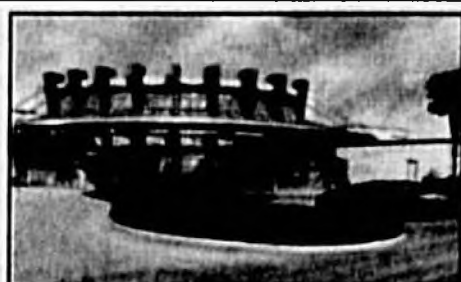

### Prison escapee caught Friday

SANFORD — Eric M. Chapman's freedom didn't last long.

After escaping from a Florida Department of Transportation work squad shortly after 1:30 Thursday afternoon, he was apprehended by Sanford police at 10:45 Friday morning. Cleo Cohen, with the Sanford Police Department said Chapman was taken into custody at a private residence on Dixie Way, less than a mile from where he was last seen. Cohen said he was taken into custody without incident, and transported to the Sheriff's Office for booking.

He had been working near the intersection of SR-46 (West First Street) and Airport Boulevard in Sanford.

Chapman was a minimum custody inmate and did not require constant sight supervision by correctional officers. He was a state prison inmate incarcerated at Central Florida Reception Center in Orlando, serving a sentence for burglary and grand theft in Seminole County.

# Teen center planned for Sanford

SANFORD — Teenagers in Seminole County may soon have a club of their own if the Sanford City Commission approves a request to put a dance hall at the corner of Park Avenue and 25th Street.

Willie "Bebe" Rumph wants to open the Bee Hive Teen Center at the location. Rumph is a Sanford businessman who owned and operated Bebe's Home Cooking on Sanford Avenue. He sold the

business last year and hopes the teen center will be equally successful.

"My son and daughter are always sitting around the house talking about, 'I ain't got no where to go. I ain't got nothing to do,'" Rumph said. "I figured if my kids are whining, so are everybody else's."

The teen center will be open from 3 to 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday, and 3 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. Friday and Saturday. Access to the club will be limited to students between the ages of 13 and 17, and the teens will be required to show identi-

fication.

"That does two things: helps us check the age, and helps the cops out," Rumph said. "Any kid coming or going from our place is going to have ID, that way if the cops stops them, they'll now who they are."

One issue sure to catch commissioners' attention is the close proximity of the teen center to Stoooges bar. Both establishments are in the same shopping center. Charles Rowe, Sanford's community

development director, said he doesn't anticipate any problems.

"There are two office suites that separate the dance hall from Stoooges," Rowe said. "There is not a provision in the ordinances that calls for a distance requirement. I suppose that will be one of the things the commission will have questions about Monday night."

## Officers nab sleeping bandit on Marshalls lot

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Two Altamonte Springs cops nabbed a sleeping bandit on the Marshalls department store parking lot early Thursday morning.

The man, identified as Andrew Edward Blice, 20, eventually confessed to an armed robbery that occurred in Orange County. He had an arsenal of attack weapons inside the vehicle. The haul dumfounded the arrest party.

"It was more than the usual," one said.

When awakened, Blice told the Altamonte Police Officers that he was coming from

Apopka and that he got tired. It was 1:30 a.m.

Officer Luis Torres said he observed the handle of what appeared to be a weapon, and told Blice to step out of his vehicle. He asked Blice if there was anything in the vehicle the police should know about and if he could conduct a search.

Blice told him about the gun, a loaded semi-automatic tech-9 with 33 rounds. Cuffing Blice and doing the search, Torres recovered an Ak-47 assault rifle with 150 rounds, a shotgun loaded with 5 rounds and 50 rounds in an ammo bag, a sledge hammer, full face mask, knife and military clothing. Also

## Women gives birth in jail, says nurses ignored her pleas

SANFORD — A woman who gave birth alone at 11:30 p.m. Tuesday at the Seminole County jail said Friday that three nurses were nearby but ignored her screams for help.

Terrian Gillette, 20, and her baby — Rashard Bruce German — were released Friday from Central Florida Regional Hospital. The boy was sent home with his father and grandmother who live in South Florida.

Gillette, a convicted cocaine courier, was returned to jail where she is awaiting sentencing. She said Friday, "I could have died. My baby could have died."

Jail director Maj. Gregory Futch of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office said that earlier in the day a guard had taken Gillette to the hospital after she told jailers her contractions had begun. Doctors dismissed her saying it was false labor and

## Lake Mary police add high-tech equipment

LAKE MARY — The city's police department is moving into the 21st Century.

By December, every police vehicle should be equipped with a mobile data terminal (MDT) and an automatic vehicle locator (AVL), Lake Mary Deputy Police Chief Sam Belfiore said. The new equipment is part of a two-phase project funded through federal grants and the city.

"Before we started this pro-

ject, we were way behind other departments technology wise," Belfiore said. "We are now bringing this department up to par or going beyond other departments in this area."

The project began in January with the purchase of a CAD (computer aided dispatch) and records management system.

SANFORD — When members of the Marching Seminoles Band, of Seminole High School, take to the practice field, the rewards reach far beyond music or learning a new marching routine.

## Veterans want aircraft for Naval Memorial

Organizers narrow choices to two sites at Sanford airport

SANFORD — Preliminary work is continuing toward a project to have a Navy Memorial display at the Orlando/Sanford International Airport, formerly the Sanford Naval Air (and Auxiliary) Air Station.

Although it has been in the mind of several Navy veterans for a considerable time, the initial project was kicked off early this year at the Sanford/Seminole County Chamber of

Commerce. Jerry Bohm, one of the Board of Directors for the Navy Memorial Committee said individual committees were still being formed and while work is going rather slowly, efforts are progressing.

Board Chairman Jack Dow commented, "The effort is gathering momentum now. There have been other attempts to do this in the past, but this time I believe we're really moving in the right direction."

Dow said the possible location for the memorial has been trimmed from six to two now, through the cooperation of the Sanford airport management.

