

Locals Drop Two Out Of Three To G-Men

Second Game Of Four Game Series Called Because Of Rain With Sanford Leading

Lookouts Lose Third Game When G-Men Score Two Runs In Ninth To Win 2 To 1

The Sanford Lookouts were able to take but one game in the four-game series with the league leading Gainesville G-Men over the weekend. Gainesville took the first game, the second game was rained out, the Gainesville club took the third and the Lookouts rallied to win the fourth.

In the first game, Lefty Joe Sparkman effectively blanked the locals, allowing them but six scattered hits while the G-men were collecting 12 hits good for six runs off Early Wynn, pitching for Sanford.

The second game rained out a break for the G-Men in the second inning, the Lookouts were leading 5 to 0 with the bases loaded and one out. Then the rain poured down and the game was called.

Yesterday the Sanford Club traveled to Gainesville to meet them in another double bill. In the first game, Big Dan Bralnard was on the mound for the locals. The Lookouts played loose ball behind him and he was in trouble one or two times. Sanford held a one to nothing lead until the last inning when the G-Men scored twice to take the ball game. Revell led off with a single and was sacrificed to second by Devereux Livingston, backing for Rogino, fled to right. Staub walked and Sparkman hit a ball back of second which Buddy Lake went back and fielded. On the play Revell rounded third and came home. Lake threw home but the umpire called the runner safe on a very close play. Wright went in for Bralnard at this point. McMullen singled on the first ball pitched scoring Staub. This was a hard game for the Lookouts to lose and only the great fight in them kept them in there to win the second game.

In the fourth game of the series, the locals won by a score of four to two. Sanford used Mote, Ochs, and Wright, while Gainesville pitched for the win. Wright allowed the G-Men but one hit in his four innings on the mound.

The Lookouts play the Palatka team in Sanford today. The locals are only three and one half games out of first place.

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State League Now Led By Deland's Star Infielder

Chuck Aleno Passes Martin Of Daytona With .338 Average

ORLANDO, Aug. 2.—For the first time in weeks, pitching predominated Florida's State League play, a fact reflected in the general slump of a large majority of the 66-odd regular players whose marks touched the .300 or better figure.

Official averages released here by League Secretary Peter Michael reveal that Chuck Aleno, the flashy Deland third sacker, has replaced Popper Martin of Daytona Beach as the league's leading batter among the majority-game regulars. The figures covering the week ending with games of Thursday night, July 29.

In 78 games to date for Martin, Aleno has pounded out 164 hits in 308 trips for an average of .338, just three points better than the 345 of Martin. Aleno also is second in runs batted in with 63.

Four players cracked the .350 or better mark for the first time in weeks. They were: Smith of Palatka, Orlando, of Ft. Augustine, Honner of Leesburg and Overstreet of Orlando.

The Deland Reds boosted their club batting mark in a 7-1, six points ahead of the Daytona Beach Islanders, mainly because of their record-breaking 25-10 victory over Orlando.

The game saw the runs scored, hits piled out (26) and runs batted in (21) marks equalled, and two new marks established. Adair became the first player to score six runs inside eight innings, and a world record in organized ball was believed set when the first 11 batters to face Orlando pitchers scored runs.

Orlando held its slim club fielding lead over Deland, nearly losing it Wednesday night when the Gulf infield bobbled eight times, a record for the Orlando season.

Merritt Hubbell, brother of the New York Giant star, still remains undefeated among the hurlers with five straight victories, while Elbert Padgett of Gainesville has boosted his victory string to 19 in 22 decisions.

Jap Airplanes Bomb Armies Of Opposition

Advancing Forces Of Chinese Subjected To Air Attacks On Border Of Shantung

Nippon Infantry Is Pushing South

More Jap Re-Inforcements Pour In From Manchoukuo Bases

TIENTSIN, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Japanese warplanes rained bombs on the vanguard of advancing Chinese armies today at Tschow on the border of Hopeh and Shantung provinces, 80 miles south of here.

A column of Japanese infantry, supported by artillery and tanks, was pressing southward by forced marches, to dispute the advance of central government troops into Hopeh province.

While more reinforcements poured in from Manchoukuo, the Japanese-sponsored state on the north, Japanese scouting and bombing planes rained over a wide area to the south.

