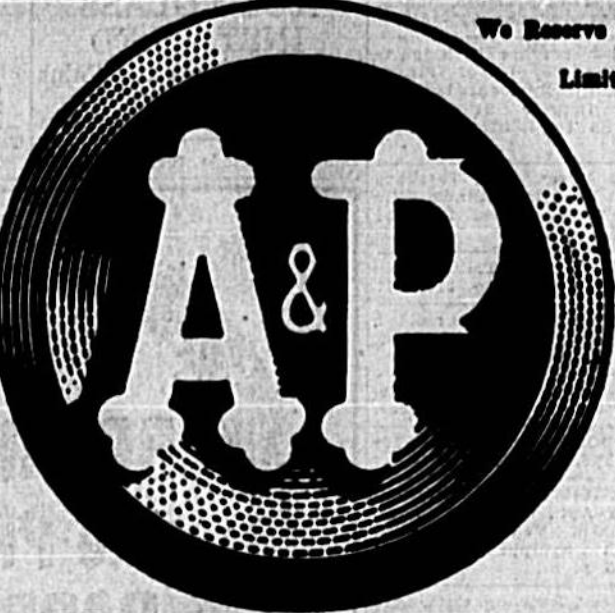

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Retirement Age To 60

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Optimistic Senate leaders, encouraged by its smooth progress so far, spoke of the possibility of a final vote tonight on President Johnson's historic \$6.8 billion Medicare bill.

Moving with almost clock-precision, the Senate swept through a long series of amendments to the measure Wednesday, prompting the bill's manager, Sen. Russell B. Long (D-La.), to say it was "not out of the question" that the crucial final vote might come tonight.

In any case, Long added, "It should be relatively easy to get a final vote on the sweeping welfare and health care package Friday."

There were, however, a number of amendments still to be offered. Among them was one proposed by Sen. Carl T. Curtis (R-Nebr.), which would base on a patient's income the amount he would be required to contribute to the cost of his hospitalization.

House Leaders Fight Voting Rights Threat

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House managers of President Johnson's voting rights bill were confident today they would turn back the legislative threat yet to the strongest of a Republican alternative with Southern support.

The House was expected to wind up general debate on the measure today and begin consideration of amendments. The first test could come on a substitute sponsored by Rep. William McCulloch (Ohio), which would delete the House Judiciary committee.

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Spacecraft Center Once Grazing Land

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI) — Inside building No. 50, a group of men and machines controlled America's greatest space drama, the four-day voyage of Gemini 4.

In this same building four years from now, if all goes as planned, another group will be keeping track of the first U.S. manned landing on the moon.

Here about 25 miles southeast of downtown Houston, is the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's manned spacecraft center.

It is one of the impressive space bases reaching across the southern tier of states to Cape Kennedy by way of New Orleans, Hock County, Mass., and Huntsville, Ala. All play a major role in the fantastic Apollo mission initiated by President Kennedy in 1961.

But the heart of Project Apollo, and the forerunner Gemini program, lies behind the ultra-modern concrete and glass walls of the campus-like Manned Spacecraft Center (MSC) here.

It is here where the vast American manned spaceflight program is coordinated, where its astronauts live and are trained and where the sophisticated spacecraft that will carry man deep into space are tested.

Four years ago, the area was flat grazing land populated by cattle, deer and rattlesnakes. Land that only a few years ago was selling for \$200 an acre has been priced recently as high as \$10,000 an acre.

The Gemini-4 flight of astronaut James McDivitt and Edward White last month brought world-wide attention to MSC, or "NASA" as it is known locally. It was the first time an American manned space shot had been controlled away from Cape Kennedy.

But just as important is the quieter work going on preparing for the biggest mission of them all, the first Apollo moon shot.

Many of the center's futuristic buildings are devoted to training America's 24 astronauts for upcoming flights and to development and testing of the Apollo ship and its components.

The entire eight-year Apollo program is being managed by a series of ground stations, items by item, under conditions as close as possible to those found in space.

"We believe that the space age has advanced to the point where the design can be accomplished and tested almost entirely on the ground," said Dr. Joseph P. Shea, Apollo program manager.

"The work is hard, demanding, detailed and very often mundane," he said.

