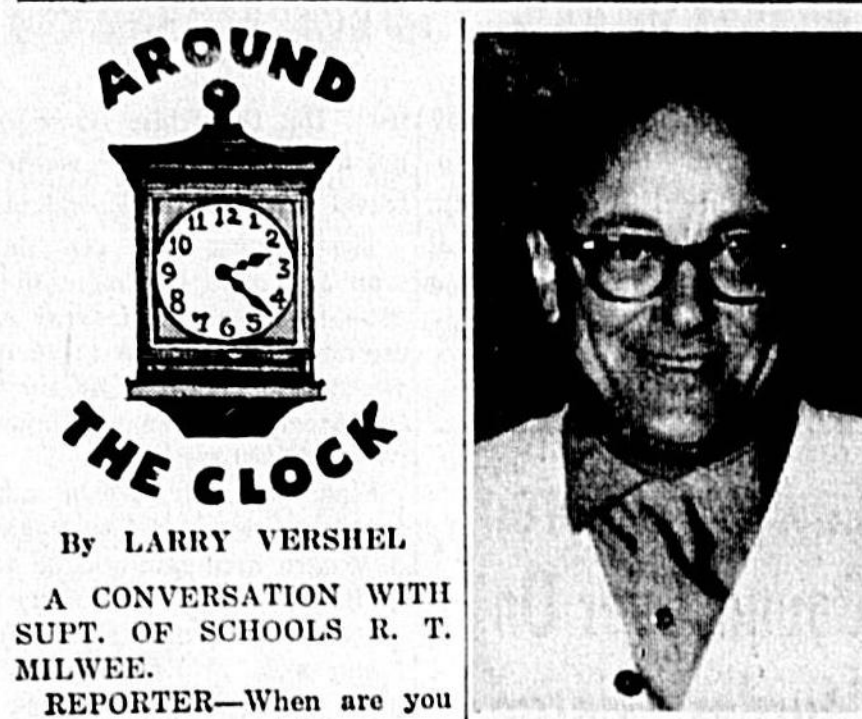

World News In Brief
Faith Moves Away MIAMI, Fla. (AP) Hurricane Faith sped away from the U.S. mainland today, churning the Atlantic into mountainous seas and battering a disabled Italian tanker. Weathermen said the hurricane, packing 100-mile an hour winds, was following a path that would take her into colder climes—possibly to her death.
One Nun Dies HONG KONG (AP)—One of the eight Roman Catholic nuns expelled from Red China died today less than 24 hours after she crossed the border into Hong Kong. Death was attributed to heart failure and strain. She was Sister Eamon, the former Mary O'Sullivan of Cork, Ireland. She collapsed at the border Wednesday and was wheeled across in a baggage cart.
Expand Purge TOKYO (AP)—Red China's new strong man, Defense Minister Lin Biao, called on the militant young Red Guards Wednesday night to expand the purge now sweeping the Chinese mainland but warned them against coercion and force. "Don't hit people," Mr. Tse-tung's heir apparent told 500,000 young Red Guards and other revolutionary youths in Peking's Square of Heavenly Peace.

Okay Wage Hike WASHINGTON (UPI)—House and Senate negotiators agreed Wednesday to boost the federal minimum wage to \$1.69 an hour by 1968 and to extend wage-hour law coverage to 8.1 million more workers. A conference committee made the key decisions as it tentatively approved a compromise between differing House and Senate minimum wage bills that is stronger than either.
Pastors Laud Milwee Stand R. T. Milwee, Seminole County superintendent of public instruction, was commended to the City Employees' Union, voiced the opinion after hearing yesterday that \$537 rather than \$578 had been computed as the new starting base pay. The present figure is \$465.
Get Out Of Viet PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI) Charles de Gaulle bluntly told the United States today to get out of Viet Nam. He said the war will continue until Washington follows his advice. In his most outspoken comment to date on the war in Southeast Asia, the 79-year-old De Gaulle spoke to a cheering crowd of more than 80,000 Cambodians in Phnom Penh's city stadium. He said 80 persons were killed in the crash, five others died on route to hospitals, and 10 others after admission to hospitals.