"We're also continuing plans

Rumph also doesn't believe the center's proximity to the adult bar will be a problem.

The entrances are on opposite sides of the building and we're not going to let the kids go toward that end of the building," Rumph said. With the deputies on hand, as well as my security people, we're just not going to have a problem with it.

# SCC opens theater season with A.R. Gurney's 'Overtime'

The Fine Arts Theatre of Seminole Community College announces its 2000-2001 season.

Opening the season is A.R. Gurney's "Overtime" on Oct. 5, 6, 7, 13 and 14 at 8 p.m. and Oct. 8 and 15 at 2 p.m. "Overtime" begins where Shakespeare's "Merchant of Venice" ends, but now it's the present and Venice feels very much like America. When Portia, the once rich society girl, throws a party to celebrate her victory in the recent trial, the traveled fabric of Venetian society begins to unravel. Gurney transforms the Bard's characters in a cleverly volatile, all-too-familiar mix of ethnic archetypes.

The second show in the season is a play reading of the comedy classic "Harvey" by Mary Chase. This perennial favorite for over 50 years features the adventures of Elwood P. Dowd and his imagined great white rabbit. Winner of the Pulitzer Prize for drama in 1945, "Harvey" features both SCC students and actors from the Orlando Theatre Project. Play

dates are Nov. 30, Dec. 1 and 2 at 8 p.m. and Dec. 3 at 2 p.m. Admission is free.

"Lucky Stiff," a musical by the creators of "Ragtime," premieres Feb. 15, 16, 17, 23 and 24 at 8 p.m. and Feb. 18 and 25 at 2 p.m. "Lucky Stiff" is a musical farce that combines a madcap storyline with lots of slamming doors and witty songs. With music by Stephen Flaherty and book and lyrics by Lynn Ahrens, this off-Broadway musical won the Richard Rodgers Award, as well as a Helen Hayes Award for Best Musical.

Closing the SCC Fine Arts Theatre season is the premiere of "Easter Lilies" on March 29, 30, 31, April 6 and 7 at 8 p.m. and April 1 and 8 at 2 p.m. In this original script by SCC theatre faculty member Bobbie Bell, a wealthy Central Florida father's shady business dealings leave his dysfunctional family on the edge of financial ruin. A spoiled son, a delusional daughter and mother in self-denial all await a mysterious creditor in this premiere of a

comedy-drama about the season of resurrection and renewal.

In addition to the SCC Fine Arts season, audiences also have the option of seeing plays produced by the Orlando Theatre Project in residence at SCC. Individual ticket prices for SCC productions are \$9 general public, \$5 for senior citizens and students from other schools. Admission is free for SCC students, faculty and staff. Subscription rates range from \$24 to \$60 for SCC plays. Orlando Theatre Project plays, or combinations of both seasons. # Editorial

## Detachment is difficult in Kenya

Maybe it's the arid air that keeps the stench of the carcasses from traveling. We never notice one until we're almost upon it. Up close, we again see thin ribbons of flesh still clinging to the bones.

"Why haven't the vultures picked them clean?" I ask.  
 "Too many dead cattle," our guide, Nderi, says. "The vultures have more than they can eat."

The worst drought in 16 years has killed off up to 80 percent of the cattle in some parts of Kenya, including the Laikipia region, where we met Nderi last month. Laikipia is 100 miles northwest of Nairobi, a craggy expanse of plateaus and plains that stands on the edge of the country's desolate northeastern province.

If the rains don't come, there will be famine. I picture the news story we'll see some weeks or months from now, another poignantly familiar tragedy with an African dateline. I was here in 1984, too, but this time I'm not as anguished by the devastation. Maybe I'm more willing now to remove myself, to concede that the problems are too big for any one of us to fix.

The nomadic Samburu people that live here grow no crops and rarely hunt for food. They survive by drinking the milk and blood of their cattle. Nderi tells us his father's herd of 423 cattle has dwindled to 34. He knows even those won't last much longer, but his father won't slaughter them for the beef. A man's value is measured here in how many cattle he owns not how much dried meat is in his cupboard.

So people are beginning to go hungry. One day, as Nderi drives us out to the local school, we pass a tin-roofed building where women are gathering outside. Nderi explains there's talk of food arriving there from an aid organization — maybe the awful dried corn kernels from the U.S. that makes everyone sick — but the rumor has women coming from miles away anyway. On the horizon behind them, the sky is darkening, and as we drive we hear the rumble of thunder.

But Nderi knows better than to get his hopes up. "I don't think it's rain today," Nderi says, in a familiar refrain: "Maybe tomorrow."

Lessons are over for the day by the time we reach the school, a collection of four classrooms built of sticks and dung. Some are wearing worn-out maroon V-neck sweaters and pink collared shirts, the school uniform. Others have on whatever cast-offs their parents could find. One child's shirt has a Fanta cap for a button.

The children gather to sing, and suddenly my eyes lock on one boy in the back of the group. His arms and legs look like twigs from a dead tree. His face is all

**Dear Mayor Dale:**  
 I spoke to Paramedic Chief Martin Johnson in Sanford this morning to learn the names of the wonderful paramedics who answered my call for emergency assistance on July 1 at approximately 3:30 p.m.

