The Sanford Fire Department ef-fective on July 1, will be held within the limits of a five-mile radius of Sanford by action of the Board of Sanford City Commisioners.

In order for the Sanford Fire Department to answer a call othe side of the Sanford City limits, avapplication for such service must first be made at the City Mani-ger's office in the City Hall. The application enumerates the date, name, address, telephone number, location of property the type of construction of the builde ings, and the location of water

Accompanying the application must be a deposit of \$100 or in insurance policy or rider covering the payment of \$100 to the City of Sanford for making the call outside of the city limits.

An applicant, if not wishing to make the \$100 cash deposit, must first see his insurance agent to secure the palicy or rider to pro-sent policies to deposit with the

The application must be reach-ed annually on or before July 1 and accompanied by an administration fee of \$5.






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

They say: "No businessman or woman in any town should allow a newspaper to go to press without his or her name and business mentioned somewhere in its columns. This does not mean you should have a whole, half, or even a quarter page advertisement in each issue of the paper but your name and address should be mentioned if you do not use more than a two line space.

"A stranger picking up a newspaper should be able to tell what business is represented in a town ... it's the best possible town advertiser. The man or woman who does not advertise does an injustice to him-self or herself and definitely to the town."

ST. LOUIS UP-Ladies, in about five years you just might be able to serve your family a meal with loods preserved through , atomic radiation. The process was described Wednesday to a meeting of the

Institute of Food Technologists. It is intended to supplement presentday methods of canning and refrigeration. Capt. Reuben. Pomerants, radiation preservation officer of the Quartermaster Food and Container Institute of Chicago, said results of the program might be available to the general public in about five years and it could reduce prices somewhat. He said a limited amount of radiation could permit keeping some foods to a long time at regular refrigeration temperatures. He said the food doesn't become ra-