Seek Legislative Help Push Funds To 'Open' St. Johns

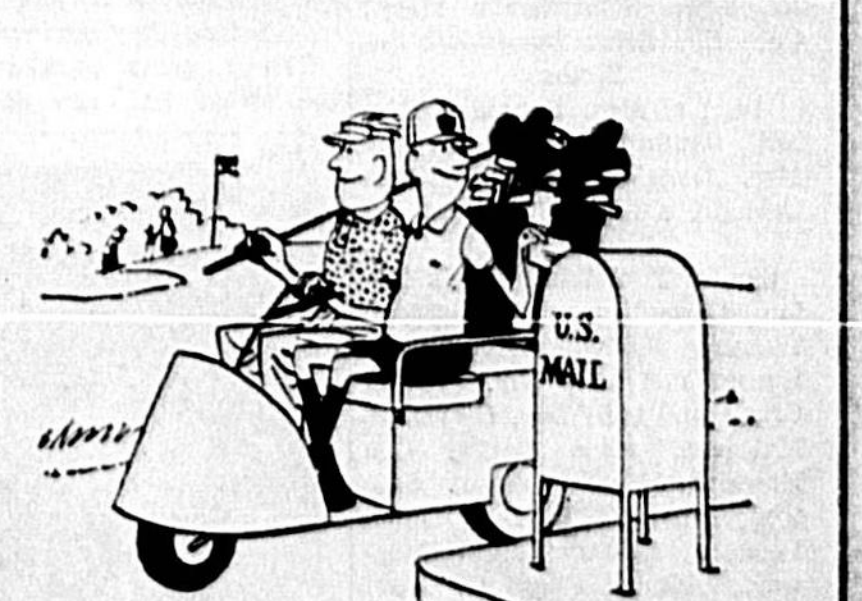
The 1967 Legislature will be requested to appropriate the necessary funds which will open the St. Johns River through pleasure boating — from Atlantic Ocean to Atlantic Ocean. "Things funds would be to pay the cost of installing locks and/or boat lifts in the Sebastian Canal now under construction at the south end of Brevard County. Sebastian Canal will be a part of the Central and South Florida Flood Control District (FCFD) project. Further, should lifts and/or locks be constructed in the Sebastian Canal for pleasure boating, a channel would be dredged through St. Johns Marsh to Lake Helen Blazes. This would open the upper St. Johns River for pleasure boating to the Intracoastal Waterway and the Atlantic Ocean. The western terminus of the Sebastian Canal is immediately south of Lake Helen Blazes, headwaters of the St. Johns River. Ultimately, wires and locks are to be constructed in a channel which would be dredged through St. Johns Marsh to Lake Helen Blazes. This would open the upper St. Johns River for pleasure boating to the Intracoastal Waterway and the Atlantic Ocean. Army Corps of Engineers has informed The Sanford Herald it has authority to construct boat lifts or locks in Sebastian Canal but "will recommend that the final control project be modified to include construction of those navigation structures that can be economically justified." The Herald it has no authority to expend any moneys for recreational purposes but will request the 1967 Legislature to appropriate the necessary funds for boat lifts and/or locks to allow pleasure boats to traverse the Sebastian Canal. It was pointed out it will be a 25-foot drop from the St. Johns Marsh east to the Sebastian River. Under these plans, it was said, the Sebastian Canal would not be opened to commercial (barge) traffic, only to pleasure boats. But this would allow pleasure boats to leave the Intracoastal Waterway at Jacksonville, come up the St. Johns River, through Lake Monroe (with its new marina-motel complex at Sanford), through Lake Harney, on up to the Sebastian Canal and back to the Intracoastal Waterway. Or vice versa. Presently, boats coming from Jacksonville must return there.

High In Whirlwind Tour Pledges Pollution Program

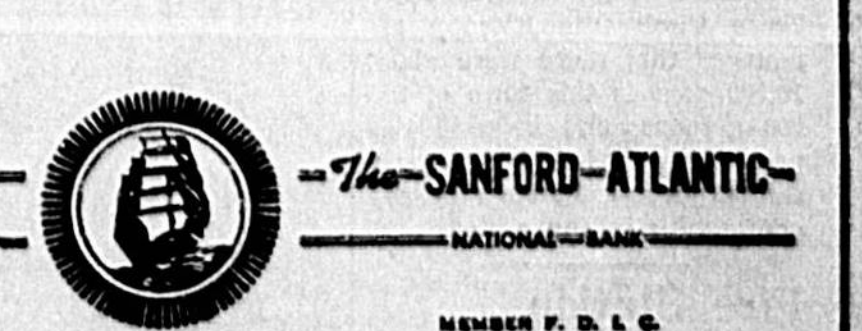

B52s Bomb Buffer Strip To Halt Red Infiltration

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. B52 bombers hampered suspected Communist infiltration routes in the demilitarized zone between North and South Viet Nam today.

The planes from Guam unloaded tons of explosives on two target areas in the buffer strip where North Vietnamese regulars were being infiltrating into the South.

Other U.S. planes continued the pounding of North Viet Nam.

Air Force pilots reported to see many hits on an ammunition depot that it "looked like a fireworks display."

A week-long lull in ground fighting persisted another day in South Viet Nam. The U.S. command reported no significant fighting. South Vietnamese headquarters listed only one engagement of any size.

The allied commands announced that enemy casualties dropped sharply last week while U.S. and South Vietnamese combat losses remained about the same.

Allied spokesmen said 1,009 Communists were killed and 101 captured last week. This was an unexplained drop from 1,829 Communists reported killed and 247 captured the previous week.

The U.S. command said 87 Americans were killed last week compared with 91 Aug. 12-20. However, the number of wounded rose more than 40 percent from 425 to 599. Only one American was reported as missing, a decline of seven.

A South Vietnamese spokesman reported 295 government troops killed last week, nine fewer than the week before, and

Sarasota Doctor To Plead Today In Wife Murder

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Mike Mansfield predicted today the time will come when President Johnson will be glad to have the Senate on record for reducing U.S. troop commitments to Europe.

Mansfield, the Senate Democratic leader, said in an interview he intends to push for action on a resolution calling for a substantial reduction in the U.S. forces in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization despite Johnson's current opposition to it.

