Aramco To Be Nationalized

BOSTON (AP) — The Christian Science Monitor said today that Saudi Arabia will soon demand that four American oil companies give up their shares in Aramco for a likely price of \$1.5 billion.

Aramco is the world's largest oil-producing company. Saudi Arabia now has a 25 per cent interest in the company. The remaining 75 per cent interest is owned by four american oil companies - Exxon, Texaco, Standard Oil of California and Mobil.

Aranico now pumps 7.1 million barrels of oil daily from Saudi Arabian lands. It pumped 8.8 million barrels a day before the Arab oil embargo of the United States, the

Poll Rates Congress Low

NEW YORK (AP) - A recent Harris survey has given Congress the lowest marks for performance in more than 10 years of polling about the federal legislative branch. The survey reported Monday that 69 per cent of those asked, "How do you rate the job Congress is doing?" said fair or poor. Twenty-one per cent said good or excellent, and 10 per cent were not sure.

On individual topics, Congress received an 88 per cent negative rating on controlling inflation, 83 per cent negative rating on keeping spending under control and 82 per cent negative in inspiring confidence in government Faring better was William E. Reporters Sue For Privacy

WASHINGTON (AP) - A suit aimed at preventing the elephone company from secretly giving journalist's telephone records to law enforcement agencies is being filed by an organization of reporters.

The Reporters Committee for Freedom of the Press said it will file suit within three weeks alleging that, in order to protect the First Amendment guarantee of freedom of the press, the telephone company should be required to notify reporters and news organizations of any

subpoenas of their telephone records.

The American Telephone & Telegraph Co. disclosed over the weekend that the records of at least four news organizations and five journalists had been secretly subpoenaed by federal officials in recent years.

Libya Takes U.S. Firms

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — President Moammar Khadafy has retaliated against the Washington oil conference by completing the nationalization of Libyan subsidiaries of four American oil companies. Last September, Khadafy took control of 51 per cent of all foreign oil heldings in Libya. A decree issued Monday by his Revolutionary Command Council ordered nationalization of the other 49 per cent of the California Asiatic Co., owned by Standard Oil of California; the American Overseas Petroleum Co., owned by California Asiatic and Texaco; and the Libyan-American Oil Co., owned by Exxon and Atlantic Richfield.

Wage Subsidies Offered

LONDON (AP) — A British businessmen's group has offered to subsidize raises for the coal miners temporarily if they end their three-day-old strike. Leaders of the miners' union said they would study the suggestion from Godfrey Bradman, a director of the London Mercantile Corp. The second day of the strike passed peacefully in the collieries Monday. On Monday night the 30,000 railway engineers decided to call off their eight-week slowdown in support of wage demands.

REIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Iraqi sources predict more thting between Iraqi and Iranian forces along the horder between the two countries. 

International Diplomacy Good

Nixon May Make USSR Trip Again

It looks like President Nixon is going to make another trip to the Soviet Union, probably in June. In a way, this is good news because the President is a master in international diplomacy and some good can't help but accrue from such a trip.

Meanwhile, however, back on Rancho U.S.A. things continue to go to pot (not marijuana) and the outlook for the future is dim insofar as the average American is concerned.

What seems to be needed is domestic application of the Nixon global genius (or a domestic Henry Kissinger) so that the following foreign achievements can be matched in

End of the Vietnam war and return of prisoners; better relatiors with Russia; opening of quasi diplomatic relations with mainland China; start of an arms limitation agreement with Russia; leadership that has helped forge at least an uneasy truce in the Mideast.

There are those who say that the President cannot or should not be blamed for economic and other domestic ills. The fact is, however, that if we are to give him full credit for accomplishments abroad - and we should - he also must take the heat for failures at home. This holds true despite full awareness that his in-terests are global rather than internal. And, despite the distractions of Watergate and associated felonious conduct of some of his

In his recent State of the Union message, Mr. Nixon said, "There is not going to be a recession in the United States of America." Good.

However, already Secretary of the Treasury George Schultz has hedged on this promise by saying that there are extenuating circumstances, like the energy shortage, to get the



radically new forms of missiles moved ahead at a rela-The only way the second round of Strategic Arms Limitation Talks (SALT II) now in progress can succeed, Schlesinger believes, is for the United States to push ahead on research and development so vigorously and imaginatively that the Russians see us as steadily pulling

away ahead of them, and for Washington to show Moscow this country is willing to match the Kremlin's increases in missile numbers and power.


We must do this, he says, so convincingly the Russians will be certain that in any convincingly the Russians will be certain that in any contest they will surely slip further behind. Then, if Schlesinger has analyzed the situa-tion correctly, Brezhnev will come to an agreement that has meaning. Otherwise no.

has meaning. Otherwise no.

