Ag Agent Addresses Welcome Wagon Club

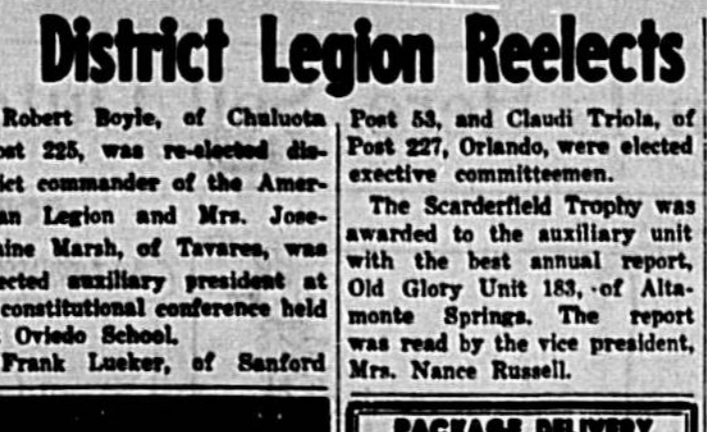

Seminole County Needs A Voice In Washington

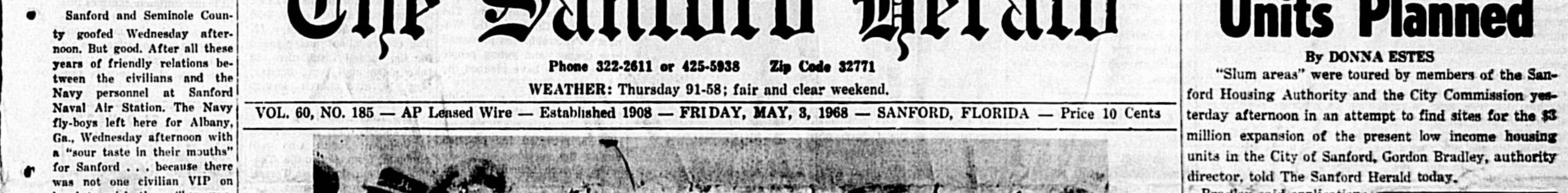
Editorial Comment

U.S., N. Vietnam Agree On Paris

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and North Vietnam agreed today to open preliminary peace talks in Paris next Friday or a few days thereafter.
President Johnson announced at a 10 a.m. news conference he had sent word to Hanoi that he accepts the time and place Hanoi had announced to the world two hours earlier.
Johnson said he was informed of the North Vietnamese agreement at 1 a.m. today. He then conferred with Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford, Secretary of State Dean Rusk and other officials and made his decision.
Hanoi announced its purpose in the talks would be "to decide with the U.S. side the unconditional cessation by the United States of its bombing and all other acts of war against the Democratic Republic of Vietnam and later to talk about other matters related to the two sides."
Johnson ordered March 21 a partial halt in bombing of the North and called for peace talks. He offered to stop the rest of the bombing if Hanoi would show "restraint" in its military operations.
But U.S. officials report Hanoi since early March has greatly increased infiltration of men and weapons into South Vietnam.
Asked about this today Johnson said "we have been quite concerned" about the North Vietnamese expanding infiltration.
The President warned the Paris talks would be only the "first step" toward bringing the long and bloody war in Southeast Asia to a close.
"Let me sound a precautionary note," Johnson said after announcing his decision. "This is only a very first step, and there are many hazards and difficulties ahead."
"I have never felt it was useful for public officials to confuse delicate negotiations by detailing personal views" in advance, Johnson went on. So, he said, he would not discuss the question further now.
It was exactly a month ago today that North Vietnam and the United States publicly declared their readiness for such talks, thus signaling a potential breakthrough in the long effort to begin peace discussions.
The forthcoming discussions are expected to be only preliminary to what could be much-drawn-out negotiations.
For the preliminary contacts, the United States had proposed 15 Asian and European capitals for possible meeting places while North Vietnam had suggested Phnom Penh or Warsaw.

