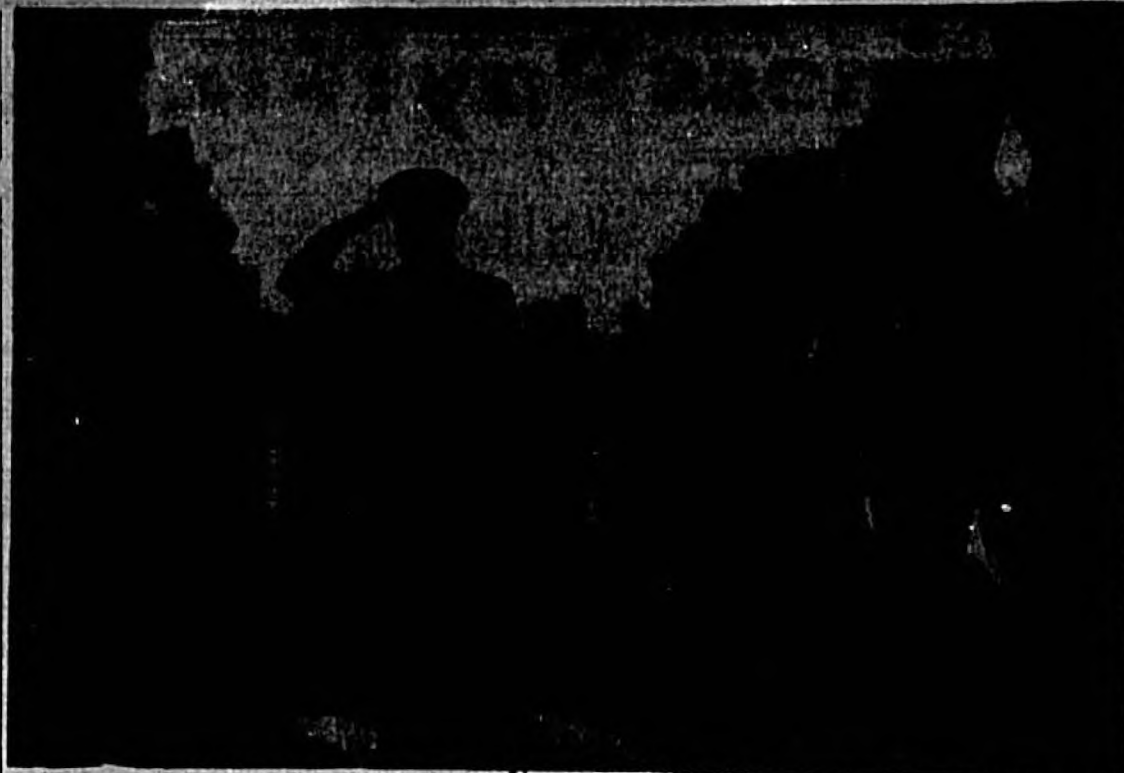

NEW YORK (UPI) — Here's a quick idea of how unpretentious the new Kate Smith show is: Miss Smith wore the same gown throughout her half-hour CBS-TV musical rollick.

The accent, you see, was on music and not fashion, snappy patter or dancing; just the sound of music.

It was a pleasant show. Of course, we've seen enough of Miss Smith on recent TV guest appearances to know that voice-wise, as we say east of Madison Avenue, she sure can vocalize.

But the happiest factor of all was in seeing that she didn't let herself get trapped into a soupy, dated array of music arrangements. She's staying young. The orchestra, under Neal Hefti's baton, knocked out some crisp swinging backgrounds for her — especially in her theme, "When the Moon Comes Over the Mountain."

The Harry Simeone Chorus also contributed a bouncy reading of "The World is Waiting for the Sunrise." And the Barbara Carroll Trio added its share of easy-listen sounds.

Fishing Boat Missing In Gulf

MIAMI (UPI)—A 24-foot fishing boat carrying five persons has been missing in the Gulf of Mexico since Friday, the Coast Guard reported today. An immediate search was launched.

The owner of the missing vessel was identified as Brantley Millender, Carrabelle. He was not aboard.

