NEW YORK (UPI)—Benny (Kid) Paret showed "very slight improvement" in his battle for life today while his embittered manager branded the New York State Athletic Commission's report absolving Referee Ruby Goldstein of blame for the boxer's condition as a whitewash.

The 25-year-old Paret remained in critical condition at Roosevelt Hospital but an official announcement said he showed "very slight improvement" and Manager Manuel Alfaro reported that Paret had opened his eyes and moved his hands in response to commands.

At the same time Alfaro reacted violently to the New York State Commission report which absolved Goldstein for his role in Saturday night's savage 12-round welterweight title bout in which Emile Griffith of St. Thomas, V. I., pummeled Paret to the point of death.

## 1,182 Pigs Bay Invaders Go On Trial

MIAMI (UPI) — Havana radio reported today that the war crimes trial of 1,182 Pigs Bay Invaders started in the Cuban capital at 9 a. m. EST. It is the biggest mass trial in Cuba's turbulent history. The death penalty likely will be asked for many of the defendants.

The prisoners are the remnants of the Cuban refugee force which stormed ashore at Pig's Bay April 17 in an attempt to overthrow the government of Premier Fidel Castro. After 72 hours of bloody fighting, they ran out of ammunition and water and then surrendered piecemeal for weeks later.

Preparations for the trial have been accelerated since the government announced the opening date March 20. The site was not announced although it probably is being held in Havana's Principe Prison where the men have been held.

Relatives were unable to obtain a postponement of the trial despite persistent pleas, and they were denied permission to provide defense lawyers. The government refused to give out information on the exact charges, or whether the prisoners would be tried individually or en masse.

Aside from a government radio broadcast Wednesday that the trial would begin today, the only official comment on the March 20 announcement was an item from the Prensa Latina News Agency that time had run out for an exchange of the prisoners for tractors.

This was a reference to Castro's offer last year to release the prisoners in return for 500 tractors.

## Kennedy Blasts GOP Opposition To Tax Revision

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy lashed out today at what he called Republican attempts in Congress to block his tax revision program.

Kennedy, in a statement at the White House, strongly defended the measure which has been approved by the House Ways and Means Committee and which he said opponents are trying to defeat.

The chief executive said he had "great difficulty in understanding the position of any political party which tries to kill proposals such as are contained in the pending bill."

The President also said he was hopeful the Steel Worker's Union Executive Board and Wage Policy Committee would stamp final approval on a new steel labor contract within the next few days.

Said the Soviet Union in Geneva "flatly rejected" any form of international inspection over a test ban treaty.

## Webb Rejects State Proposals

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Federal Space Agency Administrator James E. Webb rejected Florida proposals Wednesday to switch the assembly plant for the Saturn II booster rocket from Seal Beach, Calif., to Eglin Air Force Base in Florida.

Florida officials had sought the switch on grounds that assembling the huge booster in Florida would cut down transportation costs to Cape Canaveral. The contract for the booster was awarded to North American Aviation Corp.

## No Comment On Supreme Court Ruling

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant today urged opponents to Florida's proposed new legislative reapportionment formula to "go slow" in asking voters to turn down the amendment at the polls in November.

Bryant said if the 45-senator, 104-representative plan is rejected, the small county bloc in the Legislature will be given the tool to defeat reapportionment.

They will have the tools, he said, "to relegate us to the existing unsatisfactory conditions."

Attorneys from Miami Wednesday filed suit in federal court to force legislative reapportionment giving more representation to urban areas.

The suits were a follow-up to this week's U. S. Supreme Court ruling that federal courts may hear suits brought by big city voters complaining of unequal representation in the Legislature.

Bryant told his weekly news conference, in his first comment on the ruling, it was a false hope that the Legislature might pass a better reapportionment formula if the proposed one is turned down. He said the Legislature would simply come back and reapportion under the existing 35-senator, 95-representative formula which he said was unsatisfactory.

The governor said he had not yet gotten a wire from State Sen. Scott Kelly, Lakeland, asking for an attorney general's ruling on whether the Legislature could reconsider the 1961 reapportionment if called into special session.

But Bryant said at the moment he has no plans to call a special session. He indicated he might consider such action if the voters turned down the amendment, but said "I'll have to meet that when it comes."

He refused to comment directly on the Supreme Court ruling. He said he had not read the opinion of the court, which was based on a Tennessee case where the Legislature has not been reapportioned since 1901.

Bryant said the situation in Florida and Tennessee was far different. Florida reapportioned in 1945 and has been "vigorous about the business of reapportionment" since 1955.

He said not only has the Legislature been attempting to reapportion under the old formula, it has worked out the new formula to give additional senators and House members to the fast-growing counties.

Two suits have been filed so far in Florida under the precedent of the decision, and more are promised.

Miami attorney Peter Sobel filed one suit in Miami Wednesday asking the U. S. District Court to throw the 1961 Legislature's proposed reapportionment plan off the November ballot. This is the constitutional amendment which would raise Senate membership from 35 to 45 and House membership from 95 to 101.

The suit also seeks to force "a truly fair and representative reapportionment in this state."

