U. S. To Back Viet Nam, Adlai Tells UN Council

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson said today the United States "cannot stand by while Southeast Asia is overrun by armed aggression."

"As long as the peoples of that area are determined to preserve their own independence and ask for our help in preserving it," Stevenson told the Security Council, "we will extend it."

"And if anyone has the illusion that my government will abandon the people of Viet Nam—or that we shall weary of the burden of support that we are rendering these people—it can only be due to ignorance of the strength and conviction of the American people."

Stevenson addressed the Security Council against a background of accelerating crisis in Laos, where Communist

troops have won control of the north-central portion of the country, and of increasing criticism of U. S. strategy in South Viet Nam, where 129 Americans have died in combat against Communist guerrillas.

He rejected demands by Russia, Communist China and France for a reconvening of the Geneva conferences of 1954 and 1962 which set up the present arrangements in the former French Indochina and guaranteed the neutrality of the newly created countries.

"There is no need for another such conference," Stevenson said. "Another Geneva conference, if it reached any agreement at all, would prove no more effective than the agreements we already have."

"What is needed is not more conference; what is imperative is to carry out, to respect and honor the agreements we already made."

Some Troops Still Holding Against Reds

VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI)—Pockets of neutralist troops were reported still holding out in the hills west of the Plain of Jars today, fighting their way back or infiltrating the Communist lines to join neutralist commander Kong Le.

A neutralist command communiqué broadcast over Radio Vientiane Wednesday night reported that a neutralist unit from Phou Tenong had broken through the enemy lines and reached the Ban Na area, Kong Le's newest command post.

It was believed that these troops were loyal remnants of Parachute Battalion Four, which originally held one corner of the plain before the Communists launched their all-out offensive.

Elements of this unit allowed the Pathet Lao to infiltrate their positions last Friday night at the beginning of the offensive which swept the neutralists off the plain.

All was calm at Muong Soui, 18 miles to the west of the plain on strategic Route Seven.

But some skirmishing was still reported around Muong Kheung.

Despite the actions of the paratroopers, Communist Pathet Lao forces were reported driving Kong Le farther into the hills despite his aerial support from rightist forces.

Kynes Accused Of Ignoring Own Opinion

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Atty. Gen. James Kynes has been accused of ignoring his own legal opinion in filing a Circuit Court suit challenging outcome of the May 5 attorney general's race.

The charge was leveled by lawyers for Dade Rep. Earl Faircloth, who defeated Kynes by less than 600 votes in the first primary.

Attorneys for Faircloth called Kynes' suit a "sham" Wednesday and asked the court to throw out the litigation.

Kynes, appointed by Gov. Farris Bryant, challenges the validity of absentee ballots in Levy County and of about 4,000 votes in Alachua County which he said were cast by illegally registered voters.

The attorney general claims about 4,000 votes in Alachua County were apparently registered by so-called deputy supervisors in a door-to-door registration drive. He asked the court to throw out the entire Alachua County vote on these grounds.

Faircloth's attorneys claim that by filing the suit, Kynes was taking the exact opposite stand from an opinion he had given to State Attorney T. E. Duncan of Gainesville on April 4.

This opinion states that a deputy supervisor of registration is in no way authorized to register voters. It also stated that the registration was conducted in good faith and without intent to commit fraud.

But if he does, the opinion said it would appear that the registration of innocent electors would be valid even though there was some question as to the authority of the deputies, "assuming that the registration was conducted in good faith and without intent to commit fraud."

Allies Press For Laos Conference

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States and its major Allies pressed today for an early East-West conference on the critical situation in Laos where Communist forces have lured out new gains.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk was meeting in closed session with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to explain the state of affairs. There was mounting congressional concern over Southeast Asia, and administration officials talked openly of the possibility of massing American military might in the area.

The United States, Britain and France threw their support behind neutralist Premier Souvanna Phouma's appeal for early "consultations" among the 14 nations which signed the July, 1962, Geneva agreement guaranteeing the independence and neutrality of Laos.

Terrorist Shot Throwing Bomb

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI)—A young terrorist tossed a grenade into a U. S. Army truck today in the latest violence against Americans in South Viet Nam.

An American soldier escaped the attack unhurt and shot the terrorist as he tried to flee on a bicycle. The grenade was concealed in a load of bread.

BARCELONA, Spain (UPI)—Florida State University's student circus scheduled its first European performance today after two days of sight-seeing in Paris.

Burns Travels To Tampa Area From Panhandle

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—Hayden Burns, aiming for a six-year stretch in the Florida governor's chair, headed for the Tampa Bay area today after a sweep through the Panhandle in which he dwelt on highways, mental health and taxes.

The Jacksonville mayor flew home Wednesday night and set out again today for St. Petersburg, where he will meet with supporters, attend a television appearance.

Burns, like opponent Robert King High of Miami, plans to wind up his campaigning for the runoff next Tuesday with a weekend in South Florida.

Wednesday's visits to Pensacola and Panama City were the last scheduled for Burns. He had morning coffee with supporters in Panama City, spoke at a civic club luncheon and on television, then flew to Pensacola for the remainder of the day.

Stocks Higher

NEW YORK (UPI)—Stock prices were slightly higher today in moderate trading. Rail issues moved higher for the most part but were far more subdued after Wednesday's spectacular highballing.

Altamonte To Vote On Charter

Altamonte Springs may adopt the city manager form of government.

Town Council members Wednesday night set the wheels in motion for a general overhaul of the antiquated charter and will offer the re-

vised package at a referendum next December.

Tentative plans call for the charter to include the city manager-commission form of government rather than the current mayor-commission form.

Prime backer of the pro-

posal is Mayor-Commissioner W. Lawrence Swofford, who noted the salary of a city manager could be offset through more efficient operations of the town's business.

Commissioners will convene the community in the next few days seeking a citizens com-

mittee to study the proposed changes. The commission would serve with the group as ex-officio members.

Swofford and Town Atty. S. J. Davis Jr. insisted that prompt action is needed and that the general public be kept "totally informed" as to

the committee's efforts.

A 90-day target date was set, once the committee is organized. Commissioners are to report their nominees at the June 3 council meeting.