He said two divisions of 18,000 men and dependents should be withdrawn now, a move the administration has said it will not make.

"This is an independent Senate action," he said. "The President is opposed to it. But the Senate has some responsibilities of its own and this resolution is the outgrowth of a spontaneous movement among its members."

"It can foresee circumstances when the President might be glad to have this expression of sentiment for some future action of this nature that he might decide was necessary."

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, consulted about the resolution Monday, said he and 12 members of the Democratic Policy Committee introduced Wednesday, said he is taking no position on it at this point.

Dirksen indicated, however, he supports the contention of Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel of California, the assistant Senate GOP leader, that there should be hearings on the proposal.

Sen. Leverett Saltonstall of Massachusetts, top Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee, backed this up with the observation that "it might be more helpful in the long run to have hearings."

Mansfield said, however, that he thinks discussion of the issue should take place in the Senate and he will move after the Labor Day holiday to make the resolution available for debate.

He said he has agreement from Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., chairman of the Armed Services Committee, and Sen. J.W. Fulbright, D-Ark., chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, that hearings are not needed.

The Johnson administration faced with the delicate problem of a NATO realignment because of France's withdrawal of troops, maintained its position that no U.S. troop cutbacks are contemplated.

Bill D. Moyers, White House press secretary, said Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara had told Democratic Policy Committee members who sponsored the resolution that he would "not be a helpful step at this time."

"In our judgment this is a NATO matter and should involve consultation with our allies," Moyers said.

Congressmen Take Action To Halt Highway Slaughter

WASHINGTON (AP)—A landmark safety package that would give the government broad authority to deal with slaughter on the nation's highways is one step from final congressional approval today.

Both houses gave unanimous approval Wednesday to the bill that would grant the government power to set mandatory safety standards for all new cars, buses and trucks starting with 1968 models. Power to develop standards for automobile tires and, eventually, the sale of used cars also is included.

The House action came on a 365-0 vote, and two hours later the Senate acted by voice vote.

The House also passed 380 to 0 a highway safety bill that would provide \$22 million in federal aid to help states and communities establish safety programs covering such things as vehicle inspection, driver education, improved highway design and maintenance and traffic control.

A deputy sheriff testified that the suspect after being advised of his rights, gave officers statements admitting he killed his wife by hitting her on the head with a hammer.

The signed statement, admitted as evidence, said Waldron and his 56-year-old wife had argued and that he stepped over about three feet and picked up a hammer and struck her. After she fell, the statement said, he continued to hit her.

A medical examination report about the victim suffered about 20 blows.

Assistant State Attorney Joe Miele argued that stepping away to get the hammer and the repeated blows indicated premeditation and the first degree murder charge should stand.

Policeman Charles Miller of Madeira Beach testified he asked the suspect what was used as a yellow bedspread on the floor of the Waldron home and said the suspect replied, "It's her, it's my wife."

Miller said at the time of his arrest, Waldron was very quiet, calm, and showed no signs of having been drinking.

Later State Attorney Clare A. Davis said he will present the case to a grand jury, probably about the first week in December.

The grand jury could indict Waldron on a charge of either first or second degree murder.

'Went For Swim,' Hero Describes Being Shot Down

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP)—"Went for unscheduled swim. All A-O-K. Your son, Rick."

That was how Lt. (j.g.) Robert F. (Rick) Adams wined his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Allan W. Adams of suburban Edina, that he'd been shot down over North Viet Nam the first time.

When he plunged into the Gulf of Tonkin last Oct. 5, Adams, 25, became the first pilot to survive a direct hit to his plane by a Soviet-built surface-to-air missile.

The second time he was shot down the Navy pilot was flying fighter support for a mission during raids on oil storage depots in the Hanot-Haliphong area July 12. A helicopter rescued him.

"I'm famous for being the most shot-down pilot in the war," said Adams, his face smeared with his mother's lipstick after he arrived in Minneapolis Tuesday.

"All the wrong kind of friends," Adams said. "I don't agree. The pilot was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds suffered in the first bailout, and later received the Distinguished Flying Cross.

When hit the second time, by ground fire, Adams said, "I was burning pretty good." His F8 Crusader was "a big ball of flames. I had lost control of it but was headed in the right direction."

Adams bailed out just before the plane crashed. He landed in a tree on a mountainside. But he "dropped everything and started running" up the mountain to get away from a village.

A U.S. aircraft picked up the signals from his survival radio and Adams was rescued by a helicopter.

After visiting his parents, Adams will be stationed at the Pensacola, Fla., Naval Base where he will tell young recruits what to expect in Viet Nam.

Following two tours in Viet Nam, Adams said he would like to go home—Adams said he found no morale problems.

