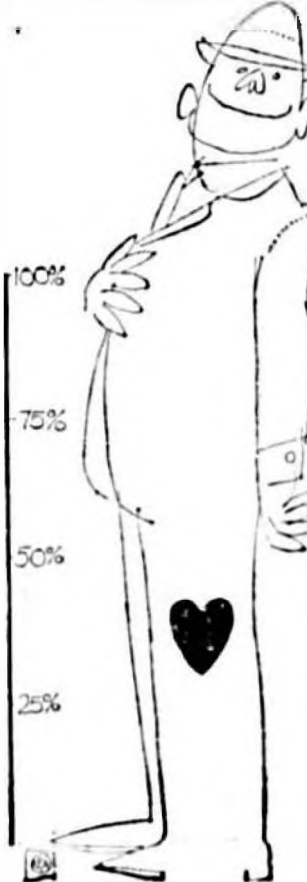

Protest Lodged By City

Sanford City Commissioners, sitting as a canvassing board Wednesday, voted to return balloting in city elections to City Hall unless the names of city candidates are placed in a more advantageous spot on the ballot in the future.

All of the commissioners and particularly Joe Baker, who was re-elected, expressed dissatisfaction and disappointment at the voting record, as did aspiring candidate E. C. Harper Jr.

A count of the absentee ballots gave incumbent Commissioner Baker a total of 1,132 votes to Harper's final total of 922.

After the canvassing was completed commissioners discussed the matter and Commissioner Baker moved that "unless County Registrar Camilla Bruce can assure the position of the city's contest-

ed candidates at the top of the ballot on the voting machines, that the elections be returned to being held in City Hall."

The motion was seconded by Commissioner Earl Higginbotham and passed unanimously.

In Tuesday's election, the names of the city candidates were placed at the bottom of the first row of names on the ballot, underneath a long list of unopposed candidates.

Many city voters complained that they could not find the names of city candidates on the ballot and a number showed up at City Hall Tuesday to vote, after they had voted at county precincts.

The disadvantage of this position on the ballot was increased by the fact that only 2,005, or 29 per cent, of the city's 6,896 registered voters marked the city ballot on the voting machines. Checks showed that 4,887 city voters went to the polls.

City Commissioners voted in 1962 to have the city ballot included on the county voting machines to save voters from having to go to two different places to vote.

This also simplified the matter of voter registration enabling voters to register at one place and vote at one place instead of two. Legislation was introduced, the city charter was changed, and an ordinance passed to permit this to be done.

However, since changing the voting procedure, the City Commissioners have not been satisfied with the position accorded the city ballot on the voting machines.

City Commission elections are held every year in a staggered procedure. In 1965 the seats of Commissioners J. H. Crapps and M. L. R. R. born will be up for election.

Bassett Protests Results

E. Pope Bassett, unsuccessful candidate for County Commission, today filed an official protest with the canvassing board on the results given in seven precincts.

The board decided late this morning to check the voting machines at 3:30 this afternoon at the warehouse to determine the official tabulation of the machines as compared with the written reports.

Precincts challenged by Bassett are 1, 3, 11, 13, 17, 20 and 23. Twenty-three machines are involved, according to County Judge C. Vernon Mize and Voting Registrar Camilla Bruce.

The protests were filed by Gretchen W. Pope and Ellnor Macdonald against returns in Precincts 1, 3 and 15. They charged that results in these three precincts were not announced distinctly and that there was a possibility of errors being made in transferring figures to certificates.

Judge Mize and members of the board which also includes County Commissioner John Fitzpatrick and Supervisor of Registration Camilla Bruce, were scheduled to make an inspection of the voting machines in question sometime today.

Swofford Squeaks To Close Victory

Altamonte Springs Mayor W. Lawrence Swofford is the new county commissioner for District 3.

Absentee ballots nudged Swofford ahead of his rival, E. Pope Bassett, Republican candidate who had led in the unofficial tally Tuesday night by a scant margin of 118 votes.

His return was short-lived, however. The official canvassing board, in a marathon session which lasted till last midnight, reported Swofford had gained a 128-vote margin of victory.

The official vote now is: Swofford, 8,232; Bassett, 8,104. The canvassers waded through 1,231 absentee ballots Wednesday to bring out the official verdict. They started at 10 a. m. and worked virtually continuously to complete the mammoth task.

