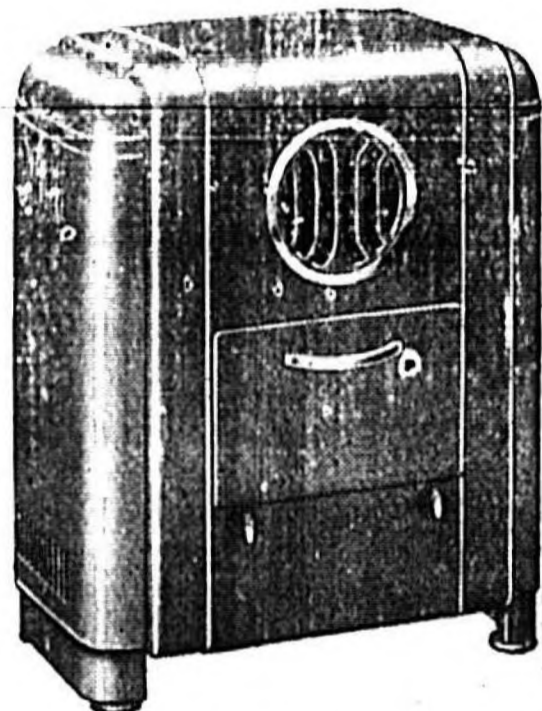

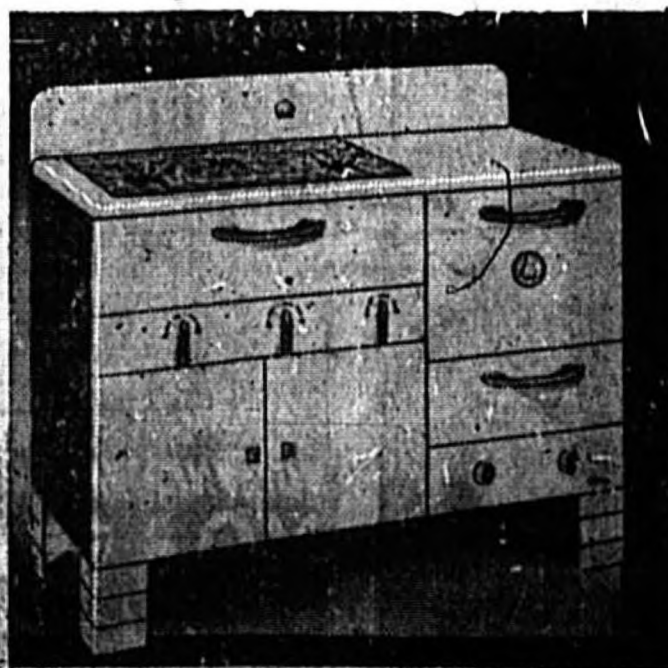

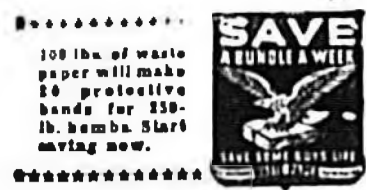

## More Meat Is Seen For U. S. By Anderson

### New Secretary Of Agriculture Is Given Full Power To Control Food Supplies

WASHINGTON, June 25. (AP)—Clinton P. Anderson today forecast more meat for the nation's dinner tables. The new secretary of agriculture said the change "hands me a weapon to deal with the black market in meat and to channel more meat to the dinner table."

WASHINGTON, June 25. (AP)—Clinton P. Anderson, who becomes the nation's food chief July 1, sees house changes in the price control extension bill as assuring the break-up of the meat black market.

The Democratic congressman from New Mexico would not discuss other far-reaching amendments which would make him a virtual czar over everything the nation eats, but in an interview today he said of the new house rule on the stock slaughter:

"It hands me a weapon to deal with the black market in meat and to channel more meat to the dinner table."

"It gives me authority to require affirmative proof of the destination of every carcass of beef. I intend to revoke the license of any slaughterer furnishing meat for the black market."