The prescribed charter change procedure would follow this pattern:

1. Committee announced at June 3 meeting.
2. Each member would be given copies of existing charters in other cities to study for possible inclusion of some parts in the Altamonte Springs charter.
3. Committee meeting called in "a few days" after its formation to begin discussions.
4. Public meetings arranged to brief the residents on the program.
5. Other meetings of the committee to complete the package proposal.
6. Presentation of the plan to the public at a referendum in December.
7. Request approval of the State Legislature shortly after it convenes next year.

Davis pointed out the community now is working under laws which have been on the books "from 1921 up." He urged a close check of all provisions in the charter, the revision or elimination of some of them.

Swofford, who now presides at court sessions, said he deemed it essential that a "more qualified person" be given this assignment under the new charter.

"The mayor, any mayor including me, is not qualified to sit as a judge," Swofford said.

He again stressed the urgency of action on the charter revisions "for we'll have to wait two more years" until the Legislature reconvenes.

Castro Alert For Any Air, Sea Attacks

MIAMI (UPI)—Cuban Premier Fidel Castro, confronted with "war declarations" by two refugee groups, prepared today for possible air and sea attacks against his island stronghold.

Refugee sources interpreted Wednesday night's flight over Oriente Province by a mysterious B26—apparently refugee reconnaissance plane—as a "hint of things to come."

Castro's military radio network reported the presence of the twin-engine plane—a U. S.-made bomber of the type used in the 1961 Bay of Pigs invasion—near Ensenada de Mora, target of last week's exile sea raid by Manuel Artime's Revolutionary Recovery Movement (MRR).

Cuban broadcasts monitored here indicated that two Russian-made MIG jet fighters were dispatched to intercept the plane, but apparently too late.

The B26, gray with a red stripe on its fuselage and a Cuban flag painted on the tail, "buzzed" Cuban fishing boats twice and headed inland before the alarm was given.

Subsequently the Cuban marine radio network warned fishing boats to keep their running lights on because "we don't want to make any mistakes."

RVAH-5 To Go West For Duty In Pacific

The Navy's Heavy Attack Squadron Six, based on the Pacific Coast at Whittier Island, Wash., will move aboard the Atlantic Fleet Carrier USS Forrestal next week, executing inter-fleet deployment plans which include RVAH-5, of Sanford Naval Air Station.

RVAH-5 will fly its new RA-6C Vigilante reconnaissance bombers to Alameda, Calif., next month to board the carrier USS Ranger for sea operations preparatory to deploying to the Far East in August.

Heavy Attack Squadron Six (VAH-6) is slated for deployment to the Mediterranean aboard the Forrestal with its twin-jet A-3J Skywarrior attack bombers.

Thus the two squadrons will exchange places in their respective fleets while their home bases remain unchanged, emphasizing the growing mobility of U. S. carrier striking forces.

RVAH-5 (then VAH-5) ended five years of service with the Forrestal air group in mid-1963. Since that time the squadron has been transitioning to the RA-6C, with Sanford's VAH-11, Detachment 8, performing heavy attack duties on the Forrestal.

VAH-6 has been assigned to the Ranger air group since 1960. It has been home-ported on the West Coast since 1962, when it left Norfolk, Va., to become the first Pacific Fleet heavy attack unit.

The deployment of RVAH-5 westward next month means that NAS Sanford has become staging base for global operations. While RVAH-5 is operating in the Western Pacific, VAH-7 and VAH-11, also based locally, will be flying with the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean on the carriers Enterprise and Roosevelt.

At the heart of this worldwide concept is the RA-6C, which incorporates within a single air frame the world's most advanced tactical reconnaissance and bombing systems.

The Vigilante's two 17,000-pound thrust engines drive the aircraft to velocities approaching twice the speed of sound.

RVAH-5 is the first squadron to operate at sea with the RA-6C.

Agent Charges He Was Framed

CHICAGO (UPI)—A U. S. Secret Service agent charged with trying to sell a government report said Wednesday he is being framed because he intended to reveal details of heavy drinking and "general laxity" among agents assigned to the late President Kennedy.

Abraham Bolden, 29, who in 1961 became the first Negro ever assigned to the Secret Service detail guarding the President's life, outlined his charges in a new conference at his South Side home.

He is charged with trying to sell a confidential government file to a man indicted for the alleged counterfeiting of a half-million dollars in bonds and checks.

Bolden said two weeks ago he told another agent, "I'm going before the Warren Commission and tell about the drinking and disappearance of the Secret Service agents from their posts while they were guarding President Kennedy in Hyannis Port."

CG Goes After Ill Shrimper

ST. PETERSBURG (UPI)—An 82-foot Coast Guard patrol boat was ordered today to intercept and board if necessary, a shrimp boat with only one man aboard.

The Coast Guard said the man, an unidentified Negro, was injured and apparently delirious.

Folk Singer Burl Ives Pays New Attention To The Scales

NEW YORK — (SNA)—Burl Ives, who files his clothes chronologically, is currently wearing his 1946 wardrobe. "I've lost 75 pounds," Ives says, "since Dec. 1. And I hope to take off another 75 pounds, but slower—40 pounds more this year and the rest next year."

He won't say how much he weighed at his Ivesian zenith.

"It was a staggering figure," he says, "but he was so large that his health was affected. 'I didn't feel badly,' he says, "but I simply couldn't do certain things. All I could do was sit and read. Now I can be active again. This morning, I walked three miles and it was wonderful."

Fortunately, as he grew larger and required larger clothes, he didn't throw away his old ones. And as he lost weight, he retrogressed through the closet until he reached the '46 outfits, which he now wears.

"The lapels may be large," he says, "but the waistlines are smaller and that's what counts."

Happily, the problem of weight has never bothered his acting or his singing voice. There are 32 Ives albums, mostly on Decca, and the royalties come in handy when there's nothing else doing.

"I'm not a folk song purist," says Ives, the man who introduced millions to the charms of the folk song. "I think it's fine if kids sing songs any way they feel like singing them. I have always thought that folk songs are constantly changing, anyway. And any attempt to sing them in a set fashion is wrong, I believe."

Even now that he is physically active again, Ives still reads more than the average person. "I'm ignorant, uneducated," he says, "and it bothers me. If I had other opportunities as a boy, I think I might have been something else. Sometimes I feel I've led a wasted life—but it's been fun."

Good Barker has promulgated a law, which shall henceforth be known as "Barker's First Law of Television Censorship." It holds that "censorship on television decreases as the rating of a television program increases."

This is a pretty cynical attitude, but Barker insists that it is valid. And he says that it has happened to him, in his capacity as producer (for seven years) of The Red Skelton Show.

