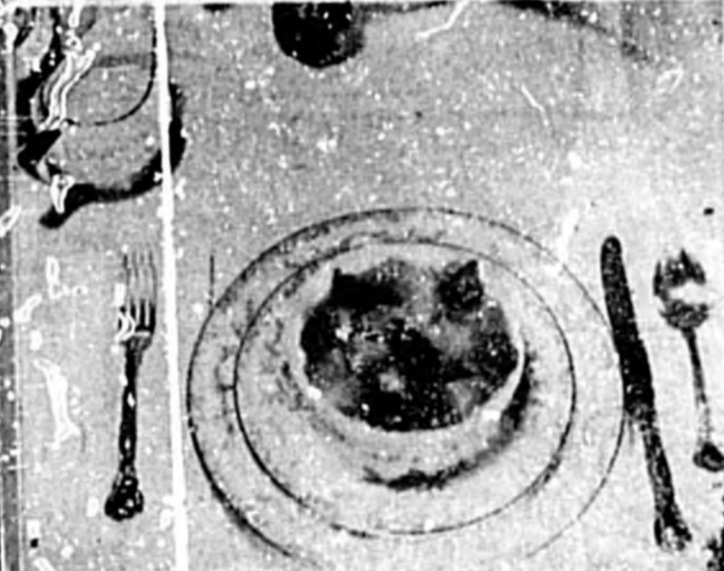
**PUDDIN' PROOF**

It's gratifying how happy the housewife she looks forward to an afternoon off now and then, but this is sooner wished for than arranged—it takes time to fix meals for the family, especially if "occasional pie" is music to your ears.

But we have a menu in mind that's a perfect warm weather quickie—and with some forethought in shopping and a short stint in the morning when the kitchen is still cool, by afternoon you'll be free as a breeze and as fresh.

First, a delicious Fruit Cooler. The family will love the frosty chunks of frozen pineapple and sections of grapefruit topped with frozen or fresh strawberries. Besides being good, and vitamin-wise, this appetizer makes a beautiful table for the family to sit down to.

**FRUIT COOLER**

Peel and remove sections of three grapefruit or scoop fruit out of halves with a spoon. To this add one can frozen pineapple and 1 pint fresh or frozen strawberries. Add 1/2 cup sugar. Place in fruit cups and chill.

**HAM 'N EGG 'N CHEESE PIE**

Combine ingredients a half hour before baking.

4 eggs, slightly beaten	2 cups cooked ham (cut in 1/2 inch cubes)
1/4 teaspoon pepper	1 cup grated cheese
1/4 teaspoon baking powder	1 unbaked pie shell
1/2 cup of milk	

Prepare pie mix, ham and cheese, and store separately in the refrigerator until just before baking. When ready for final preparation combine remaining ingredients and put in unbaked pie shell. Bake in very low oven (475 degrees) for 30 minutes or until knife comes out clean. Serve with tossed green salad and any frozen vegetable, which can be cooked while the pie bakes.

**HASTY PUDDING**

You can do this one the day before as it should be thoroughly chilled before serving. Your family will enjoy this combination of flavors.

To one cup whipped cream add one cup brown sugar and one teaspoon vanilla extract. Blend thoroughly. Add 15 graham crackers, broken in small pieces, four bananas, quartered and sliced, and 16 marshmallows, which have been snipped with scissors into small pieces. Mix lightly and chill.

**Weekly Household Hint:** When using scissors to cut marshmallows, dip the blades in hot water so they won't become sticky.