A Coast Guard spokesman quoted Millender as saying the vessel, "Kanaris," was due to return to Carrabelle last Friday from a fishing trip in the Gulf. It was last seen by the fishing boat Nicholas about 80 miles east-southeast of Carrabelle, apparently coming in.

Carrabelle is located on the Gulf coast near Apalachicola. Coast Guard planes from St. Petersburg and Biloxi, Miss., and Navy planes from Pensacola were sent to look for the boat. A Coast Guard cutter from St. Petersburg also will join in the search.

The Coast Guard said the names of the five persons aboard was not immediately available.

France Begins Drive Against Anti-DeGaulleists

PARIS (UPI)—The government today began the wholesale arrest of extreme right-wing French leaders in a dramatic move to prevent the Algerian uprising from spreading to the mainland and overthrowing the government of President Charles DeGaulle.

One of the first arrested was extremist leader Jean-Marie Le Pen, a member of the National Assembly who tried Wednesday to organize a student strike in Paris but failed. Arrest warrants were issued for 80 other prominent rightists.

Among these was Air Force Gen. Rene Chassin who helped lead the 1958 uprising which smashed the Fourth Republic and brought DeGaulle out of retirement as France's leader. In 1958 he was accused of trying to raise a guerrilla force in France against the existing government.

DeGaulle's aide, Gen. Paul Delevrier said tonight that he and Gen. Maurice Challe, French commander in Algeria, were leaving the city of Algiers to set up a command post in the countryside. He said President Charles DeGaulle soon would issue orders to the army.

The warrants, charged all of those sought today with violation of Article 87 of the penal code, prohibiting any plot to change the form of government.

The crackdown began at dawn with police raids on homes throughout France and on right-wing organizations which support the Algerian settlers.

Nuclear Attack Could Come Soon, General Says

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Air Force Gen. Thomas S. Power warned today that Russia might have enough intercontinental missiles within two years to launch a massive nuclear attack on the United States.

But, Power, chief of the Strategic Air Command, said the Soviet Union would be afraid to make such an attack if America's nuclear bombers were kept on an airborne alert. Such an alert, he said, "can be instituted when required."

If the Russians were not deterred from attacking, Power declared, "we will have no active defense whatever against their ballistic missiles."

The SAC commander made the statements in a speech prepared for the American Legion National Security Commission. The remarks were sure to add fuel to the controversy over new administration estimates downgrading the Russian missile threat. Democrats claim the new view is "too rosy."

Another speaker, Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.), a member of the Senate Armed Service Committee, told the Legion group he would seek funds for 10 new Polaris missile submarines this year—seven more than President Eisenhower's defense budget recommended.

But Power said the Navy's Polaris missiles could "conceivably even detract" from the nation's offensive strength unless they

were integrated with SAC weapons under a "harmonious" command. A joint strategic command is under consideration at the Pentagon.

Although the 1,300-mile Polaris will carry an H-bomb warhead, Power referred to it as a "small" missile.

The four-star general emphasized his belief that the nation must prepare for an airborne alert in which some of his nuclear bombers would be kept constantly in the air so they would not be destroyed on the ground by a surprise Russian attack.

By 1962, when he predicted Russia might have enough missiles to attack, Power said, "we will not have in full operation warning systems, which under all circumstances, will give SAC enough warning to get the alert force airborne before it can be destroyed on the ground."

Firemen Agree On Mutual Aid

Four Seminole County fire departments streamlined their mutual aid agreements Wednesday night.

Longwood, Altamonte Springs, Casselberry and Lake Mary fire departments worked out two agreements that will keep all four towns protected even though some departments may be away from home helping fight fire in another town.

X-15 Ready
WASHINGTON (UPI)— The first of three X-15 rocket planes designed to probe the fringes of space will be turned over to the government in the next "week or so." The X-15 is designed to carry a man to altitudes of 100 to 150 miles and at speeds of 4,000 to 4,500 miles an hour.

Members of the Industrial Union of Marine and Shipbuilding Workers went on strike against six yards at midnight Wednesday night. Two others were shut down last Friday in a dispute with the company over a new contract.

