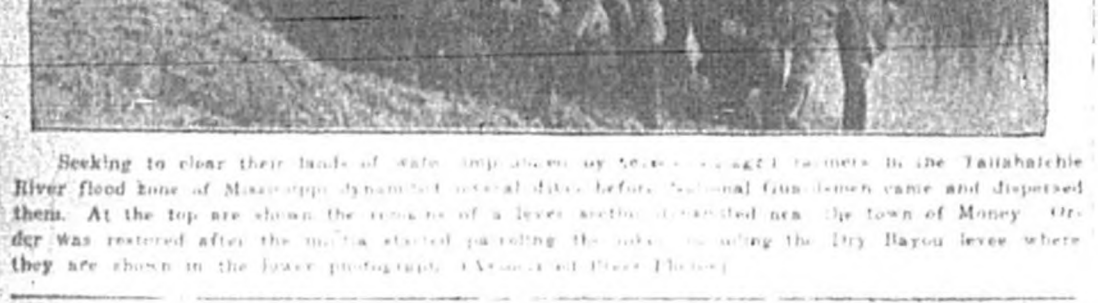

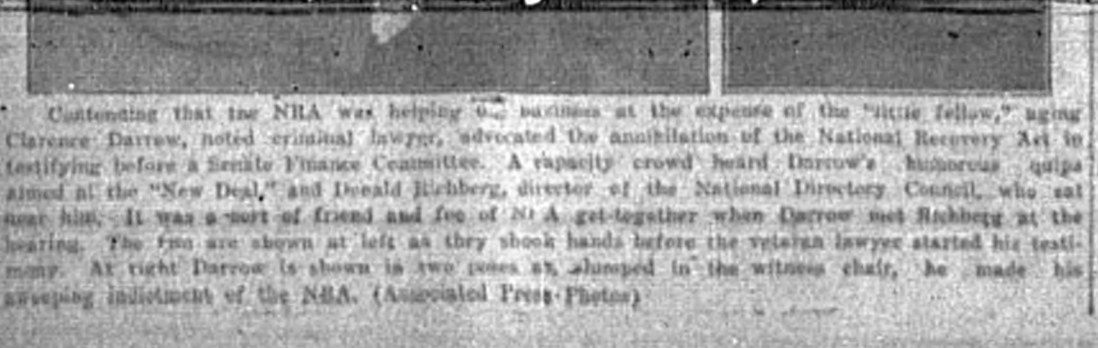

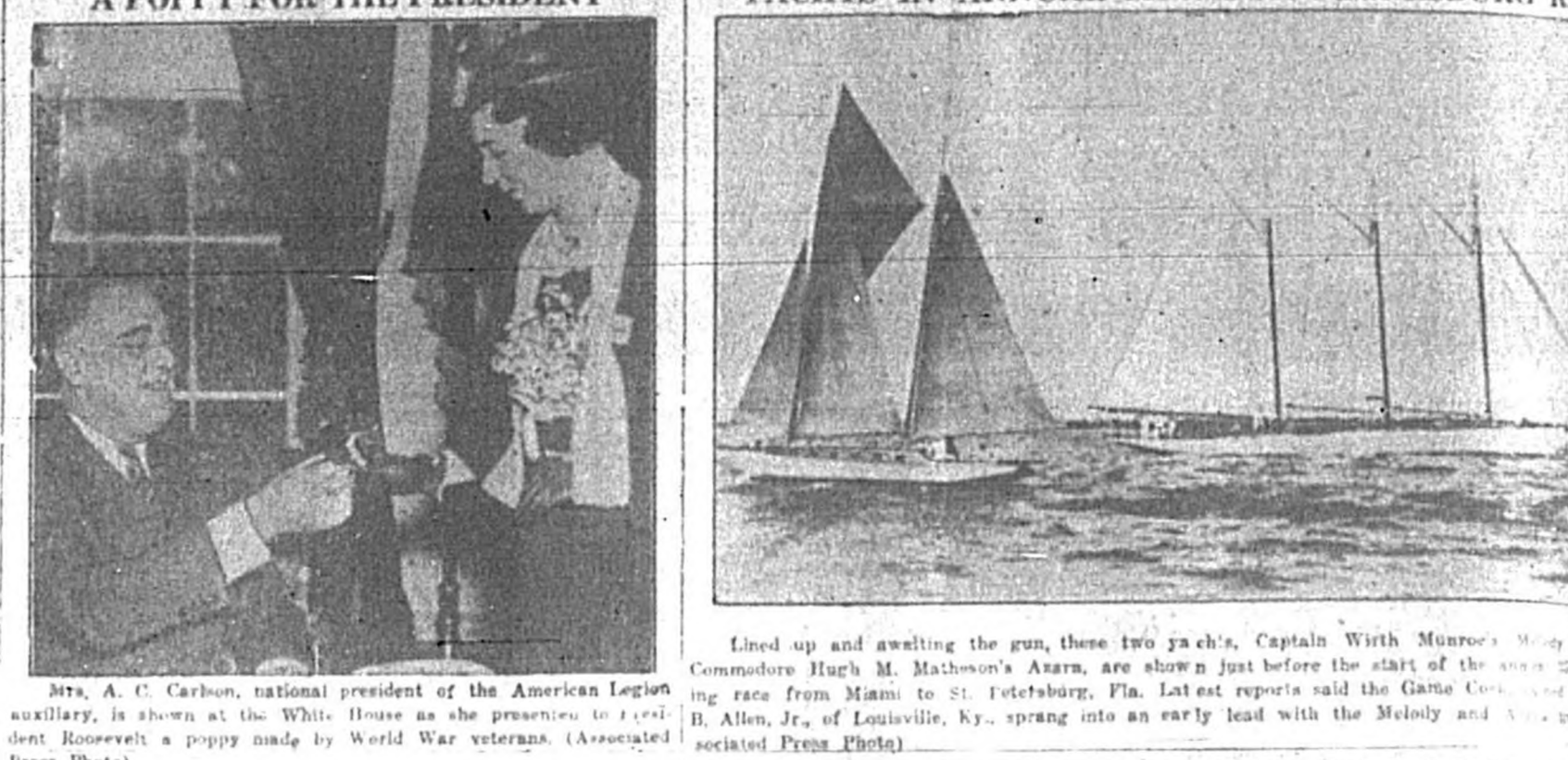

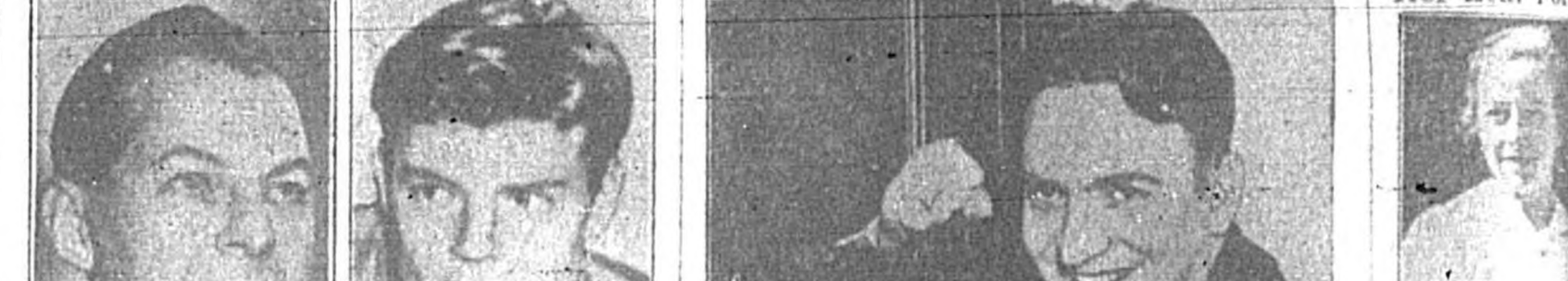

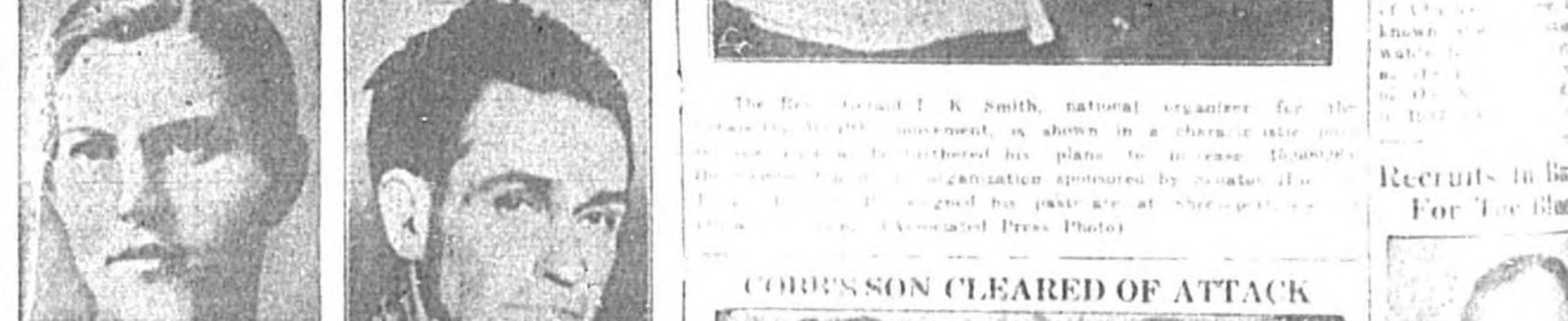
Mrs. A. C. Carbon, national president of the American Legion auxiliary, is shown at the White House as she presents to President Roosevelt a poppy made by World War veterans.

