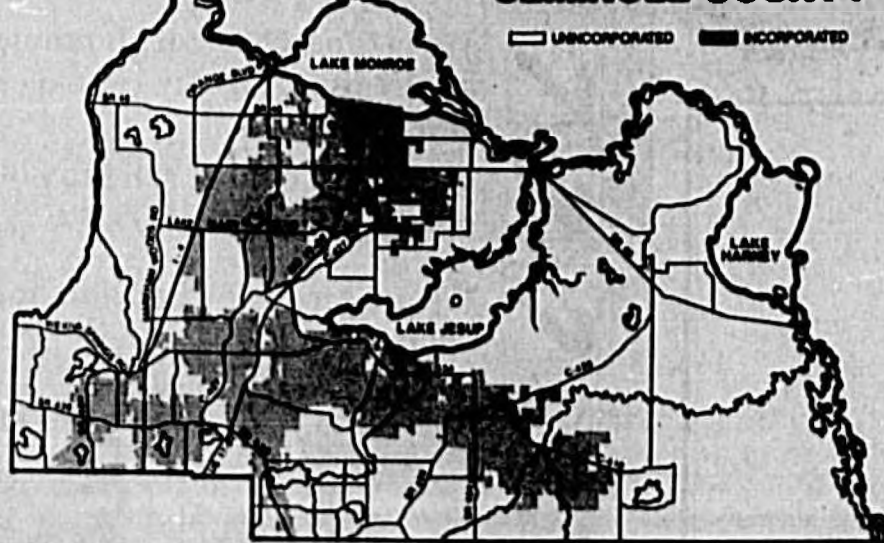

## Violence, bad habits cost nation plenty

CHICAGO — Violence and bad habits such as smoking, drinking, taking drugs and overeating cost the nation \$43 billion a year, or 5 percent of its health-care bill, the American Medical Association estimates.

Related expenses such as lost productivity boost the total to more than \$189.1 billion annually, according to an AMA report issued Monday.

Health-care costs from smoking were put at \$22 billion a

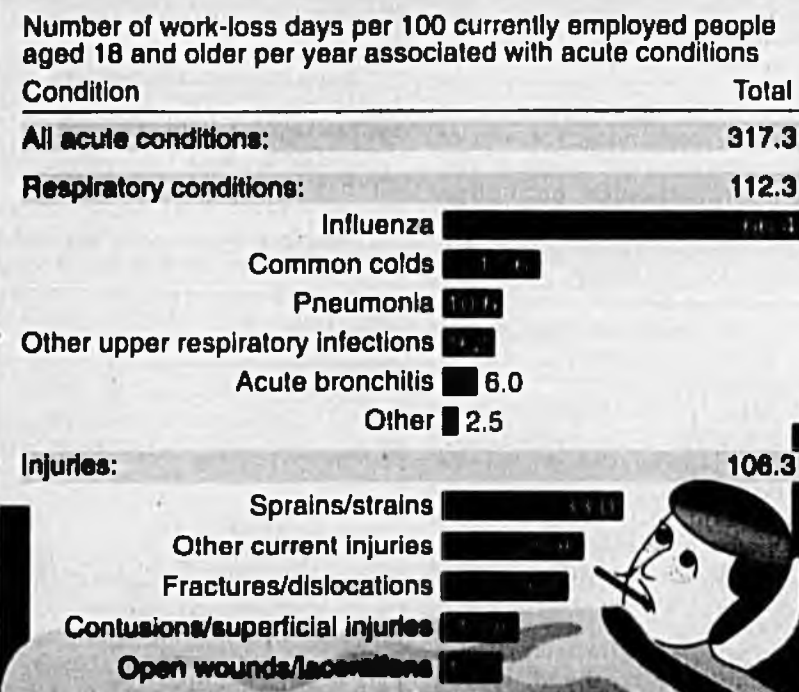
year, and alcohol-related health-care costs were estimated at \$13.5 billion.

Drug abuse cost \$2.1 billion in health-care services in 1985 and \$58.3 billion in total costs in 1988, including lost productivity and crimefighting expenses.

Violent injuries, such as shootings and assaults, accounted for \$5.3 billion in direct medical costs in 1985.

Diseases related to obesity and poor diets extremely costly, the report said. But it gave no estimate.

## Sick days



For every 100 employed people, 317 days are lost each year due to some form of acute illness. Respiratory conditions account for many of these sick days, particularly flu. Sprains and strains account for 33 lost days yearly.