Another race which was watched closely as the absentee ballots were tabulated was that of Justice of Peace for District 4.

Democrat Al Davis maintained his lead over Republican C. E. (Chuck) Kern although it was sliced somewhat from a 252 plurality to 217. In losing the five votes, Davis won the election with an official 3,263 to Kern's 3,046.

No other contest was close enough to be affected by absentee ballots.

Incumbent Tax Assessor Mary Earle Walker picked up 227 absentee votes to increase her lead over Republican Guy Allen 9,980 to 7,155.

Barry Goldwater, Republican candidate for president, picked up 90 more votes to increase his lead over President Lyndon B. Johnson, 10,078 to 9,125.

TORONTO (UPI) — Toronto may soon have city-supervised birth control clinics.

The Board of Control approved in principle the establishment of such clinics.

Re-Registration At 'Slow Pace'

Mayor Lawrence Swofford today said that re-registration of voters in Altamonte Springs is progressing at "a very slow pace."

The municipal election is scheduled for Tuesday, Dec. 8. Two council seats will be up for grabs—District 3, now held by Gene Stephenson and District 4, held by Donald Fritch.

Swofford, elected to the County Commission in Tuesday's election by a 128-vote margin over E. Pope Bassett, said this morning that there was a possibility that he may resign as mayor and that if the does voters would have to elect a mayor to serve the final year of Swofford's two-year term.

22 Photos Scheduled

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—The countdown proceeded steadily today for an attempt to rocket a Mariner television craft on an historic 8½-month voyage to Mars.

A space agency spokesman reported that preparations are going well with the craft, scheduled to begin its 350 million-mile flight at 1:22 p.m. (EST). The launch period ends at 3:17 p.m.

The pioneering probe is designed to take up to 22 pictures of the surface of Mars and to see if the little planet's atmosphere is thick enough to allow future spaceships to land using parachutes.

It will take about eight days for all 22 pictures to be flashed back to earth because the craft's radio transmission speed is limited. At the 150 million-mile distance between Mars and earth next July, it will take about 13 minutes for each signal to reach earth.

If all goes as planned, Mariner 3 will swoop next July 17 to within 7,000 to 10,000 miles of the planet that scientists say has the best chance in the solar system to support earth-type life.

Today's shot was the first of two costing \$112 million in America's opening scientific assault on the red planet. The Soviet Union failed in at least one Mars probe two years ago and is expected to try again this month.

The second Mariner is likely to be launched Nov. 13 if the first few days of Mariner-3's flight are on target. But even with twin spacecraft, officials said the mission was so difficult that the odds for at least one partial success were little better than 50-50.

Besides exploring the planet, itself, Mariner-3 carries instruments to measure the radiation, space dust and magnetic forces it encounters on its long journey through uncharted interplanetary space.

Scientists say they don't know what the photographs will disclose. But if the probe is on course, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration hopes the pictures will be able to spot mile-long features of the surface.

Such detail would be many times better than the best pictures taken through earth-based telescopes.

The famous Martian "canals," a vast series of seemingly straight lines, have puzzled astronomers for years. Whether Mariner's pictures will solve the mystery is unknown.

'Carpet Bagging' Eyed As Cause Of Salinger Loss

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Senator-elect George Murphy granted newsmen a frank interview during which he commented on his adversary, Sen. Pierre Salinger; Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, the election and his plans in the Senate.

The former actor said that although he was "happy" with Goldwater as the Republican presidential candidate, "I didn't tie up my campaign with Goldwater because he was suffering from a bad image which made him look wrongly—as 'triggy happy.'"

Speaking of Tuesday's triumph over Salinger Murphy said: "Gov. Edmund G. Brown clinched the election for me when he appointed Salinger to the seat of late Democratic Sen. Clair Engle. The people apparently agreed with me that the appointment was illegal. And I still say it's illegal and I'm going to prove it."

The new California senator also said he felt the "carpet-bagging" issue hurt Salinger, who moved to California from Virginia to run for Engle's seat in California, where Salinger was born.

Fence-Mending Mission Seen For Humphrey

LONDON (UPI) — President Johnson was reported today to be planning to send Vice President-elect Hubert H. Humphrey on a fence-mending mission to West European capitals.

British reports from Washington said Humphrey may fly to Europe later this month to give the ground for a new major diplomatic effort to repair the crumbling North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

London, Paris and Bonn were cited as the major stopping points.