After twice bombing Peipingfu on the Peiping-Hankow Railway southwest of Peiping, one of the Japanese planes proceeded south into the heart of Honan province to hit the Changchow strategic rail junction and most important Chinese military center of the vicinity.

Other Japanese planes attacked Tschow, capital of Shantung province, to the east.

Tropical Storm, In Making, Reported By Weather Bureau

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The Weather Bureau said today there was evidence of development of a tropical storm over the Northern Bahamas islands.

Small craft along the East Coast of Florida and in Northern Bahama waters were warned to exercise caution during the next 24 hours.

The Weather Bureau issued the following advisory at 9:30 A. M.: "Squally weather was reported at 8:00 A. M. over the Northern Bahamas islands and the ocean to the northwest with pressure somewhat below normal and evidence of the development of a slight circulation with the center about 15 miles northwest of Nassau. The conditions appear to be moving northward. The highest winds reported were 25 to 30 miles an hour but may increase. Small craft along and on the East Florida Coast and north of the Bahamas should exercise caution during the next 24 hours."

Weather observers said the disturbed conditions—not yet a full storm—first were reported last night.

Byrd Leads Fight Against Bill For Large Re-vamping

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Senator Byrd, Democrat, Virginia, charged yesterday that the administration's bill to reorganize the executive branch of the government would give President Roosevelt a vast amount of power which congress could be sure of recovering only by a two-thirds vote.

The Virginian, who long has argued that governmental reorganization should effect greater economies than the administration has proposed, opened fire on the measure at a Senate committee hearing.

Charles E. Merriam, a member of the President's reorganization committee, retorted from the witness stand:

"I don't know whether Senator Byrd seriously intended to intimidate the (President's) committee did not intend to maintain the Democratic form of our government, but if he did, I resent it."

Byrd replied: "I said nothing about anybody's intentions. I only said what was (Continued on Page Three)

Co-operating with the Florida State Chamber of Commerce to their "buy Florida" drive for the coming year, the Florida State Agricultural Marketing Board and other State-wide agencies are making efforts to sell souvenirs and useful articles made of Florida raw materials to the tourist in place of the German and Japanese made articles depicting Florida that the tourist now buy.

Mrs. Gladys Kendall, house demonstration agent here, received the following message from the Florida State Marketing Board recently:

"Do you know of any people in your community who either now are making or are able to make unusual and interesting products from native raw materials? We have a wide range of things which will be interesting as souvenirs and memorabilia which our tourists will be glad to buy. These may be useful articles of just 'souvenir' type. We have found opportunities of this sort.

which if followed through, will be the means of providing extra income to our citizens. Therefore, the difficulty in the marketing of this type product has been the lack of sales machinery for placing these things before the buyer at a minimum cost. 11 Passengers, Crew Of Three On Board Huge Aircraft Which Was On Regular Hop

Other Planes Of Line Join Search

Two Department Of Commerce Officials Among Passengers

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The War Department received a message from its Panama military establishment today asserting an army plane had located the missing Pan-American-Grace Airways flying boat 30 miles northeast of Cristobal but had found no signs of life near it. The brief radio message said merely that the airplane which carried 11 passengers and a crew of three was located "totally under water with no signs of life."

BALBOA, Canal Zone, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Twenty-two United States navy planes fanned out over the Isthmus and coastline today in search of the missing Pan-American-Grace Airways flying boat with 11 passengers and a crew of three.

Two squadrons from the Navy air base at Coco Solo combed the area south of the plane which had not been heard from since it reported bad weather at 7:16 P. M. last night.

The Navy Department at Washington said a total of 65 planes, the Navy aircraft tender, Teal, the survey ship Nokomis and the destroyers Taylor and Habbitt had been ordered into the search.

A radio message last night indicated the ship was nearing Cristobal, its destination, on the Atlantic side of the canal and was descending in search of an opening in a heavy cloud bank.

The Pan-American clipper, scheduled to take off at 6 A. M. today for Miami, Florida, and with which the missing ship was to have made connections cancelled its flight and joined the search.

All other Pan-American-Grace Airways ships also were taken from their regular service to hunt the big Sikorsky amphibian which was flying from Guayaquil, Ecuador.

The pilot was Stephen Dann, among the passengers were two United States Department of Commerce officials—Max Martin and C. Q. Caldwell—Thomas Wakely, representative of the National City Bank of New York and Oscar Miller, a Ford Motor Company employe.