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# Further evidence of bomb found at World Trade Center

NEW YORK — Traces of nitrate were found at the site of an explosion that rocked the World Trade Center, prompting police to say Saturday that the blast was almost certainly caused by a bomb, possibly planted by terrorists.

The chemical deposits alone are "not conclusive," Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly said. But taken together with other evidence, "it would buttress our position that we believe it to be a bomb."

Kelly said authorities received 19 telephone calls from "all sorts of groups and individuals" claiming responsibility for the explosion.

"It may be terrorist related," said James Fox, head of the FBI's New York office.

The toll from the explosion, which brought the city's financial center to a halt Friday, was at least five dead and more than 1,000 injured, not to mention an uncalculated loss of property and productivity.

Kelly said two people were still unaccounted for today.

"If indeed this is a terrorist attack — then no one is safe in any city," New York Mayor David Dinkins said as news of the tragedy reached him in Osaka, Japan.

The explosion in an underground parking garage turned Friday's lunch hour in the twin 110-story towers into a terrifying test of survival.

About 200 kindergartners and elementary school children were stranded on an observation deck 107 stories high, while 17 more youngsters and their adult chaperones were trapped in an elevator for five hours. A pregnant woman was plucked off the roof by a helicopter. Other people were trapped in elevators, or in rubble in the garage and a train station beneath it. Kelly, speaking at a news conference early this afternoon, said there were three reasons to believe the explosion was caused by a bomb: "The magnitude of the explosion, the fact that a significant amount of heat was generated, and the fact that traces of nitrate were found."

"It looks like a bomb (and) it smells like a bomb," Gov. Mario Cuomo said, although he stressed that it was too early to be certain.

Cuomo, who has an office in one of the damaged towers, toured the area for 20 minutes this morning, walking down to the crumpled parking garage to see the enormous crater carved by the blast.

New Jersey Gov. Jim Florio also visited the site. The World Trade Center is operated by the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, a quasi-governmental entity chartered by both states.

President Clinton promised in his weekly radio address today that "the full measure of federal law enforcement resources will be brought to bear on this investigation."

While the explosion's source remained in some doubt, its impact was swift and certain.

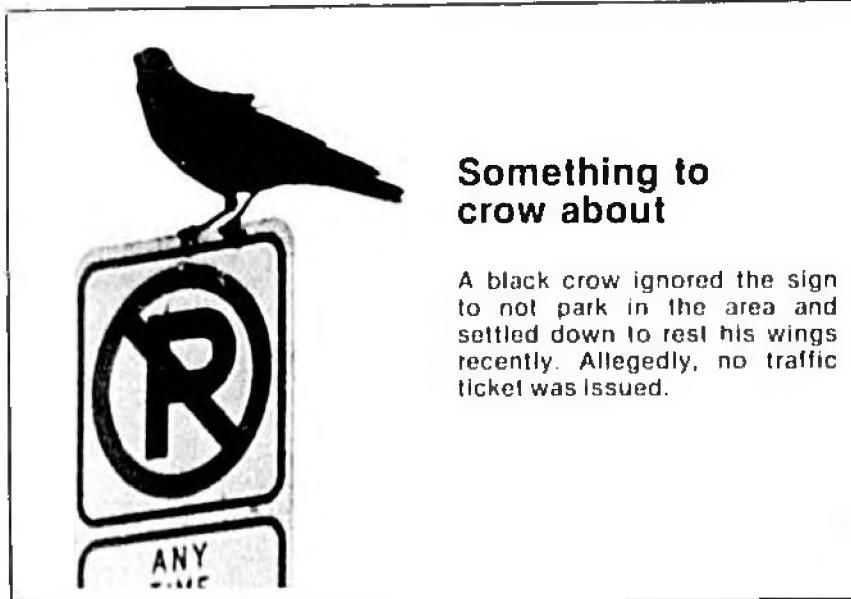
The blast hit at 12:18 p.m., creating a 200-by-100-foot crater in the garage below the center's Vista Hotel. It demolished parked cars — including a fleet of Secret Service vehicles — tossed beams and concrete debris into a commuter train station and jolted both towers, a

virtual small city of some 130,000 people.

"It felt like an airplane hit the building," said 34-year-old broker Bruce Pomper.

Electricity and heat were cut off to the entire complex.