Johnson, himself, is not expected to come to Europe before February or March of the new year.

British Prime Minister Harold Wilson plans to fly to Washington early in December or in January for wide-awing policy talks with the President in which NATO and the future of East-West relations are to take top rank.

With the Western alliance in disarray, pressure for speedy peace moves was building up in the major European capitals.

Veiled threats from President Charles de Gaulle's government in Paris to quit or block both NATO and the European Community have heightened the urgency.

Poll Watcher Rebutts 'Slow Down' Charge

William O. Garavely, a Sanford insurance executive and a poll watcher at Precinct 1 for defeated Republican candidate for tax assessor Guy Allen, said today that Peter Bukur, chief election clerk, "was not slowed down by poll watchers."

Garavely declared, "Bukur slowed himself down."

"On several occasions," Garavely contended, "Bukur questioned our inspection of voting machines from a distance. But Section 101-131 of Florida's election laws provides that a poll watcher may be by the table or near an election booth as long as he does not interfere with the normal flow of electors."

"I was at least 15 to 18 feet away from the machines," said Garavely, "when I attempted to look at the machines to see if they were marked in any way."

Garavely said it was true that "We did challenge some people who could not read nor write and had no identification whatsoever, including a voter registration card."

"Under the laws Bukur should have administered an oath. But he did not do so. At Precinct 3," continued Garavely, "where I spent part of the day, the election clerks administered oaths in accordance with the law."

Referring to the fact that Bukur called for sheriff's deputies when some poll watchers attempted to obtain the number of voters from the machine registers, Garavely declared:

"The deputies were called only after J. E. Best threatened a young lady, one of the watchers, who entered the third booth while Bukur, himself, was voting in the second booth. In no way," said Garavely, "did she interfere with Mr. Bukur."

Garavely also contended that a poll watcher can inspect a voting booth anytime during the election hours provided he does not interfere with voting procedure.

Republicans Disagree On 'What Hit Them'

WASHINGTON (UPI) —

Republican moderates and conservatives disagreed sharply today on what hit them Tuesday — and also on how to go about getting off the floor.

Moderates blamed the GOP's spectacular election defeat on what New York state Chairman Fred Young called "an ill-advised, badly-led swing to the extreme right."

They said the party must give up Goldwaterism and get back into the mainstream of American thought.

Conservatives insisted that President Johnson's landslide victory over Sen. Barry M. Goldwater was not a repudiation of their political philosophy, but only a temporary setback in a long-range cause.

They said the GOP must remain true to Goldwater's principles, and try again to convert the American people to conservatism.

Goldwater, himself, struck

this note in a news conference at Phoenix, Ariz. He said the election proved only that "this conservative effort turns out to be much longer than we thought."

"We can't drop it now not do we have any intention of dropping it," he declared. "I don't feel the conservative cause has been hurt—25 million votes are a lot of votes. A lot of votes are devoted to the cause of conservatism."

The Arizona senator in referring to his future said: "Being unemployed as of Jan. 31 will have a lot of time to devote to the party. Now is the time to work to strengthen the Republican party. We not only have to work with the party, but as I said in my telegram to the President, we all must join together."

TALLAHASSEE — (NEA) — It is at least possible that the two best college football teams in America are separated only by 140 miles of bad road.

These would be Florida State University at Tallahassee, and the University of Florida, 140 miles away at Gainesville.

In addition to quite interesting football teams, the two schools have about two things in common: (1) a lions' share of scholarship money that comes from special days at Florida's horse tracks, dog tracks and jai-alai frontons, (2) an intense dislike for one another.

Florida State delivered the shocker of the young season, a 48-6 whumping of Kentucky, conqueror of Mississippi and Auburn. On the same afternoon Florida measured Mississippi for a shroud, 30-14.

Ray Graves, the Florida coach, and Bill Peterson, the Florida State coach, arrived at this pinnacle by kindred methods. Both took a look at new rules and decided to go with platoon football all the way.

Graves says his Florida team is one "without stars," a statement open to statewide refutation.

Florida has one of the more interesting sophomore quarterbacks in the country in versatile Steve Spurrier. He complements a senior Tom Shannon, a daredevil who calls himself "The Green Wop." His father was Irish, his mother Italian.

The Gators have a core of smooth running backs, led by Larry Dupree who, Graves insists, is "the best runner I've ever seen in college football."