"Our show," he says, "has been accused of being earthy at times. And I must admit that we're capable of earthiness. We weren't seven years ago. You see, sponsors and networks figure that a high-rated show is making money for them, so they leave it alone. But if a show is doing poorly, then don't want to risk

any complaints so they censor is very strictly. The censorship on television decreases as the rating of a television program increases."

This is Barker's last season with Skelton. He's been signed to develop three comedies for CBS for the season after next. But he'll still be busy, because Barker has discovered another career—writing.

"I always wake up at 5 a.m.," he says. "For years, I would spend a few hours reading or watching television. I finally figured that was a waste of time. Since I had always wanted to write, I decided to spend those hours writing a novel."

The result is a happy book called "The Olive Winked Back," based partly on Barker's World War II experiences as a producer of war documentaries.

"Writing books," he says, "is wonderful. You have complete freedom or as near complete freedom as is possible. It is a great feeling."

State Traffic Accidents Cost \$90 Million

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Traffic accidents in Florida during the first four months of this year resulted in an economic loss of \$90 million (\$1), the state patrol said today.

"This is quite a price to pay for carelessness," said commander H. N. Kirkman. The patrol estimates economic loss at \$185,000 for each traffic fatality. The figure includes loss of earning power, hospital, burial and associated expenses plus property damage.

There were 491 persons killed in accidents during the period.

The Army has been in existence in the United States for 84 years and, when it was only six years old, President Grover Cleveland gave his personal endorsement to it, Colonel Stevens said, adding: "Every president since then has endorsed the Army."

He recalled the start of the organization in London and how Capt. William Booth hit on making it a militant one. The organizer declared it just as important to save souls as it is for militant organizations to save nations from conquest.

"Every step was hard," the speaker said. "The Army was greeted with ridicule and even imprisonment but their vigilance led to recognition as soldiers of Christianity."

Its creed, Colonel Stevens said, is to "take any man who comes to us and lift him from the mire surrounding him."

Prior to the talk, Roy D. Green, advertising executive of The Sanford Herald, was inducted into the club. The ceremony was conducted by E. D. Kirchhoff, Green, whose father, Roy Green, was also a member of the local club until his death, was introduced by Mack N. Cleveland Jr. Kirchhoff stressed the duties, responsibilities and opportunities such membership involves.

Kiwanis President Dr. John Darby greeted the new member in behalf of the club and appointed Green to the club's house committee.

Emphysema Linked To Smoking, Polluted Air

Dr. Kenneth Wing was guest speaker at a recent dinner meeting of the R. W. Ware's Bible Class of the First Methodist Church which was held at McKinley Hall.

After a short business meeting, Mrs. W. W. Tyre introduced Mrs. Lorraine Graham, Program Administrator of the Central Florida Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association and Dr. Kenneth Wing.

Dr. Wing spoke on "Emphysema" and showed a film, a question and answer period followed.

Dr. Wing said Emphysema (pronounced em-fih-SEE-ma) is a Greek word meaning "inflation." It is a disease which causes the lungs to become so greatly enlarged they literally deteriorate.

He also stated there is an alarming increase in this disease throughout the United States. California figures show a 30 per cent increase in a eight year period and doctors fear this increase may

be true all across the country. An interesting fact, he said, is that the disease appears to occur more frequently in white males between 50 and 70 years old. Women get emphysema, too, but ten times more men have it than women. A high percentage of the people who have emphysema smoke and have been heavy smokers most of their lives. Frequently, they live in areas where air pollution is a constant problem.

The first symptom of pulmonary emphysema is shortness of breath. The next most common symptom is cough which becomes worse as time passes.

Chronic and recurrent infections of the lungs and bronchial tree, especially virus infections, and smoking are factors intimately associated with Emphysema.

Doctors can help emphysema patients live comfortably with their disease for a long time. Different treatments, including "wonder

drugs" help different patients at different times. Under a doctor's care, most patients can get relief from their attacks of breathlessness.

At this time, doctors do not know how to prevent emphysema. Continuing research is being conducted to find answers to many questions about this disease. However, modern medicine can usually slow down the development of emphysema if patients are treated early. It is always the doctor's immediate concern to clear up any infection of a patient's respiratory system—mouth, nose, throat, sinuses, or lungs—because such infections set up a possible starting place for emphysema.

Mrs. Johnson Speaks To Kentucky Crowd

JACKSON, Ky. (UPI) — Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson said today "much remains to be done" to fight illiteracy and other problems but President Johnson is confident of victory in the war on poverty.

The First Lady, on an all-day tour of poverty-stricken areas, made the statements in

a speech prepared for delivery at the dedication of a new gymnasium at Breathitt County High School here.

Citing construction of the new gym and other accelerated public works programs in the area, Mrs. Johnson said:

"This is the kind of concrete evidence of Kentucky pioneer self help and self-reliance that makes the President and all America so confident of victory in our war against poverty."

Mrs. Johnson said more such facilities were needed so that "boys and girls across the country will increasingly be physically fit, mentally awake and morally straight."

The President's wife flew to Kentucky for an overnight stay which included an address tonight before the Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs at the Phoenix Hotel in Lexington.

Mrs. Johnson recalled that her predecessor, the late Eleanor Roosevelt, had dedicated the Breathitt High School on Jan. 28, 1938, and had deplored illiteracy in the country.

"Much progress has been made since then in the fields of literacy and general education," she said. "Much remains to be done."

"This new gymnasium symbolizes the steps we as a nation are taking to strengthen the physical fitness of our youth—our greatest natural resource," Mrs. Johnson said. "Here again much progress has been made, but as the nation's unduly high percentage of draft rejections shows, much still remains to be done."

The First Lady was greeted at the school by Gov. Edward Breathitt of Kentucky. Earlier today, she threw a switch to bring electricity to one-room Lick Branch school in the mountains.

Mrs. Johnson, who attended a one-room school in Texas, also joined the school's 25 pupils at the hot 10-cent school lunch.

Mrs. Johnson's press secretary, Mrs. Elizabeth Carpenter, said the Sylvania Electric Co. had run a power line into the primitive Lick Branch school as a "community contribution." She said the company had been planning to install the line for some time but had "hurried it up" for the First Lady's visit.

The hot lunch program at the school is part of the government's emergency program to aid economically depressed areas of Kentucky. Government surplus food is prepared and heated at a home near the school.