## Kennedy Asks Special Science Reorganization

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy today asked Congress to approve plans for overhauling the government's scientific policy-making machinery.

The President submitted to Congress a reorganization plan under which he would create an Office of Science and Technology. It would be an independent office below cabinet status. The plan would be headed by a director, at \$22,500 a year, and a deputy director at \$20,500 a year. The director would be assigned the certain functions now vested in the National Science Foundation.

Principal purpose of the new office will be to coordinate the vast and sometimes scattered planning of national scientific policy. A Kennedy message to Congress said the President would have under the reorganization plan, "permanent staff resources capable of advising and assisting him on matters of national policy affected by or pertaining to science and technology."

The National Science Foundation, some of whose duties were transferred to the new director, will continue to originate plans for supporting basic research and science education. The new office was given some of the foundation duties because, as the President pointed out to Congress, the foundation heretofore operated on the same level as other agencies and thus could not satisfactorily coordinate federal science policies or evaluate other agency programs.

The chart shows that one ton of freight can be moved 250 miles by barge, 62.6 miles by rail, 15.4 miles by truck and 4.8 miles by plane.

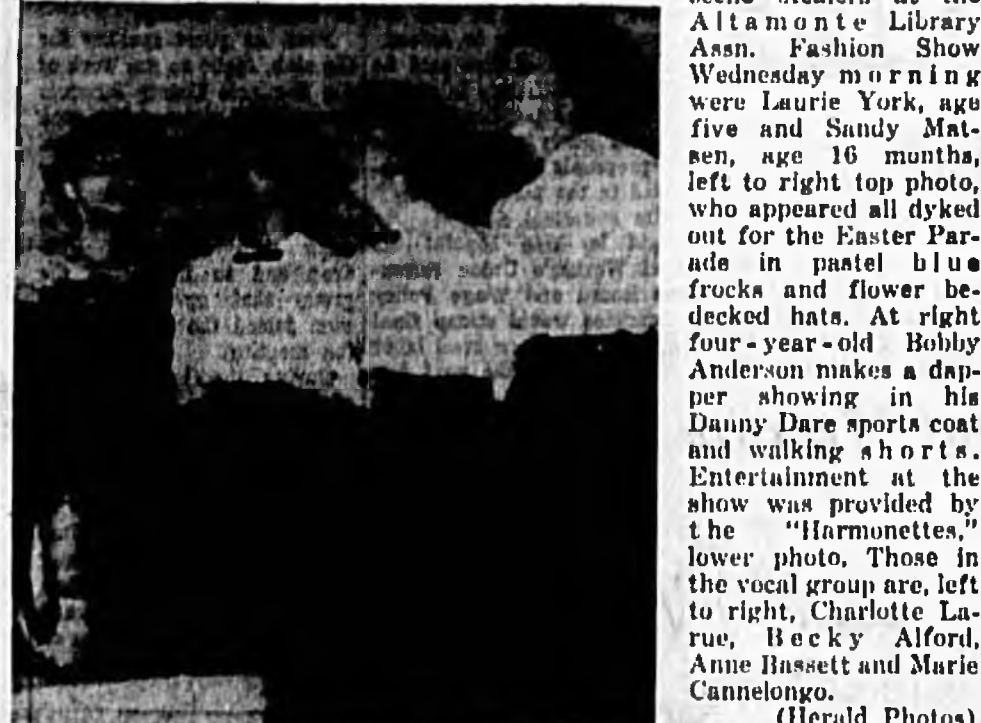
Water cargoes are important to Florida, Krider said, pointing out that the St. John's River carries more tonnage from Jacksonville to Sanford than does the interoceanic waterway from Jacksonville to Miami.

In the line of conservation, proponents of the canal advocate water control, not drainage, Krider emphasized. Figures show that although Seminole County got 70 inches of rainfall in 1950, last year and this year combined have not yet reached 80 inches.

"Florida has more natural resources and has done less to develop them than any other place," Krider said. He pointed out that there are 1,277 miles of coast line, 40 navigable rivers and in excess of 30,000 lakes in the state. "The way that you can help," Krider told Kiwanians, "is to endorse this program, and write your legislators."

## Coach Urges Fitness Program

Physical education for elementary grades, with the services of a regular physical education supervisor was urged by Coach Jim Pigott of Seminole High School, speaking to the Southside P-TO Tuesday.

The head football coach and physical education teacher at Seminole High School centered his remarks around the current Physical Fitness Program of President Kennedy. This program was praised by the speaker, who stated that for the first time a standardized physical education test is available on a national level. He further elaborated that he has instituted the program in the local high school and that his students rate high.

Pigott told of events that brought about the national program and gave special mention to the Korean Crisis when one out of every two men was rejected and also the Berlin crisis when 700 were recruited in order to secure 300 men.

"With the present swing toward academic emphasis the national leaders fear that the physical aspects will be greatly neglected," stated Pigott. He remarked that many high school students prefer to carry six academic subjects rather than take physical education. With regard to the elementary teaching of physical education, Pigott stated that grade four is the earliest that such a program can be carried out. He also voiced optimism that an elementary program is in the future for Seminole County.