### The Fiesta of the Five Flags



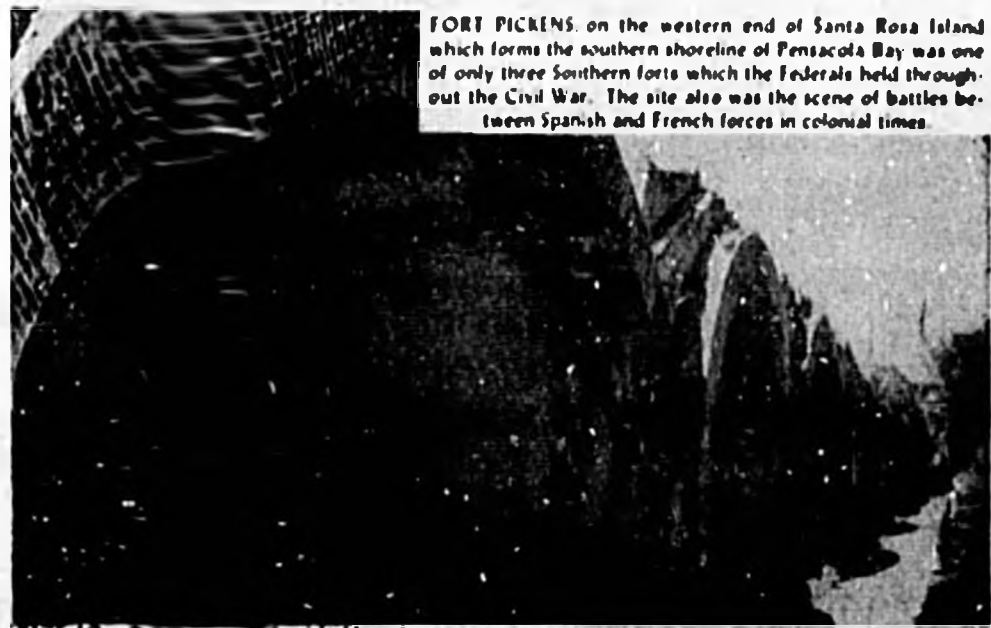
The Fiesta of The Five Flags, Pensacola's annual celebration to commemorate the early history of Northwest Florida will be staged May 13-15. The three days of continuous pageantry, contests, parades, and entertainment has become one of the state's most colorful annual events. Crowds numbering in the thousands converge on Pensacola during Fiesta time, for a show well worth traveling miles to see. The accompanying photos were taken during the 1953 celebration.



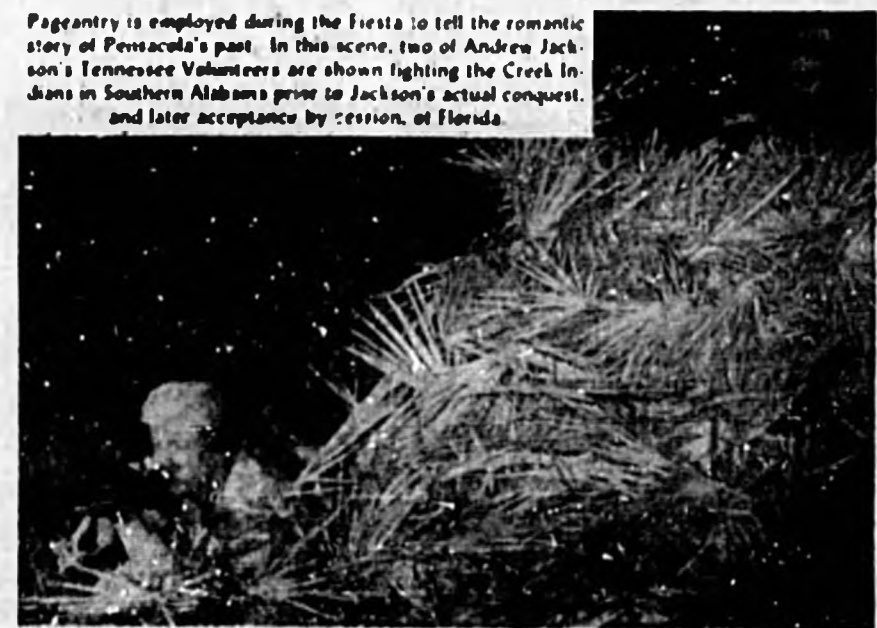
Field archery—a popular sport played over a "course" laid out through the forest, is a sanctioned championship event.

