

GLASS PLACES CREDIT BILL UP TO SENATE

Measure To Produce Funds To Relieve Depression Started On Legislative Way

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—(A.P.)—Emergency legislation opening the vaults of the Treasury and the federal reserve bank for the expansion of the nation's credit was started through Congress yesterday with formal introduction in the Senate and House.

Senator Glass, Democrat, Virginia, put the bill before the Senate with a statement saying "It is not intended for will it be used for excessive inflation of the currency."

Chairman Staggall of the Democratic House committee dropped the measure in the House yesterday. Today hearings will be begun before the Senate Banking Committee. Leaders of both parties are supporting the bill.

Last night it was disclosed that the first week of President Hoover's anti-inflation campaign saw a decrease of \$5,000,000 in the amount of money in circulation in the country, indicating that part of it at least had come out of hiding to return to the channels of commerce.

The federal reserve board's weekly statement said that total money in circulation for the week ending Wednesday was \$5,825,000,000, an amount \$1,032,000,000 greater than on the corresponding date a year ago. This circumstance was attributed chiefly to hoarding as there has been no legitimate business call for such an increase in currency.

The primary purpose of the legislation is to loosen redoubt restrictions of the federal reserve system and make additional classes of paper eligible for that treatment. The bill provides that five banks must combine in giving a promissory note when securities not now eligible are redoubted. Six of the eight members of the federal reserve board must approve the transaction.

For a one-year period the \$18,000,000,000 in direct obligations of the United States would be made acceptable as collateral for new loans.

In "exceptional and exigent circumstances" within a one-year period, federal reserve banks would be authorized to make advances to member banks on time or demand promissory notes "secured in the satisfaction" of the bank on paper not now eligible for redoubting.

All in all, the legislation paves the way for the redemption of billions in sound securities now held by banks but not eligible for redoubting.

Another important effect is the release of nearly a billion dollars worth of gold held by the Treasury and not now needed as reserve against bank notes in circulation. It is planned that this be used to certify the gold status of the federal reserve banks rather than for an expansion of currency.

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—(A.P.)—Meteorologists counted on a cold wave from Canada today to put an end to the freakish weather in the Middle West that brought strong winds to some sections and heavy rain to others.

At least five deaths were attributed directly or indirectly to the storm. Fifteen small buildings were damaged by a 60-mile-an-hour wind in Chicago and Cincinnati.

Reports of other deaths were received from St. Louis, where a woman was killed by a falling chimney.

TRAMMELL WILL OPPOSE PARRISH IN SENATE RACE

Citizen Of Melbourne Declares Candidacy For State Office

Clyde G. Trammell, former mayor of Melbourne and one of its leading attorneys, today announced his candidacy for the office of state senator from the 37th District, subject of the decision of the voters in the June primaries. He is a former representative of Brevard county in the state legislatures of 1929 and 1931.

In making his formal announcement for the Senate, Mr. Trammell said: "I know that taxes must be reduced by lowering the cost of the operation of the State, County, and City governments and otherwise, so that it will be profitable to own real estate, and encourage home ownership, and especially so in the case of the Florida automobile. If nominated and elected I pledge my honest and best efforts and all the power of the office to that end."

Mr. Trammell says he feels that a public office is a public trust, and that a public officer, in fairness to himself and to the state, should so act as to express the best judgment of a majority of its people. "I assure you that such will be my ambition and aim, if honored by this political elevation," he said.

Born at Lakeland in 1892, Mr. Trammell is the son of E. R. Trammell, of that city, one of the four men who gave Lakeland its name. E. R. Trammell was for 35 years a locomotive engineer for the Atlantic Coast Line railroad, and an outstanding member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

Mr. Trammell attended high school at Lakeland, graduated from that institution as well as the University of Florida. He practiced law at Lakeland until 1917 when he entered the army, serving as a commissioned officer in France during the World War. After being mustered out of service, he spent two years in Dallas, Texas, where he was assistant general attorney for the Southern Surety Co. in Texas. He returned to Florida and located at Melbourne in 1923, and was mayor of that city in 1924. He is prominent in civic and fraternal organizations, and is married and has one son.

ABOLITION OF TRUST LAW IS BEING TALKED

Governmental Regulation Would Be Successor To Statute Restricting Trade

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—A choice between strict governmental regulation and a continuance of the present hampering restrictions of the anti-trust laws has been offered by the administration to industries seeking to free themselves from the depressive effects of destructive cut-throat competition.

Frankly friendly to all efforts at revision of the statutes prohibiting combinations in restraint of trade, President Hoover and his advisors, nevertheless, are convinced that if this is done, federal supervision of the resultant commercial activities must be instituted.

Two movements to eliminate harmful competition both running counter to the Sherman law were brought to Hoover's attention yesterday. At almost the same time, a House committee decided to ask authority for an investigation aimed at the revision of this statute for the purpose of improving business.

A group of 122 business men gathered here as independent business executives to study methods of economic rehabilitation presented the President with proposals for a two-year "trust" in competition, directed by a national board, with a non-partisan investigation of business conditions filling the interim. The President asked them to reconsider, and cited the anti-trust laws as the principal barrier to their plan.

Then, John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, brought to the White House a petition asking Hoover to lend a helping hand forward the enactment of legislation.