**NEW YORK**—Highest sales and earnings in the history of J. C. Penney Company, the country's largest department store chain, were reported today (March 21) for the 12 months of the company's fiscal year ended Jan. 31, 1962.

Earnings reflected a year in which total sales exceeded \$1.5 billion for the first time. Total sales amounted to \$1,553,665,650, an increase of 5.8 per cent over last year's \$1,468,917,382.

Net earnings totaled \$31,739,552 against \$41,994,095 for fiscal 1960, an increase of 15 per cent or \$6,744,457. This was \$2.10 a share on 24,095,854 shares of common stock outstanding against net earnings of \$1.82 a share for fiscal 1960.

The record per share earnings figure of \$2.10 exceeds the previous high of \$2.09 for fiscal 1959 when net earnings were \$51,523,731.

Today, every doctor will wear a red carnation, the official flower of the day, and their wives will honor them in special ways.

Dolly's parents failed to "condition" her properly to new foods. Except for sugar, the new baby has no natural fondness for any menu item. It will make a face and spit out the best fried chicken or steak, etc., until it has been educated to transfer food memories to the new food.

CASE L-476: Dolly G., aged 18 months, is a problem eater.

"Dr. Crane," her mother began, "Dolly turns up her nose at vegetables."

"She makes a face and spits them out, despite all I try to do to get her to like them."

"How can a parent get her child to like new foods? Or is our dislike for various foods a matter of inheritance?"

**Mothers, Note Bene**  
Except for sugar and possibly a mild salt solution, babies show no fondness for ANY other foodstuff.

"Then how do we get our liking for beefsteak or fried chicken?" you may inquire.

It is all a matter of what we psychologists call "conditioning."

First, we get the baby into a happy, smiling mood. Then we slip him a bite of the new food and praise him until it becomes a gleeful occasion.

Soon, his generalized happy mood begins to attach to the new food.

Ultimately, the new food itself will serve as the "trigger" that then sets off his delight. So he likes it.

For example, children seldom care for fried chicken or T-bone steak, oysters or other delicacies that make our adult mouths water.

Take a boy of 10 or 12 into a fancy restaurant and let him look at the ritz menus. What will he most likely exclaim?

"What, don't they have any hamburgers (or hot dogs)?"

How do you suppose a child gets his fondness for hot dogs or hamburgers, since they, too, are not inborn taste delights?

**Food vs. Memory**  
A baby or toddler has no natural fondness for hot dogs or hamburgers.

But because those meat items are ultimately linked with pleasure, where cooped up city kids are turned loose to run and frolic, the hot dogs soon become symbols.

They become the "triggers" for happy memories. So when your boy of 10 or 12 years bites into a hot dog, he is suddenly suffused with the varied but diffuse memories of holiday excursions, hikes, picnics and freedom from city restraints.

So he thinks the hot dog is delicious.

Actually, it may be the very same type of hot dog that 8 years earlier he rejected.

Then it was only a fine idea and a neutral taste. Now it has become the acme of taste delight.

In fact, the reason a baby smiles and crawls delightedly at the sight of his mother, is also based on this same educational process.

At the outset, the mother means nothing to her own baby. But the infant soon links her face and voice with the sweet milk she gives it every 3 or 4 hours.

Finally, "Mother" and "sweet milk" become synonymous. So when the baby smiles gleefully at sight of her, it is simply because mother is now a glorified lump of animated sugar.

Later, the mere presence of its mother makes the child gleeful even when it isn't hungry at all, for the pleasure of the sweet milk has now transferred to its source, namely, Mother.

The reverse of this process was demonstrated a generation ago by the Russian scientist, Pavlov, who conditioned a dog to an electric buzzer. Every time it was served its food, the buzzer sounded. And after a period of time, the buzzer alone would make a shower of saliva flow into the dog's mouth even when no food was in sight!

## De Gaulle: Dreamer

PARIS (UPI)—If or when peace truly is restored to Algeria, President Charles de Gaulle will be able to give full sway to his dreams of "la grandeur de la France."

These are the dreams which, even as France lay prostrate in the midst of World War II, caused Sir Winston Churchill and the late President Roose-

velt to throw up their hands in despair. They led Churchill to say that of all the crosses he had to bear the "Cross of Lorraine" which De Gaulle had made his symbol was the heaviest.

De Gaulle walked alone in those days of crisis and he walks alone in these days of

crisis, his dream of French grandeur as enduring now as then.

Partly as result of these dreams, peace in Algeria may be expected to see an increase in the strains which already exist between De Gaulle and his allies, particularly the United States.

De Gaulle is determined that French defenses depend only upon herself, and upon no alliances or single ally.

He is equally determined that French leadership in Western Europe reassert itself after 40 years of decline.

De Gaulle is determined that France shall have its own nuclear striking force and he is deeply angered by U. S. opposition.

A high French official made clear in strong language less than a month ago that Franco-U. S. relations would remain unsettled as long as the United States maintained its present position. The French demand equal treatment with the British as a nuclear nation.

While tradition and necessity bind the United States and France as allies, there are other deep differences between the two nations.

De Gaulle is contemptuous of the United Nations, which remains a keystone of U. S. foreign policy.

