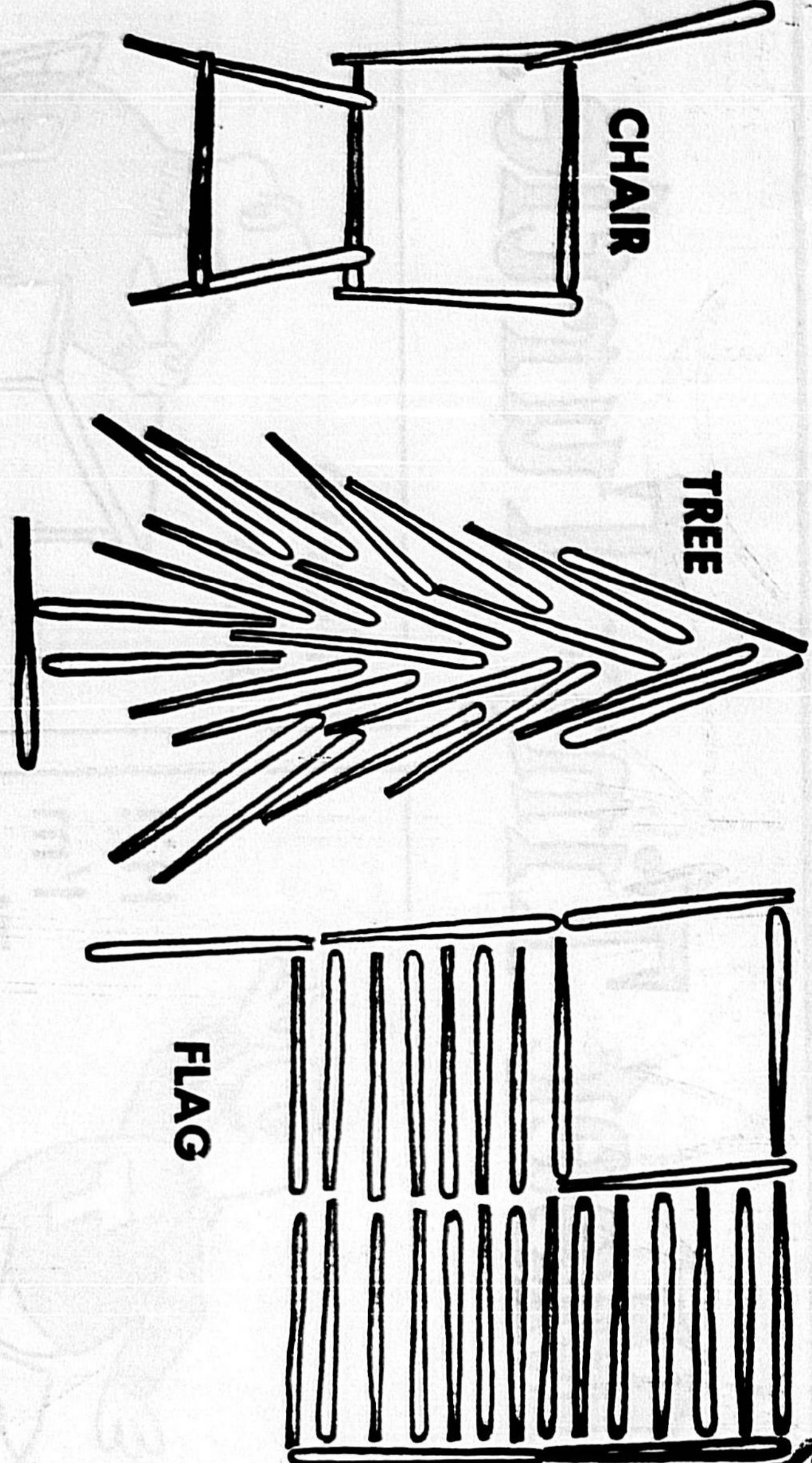
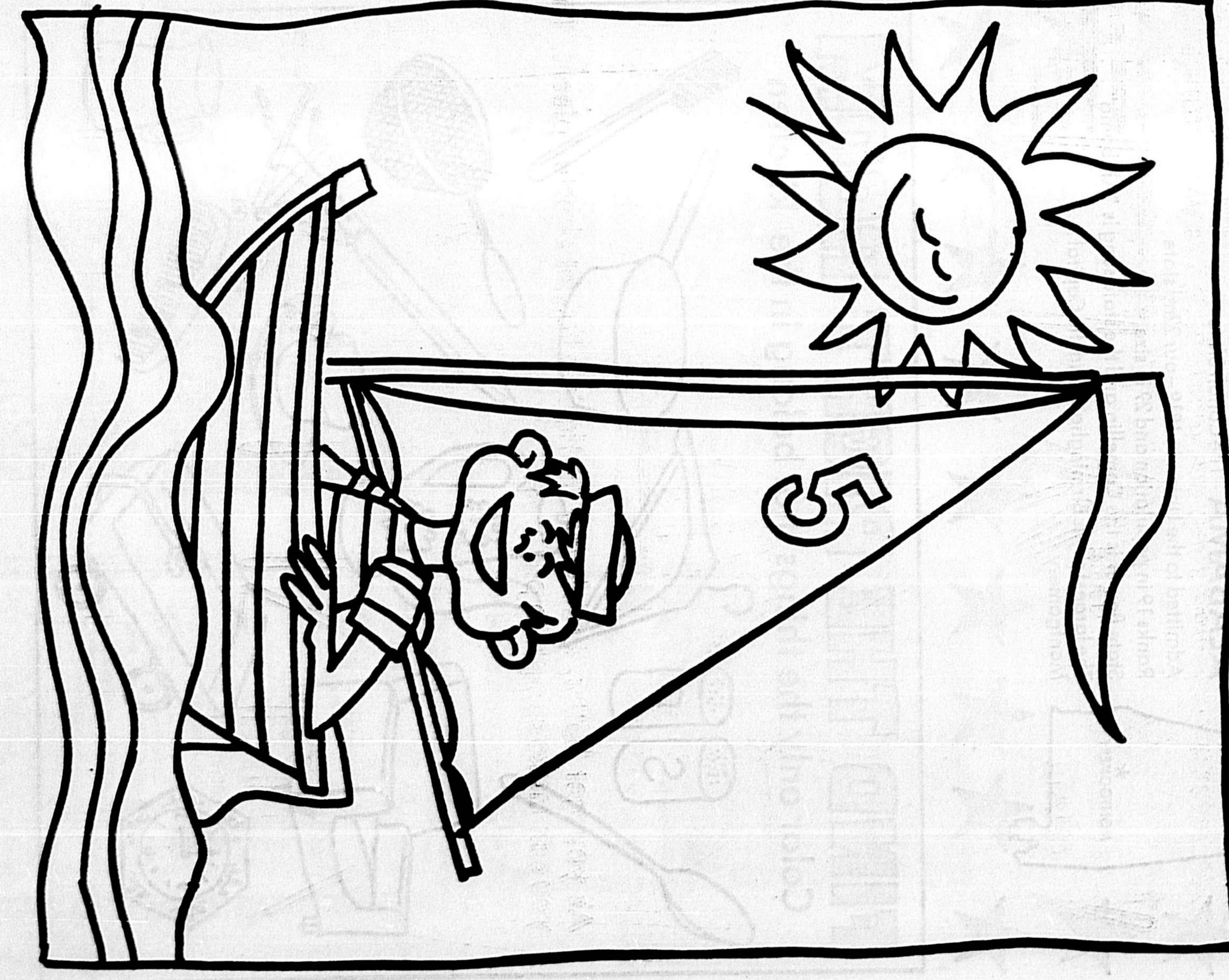