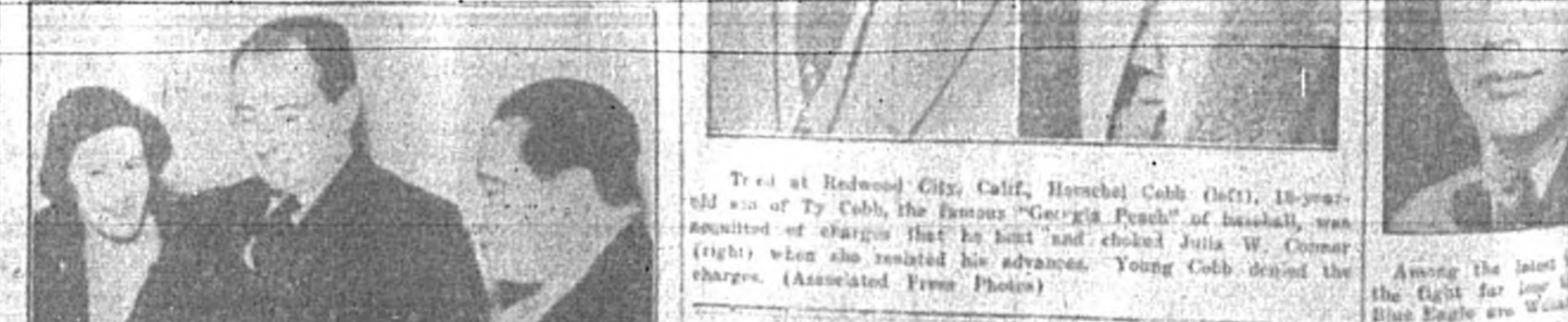

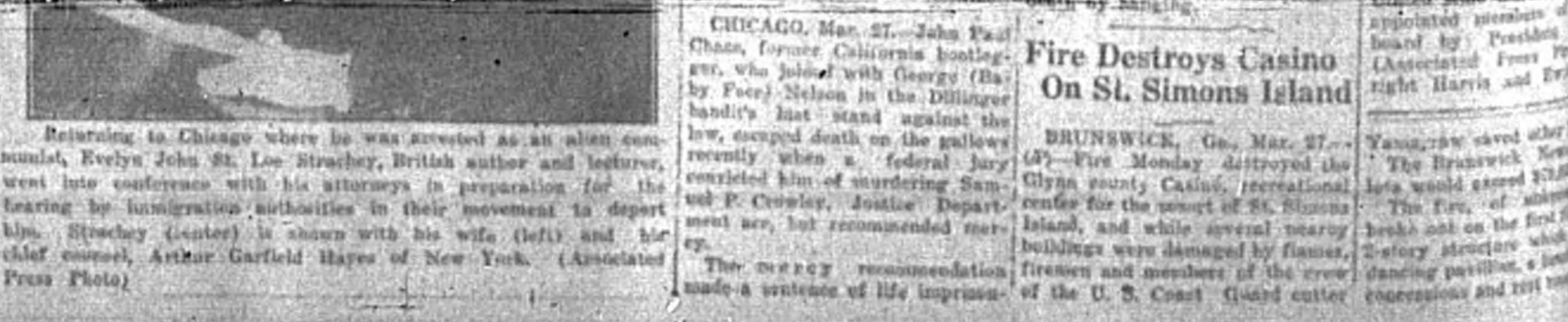

Smoke Clouds Cover Miami, Environs

MIAMI, Mar. 28.—An overnight shift in the prevailing wind sent dense clouds of smoke from Everglades mark fires billowing over the greater Miami area Tuesday.

Cotton Mill Output Will Be Controlled

WASHINGTON, Mar. 28.—The National Industrial Recovery Board Tuesday announced that production in the cotton textile industry would be curtailed to meet present reduced consumer demand.

