Florida Keys Are Used As Dumping Place For Aliens

KEY WEST, Fla., April 4—
(INS)—The Florida Keys are fast becoming the dumping off place for aliens, according to local immigration authorities.

While making her way into Loggerhead Key, twenty miles north of Key West, recently, the Cuban schooner Coral with 20 aliens and a crew of four on board, was seized by Coast Guard Patrol boat 298, Boatswain L. R. Daniels, commanding.

The seized schooner and the pris-oners were brought to Key West and turned over to immigration authorities, the aliens to be deported. The Department of Labor at Washington has been asked to decide what disposition will be made of the schooner's crew all of whom are