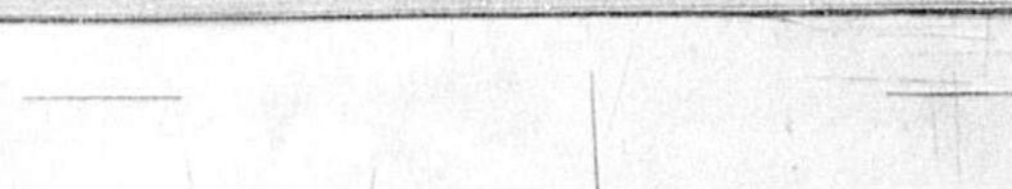

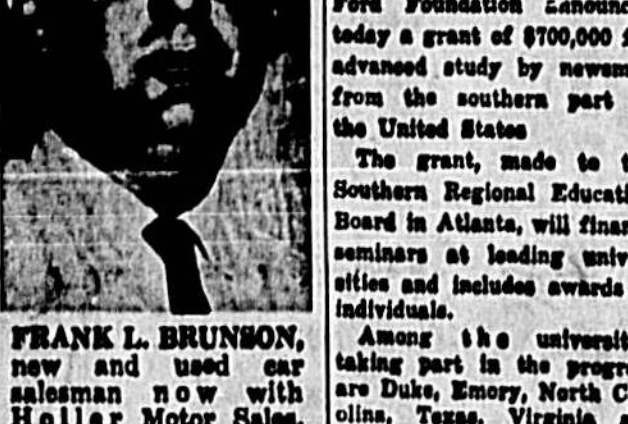

'Wasteland'

The Federal Communication Commission continues to search for cultural cases in what former FCC head Newton Minow described as the vast wasteland of American television.

The commission has come up with a new idea to combat the overcommercialization of TV by—of all things—giving advertisers a greater hand in programming.

The plan would require each network to have 50 per cent of its evening programs supplied and controlled directly by advertisers. This means that networks would produce and broadcast only two hours of entertainment nightly instead of the present four hours.

The proposal has aroused not only the understandable opposition of the networks but of other interested parties. It is, alleges publisher Arthur H. Motley, a disguised form of censorship which would inevitably lead to attempts to control all communications media.

Under the present system, about 10 per cent of total programming, including the most outstanding documentaries, is supplied by the networks from their own production resources, and 82 per cent by independent producers working with advertisers, who then pick and choose the ones they wish to sponsor.

Only 7 per cent of the programs are furnished directly by advertisers, who has not been exactly noted for their daring, innovation or eagerness to sponsor any but bland, uncontroversial and surething programs.

The FCC proposal would, say the networks, reduce the variety, quality and number of programs now available to the public—which would, indeed, be quite an accomplishment.

All in all, this attempt to turn the wasteland into a garden seems more like carrying sand to the Sahara.

Meanwhile, in another part of . . .

Antenna Jungle

CATV is a four-letter nonword standing for Community Antenna Television — the piping in of programs to subscribers for a monthly fee.

Originally begun in the early days of television as a way to bring programs to people in remote areas outside the range of existing broadcasting stations, CATV has grown to about 1,300 companies today serving over three million people in 48 states.

Up to now, because it transmits by wire, CATV has itself been beyond the range of the Federal Communications Commission and has been able to pick network programs out of the air free of charge and sell them to its customers.

According to its opponents, CATV's competitive advantage could result in the still-birth of hundreds of local stations in the as-yet untapped UHF area of broadcasting frequencies.

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Winds Of Change

WASHINGTON — For the deal with the explosion in the world population and the growing scarcity in world resources, Lyndon Johnson has strongly urged that the United States Government take action to encourage birth control.

In his first State of the Union Message, Mr. Johnson promised that as a President, he would seek new ways to help the world's population.

The occasion of the 30th anniversary of the United Nations inspired the President to urge the whole world to join in a population control campaign. He explained in dollars and cents terms why this is necessary. Given "the multiplying populations" and old concepts of foreign aid have followed since World War II are out of step with the times.

"Let us act on the fact that the five billion people in population control is worth a hundred dollars invested in economic growth," President Johnson challenged the United Nations delegates.

The word has been passed down through government ranks in Washington that the President in the future expects this fact to be the guide rule in administering funds for foreign aid to free countries trying to build a modern economy.