The house, to an accompaniment of shouts, "we want meat," wrote the new slaughter rules last night and voted Anderson's unopposed local price control bill to give the Office of Price Administration a year's extension of the OPA for a year.

These changes, and other giving federal district courts jurisdiction over appeals from OPA orders, are subject to senate concurrence.

### Takes Over Shortly

Anderson will be sworn in a week hence as President Truman's choice for secretary of agriculture, succeeding Claude R. Wickard. The president has announced that he also will head the heretofore-separate War Food Administration.

The livestock amendment by Rep. Patman (D., Tex.) permits unlimited slaughter in all plants large and small, certified by the agricultural secretary as sanitary; sets aside restrictions on interstate transportation of meat not federally inspected; and permits the army to purchase meat without such inspection, so long as it comes from plants certified as sanitary.

Just returned from a cross-country swing with the house food investigating committee, of which he is chairman, Anderson said:

"If you go back to those slaughterers who are forcing the small retailers to get their illegal prices, you can force meat into legitimate channels of trade."

He is survived by his wife Dorothy Evans, a daughter, Miss Evans Dickerson, a son, Tracy L. Evans, Jr., three brothers, Frank, Col. Wm. G. Evans, and Flight Officer John Evans and one sister, Claire Evans O'Connor.

### Little Damage Done Here As Hurricane Crosses State To North From Gulf

Heavy rains deluged Sanford and Seminole County Saturday night as the tropical disturbance moved over Florida, but this time instead of damage, it was the opinion of growers of this section that the heavy soaking would prove beneficial, come as it did after a long period of drought.

During a 24 hour period up to 8:00 A. M. Sunday, 8.80 inches of rain fell, according to B. F. Whitner, weatherman. For the whole week starting Monday, 12.07 inches were recorded, which is something of a record.

Manager H. J. Lehman of the Sanford State Farmers' Market reported that the whole area around the market was inundated to a depth of a foot and a half when he arrived there Sunday morning.

"You could have rowed a boat around there," he said, and added there was more water there than during the hurricane last October. Today, he called on Mayor Higgins to secure city help in pumping out the weighing pit, the motor of which was flooded.

## 30,632 Are Killed On Okinawa And In Philippines; Many Also Surrender

The Associated Press—Empire of Hirohito lost more soldiers last week than in any comparable period of the Pacific island war, American communiques disclosed today. The Yanks killed 30,632 Japanese troops on Okinawa and in the Philippines.

Another 7,705 surrendered, an astounding figure in view of the traditional Japanese willingness to fight to the death. The fate of about 20,000 more was sealed by a paratrooper landing near the northern tip of the Philippines.

They talked of an attempted Australian amphibious landing at Balikpapan on southeastern Borneo. Chinese forces moving up the East China coast were reported to have reached a point 125 miles south of Shanghai. Other reports were said to be fighting south of Hainan, a one-time South China island.

Marriage Opportunities

Southern girls marry earlier than those of any other section of the country but girls in the West have the best chances of eventual marriage.

The chances of marriage before age 20 are greatest for girls living in the South, particularly for those living in small towns.

In the country as a whole 11.1 per cent, or one-ninth of the native white girls of ages 15 to 19 were married at the time of the census.

As to geographic distribution, an increase occurs in the chances for early marriage as one proceeds from East to West along the northern tier of the country.

Although the best chances for early marriage may be with the girls in our small towns and villages, the chances for eventual marriage appear to be greatest for those who remain on the farm.

An unmarried woman of middle age is rare in the farming area of the West.

Vice Presidents

Discussion of the line of succession to the presidency, which always arises when a Vice President takes over the job of Chief Executive, has risen higher with the announcement of the imminence of another Big Three meeting outside the United States.

Under the present circumstances, the only legal successors in case of emergency are members of the Cabinet, who are not elected representatives of the people but personal appointees of the president.

