

Yank Planes Batter Red Supply Lines

SAIGON (AP) — American warplanes kept up intensified pressure on North Vietnam's battered supply lines Tuesday with raids from the suburbs of Hanoi to within 30 miles of the Red Chinese frontier.

The U.S. Command said the principal targets were rail and road bridges around the North Vietnamese capital, including the big span across the Canal des Rapides only five miles from the heavily defended North Vietnamese heartland, but there was no report of any losses. The previous day it was the fourth attack on the bridge, one of Hanoi's two chief rail routes to China.

Record Money Bill Near OK

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate moved quickly today to work out differences with the House on the nation's largest single appropriation in history, a \$7.1 billion defense spending bill.

The Senate overwhelmingly approved the bill Tuesday night, 85 to 2, after turning back several attempts to trim the total and hearing that the Vietnam war may require additional billions later.

The Senate's final version was more than \$1.45 billion less than President Johnson had asked and more than \$15 million less than the House voted. Voting against the bill were Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., Ernest Gruening, D-Alaska, and Stephen M. Young, D-Ohio, opponents of Vietnam war policy.

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—Leaders of the Florida Education Association met with Gov. Claude Kirk Tuesday but came away without any indication that the governor might change his mind and call a legislative session for schools.

Founding his desk in a sometimes stormy meeting with four members of the FEA's executive committee, Kirk also rejected a request from FEA president Dexter Hagman for a "blue ribbon committee to look at the education crisis."

"I don't agree that there is a crisis," Kirk said. "Anytime you hear the drums that lead to hysteria."

After the brief meeting, Hagman said he felt the governor and the teachers were not closer together in the educational financing battle than he had the previous day.

Analysis Of The News

WASHINGTON (AP)—Around his head the doves and the hawk can see and President John F. Kennedy along, keeping the war going, sending in more men, asking a tax boost to help pay the bill. This week a dove and a hawk swooped at the same time, and nothing illustrates better the fix he's in.

The dove was one of Johnson's fellow Democrats Sen. J. W. Fulbright of Arkansas, chairman of the Senate's powerful Foreign Relations Committee. Fulbright, Johnson's most liberal critic, wants the war toned down.

The hawk was the leader of House Republicans, Rep. Gerald R. Ford of Michigan, who has backed the President consistently by the war. But he, too, has been a critic, constantly reminding Fulbright that Johnson wasn't fighting it hard enough or explaining enough. He wants the war intensified.

Fulbright has read many ominous things into the war and this week came out with a new one. He linked Vietnam with the Negro riots in this country, saying "the Great Society" has become a sick society by trying to cope with Vietnam and the riots at the same time.

"Each war feeds on the other," he said. "All large because of neglect resulting from the war. The Great Society with foreign involvements, our cities are exploding in violent protest against generations of social injustice."

He asked, "How can we commend democratic social reform in Latin America when Newark, Detroit and Milwaukee are providing explosive evidence of our own inadequate efforts at democratic social reform?"

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Telltale Signs Of Fall Are Fast Nearing

The telltale signs of fall are fast approaching. In one nine-day period between September 14 and September 22 the nation's Big Four automakers will begin selling their new models, but already the tension is building with preview showings. This isn't going to be an ordinary season.

To begin with, seldom have the automakers planned a season with as much care. Having suffered two long and difficult years they are determined to make this an exceptional one.

To condition themselves for the new season they have had to changeovers earlier than in past years and their investment of the 1968 models is scheduled to be the earliest in the past few years.

They have also cleared the road to one of the biggest obstructions to sales, the safety problem. Most automakers now have met the safety standards demanded by federal authorities.

The advertisements are prepared and mailed. The promotional hoopla is all cleared for use. The new models are being shown from production lines. The dealers are standing staunchly confident beside the new cars as thousands of customers are ready to make deals.

The one thing that sends a chill down the back of the industry is the possibility of a strike. A very real possibility this year against at least one of the big three—General Motors, Chrysler, Ford.

Negotiations for a new contract are now under way. A strike deadline of Sept. 6 is approaching fast.

Barring a strike, the experts say sales could exceed last year's. In fact, imports included, this would be an improvement of about 50,000 cars.

The big three—General Motors, Chrysler, Ford.

Dealers inventories of old cars are lower than they were at this time a year ago. There is less of a backlog of 1967 models to be sold off.