Good Samaritan Home Needs \$\$

Now is the time for all good men (and women, too) to come to the aid of the Good Samaritan Home.

Time is running out for this refuge for the sick and helpless. Notice has been served that the present frame structure does not meet present nursing home standards set by the state fire marshal and it will have to close its doors by Jan. 1 if a new fireproof building is not obtained.

Good Samaritan Home was given only until July 1 to actively solicit donations for its building fund on its own by the United Fund of Seminole County, of which it is a participating agency. Red Tape and delays have taken up much of this allotted time for the drive, but after an analysis of the need and a long range construction program the officers still plan to build the needed new facilities.

At this time they are in the process of completing design drawings with the contractor, who has estimated the cost of the 50-bed nursing home at \$164,000.

Even though time for the special drive will expire tomorrow, contributions may still be made at any time after that for the special building fund that has been established at Florida State Bank. Donations may be mailed or taken to the Good Samaritan Home at 804 Mulberry Ave.

Founded in 1916 by a small group of dedicated Christians concerned with the need for such an institution, over 500 patients, both black and white, have been cared for at the home since. Gradually enlarged and improved, it now has facilities to care for 90 patients.

"Mother" Ruby Lee Wilson, founder and president, is truly a 20th Century Good Samaritan.

It is largely through her faith and vision that the home was founded and has managed to stay open through the years in spite of the fact that many of the patients are without funds. To get money to build the original building, Mother Wilson and the other members of the Free Will Holiness Church sold pencils and other articles. A grassroots effort is already underway in the Negro community to raise the money through bake sales, selling more cones and other means. Money is also coming from unexpected sources. A friend from Deshay had misplaced her pocketbook and vowed if she found it she would give the money in it to the Good Samaritan Home.

Altamonte Youth Killed In Crash

A 19-year-old Altamonte Springs youth was killed early Saturday morning as the result of a one-car traffic accident on the General J. C. Hutchinson Parkway (Big Tree Road) approximately 600 yards from U.S. 17-92.

