"She's pretty much exhausted every lead," said sheriff's spokesman George Procchel of missing persons investigator Lou Porter. "It just seems like he vanished. She is still making regular contact with the family. Maybe he's trying to make his home in Connecticut."

Philip Sellew, injured four years ago in a construction accident, left the group home at

about 8:45 a.m. after saying he needed a pair of toenail clippers. He was seen later that day along the shore of Lake Monroe and the next day in front of ABC Liquors on Orlando Drive,

but has not been seen since.

Procchel said Sellew is from Connecticut and may be trying to find his way there but left with only \$15 in his pocket.

Sellew is five feet, eight inches tall, has brown eyes and black curly hair. He was last seen wearing a blue, short-sleeved button-down shirt and jeans. Sellew is not dangerous to himself or others, but may become disoriented within minutes of receiving directions. He may fall into


a fatigued trance after a few hours.

Tiff idles road project

LAKE MARY — Much of the heavy equipment used for widening Lake Mary Boulevard has been idled in a dispute involving contractors, it was confirmed today.

The dispute involves the prime contractor and a subcontractor who has walked off the job, according to Larry Sellers, Seminole County Public Works Director.

"Mahoney Construction of Boston, is the prime contractor for the \$6.6 million widening project," Sellers said this morning. "John Mahoney hired Jeff Tickal as the subcontractor, and Tickal has

been supervising the actual work on the road." He explained, "While Tickal is the owner of Tidell Construction Company, he is actualy

employed as an individual by Mahoney, to manage the construction project as a subcontractor."

Sellers continued, "Last week, John Mahoney informed the County that he and Tickal had been in a disagreement, with resulted in Tickal walking off the job."

"The major problem that has slowed the work," Sellers said, "is that Tickal had the contract for almost all of the heavy construction equipment, and it has been pulled from the job. So, for these few days, work has almost come to a standstill."

Tickal could not be reached. Ashby referred comment to Mahoney and Mahoney's Boston office said he was unavailable.


County Construction Management Engineer Jim Pullen said this morning, "Mahoney has

already replaced Tickal with Steve Asby, who is now on the job, but may need a few days to a few weeks before he can enter into contracts to obtain a full complement of equipment needed for the Job.'

Neither Sellers nor Pullen expect the temporary slowdown to delay completion of the construction contract. "Mahoney told us he is the prime contractor and promised to get the job done as scheduled," Sellers said.

"At the present time, we don't believe this is any serious concern for the County," Sellers said. The bid for the project was finalized on May 8. 1991, with the contract calling for completion by June 14, 1993." He added, "But the way things were progressing, we had indications that the overall widening project might be completed by ☐Sec Road, Page 5A

Schools get confiscated drug scales

SANFORD — Seminole County schools will benefit from area drug arrests. The Sheriff's department has donated 60 scales to the school

Sheriff's spokesman George Pro-echel said. "These are scales which were confiscated in various drug raids and arrests during the past raids and arrests during the past year. Generally, they are used by drug dealers to measure the weight of various drugs." Most of the scales are "Ohaus" table type scales, which Procchel estimated at a value of between \$100 and \$150 each.

Diane Lewis, Science Resource Teacher for the Seminole County School Board accepted the scales.
"We'll be contacting the various department chairmen at the schools to determine how they should be distributed," she said. "Many of the newer schools probably are already well equipped, but we'll have to see where the need is before we give them out.

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Televangelist convicted

NEW BERN, N.C. - A minister known for his flamboyant lifestyle says he was convicted of bilking a Florida widow of more than \$900,000 because he is a TV preacher.

"I think if I had been anything other than a television evangelist it would have been different," the Rev. Jim Whittington said Thursday after his conviction was handed down. "I'm identified with Paul and Peter and Jesus and all the other religious prisoners. I'm no better than they are."

Defense attorney Trawick Stubbs said "the overwhelming national wave of intense animosity toward television preachers surely had an effect on the trial."

Whittington, who founded Greenville-based Fountain of Life ministry, showed off his expensive cars, flashy jewelry and large house, saying God blessed him for his devotion. He suspended his television ministry during the trial but

continued a mail ministry and tent revivals. A U.S. District Court jury found Whittington guilty on 11 counts. Four others also were convicted of defrauding Valeria Lust of Lakeland, Fla., out of 8913,072 in cash and property.