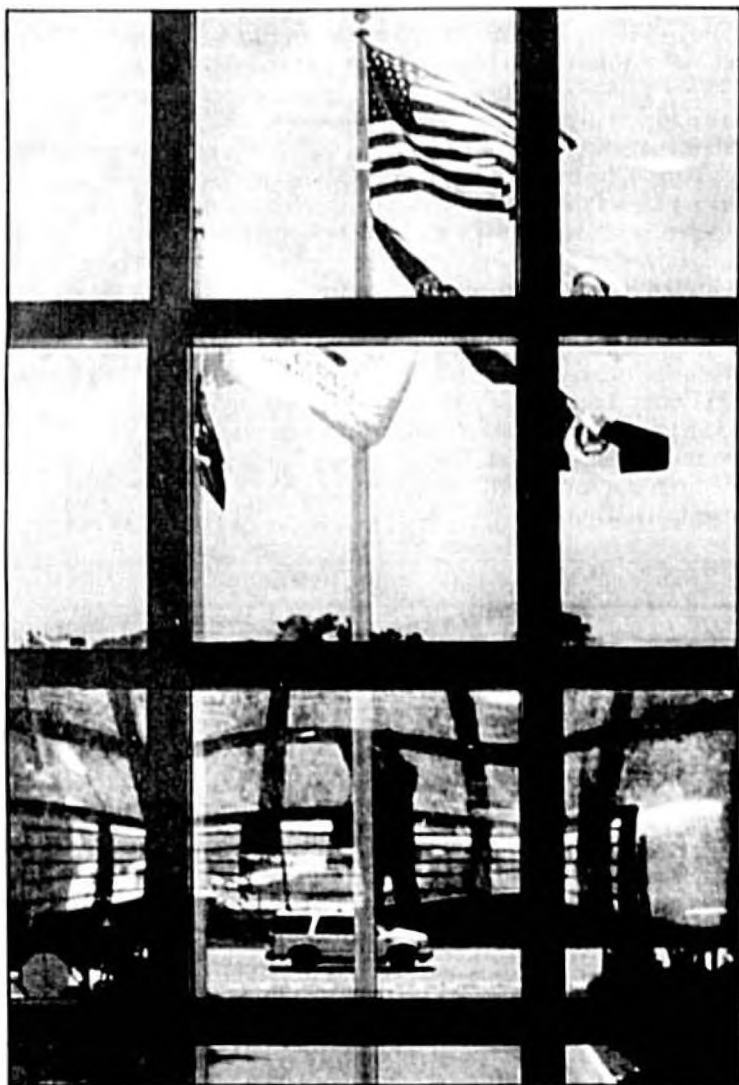

# Work at CR-427 rail crossing delayed

For the second time, work on CSA rail crossings on CR-427 has been postponed.

Most recently, road closures connected with the work were scheduled for mid-August. Now, the dates have been tentatively scheduled to begin Sept. 4th, or possibly the 11th.

CSA has informed Seminole County that the delay is due to work on other CSA areas.

Work on the General Hutchinson/Longwood-Lake Mary Road crossing is expected to take approximately one week. CSA will then move on to the tracks in Longwood, north of SR-434 on CR-427. This section of roadway will be closed to traffic for approximately two weeks.

Following this work, CSA will move on to CR-427 in Altamonte Springs, just south of Dog Track Road. This section of roadway will be closed for approximately two weeks.

Proper signage is to be put in place at each of the three sites approximately one week prior

Belfiore said. The two computerized items enabled the department to move away from what many officers refer to as the "stubby pencil" process.

CAD electronically records police dispatches and reports. Prior to the new system, dispatchers wrote the information on a card and then punched it into a time clock. When an officer was finished with a report, he or she would collect the card, add information to the report and then type everything manually.

"CAD is a real time saver," Belfiore said. "When we were doing it the stubby pencil way, we wasted time."

that she was dehydrated. Back at the jail, Gillette was locked in the infirmary and nurses checked her every 15 minutes, giving her water and juice according to Futch. The

"With CAD, you type in the information and it's there. We can even build a history database from the calls we receive."

CAD records the history of past dispatches. Officers responding to a dispatch can obtain information about a location.

Belfiore said the information is extremely valuable for residences with a history of domestic violence or weapons possession.

When phase II of the project is complete, officers will be able to talk to the communications center via computers. The calls will be dispatched to the officers through the mobile dispatch terminal, not the radio.

Officers in the vehicles will be able to do driver's license and tag checks and obtain a criminal history through the MDI. This allows the officers to save time with dispatching and information collecting.

"It also is vital to the officers' safety," Belfiore said. "You can't give a criminal history over the radio. With the MDI, the officer can have the information before they approach a scene."

The automatic vehicle locator, which also should be installed in all vehicles by December, has several benefits, Belfiore said.

"The primary benefit is officer safety," he said. "If an officer can't get to a radio for any

reason, it lets us know where the vehicle is. It narrows the search area."

The locator also allows dispatchers to know what unit is closest to an area. Instead of covering the city through zones, the communications center can dispatch directly to a particular unit.

The entire project, which includes software and 30 portable computers, cost about \$250,000, Belfiore said. All the software should be up and running by the end of the year.

"The technology enables us to respond quicker and safer," he said. "And, the whole key to this is officer safety."

toward obtaining an aircraft," he said. "We're working through the Department of the Navy on this. Then, if we obtain an aircraft, we'll have to have some way to have it moved to Sanford."

What has been hoped is that the aircraft might be one of the type used by squadrons based in Sanford at various times.

From the World War II era, when the base was first commissioned on November 3, 1942, these might include aircraft designated as PV-1,

Lockheed PBO Hudsons, SNB, VB-2, FM-1 and FM-2 Wildcats.

When the base reopened in the early 1950, the aircraft included A3D Skywarriors, A3J Vigilantes, P2Vs, AJ-1 Savage and others.

Several financial donations have already been pledged, but the major fund raising effort is not yet underway.

The Board of Directors and committees will meet later this month for continue working on plans and hopefully by that time, some aircraft may have been located.

# Doctors long for untrained patients

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** What effect has the explosion of publicly available medical information had on most doctors?

**DEAR READER:** Good question. Allow me to give you a rather long-winded, tongue-in-cheek answer.

There's a lot of interest nowadays in doctors' training. Although most people like to know where their doctors

obtained their basic education, the actual medical school seems to be less critical in the MD profile than is the post-graduate training where the doc did his or her internship and residency. For example, the most sought-after healers have trained in prestigious, university-affiliated medical centers, such practitioners usually view themselves as superior to and more skillful than mere MDs. Moreover, these self-styled Brahmins will happily debate, for hours, the relative merits of THEIR residencies at St. Sinai over the lesser virtues of Mt. Nowhere Community Health Center.

