

FRANCE'S GOLD STOCK REACHES HIGHEST POINT

As Result Franc Now Appears As World's Soundest Currency

PARIS, Feb. 12—Gold coverage for France's bank notes circulation appears to stand at 85 per cent of the total stock, figured on the last balance sheet of the Bank of France at \$2,009,000,000, a weekly increase of almost \$40,000,000, the country's circulation being \$3,015,000. This is the highest coverage yet reached in France.

Of course with such an enormous gold stock supporting the franc, it could be considered as the world's soundest currency. But, as some economists point out, the gold of the Bank of France can not be looked upon as stable for the bank. In great part it is made up of refugee capital, whose tide may turn if conditions change. GOTHAM WRITERS ARE ASSAULTED IN MINING AREAS

Novelists Had Taken Food To Destitute Coal Field People

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 12.—(AP)—Exhibiting injuries they said were the result of a visit to the Kentucky coal fields, two members of a group of New York writers who went to Pineville to give food to destitute miners returned here yesterday, but their story is being disputed by officials at Pineville.

Appeals have been made to cut expenses, but heretofore sparing any headway has been made in this direction. Almost half of the expenditure is swallowed by the editorial debt and war pensions. About a third is taken by military defense. Reliance on the part of the government to ask Parliament for conversion of interest on internal debts has reduced it extremely difficult to make both ends meet.

High tariffs on imported goods last year summed about \$30,000,000, but this revenue has been de-

creased. The financial prosperity is complete. The balance of payments and an adverse commercial balance are strongly unfavorable, while the budget is hard to balance.

Parliament is now facing the difficult task of voting the 1932 budget before the beginning of the fiscal year, April 1. Only two months remain. Estimates have been set by the Chamber's Finance Committee at \$1,500,000,000 in receipts with expenditure of \$1,619,500,000. This apparent balance has been achieved by the utmost effort, thanks to some re-estimates which the Minister of Finance called "exceptional" and not to be counted upon in the next budget. No possibility of an increase in taxes is seen here.

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Boxing To Mix With Baby Godwin At Daytona Feb. 17



Reputed Gambler Slain By Woman In Miami Apartment

Miami, Feb. 12.—(A.P.)—R. O. Allison, 25, reputed gambler was shot to death in an apartment here Tuesday and a woman looked as his wife was held as the slayer.

Police said she admitted the slaying but gave no reason, saying only that she shot "as long as the gun would fire." One bullet struck Allison in the back and punctured his lung. The others missed him. No formal charge had been placed against the woman last night.

Thomas E. Shea, sought by police for a time, surrendered but was not held. He said he was in the apartment when the woman, also known as Juanita Kempton, started firing. He said he fled the first shot. He said he was a New York attorney.

G. W. Mathews told officers he left the room just before the shooting. He said Allison and Shea were discussing the division of money when he left. Officers found \$94 cash and diamond ring on the table.

Allison died in a hospital. He made no statement. Officers said they were told his mother, Mrs. W. H. Allison, lived in Moultrie, Ga. A brother, U. S. Allison, lives in Belle Glade.