He has suggested that a more equitable method might name the Speaker of the House of Representatives, followed by the President pro tem of the Senate, both of whom are first elected by their constituents to their respective congressional seats.

This would appear to be a logical system, and deserves consideration.

Indian Self-Government

Both parties are now engaged in consultations preliminary to the meeting called by Wavell in Simla the end of this month.

True, this is not the complete freedom for which they have been asking. But it is, in view of the present Asiatic situation, an enormous step forward.

Sleep-Walking Is Studied By Sanfordite

Somnambulism, or why people walk in their sleep, is given an interesting explanation in the June 18 issue of Time Magazine by Lieut. Colonel Samuel A. Sandler of Camp Lee, Va., who is son-in-law of Mrs. Charles Kanner, 1920 Sanford Avenue and whose wife is the former Ruth Kanner.

After referring to the fact that contrary to slapstick humorists, sleepwalking, common to two percent of adults, is actually no laughing matter, but often a symptom of a serious neurosis, the article, under the sub-heading, "Lady Macbeth's Children," goes on to state:

"As somnambulism is not a cause for Army rejection, many a soldier's barracks full of G.I.s has been wakened by the crash of a sleeper stumbling over a foot locker. At Camp Lee, Va., Lieut. Colonel Samuel A. Sandler has discovered and interviewed 22 somnambulists (which we believe to be the largest number of cases so far studied). His report in Mental Hygiene last week clearly demonstrates the connection between somnambulism and neurosis.

"Says Colonel Sandler: 'The personality structure of the somnambulist is that of the over-protected, habited adult. Somnambulism, in its essence, represents to the sleepwalker an attempt to escape from threatening dangers. The night personalities of these men were in marked contrast to their gentle dispositions during

## Red Cross Appeals For Hospital Workers

A local drive to help fill the urgent need for American Red Cross hospital workers to staff American military hospitals was announced here today by Mrs. F. A. Dyson, chairman of the Seminole County Chapter, American Red Cross.

The Army no longer needs additional nurses, Mrs. Dyson said, "but there is an immediate and vital need for women who can supervise special recreational programs for our wounded men, help them with their personal and family problems and assist them toward whatever adjustment their physical condition demands."

The chapter chairman said the openings will be filled into the following three categories: Trained special workers—for supervisory, administrative and staff positions. Recreation workers—to plan, direct and conduct recreation programs. Untrained or partly trained hospital workers—to serve under professional guidance in social case work.

The job assignments carry annual increments and opportunity for promotion up to \$350 monthly for social workers and \$325 for recreation positions, plus free quarters or allowance for same.

Mrs. Dyson stressed the fact that the jobs are considered long term employment in that the program will be going long after V. J. Day.

## Evangelist Preaches At Adventist Church

## Survey Is Made For Rent Control Area

JACKSONVILLE, June 25.—(Special)—Rent control in the North Florida OPA district embraces 132,400 properties in 18 cities. Russell D. Hines, district rent executive revealed today after completion of the first inventory of rent registrations in this district.

The inventory, completed as of May 31, shows a total of 122,430 houses and apartments and 9,976 hotels and rooming houses, Hines said. The hotels and rooming houses include 53,624 separate rooms.

The Jacksonville Defense-rental area, which includes St. Augustine, listed 48,846 homes and apartments, and 5,896 hotels and rooming houses with 25,216 rooms.

The Orlando Defense-rental area registered the second highest number, with 17,904 houses and apartments and 764 hotels and rooming houses, for a total of 18,668 registrations. The Orlando area includes Sanford and Melbourne.

The Pensacola Defense-rental area was next, with 18,541 registrations, of which 17,680 were houses and apartments and 864 were hotels and rooming houses. The Pensacola area includes Crestview, Milton, and DeFuniak Springs.

Panama City was fourth with 12,949 registrations. Of these 12,332 were houses and apartments and 617 were hotels and rooming houses.