# From An Old Mill In Georgia . . .

A century old, slave built, water-powered mill, a two-horse wagon, and the foresight to provide the public with a convenience it wanted were factors in the Horatio Alger career of C. R. Mehaffey, Sr., owner and president of the Felbeck Milling Co. of Florida, with offices at Jacksonville.

Now operator of the world's largest water-powered mill, on the Chattahoochee River at Columbus, Ga., the Felbeck firm is the only mill supplying all of Florida with meal ground in the old-fashioned way—by water power.

Vigorous and hale at 70, Mehaffey is the personification of the American success dream. Of humble birth in Lee County, Ala., he started work in the old wooden Felbeck mill near Columbus when only 12 years old. Seven years later, he was its manager.

In those days, he recalls, all meal was sold in bulk and was apt to be weevilly. Hauling his meal to Columbus in a two-horse wagon, he soon sensed the customers' need for meal of assured quality and in convenient quantity. So he offered his product in paper bags and the idea was an immediate success. The other mills scoffed at his innovation and waited 10 years before copying it. By then it was too late, he had secured 90 per cent of Columbus' meal business.

Under his direction the firm grew steadily, acquiring four other mills and finally the present one at Columbus where all the meal is water ground. Mehaffey came to Florida in 1924 bringing this state its first paper sacked meal and the firm has expanded its operations to embrace the entire state, with distributing points at Tampa, Orlando, Jacksonville, Miami, Belle Glade, Tallahassee, and Pensacola.

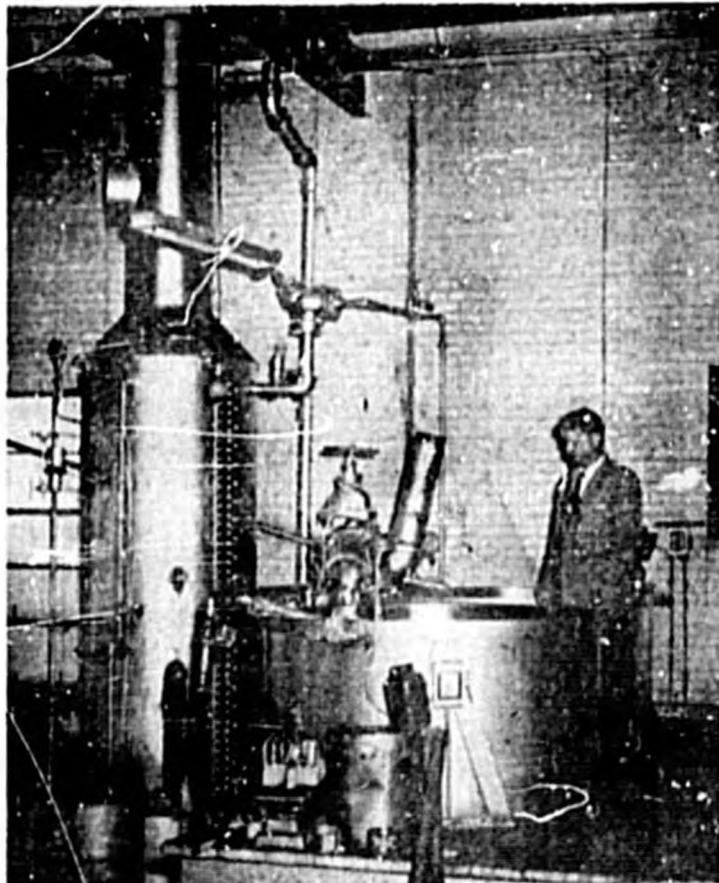


The original Felbeck mill (right) which was built by slaves in 1828 near Columbus, Ga. Its framing and wood weatherboarding were hand dressed lumber and joined together with wooden pegs. The mill continued to stand until 1944 when the federal government acquired the site and demolished it.

# . . . A Florida Industry Was Born



This modern machine in the Jacksonville plant is a far cry from the original way of sacking meal. Mehaffey explains to son, Hubert, who is associated with him in the business. The machine sacks the meal and automatically ties the tops of the bags without the touch of a hand. In the old days, meal was measured out in a scoop from bulk supplies and often contained many impurities.