Lowthar W. Rosenbaum, of Livingston Street, was killed after his 1959 model car traveling at a high rate of speed ran off the north side of the road and struck a tree. Rosenbaum was alone in the car at the time, according to Trooper W. E. Glass.

Proposed Park Is Studied

The importance of a planned study for the proposed Lake Monroe Park was the recommendation of John Alexander, chairman of the Seminole County Commission, in his appearance before the Lake Monroe park committee of the Seminole Chamber of Commerce this morning.

Alexander said the commission would, he believed, look into setting up a study of the proposed recreational facility to be located along the lake near Sanford after the park committee brought the subject before the county.

A. B. Peterson Jr., chairman of the park committee, had sought Alexander's views of establishing the park as a tourist attraction and was told to arrange for the study of the project.

Due to county's lack of a planner, Alexander said, the Orange-Seminole-Osceola Planning Commission had been doing the county's work.

Special zoning would be needed, Alexander said, to insure the blending of recreational facilities and motels.

The chairman said the site was in an ideal location and should be approached from that standpoint.

He said it would require several months to complete the study and would be attempted as soon as possible in line with other county studies now underway.

Peterson stated his committee's interest was to encourage property owners to allow development of their property in the park site area.

County Ponders Budget, Largest Bid In History

At \$30,000 and salary for an administrative aide could range from \$10,000 to \$15,000.

Other budget requests are: arthropod control — (sanitary landfill) \$138,736 up from \$65,051; circuit judge — same as last year at \$6,948; county judge — \$30,427 up from \$17,520; civil defense and veterans service office — \$18,198 up from \$12,485; juvenile judge — \$11,245 up from \$23,295; county planner — \$40,003 up from \$19,242; zoning department — \$67,103 up from \$39,910; county engineer — \$52,622 up from \$41,124; road department — \$671,276 up from \$653,462; agriculture extension service — \$29,399 up from \$27,548; health department — \$165,165 up from \$135,562; maintenance department — \$83,051 up from \$69,676; motor vehicle inspection — \$29,017 down from \$81,909; sheriff's department — \$418,712 up from \$390,007 up from \$19,705.

Included in the budget are funds for a new juvenile detention facility expected to cost some \$138,000 to construct with annual operating expenses of \$27,000. The facility, if approved, would be patterned along the lines of the center currently being operated in Manatee County. The County Commission and Juvenile Judge Wallace Hall toured the juvenile facilities in all the surrounding areas and counties of comparable size over the past few months.

Also expected to be included in the budget requests are some \$50,000 to house mental incompetents. They are presently being held while awaiting commitment to state institution at the county jail.

Should the county approve a surplus commodity food program or stamp plan for low-income families, \$20,000 is the estimated cost; relocating the motor vehicle inspection station from Casselberry is estimated at \$100,000.