While I don't wish to devalue high-powered residencies as sources of super docs, I am convinced that physicians should take a hard look at where their patients trained, too. Patients' behavior and orientations are just as governed by their medical experiences as are doctors'. The physician who fails to recognize this is asking for trouble.

Untrained patients are the easiest to take care of. They haven't been contaminated by a little knowledge, which can be dangerous, as everyone knows. They are inexperienced. They don't really understand disease and, having never been sick, don't care to. When confronted with the observation, "Jerry, you need a prostate operation," they smile and cheerfully answer, "OK, Doc. Do what you have to do. I'm in your hands." This is the classic response of untrained patients and, in the past, it made the practice of medicine uncomplicated and enjoyable. Too bad they're becoming few and far between.

On the other hand, self-trained patients are, for all practical purposes, frustrated doctors. Like the diploma-mill physicians of years ago, these patients rely on the equivalent of mail-order medical education. They glean their knowledge from the supermarket tabloids, women's magazines, holistic pamphlets, crystal healing, harmonic convergence, aroma therapy, past-life regression, Shirley-speaks, New Age healing and Prevention magazine. They abhor traditional medicine and regularly cluster in intensive support groups where they criticize M.D.s as self-serving, ignorant, arrogant Neanderthals. They prefer macrobiotics over antibiotics. They drive doctors nuts.

Fortunately, they're generally healthy, but when, on occasion, they become ill and seek medical attention, the earth trembles. In response to the statement, "Janet, your blood pressure is sky-high. Take this medicine and check with me on Friday," they counter, "Can't I treat this with acupuncture, ginseng tea or vitamin B-15?"

Some patients undergo their training in small community hospitals. Although these people are reasonably well-versed in basic disease processes, they may not be aware of new advances in diagnosis and therapy. Also, they tend to be suspicious of doctors and nurses. They are experienced enough to recognize the unnerving frequency with which health care professionals make mistakes and fly by the seats of their pants. When told, "Your appendix is badly inflamed. You need immediate surgery," they retort, "Hold on a minute. I want a second opinion." With good fortune and continuing medical adventures, these patients can progress to the next level of expertise, providing they don't become thoroughly confused by the enormous amount of misinformation on the Internet.

Well-trained patients are the

elite. They have completed their medical education at renowned institutions and major medical centers. They have seen and done it all, no disease is too exotic and no treatment too complex for them. They have frequently been apprenticed to a knowledgeable, university-trained professor and they are invariably familiar with the convoluted intricacies of the modern health care industry. They know the difference between a beta blocker and a calcium-channel blocker. More often than not, they are socially prominent lawyers, Masters of the Universe or hospital trustees.

Proudly realizing they're in the highest echelon of trained patients, they disdain ordinary doctors and gravitate to super-specialists in large urban centers who charge megabucks for the same services for which ordinary country doctors are paid a pittance. Invariably, when they become sick, it turns out that they recently had expensive and complete annual examinations at one of the eminent national clinics

They rarely have a primary care physician, preferring instead a different specialist for each part of the body. When told, "You need to have that ingrown toenail removed," they reach for their cellular telephones and reply, "Wait a minute. I'll have to get clearance from my gastroenterologist."

Many patients have specialized training in fields such as psychiatry, gynecology, rheumatology and so forth. In fact, however, most specialties are adequately represented in the well-balanced experiences of most highly trained patients. Personally, I prefer patients who are drilled in internal medicine; they tend to be more sensitive, caring and sympathetic to their doctors as whole people, rather than as an isolated collection of esotropias and idiosyncrasies.

Advise physicians to question new patients carefully. Along with the usual queries about health insurance, allergies, medications and medications, it's truly vital to determine where the

patients trained and in which specialty. To do less is to court disaster.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Although I believe that I have above-average intelligence, I can retain new information only if I see it many times or memorize it until it becomes familiar. Do I have a learning disability?

**DEAR READER:** People exhibit marked variations in how they learn, comprehend and remember. Some individuals easily acquire information by listening, others learn more quickly by reading or looking. You seem to be the visual type.

I cannot say whether you have a learning disability. That diagnosis depends on how difficult it is

for you to retain data, regardless of how they are presented. If you are an adult who reads easily and has achieved moderate success in the world, I doubt that you have a problem. On the other hand, if you are young and have trouble with such activity, you should probably be tested. See your doctor to clarify the issue.