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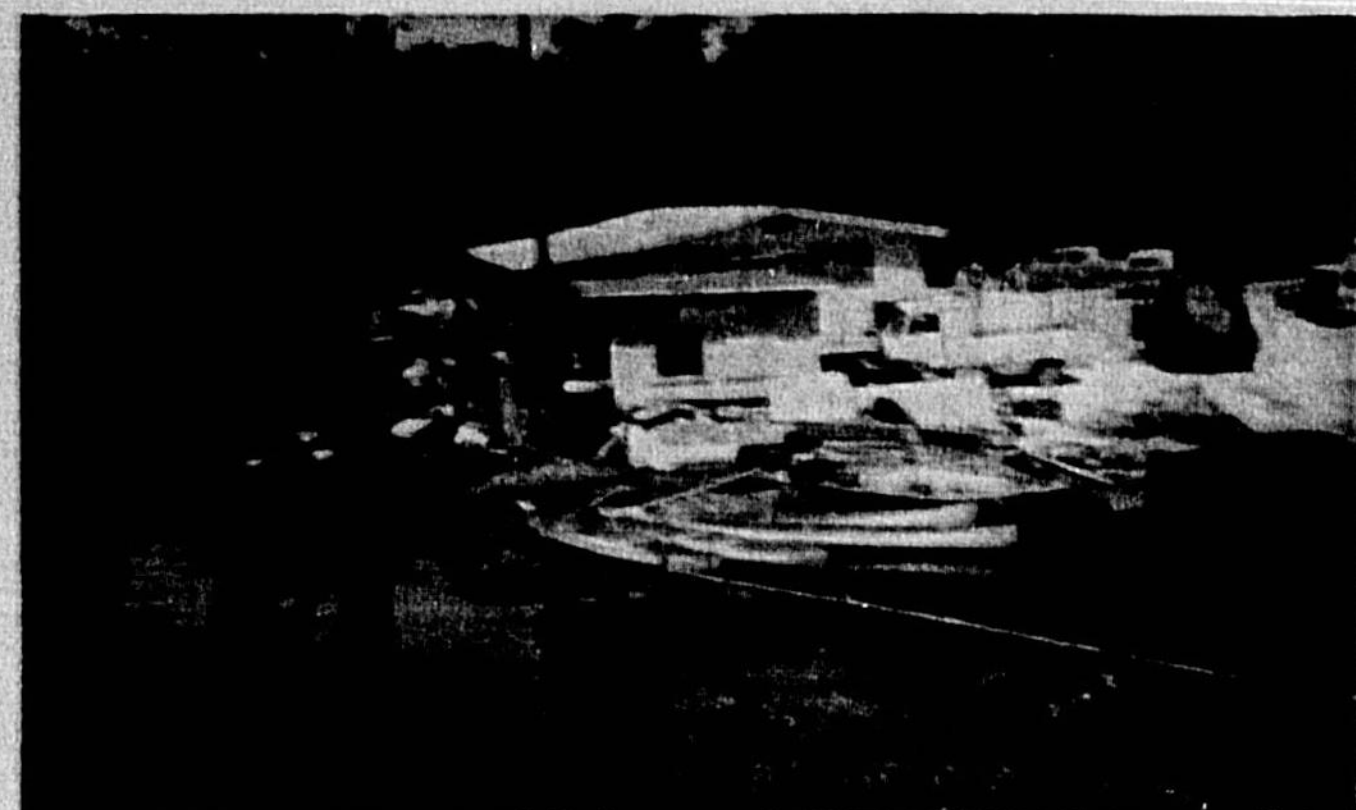
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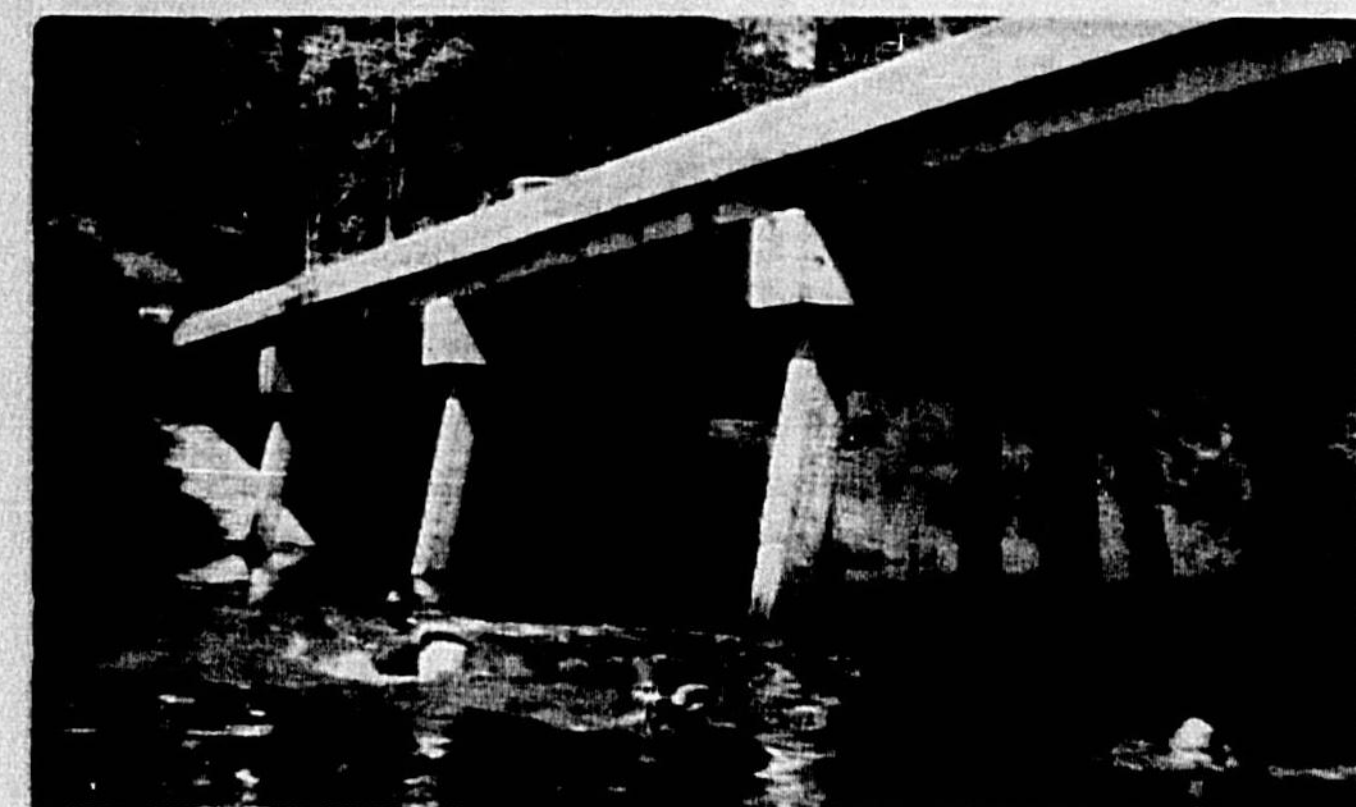