Court Vacancy Stirs Up Row In Senate Chamber

(Continued From Page One)
has filed that the Chief Executive can fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Justice Willis Van Devanter on June 9, either now or after Congress adjourns.

Although Stephen T. Early, a presidential secretary, said Roosevelt has not decided when he will name Van Devanter's successor, some senators assumed the President intends to fill the vacancy by a recess appointment.

Senator Burke, Democrat, Nebraska, one of the leading opponents of the President's proposal to reorganize the Supreme Court, said if a recess appointment is made and the nominee takes his place on the court before being confirmed, he will consider that "sufficient grounds to vote against confirmation."

Even Chairman Ashurst, Democrat, Arizona, of the Senate Judiciary committee, who supported the President's court bill, commented that "a wise man would not take his seat until confirmed by the Senate."

In the midst of the furor over the White House announcement, the Judiciary committee unanimously approved a resolution for a broad inquiry into all phases of the President's reorganization proposal.

It endorsed a resolution by Senators Burke and Hatch, Democrats, New Mexico, a Roosevelt supporter calling for appointment of a group of Judiciary committee members to study the entire question and report "from time to time."

With an appropriation of \$10,000 the committee would be directed to inquire into "all matters relating to the reorganization of the courts of the United States, the appointment of additional judges for any such courts, and the reform of judicial procedure."

Hatch said he believed the study either would "do something worthwhile, or demonstrate we can't agree on anything."

He expressed the opinion a constitutional amendment for compulsory retirement of judges of 75 years of age is needed.

The proposal for a study of the Judiciary issue came on the floor of Senate consideration of the lower court bill which has been substituted for the President's measure. Senate leaders said they expect to take up that measure today after disposing of the Wagner housing bill.

Administration spokesmen acted quickly yesterday when Senator Vandenberg offered his resignation against recess appointment of Supreme Court members.

Although the Michigan senator asked his proposal be permitted to lie on the table, Ashurst and Democratic Leader Burke, of Kentucky, both advocating sending it to committee for study.

Vandenberg left it on the vice president's table, subject to consideration at any time.

The Vandenberg resolution drew sharp criticism from Senator Connally, Democrat, Texas. "It is not within the province of this body to fill the President's office to make appointments," Connally said.

Most of the Roosevelt court bill foes did not challenge the validity of Attorney General Cummings' opinion. Burke, however, said he was not sure it was correct and that he would study the question thoroughly.

Senator McCarran, Democrat, Nevada, said the Constitution provides for naming Supreme Court justices "with the advice and consent of the Senate, and before Congress convenes again the nomination should be sent up at once."

Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, said the attorney general had "ample precedent" for his opinion, but contended "the precedents grew out of political exigencies and are in conflict with the plain, simple and unambiguous language of the Constitution."

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Mystery surrounded preparations of 182 American pilots, each of them with a mechanic or two, to sail soon for China to man combat planes.

The Times today quoted Russell L. Hearn, soldier of fortune and former general staff officer with Marshal Chang Tso Lin, as telling: "Mr. Tao Heng Chin, here on a lecture tour, that 182 pilots had signified their willingness to go to China and that each had his own mechanics."

Hearn said he had a report the Chinese central government had 392 planes for which it had no pilots, but declared it a violation of federal law to recruit them here.

Joe DeMaggio Big Threat To Babe Ruth's Home Run Record Of 60 Set In 1927

Bombarding Italian Says He Hasn't Any Particular Ambition To Break Record

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Joining Joe DeMaggio, who insists he hasn't any particular ambition to break Babe Ruth's all-time home run record, is challenging the Bambino's mark whether he wants to or not.

Although it's improbable that any batter can duplicate Ruth's runaway through the last month of the 1927 season, when he clubbed 17 out of the lot, the deadpan dynamite of the New York Yankees may have a chance to come within shouting distance of the Babe's 60-homer mark for a season.

At any rate, he's in front of the Bambino's record right now, for the same period of play. The Babe hit his thirtieth homer in the eighty-second game of the '27 campaign, and then went without one for nearly two weeks, finally breaking the ice with his thirty-first in the ninety-third contest.

DeMaggio, despite a late start in which he missed the season's first 10 games hit his thirty-first Sunday, in what was officially the Yankee's eighty-ninth game or the ninety-first if two ties are included.