There is no doubt in Schlesinger's mind that the U.S. can stay ahead technologically — and numerically if we must. The problem is a question of will, he says. That will must be expressed by the President and by Congress. But back of these leaders there must be a will on the part of the citizency. That is the way a demucracy works.

Schlesinger helieves it may not be necessary for the United States actually to put through a major buildup of new weapons for this strategy to be successful. If the Russians are convinced that we have the will and that we will carry out this major advance in weaponry if the USSR does not coopercte, this may suffice. The problem, of course, is convincing the Krenilin.

Schlesinger is certain Congress will do what is necessary when the chips are down if the legislators can be sold on the correctness of these arguments. The problem is to make sure the Russians do not mismterpret our necessary national and Congressional debates. Our present task is to show the Kremlin the failacy of any such misinterpretation of the American will.





Investigations

WASHINGTON- We are beginning to feel that the Nixon

Administration has nothing to do but investigate us. Once again, we have caught the President's heavy-handed Keystone Kops grabbing our personal phone records and snooping into our private lives in an attempt to put a stop to stories that embarrass This time, his slippery sleuths made off with five different

batches of our toll calls so they could check out the numbers and find out who we've been speaking with. As so often happens when a corrupt government tramples on private rights, the FBI men unleashed on us by the Ad-

ministration badly wronged the innocents. One of those whose records were seized committed the unpardonable sin of bearing the same name as one of our reporters. With no check whatsoever, the FBI grabbed his records along with those of almost everyone one our staff. They even in-

vestigated the 18-year-old son of one of our newsmen. One would think all this unconstitutional folderol had to do with a life-and-death matter of national security. Quite the contrary. The hordes of FBI men were directed to sniff out the source of a humorous story about the drunken hijinks of a Nixon ap-

The errant diplomat was Bert Tollefson, a former corn lobbyist, honored for his loyalty to the Republican party with the top foreign aid job in Kenya. He had been there but a few weeks when ther-Vice President Agnew stopped by for an official visit and traveled with his entourage to a fancy jungle lodge called

Tollefson was not invited to the Vice President's party, but he went anyhow. The raucous scene he created still has the striped-

The American ambassador to Kenya, Robinson McIlvaine, described the incident in a series of blistering, "eyes only" wires to Tollefson's boss, Dr. John Hannah, then head of the Agency for International Development.

"I regret to inform you," Ambassador McIlvaine cabled, "that Bert Toilefson blotted his copy book so badly during the Vice President's visit (that) you may be hearing from the Vice President directly on the matter. "The problem started with Bert's well-known pushiness and

general lack of sensitivity and culminated in his getting sloshed at freetops, making passes at the Vice President's secretary and trying to drag her down the steps to meet an elephant at ground Tollefson capped his performance, the ambassador con-tinued, by talking a native Kenyan out of a room at the lodge,

versleeping the next morning, then making off with "the remaining Secret Service car" leaving the government agents Our associate Joseph Spear reached AID chief Hannah, whose main concern was not how Tollefson had shamed the U.S.

in Africa, but how Spear had gotten a cable which had come to him "highly restricted, hand-carried and sealed." Spear, of course, declined to reveal his sources.

The outraged Hannah forthwith ordered all AID hotocopiers moved to "secured areas" where they could be marded all day and made "inoperable...during non-working

Not content with these steps, the Administration ordered the FBI to invade the State Department to administer lie detector tests, grill distinguished officials and generally terrifying the

Still unsuccessful in finding who tattled on Tollesson, the government ordered a federal grand jury to issue subpoents for all phone toll calls made from our office and from the homes of our reporters during the entire month of July 1971.

The Bell System, whom we—not the White House—pay for

our costly long distance charges, slipped the FBI all our records without a whimper. By the time Ma Bell had stopped gossiping away our secrets to the FBI, the Administration had the toll records for our office, Spear, Brit Hume, Les Whitten, and Whitten's 18-year-old son, Les Whitten III.

They also seized the records of a Kensington, Md., technical writer named Charles Elliott. His crime, it seems, was to carry the same name as an intrepid young reporter then on our staff.

The Administration's goof on Charles Elliott of Kensington was compounded because Chuck Elliott, our reporter, was already well known to the FBI. He was the man we dispatched to sort through J. Edgar Hoover's garbage, as Hoover's agents had done so often to those he investigated.