Up To Smith's

MIAMI (UPI)— A slate of Democratic convention delegates pledged to Sen. George Smathers definitely will be on the Florida presidential preferential primary this spring, according to former Congressman William Lanfuff of Miami.

Lanfuff, who heads a group seeking to draft Smathers as a "favorite son" presidential candidate, said Wednesday he is sure Smathers will accept the proposal.

Johnson Withdraws From State Race

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)— Senate President Dewey Johnson, leader of the "Pork Chop Gang," took himself out of the governor's race apparently because he thought he could not get the big city vote.

The Quincy legislator had not officially announced as a candidate but it was thought he would run up until the moment he gave his withdrawal statement Wednesday. Johnson heads the bloc of small county senators, called the "Pork Chop Gang," which has refused repeatedly to accept a legislative reapportionment plan acceptable to lawmakers from heavily populated areas.

WASHINGTON (UPI)— Southern Democrats charged in the Senate today that the administration's new civil rights proposal for voting guarantee would revive what they called a "punitive Reconstruction era" bill once repealed by Congress.

In a floor speech, Sen. Herman E. Talmadge (D-Ga.) called the plan "election year bait." He said it is symptomatic of what he called the "second Reconstruction era."

FBI Foils Cuban Kidnap Attempt On Castro Enemy

MIAMI (UPI)—FBI agents acting on information from an undercover source broke up an attempt to kidnap Cuban Premier Fidel Castro's bitterest enemy here.

The FBI arrested two Cubans and charged them with conspiring to kidnap Rolando Masferrer, 31, a former member of the Cuban Senate and one-time aide to Batista. Private sources here said the Cuban government would pay up to \$250,000 to anyone bringing Masferrer back to Cuba.

The accused plotters, George L. Valdez, 57, and Juan Fernandez de Castro Rodriguez, 32, were placed under \$20,000 bonds and were to have a preliminary hearing this afternoon before U. S. Commissioner Roger E. Davis. Lee O. Torgan, special agent in charge of the Miami FBI, said the men met with others at a hotel near Miami International Airport to plot the kidnaping. He said they planned to return Masferrer to Cuba.

A spokesman at the hotel confirmed that Valdez had checked in Monday from Havana. The other suspect had checked in at the hotel Sunday but later paid his bill and gave up his room. Masferrer fled to Miami when

Castro forces overthrew Batista's government.

Castro accused Masferrer of being the leader of a private army, "the Tigers," which Castro blamed for carrying out private

executions ordered by Batista. Masferrer has been known as Cuba's No. 1 "war criminal" since Castro took control. He was charged with the murder and torture of at least 1,000 persons.

Plea Denied

But the 92-foot-tall Titan, biggest and potentially most powerful intercontinental missile, failed again. The Titan launch vehicle failed to rise above the launch pad but exploded about 100 feet from the base of the launch pad in August and December.

This bird, says Hays, has to go. The positive subject came up for the second straight year Wednesday during closed hearings of the House subcommittee on State Department organization and foreign operations.