Whittington could be sentenced to more than 100 years in prison and \$3.5 million in fines on Oct. 5. Also convicted were the Rev. Daniel Atwood of Highland City, Fia.; Mrs. Lust's live-in nurse, Barbara Stevens of Lakeland: Whittington's assistant Riley Ferguson: and Atwood's secretary Claudette Collier.

Mom pleads for locked trash bins

TAMPA - The mother of a boy who died last month in a trash bin filled with toxic fumes made an emotional appeal to county commissioners for a law requiring that all trash bins be locked.

The Hillsborough County Commission voted 5-0 Wednesday to have its staff draft such an ordinance, which is sure to be hotly debated by solid waste hauling companies.

Kathy Radney said her son, Anthony Storman, and a friend, Daniel Scott Perez, "died needless deaths" when the 9-year-old boys climbed into a trash bin and inhaled a chemical solvent on June 13. She told the commission that the tragedy should benefit other children.

But Stuart Rose, a lobbyist for Waste Management Inc., said the ordinance "will cost a fortune, and rates will go sky high."

Fire department official found guilty

MIAMI - A federal jury found a 38-year-old lieutenant in the Miami Fire Department guilty of one count of receiving child pornography despite his attorney's argument that he was entrapped.

The jury of 10 men and two women deliberated two hours Thursday before returning the verdict against Paul Davies. He could face a sentence of 12 to 18 months when he is sentenced Sept. 25.

For two years, Paul Davies received offers in the mail to buy pornographic movies. From time to time, he inspected magazine ads offering sex videos for sale.

Twice, he placed an order: The first depicted a 7-year-old girl performing oral sex. The second was for two videos titled Family Sex and School Boy Orgy.

The first video never arrived. But on Feb. 5 of this year, a

courier delivered a package to Davies' South Dade home. A half-hour later, seven armed members of a SWAT team burst into his living room.

Acting state labor secretary chosen

TALLAHASSEE - A 21-year veteran of state government was chosen as acting state labor secretary by Gov. Lawton

Shirley Gooding, 48, will take over for Frank Scrug helm of the Department of Labor and Employment Security while a search for a permanent replacement is found. Scruggs, whose resignation was effective Thursday, is

returning to private law practice in Miami. 'We have a talented management team in place at the labor department and I look forward to working with Shirley to continue the momentum begun under Secretary Scruggs, who

has truly electrified this agency," Chiles said Thursday.

Gooding, who like Scruggs is black, has served as assistant secretary since November 1991 and was the department's inspector general from May until November 1991.

Validity of breath analysis tests upheld

WEST PALM BEACH - A state appeals court has upheld the validity of hundreds of breath analysis tests in Broward County drunken driving cases.

The 4th District Court of Appeal in West Palm Beach overturned a Broward County judge's ruling that state guidelines ensuring the reliability of breath analysis machines were unconstitutionally vague.

'This is a win for our side, and we intend to continue to be aggressive in our prosecution of DUIs," said Tony Loe, the sistant state attorney who oversees Broward's DUI cases.

Florida Supreme Court rules

Violent children put in detention

TALLAHASSEE - Only violent children who are a public safety risk or might not show up for court can be put in detention centers, the state Supreme Court has said.

In a 5-2 decision Thursday, Florida's high court said six Miami and Jacksonville children were wrongly put in "secure detention facilities" for contempt of court.

'The acts of contempt committed by the dependent children in this case constituted running away from home and refusing to go to school," Chief Justice Rosemary Barkett wrote in the majority opinion. "These acts are ones that the Legislature deems a sign of children in need of services, not children in need of punishment.

She called it "inconceivable" that a system of justice that takes children from their parents

or guardians to protect them would end up incarcerating them because of behavior that stems from abuse or neglect.

But she noted that 351 dependent children were placed in secure detention centers for contempt of court from July 1990 through June 1991.

The Legislature has made it clear in its juvenile-justice laws that only children who pose a risk to themselves or the public or who might not show up in court can be kept in secure detention facilities, Barkett wrote.

"The lack of adequate placement alternatives or mental and physical health services for children needing them is a recurring daily problem in our juvenile system." Barkett wrote. "Even though the Legislature has recognized the critical need to provide appropriate placements or services for such children, these services have not been made available."