Safety features, the absence of which might have caused some customers to postpone buying 1967 models, are installed on most of this year's cars. For the time being, that problem is licked.

Foreign competition in the U.S. market might not be as severe this year because some foreign makers are finding it more expensive to adapt to the new safety standards.

People are loaded with cash. This year, having saved as much as 4.5 per cent of their disposable income pay for the home pay through much of the year. This is a very high rate and leaves potential customers very capable of buying.

The clouds in the new season include higher prices, perhaps about 10 to 15% a car, the lack of marked model changes—the threat of an income surtax and the subtraction from customer lists of those who bought late 1967 models to avoid price increases.

It is debatable, of course, as to whether the number of customers who have delayed purchases cancels out, exceeds or falls short of the number who bought early to beat price increases.

Extra excitement this year is added by the comeback attempt of American Motors, a company now living on borrowed cash, the good will of banks and the calculated hope that their new models, introduced Tuesday, will catch on.

American is by most measures one of the largest companies in America. But measured against the Big Three automotive giants—GM, Ford, Chrysler—it is a pygmy.

Measured in profits, American is the smallest. In the nine months that ended June 30 the company reported losses of \$42.5 million.

It hopes that by increasing sales to 300,000 cars from 250,000 by enlarging its share of the market to nearly 4 per cent from 3 per cent—it can turn the loss to a profit.

As for the new season begins, accompanied by school days, the World Series, football games, falling leaves and new cars. Excitement is in the air.

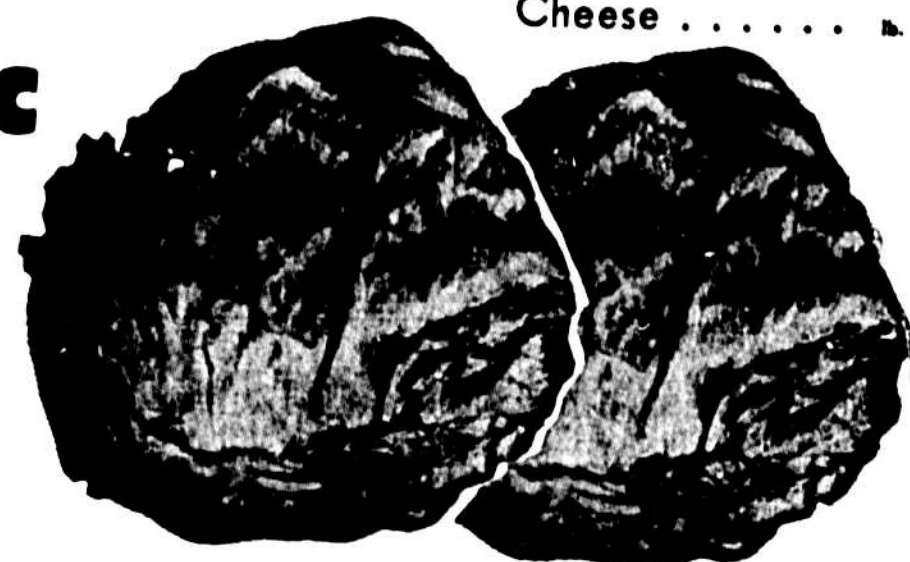

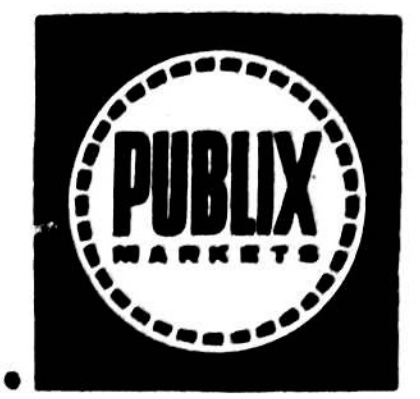

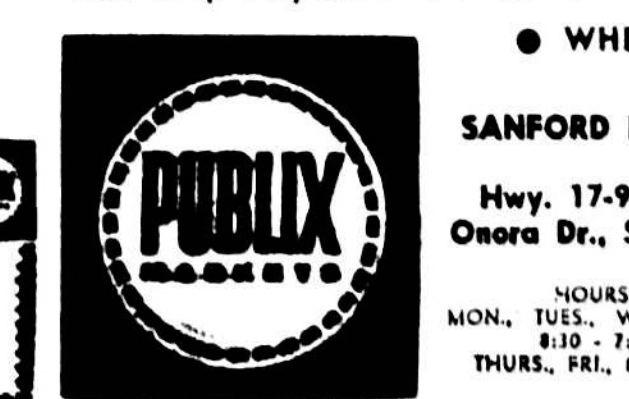

Refugees Lag In Return Home

The return of Arab war refugees to their homes in Jerusalem and Jordan lagged for the second day Sunday, while in the Sinai Desert, Israeli troops secured El Arish for Arab arms and organizers of a general strike.