Florida State may have two All-Americans in its backfield. One is Steve Tensi, who stands 6-5. The other is 6-1 Fred Biltzkoiff, a flanker back. They form possibly the best passing combination in the land.

Biltzkoiff, an incredible receiver, is the key to an offense that took Kentucky apart. Most teams elect to double-team or triple-team the gifted Biltzkoiff. When they do they are as defensively vulnerable elsewhere.

"No one man in the country can cover Freddie," says Tensi, "and when I am given plenty of time to throw I don't think three men can handle him, because he has time to work loose."

This offensive tandem is coupled with superb defensive play. Through three games and 89 1/2 minutes of a fourth FSU was unscored upon.

New Congress To Favor LBJ

Johnson Swaps Tales And Looks Toward Future

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (UPI)—President Johnson swapped campaign tales and looked into the administration's future today with his battle-mate, Vice President-elect Hubert H. Humphrey.

"They're talking about everything under the sun," one close source said in describing the Minnesota Senator's visit with Johnson at the LBJ Ranch near here.

Johnson and his wife Muriel, planned to fly to Washington today to spend a few days before heading for the Virgin Islands for a vacation. They arrived at the Johnson ranch Wednesday for a victory barbecue and a triumphant get-together.

Before the ranch party, Johnson sent a telegram to Sen. Barry M. Goldwater calling for "any leadership and effort" the defeated Republican presidential candidate could make toward building America and assuring an honorable peace.

The telegram was in reply to a message in which Goldwater conceded the election and offered to "help in any way I can toward achieving a better America and a secure and dignified peace."

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson emerged from the election struggle today in a better position to command action on his legislative program than any chief executive since the high water mark of the New Deal.

From its disaster the Republican party emerged bitterly divided between its pro-and anti-Goldwater wings. But it also was in a position for the normal forces of politics to compel lurching moves toward unity after some skirmishes in the early months ahead.

Returns from 98 per cent of the precincts in the nation gave Johnson 41,727,846 votes and Goldwater, 26,197,960.

Johnson won election by capturing 44 states and the District of Columbia with 486 electoral votes. Goldwater won six states with 52 electoral votes — Alabama, Arizona, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina.

Nearly complete congressional returns showed the Democrats won 294 seats and the Republicans 140 with Alaska's lone seat still in doubt. The Democrats added at least 37 seats to the majority they won two years ago.

In the Senate, the Democratic margin was 67 to 32 with a Nevada seat still in doubt. This meant a net gain of at least one seat in the chamber where the administration already had a fairly easy time.

It is in the House where the administration has been engaged in a constant struggle to find a majority for its bills. The new Democratic members will be almost unanimous supporters of the administration.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Republicans weathered a torrent of anti-Goldwater votes to wind up today with a net gain of one governorship, but Democrats still held the nation's state houses in a firm grip.

The outcome of gubernatorial battles in 25 states indicated massive split-ticket voting decided many of these contests largely on local issues.

Republicans defied the national returns to oust Democrats in three states—Washington, Wisconsin and Massachusetts. Democrats replaced Republicans in two — Utah and Arizona. The net GOP pickup of one trimmed the Democratic edge from 31-16 to 33-17 in the 50 states.

Two Precedents Are Shattered

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Two precedents as old as the republic were shattered in Tuesday's presidential election.

Georgia went Republican for the first time in history. Vermont went Democratic for the first time in history.

