Ways Of Life

A good lesson in the difference between a democracy and a totalitarian system has been given to the world by the reaction of India to Communist China's explosive entry into the nuclear club.

Although India has both the capability and the resources-perhaps more even than China-to build its own nuclear bomb, it has no intention of doing so.

It is still the Indian government's policy, Prime Minister Shastri said in a recent speech, to devote maximum effort to building the country's economic strength. This, he believes, is not only the best course for India but the most effective answer to Chinese expansionist designs on southern Asia.

This is not a popular decision. The Indians, still smarting from the Chinese invasion of the Himalayas two years ago and still forced to stand by while the Communists continue to occupy thousands of square miles of Indian territory, would like very much for their country to have its own atomic arsenal. It is as much a matter of national pride as of security.

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The long-term success of the offic-

ial Indian policy depends a great deal on the West. The United States, which not only has ground forces in South Viet Nam but the powerful Seventh Fleet roaming the waters of the South Pacific and Indian Ocean, has welcomed Shastri's statesmanlike action.

Western support-moral as well as military-is essential. If India can succeed as a free nation, if over the next generation it can raise the standard of living of its people while continuing to build political stability, that achievement will rank higher in the eyes of the other "nonaligned" nations of Asia and elsewhere than the explosion of a string of nuclear devices.

India is the great crucible of democracy in Asia-perhaps in the world. Its tremendous problems-huge population, language differences, primitive communications, educational deficiencies, agricultural and industrial challenges-are no different in kind and little different in degree from those confronting China.

The contrast between the ways the two countries are attacking their problems should not be lost on the rest of the world.