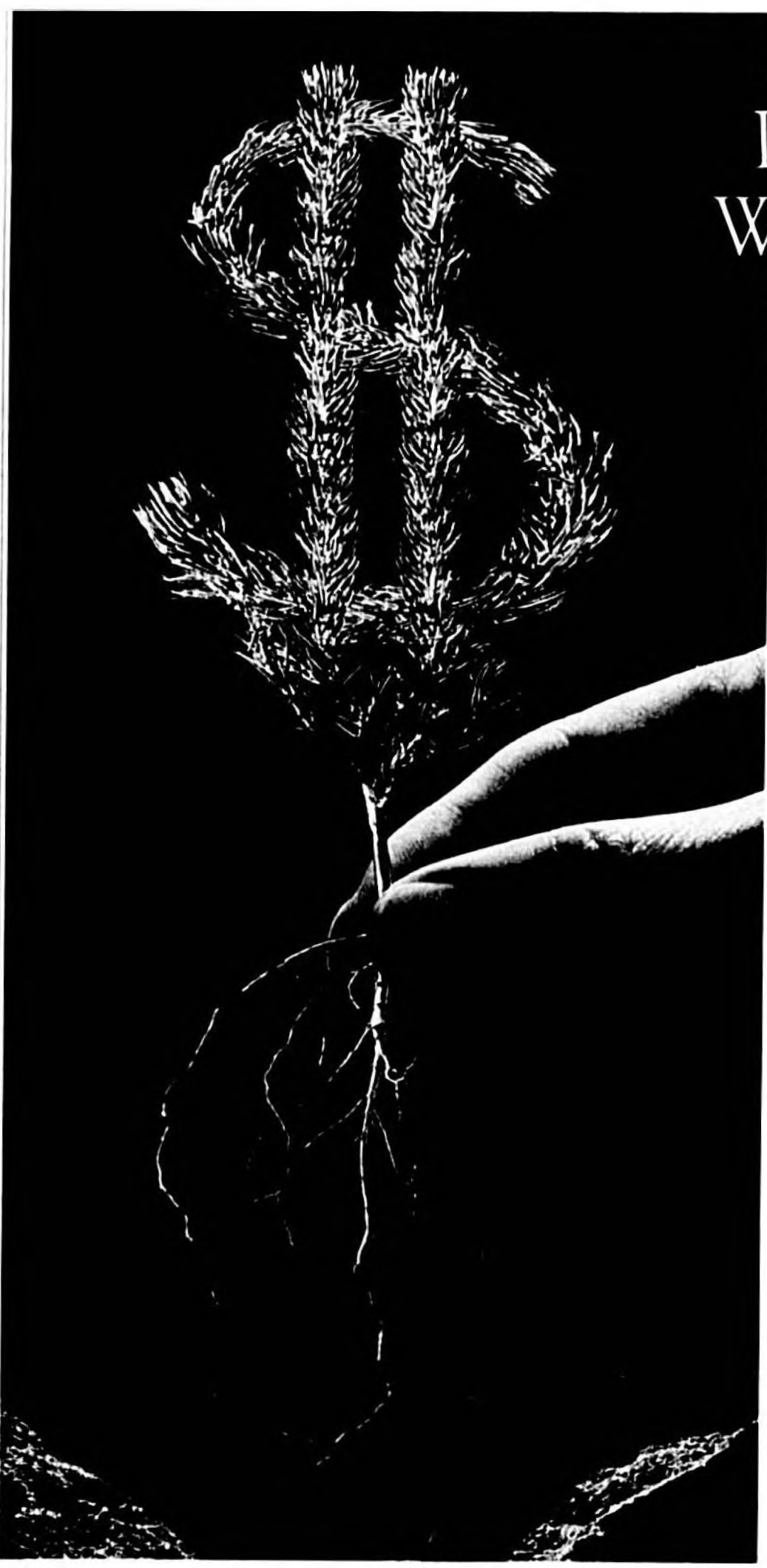

## Miracle win first playoff game

ORLANDO - Adrienne Johnson has been sensational lately and teammate Taj McWilliams was perfect Friday night.

Johnson hit a critical layup late in the contest and McWilliams scored 18 points on 7-of-7 shooting as the Miracle defeated the Cleveland Rockers, 62-56, in the opener of their Eastern Conference first-round series.

In their first postseason game ever, the Miracle pulled away before a raucous crowd of 6,365 at TD Waterhouse Centre. They can win the best-of-three series Sunday in Cleveland.

That game is set to begin at 3 p.m. and can be seen locally on the Lifetime Network or heard on the radio on WDBO-AM 860.

In a contest that featured many runs, the Rockers scored 10 straight points to close to 53-51 with 2:53 left. Merlekin Jones scored six points and Roshia Brown's layup capped the spurt.

But third-seeded Orlando had the last burst. Johnson was fouled on a layup but missed the free throw with 36 seconds to go, leaving the Miracle with a 60-55 lead.

Cleveland's Steve McCannell kept matters on a three-pointer and McWilliams made two from the line with 21 seconds remaining to close the scoring.

Orlando shot 58 percent (14-of-24) in the second half and outscored Cleveland, 24-26. The Rockers hit just 31 percent (10-of-32) in the final 20 minutes.

The Miracle survived despite only seven players seeing action and their bench being shut out, 13-0.

Nyasha Sales scored 15 points and Adrienne Johnson added 13 points, and four assists for the Miracle, who lost eight of their last 10 regular-season games. Adrienne Johnson had led Orlando in scoring four of the last six games.

Shannon Johnson was held to only six points, but was outstanding overall with eight rebounds, five assists, two steals and a blocked shot. McWilliams also had a game-high 10 rebounds and blocked two shots to go along with her points.

Jones scored 18 points and Chaisty Melvin added 14 for the second-seeded Rockers, who shot just 37 percent (23-of-62) and fell to 0-2 in road playoff games.

The Miracle, which trailed 39-38 at halftime, began the second half with a 15-1 run to open a 43-33 lead with 11:36 remaining. Sales scored eight points in that burst and Shannon Johnson closed it with a free throw.

Cleveland roared back with the next eight points to pull within 43-40 with 9:36 to play as Jones and rookie Helen Darling scored three points apiece.

Orlando then used a 9-1 spurt to gain a 52-41 advantage with 7:03 left before Cleveland made its final run.

SANFORD - The Ynots proved that their domination of the A League was for real, but the Guppies could not follow up their outstanding regular season as the Sanford Church of God won the End of the Season Tournament as the City of Sanford Recreation and Parks Department Spring Recreational Volleyball League called it a wrap last week.

## Magic ink 1st round pick Miller

ORLANDO - The Orlando Magic have signed first-round draft pick Mike Miller, General Manager John Gabriel announced Friday. Per team policy, terms of the deal are not disclosed.

Miller was the fifth overall selection in the 2000 NBA Draft. Miller (6-foot-8, 218-pounds, birthdate - 2/19/80) was a two-year starter at the University of Florida and was named honorable mention All-America by The Associated Press as a sophomore.

He became only the second player in school history to lead the Gators in scoring as a freshman and as a sophomore. While leading Florida in scoring 23 times, Miller had 52 double-digit scoring games, including nine 20-point performances during his career.

Last season, Miller was named First Team All-SEC by the coaches and Second Team All-SEC by The Associated Press after averaging 14.1 points and 6.6 rebounds per game.

He was named the Most Outstanding Player of the NCAA East Regional, helping Florida advance to the National Championship Game, where the Gators eventually lost to Michigan State.