In the 21 games in which he has been action, DeMaggio has clubbed one round-tripper on an average of every 27 innings. In Ruth's big year, his average up to the time he belted No. 61, was every 27 innings.

However, even should DeMaggio keep up his present pace, he would still fall short of the big Ruth year. And he would have to quicken that pace by 100 percent during the last month of the season to hang onto the listening bellies the Babe did in his September slugger 10 years back.

But regardless of his chances of eclipsing Ruth's record—and they're slim at best—DeMaggio has been doing a lot of pretty fair country clubbing so far in his sophomore year. Except for three instances, his longest lapse in games between homers was four contests. Twice he hit at least one each day, three days in succession. On four occasions, he has hit two homers in one game, and once he whacked three in a single contest.

His job, particularly at home in Yankee stadium, is harder than was Ruth's. The Babe, a left-handed hitter, found the shorter right-field bleachers in the stadium an easy target. DeMaggio, a right, has the more distant left and center field stands to shoot at, both at home and on tour through the circuit. Jarring Joe has clubbed at least one "four-bagger in every park in the league, with the single exception of Boston.

Florida Markets Are Results Of Improved Stock

Gainville, Fla., Aug. 3.—The development of Florida's fine system of livestock markets is the direct result of improvement in cattle and hogs produced in this state during the past few years, according to Walter J. Sibley, animal husbandry agent with the State Agricultural Extension Service.

Not many years ago, he pointed out, there were few markets where farmers could "dispose of their cattle and hogs. The cattle were inferior in size and quality and the small "porker" hogs, parasite-infested hogs were not wanted on the market. Most of the stock sold by the farmer during those days were sold to local consumers and very few were shipped from the state.

Education of ticks enabled farmers to import good bulls and the adoption of advanced methods of feeding, breeding, and management were responsible for steady improvement of cattle. The razor-back gave way to his high class brother—the pure-bred Poland China, Duroc Jersey, Hampshire, and other good breeds—and Florida

hogs began improving in size and quality. "When a farmer produces what the public wants, he can sell it and this was the case with Florida livestock," Mr. Sibley said. "Co-operative sales and the establishment of markets for Florida livestock began. Buyers began coming to Florida for meat animals and Florida stock began competing with stock of other states on the big markets. Today, much of our livestock is shipped to large Eastern markets, where it holds its own with beef and pork from other sections. In short, the market system available to our farmers today resulted from the farmer's efforts to improve his stock."

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Assistant State Attorney Wilbert F. Crowley announced today that Donald Horst, two, snatched last night from his parent's home, had been found and was safe in Crowley's office. The prosecutor did not immediately give the details of how and where the child was located. Crowley left his office about 9:40 A. M. with a large statement he expected to be back within an hour with "important information."

Child Finds Mother Slain, Father Dying



Grim fate chose Colleen Sweeney (above), 4, to discover a terrible tragedy in her home at Hollywood. In a bedroom the child found the body of her mother, Mrs. Gilbert Sweeney, 21, apparently strangled to death. Aid nearby she discovered her father, L. A. Sweeney, 25, near death with his wrists slashed.

Crowley returned about 10:30 A. M. and announced the child, son of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Horst, was safe.

Crowley said Mr. and Mrs. John Regan told him that the Regans told him they were Donald's natural parents. The Regans were questioned at Crowley's office.

A birth certificate filed with a board of health showed Donald Otto Horst was born Jan. 4, 1936 at a residence on the West of Chicago. The certificate was signed by the Chicago health officer, Dr. John A. Ross.

Crowley said Regan and his wife, Lydia, told him they took the baby from Mrs. Horst and drove away with him in an automobile they said was driven by Fred Ewert for whom a search by police of seven states was hampered. Ewert was the chauffeur for Dr. Ross, partner of Horst in the sound equipment manufacturing business. Crowley said he expected Ewert to appear shortly at his office.

Police reported it was not until 35 minutes after the kidnaping that they got the alarm. This was the story told by Mrs. Horst to the police.

Cowan Returns To City After Tour Of Many U.S. Sections

E. T. Cowan, owner of the Cowan Company store here who returned recently from a buying trip which took him through 13 states, brought back very optimistic reports of business conditions in the manufacturing centers of the nation.