Mrs. Johnson's trip to Kentucky was reminiscent of the many made to the area by Mrs. Roosevelt during the 1930s. In fact, Breathitt County High School was dedicated by Mrs. Roosevelt in January, 1938.

Mrs. Johnson also was to visit the home of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Robertson at Warshol Branch after the school ceremonies. Robertson, a tobacco farmer, obtained a government grant to "winterize" his home and to sink a well. He was also aided in getting a job with the Breathitt County forestry division.

Mrs. Johnson's schedule then calls for her to motor to the town of Quicksand to inspect the University of Kentucky's wood utilization center. From Quicksand she goes to Lexington for her speech before the Women's Club Federation.

Homemakers Corner

I had a conversation one day last week with a reader. She mentioned that her family liked liver and she liked beef, and wondered if they could be put together some way. Well, I found this recipe and it sounds real good. Let's call it LIVERBURGERS.

1/2 lb. ground beef or pork liver
1/2 lb. beef chuck
1 cup fine cracker crumbs
2 eggs
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. celery salt
dash pepper
1 tsp. grated onion
3 tbsps. bacon fat

Have liver and beef ground together and add cracker crumbs to it. Beat eggs, then stir in next 4 ingredients. Thoroughly mix egg mixture with meat and crumbs. Form into 10 flattened patties. Fry about 4 minutes on each side in hot bacon fat in a heavy skillet over low heat, turning

only once. Serve hot. Serves 5.

Another fresh cabbage idea. **HOT CABBAGE SLAW**
Cook 7 slices of bacon until crisp. Remove from pan, drain and crumble. Stir 2 tablespoons flour into drippings. Add 1 bottle (7 oz.) 7-Up, 1/2 cup vinegar and 1/2 tsp. salt. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Combine with 4 cups shredded cabbage and crumbled bacon and serve immediately.

Another idea with 7-Up. **CANDIED SWEET POTATOES**
Place contents of one can (1 lb. 2 oz.) vacuum packed sweet potatoes in shallow baking pan. Combine 1/2 cup brown sugar and 2 tbsps. flour. Stir in 1/2 cup 7-Up. Pour over potatoes. Dot with 2 tbsps. butter. Bake in 375 degree oven for about 25 minutes, spooning sauce over potatoes occasionally. Serves 5 to 6.

Also when pressing silk, spread a sheet of tissue paper over it and this will prevent the ugly shine.

Nancy Mumford's THREE-IN-ONE CASSEROLE.
1 lb. ground beef
1 green pepper, chopped
2 onions, cut fine
1 large can cream style corn
4 slices tomato
butter
crumbs
salt and pepper
Sauté pepper and onions in butter until light brown. Add meat and cook until seared. Place alternate layers of meat mixture and corn in buttered baking dish, seasoning with salt and pepper. Cover with buttered crumbs. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees until crumbs are brown.

Judy Hunter fixes a dishy dish with Spam. Sounds good. Try it.
SPAM DISH
2 cups ground cooked macaroni
1 small onion
1 green pepper
1/2 lb. American cheese
1 can Spam
1 1/2 cups hot milk
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup bread crumbs
4 eggs separated
Mix butter, beaten egg yolks and pour over crumbs. Add this to mixture of macaroni, onion, pepper, cheese and Spam. Fold in beaten egg whites last. Pour into buttered casserole and bake at 325 degrees for 1 1/2 hours. Pour 1 can cream of mushroom soup over for last 20 minutes of baking. This recipe may be prepared and kept in refrigerator until ready to bake.

Kennedy Blasts 2 Homers; Jones Gets Key Double

Sometimes the guys who are paid the least are the ones who produce the most. That was precisely the case Wednesday night when John Kennedy of the Washington Senators and Dalton Jones of the Boston Red Sox, a pair of bench-warmers who are working for approximately the \$7,000-a-year minimum, both came up with maximum performances.

Kennedy, given a chance at shortstop only because regular Ed Brinkman had slumped to .187, blasted two homers and a single to drive in three runs and pace the Senators to a 10-3 triumph over the Detroit Tigers. Jones earned his letter with the Red Sox in similar fashion.

Named to the starting line-up largely because of his pinch three-run double in the ninth inning the night before, the rookie second baseman, drove in the tying run with a key seventh inning double and set up the winning one in Boston's 4-3 victory over the Los Angeles Angels.

The 22-year-old Kennedy started Washington's 12-hit attack with his first homer of the game in the opening inning off loser Ed Rakow (0-3), hit his second circuit in the fifth at the expense of Julio Navarro and then singled home another run during a five-run seventh.

Jones drilled a double with runners on first and second to tie the score. Harmon Killebrew crashed a pair of 400-foot homers to power the Minnesota Twins to a 7-4 win over the New York Yankees and the Baltimore Orioles downed the Kansas City A's 8-3, in the only other American League games scheduled.

hunting season for resident game birds and animals will open Saturday, Nov. 14, except in the Third Conservation District where the season will open Nov. 21.

The opening date — applying to deer, turkey, quail, squirrel and bear, was set at a formal meeting of the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission at Tallahassee, according to A. D. Aldrich, director.

Hunting will be allowed every day in the First, Third and Fourth Conservation Districts, and in the Second District except in Dixie, Gilchrist and Levy Counties. In the Fifth Conservation District, every day hunting will be allowed in that portion of the district located south of State Road 50, and west of the St. Johns River.

Where staggered-day hunting is in force, hunting will be allowed every day during the first nine days, and the period between Nov. 25 and Nov. 20 and between Dec. 23 and Jan. 3, Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays will be closed at all other times. Shooting hours for resident game species will remain at from one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset of each open day.

Hunters will be provided with two turkey hunting seasons during the 1964-65 season. The first season opens with the general hunting season and allows the hunter to harvest three turkeys of either sex. The second season opens March 13 to March 28 in that portion of the state located south of State Road 50, and March 27 to April 11, north of State Road 50. Hunters will be allowed to take two gobblers during this second turkey season.