Some broke windows to get air. Others remained stranded for hours in elevators, frozen between floors when the power went out.

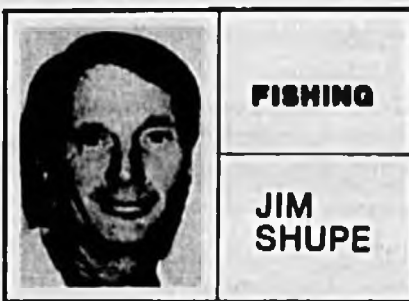
Trailing Lepore was Eva Jackson, who notched a 513.

## Misinformation surrounds gators

### SHUPE'S SCOOP

"Wild" alligators are actually safer to be around than alligators that have become accustomed to humans. Statistics clearly demonstrate that alligators who have lost their natural fear of man due to feeding, etc. are much more prone to attack than animals in the wild.

### FISHING FORECAST

Bass fishing has been excellent in local lakes and ponds. Plastic worms and shiners are the top offerings for lunker largemouths. Fishing in the river has been tough due to high water levels.

Specks are red hot in Lake Jessup. Look for a crowd of boats and fish in that general area, with Missouri minnows.

Sebastian Inlet has been slow with only a few big winter flounder, and a few scattered redfish, sea trout, and bluefish. The outgoing tide is best, and large live shrimp are the best bait.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral has little to report in the way of offshore action due to high seas and dirty water. Inside the Port, flounder, bluefish, and sheepshead are biting on a steady basis. Guide Troy Perez reports good action with trout and redfish on the flats of the Banana and Indian rivers.

Ponce Inlet has been rough due to high winds, but sheepshead are biting at a furious pace along both jetties and back in the river along channel markers and bridge pilings.

Pity the poor gator, since it is probably the victim of more imagination and less real knowledge than any other member of Florida's wild kingdom. People either like or dislike the alligator, and an indifferent attitude is rare among those who come in contact with this sometimes large reptile.

Wildlife officers of the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission investigate hundreds of complaints about alligators each year. Most of the complaints can be classified into four general groups:

1) People who have little or no information or knowledge about the alligator.

2) People who insist on making pets of alligators and in turn the alligator loses its natural fear of man.

3) Those people who invade the alligator's natural territory where complications arise from the close association of human dwellings and alligators.

4) Illegal hunting or illegal traffic in alligators and alligator hides.

In 1961, the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission adopted a regulation which eliminated the hunting season and provided full protection for the alligator.

When you see an alligator, the best thing to do usually is leave it alone. Never bother an alligator and it will not bother you; therefore, you will probably never have any trouble with an alligator.

The longest alligator on record was a little over 14 feet. There

# Clinton talks bring local comment

President Bill Clinton has delivered his State of the Union address, and made several speeches regarding the economic problems of the nation. Many local businesses are responding.

• **ENERGY TAX** — AAA in Heathrow is studying President Clinton's proposed energy tax. In an address to Congress, he called for a tax on BTUs, or British Thermal Units. BTUs measure the heat content of energy.

AAA officials say Clinton's plan leans more heavily on oil than on other fuels. Tom Schroeder, manager of Public Affairs for AAA Florida said, "AAA is studying the President's proposal, but most experts agree a BTU tax is the lesser of all evils when compared with other possible taxes on energy."

He continued, "It's more equitable than a straight gas tax because it doesn't focus solely on one segment of society. We hope the President and Congress work to minimize the impact of this tax on the

average consumer and that any revenue collected is used to fund transportation improvement projects the President mentioned in his speech."

• **TAX INCREASES** — Howard Howland of Contemporary Mortgage Services, Inc., of Altamonte Springs is studying the President's tax plan calling for \$246 billion in increases over the next four years. Howland believes it will have a positive effect on the nation's housing industry by stimulating home sales.

"The President is trying to get the deficit under control and that is definitely going to help long term interest rates," he said. "Mortgage interest rates should stay around 7 1/2 percent with very fluctuation."

He continued, "That's very encouraging for prospective home buyers or those thinking of refinancing existing mortgages."

The seven year old company serves six Central Florida counties including Seminole.

• **REAL ESTATE** — "President Bill Clinton's economic plan offers exciting news to the real estate industry in Central Florida," said Greater Orlando Association

of Realtors President Gary Williams.

According to Williams, the package is a recognition by President Clinton that real estate and housing make substantial contributions to the economy.