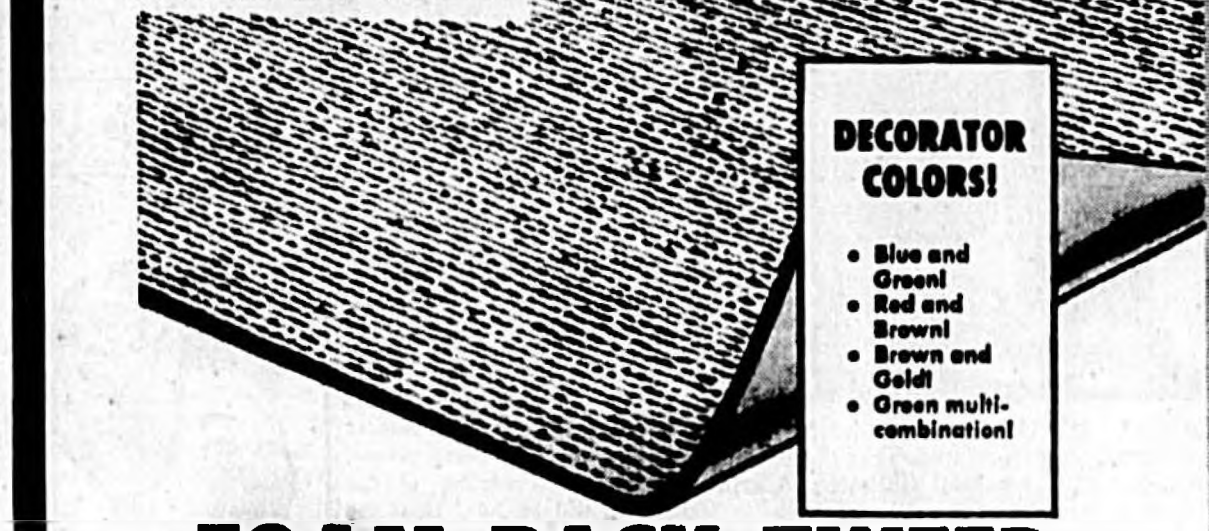
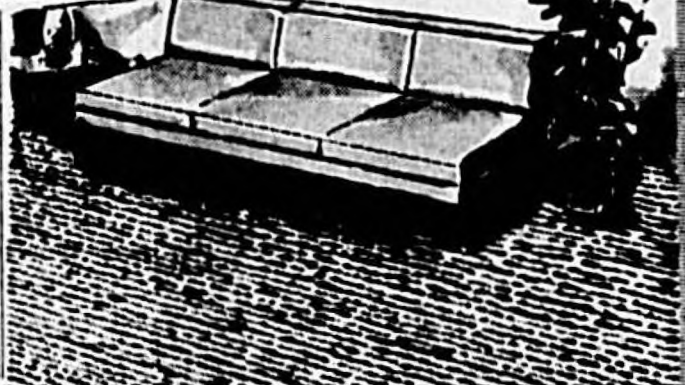

Homemakers Corner

It is now the Fall season. And what goes together with fall? Apples. Good flavor, appetite appeal and economy make apples a favorite fruit not only for old-time familiar pie dishes but for newly created recipes too. Use apples in desserts, curries, and other main dishes, with morning sausages, in turnovers, and for apple appetizers. And be sure to keep raw apples in the fruit bowl, as a between-meal snack, and use in delicious salads. Here are two recipes made with apples which your family will find real good.

APPLE JOLLY CAKES
13/4 cups buckwheat pancake mix
1 pkg. corn muffin mix
2 tbsp. sugar
1 teas. cinnamon
1 egg, well beaten
3 tbsp. light molasses
1 cup cold water
1 cup diced apple slices

Combine first 4 ingredients. Mix well. Combine next 3 ingredients. Stir into first mixture. Stir in diced apple. Drop by heaping tablespoons on hot, lightly greased griddle or skillet. Flatten with back of spoon. Cook slowly, turning often until well browned on both sides and cooked through. Keep warm while baking remaining cakes. Serve with butter and syrup. Makes 6 or more servings.

HUDSON VALLEY APPLE CAKE
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
2/3 cup sugar, divided
1/4 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teas. salt
1/4 teas. vanilla
1/4 cup butter or margarine
4 cups thinly sliced apples
3/4 cup canned toasted slivered almonds
1/2 cup seedless raisins
1 teas. cinnamon
1 lemon, juice and grated peel
2 egg yolks
1 cup dairy sour cream

Mix and sift flour, 2 tbsp. of the sugar, the baking powder and salt. Stir in vanilla. Cut in butter or margarine until mixture resembles coarse meal. Spread on bottom of greased 9-inch pie pan. Combine apples, almonds, raisins, 1/4 cup of the sugar, the

cinnamon, lemon juice and peel, mix well; heap in pie pan. Bake in a hot oven, 425 degrees for 10 minutes. Combine egg yolks, remaining sugar and sour cream. Pour over apple mixture, lower heat to moderate 350 degrees and bake 35 minutes.