Florida's fresh water fishermen will find the 1964-65 basic regulations and bag limits for fresh water fish essentially the same as the current regulations, with a few local exceptions. The new local regulations and bag limits were established at a meeting of the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission and will become effective July 1, according to Aldrich. The daily bag limit for fresh water fish remains at 10 black bass, 35 panfish, 15 pickered and 30 white bass. Total possession limit is two days' bag. A daily bag limit of 70 panfish will be in effect in Dade, Monroe, Broward and Collier Counties. These counties do not have a bag limit on panfish at the present time. A minimum size of 12 inches will apply to bass being taken in Putnam County. The size limit was enacted as an aid in determining the effect of experimental stocking of six inch bass in the St. Johns River by the Bass Capital Sportsmen's Association.

Reports are conflicting this week on fishing; some camp operators report good results, others say the fishing is poor. Seems the breeze and perch are biting in the Wekiva while the bass are said to be starting in the St. Johns between Lemon Bluff and the Crow-Crym area. Jim Crowe also says the breeze are biting in "Lake Jessup where the green ain't" meaning the algae.

NFL Owners OK Pension Program For Pro Gridmen

NEW YORK (UPI)—A farmer, an investment broker and a restaurateur were assured of an income in their old age today because of a liberal benefit policy approved by National Football League owners.

The trio—Charley Conerly, Bobby Layne and Alan Ameche—became eligible for league pensions at age 65 as a result of a \$1,228,000 player benefit package approved by the owners at Wednesday's league meeting.

The one-time NFL greata come under a retroactive clause that made 110 former players, who were in the league for at least five seasons, eligible to collect about \$437 a month when they reach retirement age. They had to play in 1950 to qualify.

Commissioner Pete Rozelle said the package deal also included a \$20,000 life insurance policy as well as a year-round \$20,000 accidental death policy for the players, and for the first time will include all coaches, trainers and equipment managers.

Mayo Addresses Technical Unit

Capt. James O. Mayo described to 10 Central Florida technical groups Tuesday the impact which modern technology has had upon Naval aviation, particularly the part which he directs as commander of Heavy Attack Wing One at Sanford Naval Air Station.

Speaking to more than 100 persons in the Mayfair Inn, Captain Mayo showed how modern weapons have opened the way for greater mobility, including deployment of Sanford-based RA-6C Vigilante reconnaissance bombers to all oceans of the world.

His audience included members and wives of the hosting American Society for Metals and local chapters of other engineering societies: The American Society of Chemical Engineers, American Society of Tool Manufacturers and Engineers, Florida Engineering Society of Mechanical Engineers and the American Society of Quality Control Engineers.

Captain Mayo used color slides to illustrate the capabilities of the Vigilante and other aircraft within his command. He pointed out that the modern attack carrier with its 50-plane air group is a "floating Cuba" which can be placed a few miles off any coast in the world at a moment's notice.

The biggest advantage, he said, is the self-sustaining nature of the carrier task force. It can operate for months at a time completely independent of any shore installation.

Wallace Gets Hero's Welcome

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI)—Jaunty Gov. George C. Wallace came home from another presidential primary battle Wednesday night and received a warrior's welcome.

Huge crowds cheered him when his silver and blue plane, bedecked with Confederate flags, landed at the Birmingham and Montgomery airports.

"From the looks of this crowd, I thought I was in Maryland," he told 4,000 persons here. Earlier, around 2,000 supporters had greeted him at Birmingham during a stopover en route from the Maryland presidential primary where he got 42 per cent of the votes.

"He won in Maryland and they know he won," he said, adding that his showing emphasized the strong opposition to the civil rights bill.

"I feel the people in Washington—the ones who develop the trends in both parties—will sit up and take notice," he said. "They can't ignore our victory."

Sen. Daniel B. Brewster, D-Md., a stand-in for President Johnson, won the primary, but Wallace said "we never expected to get the numerical majority because we had everything against us but the people."

It was the segregationist governor's best showing in the three presidential primaries he has entered. He got 33 per cent of the vote in Wisconsin and 29 per cent in Indiana.

Wallace promised to "continue the fight" in the California primary.

Boy - Wonder A Has - Been

The fact that political leaders and the people in general were surprised that Harold Stassen received as many votes as he did in the Indiana primary is an interesting footnote to what began as a startling biography.

Stassen's political career got away to a flying start. Then he got into the habit of being turned aside for the presidential nomination. Now he can't even get into the California presidential primary. The Supreme Court has ruled against him.

Stassen is a classic example of the school valedictorian who never quite made good. Though he attracted national attention in 1938 by winning the governorship of Minnesota when only 31, and was reelected twice, that was as high as he ever got, election-wise.

He undoubtedly would have entered the Republican convention of 1940, of which he was the keynote, had it not been for his constitutional ineligibility because of his age. As it was, he masterfully engineered the Willkie blitz.

Though he offered himself—in

vain—to his party in 1944, and strove manfully for the nomination in later conventions, he never came close. He did carry enough weight, however, to help decide the nominees—Dewey in 1948 and Eisenhower in 1952.

His real political decline began in 1956 with his "dump Nixon" drive. This attempt to oust the vice president turned out to be a lead balloon that fell squarely on Stassen.

After that came defeat for governor of Pennsylvania, then even more ignominious defeat for mayor of Philadelphia. Now defeat in California before he could even run.

It should be remembered that Stassen resigned his governorship in 1943 to serve with distinction in the Navy and that in 1948 he became president of the University of Pennsylvania and later held important posts in the first Eisenhower administration.

But as far as politics is concerned, the one-time "boy wonder" is a has-been at 57. He was the early bird who never got the worm.

Dogs Dog Politics

You could argue that American politics went to the dogs long ago, but it's surprising how often canines have actually become involved in election year goings on.

First there was Roosevelt's little Scotty. Then, the Republicans indignantly charged, had had a special plane placed at his disposal on one occasion. FDR neatly turned the criticism back on them.

In 1956, in his famous television appearance to clear himself of charges of missing a campaign contribution, Richard Nixon was friends by defending his children's dog, Checkers, who was the gift of an admirer.

(Incidentally, as a result of the broadcast, President Eisenhower pronounced his running mate "as clean as a hound's tooth.")

Now Lyndon Johnson is in the

doghouse with some people because he picked up his beagles by their ears. Fortunately, the President has six months before the election to establish his image as a dog lover.

Apparently, people don't mind if politics is a dog-eat-dog business—just as long as it's confined to humans.

Can't Please Everyone

The new Brazilian government, in power just a month after the military overthrow of President Joao Goulart, is learning an important fact of life, which is that you cannot please everyone.