In Baghdad, the Arab economic warfare convulse ended with indications of a continuing halt on whether to continue the embargo on Arab oil exports to Britain, West Germany and the United States.

The International Red Cross reported that 1,676 Jordanian war refugees crossed the Jordan River Sunday to go back to their homes. Aided in the 350 that crossed the Allenby Bridge and another bridge at Umm Al Sheikh. Another 2,221 of about 27,000 refugees were repatriated in the first two days. The Israelis stopped the refugee traffic Saturday, but only nine days are left until the Israeli deadline of Aug. 23 to complete the massive repatriation. The Red Cross said 2,500 refugees were expected to cross the Jordan today, although Israel announced it would accept 2,000. The Israeli interior minister said that 300 more Jordanians would have been accepted in Sunday's crossings, but Jordan appeared to have trouble rounding up refugees and taking them to the two bridges. The Red Cross says it will take until the end of October to get all the refugees back home and is negotiating with Israel to extend the deadline. But all Israeli newspapers are arguing against any extension, and Premier Levi Eshkol said Sunday that the Aug. 23 deadline still stands.

The Israelis appeared to be rejecting few refugees Sunday. In contrast with Friday when mostly women, children and old men were accepted and young men appeared to be regarded as security risks.

Many in Israel have expressed fear that the refugees will become a fifth column in Israeli-controlled territories. In resulting violence against the war victors.

In the Sinai, a successful general strike closed every bar and business in El Arish, scene of bitter fighting between the Israelis and the Egyptians in the June 5-6 war. The strike was called to protest Israeli restrictions which the Arabs claim have resulted in total unemployment.

The final recommendations of the economic and oil ministers from 13 Arab states who met in Baghdad were not revealed. They are to be submitted to the Arab foreign ministers' conference opening Saturday in Khartoum, the Sudanese capital, to prepare for a summit meeting of their country's leaders on Aug. 23.

'Going To Do It' Lawmaker Says

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Sen. John Mathews, a Democrat from Jacksonville, says that pessimism is turning to optimism in the Florida Legislature as the struggle for a revised state constitution continues.

"The people who three weeks ago said 'You're wasting your time' are saying now they believe we're going to do it," Mathews said.

Mathews said he is pleased that some of the "doubting Thomases" are changing their tune.

So far, Mathews has been the key in the Senate during the special session on constitutional revision. He has stood repeatedly to deliver telling points, spot flaws in amendments, or clarify an issue where his colleagues were apparently on the point of bewildering.

Mathews, who will be Senate president during the next regular session unless Republicans win a majority, said there is a certain to be plenty of debate among attorneys in the Legislature over proposals for the judicial structure in the new constitution.

"If it gets too controversial," he said, "we can always keep what we've got."

Gov. Claude Kirk has added 10 days to the original 30-day special session he called to deal with the revision, and Sen. Mathews thinks the job may be finished in 10 days.

"At the rate we are going," he said, "I think the chances are excellent that we will make it."

A veteran legislative observer and chairman of the state constitutional revision commission that drew up a proposed constitution, says the remaining 10 days may not be enough time.

"They will have to increase their tempo to finish on time," said Chesterfield Smith of Bartow.

Smith said he is "hopeful" that they will come out with a document that will be better than the one we recommended.

Smith said the Legislature not only is making substantial progress in its mammoth task, but many changes which are receiving majority votes in the Legislature "are even improvements on what we suggested."

The constitution won't be ready for the voters when the Legislature gets through with it, though, Mathews said that a "group of English professors and real good lawyers" are to spend about two weeks checking each word and comma in the document.