He has remained aloof from U. S. exploratory talks with the Soviet Union over Berlin, and he has boycotted the disarmament talks in Geneva.

For each of these actions he has similar reasons—that the Russians have shown no desire to settle problems, which they themselves created, and that their only clear objective is to obtain a propaganda forum by which to influence or frighten world opinion.

But perhaps the deepest difference of all springs from his determination to build his own nuclear force, which meets opposition even within France.

These opposition forces and the United States regard such a program as an unnecessary and heavy burden on the French economy. De Gaulle is moving ahead relentlessly to build a 13-division nuclear army which will be the strongest in Europe.

So all the men of Israel gathered against the city, united as one man.—Judges 20:11.

## The High Road

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Among the more eye-catching bills introduced in Congress this week was a proposal by Rep. Ed Edmondson of Oklahoma to create a national, highway academy.

This one had a cinder-like effect on my pretty brown curls because of its timing. It followed a weekend during which I spent most of my time driving about the countryside on assorted missions.

Edmondson's plan is to set up a sort of road-building school in the Commerce Department to which state highway officials might repair for courses of instruction.

I think this is a fine idea and, as a member of the great motoring public, I am prepared to offer some suggestions as to what type of curriculum the school might provide.

First of all, there should be a course on "The Theory and Practice of Watering Cement." This would be a required course and would insure that all road-builders know how to mix concrete that crumbles.

As an elective, students enrolled in the cement course could study the strategic location of potholes, learning how to make them appear in just the right place to break an axle.

They also would be provided with a textbook entitled "Asphalt Paving and How to Make It Bumpy."

Once they had mastered these basic skills, the students would move on to the finer points of highway construction. Here they would learn how to build blind curves in open country and how to find hills on flat terrain.

## Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Total effect of the 15 messages which President Kennedy has sent to Congress so far this year is to line up a program for the closest thing to a welfare state that this country has ever faced. And there are more messages with still more requests and recommendations to come.

Administration spokesmen and philosophers may argue that the private enterprise system and a free economy are not being impaired by this massive New Frontier program.

What the President is proposing is not communism and not even socialism. The government won't own anything, take all the money, pay all the bills, pile up all the debt. Federal government will still take only about a sixth of the gross national product, however big it grows.

But if the major portions of the Kennedy program are approved by Congress, the average American citizen will have the most protection and insurance that his government has ever offered against every risk and danger. This is emphasized by the Consumer Protection message which the President has just sent to Congress.

To promote the full realization of consumer "rights" to buy safe products at competitive prices, correctly labeled and of good quality, the President would provide more food and drug law protection, better enforced.

Also, he would provide for more effective financial protection of savings from fraud.

more effective governmental regulation of services to consumers, lower cost and better quality housing, safer transportation, a "truth in lending" bill, all-channel television sets, more free enterprise competition and further restraint on business monopolies.

Few consumers, few honest manufacturers or merchants can object to all these things on principle.

But when this package of requests is piled on top of all the other citizens' protective measures which the President has asked for, the sweeping nature of the program becomes more apparent. Consider just the highlights:

Lower taxes on income in time of recession.

Incentives to business to increase production.

Public works to create more jobs in recessions.

Extended benefits and retraining for the unemployed.

Aid for education and educational facilities.

Health insurance for the aged under social security.

Extended public housing and rehabilitation.

Mass immunization against disease.

A farm program that would cut production to demand levels by land retirement and strict quota controls but still give producing farmers higher income.

Rural vocational training for nonfarm employment.

More public recreation facilities on unused land.

More alum clearance and urban redevelopment.

Mass transit and a new transportation policy.

Federal incentives for public fallout shelters.

Expanded Food for Peace, Peace Corps and foreign aid programs, particularly loans to underdeveloped countries.

Freer trade, with adjustment payments to U. S. manufacturers and workers hurt by foreign competition.

Higher pay for government employees.

Increased child welfare services including aid to the handicapped and children of migrants and the unemployed.

A Youth Corps and more youth job opportunities.

Legal prevention of discrimination against women.

Reduction of racial discrimination through fair employment practices and enforcement of civil rights laws.

From my standpoint anyway, the most interesting hand of the Walter Schwimmer Championship bridge series is one in which I stole a slam. I chose to open three no-trump rather than two spades since my hand was no-trump pattern. Then a little confusion set in. Mrs. Johnson responded four clubs as a Stayman major suit request. I thought she was asking for aces with a Gerber bid so responded four no-trump to show three. Then she closed the bidding at six no-trump. West opened the Jack of hearts and there I was with 11 of the coldest tricks in history and a simple club finesse for the twelfth. I would have had the same problem at six spades so I went about my business of

dummy's ace, led a heart back to my ace and ran off spades. East discarded the deuce of clubs somewhere along the way and otherwise all I looked at were diamond discards so that by the time I was through with spades there was only one diamond left. I cashed my king of diamonds and ace of clubs and still was missing the queen, jack and ten of hearts. I finally decided that for some reason or other East had frozen on to the queen and threw him in with it to force a club lead to dummy's king-jack. East could have thrown the queen of hearts some seven times, but if you think it is easy to make the right play before those cameras, try it sometime.