Teacher Transfer Puzzles Board

The problem of getting enough Seminole County teachers to agree to instruct in certain county schools next year was revealed by William Phillips, superintendent, at a Thursday meeting of the county school board.
Phillips told the board that there may be a problem in getting enough white teachers to transfer into predominantly Negro schools as required by federal guidelines. He said that the board should have the right to let out of their contracts if they desire not to teach in certain schools, even if contract already has been signed.
Board Chairman Mason Wharton said he would hate to lose a good teacher because of this situation and John Evans, board member, replied, "The school system comes first and we have other ways to develop a good school system without regard to race, creed or color for the children."
Another board member, A. L. Keith, echoed Wharton's views, with "It would be a shame to lose good teachers because of this."
The board agreed with Phillips if a teacher objects to being assigned to a Negro school it would allow that teacher to seek other employment.

School \$\$ Issue Financing Told

Walter Teague, finance director for Seminole County Board of Public Instruction, today issued a clarification explaining school building program on a pay-as-you-go basis.
Teague's statement is as follows:
Questions have recently arisen regarding the possibility of the School Building Program being placed on a "pay-as-you-go" basis rather than financing by means of the proposed Bond Issue. As a means of clarification the following facts should be considered:
The Bond Issue has been devised to cover building and equipment needs over a period of the next five years. The amount of funds needed by the School Board is not \$10.5 million (the amount of the Bond Issue), but \$17.8 million. The difference between the two figures is not \$10.5 million, but \$17.8 million. The amount of funds that will be available from Federal, State, and County sources.
What about a "pay-as-you-go" basis as a means of providing for our building needs during the next five years?
As shown above, from all sources, Federal, State, and County, the Board will have only \$7.5 million available for construction purposes during the period, leaving the system short of \$10.3. In the meantime, due to inflationary in-

Low-Income Units Planned

"Slum areas" were toured by members of the Sanford Housing Authority and the City Commission yesterday afternoon in an attempt to find sites for the \$3 million expansion of the present low income housing units in the City of Sanford, Gordon Bradley, authority director, told The Sanford Herald today.
Bradley said applications have been filed with the Housing Assistance Administration in Atlanta to obtain financing for the proposed 300 housing units including 150 low rental units and 150 units for the elderly.
The Housing Authority already has 280 low income housing units in operation in Sanford including Castle Brewer Court, William Clark Court, Edward Higgins Terrace and Cowan-Moughton Terrace.
Housing planned will be both the conventional sort on the same order as already in operation and high-rise buildings.
Bradley could give no date as to when construction may start on the units. He reminded no funds are currently available in this fiscal year from the federal government. "We have submitted the applications and are waiting for approval," Bradley stated.
The Authority is operated under the control of the City of Sanford.
The Authority and Commission members toured the "slum areas" by bus. However, places under consideration for purchase were not revealed.

Widow Builds 'Shrine'

ST. PETERSBURG (AP) — The attractive young widow of a policeman murdered by a Negro is building with her hands a shrine to his memory in the city's Negro quarter.

Jane Eustes, mother of two worked with a racially mixed group of about 50 persons, handing soft green squares of lawn sod to the children with laughing black faces who trampled them into place.

"They were building the city's third Green Spot park, all in Negro areas and all constructed by volunteers."

"I don't have any hate for what happened," Mrs. Eustes said Sunday after her role was made known. "I know if the man had known my husband it wouldn't have happened."

The work was done on 12th Avenue South, just six blocks from the spot where Charles Eustes, 26, was shot with his own gun seven months earlier.

Eustes had raced to help a deaf-mute whose husband, was beating her. The man turned on Eustes and sprayed him with Mace. But the spray didn't work and the man, James Edward Weaver, 25, took Eustes' gun and shot him to death. Weaver is serving life in prison.

The killing raised hackles in both the Negro and white areas, leaving the city tense for weeks. Why did the return to the neighborhood?

"It was glad to help out," Mrs. Eustes said Sunday.

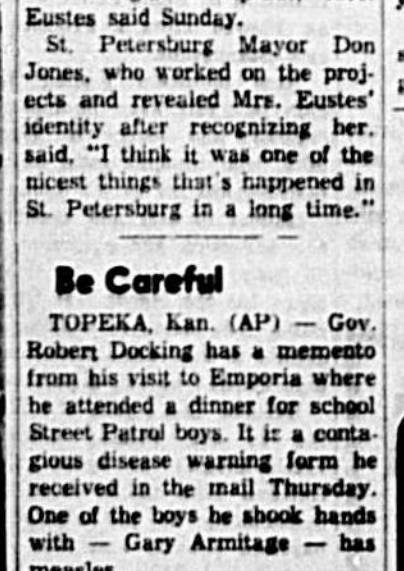

Hells Canyon Dam Dedication Sunday

HILLS CANYON DAM, Idaho (AP) — Dedication ceremonies will be held Sunday marking completion of a \$231 million, three-dam hydroelectric project on the Snake River.