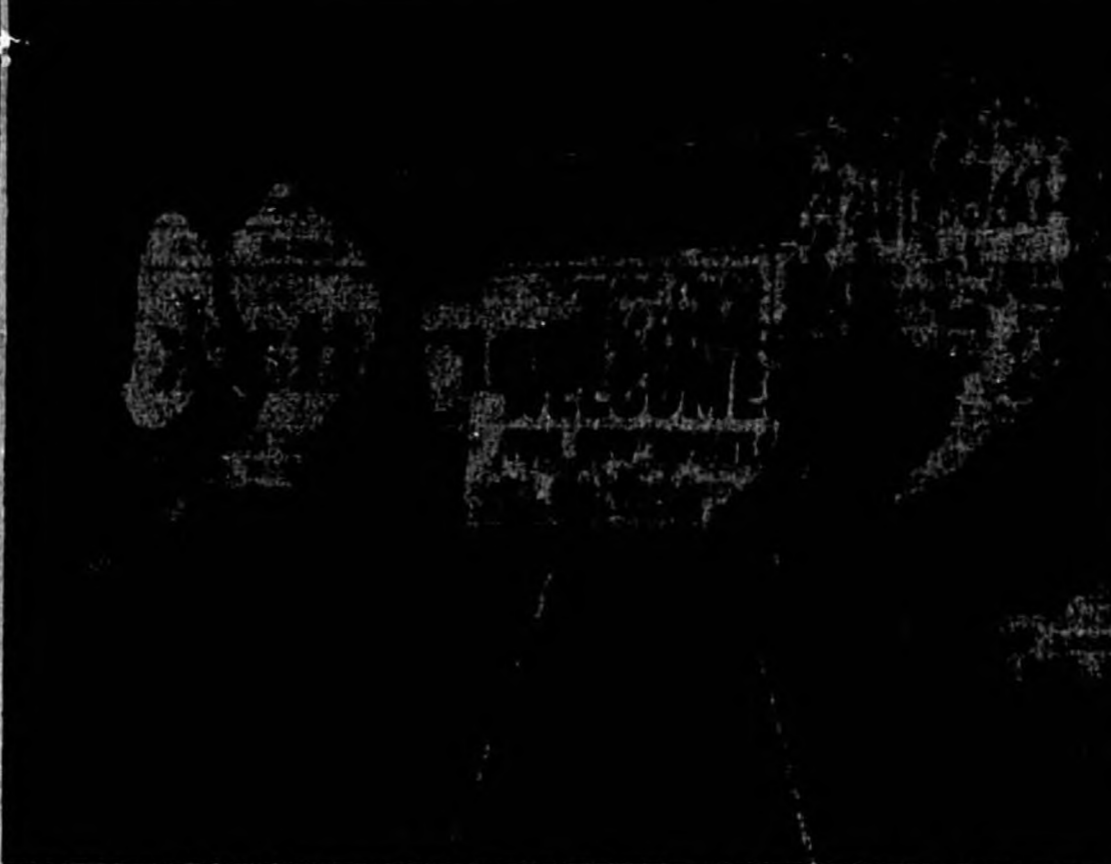
Hays said the subcommittee was surprised to learn that the department did not heed its suggestion last year to drop the proposed roof-top ornament because of the cost.

Evidence Mounts That Man-Made Explosion Caused Airliner Crash

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Evidence accumulated by investigators indicated today that a low-grade, man-made explosion caused the Jan. 6 airliner crash which killed New York lawyer Julian Frank and 28 others.

But informed sources said that even if the explosion were man-made—as they thought—there was no answer yet as to who or what caused the blast that wrecked the National Airlines plane near Belleville, N. C.

They said there was no way of determining how the explosive—if there was one—got aboard the plane. Whether it could have been put aboard by a passenger or in advance of the flight remains a mystery.

Investigators have not ruled out the possibility that organized crime could have figured in the crash of the DC-6, which was on route from New York to Miami.

Frank's body was found some 30 miles from the wreckage, much farther than the others. An autopsy also was conducted. A list of wounds, with bits of metal and wood impregnated in his remains. But no evidence has been found yet of powder burns from an explosion.

The investigation had focused on Frank because he had taken out life insurance totaling \$87,500 and was involved in legal difficulties over a far-flung web of financial transactions.

Sources said that a careful examination of the wreckage had made it clear that the crash was not caused by a runway propeller cutting into the plane's fuselage.

Humane Society Offered Land For Animal Shelter

The society president, Mrs. Ernest Cowley, told Sanford Kiwanis Wednesday that a man has offered two and a half acres outside of Sanford. He will help remodel the building if he gets some payment from the society. Mrs. Cowley said. Society officers will look at the site Saturday.

A Sanford car dealer has offered the society a car or station wagon. The offer is tentative because the society needs the building before it can accept the car. The building would be used as a shelter. Mrs. Cowley said the society needs land, with a building if possible.

The society now has 27 members and \$250 in the bank. The money came from donations and membership fees.

There is a great need in Sanford for an organization to take care of stray animals. Mrs. Cowley said. She told the Kiwanis that city manager W. E. Knowles gets many calls asking that strays be picked up.

The society aims at preventing cruelty to children, other dependent persons and animals. Society members who get complaints about care to children will go to the sheriff, become deputized and try to correct the situation, Mrs. Cowley said.