Manufacturing centers, Mr. Cowan reported, are more flourishing this year than they have been in a number of years, and because of the lack of surplus which now will guarantee immediate delivery on orders, a condition which exists mainly because of a steady increase in the sale of their goods. However, Mr. Cowan stated that in a few instances prolonged strikes were the cause of the shortage of stock at the present time.

He also stated that he was surprised to find that most of the manufacturers he contacted had become more or less reconciled to the prospects of governmental regulation of wages and hours of their employees.

Nation's Richest Grain Harvest Is Foreseen For '37

Wheat, Corn, Oats And Rye, Almost Double Last Year's Crops

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The Nation's richest grain harvest since 1929 was envisioned yesterday by Chicago crop experts. They predicted in their monthly forecast that the United States would reap 4,312,000 bushels of major grains—wheat, corn, oats and rye—this year compared with 2,940,000 bushels in 1936. At current market prices this large grain harvest would have a value of \$2,114,700,000 or 14 percent greater than last year.

Six private crop authorities, organized wherever grain is grown or traded, predicted domestic crop production would total 2,771,000,000 bushels, the largest crop since 1922, while the indicated wheat harvest was 151,000,000 bushels, the largest since 1931. This crop yield, however, has the highest market value of any crop since 1929 while the wheat crop's value is the highest in a decade.

The estimate of the experts—E. O. Crowell, Nat. Murray, E. W. Ross, E. C. Donovan, E. H. Miller and James E. Bennett—were based on personal field inspection trips and on reports from thousands of farmers, elevator men and millers. The grain trade experts an average of their figures as a reliable indication of crop prospects.

Various estimates today on crops, considering about ideal growing weather the last month, ranged from 2,715,000,000 to 2,924,000,000 bushels but the average was 2,940,000,000 greater than the best government estimate released early in July. Current prices show this potential crop a market value of \$1,264,350,000. The 1936 crop was set by drought to only 1,584,212,000 bushels.

The average on September wheat was 142,000,000 bushels, indicating a loss of approximately 50,000,000 during July as a result of rust damage in the Northwest. The experts admit that because of rust, actual production was uncertain and could be determined accurately only by harvest. The 1936 crop was set by drought to only 158,212,000 bushels.

Celery Pact Gets Partial O.K. By Board

Tentative Approval In Given Federal Marketing Agreement By Officials Of AAA

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—(AP)—The Agricultural Adjustment Administration announced tentative approval yesterday of a Federal marketing agreement regulating the handling of celery grown in Florida.

M. L. Wilson, acting secretary of Agriculture approved the program which will be submitted to the industry for signature. The AAA will conduct a referendum among growers to determine whether they favor issuance of an order based on the marketing agreement.

Officials said the agreement contained provisions similar to the Florida celery marketing agreement that operated in 1934.

The AAA said unusually heavy shipment of celery during the 1937 season resulted in over-supplies on markets which depressed prices received by growers.

Major provisions of the proposed Federal marketing program are: "Regulation of certain shipments on a volume basis; establishment of a control committee; consent to provide funds for operation of the agreement; and termination."

The control committee could confer with approval of the Secretary of Agriculture, provision of shipments among shippers and growers.

This committee would consist of eight shippers and an equal number of growers appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Eckersons To Spend Big Sum For Expansion

Improvements Will Make Plant One Of Largest In Florida Employing Over 100

Improvements which will make the Eckerson Canning plant one of the largest in the state and provide for employment of more than double last year's payroll are being launched under the direction of Earl G. Eckerson, president of the plant.

In addition to modernizing the existing plant, which will be expanded to include a new building, over 100,000 sq. ft. of new equipment is being added to the existing plant, which it is believed will increase the output of the plant from 100,000 cases of canned fruit per day to approximately 200,000.

The new plant, which is to be located in the Sanford area, will be a modern, up-to-date facility, which will provide for the processing of additional labor.

Company officials indicated that only local labor is being used in the plant and all supplies required for the installation of the new equipment will be furnished from the plant.

Dehydration of vegetables and fruits for cattle feed is an innovation in the industry and will utilize the underutilized vegetable products.

The equipment is to be manufactured and installed in a two-story building adjoining the cannery which is now under construction by the Longshore Packing Machinery Company of Louisville, Ky.

The equipment and building for the dehydrating plant, it is estimated, will cost approximately \$20,000.
