

You Are Called

Pastor's Corner



By Rev. Harold A. Harris First Christian Church

Ecclesia, the Greek word for church, is used in the New Testament to refer to the chosen people of God. The basic meaning of ecclesia referred to a gathering or assembly of people who were held together by a common purpose. In the New Testament, ecclesia describes the people who belong to God. Those who compose the church belong to God precisely because they are called by God and to God so that they might

Church is to be called ... for service, not status; for belief, not for speculation; fur obedience, not for disobedience. When one comes to confess Christ as Savior, he becomes changed, you can really call it "changed Lives"! One is

called to slavery so that as a slave he may receive freedom. To be a slave means nothing less than that one's entire life is under the influence and control of God. Control by God does not mean pupperty; it does mean, however, that the believer's life is wholly and totally committed to God and is obedient to his divine will.

From what is a man set free? As a new creature in Christ, the Christian no longer clings to that which he gave up when he accepted the call of Christ, but looks ahead to the life of freedom which has ween bestowed upon him, rie is a ite. man who submits to the highest master and finds in His service self-realization and happiness. Freedom in slavery also means freedom from slavery - the slavery of the world. Although the believer is in the world, he is set apart from the world. His slavery to God means that while he is not a slave to the world he is sent into the world to save the world. Freedom from the world means life in the Spirit, which is the ultimate aim of the follower of God.

In his letter to the Romans Paul writes, "For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set me free from the law of sin and death" (Romans 8:2). The called one of God is not in bondage to sin, for sin has no claim on him. The divine authority assures the believer that sin is overcome.

One is called to die in order that he may possess life. Stated another way the sentence, would read, "To live is death, but to die is life." The death which leads to life is not the physical death, but a spiritual death. Death, a thing of great value, is achieved when everything that prevented

acceptance of God's call is overcome and destroyed. The nature of the life which one possesses as a result of this peculiar death demands a forward vision; that is to say, once a man dies this death he can never acquire his former status as one who has not yet died and still possesses life. The death is once for all and the life is once for all. The believer is given a life which is both eternal and temporal: life is the present. "... behold, the kingdom of God is within you" are the words of Jesus.

One is called to be a saint while he is a sinner. Characteristic of the saint is that he is called to transcend himself in order that he might be saved from himself. He is transformed by the hand of God, making possible a new identification of selfhood in the Spirit. Sainthood calls one to a higher life in Christ which cannot be known apart from acceptance of his call. The saint is called to order his life. Ordering one's life involves two things: one, bringing order out of chaos and confusion, and, second, accepting the Lordship of Christ over the world and himself. Thus the believer, although he has known sin and the guilt and reality of being sunful, is free from sin by virture of his acceptance of God's finished work at Calvary, "He whom the son makes fran is frag indead " There being fran from the imprisonment to sin, the believer in the New Testament sense is called, to

One is called to eternity while he exists within the sphere of the temporal. The man of faith whom God calls is quite unusual; for he exists neither in eternity nor in temporality alone, but in both at the same time. He is free from the temporal, and the temporal has no claim on him save that a physical death is required of him. The believer is called from the temporal world to him who is eternity itself so that he might be transformed; and then he is given the divine commission to bring eternity into the temporal by witnessing to the newness of his creation. His witness is from God to man; from the eternal to the temporal.



Editorial Comment

Law Courts And Politics Don't Mix

Entrance of the law courts into the political arena has done nothing to clarify the already overcast climate which has, unhappily, enshrouded the convening of the National Democratic nominating convention in Miami Beach.

This is most regrettable although probably unavoidable when the truly revolutionary moves the democrats have made to bring about a national convention which is truly representauve of the nation in terms of 1972.

For what has taken place during the four years since the disastrous 1968 Democratic convention in Chicago within the ranks of that party is something which deserves to have the best chance possible to succeed with no booby traps set when it tries to put its best foot forward. Blame for the present confrontation between

the vigorous backers of front-runner Senator George McGovern of South Dakota, whose win over Senator Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota in the "winner-take-all" California primary gave him an apparent unbeatable lead in delegate strength, and the old-line Democratic leaders can be placed on several shoulders.

Recourse to the cours for decision as to whether or not the party's Credential Committee's ruling that the "winner-take-all" principle violated the basic principle of the new Democratic emphasis on proportional representation brought the courts-willy-nillyinto this political dispute.

Indeed, now the disagreements and the very high feelings which are visible within the McGovern ranks and those who oppose his strong drive for a first-ballot nomination next week, have gone to the highest court with Chief Justice Warren Burger being asked by both sides to reconvene the court which is now in recess.

This may be the only way that this dispute can be settled. But it surely does arouse doubts as to the implications which such a course

After all, the reforms which were debated and determined by the McGovern committee are the truly important political facts of the Democratic convention. These were decided upon long before the South Dakotan achieved the political clout which his present front-runner and possible presidential nominee status bestows. Assembling at Miami Beach are the greatest



The Labor Savers Pave Profit Path

Studies indicate it is now becoming considerably more profitable than in the past to replace men with machines and equipment. And this trend favoring the machine is

The figures in fact indicate it is now approximately two times as profitable to replace men with equipment on the average as it was 25 years ago. In part, this is due to major technological advances in equipment. In part it is because (with the higher standard of living Americans have come to expect) hourly labor costs have gone up much more rapidly than prices of box saving devices. Charte presented by the Morgan

Guaranty Survey seem to indicate in fact that hourly

labor costs in recent years may have risen at more than twice the rate of equipment prices. More rapid modernization of plant, of course, is long overdue. Some of our major competitors had their industries bombed out in World War II and have been modernizing with vigor ever since, aided by advanced U.S. technology, dollar aid, considerable American investment and their own intensified industrial research. Economically, in the past several years American researchers have grown far less worried about the indus trial application of science and technology in Soviet industry, and a great deal more worried competitively

about the marked advances in friendly nations such as West Germany and Japan The expectation among some knowledgeable economic analysts is that U.S. industry in the years just ahead may step up considerably its investment in efficiencyincreasing equipment-perhaps concentrating more on efficient production rather than greater output.

Some economists fear a marked trend in this direction will add heavily to the inflation pressure when combined with increased consumer spending and government defi-

But past records indicate that over the long pull those industries which have modernized have, on the whole, raised prices more slowly than those which have not. The inflation problem is rather that those industries which have been the slowest to adopt labor-saving devices have found their costs spiraling. Economists this reporter has talked to are especially

concerned in this regard about schools, hospitals, banks and other financial institutions, trading companies, real estate firms and local state and federal governments. If the same revolutionary changes could take place in these areas as have come about in farming and manufacturing, it would be possible to effect great savings or increase enormously the amount or quality of services

The pressure of labor and professional costs is even greater here than in manufacturing because in most instances wages and fees form such a high percentage of

But the prospects here are discouraging. Conferences on the application of labor saving devices to government and the major service industries, which this reporter has attended more often than not end up in generalities or in strong statements that major advances are next to mpossible because of the very necessary human relationships and judgments required in these fields.



"In the meantime I've been fighting and he's been retired to a chicken plantation (Frazier owns a plantation in South Carolina). "I think it'll be this year. Right now, it's him that's ducking, I tnink he's still shook up from the fierce beating I gave him."

Ali stopped Patterson, a twotime champion, after 12 rounds Nov. 22, 1965, while Ali was still champion.

For this scheduled 12-rounder, which will be seen on closedcircuit television, Ali is guaranteed \$250,000 against 35 per cent of the gate while Patterson is guaranteed \$125,000 against 25 per cent.