"Only through education can we help these situations," she said.

Senate Hit By Rights Hassle

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Another civil rights hassle—this time over the fair tax—threatened today to snarl the Senate ahead of the scheduled Feb. 18 showdown on the rights issue.

The anti-poll tax measure, in the form of a proposed constitutional amendment, barring the tax as a voting requirement, was the pending business when the Senate resumed work.

Sen. Spencer L. Holland (D-Fla.) introduced the amendment Tuesday. He looked to vote on unrelated matters sponsored by Sens. Estes Defauver (D-Tenn.) and Thomas J. Dodd (D-Conn.).

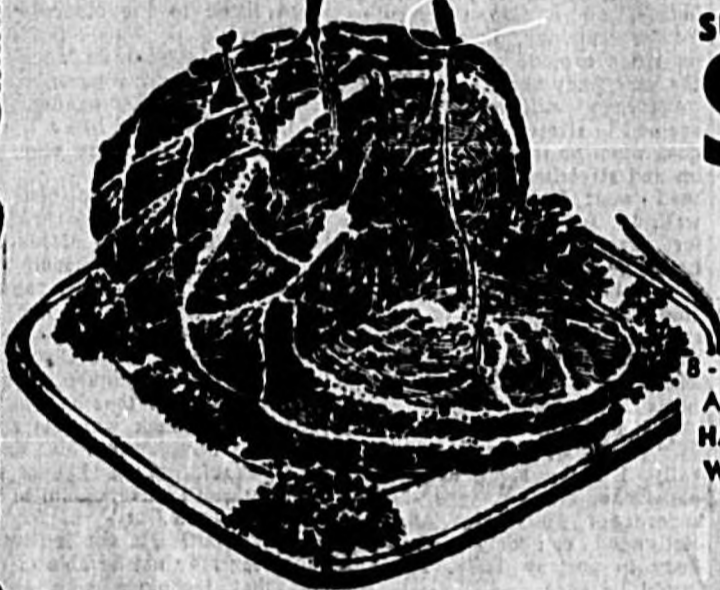

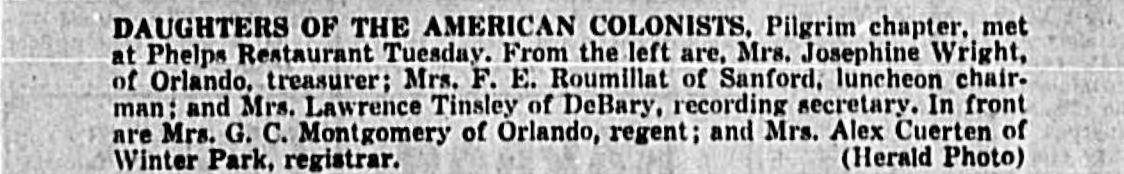

Foodmart is beginning to wonder just what you have to do to get into the first place slot of the Seminoles Kegler Loop.

