### Big Ten Coaches Have Set Nov. 26 As Date When Schedules Will Be Drafted

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Ath-  
letic directors and football coaches  
of the Western conference have  
chosen the eve of the Army-Navy game  
to draft the 1927 football  
schedules. They will meet here  
Friday, Nov. 26 and intend to wit-  
ness the gridiron spectacle after  
arranging their names for next  
season.

Rumblings of new alignments  
among the traditional Big Ten oppo-  
nents were heard today, the annual  
Chicago-Northwestern series being  
one which gossip says is  
likely to be broken. Illinois is  
ready to accept the place in the  
northwestern program for 1927,  
and the purple also are anxious to  
arrange a big inter-sectional game  
to fill their new double-deck stadium  
with its seating capacity of  
about 70,000.

A. A. Stagg, director of ath-  
letics at Chicago, remains silent  
on the reported break with North-  
western.

Chicago has an engagement with  
Pennsylvania to be played in the  
West in 1927, but it is question-  
able if Illinois and Pennsylvania  
will clash again next year.

The Michigan-Minnesota and the  
Indiana-Northwestern double-  
headers of this year undoubtedly  
will not be arranged for 1927, but  
it, the coaches do not want any  
more of the double-header games,  
provided it is possible to arrange  
schedules without them.

Although the Big Ten rules pro-  
vide that each Big Ten team will  
play four games within the con-  
ference, John L. Griffith, commis-  
sioner of athletics, is opposed to  
the double-header idea and hopes  
it can be avoided.

Coach Rockne, of Notre Dame,  
who has been playing conference  
opponents and also beating them,  
hopes to arrange at least three  
games with Big Ten foes next sea-  
son. Rockne will play the Uni-  
versity of Southern California here  
giving, using the Soldier's Field  
as the battleground.

Rockne hopes to renew the con-  
tract with Northwestern. The  
games between the two schools  
have provided one of the high  
lights of the football season. Notre  
Dame also will play the Army next  
year and also may again engage  
Minnesota.

Coach Yost, of Michigan, has  
arranged to play Navy at Ann  
Arbor on November 12, next year,  
and will dedicate the monster new  
Michigan stadium, with its seat-  
ing capacity of 75,000, with the  
Ohio State game on October 22,  
1927.

In announcing that the Buckeyes  
will share in the decennial cere-  
monies, Yost set at rest rumors  
that an eastern eleven, probably  
Harvard, would be asked to come  
to Ann Arbor for this game.

Purdue's showing against Navy

share of attractive games. Both  
Purdue and Indiana will go East  
to meet Harvard next fall.