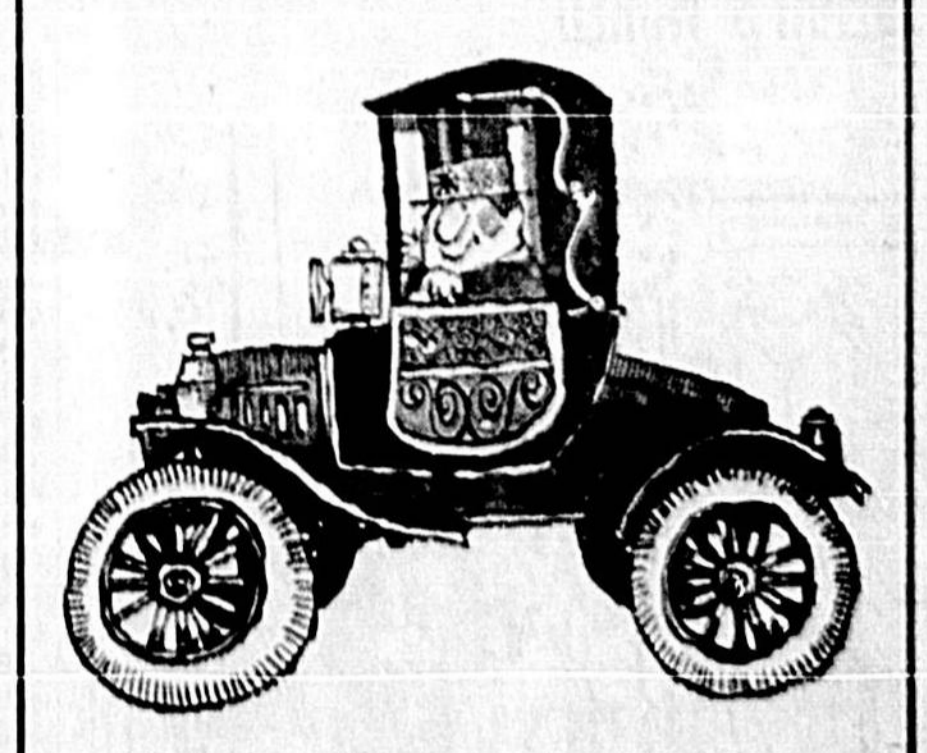

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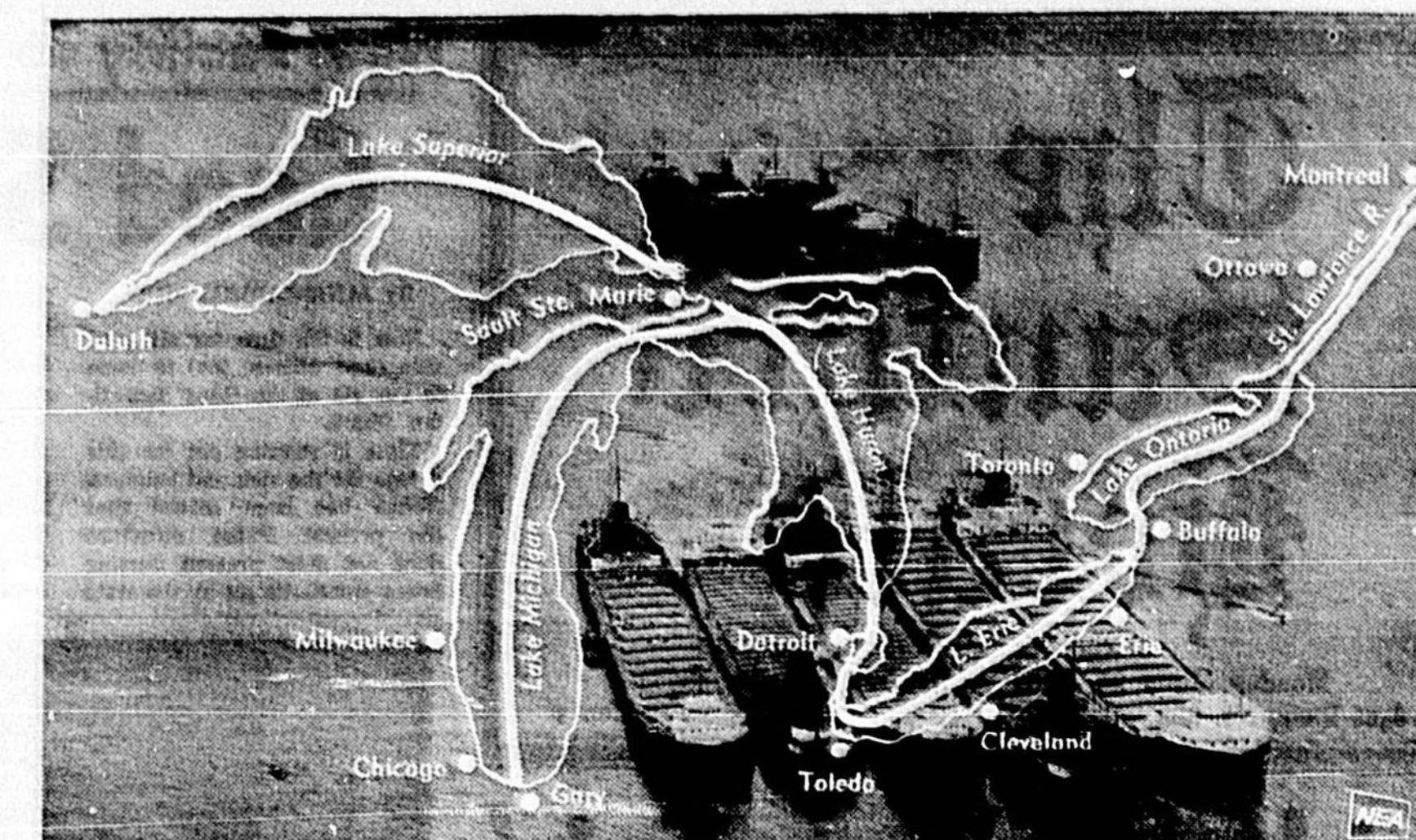

Most Important Ruling: Man's Vote

Warren Reviews Justice Tenure

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Earl Warren says the most important Supreme Court ruling of his 16 years as chief justice of the United States were those declaring that one man's vote should mean as much as any other man's.

If the people have equal representation in government, they can solve most problems through the political process rather than through the courts," Warren says in an interview broadcast today.

The 78-year-old Warren, who retired Monday, chose responsibility over the more widely known school desegregation ruling of 1954 as probably the most far-reaching of the Warren Court years. He said he likes to think of those years as the era of the "people's court."

Reapportionment rulings triggered a revolution in makeup of state legislatures and other governmental bodies.

In the area of civil rights, the silver-haired Warren expressed frustration at what he called cases of outright flouting of decisions or slowness in implementing them.