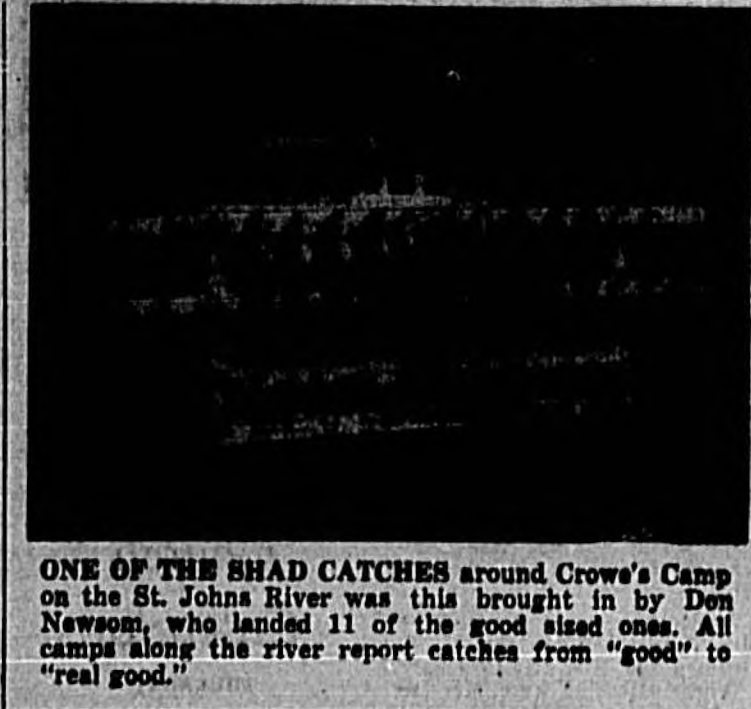

Dallas Slated To Be Admitted Into NFL Today

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—Dallas, a college football boomtown which was a bust as a professional site in 1952, was expected to be admitted today as the 13th team in the National Football League.

George Halas' complete expansion goal may yield to a compromise, however. A Minneapolis-St. Paul franchise bid probably will be deferred until 1961, according to NFL sources.

Although both sites received franchise commitments last October, NFL owners feel a league of 18 clubs for 1960 is more feasible than 14. And Dallas has reached a much further stage of progress than the Twin Cities.

The vote on expansion was expected to be taken sometime late today, or possibly Friday, depending upon just how much resistance owner George Preston Marshall of the Washington Redskins plans to put up to the proposal.

If admitted, Dallas would operate as a "swing" team, playing each other team in the league once. Each club in the league would play 12 games, the same as at present, and would be idle one weekend during the season.

The way was cleared for expansion Wednesday when the NFL voted an amendment to its constitution, making an increase in league membership possible by a vote of 10 of the 12 owners. Under the old by-laws, expansion could be achieved only by unanimous vote.

AFL Plans Action To Stop New Entry

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI)—Officials of the American Football League still split on who will get the new circuit's eighth franchise, but the Philadelphia Wildcats have launched a new winning streak.

The NFL announced in Miami Beach Wednesday it was amending its constitution to pave the way for expansion to Dallas—the cradle of the AFL—and to Minneapolis-St. Paul, which it previously wooed away from the AFL.

AFL Commissioner Joe Foss said he "already has attorneys at work on the matter," indicating there was a strong possibility he would take legal action to block the move.

Meanwhile, the league officials had narrowed their candidates for the eighth franchise to Atlanta, Oakland and San Francisco.

A final vote making the eighth franchise city may come today, or it may be a week before any concrete action is taken.

Al Watrous, 60, three-time winner of the Seniors, led the pack on opening day with a one-under par 71. But he was with the field of players ranging in age from 55 past 60.