The pantry shelf can be a blessing to the homemakers who have the task of turning out family meals day after day on a slim budget, and often at a moment's notice. Few homemakers realize the pantry's potential as a time-saver, a budget stretcher and a source of meals for any occasion. To be sure you always have the foods you need to prepare a particular meal, try this method. Collect menus for various kinds of meals; one to serve to unexpected guests; one for a week when the budget is low; or the family's favorite. Tape or tack these to the inside of the pantry door. Along with each menu, list the foods required for that meal. Before each weekly shopping trip, check the essential items and restock before any of them reaches a dangerous low.

STIR-N-DROP SUGAR COOKIES
2 eggs
2/3 cup Wesson oil
1 teas. vanilla
1 teas. grated lemon rind
3/4 cup sugar
2 cups sifted flour
2 teas. baking powder
1/2 teas. salt

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Beat eggs with fork until well blended. Stir in oil, vanilla, lemon rind. Blend in sugar until mixture thickens. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, add to egg mixture. (Though will be soft) Drop by teaspoonful about 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Stamp each cookie flat with bottom of glass dipped in sugar. (Lightly oil glass, then dip in sugar, continue dipping in sugar) Bake 8 to 10 minutes. Remove immediately from cookie sheet. Makes 3 dozen cookies, 3 inches in diameter.

PEACH MELBA
1 1/2 lb., 13 oz. can yellow cling peaches
4 to 8 marshmallows
1/4 cup raspberry or other flavor jelly

Pre-heat oven to 425 degrees. Drain peaches and arrange, round side down, in a shallow baking dish. Spoon jelly into center of each. Top each with a marshmallow. Place in the oven for 5 to 6 minutes, or until the marshmallows are lightly browned and beginning to lose their shape. Serve warm. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

COCONUT KRISPIES
3/4 cup coconut
1/3 cup brown sugar, packed
1/8 teas. salt
1/4 cup melted butter or margarine
21 crackers

Combine coconut, brown sugar, salt and melted butter or margarine. Blend well. Arrange crackers on baking sheet and spread them with the coconut mixture. Toast in broiler, 5 inches from heat for 2 or 3 minutes, or until lightly browned. Serve while still warm. Makes 24.

3/4 teas. soda
3/4 teas. salt
1/3 cup Wesson oil
1 cup buttermilk (or sweet milk, if desired)
2 sq. unsweetened chocolate, melted

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease generously and dust with flour 2 round layer pans. Beat eggs whites until frothy. Gradually beat in 1/4 cup of the sugar. Continue beating until very stiff and glossy. Stir remaining sugar, flour, soda and salt into another bowl. Add Wesson oil and half of buttermilk. Beat 1 minute, scrape sides and bottom of bowl constantly. Add remaining buttermilk, egg yolks and chocolate. Beat 1 more minute, scraping bowl constantly. Fold in meringue. Pour into prepared pans. Bake layers 30 to 35 minutes. Frost with favorite frosting. Sprinkle top and sides with coconut.

RAISIN-MOLASSES TOPPED HAM
3 to 5 lb. canned ham
1 cup brown sugar
1/4 teas. cinnamon
2 tbsp. water
2 tbsp. light mild-flavored molasses
1/2 cup golden seedless raisins
1/4 cup chopped walnuts

Place ham in baking pan and heat as directed on can. Combine brown sugar and molasses. Blend in raisins and walnuts. Ten minutes before ham is fully heated, spoon topping over ham. Bake in slow oven 325 degrees for 10 minutes.

TURKEY STUFFIES
3 to 4 lb. frozen boneless young turkey roast
1/2 cup finely chopped celery
1/4 cup finely chopped onion
1 stick butter or margarine, melted
12 to 18 slices bread
1/4 cup milk
1 egg, slightly beaten
1/2 teas. rubbed sage, optional
1 teas. salt
1/2 teas. pepper
1 1/2 oz. can condensed cream of chicken soup

Roast turkey as directed on wrapper. Turkey may be cooked the day before and refrigerated. Slice roast into 1 inch slices (about 5 to 6 slices). Place each slice of turkey on an 8 inch square of foil on a cookie sheet. Saute celery and onion in melted butter until celery is tender and onion is transparent. Tear or cut bread into cubes, approximately 6 cups, and place in a bowl. Add celery, onions and milk. Toss together with egg and seasonings to mix. Spoon 3 generous tablespoons soup over each turkey slice. Close foil tightly. Place cook sheet in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, for 30 minutes to heat turkey and stuffing.