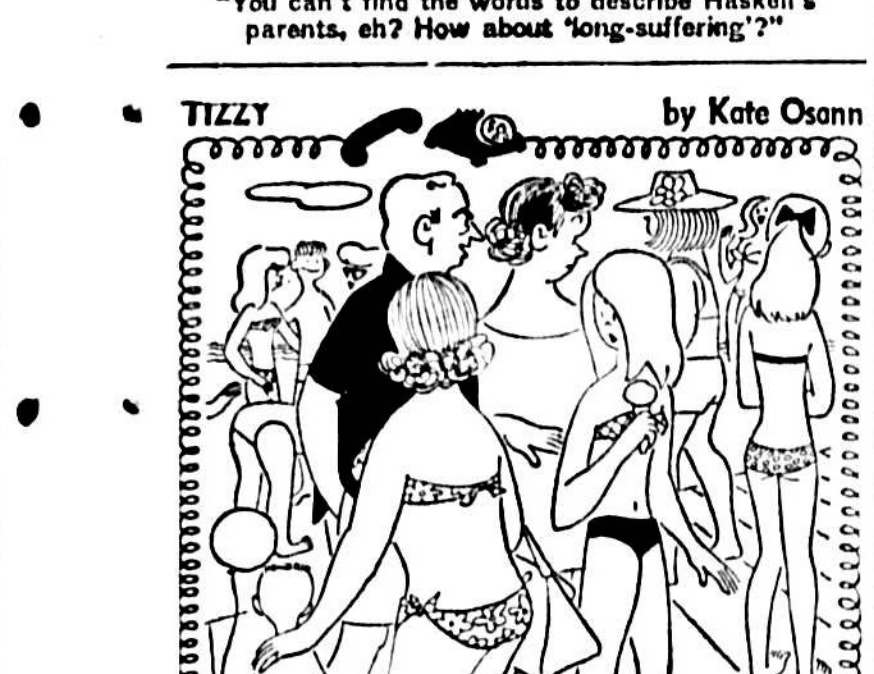
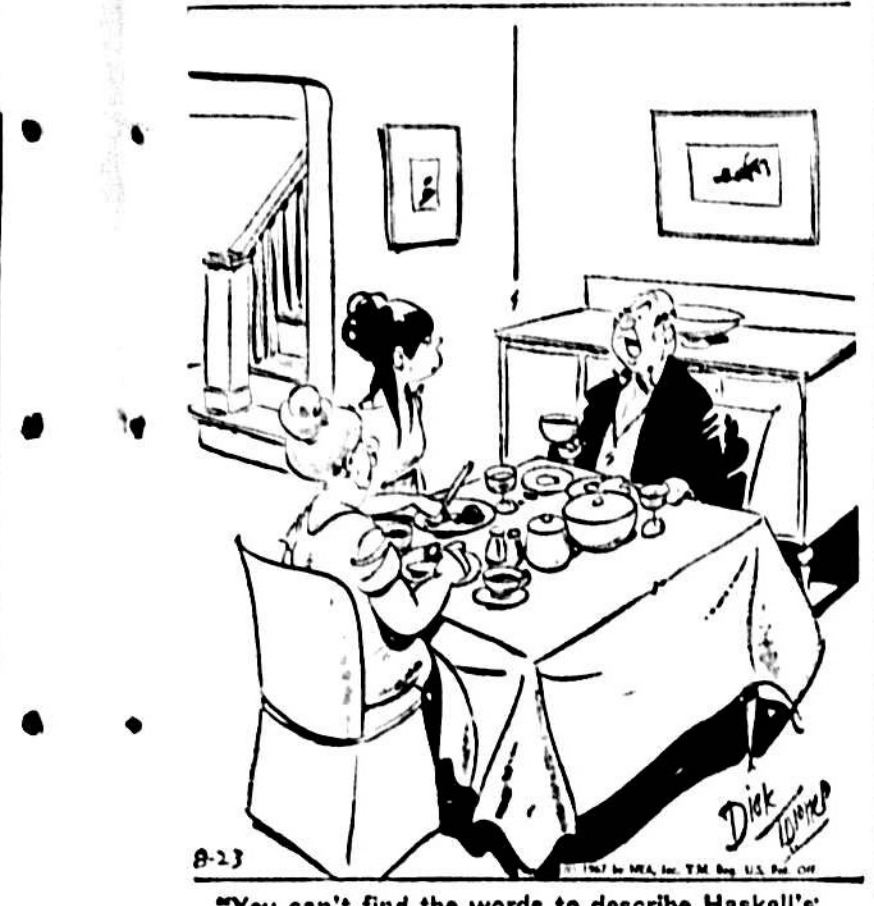