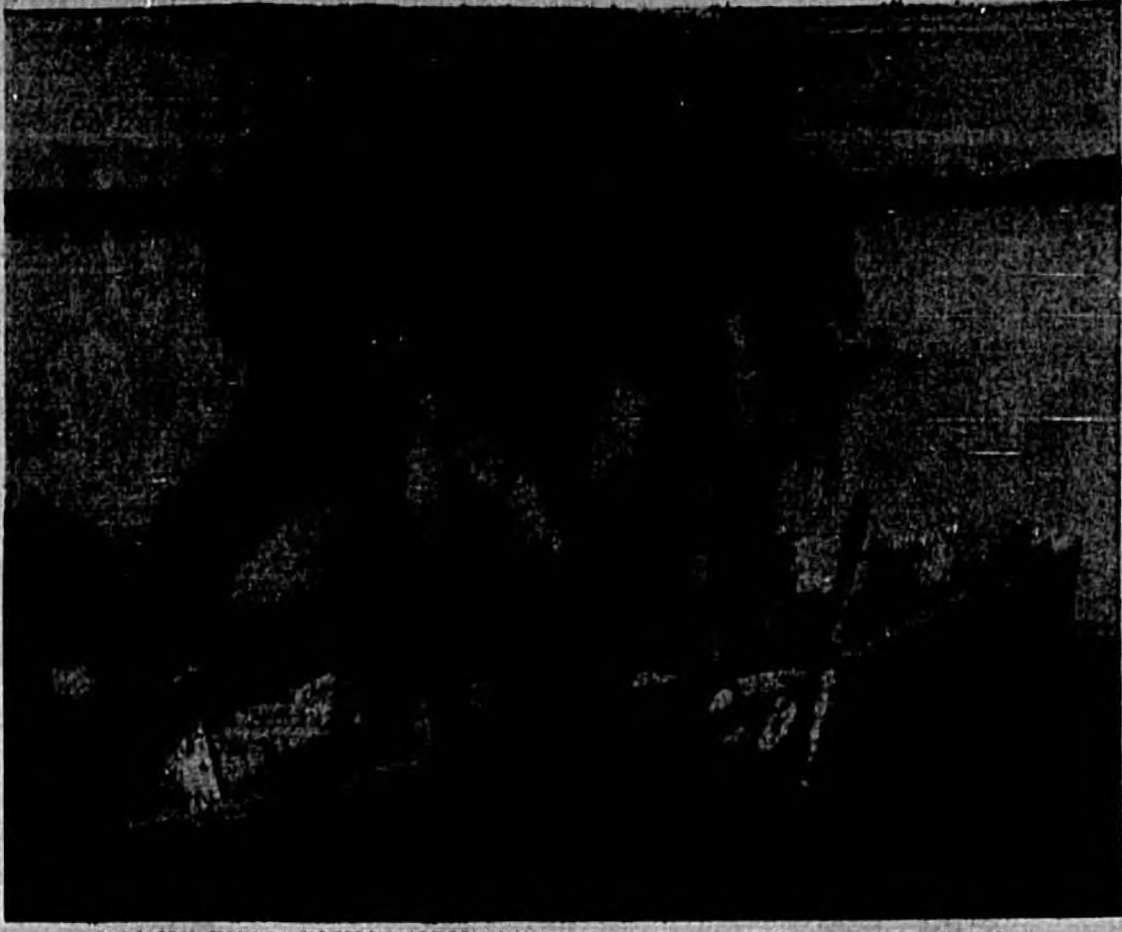

United Press International West Virginia and Villanova are headed toward a possible rematch in the eastern regionals of the NCAA college basketball tournament at Madison Square Garden in March.

The third-ranked Mountaineers are heavy favorites to represent the Southern Conference in the New York eliminations for the sixth straight season and seventh ranked Villanova has practically sewed up an "at large" berth in the same jamboree.

West Virginia handed Villanova its only defeat of the season, 89-81, earlier this month on the Mountaineers' home hardwood but the Philadelphia Wildcats have launched a new winning streak. They scored their 13th victory in 14 games by rolling past Army, 66-33, Wednesday at West Point.

Coch Freddie Schaus' Mountaineers, meanwhile, returned to action after an 11-day "recess" for mid-term exams and turned back host Pittsburgh, 76-66, for their 18th victory in 17 outings.

All-America Jerry West converted only five of 17 field goal attempts but wound up with 19 points and 14 rebounds for the Mountaineers. Teammate Lee Parsons was the game's high scorer with 23 while John Mills paced Pitt with 20.

Eighty-ranked Utah, another strong candidate for the NCAA tournament, raced to an 88-81 triumph over touring Loyola (Calif.) after hitting on 47 per cent of its shots in the first half. Billy McGill paced the Utes with 19 points.

Dayton, behind the shooting of Stan Greenberg and Frank Case, snapped Virginia Tech's eight-game winning streak, 77-59. Greenberg scored 19 points and Case added 13 for the Flyers.

Kentucky bounced back from its 21-point loss to Georgia Tech Monday night by overpowering Georgia, 84-60, as Don Mills and Bennie Coffman each tallied 18 points.

Elsewhere, Dartmouth rolled to a 90-83 triumph over Boston University, South Carolina overcame a 34-point performance by Furman's Tom Conard to defeat the Paladins, 81-81, and soph Tom Hughbanks' 24 points sparked Wisc. to a 52-30 victory over North Dakota.

CHICAGO (UPI)—Cocky Henry Hank said today he could beat Ray Robinson, Paul Pender and Gene Fullmer in one night to win his No. 1 ambition, the world middleweight championship.