The Gainesville area which includes Lake City and Starke, listed 9,995 houses and apartments and 669 hotels and rooming houses for a total of 10,664 properties.

The Tallahassee, Marianna and Perry area registered 9,069 homes and apartments and 738 hotels and rooming houses for a total of 9,798.

Registrations in the Daytona Beach-DeLand area totaled 7,111 of which 6,703 were homes and apartments and 408 were hotels and rooming houses.

All rental properties in these areas must be registered with the area rent offices within 30 days after they are first rented. Hines said.

## English Children Will Have To Make New Adjustments

English children who have left America's wartime hospitality to return to their native land have a serious period of readjustment facing them, believes Daisy Neumann, author of "Now That April's Here."

Miss Neumann, who took care of one little English boy for a short time, was prompted to write her book to help increase understanding of British and Americans who were seeing each other for the first time through children's eyes.

More than 6,000 of these children made their homes in America. Now many of them are back home and their conservative families may seem distant and strange.

A little boy who has been permitted to whistle to his heart's content affectionately call his best friend a "bum" or slide down a banister if he felt like it may find this act ungentlemanly in his own country.

So, too, a little girl who may have become a Sinatra fan, worn bobbi socks or cut her hair short may find that she has to unlearn much to be an English lady.

In her book (which she says is pure fiction) Miss Neumann depicts the plight of two little British children, Winesy and Angus who spent three years in America and who arrived back home to find that their own parents know little about "the way things are" in England.

So, a 15-year-old Winesy sets about educating her parents in the American way while her parents manage to to educate her in the English fashion and in meeting each other on a fifty-fifty basis they all manage to profit by the enforced evacuation to America.

"That's the way it should be," says Miss Neumann, who believes that both sides have gained a great deal by the exchange of ideas. "The English people speak of their children as ambassadors of good will."

"American people," she says were amazed by the trust the English put in them by sending their children over. In many instances they left on hurriedly thought out plans and knew where they were bound for.

On the other hand, she says the English people were astonished by the generosity of the American people. Since the British government had not sanctioned any overall evacuation scheme, believing that it was more dangerous to cross the ocean than to stay in their own country, they arranged here without funds and only through private arrangements with the United States Committee

to the care of English children and other organizations. They received the best of care, a great majority of them continuing their studies at private school.

It is because of this kindness of the Americans, says Miss Neumann, that plans are under way by the English people to create a fund for the English education of American children of families who cared for British evacuees.

**WAVES RECRUITED**  
The Navy continues to focus attention on the procurement of WAVES according to Mr. John C. Patterson, local volunteer WAVES recruiter. Young women between the ages of 20 and 36 are needed at the rate of 2,000 per month, a large percentage of them being designated for training and duty with the Naval Hospital Corps, she stated.

WAVES receive the same post-war benefits under the G. I. Bill of Rights as the men do, declared the volunteer recruiter in listing the privilege of attending college. Further information may be obtained by contacting the Navy Recruiting Station in Orlando, she stated.

**Red Army Hailed As Most Powerful By Marshal Zhukov**

MOSCOW, June 25. — Adolf Hitler's personal swastika flag was dragged over the cobblestones of Red Square and hurled into a muddy gutter yesterday after Marshal Georgii K. Zhukov, a victory parade speaker, said the Red Army was the most powerful in the world, but that Russia must not become "conceited or complacent."  
"After four years of savage battles, we have entered a period of peaceful development," said Zhukov, conqueror of Berlin and defender of Moscow.  
"The Soviet State has emerged even more mightily from the grim struggle we waged, and the Red Army the most modern and powerful army in the world. But for a Soviet people it is unwise to become conceited or complacent."  
"In the future, too, we must strengthen the economic might of our country, unceasingly perfect our military skill, study the abundant experience of the fatherland-war, and develop our military science."  
Zhukov stood beside Marshal Joseph Stalin on a review stand atop Lenin's red marble tomb as he spoke. He said the victory over Germany grew out of the Socialist regime's strength and because the Nation was "led to victory" by our great leader and military genius, Marshal of the Soviet Union, Stalin.