Miller joins other Magic newcomers in forward Grant Hill (Detroit Pistons), guard-forward Tracy McGrady (Toronto Raptors), power forward Andrew DeClerq (Cleveland Cavaliers), guard Troy Hudson (Los Angeles Clippers), and guard Dee Brown (Toronto Raptors), and re-signed Magic veteran forwards Monty Williams and Bo Outlaw and center John Amaechi.

That group will combine with signed holdovers in guard Darrell Armstrong, center Michael Doleac, and guard/for-

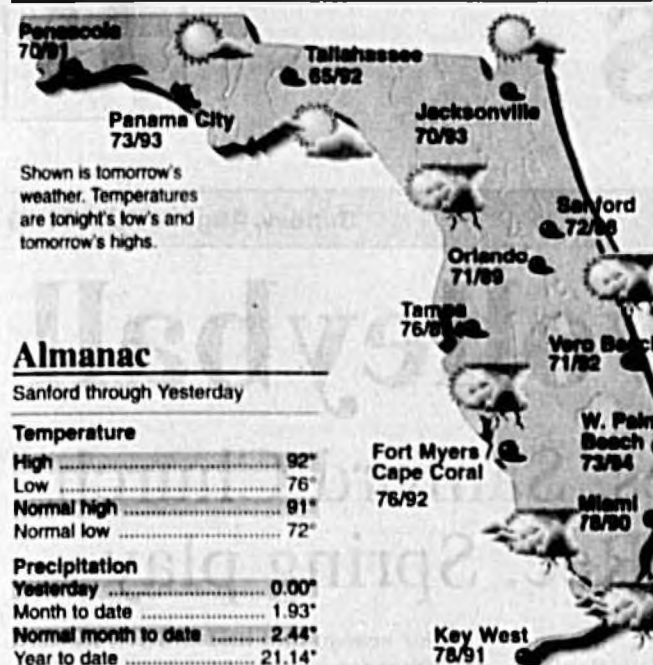

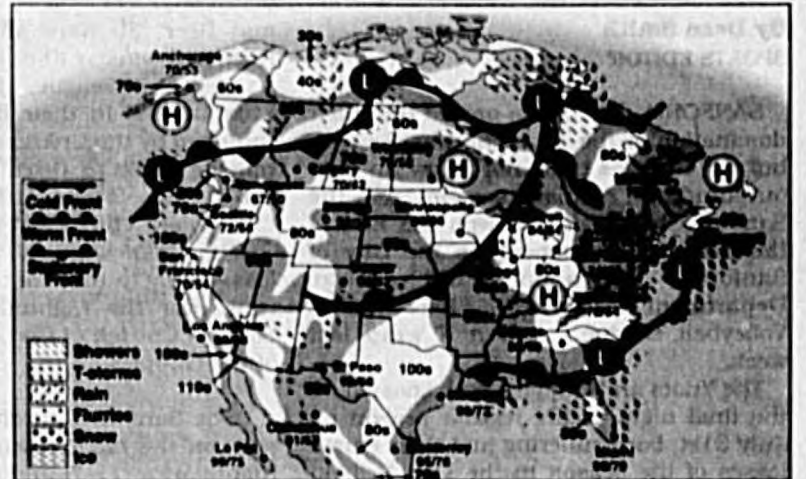

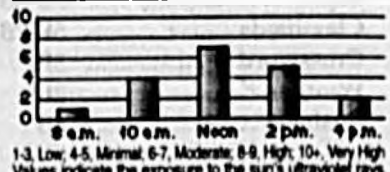

# UCF heats up with second day of two-a-days

ORLANDO - University of Central Florida battled the intense August heat in its second day of two-a-day preseason football practices, with a few players experiencing difficulties due to the heat and cramping on Friday.

The struggle with heat forced UCF out of shoulder pads and into just shorts and helmets for much of the afternoon practice.

"Practice was better this afternoon than it was this morning. We took the pads off for almost half of the afternoon practice so they could breath a little bit and get through team, skill and inside drills," said UCF head coach Mike Kruczek.

"The major problem is that once these guys relax a bit and the dehydration starts to set in, that's when you start to get muscle problems. We even had a few

people develop full body cramps in the weight room between practices," added Kruczek.

Still Kruczek liked what he saw in just UCF's second practice with the full squad.

"I think the effort has been good and that the attitude is where it needs to be. It's not easy practicing twice a day in this type of weather. It wasn't easy in two-a-days when I was in

Boston, Mass. at Boston College, but still I think we saw some good things out there today, and I'm confident that by the Georgia Tech game we will be right where we need to be."

Starting quarterback Vic Penn (Miami Senior High School) and fullback Sean Gaudion (Brandon/Hillsborough High School) both experienced difficulties with cramping during the

last half of the morning session, and linebacker Tito Rodriguez had to have four stitches in his chin after being struck by a helmet during the morning practice. All three were able to return for the afternoon practice at 100 percent.

Backup quarterback Ryan Schneider (Plantation High School) was forced to miss the afternoon session when he experienced tightness in his back

muscles due to mid-June back surgery he had to repair a herniated disc. He is expected to be able to return to the practice field early next week.

Chevy has run second for the past two weeks, and is poised for a win.