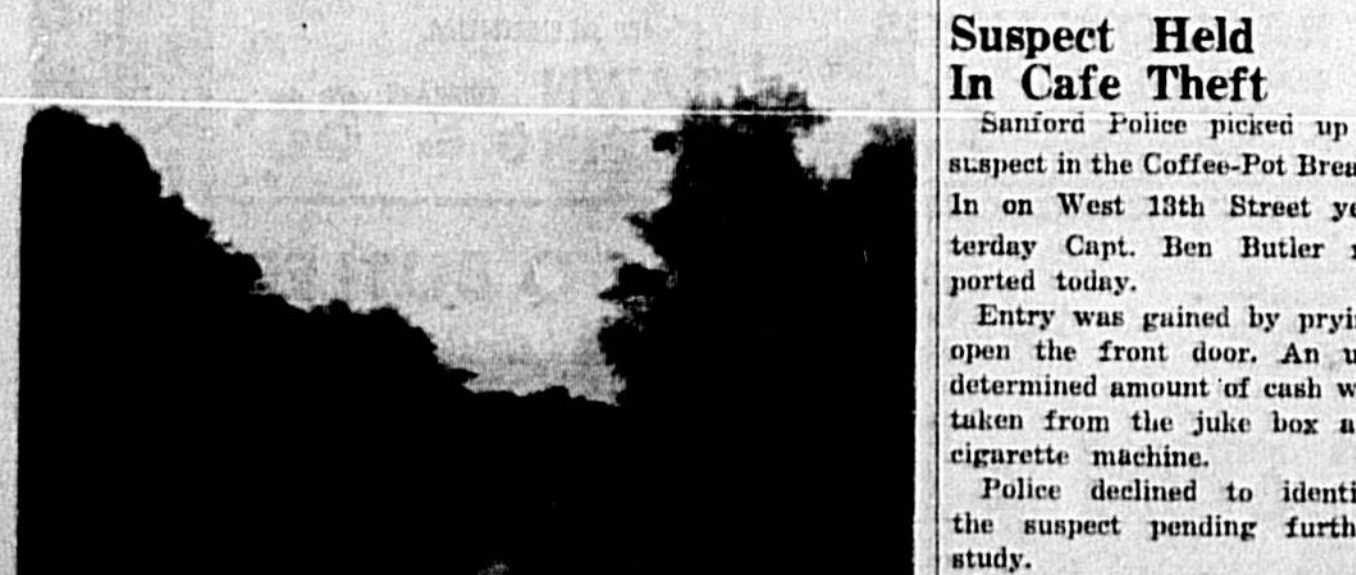
YOUNGSTERS now enjoy diving and swimming at the bridge, originally built to open the wilderness beyond for inter-county development, which fell through.