Zhukov had ridden into the square on a gleaming white horse, the traditional Russian mount for a conqueror, in sight of thousands of Russians and scores of foreign diplomats. It was the Soviet Union's greatest official ceremony to honor its victorious troops.  
Two hundred captured Nazi banners, including Hitler's personal standard, were marched through the square, dragged along its rain-soaked cobblestones, and disdainfully tossed into the gutter before Lenin's tomb while Stalin and other leaders of the Russian people watched silently.  
Christened the Red Army soldiers, the German standard followed immediately behind a parade of high officers. As they approached the open space in front of the tomb before Stalin, the carrier dropped the standard. Banners stopped playing. There was the deep, thundering roll of hundred drums.  
Thousands of eyes followed the standard which glittered with German medals and black swastikas.  
As the first banner carriers reached the tomb they tossed aside the Nazi flag without turning their heads and marched on without even breaking a step.  
From atop the marble monument, Stalin, Foreign Commissar Molotov, President Kalinin and other Government and Party heads and officers of the Army, Navy and Air Force stared down at the standards of a vanquished foe who four years ago today was charging through the Soviet Union in an undeclared war.  
The drums rolled out their thunder. The parade continued.  
Moscow's crowds began to break down to gather for the parade.  
Among the first to reach the reviewing stand were United States Ambassador Averell Harriman, President Kalinin, Katharin; British Ambassador Sir Archibald Clark-Kerr, and Premier Eduard Olsuka Morawski and Stanislaw Mikolajewski of the new Polish provisional government.  
In the parade were Polish standards and Polish officers who helped to storm Berlin.



**seeking new places in which to live and rear their families and the Sanford should get ready to offer them every inducement to settle here.**

Randall Chase suggested efforts should be made to make Sanford more attractive to returning service men and tourists. He spoke of other places he has seen where parkways and vacant lots are well kept by the City and suggested that this would be a good plan for Sanford.  
H. B. Pope pointed out that there are three principle sources of income for a community: manufacture, distribution and tourism after farming is named and he suggested that Sanford has gone about as far as it can go as a firm community. He said every effort should be made to restore Sanford as a distribution center and to get ready to take care of more tourists after the war.  
Fletcher Bull said that the fellow at home is not looking for recreation as much as the returning soldier and he pointed out that the lack of recreational and entertainment facilities here. He suggested that there should be boats on the lake for hire and that a swimming pool should be built.  
President Holler suggested that what Sanford needs is a city manager to devote his full time to the job of seeing that projects now started are properly maintained. He recalled that a few years ago the City spent a lot of money building three tennis courts entirely unsuited to the prevailing climate in this section and that in a short time the courts had to be abandoned because they weren't maintained.  
Mayor Ed Higgins said that even a city manager couldn't devote his full time to looking after recreational activities and suggested that what is needed is better co-operation from the citizens. He said the City has to look to Golf Commission composed of local citizens, and the Tennis Committee of local citizens, to look after such things.  
G. W. Sparrer said that he had been a member of the Golf Committee but resigned because you couldn't run a golf course with one man and a midget and if the City would give us some more labor we could do a better job.

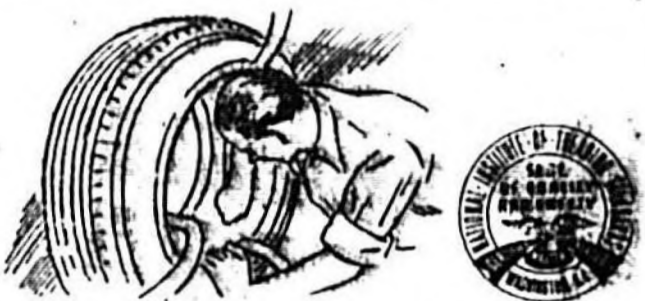