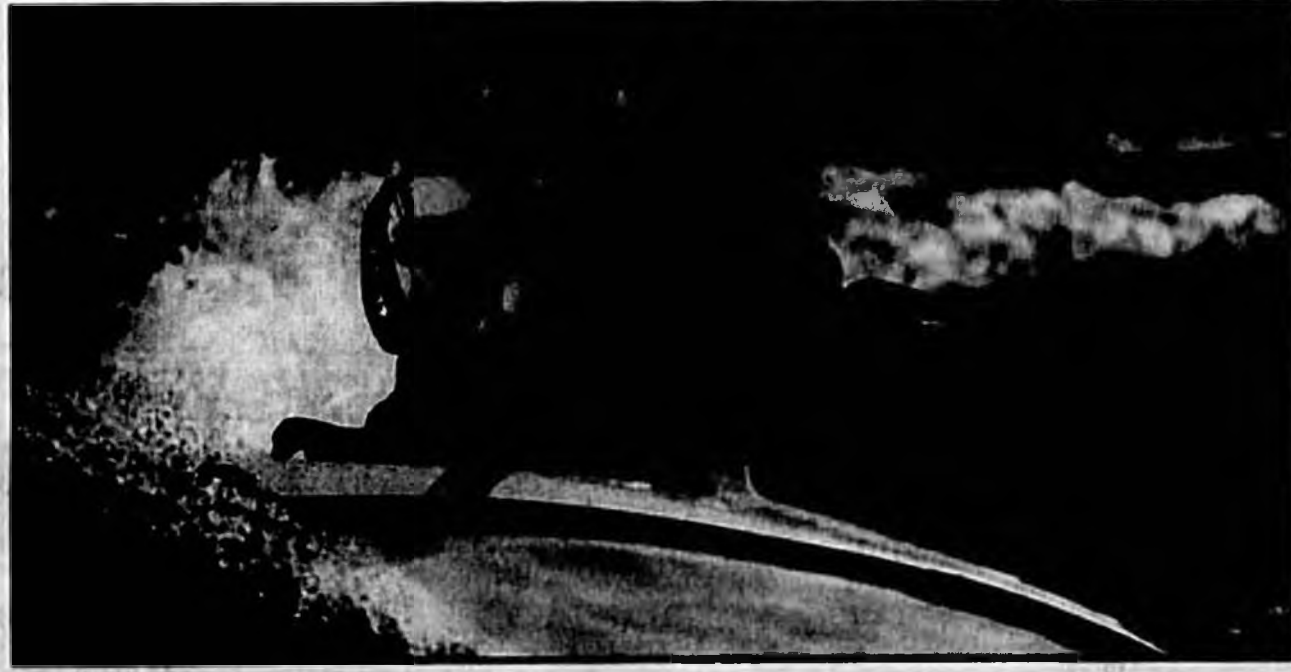
Phil Besette ran third, while Bill Morris and Bill Eggerton rounded out the field.

## People don't need to spend a lot to get cozy

Who's better in bed: Laura Ashley or Ralph Lauren? Will L.L. Bean pucker when washed? Can Eddie Bauer stand up to a strength test? And when it comes to sleeping companions, are you more likely to be soothed by a \$1,100 Egyptian cotton or a \$45 percale?

To answer these questions and more, we bought 27 sets of queen-size bed sheets from department stores, linen stores, mail-order catalogs and discount stores. We concentrated on woven sheets made of all-cotton or a cotton-polyester blend — the two best-selling types — and skipped flannel and jersey sheets.

We washed and dried our test sheets multiple times and then assessed them for fit, softness and looks. We evaluated how strong their fabrics and seams



were, and we noted if the sheets shrunk after 10 launderings, if their colors faded after 20, and whether they lived up to their advertised claims of being "wrinkle-free" or having pockets deep enough to contain today's thick mattresses.

What we found is that none of the sheets excel every category to score excellent overall, but many were excellent in one attribute or another, and a number were very good overall. Here are two attributes you should consider when shopping for sheets:

— Thread count. Often con-

sidered the benchmark for quality in sheets, thread count is the number of threads per square inch, lengthwise and widthwise. The number can range from 80 to more than 340. A lower count normally means thicker yarns; a higher count, finer yarns and a higher price. While a higher thread count is becoming a status symbol for consumers, we believe most users would be satisfied with a thread count of 180 or 200.

— Fabric. Percale is the most prevalent fabric for sheets. It's a plain weave, and the thread count is typically about 180 to 200. It may be all-cotton or a cotton-poly blend, usually in a 60/40 or 50/50 ratio. Pinpoint percale sheets, with a thread count of 220 to 250 and a somewhat different weave, are a step up in price from regular per-

cales. Sateens have a type of satin weave that gives the fabric a slight sheen and a soft, smooth feel. They are typically all-cotton and usually pricey.

Ad hype notwithstanding, a higher thread count and the use of premium cottons such as Egyptian, Pima and Supima do not guarantee quality — but they do jack up the price. And while sateen sheets were judged the softest by our trained panelists, our tests showed they might not stand up as well as other types of sheets to everyday wear.

Choosing all-cotton or a cotton-polyester blend is a matter of personal preference. The blends' affordable pricing and reliable, ready-for-bed appearance is an attractive combination. All-cotton sheets, even those that claim to be wrinkle-

free, emerge from the dryer with some crumples, but they're generally softer and more absorbent than blends.

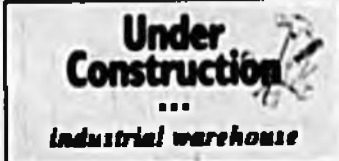
If blends rub you the right way, you can't do much better than our top-rated percale, Sears Colormate, a CR Best Buy at \$44 for a queen-size set. Laura Ashley Cottage Rose scored slightly lower, but, at \$95, costs more than twice as much. The highest-scoring all-cotton percale was Ralph Lauren The Polo Sheet Classic (\$83). These high-count percale sheets are discontinued, but you might still be able to find them, perhaps at close-out prices. Of the sateens tested, we recommend the L.L. Home from L.L. Bean (\$172 per set) or the Eddie Bauer Home (\$230).