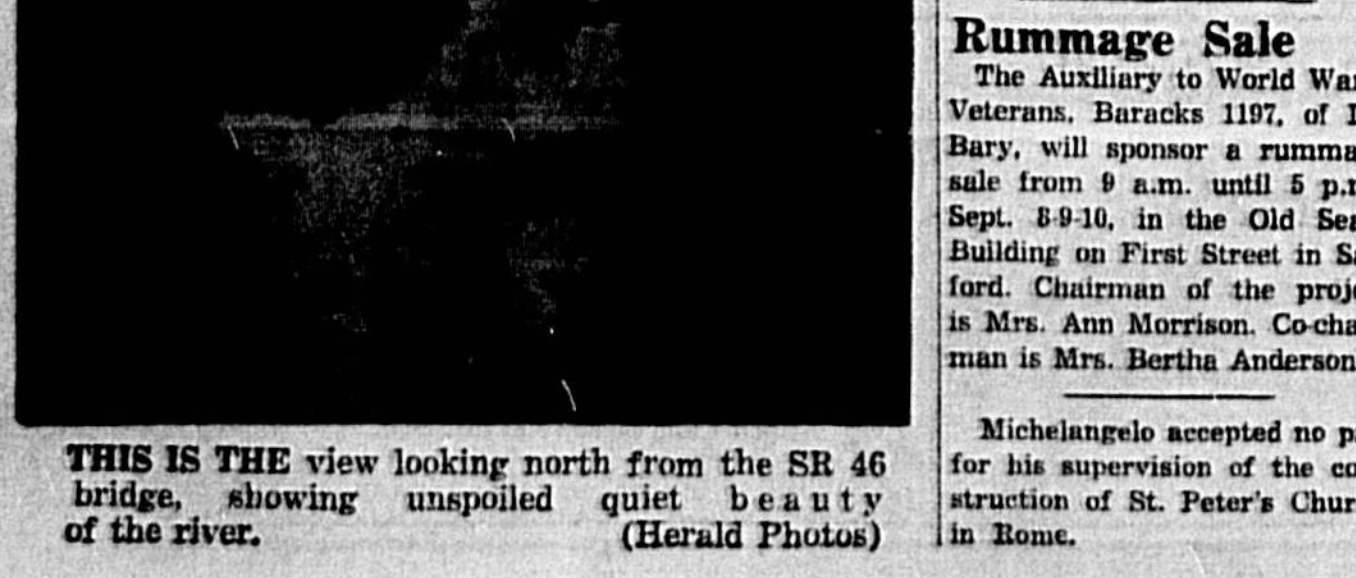

Minor Disturbances Only On Wednesday

A smattering of racial incidents and demonstrations spotted the Midwest Wednesday night in sharp contrast to the violence-marked nights of other weeks.

In Benton Harbor, Mich., where National Guardsmen were on call under a declared state of emergency, scattered groups of Negroes knotted around a filling station. There was only a minor disturbance, in contrast to three previous nights of violence.

State troopers dispersed the crowd that gathered before a few rocks and bottles were thrown. No one was hit. Police released Willard Benfield, 36, a white man who had been arrested and arraigned on an open homicide charge in the fatal shooting of a Negro, Cecil Hunt, 19, during a demonstration.

Benton Harbor Police Lt. Alfred Hauwetter said today Benfield was released because the bullet extracted from the victim did not match Benfield's gun. An attorney for Moore Sharp, bearded Chicago chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee.

There were some jeers, but King received a standing ovation when he told Sharp: "I don't believe in white power. I believe in black power. I believe in human power."

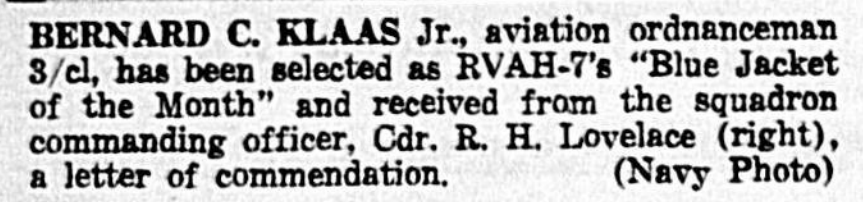

Exclusive School Will Ignore Will

SWEET BRIAR, Va. (AP) — Fashionable Sweet Briar College, citing the protection of a temporary federal court ruling, is facing with the possible loss of federal funds — had voted last May 28 to "implement an open admission policy." The Negro student, Marshawn Yeargin of Greenville, S.C., will be a member of the junior class. She has finished her education at Bennett College, Greensboro, N.C., and plans to major in biology. "It is to pay for a book I took with me when we moved away 38 years ago. I didn't purposefully steal it — just failed to return it when we left. I'm getting ready to go to heaven and don't want anything on my conscience." The letter was signed: "Sincerely, a converted sinner."

Sinner-Convert Pays Book Dues

BARTLESVILLE, Okla. (UPI) — Someone who described himself as a converted sinner settled an old debt today. "You will find \$2 enclosed," said a letter addressed to the librarian at Carnegie Library in Bartlesville and mailed from Fayetteville, Ark. "Under terms of the will of Ina Diana Fletcher Williams — the subject of litigation in state and federal courts the last two years — Sweet Briar plantation in Amberley, Oyster Bay, N.Y., was bequeathed in trust to become a college for the education of white girls and young women."