Peddling Neckties

A Little Chat With The Secretary Of The Seminole County Chamber Of Commerce

The woods in Florida are full of peddlers, peddling everything, from "alleged" advertising on stage curtains, book covers, trick and fancy signs, touring guides, air guides, blindfold automobile drivers, down to shoes, and even neckties. The latest peddler to work his tactics on people of Seminole County was selling "Quality \$2.00 neckties", at three for a dollar. He lugged his boxes around Sanford for a couple of days, and too many folks bought these "Quality \$2.00 neckties". The Billboard and other publications that circulate among peddlers and "pitch men" advertise plenty of firms, mostly in New York, who sell these so-called "quality neckties" at from 85c to \$1.50 a dozen. Anyone who thinks he bought a \$2.00 necktie for 33 1-3c this week is just kidding himself. Stores in Seminole County that carry cheap merchandise have similar neckties retailing at from 10c to 50c, and they are worth about what the stores ask for them. If a fellow really wants to wear a \$2.00 necktie he will have to pay \$2.00 for it. We shall not find them being sold at 33 1-3c by reputable dealers or even by peddlers.

A peddler is no asset to the community. He sells cheap merchandise at cheap prices, prices no cheaper than the same quality merchandise can be purchased regularly from local merchants. He gets his few dollars and is gone. He has made no contribution to the upbuilding and development of this community.

Keep Seminole County dollars moving at home. The local merchant helps pay our taxes, keeps up local payrolls, keeps the dollars circulating where they will do some good. The dollars are worth something to you only as they are kept circulating here at home.

STOCK MARKET ADVANCES WITH GREAT ACTIVITY

Leading Stocks Push Up From Two To 7 Dollars Per Share

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—(A.P.)—Wall Street again experienced the thrill yesterday of a sudden resurgence of security values, coming unexpectedly in the midst of a particularly dark hour.

The proposal to revise federal reserve banking practices in a manner designed to restore normal banking services to the nation's business was widely proclaimed in highest banking quarters as one of the most promising steps yet taken to combat the paralyzing effect of excessive deflation.

The stock market, which had been slowly sinking during the past week into new depths for the last decade, went quickly upward. Price averages indicated that some \$2,000,000,000 was restored to quoted values in the New York stock markets. Leading stocks pushed up \$2 to \$7 a share, with some making even wider gains. Bonds and leading commodities responded less spectacularly, but registered substantial advances.

Walter E. Fraw, chairman of the Corn Exchange bank, said he considered the proposal "one of the most constructive steps undertaken by the administration and Congress during this depression. The broadening of the lending facilities of the federal reserve system."

Action Is Centered On Woosung Front With Chinese Holding On Stubbornly

(By The Associated Press) Japanese warships and artillery swung into action on the Woosung front soon after today's brief truce expired. They bombarded the village and fort where the Chinese are still hanging on stubbornly and machine gun sections on both sides of the river picked away at each other with a sharp crossfire.

The Japanese said their men killed considerable numbers of the force on the opposite bank and each side accused the other of having started the fighting again.

A new movement for peace through the mediation of Nelson Johnson, United States minister to China and British and French ministers was begun by Chinese merchants. They fully sought the extension of the mercy truce which went into effect for a short time for the evacuation of non-combatants and wounded from Chapel. China appealed for a special meeting of the League of Nations assembly at Geneva to consider its charges against Japan. It appeared likely, however, the assembly will not be called for several days.

Luis Zolusta, foreign minister of Spain, proposed total abolition of military aviation and internationalization of civil aviation to the world disarmament conference at Geneva and joined spokesmen of great powers in urging outlawing all arms of aggressive nature.

SHANGHAI, Feb. 12.—(A.P.)—The Japanese high command determined today to reduce the stubborn Chinese forts at Woosung with 600-pound aerial bombs.

Two weeks of dogged resistance by the Chinese in the Shanghai-Woosung area have convinced the Japanese staff that the only way to reach a decision is by a large scale military operation, and these bombs, capable of causing terrible destruction, will prepare the way for assault lines of infantrymen with bayonets.

When the zero hour will come remained a secret, but it will be soon. The expected arrival of more reinforcements from Japan to swell the already strong attacking force was one of the factors that held up the action today.

Already 40 Japanese warships and transports have been jammed into the Yangtze estuary. When the engagement starts, the Japanese will be involved in one of the largest military actions since the Russo-Japanese war.

Peace was insured in the Chapel area of Shanghai between the hours of 8 A. M. and noon today through the activity of Father.

104 Indictments Are Returned By Court

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 12.—(A.P.)—A hundred and four indictments against men and distilleries charging conspiracy to violate the prohibition act were handed down by the federal grand jury investigating operations of alleged far flung international rum ring.

Federal agents claim they have evidence that indicates Al Capone is the directing head of the smugglers and runners that purchased liquor in Canada, shipped it to New Orleans, British Honduras, where it was re-shipped to Louisiana, Mississippi, and the Gulf Coast and then smuggled to the interior of the United States.

The alleged ring was uncovered in a series of raids last spring when seven men were arrested and an outlaw radio station was seized near here. The government claims to have evidence backed by 200 witnesses.

BISMARCK, N. D., Feb. 12.—(A.P.)—Gov. Franklin D. Roosevelt's name was filed yesterday for the state primary election as a Democratic presidential nominee. The Republican candidacy of Congressman L. T. McPadden of Pennsylvania also was filed. Joseph I. France, former United States senator from Maryland, recently filed as a progressive Republican.

The state preferential primary election will be held Mar. 15 and the deadline for filing names of candidates is Feb. 13.

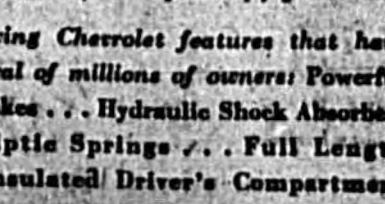