The revolt against Goulart came one March 31, and on April 2 President Johnson sent his "warmest good wishes" to interim President Ranieri Mazzilli who held office until former marshal of the army and chief of staff Humberto de Alencar Castelo Branco took over the job on April 15.

The United States regarded it as an effective blow against communism in Latin America and the weaknesses which

seemed to be leading Brazil into a leftist dictatorship.

From the Brazilian people also came wide acclaim.

Both inside and outside Brazil there were hopes that a regime indebted to no political grouping and with no political ambitions at least could cope with Brazil's chronic social and economic ills.

But the social ills were deeply imbedded and printing press money was such a part of Brazil's inflationary way of life that from the beginning it was apparent that both would be hard to reverse.

The military-backed regime had other problems. What of the future of Brazil's relation-

Some 140 editors thought Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater's organization was good. This represented 55.6 per cent of those with opinions.

But only 40 editors—18.8 per cent of those who spoke on the subject—thought Barry's campaign techniques were good. A total of 127 said "fair" and a sizable 85 said "poor."

Just 35 editors put Rocky's technique in the "poor" category. A total of 102 thought it fair, while 127 said Goldwater also was just fair in this regard.

In the realm of strategy, neither of these candidates got much of a score.

strategy (presumably staying off the campaign circuit entirely) was rated good by 96 editors, or 51 per cent of those with opinions on the matter.

Forty-five editors felt Goldwater's strategy was a good, and 64 thus rated Rockefeller in this department.

Eighty-two editors said Goldwater was a poor strategist—almost the same number as down-rated his campaign techniques. Fifty-four put Rockefeller's strategy in the lowest category. Both of these men found roughly 120 editors ranking their strategy simply fair.

Lodge did not earn much praise for organization, with only 52 editors placing him high. Seventy-two thought his techniques were good.

Not surprisingly, on each of the questions pertaining to campaign effort, a substantial number felt that Lodge's absence in Viet Nam made any useful determination as to his methods virtually impossible.

One editor ventured, however, that "Lodge has style... looks like a president."

Though the editors' replies indicated many have complaints on the subject of campaign effort, they did not generally spell these out in specific comment. The one word that showed up in association with Goldwater was "aloof."

The editors expressed themselves on one final question: Will the GOP be able to work cohesively as a party regardless of who is the 1964 nominee?

Some 1-65 said "yes," putting little stock in reports that many party workers might "sit down" next fall if a candidate of their choosing is not selected at San Francisco. But 116 editors thought the answer should be "no." Only 20 voiced no view.

When South Africa held the North-South cards in a match against England, South did open two spades. North responded two no-trump. South raised him to three and East made the inspired lead of a low heart. Down two. Strangely enough South Africa gained on the hand. The British South opened an artificial two clubs and North responded with an artificial two diamonds. Then they staggered into six diamonds

he should open with either a very conservative two no-trump or a slightly optimistic three no-trump. North might decide to raise three no-trump and South might get to six no-trump if he continued to overbid. Playing at no-trump, South would have 13 easy tricks against a club or spade lead and the only defense that will positively beat six is so unusual that I doubt if anyone will find it. West has to open the ace of clubs and then shift to the nine of diamonds. Once he gets off to that start, all he has to do is discard correctly in back of South.

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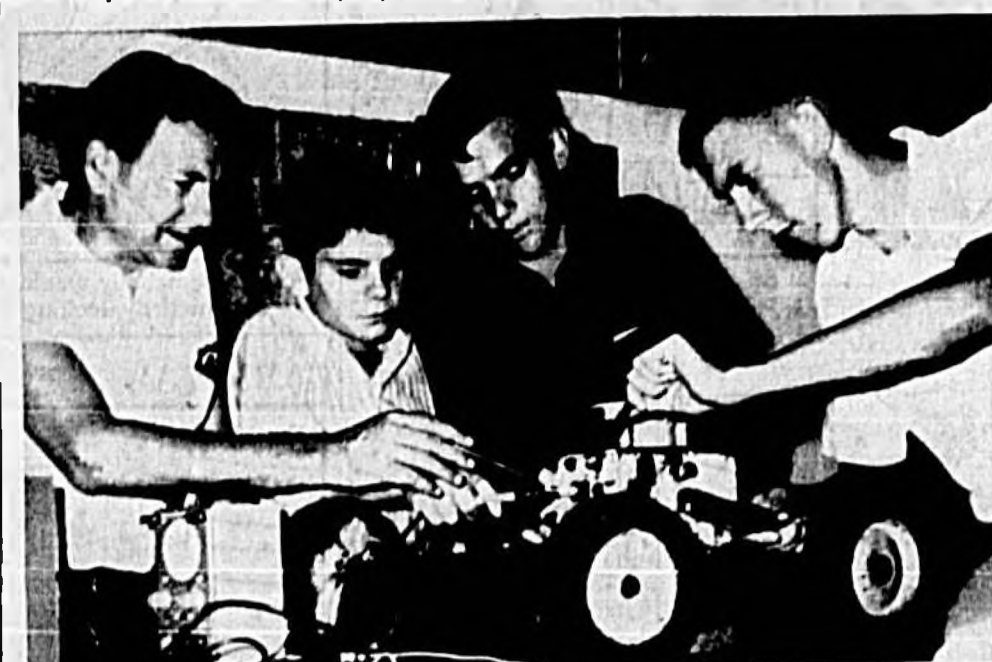

Tax Take On Smokes, Drinks Hits New High

Tax collections from the sale of cigarettes and alcoholic beverages exceeded \$102 million, surpassing all records in Florida's history and with still two months to go in fiscal year 1963-64.

According to the state beverage director, Richard B. Keating, collections for April alone reached \$10,500,838.39, for an increase of 42.52 per cent over the same period last year. This brings collections from July, 1963, to April, 1964, to \$102,072,929.99.

The director said his agents also destroyed 19 moonshine stills during April, poured out 18,317 gallons of fermenting mash and 1,075 gallons of moonshine ready for market.

Twenty automobiles were seized, 59 arrests made for moonshine activity and 179 arrests for other beverage law violations.

Keating conducted 112 administrative hearings during the month on licenses charged with various beverage law violations.

The beverage agent's report shows 605 gallons of mash were found in Seminole County during April.

The auditors' report from the beverage department show cigarette sales brought the largest tax contribution with \$1,912,487.36; followed by beer with \$2,458,816.12; liquor, \$2,295,467.52; and wine, \$807,202.43. Other miscellaneous collections made up the balance of the \$10.5 million taken in during the month.