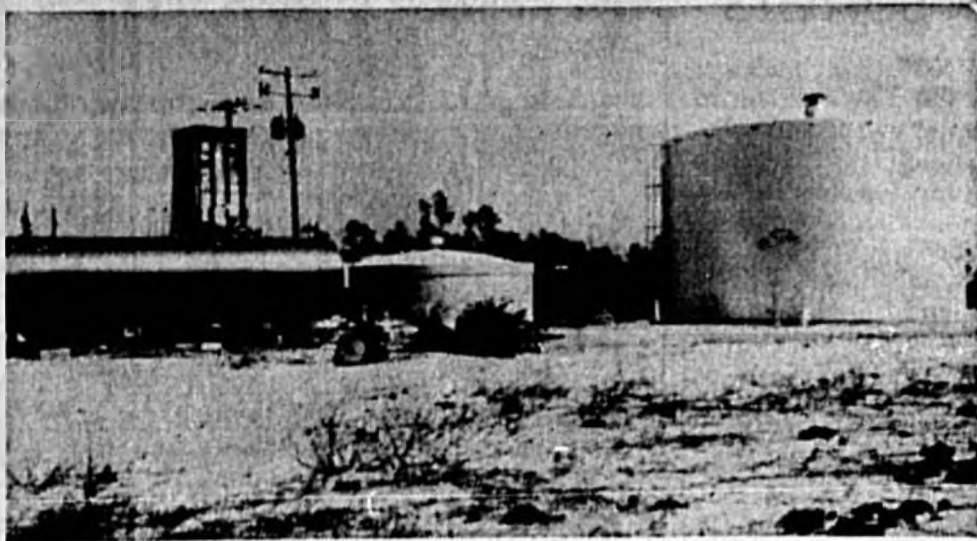

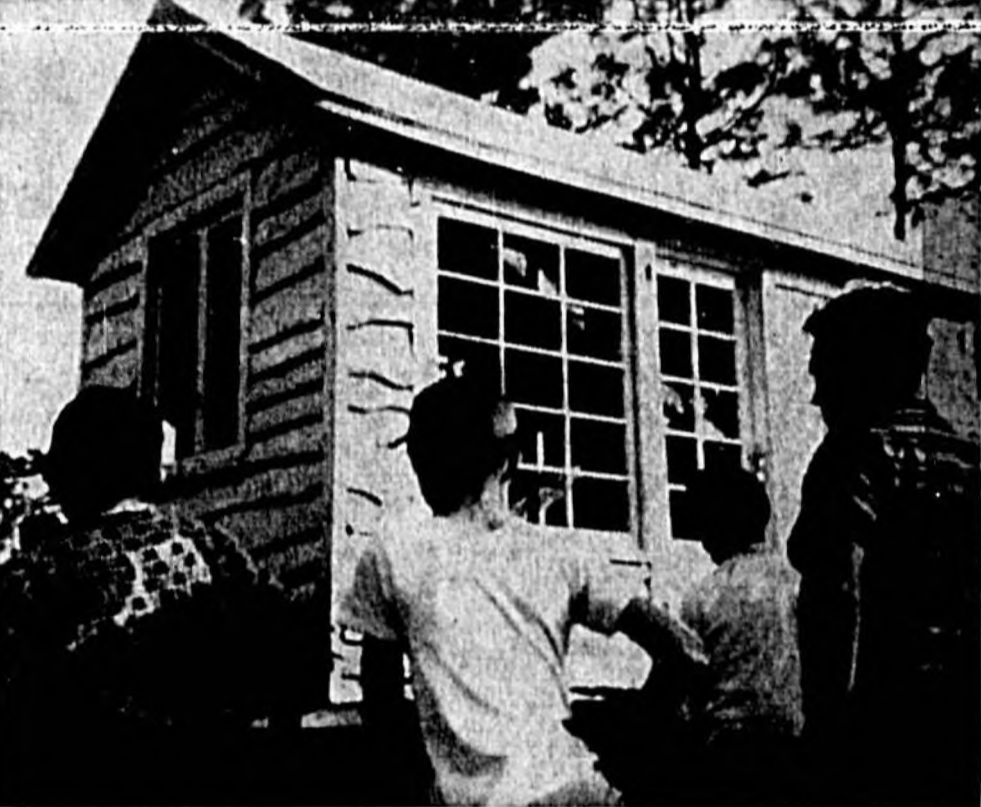

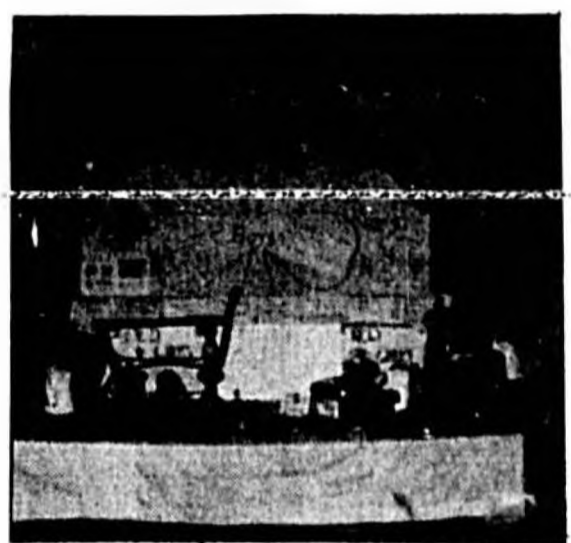
#### Who And What

### Schools Face U.S. Funds Loss

#### Affects Areas With Military Installations

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Kennedy administration in the fall of 1963 it will cut off some federal funds now paid to racially-segregated school districts serving the children of servicemen and federal workers.