And Warren called a definition of obscenity one of the toughest court problems. He defended obscenity rulings.

He denied allegations that numerous civil liberties decisions resulted in "coddling" criminals and made it tougher for prosecutors to convict.

'Risk Aversion' Splits Winners From Losers

You've accumulated "some surplus savings, and you begin wondering whether your money shouldn't be working a little harder—earning more than it does just sitting there. You begin, probably, thinking about the possibilities of higher returns offered by stock or mutual funds.

If you're an about-to-be-investor, or an occasional investor, you'd do well to take a critical look at yourself and determine your risk-aversion factor. It has a lot to do with your investment behavior and your success in timing investment decisions.

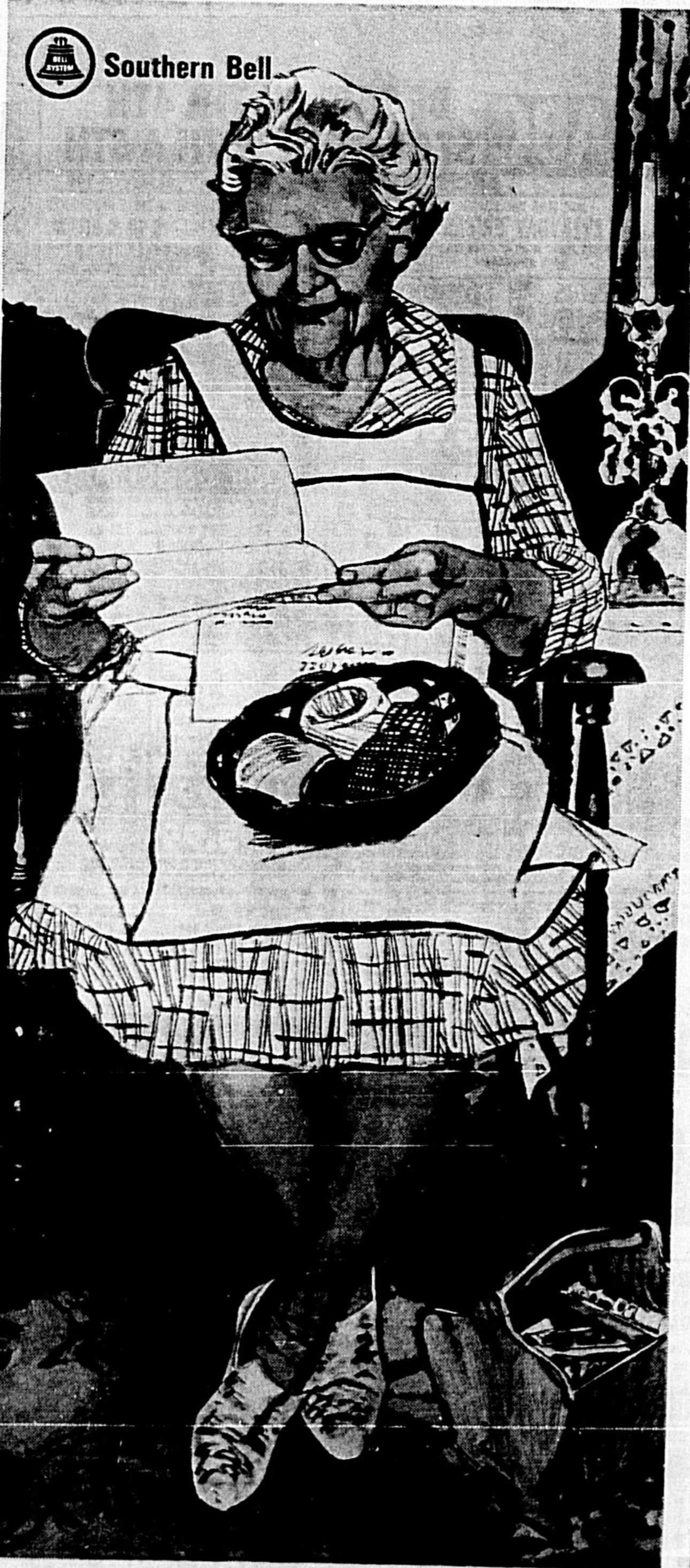

The Stock Trader's Almanac and Record is an annual publication that serves Wall Streeters somewhat as the "Farmer's Almanac" does their rural brethren. Its carry tips on how to read the weather signs in the market and pointers on when to sow and when to reap. But will you sow when the weather signs say you should?

That's where risk-aversion becomes a factor, says the Almanac. Citing a book by broker Jack J. Hayden, "What Makes You a Winner or a Loser in the Market?" it points out that "all investors can be classified according to how much risk they ordinarily will assume." And if you have a very high aversion to assuming risk, maybe you should just stay out of the market—because you'll miss the best part of the time. Here's why:

The market has been in a decline. Investor climate is generally gloomy. Nobody's buying—but we all know the market is a succession of ups and downs, and we're awaiting signs of the upturn that's certain to come, sooner or later.