Road Building Hearings Open

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A legislative committee opened an investigation today to determine whether the Road Department is spending too much money on the interstate system and not enough on primary roads.

Sen. Scott Kelly of Lakeland, the committee chairman, said he has received reports that Florida's primary funds are in danger of being "bankrupted" by the present program.

The committee also wants to look into the expenditure of more than eight million dollars since 1955 to hire private engineering consultants on road projects.

New Road Chairman William B. Killian and members of his staff were asked to be on hand to answer questions. Also attending was former road chief Joe Grotz, who stepped down two weeks ago to enter private business.

Kelly said the question of interstate spending was of vital importance to the state's financial structure.

He said there have been reports that the department is going to allocate the next 10 per cent of funds to interstate roads. The federal government is required to put up the remaining 90 per cent of funds to finance the proposed 1,111 miles of interstate highways at a cost of some 929 million dollars in the next 12 years.

Asian Flu Deaths 'Heavy' In LA

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — One hundred and 27 persons have died of influenza and pneumonia in Asian flu-plagued Los Angeles during January—more than double the number for the same time last year.

The sharp increase in deaths came during the Asian flu epidemic which has stricken more than a million residents since breaking out here two weeks ago. The epidemics is now on the wane.

The front kicked up thunder storms and 30 mile an hour winds as it moved into the state. The gusty weather was expected to reach South Florida Saturday.

Despite the intrusion of cool air, today was the warmest across the state since last week's freezing weather put an end to a hot spell. Highs ranging from the low 70's to the low 80's were predicted.

A blanket of snow, rain and fog covered the eastern half of the nation today, turning Iowa roads to ice and reducing Florida highway visibility to zero.

A head-b-d of snow and rain stretched from the Great Lakes to the Gulf while freezing rain and snow plagued New England.

Safety officials reported that roads in eastern Iowa were snow-packed and hazardous.

Half an inch of rain fell in Louisiana thunderstorms. Rain and snow mixed to produce mid-winter slush through Missouri and Illinois.

Fog and smoke from a series of brush fires combined into a dense smog which frosted Florida police to close sections of U. S. 92 and Florida 342 Thursday.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Funeral services were held today at a funeral home for actress Diana Barrymore.

A blanket of 2,000 violets sent by playwright Tennessee Williams covered the coffin. Williams flew here from Florida for the funeral.

Miss Barrymore, whose last stage appearance was a Chicago production of Williams' "Garden District," had told friends that she loved Williams and wanted to marry him.

Miss Barrymore was found dead in her apartment here from apparently natural causes, but an autopsy failed to disclose the actual cause of death and chemical analysis of her vital organs has been ordered.

Friends who viewed the body of Miss Barrymore, whose life was a torment of stage failures, divorces, and alcoholism, said she appeared to be "at peace at last." She was dressed in a simple black gown with a sheer scarf at the neck and wore earrings.

The Episcopal funeral service was read by the Rev. Sidney Lanier of fashionable St. Thomas Church following a eulogy by author Gerold Frank, the writer who assisted Miss Barrymore with her autobiography, "Too Much, Too Soon."

MP Shot Guarding Classified Items

KEARNY, N. J. (UPI) — A military policeman guarding a classified shipment on route from Indiana to New Jersey was accidentally shot and killed Thursday night at the railroad station here, the U. S. Army announced.

Lodge Gets Nod For VP Nomination

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Joseph W. Martin Jr., former GOP House leader and one-time speaker, today threw his support to Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge for the GOP vice presidential nomination.

Martin, chairman of the last five Republican conventions, said he would discuss the matter with Lodge, U. S. ambassador to the United Nations. Lodge has said he would not talk politics while he held his diplomatic post.

Lodge said in New York City, "Mr. Martin is very complimentary and I am grateful he feels that way about me, even though I am not a candidate in any shape or manner."

The 78-year-old Martin listed Treasury Secretary Robert B. Anderson as his close second choice for the vice presidential nomination. But he said he was not sure Anderson would accept the nomination.

The veteran Massachusetts Republican also said it would be "very difficult" for the GOP to recapture control of the Senate and House in the November elections.