The announcement was made by Abraham Ribicoff, secretary of health, education and welfare, in an uncheduled appearance before a special House education subcommittee.

The congressmen are studying the use of federal aid in school districts which enforce racial segregation.

The new policy would effect only part of the government's \$285 million aid problem to about 4,000 school districts which qualify for construction and operating assistance under the 12-year-old "impacted areas" school laws.

Ribicoff said an estimated \$10 million of such aid goes to schools in Southern states. Other officials said they did not know yet how much of this assistance would be cut off.

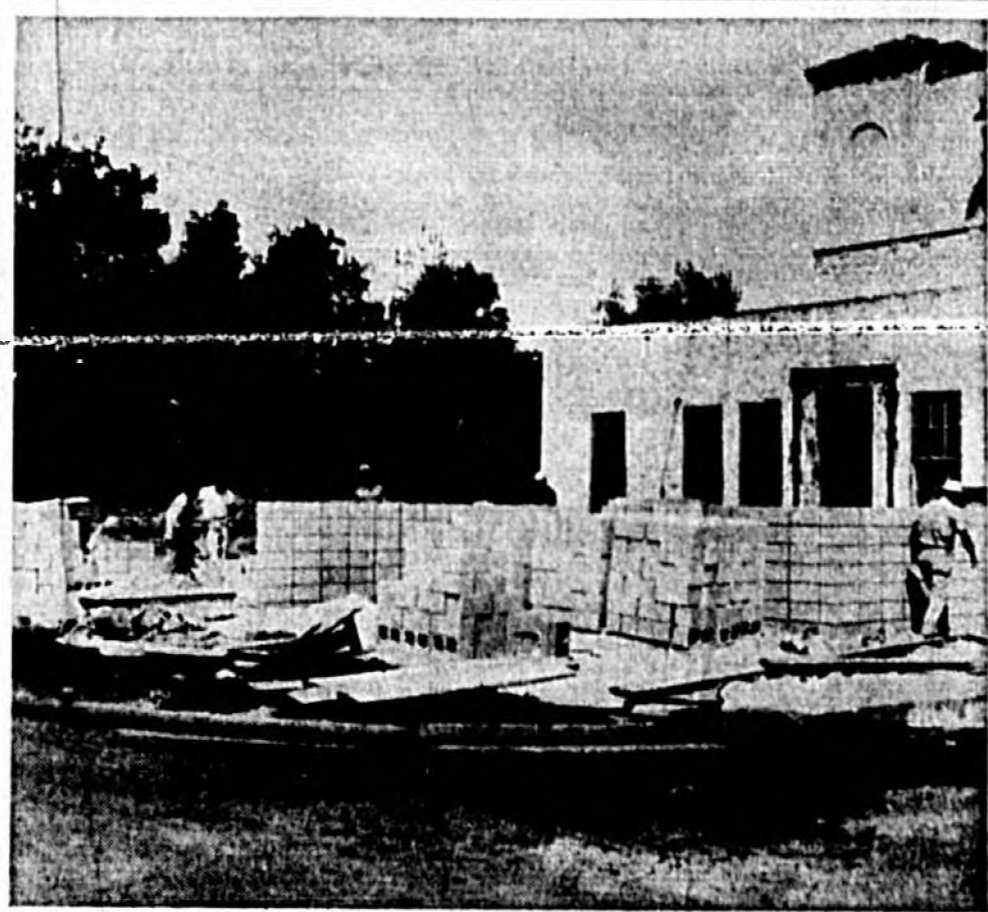
Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N. Y., charged Thursday that Ribicoff was "ignoring, not enforcing, the law" by permitting federal aid to segregated schools.

Ribicoff said today that about 200 federal installations are served by public school districts which segregate their grade and high schools. However, all of these may not be affected by the ruling.

The decision will affect federal aid paid on behalf of children whose parents both live and work on federal property. It will not halt assistance paid on behalf of children whose parents work on federal property but reside away from government installations.

Ribicoff said the ruling would not go into effect until the beginning of the 1963-64 school year because of problems presented by the possibility that substitute schools may have to be provided for children whose parents work and live on federal installations.

He also noted that Congress will have a chance to amend the "impacted areas" laws before they expire next year. He said the delay might give affected school districts time to consider changes in their segregation policies.

#### Cuba Reports All 'Confess'

HAVANA (UPI)—The 1,182 captured veterans of last year's abortive Cuban invasion pleaded guilty at the start of their trial Thursday, it was reported today.

All Havana morning newspapers said "the mercenaries admitted their crime."