At the first hopeful signs, the earliest buyers will be "those whose risk-aversion is practically nil"—the "professional short-term traders." After them, says the Almanac, come "the optimists with slight aversion to risk. They are gradually followed by those with stronger aversion to risk, who wait until their optimism is sufficient to bring them to an emotional decision."

By now there's a bull market in full swing; pockets are bulging with profits, investors are riding high and happy. It's all so wonderful that it finally overcomes the caution and timidity of "the highest class of risk-aversers," who must have very unrealistic expectations to push them across their psychological thresholds.

The unrealistic expectations that finally move them? They expect prices to go higher and higher—that the market will go up forever. But, of course, it's a series of ups and downs. And those with the highest aversion to risk have hung back so long that they miss most of the upswing. They clink on boards too near the end—just about in time for the downturn.

Poet John Dryden observed that "none but the brave deserve the fair." The dictum seems to apply in the market as well. Only those who know how to read the weather signs—and who are brave enough to do their sowing when there's still a bit of chill in the air—will reap a full harvest. Those who are every timid about

The Greater New York Safety Council has drawn up a list of safety rules to protect children from molesters.

Children should be drilled in these rules with as much steadfastness, said the Council, as they're drilled in how to cross streets.

The suggested rules:

Tell your child never to get into a car with a stranger, to go into a stranger's home, to accept a gift from a stranger.

If a stranger stops his car to ask directions, the child should stand several feet away while replying.

Children should be warned not to play alone in parks or in empty buildings and alleys.

If a stranger touches a child in a movie or public place, the child should immediately report this to the manager or usher if the child is bothered on the street, the youngster should try to attract the attention of passers-by.

Children should be trained to watch out for their playmates. If a playmate gets into a stranger's car, your child should write down the license number and immediately report an adult, if no pencil is available, the number can be scratched in the dirt.