Despite their dossier on Chuck, the G-men still got the wrong

With these new revelations, at last we are willing to believe that the White House "plumbers" reflected the President's views when they posted our name on a wall board in their beament bunker as their Press Enemy Number One. After all, the Nixon Administration has used lie detectors,

tapped phones, invoked grand juries, set up stake-outs, and followed us in unmarked cars to try to inhibit our reporting. They arrested Les Whitten on a phony charge of possessing stolen Indian documents—a charge later thrown out by a grand jury and They used that case as a pretext for previously seizing all our toll records and harassing our callers. They refused to give the records up until forced to by Judge John J. Sirica. Indeed, this

time, as far as we can determine, the FBI still has copies of our records in the Case of the Drunken Diplomat.

FOOTNOTE: Through the hard work of the Reporters Committee for Freedom of the Press, we, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch and Knight Newspapers learned of the seizure of our toll bills. In defense of the FBI, however, they took the dirty case only when ordered to and they frankly admitted to us the goof in the Elliott seizure. This is heartening evidence that the new FBI director, Clarence Kelley, means what he says about running a




I never dress him like a girl. His hair is cut like most boys his age, but what really disturbs me is after I correct people, they go right on saying, "What a beautiful little girl



DEAR POLLY - Mrs. T.J. wanted to know how to transfer an embroidery design on to black material. I have used a white crayon by solidly covering the lines of the design on the back of the pattern and then placing the pattern on the material and transferring by going over the pattern lines with a pencil. The crayon marks may show but I remove them with cleaning or lighter fluid. Test first.


For removing carbon paper smudges such as she has on her white corded coat I have used rubbing alcohol and sometimes peroxide will do. Do test on the fabric first. Both have been successful for me on knits and woven fabrics. - ANNA. POLLY'S NOTE - My references all say to use one part of rubbing alcohol to two parts water for such removal but do not skip the testing. Alcohol will injure some synthetic materials and fade some. Also, when using Anna's pointer for tracing a pattern on black fabric and crayon is not easily removed from your fabric try white chalk with as

sharp a point as possible.

DEAR POLLY - I am a professional artist who has worked with arts and crafts for years and my personal choice of methods for transferring a pattern to dark fabric is the following: Lay unwrinkled new waxed paper over the design to be traced, trace it and then place this pattern on the material to be used with a No. 1 or soft lead pencil go over your design tearing through the waxed paper as you go. The black carbon pencil will show up on most black fabrics. f you need a sharper view of it as you work let a lamp shine firectly on the pencil markings to highlight them. - MRS.

Rogers Improbable Rules

Weiskopf's Unhappiness Matched By His Candor Copley News Service Tom Weiskopf is a young man who should be happier with his lot than he seems to be. Last year the 31-year-old professional golfer won nearly \$250,000 on the PGA tour with five victories during a string of eight tournaments. Counting wins in the British and Canadian opens, his earnings for 1973 amounted to more than

Yet these days Weiskopf's unhappiness with many phases of the \$8.5 million PGA tour is surpassed only by his honesty and willingness to tell it like he sees it. For one thing, Weiskopf says, first-place money in many of the tour tournaments is too high. More of the purses should be tapered down to give a fatter slice of the money to those

who finish, for example, between 15th and 30th. It costs a pro about \$25,000 a year just to travel to the tournaments and pay his board and room, Tom points out. And if he has a sponsor—most do now—the pro must split his earnings down the middle and hand the "angel" half. Unless he finishes high up on the money list, the pro with

even a better than mediocre season may wind up with only his hand in his pocket. There are too many PGA tournaments, so many that they collide with the mounting number of foreign competitions-in Japan, Europe, Australia, even Africa-many

with bulging purses, in Weiskopf's view. The PGA's new rule that the "big name" golfers are obligated to play in certin major tournaments-whether they want to or not-is unfair, he insists. This year the PGA has ruled they must play in the Colonial, Kemper and the World Open, or be penalized.

Eventually the association intends to make from 10 to 15 tournaments "mandatory" for the top money winners. The aim is to assure tournament sponsors, who put up the money to finance them that they will get the big gallery-drawing

Weiskopf contends. "What if my best friend was getting married? Or they could take you to court if you skipped a mandatory tournament to attend your daughter's high school

He predicts "a lot of problems" if players are commanded to appear in specified tournaments under the threat.

Weiskopf says he is opposed also to the marathon tournaments like Bob Hope's 90-hole Desert Classic at Palm Springs and the eight-round World Open inaugurated last year with a record purse of \$500,000. Weiskopf also seems irritated when he talks of "fly-by-

night" tournaments, like the Dow Jones Open, which last only a few seasons but offer such big purses that they crowd other more deserving competitions right off the PGA

He cites the Portland and Seattle opens as two fine tournaments which were canceled to be replaced by richer

Weiskopf, who plans this year to compete in only 20 or 21 of the more than 40 PGA events, concedes that "I like to play where I have friends in town, so I can visit with them in off