The company has now diversified its operations and handles many other products besides meal. Here Hubert Mehaffey inspects the huge vats where syrup is mixed and cooked.

Don knows the reward and happiness that comes with doing the work you like—and he's always ready to help the other fellow find the way.

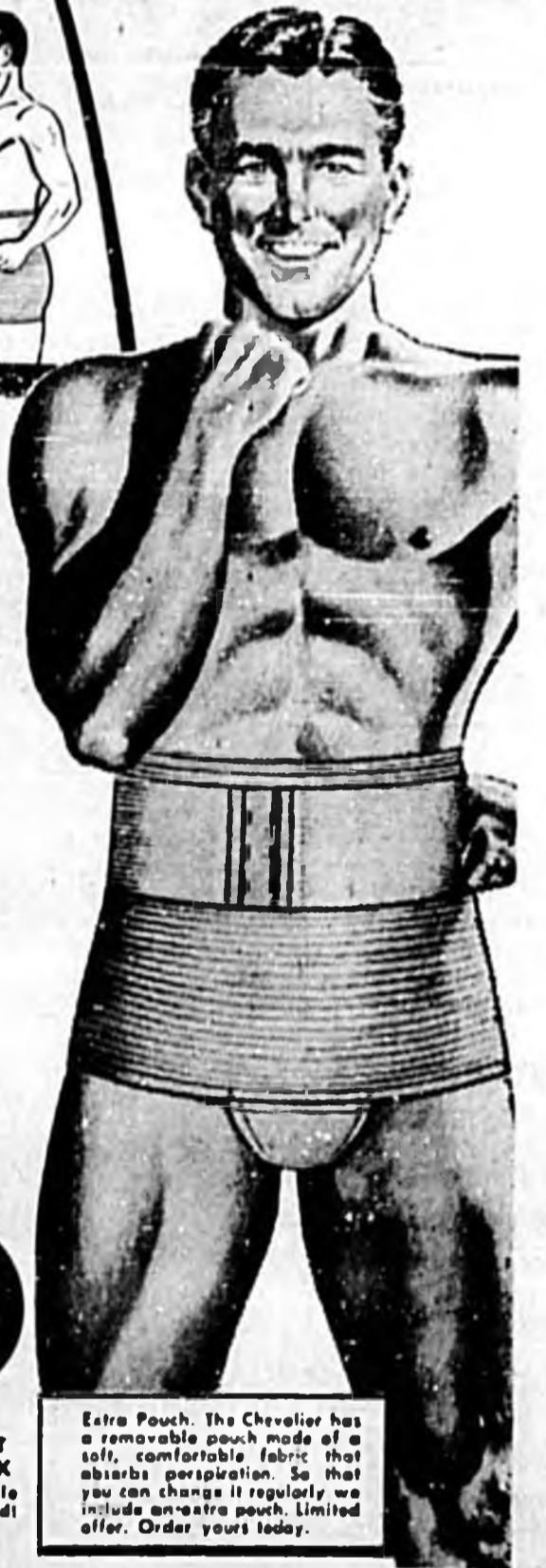
Don prides himself that in six years and with approximately 3,000 guns passing through his shop there have been no accidents reported from any work which he has turned out.