Production will be allocated among mills on the basis of estimated demand, it was said. The textile planning committee, composed of Arthur D. Whitehead, Sidney Hillman and Leon Hindson, members of NIRA, and Preston Combs, administrator of the textile division, will recommend temporary or emergency steps for curtailing production.

Talmadge Vetoes Sterilization Bill

ATLANTA, Mar. 28.—(AP)—Governor Talmadge Tuesday vetoed the bill to sterilize habitual criminals and feeble-minded persons and signed legislation fixing 1 1/2 percent a month as the legal rate of interest on small loans in Georgia. The old rate was 2 1/2 percent.

The governor made no official comment in vetoing the sterilization measure, but as to the interest law he said:

"If anybody can't do business at 1 1/2 percent a month, he ought not to do business at all."

MacArthur Sees Next War Won By Small, Fast Units

Well-Trained Units Will Travel Into Battle With Speed

WASHINGTON, Mar. 27.—(AP)—The "next war," if it comes, especially if fought on American soil, will be a war of comparatively small but highly-trained armies traveling to the attack at high speed.

These future conflicts are seen by Gen. Douglas MacArthur, chief of staff of the U. S. Army, and he is endeavoring to build up and equip the American forces with these ideas in mind. One of the first steps, already put into effect, is to organize the regular Army and National Guard troops in the United States into four armies, each complete in itself and ready to go to a unit to ease its area is attacked.

The vast armies of millions of men, fighting on fronts hundreds of miles in length and punctuated by deadlocks for months and even years at a time, such as were typical of the World War, will be confined in the next war, General MacArthur believes.

In an attack on the United States, a small but highly modernized enemy force might be able to strike a serious blow at some vital center.

"There can be no doubt," says the general, "that thoroughly efficient and completely modernized forces, although only of moderate size, will be capable of striking telling blows."

An attack by such units might be delivered against our sensitive areas with devastating suddenness, and the only sure defense would be prompt intervention of defensive forces featuring an equal degree of speed and power.

In future wars, armies will use fast machines both for moving to the point of combat and in action. An army's movements will depend on the speed of its trucks and tanks instead of the speed at which men and horses can walk. Because of this greater speed, armies will operate and fight over vast areas of territory.

Townsend's Plan Has Nothing At All On Rubens

Former Pants Buckle Inventor Would End Depression Pronto

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 28.—(AP)—Townsend, Dr. F. E. Townsend, Huey Long and other "plus" boys might as well throw away and make room for G. Arnold Rubens, former Chicago pants buckle inventor.

Mr. Rubens has invented a plan which he says will end the depression in 30 days, do away with taxes and crime, pay the veterans' bonus and the national debt, and eliminate poverty, without costing the government a cent.

The scheme is called the "Prosperity Bank Credit Plan," and according to Mr. Rubens, if all the nations of the world would adopt it, it would pay off the total national debt in two years, and make poverty an obsolete thing.

"For three years I lay awake at night," explained Mr. Rubens, a swarthy, brown-eyed man of 50, who also has been a successful businessman and publisher, editor of a newspaper and inventor of a rooftop landing field for gliding airplanes.

"I was trying to figure out what was wrong with things suddenly I got it. You know how Edison got his ideas, and Einstein invented relativity? Well, I got mine the same way—inspiration, you might call it."

The "Prosperity Bank Credit Plan" gets into some astronomical financial figures, but Mr. Rubens said it was really quite simple.

"The government simply orders the banks to credit \$100 to each adult citizen every month. Nobody puts up any money. It's just credit. The amount \$100,000,000 a month will be spent—creating 20,000,000 adults."

Mr. Rubens worked it out in paper to prove it.

"Each person pays the government \$11 for the \$100 credit. Each person pays the same one percent for each transaction. Figuring each check turns over four times, the government gets \$110,000,000 the first month."

But the second month the government gets \$121,000,000.

Coffey and Carroll's mother, Mrs. Opie Minor, quoted her son as saying he and Haller were in a double date Wednesday night but that Haller did not show up and Carroll was kidnapped while on the way to the date.

"We refuse to obey any order from any authority which compels us to take part in the heinous wickedness of war," said a committee report approved by the Quakers in annual meeting.
Urging young men and women to withdraw from educational institutions requiring military service, the society advocated the study of "industrial conflict in our midst."
"We should make such study of strikes, lockouts, and other forms of social warfare as will enable us to take intelligent part in the problems involved," the report asserted.