Newspapers will ante up for tax

TALLAHASSEE - If magazines must be subjected to the sales tax, newspapers must ante up as well, the Florida Supreme Court decided.

The state court had previously ruled that the 6 percent sales tax should apply equally to newspapers and magazines, but the justices took a second look after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in 1991 that some media could be exempted.

In Thursday's ruling, the state court applied new legal principles but arrived at the same conclusion: if state law says magazines must pay, newspapers can't be exempt. The tax is worth \$25 million annually.

In a minority opinion, Justice "We're going to keep doing Ben Overton said he didn't think what we've been doing," said the Legislature had the authority Jere Moore, spokesman for the state Department of Revenue. "We've been requiring the

newspapers to collect the 'tax and send it in."

Magazine Publishers of America Inc., the Hearst Corp. and Time Inc. were among the publishers that originally challenged the law, which forced them to pay sales taxes but exempted newspapers.

The state Supreme Court agreed in 1990 that the tax was unfair but decided the best way to deal with the problem was to simply remove the newspaper exemption, not strike down the entire tax.

The Miami Herald appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court, which asked the state panel to reconsider in light of its support of an Arkansas law that taxed cable television but exempted newspapers and magazines.

Florida's Supreme Court, in a 4.2 opinion, found that the newspaper exemption was still unfair because it was based on the content of the publication, unlike the Arkansas statute, and therefore infringed on the First Amendment.

Convicted killer now key witness

JACKSONVILLE - A witness in the trial of a white supremacist charged with killing a black sailor was convicted in a rape-murder case in Vietnam that was the basis for the movie "Casualties of War," a newspaper reported.

Steve Cabbot Thomas, a leader of the white supremacist Church of the Creator, was convicted in a 1967 Army court-martial of the rape and murder of a Vietnamese woman. That case was the subject of the Brian De Palma film, which starred Sean Penn and Michael J. Fox, the Florida Times-Union reported Thursday.

Thomas, 48, is expected to testify for the state in the murder trial of George Loeb, who is charged with the May 17, 1991. shooting death of USS Saratoga sailor Harold Manafield.

Thomas has been charged with being an accessory after the fact in Loeb's case, but has remained free on bond. Court records show that he had agreed to testify in exchange for a year's probation.

Prosecutor Harry Shorstein said in opening statements Wednesday that Loeb shot and killed Mansfield in the parking lot of a supermarket because he hated blacks. Defense Attorney Craig Williams admits Loeb shot and killed Mansfield, but said Loeb acted in self-defense after being threatened with a brick.

Thomas, who has since moved to Milwaukee, is expected to testify about helping Loeb and Loeb's wife flee Jacksonville after the shooting. Loeb, like Thomas, was a leader in the

Chiles says he doesn't recall any deals on computer appropriation

TALLAHASSEE - Gov. Lawton Chiles says he doesn't recall trading \$2 million in state spending for a computer system for votes on a tax package that concluded the June special legislative session.

And though the \$2 million came from money targeted for emotionally disturbed children. Health and Rehabilitative Services Commissioner Bob Williams defended the 11th-hour budget switch.

"We did not oppose the appropriation because we recognized that the need for such a system is a legitimate need that could very well have money on services to clients through more efficient management."

Williams said in a statement. The money was slipped into

the budget in the session's closing hours by Sen. Curt Kiser, R-Palm Harbor, and lobbyist Donna Placilla, who wanted it for the Qualifacts Systems computer company in Kiser's home county of Pincilas.

A House leader told a newspaper she was told that Chiles approved the appropriation in exchange for Republican votes needed to pass a \$300 million tax plan.

"I don't remember that particular conversation, or that that was expressly on the list of things that we looked at," Chiles said Thursday.

Rep. Elaine Gordon, D-North Miami, chairman of a budget subcommittee on social services, told the newspaper she dropped opposition to the computer spending at Williams' request.

Gordon said he told her, "It

gives us two votes and we can go home."

Kiser, a key GOP negotiator in a deal on the tax increases and the \$31.4 billion budget, denied that the computer project determined his vote.

"That certainly was not part of the deal," he said. He was one of four Republican senators who voted for the tax increase shortly after midnight July 1.

Jim Krog, Chiles' chief of staff, also denied awapping approval of the computer project for votes for taxes.