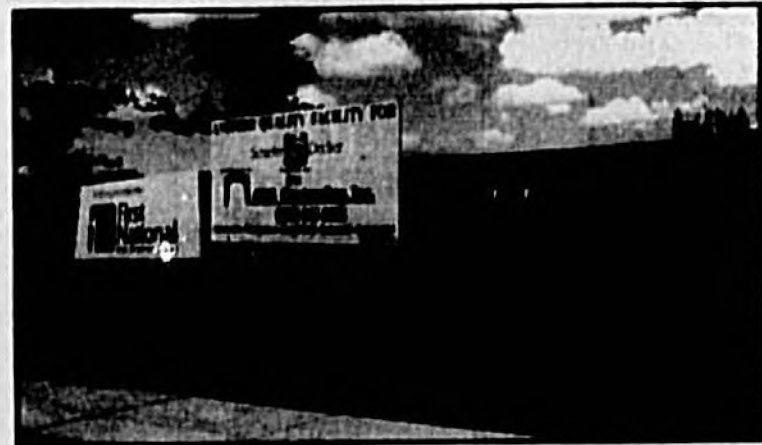

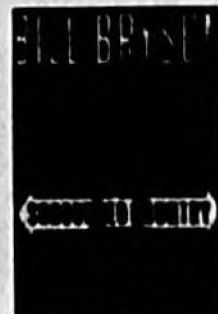

## CFRH's ER expansion will provide Sanford with top-notch care

A middle-age man is unconscious after a high-speed, head-on collision on the interstate. Paramedics suspect the man has a major head trauma. They immediately begin treating his injuries as they transport him to the nearest medical facility.

As the ambulance pulls up to the hospital, the patient goes into cardiac arrest. He's rushed into the emergency room, where a team of doctors and nurses use the latest technology to stabilize his condition and prep him for neurosurgery.

A scene from the television show "ER?" Could be. It's also a scene that could very well occur at Sanford's Central Florida Regional Hospital (CFRH).

A long time institution in the community, CFRH is undergoing a \$10.5 million renovation and expansion that will make its emergency-care department one of the top facilities in the region.

"We're not a major trauma center like Orlando Regional Medical Center," says Dr. Larry Alexander, the hospital's emergency room director, "but we are fully capable of doing whatever needs to be done."

The 20,000-square-foot expansion will increase the number of emergency room beds from 10 to 22. The nurse's station is larger, allowing nurses to monitor each patient's vital signs from one central area.

"Each of the emergency rooms has state-of-the-art heart, lung and breathing monitors," Alexander said. "In addition, we have special rooms depending on the needs of the patient: ICU, a cast room, an OB/Gyn room, a room for pediatrics, a psychological room, and an isolation room for those with contagious diseases."

The expansion is also designed so the hospital's other services are easily accessible from the emergency room. Imaging equipment like MRIs and CT Scans are adjacent to the emergency room, as is CFRH's top-rated open-heart surgery facility.

"You don't often find community hospital's with an open-heart surgery unit, but we have one of the best in the area, and it will be very accessible from the emergency room," said Rodney Smith, chief executive officer for CFRH.

Approximately 60 patients per day come through the CFRH emergency room, but not all are life-and-death situations that require heroics from the trauma team. Many of the patients have minor, though painful, injuries that need basic medical service: cuts, sprains, broken arms and sore throats. For those ailments, Alexander and his team are implementing a new concept called Fast-Track that allows minor injuries to be treated quickly.

"In the old days, it might take four or five hours to treat these types of injuries," said Bland Eng, chief operating officer for CFRH. "If you came in with a broken arm and there were a couple of heart attack patients, you would be sitting in the waiting room for awhile."

With Fast-Track, however, Alexander said a physician oversees a team of nurses and physician assistants who can quickly treat minor injuries.

"We're still providing quality care to all of our patients," Alexander

Q. Tell us about your church and its mission.

There's a great tradition, of course. We're proud to be one of the historic churches in the community. Lieberman, an Orthodox Jew, won't be judged on his religion but on his accomplishments and abilities to be a leader. America accepted Seinfeld on his comedy not his faith. America has accepted General Colin Powell and golfer Tiger Woods on who they are not the color of their skin. I watched Tiger Woods play at Augusta several years ago before he won the Masters. It was uplifting to see the huge crowd that followed him that day. America has come along way in healing barriers of this sort.

said. "They're just not having to wait as long to get it."

Rodney Smith, chief executive officer of CFRH, said the hospital is already using Fast-Track in its current emergency room, and patients like it.

"After we started doing Fast-Track, patient satisfaction increased remarkably," Smith said. "That's what patients are looking for: fast service, good service and customer-friendly service."

In addition to implementing Fast-Track, CFRH is making a conscious effort to design the hospital's expanded facilities so patients can quickly get to where they need to go. The design — what Eng calls an "out-patient mall" concept — will allow patients to enter the hospital through a new south-side entrance for both emergency and out-patient services.

"Hospitals used to be designed with several different entrances for the various services it provided," Eng explained. "You went to one side of the building for out-patient, and another side for emergency. What happened was people would get mixed up and go in the wrong entrance. We're trying to avoid that because you don't want someone having a heart attack going to the wrong entrance."

Eng said the hospital is also trying to eliminate much of the travel a patient has to do within the hospital. For instance, a patient in either the Fast-Track section of the emergency room will not have to walk or be transported to the lab to have blood work done. Instead, a phlebotomist will draw the blood in the emergency room, then send it to the lab through a network of high-speed tubes, much like banks use at drive-throughs.

"We're anxious to get into the new facilities, the bigger facilities and serve our patients better," Alexander said.

"This really is exciting, even for a lay-person like me," Smith added. "We've got one of the best medical staffs in the area, and probably the friendliest. They're all very excited about these new changes."

If you are divorced, you can receive benefits on your ex-husband's (or wife's) Social Security record if he (or she) is receiving Social Security benefits (or is deceased) and your marriage lasted 10 years or

longer; you are presently unmarried; and you are age 62 or older. (If he or she is deceased, you can collect benefits at age 60; age 50 if you become disabled.)

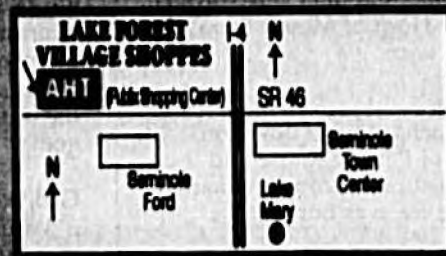