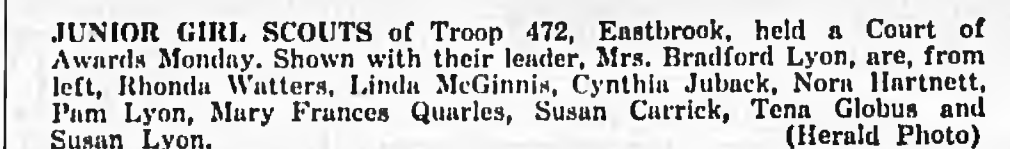

Absentee Vote Heavy

Indications are that Seminole County voters will surprise the political experts in Tuesday's second or run-off primary. The experts have been predicting a light and apathetic vote . . . but Registrar Camilla Bruce today reported a total of 355 absentee ballots have been cast.

Local political observers have felt there is little interest in the Tuesday election, primarily because of the colorless three county-wide campaigns and three district campaigns for justice of the peace and constable.

Too, local electors seemed to have lost interest in the Democratic governor's campaign, between Mayor Hayden Burns of Jacksonville and Mayor Robert King High of Miami.

But Mrs. Bruce's report of the heavy absentee vote—compared to the 369 in the first primary on May 5—indicates Seminole voters are interested and again may turn out in what may be a record number on Tuesday.

Waterway Cost Estimated At \$11 Million

Authorization to establish the center line for the St. Johns-Indian River Canal was given today by the canal district directors meeting in DeLand.

The district officially instructed its engineer, Norman Bryan, a resident engineer with the Jacksonville firm of Reynolds, Smith and Hills, to proceed at once.

The project involves aligning 23 miles of waterway from Lake Monroe east to the Indian River, linking Sanford with Titusville.

John Krider, chairman of the district's board of directors, said that the cost of project is now being estimated at \$11 million. The canal would contain two locks, each 56 feet by 250 feet. One of the locks would be located north of Lake Harney and the other just west of proposed Interstate 95.

Participating in the district's meeting were Senator Randolph Hodges of Tallahassee, chairman of the State Conservation Commission, and the chairman of the Florida Canal Authority, W. A. McCreary.

Later today the district's directors met with the DeLand Chamber of Commerce to brief that body on the canal district's plans for a four-lane highway north of the canal and a two-lane service road to the south.

Krider reiterated the purpose of the canal would be to develop the commercial, recreational and residential potential of the east Central Florida area.

Mother Denies Two Children Were Strangled

CROSSVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—A young mother testified Thursday that she lied when she told officers her two children were strangled by Sam Earl (Big John) Ammons, recently placed on the FBI's 10-most-wanted list.

At times sobbing uncontrollably, Mrs. Alma Faye Reed Matthews, 21-year-old wife of an Alabama plasterer, reversed her charges that Ammons had strangled her son and daughter. She said they died of natural causes and were placed in a 8-foot-deep septic tank near her by Ammons at her request.

Mrs. Matthews, who is expecting a child in October, testified at a preliminary hearing at which she, Ammons, and Ammons' shapely, 23-old-brunette wife were bound over to the Cumberland County grand jury in connection with the deaths of John Anthony Reed, 2, and Rose Marie Reed, 4.

U. S. Prepares For Hotter War

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Top U. S. officials worked today to shape plans for stepping up military pressure on Communist forces in Southeast Asia if diplomatic maneuvers fail to ease the Laos crisis within the next few days.

Movements of units of the powerful U. S. 7th Fleet into waters closer to the turbulent region and dispatch of American troops to Thailand, just across the Mekong River from Laos, were said to be the next logical steps if the Red offensive in Laos continues.

President Johnson was expected to review the recommendations of U. S. planners by the weekend and come to some specific decision.

U. S. jet reconnaissance flights over Communist positions in Laos, which began Thursday, were described as the first stage in additional help to be given neutralist Premier Souvanna Phouma's embattled government if necessary.

Capt. Ware To Leave SNAS Post On June 29

Captain Robert M. Ware, USN will be relieved as commanding officer of the Sanford Naval Air Station, by Capt. Chandler W. Swanson, USN, June 29.

Capt. Ware, who has been commanding officer of the Sanford air base since November 1961, will be retiring from the Navy after more than 30 years of service.

Capt. Swanson is currently at the U. S. Naval War College in Newport, R. I. He will be the 11th commanding officer of the station since the base was built during World War II.

A change-of-command ceremony will be held at 2 p. m. June 29 at the station. A reception will follow the event.

Capt. Ware, born March 8, 1915, in Hagerman, N. M., was graduated from the Naval Academy in 1937.

His first tour of duty was aboard the USS Lexington, a naval aviator in 1941 after completing flight training at Pensacola and served aboard the USS Wasp until she was sunk in 1942.

Following the sinking of the Wasp, he went to the Naval Air Station, Daytona Beach, as an instructor and then to the USS Hornet as a squadron commanding officer.

Immediately after the war Capt. Ware served as a flag secretary and two years later went aboard the USS Mindoro.

He was assigned to the Naval War College in 1949 for three years and was then ordered to the USS Coral Sea.

Capt. Ware served a tour of duty in the office of the Chief of Naval Operations in Washington, D. C., from 1953 to 1955, and from there he went to be the aviation training officer of the Fleet Training Group Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

After Cuba he became the commanding officer of the Naval Auxiliary Air Station, Saultfield Field, Fla. Prior to coming to Sanford, he served as commanding officer of the USS Suribachi and the USS Bennington.

Capt. Ware, who is married to the former Miss Myrtle Plicht of Seattle, Wash., has been awarded the following decorations: the Navy Cross with Star, the Silver Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal, and the Purple Heart.

The Coast Guard said it had no details of the capture about 200 miles southwest of here in the Gulf of Mexico.

A spokesman said earlier the Negro crewman, Henry Weaver, was armed with a rifle and was believed to be wounded and delirious.

The cutter took the shrimp boat in tow for Tampa.

An FBI agent was aboard the cutter Point Swift when it intercepted the shrimp boat Golden Net out of Tampa.

The agent carried a warrant charging the occupant of the shrimp boat with murder.

Weaver radioed the Tampa owners of the 72-foot Golden Net Thursday that "I have a hole in my head and my arm is cut."

"He was reported to be rather incoherent when he radioed for help," the Coast Guard said.