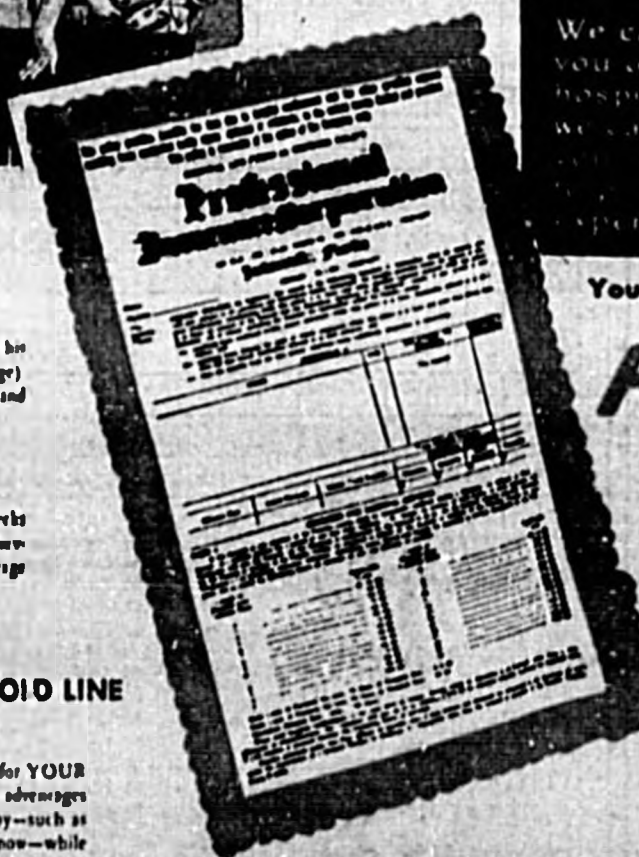

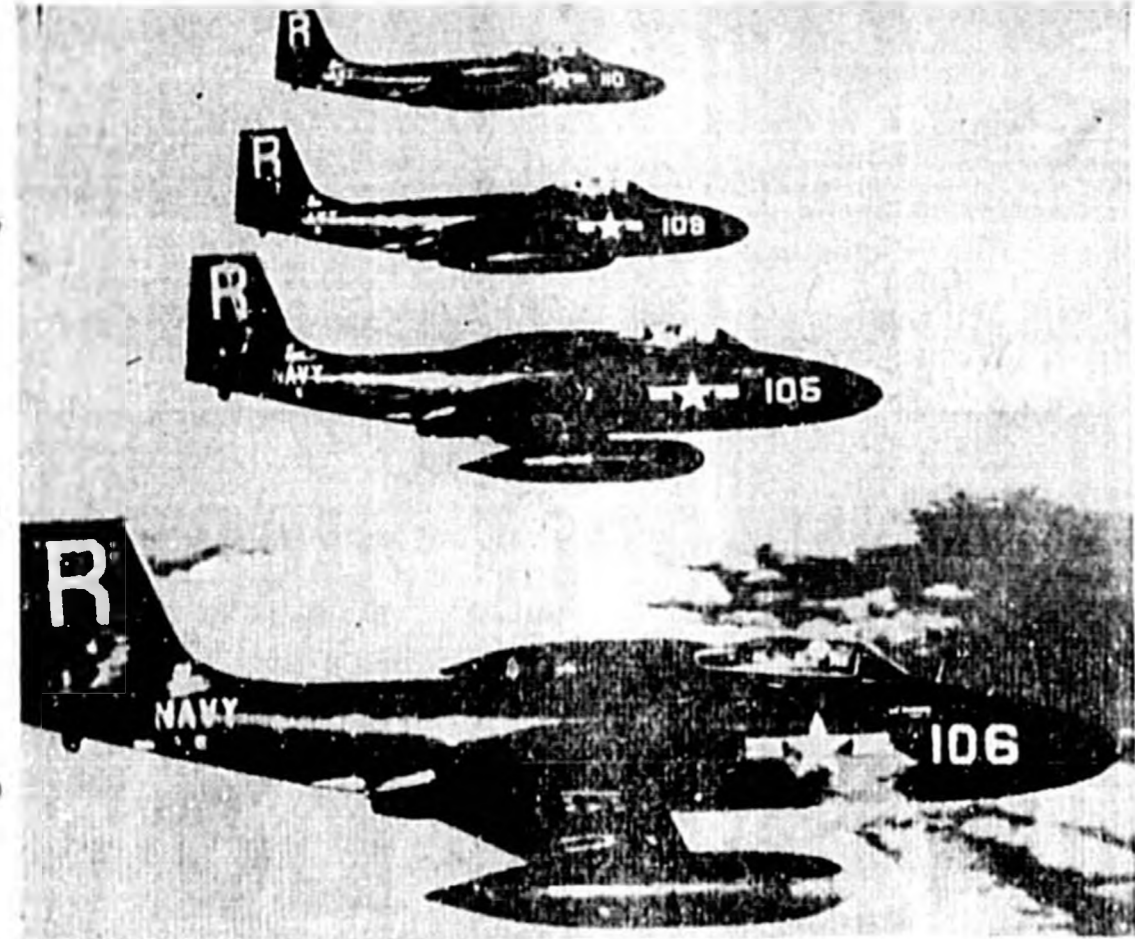

## Young Girl Escapes Drowning By Holding To Piece Of Cork

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—Ten-year-old Darlene Roaten, who doesn't swim, supported herself with a small piece of cork for more than three hours yesterday while the current swept her 10 miles down the Mississippi River.

Her father, J. S. Roaten, meanwhile, swam more than two hours to rescue his wife and their son Bobby, 8, after they and Darlene had stepped off an underwater sandbar into the swift Mississippi current.

Roaten threw three pieces of old life jackets and leaped from their 17-foot motorboat and swam to the rescue of his family. He left another son, Michael, 4, in the boat with the motor idling.

The boat began drifting and Roaten swam after it for more than two hours before he regained it. Then he used the boat to pick up his wife and Bobby but Darlene had drifted out of sight.

She was picked up just before dark by the towboat Zephyr out of St. Louis. A crewman saw her bobbing along in the current. A witness said the piece of cork supporting her was about half the size of a cigar box.

The family was on a pleasure cruise in a 17-foot inboard motorboat. The craft struck a sandbar near an island. All except Michael got out to push the boat off the bar, the water was only six inches deep where the boat ran aground.

"All of a sudden there was no sand and we were in the water," said Mrs. Roaten after her rescue. "All three of us went different ways."

## Thousands Of Workers Are Affected By Transit Strike

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Thousands of workers thumbed an auto ride or walked to work today in this steel city—27th in the nation's population—crippled by a major transit strike.

Railroads and taxi companies took up the slack for thousands of other commuters. By early morning every off-street parking space—never plentiful in the Golden Triangle—was jammed to capacity.

A strike by Pittsburgh Railways Co.'s 2,700 employees knocked auto trolleys and a major portion of the bus service out of operation.