The Hells Canyon Dam, which was put into use late last year, is 125 miles north-west of Boise in the rugged, mile-deep Snake River Gorge. Osbow Dam, put into operation in 1961, is 23 miles upstream, or almost due south, from Hells Canyon Dam. Brownlee Dam, 34 miles upstream from Hells Canyon Dam, was put into use in 1959.

The reservoir behind Brownlee Dam starts about 100 miles upriver from Hells Canyon Dam.

The three dams have a combined output of 1.12 million kilowatts.

The project was built by Idaho Power Company, a privately owned utility, and was the subject of considerable controversy.

Federal agencies wanted to build a single dam in Hells Canyon, and the question of whether the project should be publicly or privately undertaken was debated in Congress and the U. S. Supreme Court. More than 15 million man-hours were spent on construction of the dams. The final cost was \$18 million more than Idaho Power had estimated in 1957.

Brownlee, 305 feet high, is the second highest rock-fill dam in the world. Osbow, 205 feet high, also is a rock-fill dam, while Hells Canyon, 330 feet high, is a concrete structure.

Children's Society's Services Underscored

The expanding services of Children's Home Society of Florida was underscored at the 68th annual meeting of the organization in Jacksonville Tuesday at the Roosevelt Hotel, according to George Touhy, vice president and member of the state executive committee, who with Mrs. Touhy attended the all-day session.

Last year 1,977 natural parents were assisted by the society and 2,204 adoptive parents were counseled and helped. Extensive aid was afforded unwed mothers and 1,008 children were placed for adoption. "Comparing this record with 514 adoptive placements just five years ago, one quickly recognizes the strength and vigor of Florida's Greatest Charity," said Anton Vleck, executive director.

Asked to relate the figures to Seminole County, Touhy said that in the first three months of this year 112 children had been served in residential care, 87 natural parents had been helped. In the first quarter of 1967 there were 16 children placed for adoption while in the similar period this year there were 25.

Preceding a stirring address on American principles and responsibilities by the noted lecturer and educator, Dr. Kenneth McFarland, the report of Treasurer William M. Courtney indicated the strain and challenge of the coming year.

Recognizing the relation of increasing residents and babies born out of wedlock and referrals to CHS, attention was directed to the forecasts of reputable statisticians for the great increase of people in Florida in the next 10 to 15 years.