The Havana radio said in a broadcast heard in Miami that the prisoners were accused of having carried out a "treacherous attack" against the Cuban people at the "direct instigation of the imperialistic government of the United States."

In another broadcast heard this morning, Havana said the first session of the trial was taken up mostly with a recitation of the charges against the prisoners.

It said he captured men "confessed their crime and announced they wished to make no further statements."

#### Longwood Water Needs Discussed

The Longwood City Council met in a continued session Thursday night for detailed study of material needed to increase efficiency and enlarge the municipal water system.

Mrs. Onnie Hockett, clerk, was authorized to notify dealers by letter that bids will be accepted on 2,550 feet of six-inch cast iron water pipe until noon on April 12.

In other business the council authorized Mrs. Hockett to write a check to Holler Motor Co. of Sanford in the amount of \$2,784.70 in payment of the new police car.

The next regular meeting of the council will be held at 8 p. m. next Thursday in the City Hall.

#### 4 Frondizi Generals Placed Under Arrest

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — Four generals who held high posts under President Arturo Frondizi were under arrest early today, apparently because they opposed the coup that ousted Frondizi in favor of Jose M. Guido.

A war ministry announcement identified the prisoners as former War Secretary Rosendo Fraga; his undersecretary, Carlos Perilla; former First Division commander Edgar Landis and Maj. Gen. Juan C. Gordini.

Unofficial sources said eight other generals also had been arrested, but the report could not be confirmed immediately.

No reason was given for the arrests, but observers assumed that the generals had differed in some degrees with the architects of Thursday's military coup.

#### Citrus Growers To Meet Monday

Citrus growers of Seminole, Orange and Osceola counties will hold an area meeting Monday at 6:30 p. m. at the Tupperware plant on South Orange Blossom Trail, John Sikes of Mutual announced today.

Growers will hear a discussion of market trends and future prospects by Frank Trout, Mutual's executive assistant. Dale Carleton, Mutual's director of grower relations, will be in charge of the meeting which will start off with a charcoal steak dinner.

The meeting will kick off a membership drive of two weeks' duration. Mutual, with a membership now of 11,506, has as its goal a total membership of 12,000 by June 1. Sikes said.

#### Inn Robbed Of \$40 Cash, Wine

Police reported today that the Du-Buck Inn on W. 13th St. was broken into Thursday night and three cases of wine and \$40 in cash taken.

Entry was gained through a screen window, police said.

Police also reported that they are investigating a theft of \$141 at the Top Super Market on Sanford Ave. Chief Roy Williams reported that that amount was taken out of the cash register.

#### Terrorists Kill Nine Moslems

ALGIERS, Algeria (UPI) — Terrorists killed nine Moslems and wounded 12 today in new violence that followed a night of bombing in Algiers.

Guns of the outlawed Secret Army Organization (OAS) rained into the Moslem areas of the city and carried out their attacks. One European also was wounded.

Between dusk and dawn, 22 plastic bombs shattered areas in the Moslem sectors of the city, wounding six more persons. Six mortar bombs were exploded in the gardens of the summer palace on the heights of Algiers.

In the European working class quarter of Bab-el-Oued, a center of OAS extremist support, troops cordoned off one section for two hours while they carried out new searches for terrorists.

#### Committee To Inspect Junior College Site

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A three-member study committee of the State Junior College Board is expected to take a look at the site and local financing of a proposed technical junior college at Orlando.

The board Thursday approved the idea of a technical junior college in principal, but delayed specific approval until the committee completed its study. A request for authorization of the school was formally laid before the state board, which, along with the Cabinet, must approve before the school is started.

The junior college would also be expected to serve Osceola County and Seminole. If Seminole should decide to give its financial backing to the project. However, Seminole has indicated it is more interested in a college with a general education program than in a technical college.

Mrs. Florence Fishback, chairman of the Orange County School Board, said the school could eventually be expanded to a general education institution, but right now technical courses were needed for youths seeking jobs with the Martin Company and other industries in the area.

The committee named to study the site and financial arrangements included Carlisle Rogers, Leesburg, chairman; Whit Palmer Jr., Ocala, and Robert Hudson, Titusville.

The 1961 Legislature approved a junior college for Orlando, but Gov. Farris Bryant vetoed money appropriated for the project. Mrs. Fishback said the technical school could be financed at the county level and classes could be held in local high schools.

#### Crash Hurts 21

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) — A loaded grain truck crashed into the side of a Trailways bus here early today, and at least 21 persons were hurt. None was believed in serious condition, but all were taken to hospitals for treatment.

#### Astronauts Agree

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI) — The president of the Houston Home-Builders Association said Thursday the seven U. S. astronauts have agreed to accept free furnished homes in Houston.

#### Crash Kills 5

DWOSSO, Mich. (UPI) — Five persons, two of them children, were killed today and three other children were injured when a car collided with a freight train at an unprotected grade crossing five miles west of here.

#### Liquor Salesman

MANITOWOC, Wis. (UPI) — The two-year career of a teetotaling 17-year-old high school student who distilled moonshine whiskey in his garage and sold it to his classmates ended today with his arrest. He was charged with illegally operating a liquor still.