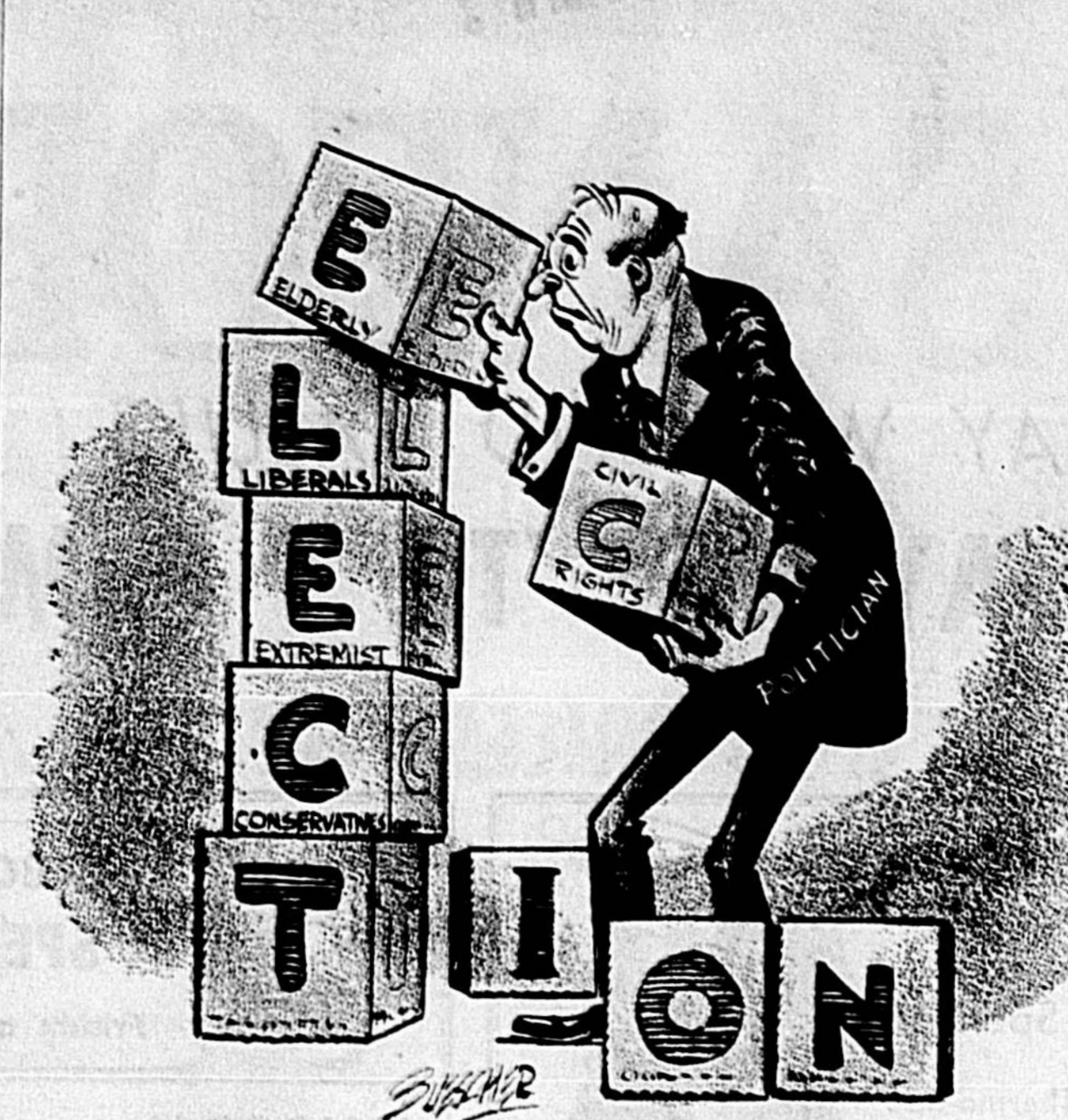

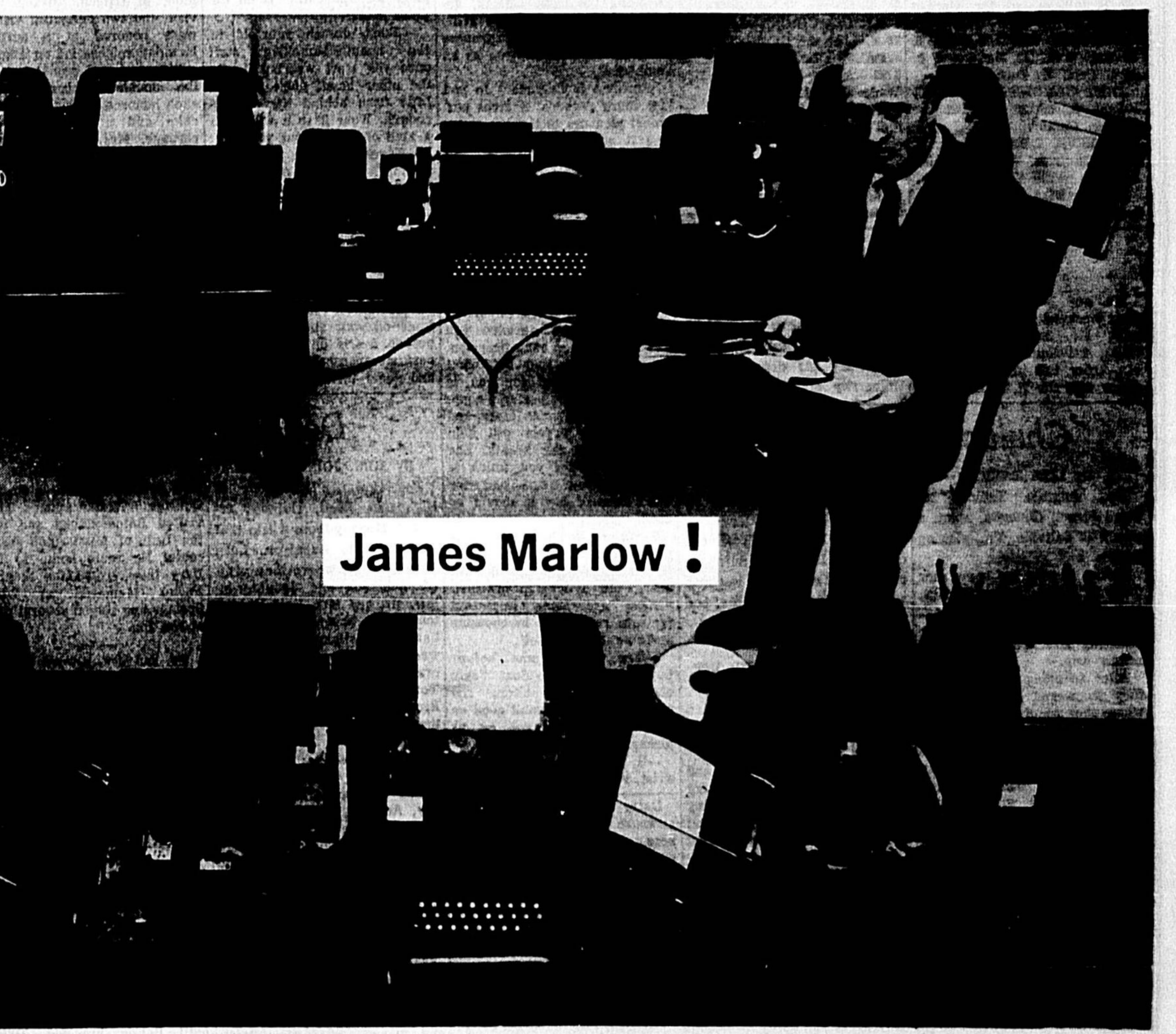

2. DO use your own sewing machine. Your own home sewing equipment. Borrowing can make you unpopular. Just remember that if your best friend has a sewing machine, she has it because she needs it. So rent one, buy one—don't borrow one.

3. DO invite friends in to visit while you're sewing. You don't have to be a home-sewing hermit. Invite a friend to see your work. It makes you sewing go faster. Besides, you may get some help.

4. DON'T annoy the neighbors by running your sewing machine when others might be asleep. The newest model machines make very little noise, so you can safely sew without disturbing anyone. But if you have an old model machine, don't use it in early hours if it's old and noisy.

Homemaker's Corner

It's now back to school time and mothers have to prepare different things for their young ones. Let's try something with eggs. Eggs are one of nature's most nearly perfect foods. They combine a heavy concentration of high quality protein with relatively few calories and complete digestibility. They are accepted as an important dietary requirement from infancy through the golden age group. For the children's breakfast try this.

ORANGE EGG
1 egg
1 cup orange juice, fresh or frozen
Combine egg and juice; beat until just blended. Serve 1/2 cup medially. Makes 1 or 2 servings.

FRENCH TOAST
4 eggs
1 cup milk
1/2 cup butter
1/4 tsp. salt
8 slices day-old bread
Shortening for frying
1/2 cup sugar or confectioner's sugar
Beat eggs, milk, sugar and salt together in a shallow dish. Heat shortening in skillet or on griddle. Dip bread slices, one at a time, into egg mixture, turn and fry until lightly brown on one side, turn and brown on the other side. Serve with syrup, jelly or sugar.

They will go simply "wild" over these cookies.