Some legislative leaders and social services advocates said the change could jeopardize the state's position in a lawsuit over its care of emotionally disturbed and handicapped children.



'Coke mom' conviction nullified

TALLAHASSEE - A woman originally convicted in Sanford can't be charged with "delivering" drugs to her newborn through the umbilical cord, Florida's Supreme Court said, reversing the nation's only appellate ruling upholding such a

"This is a victory for women and their children, a victory for families struggling to deal with the problems of drug abuse and a victory for the privacy rights of all Americans," said Lynn Paltrow, a New York attorney with the Center for Reproductive Law & Policy.

Government does more harm than good to the bables of drug users when it tries to prosecute their mothers, an attorney for the American Medical Association said in a press release issued in Chicago.

Many women are discouraged from getting prenatal care or drug treatment and some try unsafe withdrawals because of such policies, according to Kirk Johnson.

"Medical intervention is the answer," he said. "Prosecution will not save a baby's life or provide the counseling its mother needs to get off and stay off druge."

In Thursday's unanimous ruling. Florida's high court voted unanimously to overturn the two convictions against Jennifer

The minors were her son, Carl, born in October 1987, and daughter, Jessica, born in January 1989. Both children were born full-term and healthy and showed no harm from their mother's drug use, according to Ms. Paltrow.

Johnson, 26, was sentenced to a year of residential drug treatment, 14 years of probation

and 200 hours of community service. In May, she was accused of violating her probation after a relapse and was ordered to undergo rehabilitation.

Her children are living with relatives while their mother undergoes the 18-month rehabilitation, which she started

two months ago. Thursday's ruling was concerned mainly with statutory grounds like legislative intent and the plain-language meaning of the law, but constitutional issues of due process and privacy were implied when the justices cited common sense, Ms. Paltrow said.

"The Court declines the state's Invitation to walk down a path that the law, public policy and common sense forbid it totread," Justice Major Best Harding wrote in the majority opinion.

"The legislative history does not show a manifest intent to use the word 'delivery' in the context of criminally prosecuting mothers for delivery of a controlled substance to a minor by way of the umbilical cord," Harding wrote.

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

New challenge

Ross Perot's abrupt exit from the presidential contest poses tremendous new challenges for President Bush.

No longer can he simply figure to hang on to a core of loyal Republican supporters, attract a slice of other mainstream voters, and finish first in a punishing three-way brawl with the Texas independent and Bill Clinton. With Perot's decision to desert the battle, the campaign has reverted to a conventional two-man struggle.

And the outcome is likely to turn on which candidate the American voters trust more to revitalize the economy and break through the policy gridlock in Washington. By November. the stunning foreign policy successes of Bush's first term are likely to recede even further from the electorate's memory.

Instead, the economy is almost certain to be the singular issue on which most voters will decide who should occupy the Oval Office for the next four years.

The wobbly recovery defines the dimensions of Bush's dilemma. It is now clear the White House cannot count on a swift economic rebound to shift voters' attention to other issues by Nov. 3. That is especially true in recession-battered California, whose 54 electoral votes are a key element in any winning strategy.

Consequently, Bush's mission now is to articulate an agenda of real economic reform and persuade voters that his is a more effective alternative than Clinton's promise of moderate Democratic-style change. At the same time, the president must hold the Democratic majorities in the Senate and House accountable for the indefensible lack of progress on such paramount economic problems as the deficit.

Perot's sudden abandonment of the cam-paign betrays millions of disaffected voters who put their faith in his folksy pledge to clean out the barn of politics as usual in Washington.


That he succumbed so soon to the pressures of the campaign is a tell indication that, despite his considerable achievements as a businessman, he was not suited to grapple with the vast responsibilities and leadership demands of the Oval Office.

He seemed to grasp that reality himself when he acknowledged: "I don't have any drive to be president of the United States."

Perot's withdrawal - and the casual air with which he walked away from his followers - also confirms his reputation as an impulsive billionaire who tackles new challenges with fervor but forsakes his commitments promptly when things don't go his way. The rigorous winnowing process of the presidential campaign trail has served a useful purpose in making this trait apparent

The independent Texan's naive vision of suspending the two-party system and resolving the nation's complex problems through televised town hall meetings never was a plausible plan of governance. And although he was extraordinarily adept at articulating in plain terms the frustrations most Americans feel about politics in Washington, his campaign never matured beyond the brief, vaguely defined replies on issues that he served up in TV interviews.

