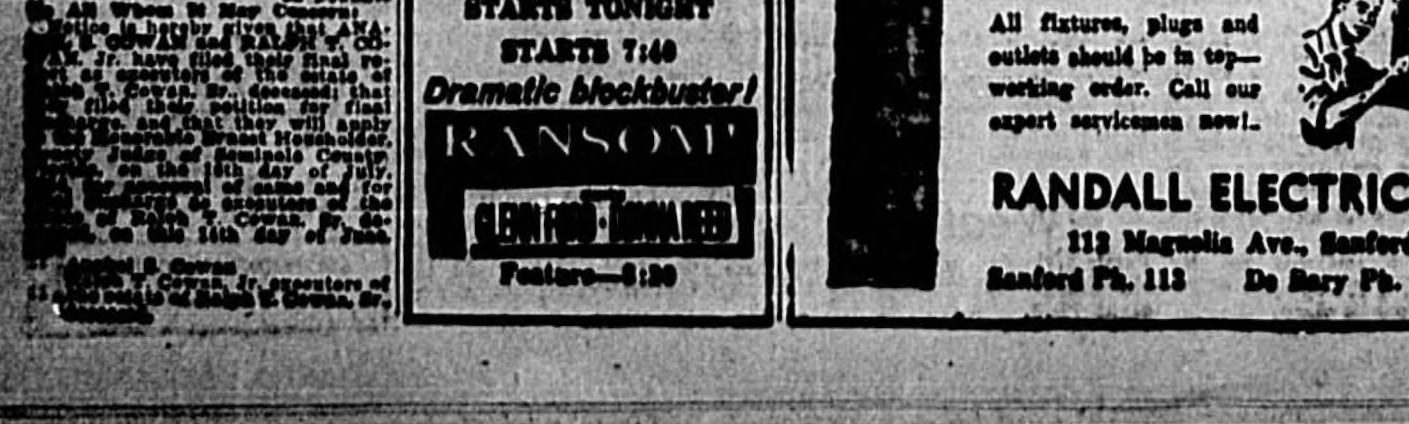
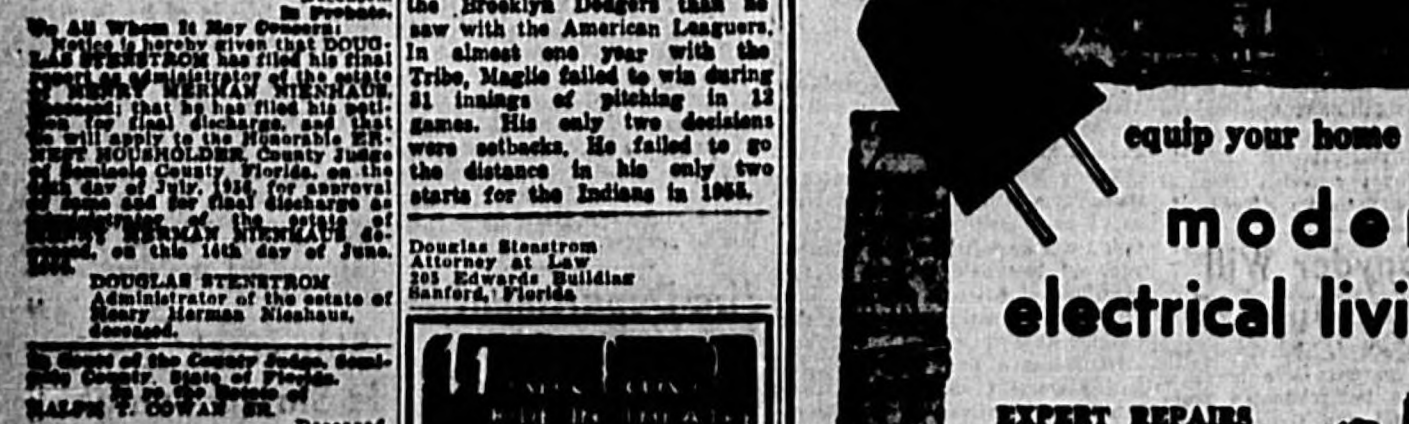

New Food Process Revealed At Meet

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Ladies, in about five years you just might be able to serve your family a meal with foods preserved through atomic radiation.

The process was described Wednesday to a meeting of the Institute of Food Technologists. It is intended to supplement present-day methods of canning and refrigeration.

Capt. Reuben Pomerantz, radiation preservation officer of the Quartermaster Food and Container Institute of Chicago, said results of the program might be available to the general public in about five years and it could reduce prices somewhat.

He said a limited amount of radiation could permit keeping some foods to a long time at regular refrigeration temperatures. He said the food doesn't become radioactive.

Army research now constitutes most of the work being done on the new approach. Plans for a pilot plant capable of turning out 30 tons of radiated food daily are in the works.

A group of 10 volunteers, all former conscientious objectors, are now on a 100 per cent radiated food diet at Fitzsimmons Army Hospital in Denver.

Capt. Pomerantz said "there is no difference at all in their behavior" when on the radiated diet. He said some foods, such as green, leafy vegetables, fresh fruits and dairy products, don't lend themselves to the process.

Strawberries turn white. Lettuce with milk comes out with a burned taste. Pork products, poultry, brussels sprouts, broccoli and fish were termed the most promising foodstuffs for radiation. Capt. Pomerantz said the process could introduce a "new but acceptable taste."

FFL To Seek Help For Blind Persons

TAMPA (AP)—The Florida Federation of Labor is planning to ask branches throughout the state to try to help blind persons get more industrial employment.

Agreement on the program was reached Tuesday at a meeting of FFL officials and executives of the Florida Council for the Blind.

Frank G. Roche, FFL president, said many plants could give small subcontracts for blind people to do outside the plants. They would not compete with union members and the FFL would not seek to organize them, Roche said.

Harry E. Simmons, executive director of the council, said blind persons could do such work as assembling, drill press operations, light repair, stapling, and sorting and packaging.

Management also will be asked to cooperate in the program.

HANDICAPPED CANDIDATE
FALMOUTH, Ark., (AP)—After County Atty. William P. Mahoney Jr. was pitched from a horse and suffered a broken arm, he showed up at work with his arm in a sling.