Atties clogged the main arteries leading into the city, stopping to pick up workers in a short-time ride plan urged by city officials.

Despite car pools and relaxation of restrictions on downtown parking space, the sudden flood of autos more than justified Traffic Engineer Michael J. Gitten's warning before hand estimate of the jam.

Gitten estimates 16,000 off-street parking spaces are available and more than 28,000 vehicles pour into the downtown section daily between 8 a. m. and 4 p. m.

But Gitten said that at best the relaxed limitations created only a few hundred additional parking spaces. He estimates an additional 25-30 per cent more cars will pour into the city daily during the transit strike.

Union officials were not immediately available for comment and there were no negotiations.

## Probers Order Stevens To Present Officers Names In Peress Issue

Showdown On Shortening Of Hearings Postponed; Closed Session Is Ordered

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate investigators today ordered Secretary of the Army Stevens to submit the names of Army officials responsible for giving Maj. Irving Peress—described by Sen. McCarthy as a "Fifth Amendment Communist"—an honorable discharge.

The action came on a ruling by Chairman Mundt (R-S.D.) of the committee looking into the McCarthy-Army dispute after the group postponed until later in the day a showdown on the question of cutting short public hearings.

## New Group Formed For Action Against Spies, Subversives

WASHINGTON (AP)—A New Jersey prosecutor today will be nominated to head a new Justice Department division charged with speeding the prosecution of spies and subversives.

The White House in announcing last night the creation of the new Internal Security Division, said President Eisenhower will nominate William F. Tompkins of Meadowlark, N. J., as an assistant attorney general in charge of the unit.

Tompkins, a U. S. attorney for New Jersey since last June, has been fighting gambling and racketeering. He is 41.

The Internal Security Division, carved out of the present Criminal Division, presumably will handle all cases dealing with treason, espionage, sabotage, defense plant security, loyalty of federal employees and allied matters.