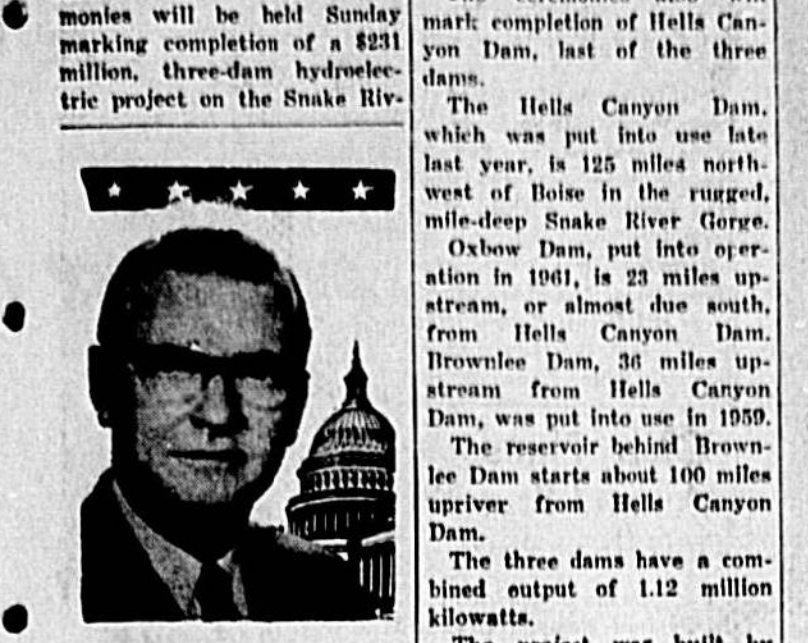

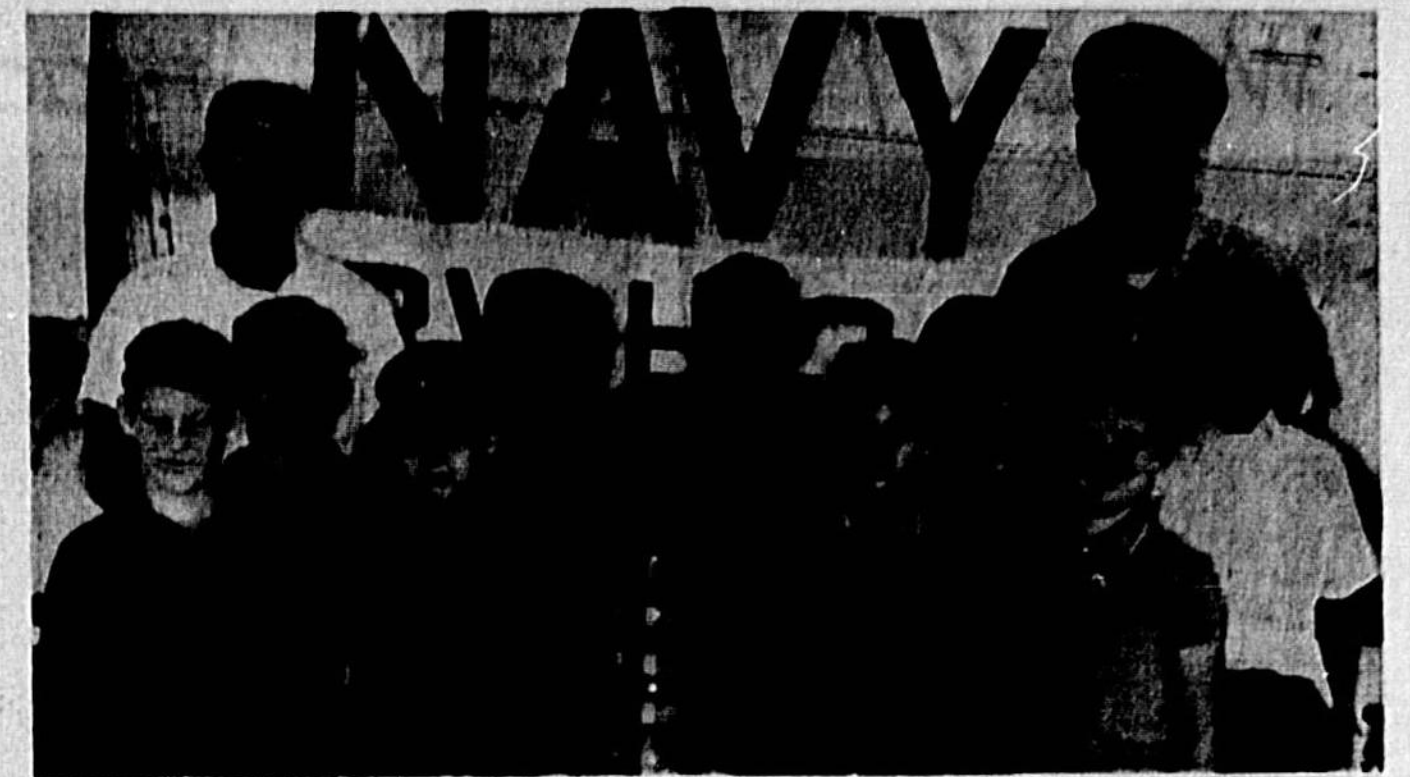

Asteroid Hurtles This Way

WASHINGTON (AP) — The maverick asteroid fiasco, a pip-squeak planet about a half-mile in diameter, starts hurtling earthward today at 20,000 miles per hour.

Navy astronomers say it will come within four million miles of earth on June 14. Its closest approach since its discovery in 1949. It won't be visible to the naked eye.

The Navy assured there is "no danger of a collision" with earth.

There have been similar reassuring words in recent years from the high echelons of astronomy—all aimed at counter-acting reports that rocky Laurus just might be on a collision course with the earth. Such a catastrophe would be equivalent to dropping 100 hydrogen bombs at one time.

But one American astronomer, Dr. Robert S. Richardson, while conceding there's no apparent chance of a collision during Laurus' upcoming visit, has said this might not always hold true as the asteroid keeps returning every 13 years.