PECAN NUGGETS
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup sugar
4 egg yolks
2 squares (1 oz. each) unsweetened chocolate, melted
1/2 cup flour
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 cup milk
1/2 cup vanilla
1 cup pecans, chopped
Cream butter or margarine and sugar in mixer. Add melted chocolate, beat well. Sift dry ingredients together and add to mixture alternately with milk, stirring well after each addition. Stir in vanilla and chopped nuts. Drop by teaspoonful onto ungreased cookie sheet. Top with pecan half and bake in a 400-degree oven for 8 to 10 minutes. Makes 3 dozen cookies.

EGG CUSTARDS
4 eggs (or 3 eggs and 2 yolks) slightly beaten
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
3 cups milk, scalded
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. almond or lemon extract
Blend eggs, sugar and salt. Slowly pour milk into egg mixture, stirring constantly. Flavoring. Pour into oiled custard cups. Sprinkle with nutmeg, if desired. Set in baking pan and pour water into pan to within 1/2 inch of top of custard. Bake in a 325-degree oven for 35 to 40 minutes or until firm. Turn out and serve warm promptly from hot water. Serve warm or chilled. Serves 8 to 4.

GOLDEN EGG SALAD
CASSEHOLE
6 hard cooked eggs, chopped
2 tbsp. diced pimiento
1/2 cup diced celery
1/2 crushed (about 1 1/2 cups)
1/2 cup milk
1 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
1/4 tsp. salt, spread half
1 tsp. garlic salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
2 tbsp. melted butter
Blend chopped eggs, pimiento, celery, 1 cup of the cracker crumbs, mayonnaise or salad dressing, milk and seasonings. Spread a greased 1 quart shallow casserole or 9-inch pie pan. Top with remaining cracker crumbs blended with the butter. Bake in 400-degree oven until golden brown or about 25 minutes. Serve hot. Serves 6.