"The residential numbers support the fact that our economy is on the right track," Williams said. "If the President can get his plan enacted, Central Florida could see a renewed commitment by businesses to invest in commercial real estate. When this takes place, our community will enjoy a much stronger financial future."

• **EDUCATION** — Primrose School is seeking a franchise to operate in the Sanford area. "We share President Clinton's resolve to rescue America's faltering school system," said Primrose President Paul Erwin. "There is an important role to be played, and profits to be made by the private sector."

Erwin points out that the government's National Education Goals Panel has established preschool preparation as its number one priority. "But private enterprise can do it more efficiently, more effectively, and more profitably," he said.

### Minority business

The Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce held a Minority Business Council Breakfast earlier this month. The event drew an excellent turnout of business people.

During the meeting, President of the Black Business Investment Fund of Central Florida, Inez Long, at podium, discussed methods of obtaining financing in order to establish new business operations in the local area. The breakfast was held in the meeting room of the chamber headquarters, 400 E. First Street in downtown Sanford.

According to Lucy Carter with Commissioner Bob Crawford's office, "It's easy and profitable to promote products from the Sunshine State, especially at this time of year, when the Florida harvest of fresh fruits and vegetables is at a peak."

She continued, "And there's variety too, because Florida agriculture produces more than 240 commodities. The incentive program is just an added bonus for smart retailers."

The department will provide colorful point-of-purchase materials incorporating the "Fresh from Florida" and "from Florida" logos for use in advertising and store displays.

The "Fresh from Florida" logo is for use on all fresh agricultural commodities such as fruits, vegetables, foliage, aquaculture products, poultry and eggs.

To qualify for the incentive program, a company or organization must be a member of the Florida Agricultural Promotional Campaign, which provides identification of Florida agricultural products for consumer awareness.

Under the advertising incentive program, ads must run in print media as a feature or sub-feature between March 1 and April 30. Prizes will be based on the number of stores covered by each ad and the number of ads run on separate dates.

Lt. Jim Brantley, of Seminole County Sheriff's Office, has been teaching firearms safety at Seminole Community College since 1973. The classes originally began as a program for just women to teach them several things: Defensive tactics and safety in the home, automobile and on the road.

He recalls, "One local doctor came to my classes to find out something about handguns. He did not even bring a weapon with him and had to use my weapon to shoot on the range. After that class and now that I get to see him every now and then, I find out that between him and his family they have over 40 different weapons. I think it has become a hobby of his to collect guns."

The class which begins on Wednesday night starts with the concealed weapons permit and how you get it, the laws concerning handguns with or without the permit, and what and when you can shoot because a permit does not just give you the right to shoot.

On Thursday, the students learn law. The class goes over when you can retreat and when you don't have to retreat, when you are in your home, automobile and out in the street. Actual cases that have already been settled are reviewed by the classes.

The nomenclatures of the different types of weapons are reviewed. Brantly goes over all the different types — autoloaders, single and double action autoloaders. They go over what .22 and .38 caliber means and what type of weapon is best for a certain student. The class discusses whether a revolver is best or an autoloader would be better for that person's situation.

"I tell all my students not to buy a weapon until after you have attended class," exclaimed Brantly, "because between my assistant and myself, we always

bring at least 15 different types of weapons to the classes. That way you sure can find out what will fit your situation best. Even the weapon shops will tell you if you plan to attend Brantly's classes, do not buy a weapon until you complete the class."

Range day is Saturday. There is no limit as to the number of rounds a student can shoot on the range. Brantly claims he will stay there until 5 p.m. if you want to shoot. A person does not shoot on the range until Brantly or his assistant personally instructs the student on loading and unloading the weapon.

It is to be emphasized that the student does not shoot one shot until he has been instructed there on the spot as to what to do. When the instructor feels the student is qualified, no matter whether it takes 10 minutes or 30 to fire, the instructor then will give the student the command to commence firing.

Finally, when each student has finished shooting, the instructors pull them aside individually and show them how to break down their weapon — how to take the autoloader apart, how to take the cylinder out of the gun and how to clean the gun. So before students leave the firearms security class, they know how to dismantle and assemble the weapon.

All the necessary forms and information are also made available so that a student may apply for his license to carry a concealed weapon. For additional information about classes starting in mid-March, call Seminole Community College 323-1450, ext. 664.