Richardson, of Alameda, Calif., has theorized Laurus might eventually be pulled off course by the combined gravity influences of the planets Earth and Mars, with which it also has relatively close brushes.

He has suggested a possible defense if danger ever appears imminent—blasting Laurus out of the heavens with a nuclear-armed space vehicle.

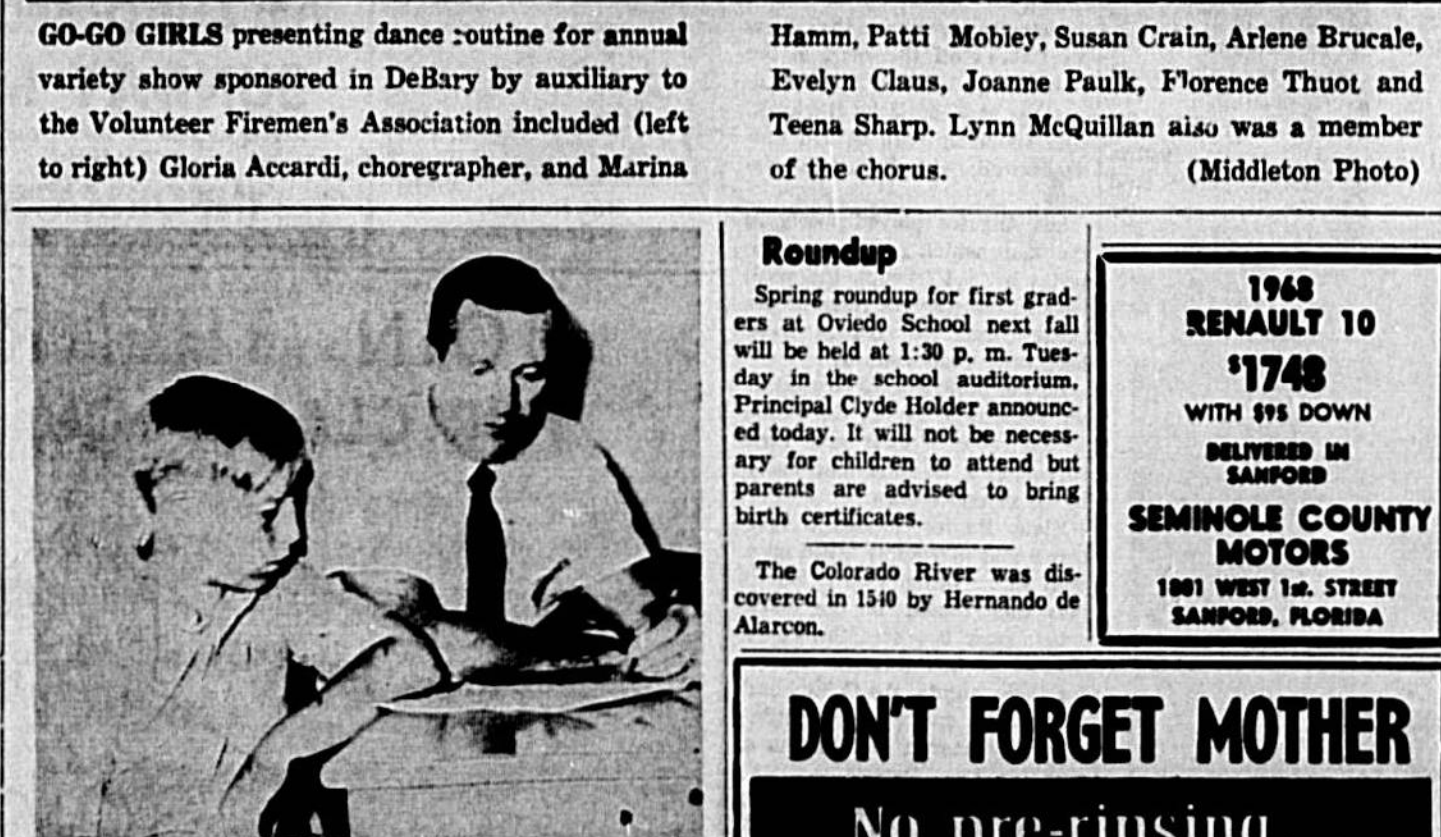

New Life Injected In Tax Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Appropriations Committee has prescribed a formula to inject new life into President Johnson's \$10 billion tax-bill—a spending cut proposal which the administration labeled good medicine.