Officials said the division will centralize and fix responsibility within the department for the handling of national security cases.

Creation of the new unit came a month after the Army, Navy and Air Force set up a joint program aimed at lowering the review level of security risks. Both actions followed criticism by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) of the way the government has handled alleged subversives. However, the actions were not taken in specific response to McCarthy's criticism.

Atty. Gen. Brownell has said the Internal Security Division, while maintaining cases disclosed by the FBI, will have the particular duty of guarding the "constitutional freedoms" of all suspects.

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## Reds Oppose Armistice Terms Of French; Favor Evacuation Of Wounded



## Vietminh Present Own Plan

Two Proposals Are Far Apart

GENEVA (AP)—The Communists "totally" rejected French terms for an Indochinese armistice today. They countered with an eight-point plan of their own.

The Communists agreed, however, to cooperate in quick action to remove the wounded from fallen Dien Bien Phu.

A Vietminh spokesman said the French to send planes into Dien Bien Phu to evacuate the wounded, which he estimated at 1,200. The spokesman indicated there was nothing to work out in the field except the detailed arrangements.

The Communist armistice plan was submitted to the nine-party Indochinese conference by the deputy premier of the Vietminh, Pham Van Dong, after he assailed the French plan for an internationally guaranteed armistice. Major points of the Communist plan were:

Recognition of the Communist regimes of Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia—the latter two labeled by the French as "phantom" governments.

Withdrawal of all foreign troops from Indochina.

Free elections conducted along the lines already proposed by the Communists for Germany and Korea and rejected by the West.

The Vietminh plan, which was expected to be pushed by Soviet Foreign Minister Vyacheslav M. (Continued On Page Six)

## Seven Year Old Indochina War Resumes Waiting Phase

SAIGON, Indochina (AP)—The seven-year Indochina war was back in the fearful waiting phase again today after the fall of Dien Bien Phu.

In the kingdom of Laos, south of the fallen fortress, there was uneasy speculation that a new invasion toward the Laotian royal capital of Luang Prabang might be high on the war plans of the Communist-led Vietminh.

A French high command spokesman in Hanoi said he doubted the rebels would mount another general offensive in northern Indochina before the seasonal monsoon rains hit their peak at the end of June.

The Vietminh kept up their daily small attacks on French communications and scattered French force defense posts in the 11-4 French delta centered on Hanoi.

A Radio Vietminh broadcast, heard in Heng Kong today, said the captives taken in the defeat of Dien Bien Phu last Friday "include one general, the French commander of Dien Bien Phu. This was an apparent reference to Brig. Gen. Christian de Castries, though the broadcast did not use his name. Previous rebel broadcasts had claimed only the capture of the fort's "French commander" without identifying him either by rank or name.

The broadcast added that 1,800 other officers, ranking from colonel to warrant officer, also had been seized, along with 8,000 French Union troops. There was no mention of Genesvieve de Galard Ferrière, the 29-year-old French nurse who was the only woman in the fortress.

The people's army has captured all military officers and soldiers in the Dien Bien Phu area, the rebel radio said. It said 21 French Union companies had been annihilated in the battle for the fortress.

French planes ranging over north-west Indochina yesterday spotted scattered groups of rebel soldiers lining up bands of the captives for the long march over the jungled mountains to concentration camps in the North.

Mrs. Werner, who saw the accident, said that her husband swam about 10 feet before going under. Several witnesses to the accident reached Werner, towed him to shore and attempted artificial respiration with no success.

Survivors include the widow and a daughter, Lucette, 8.

He conferred with leaders of the Odham forces at Jacksonville Beach then planned a visit to Odham headquarters here. Collins ran behind both Acting Gov. Charles Johns and Odham in the May 11 Duval County vote.

Collins has a busy day here, topping it off with a television appearance on WMBF-TV tonight. He is to visit the city hall, court house, office buildings and talk to transit workers in early afternoon.

In weekend speeches in the Tampa Bay area, Collins said part of his second primary campaigning would be to cite what he called "numerous instances where payroll padding is going on."