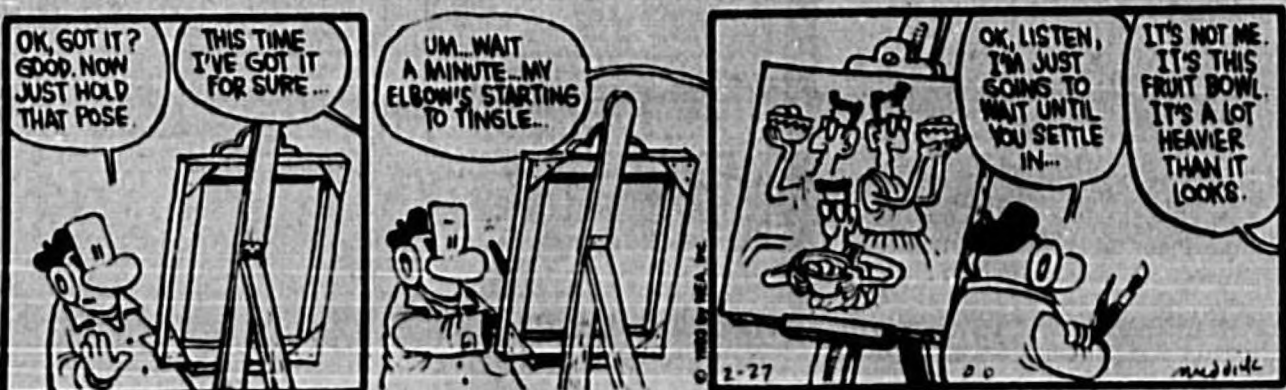

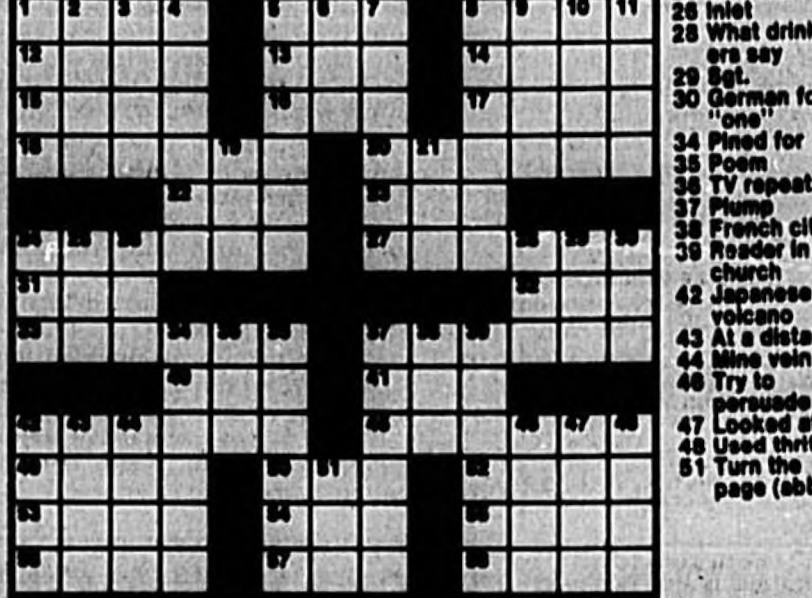

Aggressive competitive bidding works in three ways. It may push your opponents overboard. Or it may blow them into a lucrative contract they weren't going to reach if left to sail unassisted. Or the information you give to the declarer will allow him to find a safe route into harbor. If you had passed throughout, he would have run aground.

An old-fashioned player opens that West hand with two diamonds, a weak two-bid. But a modern gladiator thinks this is wimpy. He starts with a three-bid.

After North's take-out double and East's raise to five diamonds, South was under pressure. However, with length and strength in the majors, he competed with a five-heart bid. North could hardly do less than

**raise to six.**

Declarer ruffed the opening diamond lead in dummy, drew trumps and cashed dummy's top clubs, discarding a spade from hand. Then he eliminated the minors, ruffing the club three in hand and the diamond 10 in the dummy.

Without any intervening bidding, declarer would now play a spade to his ace and a spade toward dummy's queen. However, that tack couldn't work here. West was known to have started with two hearts, four clubs and at least six diamonds. He could have at most one spade.

Instead, South called for a low spade from the dummy and played low from hand. Whichever defender won the trick would be enplayed. West would have to concede a ruff-and-discard. East would have to do likewise or lead away from the spade king.