Breaking a week-long deadlock, the committee proposed Wednesday that any tax hike be accompanied by a \$4 billion cut in actual spending for the fiscal year beginning July 1 plus a \$14 billion slash in spending already authorized or appropriated for future years.

The committee's action removed a big roadblock in the tax proposal's progress through Congress, where it has been since last August.

But Sen. John J. Williams of Delaware, senior Republican on a House-Senate conference committee trying to work out a compromise, said the Senate will not pass a tax-spending package that doesn't contain a \$6 billion spending cut for next year—a proposal already endorsed by the Senate but opposed by the administration.

Secretary of the Treasury Henry H. Fowler, commenting on the Appropriations Committee's recommendations—including a \$4 billion spending cut—said they "meet every reasonable demand for expenditure control."

Rep. Melvin R. Laird, R-Wis., said: "The real bogam has been broken here today. This opens the way for the conference to go ahead."

Laird predicted an eventual compromise which would include a \$3 billion spending cut, a \$1.4 billion less than the President requested.

In other economy-related developments:—The Treasury Department offered a 8 per cent rate—highest since 1920—to borrow new cash and refinance part of the federal debt. The rate will be offered to holders of \$8 billion in Treasury securities which mature May 15 if they agree to exchange them for a seven-year note maturing in 1975.