Here is a relish made using low calorie Sucaryl

CRANBERRY-APPLE RELISH
2 cups cranberries
1/4 cup raisins
1/4 cup diced apple
1/4 cup chopped walnut
2 tbsp. Sucaryl
1/4 teas. lemon juice

Put cranberries and raisins through coarse blade of food-chopper. Add remaining ingredients, mixing well. Chill in refrigerator, several hours. Especially good with turkey, ham and chicken. Makes 13 1/2 cups.

CHOCOLATE CHIFFON CAKE
2 eggs, separated
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 3/4 cups sifted cake flour

Statistics Show Women Are More Subject To Illness

Do men resist illnesses better than women? The statistics say they do.

Although the life expectancy of females is nearly seven years more than for males, women suffer a greater number of acute conditions throughout their lifetimes, resulting in more days of restricted activity and bed confinement, according to the Health Insurance Institute.

Only in the injury category are the men more susceptible than the women, presumably because men lead more physically active lives.

The Institute based its findings on analysis of data from the U. S. Public Health Service's National Health Survey. In a one year period, Americans suffered more than 400 million acute conditions, an average of 2.2 for every man, woman and child.

Acute conditions were defined as those which last less than three months and which

involve either medical attention or restricted activity. Allergies, heart trouble, tuberculosis and other such conditions considered chronic were not included in the classification.

The study found that acute conditions caused 9.8 days of restricted activity, including 4.4 days in bed, for women, and 7.7 days of restricted activity, including 3.2 days in bed, for men.

For every 100 women there were 26 cases of infective and parasitic diseases, 138 respiratory conditions, 12 digestive system conditions, 23 injuries and 34 "other" acute conditions, a total of 233.

For every 100 men there were 23 cases of infective and parasitic diseases, 116 respiratory conditions, 10 digestive system conditions, 33 injuries and 22 "other" acute conditions, a total of 204.

During the study year, July 1962-June 1963, the common cold proved to be the most frequent acute condition, although influenza accounted for more restricted activity and bed disability days.

On the average, males suffered 42 per cent more injuries - including fractures, dislocations, sprains, cuts and bruises - than women. But women contracted 18 per cent more colds, 20 per cent more influenza and twice as many headaches.

Children have a greater rate of acute conditions than adults, particularly respiratory conditions.

In general, children under 17 average more days of restricted activity and bed disability for illness than adults, but for injuries the reverse is true. Although they receive substantially fewer injuries than children, adults are more severely affected and the days of restricted activity and bed disability resulting from injury increase sharply with age.

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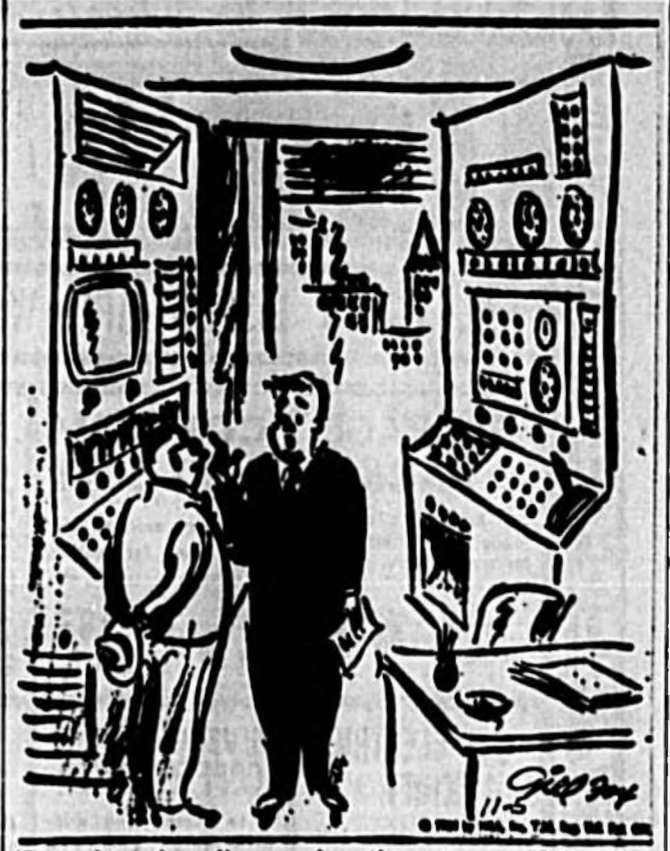