But action clearly is not going to stop there.

The President's strong declaration for population control has finally kindled interest in a number of pending bills in Congress on the subject. Hearings began this week on a proposal to establish special departments of population control and national overpopulation that will dispense birth control information to those desiring it.

The highly regarded Gen. William H. Draper, head of an Eisenhower Commission on the population problem, is devoting full time to stressing the urgency of slowing the present population rate.

Former President Eisenhower has withdrawn his doubts of 10 years ago about the need for such action and is urging General Draper and Congress on.

Pope Paul VI has announced that he will soon issue a pronouncement on the subject. Vatican experts expect it will stress the responsibility of parents to bring into the world only those children they can feed, clothe and educate to a reasonable standard.

The winds of change are blowing up around this most challenging problem.

For when a canoe or boat tips over, if you can swim but not swim, you can get out of the water and hold on to the floating craft and hold on, thus saving your life.

Or, if you are wading and step off into a deep hole, you can get back to a firm footing if you can swim a mere five or six strokes!

Thousands of lives are lost needlessly, due to drowning.

And you mothers who can't swim, might as well make a happy joint adventure out of learning. I can't swim, but I advised Tod's mother to go into the water with him but stay at the shallow edge.

Then make a game of trying face downward and holding your breath.

This is the initial problem in overcoming the fright of novices, for they grow more confident if they lie in water not a foot deep, but face downward for only a few seconds.

Let one person count loud but slowly while the other keeps his face submerged.

At the count of "Three" the usual child will jump up, for there is usually fright at submerging one's face in water.

But the youngster, as well as you adults, will soon overcome this terror and be able to lie face downward for 10 seconds; then 20 seconds or more.

The second step is to move out to water about 18 inches deep.

Lie face downward and hold your breath, but where your hands can touch the sandy bottom to reassure yourself.

Then vary this game by standing up and after taking a deep breath, fall into the water. Then, after a deep breath, fall into the water and then, after your body rises, hold your knees together but kick your lower legs up and down.

Meanwhile, keep a r m stretched out ahead floating on the water.

After a few trials, and additional confidence, then take a full breath, fall into the water, and combine kicking with dog paddling with the arms.

After the child learns to move five or six feet on a lungful of air, he can next try to submerge while swimming, and take another breath.

The dog paddling is the basic swimming stroke, and which you can aid a crawl, or backstroke, breast stroke, and the other fancy methods.

Tod and even his fearful mother were both swimming within a week, which was a delightful bit of comradely learning by parent and child, as well as good life insurance for both of them the rest of their days.

Don't terrify a non-swimmer by throwing him into deep water! Though he may learn to swim, he may remain fearful of water the rest of his life!

Moreover, the Johnson administration is accused of ear-biting, concealing and otherwise managing the news of Southeast Asia. The citizens cannot long accept that kind of treatment even if they are conservative citizens and believe that they were on top of the situation here, there and everywhere. They pictured themselves as the nation's only defense against Goldwater and national disaster.

The outraged eggheads and pundits are blistering LBJ now for creating the war in Viet Nam. Goldwater and the conservatives who supported him in 1960 in general, are supporting the administration's Viet Nam policy. That is a strange alliance and weakly joined. The conservative approval of the President's bold