#### GI Probe Asked

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., D-N. C., said today he has asked the staff of the Senate constitutional rights subcommittee to look into the conviction of Pfc. Bernis Owen, 23, Seadrift, Texas, who ridiculed a general's order against "no want out" demonstrations.

#### Steel Talks

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Chief union and industry bargainers planned continuing meetings today while awaiting arrival of major policy makers for the United Steelworkers Union to rule on a "non-inflationary" steel contract for 430,000 basic steel workers.

#### Grapefruit Record

LAKELAND (UPI) — Florida grapefruit exports so far this season have set a record and a seasonal record is almost a certainty, Florida Citrus Mutual said Thursday.

Mutual executive vice president Robert W. Rutledge said exports totalled 331,195 boxes, against 301,826 boxes at the same time last season.

#### Anti-Hoffa Strike

CHICAGO (UPI) — Thousands of Chicago taxi drivers went on strike today in a walkout which pitted the power of Teamsters boss James R. Hoffa against a band of rebels. Spokesmen for the Teamsters Union made no bones of their hopes of breaking the walkout of taxi drivers affiliated with the anti-Hoffa Democratic Union Organizing Committee.

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### Commissioner's Decision Follows Sharp Criticism

County Commissioner Ted Williams will ask the commission Tuesday to rescind its action of appropriating \$8-500 for the city zoo, the Herald learned today.

Williams declared this morning "public criticism" has been directed at him for making the motion at the last meeting of the board.

"There also seems to be a lot of talk of some 'political deal made between me and the city which is a downright lie,'" Williams emphasized.

"My only reason for recommending that these surplus funds be expended was that 'I felt the entire county was benefiting from this facility.'"

"I still feel the county should aid all municipalities in their problems and since I represent Sanford on the county board, I cannot see why they should be left out in the cold."

Williams said he has been besieged by phone calls complaining of his action of last week on the county agreeing to appropriate \$8,500 annually for the upkeep of the zoo.

"A lot of people think this is a political move, which is silly," Williams explained that he has been thinking of some aid to the facility for almost a year.

The commission last Friday agreed to take the money out of Hospital indigent aid fund. "There is plenty of money left in that fund to take care of the needy," Williams emphasized.

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### Post Office Pushed By Sen. Smathers

Sen. George Smathers today said he was putting "pressure" on the post office department "immediately" to start the ball rolling on a new post office for Sanford.

Smathers said he approached officials of the post office department urging prompt action be taken to bring about at the earliest possible moment the construction of the new post office.

He also stated that he was urging the department to place the building at the site which was originally selected as the best choice.

Smathers said in conferring with postal officials he had emphasized his desire to see that the legal difficulties surrounding the contract award for construction of the post office be cleared up as quickly as possible.

He stated, "the postal needs of Sanford are urgent. I hope the post office can get through the red tape and legal technicalities so that work can be started."

"I don't care what decision is reached but I agree with the people of Sanford that this project must get off dead center."

In a recent letter to postmaster Edward Dry, Smathers also stated that the site which was originally chosen by the Post Office Department had the approval of the city fathers of Sanford as well as commercial and business interests of the community.

Smathers asked for Mr. Dry's assurance that the new building would be erected on the Seminole Blvd. site.

### Rights Of Way Refused, Road Project Dies

The Bear Lake Road project is dead and plans can now be filed in the county engineer's office to gather dust.

County Engineer Carlton Bliss reported this morning that he failed to get the cooperation of property owners Thursday night to donate rights of way for the half mile project which would have stretched from SR 436 to Curtis Drive.

Bliss said that only a third of the 30 odd property owners along the route showed up for the meeting. . . . "All wanted the road, but none would donate it," Bliss added.

"The project is dead as far as I'm concerned," the county engineer lamented.

Bliss said he and his staff worked well over two months on plans for the road which would have included rebuilding the entire stretch.

"Maybe the board of county commissioners can come up with another approach to the problem," the county engineer said.

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### Delay Explained At Meeting

A small gleam of light was cast on the long-pending new post office for Sanford when John Krider revealed that Sen. George Smathers has appointed Steve Moran to expedite the matter of the post office with the postmaster general.

Krider said that in a phone call Moran told him, "Tell the people of Sanford that we are working on it."

Also present at the meeting was W. A. Morrison, owner of the property where the new post office is to be built.

Both Krider and Morrison went into detail on the past history of the transaction and some of the causes of the present stalemate.

Krider said that post office officials told him that this was the first time a bidder had defaulted in over 100 commitments for new post offices. Part of the delay, Krider said, was to give the contractor an opportunity to try to recover a part of the bond money (\$13,000) which he forfeited when he failed to build, by selling his contract. However, the bid was so low, Morrison said, that no one wants to buy it.

Morrison also commented that the extreme lowness of the bid, in great contrast to the other bids, was due to a miscalculation on the part of the bidder.

"No one can do more to expedite this than Sen. George Smathers has done," Krider said. Morrison suggested that the Merchants Assn. write to Smathers, Holland and Herlong, thanking them for what they had already done and urging continued action.

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
