## France Begins **Drive Against** Anti-DeGaullists

PARIS (UPI)-The government today began the wholesale arrest of extreme right-wing French leaders in a dramatic move to prevent the Algerian uprising

PARIS (UPI)-President Charles DeGaulle was reported today to have sent Gen. Paul Ely, chief of the French general staff, to Algeria to try to prevent the settlers rebel-lion there from plunging the nation into civil war.