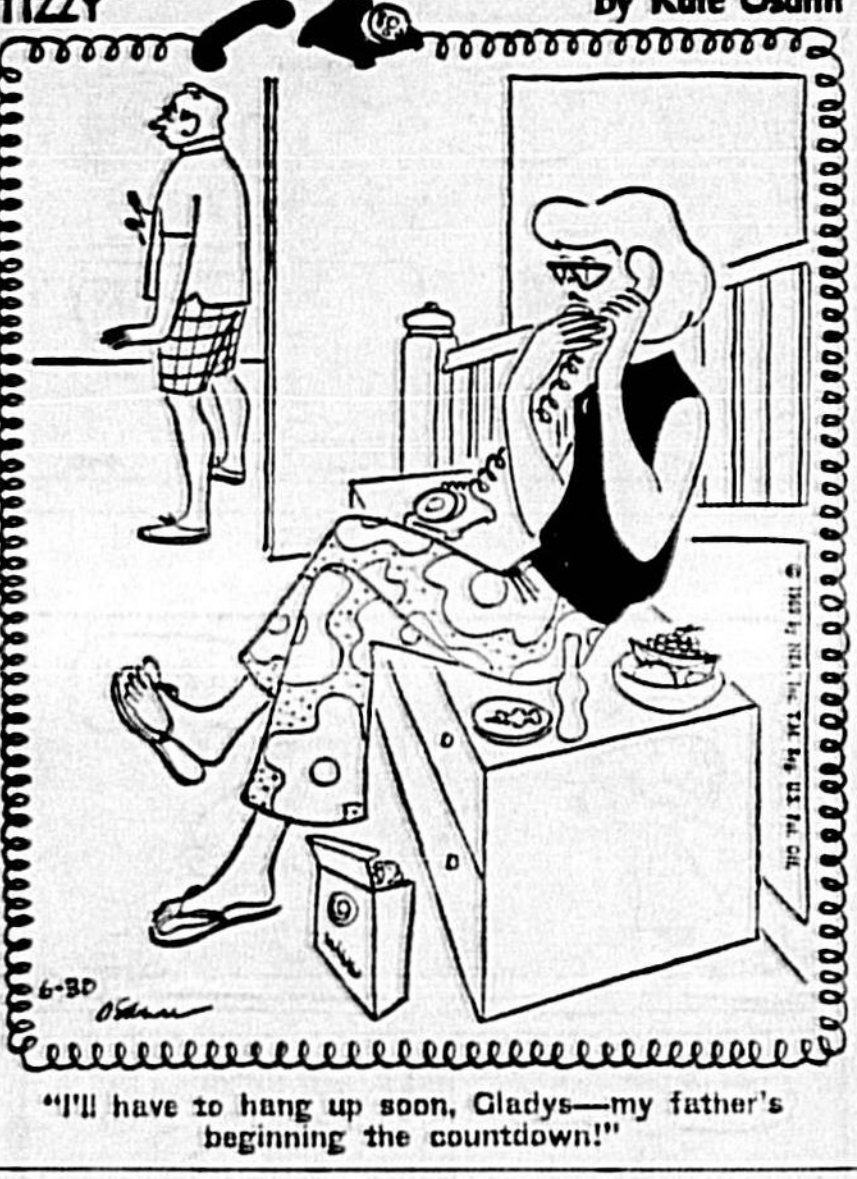

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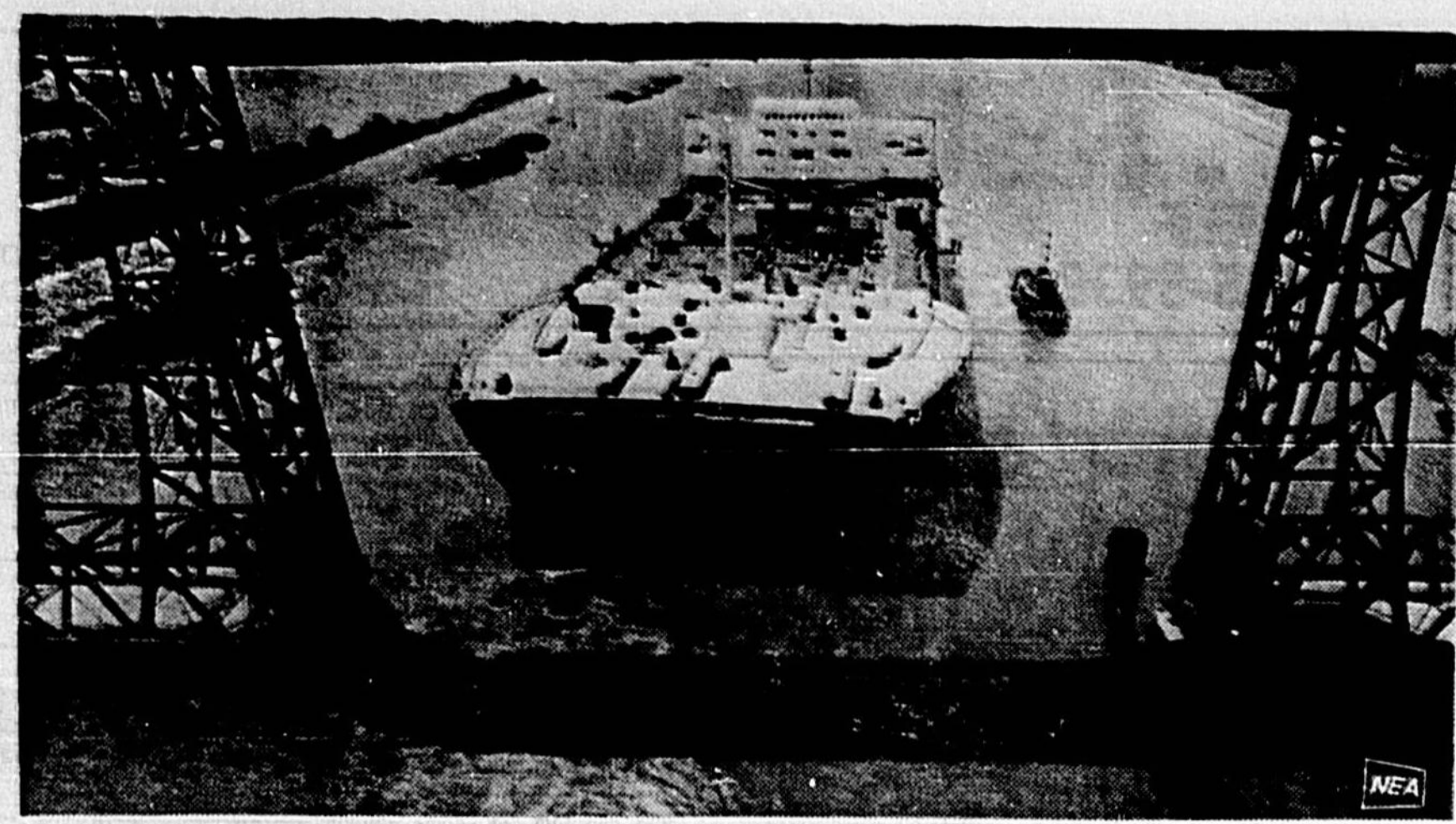

Air Congestion Eased

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration has proposed a new technique of handling air traffic to relieve congested air lanes, improve safety and reduce flying times by allowing more direct flights between airports.

The new program, called area navigation and made possible by better computerized navigation equipment, would gradually replace a system that restricts airplanes to narrow routes between navigation stations, in effect making them fly dogleg paths from one radio beacon to the next.