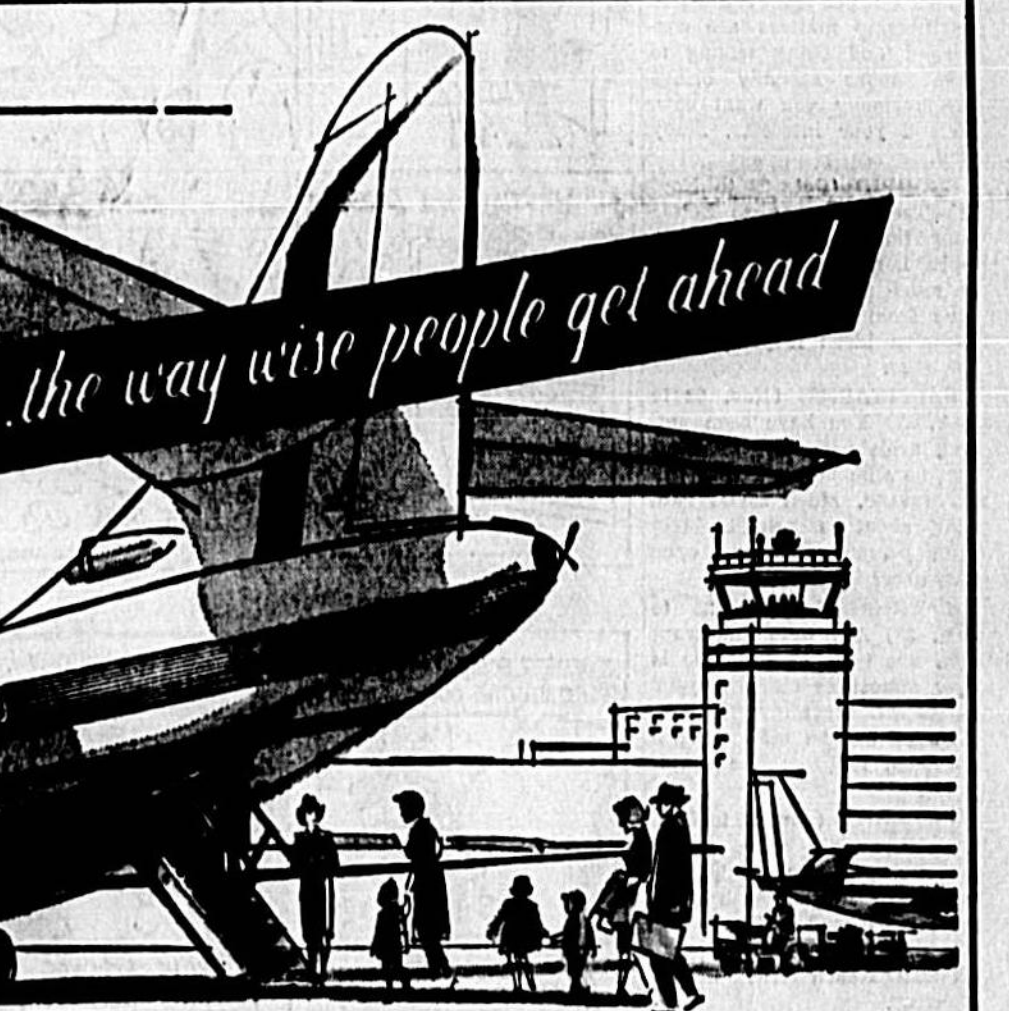

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Tropical Garden Proposed For Sanford

Big things are in store for Sanford... things that should really make Sanford a true oasis on the St. Johns River, "The Nile of America."

The project is a momentous one—the creation of a zoological park, which will also house the Sanford Municipal Zoo. The whole complex, which will be on Seminole Boulevard facing Lake Monroe, is tentatively being called the Sanford Tropical Garden.

The Sanford Tropical Garden is currently conducting a fund raising drive to begin initial work on the project. This beginning will be the installation of an irrigation system for a plant nursery.

The nursery will be created on the west side of the disposal plant and will act as a buffer between the plant and the botanical garden. Included in the nursery will be a plant bank where plant donations to the garden will be nurtured, as well as new and replacement plants for the garden.

Goal of the fund raisers is \$10,000. It is hoped that this will be the only public subscription necessary to complete the tropical garden.

Basic construction and operation funds will come from the city budget, and initial funds of about \$50,000 will be included in next year's budget for the fiscal period beginning October 1.

When the first half of the projected garden is completed, cages to house the zoo animals will be nestled among the tropical plants. These cages will be individually styled, designed specifically for the animals to be housed in each.

Plans for the tropical garden include picnic area, concessions, rides, and play area. When the garden has been completely developed, there will be a large fountain in the center, at the foot of the main entrance to the tropical paradise.

Plans call for the diversion of Mill Creek so that it will colorfully wind its way through the garden.

An area in the center of the garden will be protected from cold weather with grove heaters and a wind machine. The heaters will be operated with sewage gas from the plant. In addition, the irrigation system for the nursery will be supplied from a natural well on the property.

When it is completed, the tropical paradise will include every plant indigenous to the state, and will include such plants as coconut and royal palms, royal poincianas and many others.

