MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP

Under This Head, Articles Pro and Con Regarding Municipal Ownership Will Be Published in the Herald.

Jacksonville, Fla., Jan. 30, 1922.

Mr. R. J. Holly, Sanford, Fla.

Dear Friend:

Confirming my statement to you, while in your office last October "that the net financial results for the year 1920 to the city of Jacksonville from the municipal owned water works and electric light plants was three quarters of a million dollars," I note your article taking cognizance of the electric light plants report for the year 1921, of one-half million dollars surplus; I stated to you then, and am still, an ardent advocate and firm believer in cities owning their own utilities plants, under a commission and city manager (not aldermanic) form of government. Consumers are entitled to and should be provided with necessities for health, comfort and protection at the least possible expense, without profit to a city or company, except it be to provide for a sinking fund, to pay in a stated limited time, the bonded indebtedness incurred to purchase the utilities. I note you have overlooked the fact that we (consumers) in Jacksonville, pay only 7c per k. w. for electricity; charges for water as near Nil as for electricity. Gas provided by a private corporation is \$1.85 per thousand. I sincerely wish the city owned and operated the gas works and we would, I am sure, get gas for at least \$1.00 per thousand, and yet with the low rate for electricity and net results, no one can refute the fact that Jacksonville is as well provided with public lighting as any city in the country; extravagantly so. Note Hemming Park, as light at night, almost as noon-day, so also with all other parks, Springfield, Confederate and Riverside. In conversation with one of your commissioners coming from Sanford to Jacksonville on the train, several weeks ago, he said your citizens would not vote for bonding the city to purchase the utilities. I answered his argument: Why bond the city, bond the utilities. Why not the prosperous Sanford banks do the preliminary financing, when the utility bonds are sold refund their advances.

It is my interest in Sanford and vicinity that I desire to see the city benefited through the profits from the utilities, and twenty, possibly fifteen years will see your city economically administered, owning outright, without any indebtedness, gas, water and electric plants, provided no graft, no high salaries, no extravagant city commission expense be allowed to gas, electric or water commissioners.

One other matter I spoke to you about. I may be a dreamer, an idealist, or a nut, may have hallucinations or night-mare, but nevertheless I cannot get away from the idea, that at your back door you have a nature given source for motor power, a swift running, high embankment, never ending source of water supply stream, which, I believe, if harnessed, would give sufficient power to run turbines that not only Sanford, but Seminole, Orange and Lake counties their highways, trolleys (when inaugurated soon to be) business and private consumers could be abundantly provided at a minimum cost, with electric needs. I refer to what we always thought was a joke on nature, Econocklatchee creek, at or near its source, but mark my word, she will some day be the power that will make the Garden of Eden (Old Orange county) blossom as the rose.

With a heart's desire to know of every man, woman and child jointly, cohesively, concretely, concentratedly (lyely), shoulder to shoulder working harmoniously (not defaming any citizen or knocking Sanford in any way) for Sanford's welfare, and 25,000 population in 1930. With all well wishes to you, as I still consider you the greatest Sanford booster.

"It would hasten the publication of the figures for the total population," the report says, "if the supervisors in the various districts made the preliminary count and announced the population, subject to correction, for the political subdivisions of their districts."

To avoid duplication of effort and eliminate annoyance to manufacturers and others, the commerce secretary has asked the director of the census to negotiate with other statistical bureaus of the federal government looking to a consolidation of effort in this direction.

Receive Many Complaints. "Many complaints have been received from manufacturers and others concerning the numerous requests made by the federal bureau for statistical and other information," Mr. Hoover says, "I feel confident that in many instances the periodic investigations of the bureau of census are all that is necessary to make, and that the investigation of the other bureaus could, with advantage, be discontinued."

Calling attention to the fact that some census records were destroyed in a recent fire in the department of commerce building, Mr. Hoover declares that a hall of records in which these documents can be stored and conveniently examined is urgently needed.

Keeps Cats From Bakeries. Boston.—The cat in the bakery must go. This is one of the orders just promulgated by the city health department, under authority of an act passed by the last legislature. "Some bakers thought that cats were necessary in order to keep rats and mice away," said Dr. P. H. Mulhoney, deputy health commissioner, in charge of the food inspection division. "The same object can be obtained, however, by proper physical construction of the baking plant, so we have abolished cats and all other animals."

Charged With Keeping Little Girl Like a Dog

Charged with literally having treated her eight-year-old granddaughter like a dog, Mrs. Lillie Gross of New York city is being held without bail pending investigation. The complaint alleges that the woman tied the child under the house all day, made her sleep on an old coat beside a real dog, kept her in the coal bin during rainy weather, beat and underfed her, and sent her into the streets to beg.

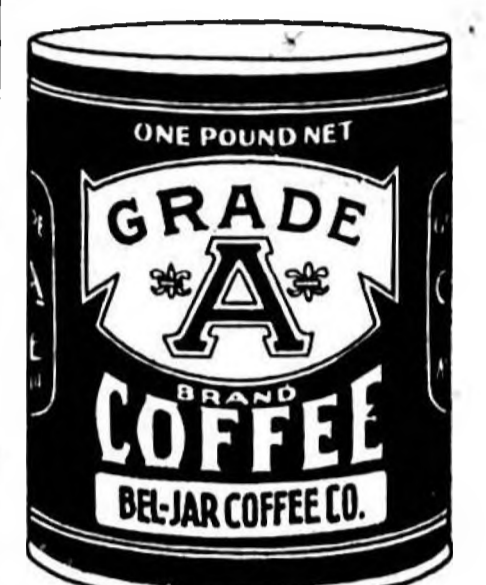

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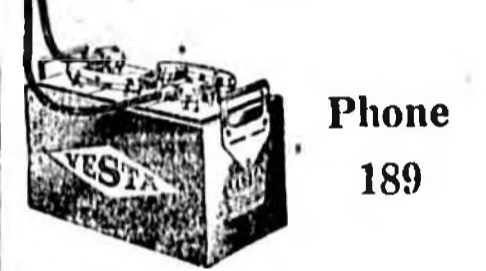


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