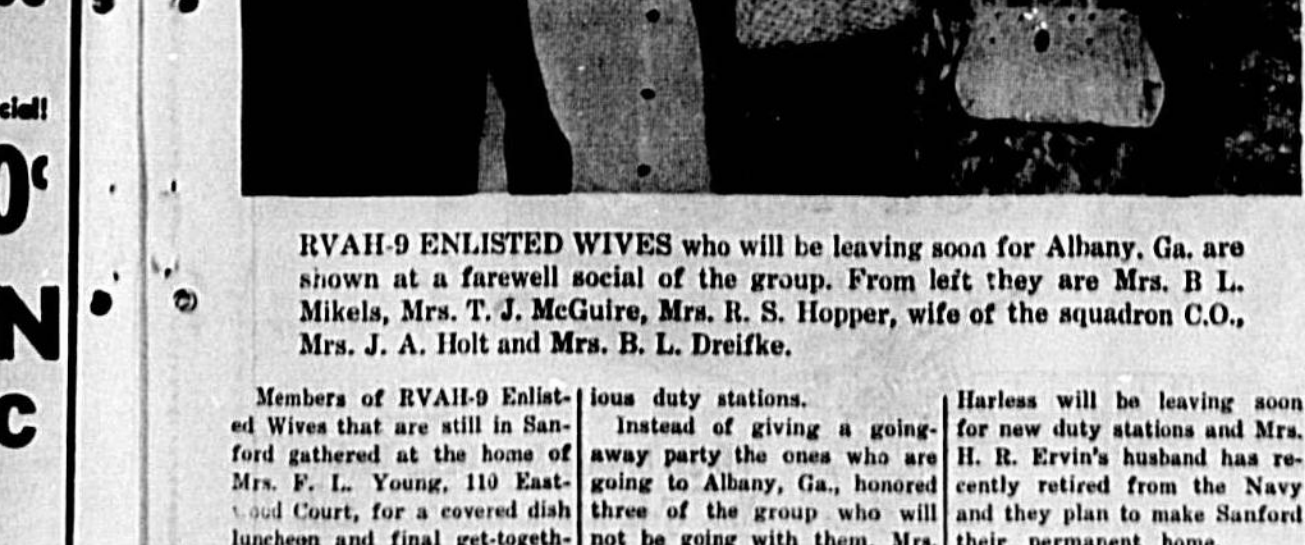

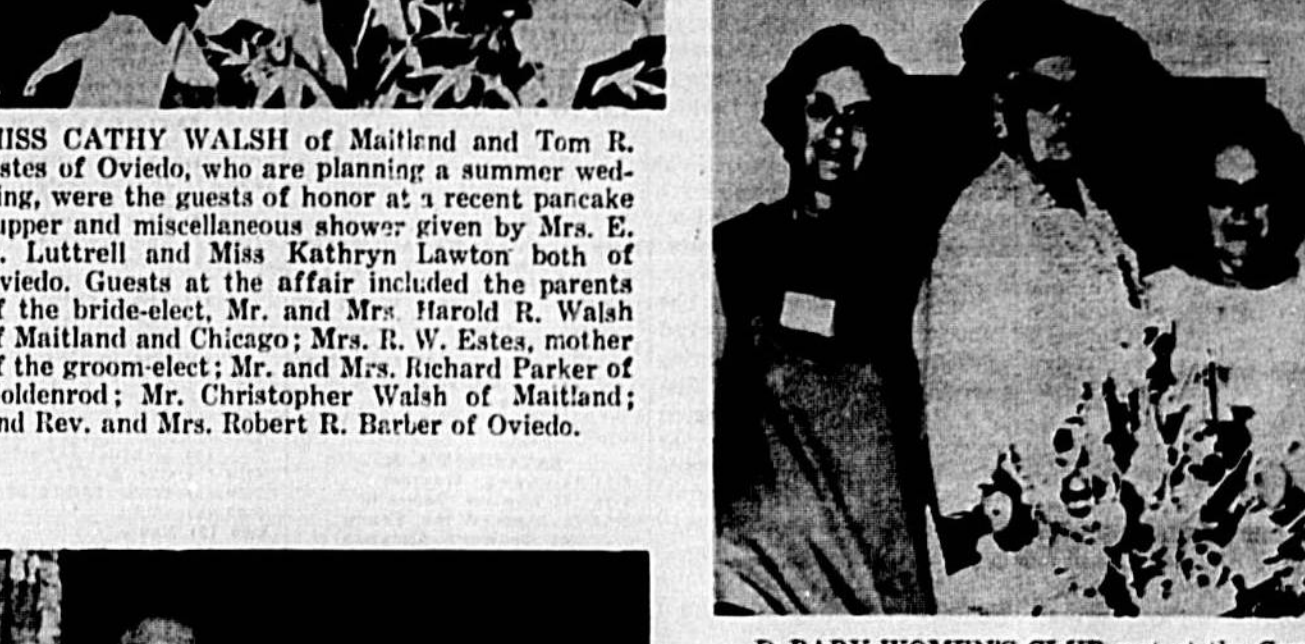

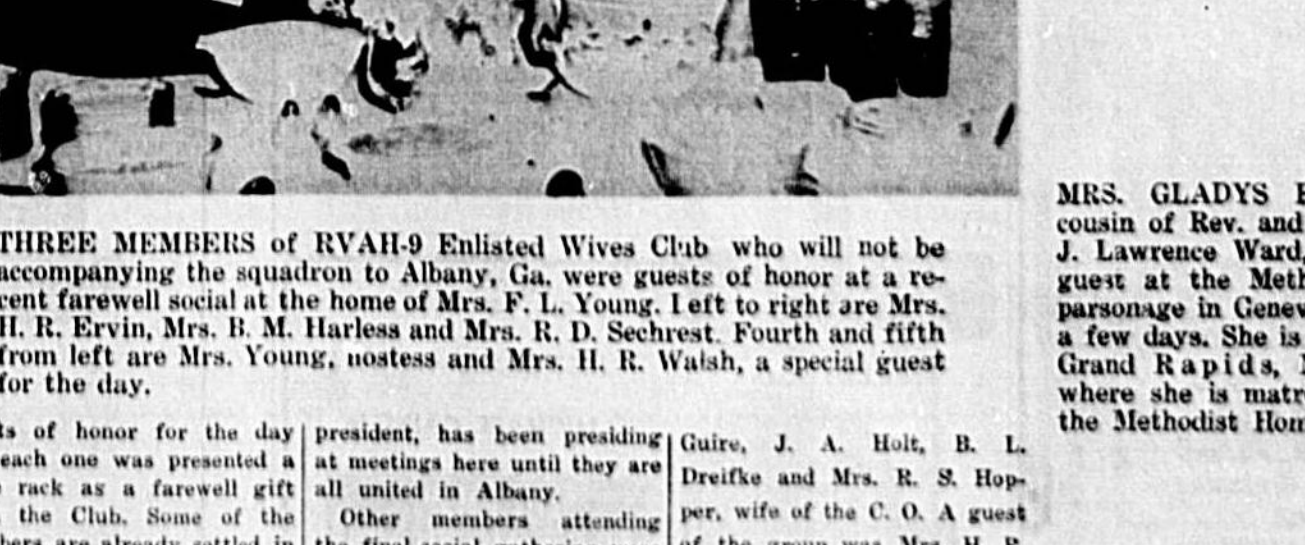