Two shrimp boats—the Captain Bill and Arlene B.—heard the call and kept the Florida-bound Golden Net under surveillance until a Coast Guard cutter could intercept the ship.

ATRIQUERQUE, N. M. (UPI)—Municipal court Judge Harry D. Robins put the damper on some courtroom cuddling Thursday.

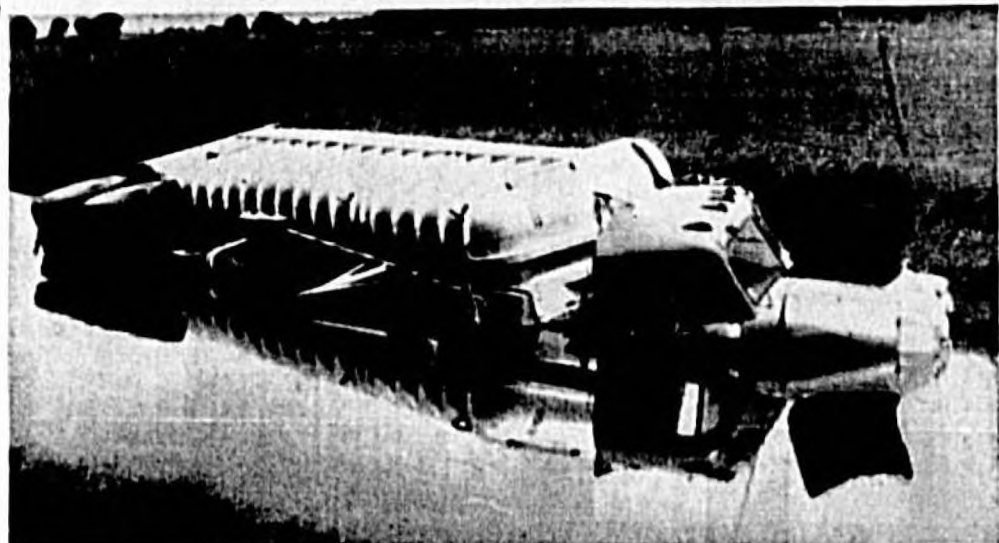
Robins caught William Mossman, 22, of Albuquerque, kissing a girl just a few feet from where he was sitting on the bench.

Burns Charges NAACP Threatened Negroes

ST. PETERSBURG (UPI)—Jacksonville Mayor Hayden Burns charged today the NAACP has threatened "many respectable and educated Negro citizens" if they support his candidacy for governor.

Burns, stumping hard in preparation for Tuesday's Democratic runoff primary, also again labeled opponent Robert King High of Miami as "the NAACP candidate" in the runoff.

Burns told the breakfast meeting supporters that the "NAACP has created an atmosphere of dread and fear in the Negro community."

He said that many Negro citizens "have come to us and said 'we are afraid—we cannot make an endorsement because of fear of what will happen to us or our families.'"

He charged that vote for High—who has announced his full support of the civil rights bill—would be a "betrayal" of Florida Sens. Spessard Holland and George Smathers who are fighting the bill in Congress.

The Jacksonville Mayor attacked the rights bill saying the public accommodations section is "the least objectionable section of the bill—objectionable as the section is."

After the coffee, Burns headed inland for a coffee at Avon Park and a luncheon at Wauchula.

Longwood OK On Sunday Beer Sales Asked

No More Silk Wallpaper In General's Bath

WASHINGTON (UPI)—An Irlked House Appropriations Committee today outlawed silk wallpaper for general's bathrooms, put the brakes on expansion of officers' clubs, and said if the Navy wants new bowling alleys it cannot look to the taxpayers to build them.

The committee, burning at a recent Army outlay of \$94,500 to remodel a major general's suite, chopped new military construction requests and sternly lectured the services on overdesign, waste and excessive cost in some of their buildings.

Approving an economy-style \$1.6 billion construction fund for the new fiscal year, the committee in a formal report cited as a horrible example of what ought not to be done exactly what it said was done when the Army Mobility Command set up a headquarters at Warren, Mich.

Adlai's Peace Plan Studied

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—Diplomats here discussed possible ways today of putting into effect U. S. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson's suggestions for a UN peace-keeping role in Southeast Asia.

Washington's willingness to have the United Nations participate in affairs of the strife-ridden area encompassing Laos, Viet Nam and Cambodia was regarded here as the most significant development in Stevenson's policy review before the Security Council Thursday.

The council was in recess until Monday morning. Its debate on Cambodia's charge of aggression by South Viet Nam and the United States has mushroomed into a full-scale discussion of the whole Southeast Asian situation.

Stevenson avoided direct accusations against Russia in his speech, but in blunt talk to the Kremlin's Communist colleagues he said: "The United States cannot stand by while Southeast Asia is overrun by armed aggressors. As long as the people of that area are determined to preserve their own independence and ask for our help in preserving it, we will extend it."

Bite Fatal To Snake Collector

MIAMI (UPI)—Snake collector Shubert Lee died Thursday night from the bite of a deadly cobra after a two-day battle by doctors to save him.

So staggering was the venom of the reptile that Lee, 28, never regained consciousness and was completely paralyzed.

Police said Lee may have committed suicide by thrusting his hand into a sack containing the cobra. No one saw Lee bitten. His fiancée, Florence Guttierrez, 32, said she found Lee Wednesday night groaning on the floor of his cottage.

She said Lee had been dependent over money.

York Ailing

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—Old soldier Sgt. Alvin York today returned to familiar battle grounds at the Veterans Administration Hospital here suffering from a kidney ailment.

High Repeats His Challenge

GAINESVILLE (UPI)—Robert King High challenged gubernatorial opponent Hayden Burns today to "tell us where you were really born" and then headed for strong Burns' territory in the Florida panhandle to drum for more votes.

The two men clash in Tuesday's democratic runoff for the right to meet GOP candidate Charles Holley of St. Petersburg in the November general election.

High said today that he realized his Jacksonville opponent's birth place was a small issue, but added "the importance of the matter is moral integrity."

The red-headed Miami mayor said Jacksonville Mayor Burns' campaign literature claimed he was born in Louisville, Ky. But High added he had information that Burns was born near Chicago.

After the breakfast speech in a restaurant packed with about 300 supporters, High took off for Tallahassee, Panama City, Pensacola, Crestview and Milton for later appearances.