As the botanical garden and zoo grow into a thing of beauty, it is hoped the zoo can be expanded with the addition of many new and different animals.

Sanford will become a beautiful and welcome oasis.

Present Plant Will Become Jr. Hi School

First concrete step toward construction of a new Lyman High School building was taken Thursday afternoon when the School Board authorized Chairman Robert R. 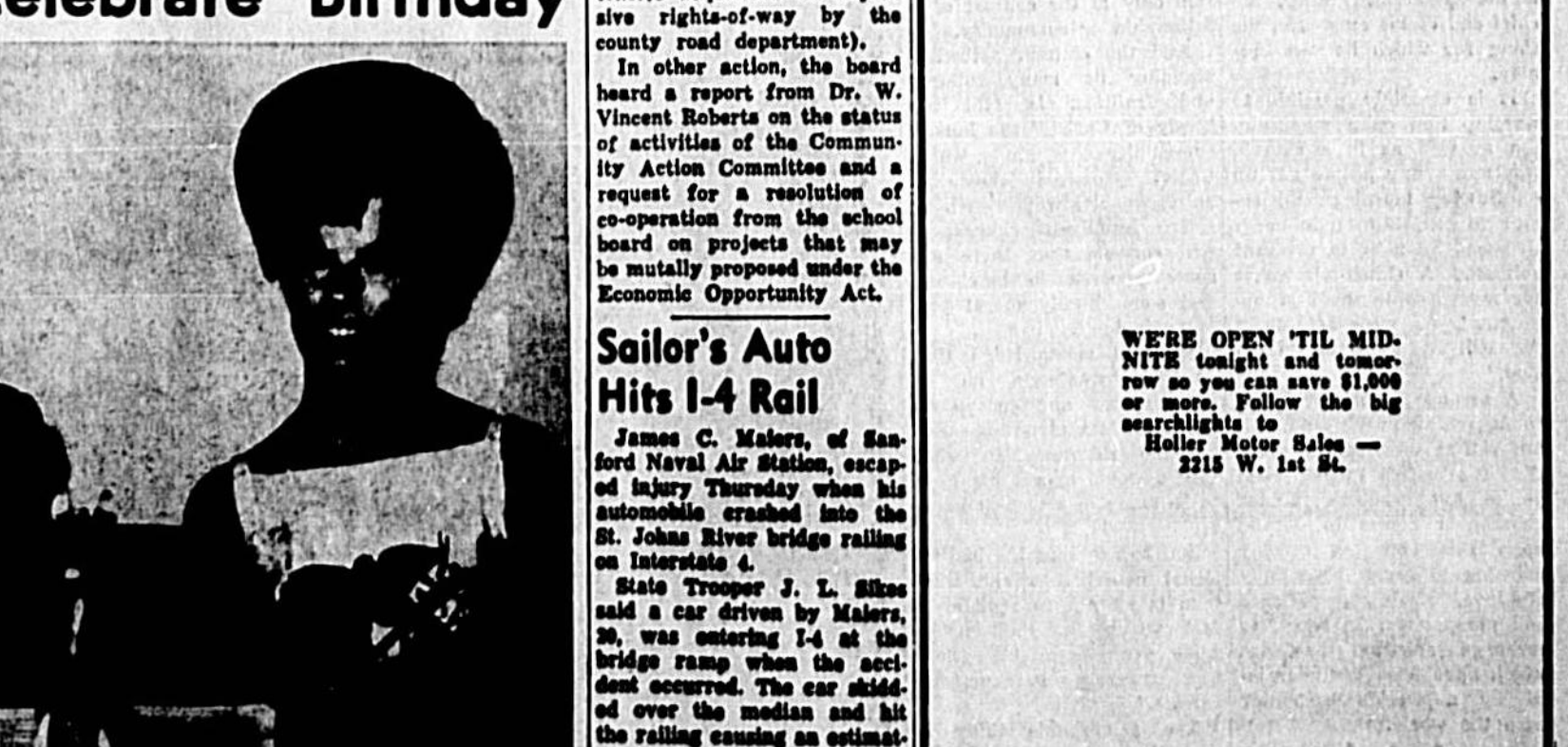