It would allow them to fly through vast areas now unusable because they are not directly between radio beacons. In a notice of proposed rule making last week, the FAA set out its plan to establish new area navigation routes, or multiple flight paths. Instead of flying from beacon to beacon, airplanes would, in effect, be able to generate their own phantom beacons in a straight line.

William M. Fierst, chief of the FAA's air traffic service, said the agency has a broad development program aimed at putting area navigation equipment into use as rapidly as possible.

"Area navigation gives us a chance to relieve some of the current air congestion on heavily traveled routes and provide better service to the air traveler," he said.

In the early years of aviation pilots followed light beams, of effective only when visibility was good. They gave way to the low frequency radio, which gave courses in four directions from each station.

In the early 1950s a more reliable method of radio navigation came along—the very high frequency stations that provided

pilots with courses over a full range of 360 degrees instead of the old four-beam technique. Later distance measuring equipment was added to provide greater flexibility and position fixing accuracy.

It is a great improvement, the current system's major limitation is that airplanes must navigate courses either directly to ward or away from a VOR station. This funneling of traffic leads to congestion that has become extreme at peak hours on some airways.

Africa 'Rubber Man' Succumbs Sunday

ALGIERS (AP) — Moussa Tshombe, known as the "rubber man" of African politics, died Sunday of an apparent heart attack. The Algerian Press Service reported today. He was 46.

A communique signed by 10 Algerian doctors said the former premier of the Congo and leader of the breakaway state of Katanga appeared to have died in his sleep. It said an autopsy was to be performed today.

The announcement of Tshombe's death came two years to the day after a French plane hijacker brought him to Algeria at gunpoint. The plane had been chartered to take Tshombe from Spain, where he had been living in exile, to Patna in Algeria.

After a deal fell through between Algeria and the Congo to extradite Tshombe to Kinshasa (formerly Leopoldville) in face of a death sentence, Tshombe's status became veiled in official silence. He was kept in solitary confinement for two years, well treated but denied contact with the outside world.

Tshombe earned his nickname by showing remarkable political resiliency in rebounding from utter defeat after the fall of Katanga in 1965 to become premier of the Congo in July 1968. The man with the moon face and toothy grin inspired no in-between emotions among Congolese. He was either loved or hated.

U. S. - Soviet Talks 'Not In Danger'

Solon Hits Missile Critics

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Richard B. Russell, a key supporter of President Nixon's missile defense program, says critics are taking a "fanatical" position by contending deployment of the Safeguard system would endanger Soviet-U.S. arms talks.

The Georgia Democrat, head of the Senate Appropriations Committee and long regarded as an expert on military matters, said in an interview: "It seems fantastic to me that the opponents of ARB contend

that the Russians will refuse to negotiate if we deploy Safeguard."

"We have been working on the ARB and on MIRV (multiple warhead-carrying missile) for several years. That didn't keep them from agreeing to the nuclear nonproliferation treaty."

"You can be certain that the Soviets are going to go ahead with their development of their system. It is ridiculous to say that they won't talk because we own MIRVs and their own ARB go ahead."

Sen. John Stennis, D-Miss., said in a separate interview that there was no serious attempt made within the Senate Armed Services Committee to strike the MIRV authorization from a military procurement bill.

Stennis, chairman of the committee, said the program of perfecting missiles that could carry a cluster of independently targeted nuclear warheads is linked closely to the development of the Poseidon replacement for the Polaris on U.S. submarines.

Safeguard critics have said there is no need for such a defense system to protect land-based U.S. missiles so long as the Polaris fleet is capable of delivering a devastating retaliatory strike.

A wedding of MIRV with Poseidon presumably would at least triple the striking power of American overseas craft while increasing the range of their retaliatory weapons.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield has urged MIRV critics to shelve this issue when the closely divided Senate debates Safeguard deployment.

As of now, 41 senators have signed an appeal to the administration to seek an agreement with the Russians for a moratorium on MIRV development, which they say might otherwise make impossible any arms reduction agreement.

Their contention is that once such nations have multilateral missiles it will become impossible to tally each other's striking power, short of on-site inspection to which neither will agree.

Russell said he doesn't believe the Soviets would agree to a halt in testing which he said both nations have been carrying on in this field.

Cigarette Law Expires Tonight

WASHINGTON (AP) — A key section of the cigarette labeling law expires tonight, opening the way for federal regulatory agencies to try to impose stringent restrictions on smoking advertising.

The section of the law dying at midnight prohibits federal agencies from modifying current regulations to tighten the current health warning required on cigarette packages or limit advertising.

With the modification ban lifted, the Federal Trade Commission can go on with hearings on an extremely strong package warning, while the Federal Communications Commission can consider the proposed prohibition of all smoking advertising on radio and television.

Although a ban, or pre-emption, part of the law loses effect tonight, the House has passed a bill extending that section for another six years, although with a tougher warning required displayed on each pack.