For a few short weeks in this turbulent political year. Perot held out a simplistic political idea that seduced millions of voters. Now it is up to George Bush and Bill Clinton to provide substantive alternatives that also can restore the hope and native idealism of the American electorate.

Bill Clinton and Ross Perot reconfirmed an old Frontier and Great Society. political adage: When an irresistible force meets an immovable object, one of them gets to go home early.

The stubborn and insufferably impérious irresistible force of Perot collided head on with the immovable Clinton, that scandal-scarred ugly duckling now being transformed into a graceful swan, and Perot got an early dinner.

But what a masterful con job this countrifled P.T. Barnum laid on us. He parlayed all of those Time, U.S. News & World Report and the Sunday New York Times Magazine cover stories and appearances on the talk show of his electronic court Jester, Larry King, into an Andy Warhol moment of fame.

He actually convinced us that he was serious about being president. Then, when he realized he couldn't be coronated, he quit.

That's the essential difference between Democrats and Republicans. With Republicans, politics is a mission. With Democrats, politics is a



GOP opens fire on Clinton's record

WASHINGTON - The 1992 presidential campaign might come down to a question of public vs. private morality.

Utah Sen. Jake Garn, playing the role of surrogate smearer for the White House. recently fired the opening salvo of what promises to be a long and bloody GOP campaign in the fall. As a warm-up act for President Bush at a Brigham Young University rally, Garn attacked Clinton's draft record

and personal character. While the White House thinks it has an oldie-but-goodie in Clinton's draft record, the Democrats can brandish a morality issue of their own in the fall campaility for the \$500 billion savings and loan scandal.

Garn himself had more than a cameo role in this morality play. As chairman of the Senate Banking Committee in 1962. he co-authored the law that deregulated the savings and loan industry, opening the floodgates for the high-fliers who ul-

timately bankrupted the industry. Garn's hand-picked choice for chairman of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, M. Danny Wall, was forced to resign in December 1989 for his role in misleading Congress — until after the 1968 elections — about the scope of the crisis. Prior to becoming the nation's chief savings and loan regulator, Wall worked under Garn as staff director of the Senate Banking Committee.

Wall was also accused of keeping the politically wired Lincoln Savings and Loan owned by now jailed ex-executive Charles Keating - open some two years after it had been judged to be unaound.

"There's no one else in the history of the U.S. government who we could say, by his personal judgment, precipitated billion-dollar losses to taxpayers," Jim Leach, a Republican representative from lows, said of Wall. Garn vigorously and personally lobbled former President Reagan for Wall's appointment.

The Democrats have determined not to repeat their mistake of 1988 when they were muzzled on the biggest financial debacle in U.S. history. Democratic National Committee Chairman Ron Brown recently said the party is spending \$30,000 to investigate George Bush's financial dealings, especially his role in the S&L crisis. Special attention will be trained on Bush's son Neil, who has already been reprimanded for his role in the collapse of Silverado Savings and Loan in Colorado.

The dirt-digging stands in sharp contrast to past Democratic campaigns, in which they have normally shunned such tactics. Republicans, of course, have a long track record of successful opposition research.

If the Democrata make an issue of the thrift crisis, it would represent a departure from the Dukakis strategy of 1968 to play down the crisis, since there were villains on both sides of the political sisle. William Seidman, former chairman of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., watched the industry collapse from the inside, and believes neither party wanted the issue vetted in the last campaign.

"With a disaster like this going on. normally the Democrats would have been acreaming, 'Look at what the Reagan ad-ministration did.' But they never mentioned it," Seidman said. "The reason is that they had Charife Keating. Jim Wright, and all this stuff the Republicans could dive into - and were ready to dive into, if the subject was

brought up. Although there's no evidence that leaders of the parties engaged in a conspiracy of stlence. Seidman notes that Republicans and Democrats were coming to him for information so they would be armed to the teeth should the issue surface.

WASHINGTON - Anti-abortion forces say Vice President Dan Quayle didn't damage his relationship with them even though he promised to support his daughter if, as an adult, she chose to have an abortion.

