



NEW YORK-When Lois Schenck came to New York four years ago from Narberth, Paher credentials were exactly the same as those of five hundred other girls. She was young and pretty and blond. She had \$40 in her pocket, she had amateur and semi-pro theatrical experience and with her parents' approval and help, she was, in her words, going to take the city by storm. The situation is old and familiar.

Where the other five hundred might have lasted a couple of years at most and then gone back to the home town to marry the butcher's son, Lois today is a success. She is not yet a success as an actress, it is true, although she is climbing closer and closer by slow degrees-but she is successful as president of Shoeshine Girls, Inc.

There are 25 Shoeshine Girls in New York right now. They are just what the name sounds like—shoeshine girls. But theirs is an esoteric working world. They turn up at conventions, service-club luncheons, restaurants and hotels, each carrying her shine kit and wearing her special costume of black and red chesked shorts and sleeveless white Peter Pan blouse trimmed with the back

They work under different salary arrangements wherever they go, but when they handle big luncheon clubs like the Circus Saints and Sinners, their tips run from \$1 to \$10 a man. In the words of Lois Schenck: it's wonderful.

"When I came to New York, it was five months before I got my first job, a bit in Bert Lahr's Burlesque," Lois told me today. "I worked as an usher at the Art theater down in the Village, and then I used to fill in as cashier, secretary and clean-up woman.

"I remember that several times I was down on my knees, scrubbing, when people like Ingrid Bergman and Dana Andrews came by. And me a potential actress! I almost died."

APPARENTLY LOIS ALWAYS THOUGHT that pretty girls could make something out of the shoeshine business. After months of receiving "that Bittle thing in the mail"-that would be unemployment insurance-she turned up one day in Times Square with &

people and talk about so many things. I don't shine shoes in the street any more, but I still go out with the girls and I shine pretty nearly everywhere else. And I'm a good shoeshiner. 



MIAMI, Sept. 6-(AP)-The dying remnants of an erratic tropical hurricane which took two lives and left over 400 homeless buffeted the nich citrus belt of Central Florida today with winds of 50 to 60 miles per hour.

School Enrollments

The traditional American school house will be near bursting its seams this week when some 3014 million elementary high school students-the largest number in the country's history-will return to their studies, according to Dr. Louis I. Dublin, of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

"And the end is not yet in sight for the snow-balling of the school-age population," Dr. Dublin warns. "It is now evident that the increase in school enrollments will be greater and will continue for a longer period than was forecast even a short time ago.

"As a consequence of the record high level of births throughout the war and postwar years, the population at ages five through 17 can be expected to rise by more than one third in the next decade. The peak for school enrollments actually will be reached several years after 1960around 1964, according to present indications—when there may be more than 44 million children at the school ages."

In each year of the next decade, Dr. Dublin notes, the number of beginners will exceed the number who are graduated from the elementary schools.. Enrollments will ise rapidly through 1956, he says, and then at a slower rate in the later years of the decade. For children at the high school ages of 14 through 17, he points out, the situsion is just the other way about—the relative gain will be greater in the latter part of the decade.

Dr. Dublin foresees that school enrollments will rise in every section of the country, with increase especially marked in regions where there has been a large influx of population, such as the Pacific States, and in surburban areas, which have a particular attraction for families with oung children.

At present, communities throughout the country are confronted primarily with the problem in elementary schools," he commented, "but before long they will be faced, as well, with a rising tide of enrollments in the high schools. If the school needs of our children are to be met. educational facilities and personnel will have to be expanded substantially. Although school construction is now under way in many parts of the country, these new buildings will provide only a fraction of the space needed. There is sino a pressing need for adequately trained teachers, parlicularly in the elementary schools."