And while pro-choice forces sought to exploit Quayle's remark, leaders on both sides of the divisive debate agreed Thursday that the incident demonstrated how complex the issue can be when viewed on a personal level.

"Watching the vice president, clearly his statement was painful." said Rep. Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., a pro-choice advocate and co-chairwoman of the Democratic Party's platform

'Would you want your daughter to have an abortion? No. Would you want your daughter to need an abortion? No. But faced with reality, there are times when people have to make this difficult choice," she said.

Pentagon criticizes U.S. government

WASHINGTON - Newly released Pentagon studies sharply criticize the U.S. government's efforts to locate American POWs and MIAs in Southeast Asia, saying investigators too often doubted live-sighting reports.

One study concluded that the Defense Intelligence Agency's POW-MIA Center personnel "were burdened and frustrated with the flood of evidence and tended toward disposal rather than analysis."

There is information, even in our limited sample, which establishes the strong possibility of American prisoners of war being held in Laos and Vietnam," said a 1986 report by a task force headed by retired Air Force Lt. Gen. Eugene Tighe, a former director of the Defense Intelligence Agency.

Another 1986 report said Pentagon personnel often had "a mindset to debunk" evidence that surfaced about possible POWs or MIAs still in Southeast Asia.

Murderer executed in Virginia

JARRATT, Va. — A man who stabbed a police informant at least 184 times and hacked a tic-tac-toe design in her back with a machete was executed in Virginia's electric chair.

Edward B. Fitzgerald Sr. extended the first two fingers of each hand as if in a peace gesture as he was strapped into the chair late Thursday. He did not speak.

Fitzgerald, 34, said Wednesday he had instructed his lawyers ot to pursue last-minute appeals "unless it was something that was going to work." None was filed.

Fitzgerald was convicted of the 1980 rape and murder of Patricia D. Cubbage, a 22-year-old reputed drug dealer and police informant who was found dead in Chesterfield County, south of Richmond.

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands — The AIDS epidemic devastating many developing nations makes the crisis in the West seem small by comparison, according to accounts at the world AIDS

While a gay activist from New York complained about inadequate health care for Americans with AIDS, African social spoke Thursday of poorly equipped hospitals flooded with AIDS patients on the verge of death.

Continued from Page 1A awards money to agencies and organizations which provide services to needy, handicapped and elderly people.

Commissioners made recommendations to award \$437,700 to four agencies and decided to lesue no grants to five other organisations Thursday.

Spending recommendations for another 10 programs won't be firmed until today. Commissioner Pat Warren was absent Thursday. Her recommendations will decide the outcome of grants for 10 programs. Warren said she missed agency presentations Thursday because her husband Luther was ill.

Nineteen agencies and organizations requested a total of about \$1.5 million from CSBG program. Last year, commissioners awarded 8672,312 in grants.

Each commissioner makes recommendations for grants to agencies on a tally sheet. Then. budget director Jean Kassab determines the grant awards by first eliminating the smallest recommendation. She then establishes the grant based on the next lowest amount, unless a consensus by three commissioners supports a specific higher flaure.

Commissioner Bob Sturm proved to be the most generous with his grant recommendations this year. Sturm recommended

awarding 18 grants for a total of \$775,000. Commissioner Fred Streetman was second-highest in his recommended spending with 8678,500 for 12 programs. Commissioner Larry Furlong came in third with \$672,500 for nine grants.

Commissioner Jennifer Kelley was fourth with recommending \$671,312 be divided among 14 agencies. Warren said she would seek to keep the grants at the same level as last year.

Of the grants approved Thursday, the Seminole Community Mental Health Center, which has services in Sanford, sought \$482.935 to pay for increased Baker Act local match requirements, provide transpor-tation for 48 residents to treatment facilities and other services. But commissioners decided to keep their grant level for the mental health agency at the \$290,000 level as last year.

The mental health center also receives more than 85 million from federal and state sources.





House clamps price restraints on cable TV

WASHINGTON — Consumer outrage over cable television prices and the quality of service led to overwhelming approval of a House bill to re-regulate the industry.

The measure, approved 340-73 on Thursday, requires that companies offer basic service under a price formula set by the Federal Communications Commission, and conform to a range of other provisions designed to prevent cable from taking advantage of the monopoly status it enjoys in almost every community.

Congressional researchers say cable TV prices have risen more than 50 percent since the industry was deregulated in late 1986.

The House measure and aimilar legislation approved by the Senate in January go to a conference committee that will work out differences for final approval by both chambers.

Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., who wrote the House bill, said the final version will be on President Bush's desk well before the November election.

White House advisers have recommended a veto, but both the House vote and the Senate's 73-18 approval are well beyond two-thirds majority needed to override a veto.

"This is another strong indication the administration doesn't understand how people feel about cable and its need for regulation," Markey

In both chambers, substitute bills favored by

the White House were offered and defeated by narrower margins, which are being viewed by some as a better indication of how a veto override vote would go.

Both Democratic and Republican lawmakers said during debate that the best solution to rising cable rates is competition.

The FCC cleared the way earlier this month for telephone companies to get into the video service, but the day consumers will be able to dial up TV programming is still years away.

In an effort to further foster competition, the House passed an amendment 338-68 offered by Rep. Billy Tauxin, D-La., that prevents cable-affiliated programmers from denying programs to cable's competitors.

National Cable Television Association President

James P. Mooney reacted by saying. "The House has taken an excessive bill and made it worse."

But the United States Interactive and Microwave Television Association, which represents the only significant competition to cable, hailed Tauxin's provision as an opportunity for their tiny industry to grow.

"It means the wireless cable operator will be able to offer consumers quality video programming at a fair price and will be able to compete head to head with the cable operators," said Lynnea Bylund Dalton, chair of USIMTA's board.

'USDA prime' may contain cheaper cuts

WASHINGTON — Meat shoppers should be asking "where's the beef?" according to federal investigators who say packages labeled USDA "choice" or "prime" may actually contain cheaper cuts — or even pig's ears.

A report obtained by The Associated Press says Agriculture Department regulators are failing to inspect most retailers to be sure that USDA's labels accurately describe the grade of beef on grocery store shelves.

And when regulators find problems, they have failed to crack down on violators, the report said.

"Consumers may be misled and overcharged by retailers." said the Agriculture Department inspector general's report, which the AP obtained under the Freedom of Information Act.

But the regulators say they're discouraged because federal prosecutors — swamped with drug and corruption cases — are unwilling to pursue smaller consumer-fraud cases.

The investigators reviewed

what retailers do with boxed and graded meat shipped to them from packers. The beef is broken into family-sized portions, priced, labeled and stocked in meat cases.

Inspectors from the 1930A's

Inspectors from the USDA's Agricultural Marksting Service are supposed to make sure that the ment for sale is properly labeled. When it's not, they are supposed to refer violators for prosecution.

But according to the March.

But according to the March 1992 report, the marketing service "could not provide adequate assurances that meat products are being properly labeled and advertised."

Other violations included improperly applying beef grade labels to pork or other "nonbeef" products, including ox tails, pork ribs, pig's feet, tails and ears.

"In many instances," the investigators said, "retailers advertised or affixed a higher quality grade label to beef products than could be substantiated by the grade or quality of products held in storage."

Mark Silberteld Weshington

Mark Silbergeld, Washington office director of Consumers Union, non-profit publisher of Consumer Reports, denounced the labeling practices.

"In this economy, people can't afford this kind of fraud," Silbergeld said. "It's money out of consumers" pockets when they so to the meat counter."

they go to the meat counter."

The USDA Prime, Choice and Select grades apply only to beef and are supposed to reflect the "palatability level" of the meat, taking into account factors that affect tenderness, juiciness and flavor. Prime is the top of the line, followed by Choice, then Select.

The report said that in 1990, the marketing service conducted just 694 grade-labeling inspections out of an estimated 200,000 retailers nationwide. Violations were found in more than 12 percent of these inspec-

USDA officials contend that the violations were mostly at small stores that account for a tiny share of the nation's meat sales.

But the auditors said the records they reviewed showed that a chain of Pennsylvania supermarkets continued to label its meat products improperly after an initial inspection disclosed violations, yet the case was never referred for prosecu-

Both USDA Prime and USDA Choice labels were affixed to products when there was only lower-graded or ungraded beef in cold storage. Regulators say that a store generally should have in storage what it has on the

The agency's regulators acknowledged the problem, but said their staffs had become discouraged because U.S. prosecutors are rejuctant to take their cases.
